### LSU RENEWS RIVALRY WITH LOUISIANA-LAFAYETTE

LSU, ranked No. 19 in the nation in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll and No. 21 by the Associated Press, renews its football rivalry with Louisiana-Lafayette on Saturday as the Tigers host the Cajuns at 7 p.m. in Tiger Stadium. The game will serve as the Homecoming contest for LSU and it will mark the first meeting between the Tigers and the Cajuns since a 32-0 LSU victory in 1938. LSU enters the contest coming off a 31-13 Southeastern Conference victory over Mississippi State last week, while ULL beat UAB, 34-0, in its last game on Sept. 21. LSU is 49-25-3 all-time in Homecoming games and the Tigers hold a 19-0 series leads over the Cajuns. LSU enters the ULL game rated No. 4 in the nation in both total defense (235 ypg) and pass defense (131.2 ypg). Through its first four games, LSU has held each of its opponents to fewer than 250 yards per contest.

### **DOMINANT DAVIS LEADS LSU PAST MISS. STATE, 31-13**

Domanick Davis returned a punt 78 yards for a TD and rushed for 122 yards and another score as the Tigers rolled past Mississippi State, 31-13. Davis gave the Tigers a 7-0 lead on his punt return just two minutes into the game. MSU responded with a field goal and a TD to take a 10-7 advantage early in the second quarter. Davis hit paydirt with a 5-yard plunge to give the Tigers a 14-10 lead at halftime. The second half belonged to LSU as the Tigers stretched the lead to 21-10 on a 39-yard TD pass from Matt Mauck to Devery Henderson. Mauck capped the scoring for LSU with a 2-yard run midway through the fourth quarter. For the game, Davis finished with a 286 all-purpose yards, which included 128 yards on punt returns. The Tigers piled up 256 yards rushing, while limiting MSU to only 88 yards on the ground and 249 total yards.



# NICK SABAN

HEAD COACH . THIRD YEAR

You can call LSU head coach Nick Saban the complete package. Brought to Baton Rouge following the 1999 season to revive what many considered a sleeping giant, Saban has transformed the LSU football program into one that wins championships, while graduating players at the same time.

Armed with a plan that gives his players a chance to be successful on the field as well as the classroom, Saban's impact on the program has been immediate and it's been powerful.

In just two short years at LSU's head coach, Saban's on-field success has been unmatched as he has guided the Tigers to 18 victories, a pair of bowl wins, including one in a BCS game, and the 2001 Southeastern Conference title.

Off the field, Saban has spearheaded a fundraising effort that has raised more than \$15 million for a state-of-the-art academic center for student-athletes. The new LSU Academic Center for Student-Athletes is all part of Saban's plan to give his players the best opportunity to best successful when they finish their football career.

Saban didn't waste anytime making his impact felt as the he guided a team coming off back-to-back losing seasons to an 8-4 mark and a win over 15th-ranked Georgia Tech in the Peach Bowl to rekindle the fire of a proud football tradition in Baton Rouge.

Saban's influence on the Tigers went much further in 2001 as he led LSU to the school's first outright Southeastern Conference title since 1986 with a 31-20 win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC title game and followed that win a 47-34 victory over Illinois in the Sugar Bowl, LSU's first New Year's Day Bowl win since 1968.

Beating Tennessee to win the league title is one thing, but the fashion in which Saban and the Tigers did so speaks volumes on the impact he has had on his squad. Playing without two of their offensive standouts, quarterback Rohan Davey and running back LaBrandon Toefield, not only did the Tigers respond to Saban's challenge to step up, they were dominant, outscoring the high-powered Vols offense 21-3 in the second half. LSU's defense allowed just 50 yards rushing.

Losing Davey and Toefield and still overcoming the adversity to win the title game, or any game for that matter, has been a trademark of Saban-coached teams. Teaching the players to trust and believe in each other has been a characteristic that Saban has branded on his squad. Saban preached to his team to play for 60 minutes, to become a dominant team on every play of every game, and to not worry about what the scoreboard read. The players responded.

After the Tigers dropped a 35-24 decision to Ole Miss in Baton Rouge in late October, LSU was practically counted out of the SEC Western Division race. Saban, however, pressed on saying the Tigers would continue to focus on getting better, playing one game at a time, and not worrying about anybody but the next opponent. It worked as the Tigers began to peak during their November run, a stretch that saw LSU win at Alabama, then beat nationally-ranked foes Arkansas and Auburn at home to advance to the SEC title game.

The win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC Championship game and then No. 7 Illinois in the Sugar Bowl were just two more steps along the way for the Tigers as Saban continues to restore the winning tradition to an LSU program that will soon be a fixture among the nation's elite in college football.

Prior to LSU, Saban spent five years as the head coach at Michigan State, where he built the Spartans into a perennial BigTen contender after going to four bowl games in five seasons.

### IN THE POLLS

LSU moved up to No. 19 in the coaches poll and to No. 21 in the AP poll following the 31-13 victory over Mississippi State on Saturday. Louisiana-Lafayette is not ranked in either poll. LSU has been ranked in 11 consecutive top 25 polls dating back to last season. Under Nick Saban, LSU is 8-4 as a ranked team and the Tigers are 7-5 against Top 25 teams.

### **LSU-ULL TIES**

LSU's assistant strength & conditioning coach Will Jones is a 1998 graduate of Louisiana-Lafayette and played defensive back for the Ragin' Cajun football team for four years ... The Tigers also have four players that call Lafayette their hometown: senior placekicker John Corbello, senior offensive tackle Michael Dupuis, freshman tight end Kory Hebert and senior cornerback Jeremy Shealy ... Current Cajun Derace James played at LSU for one year before transferring to UL-Lafayette.

### **HOMECOMING**

LSU is 49-25-3 in homecoming games and have won six of the last seven times. This will be the first time Louisiana-Lafayette will be the Tigers opponent for homecoming and the first time LSU will play an in-state team at homecoming.

### **IN-STATE RIVALS**

LSU is 119-25-1 against teams from Louisiana on the football field, including a perfect 19-0 against Louisiana-Lafayette. The Tigers have won 13 straight games against in-state teams dating back to 1982 when Tulane defeated LSU 31-28 on Nov. 27th in Tiger Stadium.

### **JUST CALL HIM DOMINANT DAVIS**

To borrow a line from a local newspaper, you can call LSU senior all-purpose threat Dominant Davis. Last week against Mississippi State, Davis recorded a career-best 286 all-purpose yards, which included a 78-yard punt return for a touchdown and a career-high tying 122 yards rushing. Davis' career-high of 286 all-purpose yards moved his season average to an SEC-best of 197.2 yards per game. Davis' average ranks second in the nation, less than one yard behind Michael Turner of Northern Illinois (198.0). Through four games, Davis has 280 yards rushing, 43 yard receiving, 313 punt return yards and 153 kickoff return yards. This year, Davis has touched the ball 77 times - 51 rushing, 16 punt returns, 6 kickoff returns and 4 receptions and he's averaging a remarkable 10.2 yards every time he touches the ball.

### **TAKING NOTE**

LSU is now 8-4 in September under Nick Saban after last weeks win over Mississippi State ... The Tigers are 14-3 at home under Saban, which includes a 7-1 non-conference mark and a 11-2 record at night ... The Tigers are 5-1 under Saban in games decided by 7 points or less and an impressive 18-1 under Saban when leading at halftime ... The Tigers are 17-1 under Saban when leading after the third quarter ... LSU is also 16-0 under Saban when they score at least 30 points in a game and 22-1 under Saban when they score 20 or more points ... LSU is 10-0 under Saban when having a 100-yard rusher.

### **HOME SWEET HOME**

LSU enters Saturday's game with Louisiana-Lafayette riding a six-game winning streak at Tiger Stadium. The Tigers have not lost a home since Oct. 27, 2001, 35-24, to Ole Miss. The streak includes wins over Middle Tennessee, Alabama, Auburn, The Citadel, Miami (Ohio) and Mississippi State. The six-game home winning streak is the longest for the Tigers since LSU won six straight games spanning over the 2000 and 2001 seasons. Florida snapped LSU's six-game home winning streak last year with a 44-15 win over the Tigers.

### NO OPENING DRIVE TDS ALLOWED HERE

LSU ran its streak of keeping the opposition out of the endzone on its first possession of the game to six straight against Mississippi State. The streak includes all four games this year as well as the Tigers' final two games of the 2001 season. The last time an opponent scored on its opening possession against LSU came against Auburn on Dec. 1 of last year.

### **FIRST QUARTER SUCCESS**

LSU's defense has yielded only 10-first quarter points this season. A field goal that came

with 30 second left in the opening quarter at Virginia Tech on Sept. 1 and a field goal with 5:38 remaining by Mississippi State last week. Over the past six first quarters, which dates back to the final two games last year, LSU has only given up 10 first quarter points (7 to Virginia Tech and 3 to Mississippi State). In those six opening quarters, the Tigers have outscored the opponents 48-10.

### LSU DEFENSE LEADS SEC; RANKED NO. 4 IN NATION

LSU enters Saturday's game leading the SEC and ranked No. 4 in the nation in total defense by allowing only 235.0 yards per game. The Tigers are allowing 103.8 yards rushing per game and 131.2 yards passing a contest. The 131.2 passing yards leads the SEC and ranks fourth in the nation as well.

### LSU "D" CONTINUES TO BE STINGY

LSU's defense has held all four of its opponents to under 250 yards of total offense this season, a streak that is the longest of its kind since 1970. Last week, the Tigers limited Mississippi State to 249 yards of offense. LSU's current streak of holding four straight opponents to fewer than 250 yards of offense matches the 1970 Tiger team that did it against Texas A&M (230 yards), Rice (182), Baylor (220) and Pacific (126). Kentucky snapped the streak in by picking up 271 yards in a 14-7 LSU victory.

### 100-YARD GAMES HAVE BEEN HARD TO COME BY AGAINST THE LSU "D"

LSU's defense ran its streak of not allowing a 100-yard rushing game to nine straight by limiting Mississippi State's top rusher to 38 yards on Saturday. The Tiger defense has not allowed an opponent to rush for 100 yards since the Middle Tennessee contest last Nov. 10. In that game, Dwone Hicks rushed for 117 yards in the 30-14 loss to the Tigers. LSU has not yielded a 100-yard rushing game to an SEC opponent since the season-finale in 2000 when Brandon Holmes rushed for 143 yards and 1 TD in Arkansas' 14-3 win over the Tigers. LSU has kept its last 10 SEC opponents without a 100-yard rusher.

### LSU'S PASS DEFENSE PASS THE TEST, AGAIN

LSU's pass defense, ranked first in the SEC and No. 4 in the nation, passed another test against Mississippi State on Saturday. The Bulldogs came into the game with the SEC's No. 4 passing offense (282 yards per game) and were 25th in the nation. LSU held MSU to just 161 yards on 16 of 43 passing and collected three interceptions in the 31-13 victory. The Tigers defense also passed a test against the Miami (Ohio) air attack. Miami entered the game on Sept. 14th averaging 273 yards per game and were held to 195 yards through the air. The RedHawks did manage to score the only passing touchdown of the year against the LSU defense.

### **LSU'S MAGIC NUMBER: 20**

One thing is almost certain and that's when the Tigers score at least 20 points they get a win. LSU enters Saturday's contest with a 21-1 mark under Saban when they score at least 20 points in a game. LSU was 8-0 in 2000, 10-1 in 2001 and they are 3-0 this season when reaching 20 points. The only loss during that span was a 35-24 defeat to Ole Miss last season. Dating back to last season, LSU has scored at least 20 points in 11 of its last 12 games. However, the Tigers are winless, 0-7, when not reaching the 20-point plateau under Saban.

### **30 ALSO MAGIC FOR SABAN'S TIGERS**

LSU is 15-0 under Nick Saban when they score at least 30 points. The Tigers posted a 4-0 mark in 2000 when scoring 30 or more, collected a 8-0 record last season and are 3-0 this season when putting at least 30 points on the board. In fact, LSU has won its last 17 games when scoring at least 30 points, including two wins in the 1999 season. The last time LSU lost a game in which 30 points where scored was Nov. 21, 1998 with Notre Dame defeated the Tigers 39-36 in South Bend.

### LSU GETS WIN IN SEC OPENER

The Tigers 31-13 victory over Mississippi State snapped a streak of three straight SEC opening-game losses for LSU. Before Saturday, the Tigers had not won the conference opener since 1998 when they defeated Auburn 31-19 on the Plains.

### GET "TOE" TO 100 AND THE TIGERS ARE TOUGH TO BEAT....

When it comes to LSU football and 100-yard rushing games, the Tigers have proven to be tough to beat. Seven times in his career, LaBrandon Toefield has rushed for 100 yards and seven times the Tigers have come away with a victory. Last week, Toefield rushed

for 111 yards in LSU's 33-7 win over Miami (Ohio). Five of Toefield's seven 100-yard rushing games have come in SEC action, including a 119-yard, 2-TD performance in LSU's 45-38 overtime win over Mississippi State in 2000. Overall, LSU is 163-25 all-time when having a 100-yard rusher, which includes an 9-0 mark under Nick Saban and a 14-0 mark against Mississippi State. LSU's last loss when having a 100-yard rusher came on Nov. 3, 1998, when Kevin Faulk posted 201 yards in a 22-16 loss to Alabama.

### .... AND THE SAME IS TRUE FOR "DOUBLE-D"

Domanick Davis recorded the fourth 100-yard rushing game of his career vs. Mississippi State with a career-best tying 122 yards on 18 carries. LSU is 4-0 when Davis reaches the 100-yard mark. Davis's 100-yard games have come against North Texas State (109 yards) in 1999, vs. Ole Miss (106 yards) in 2000, vs. Illinois (122 yards) in the 2002 Sugar Bowl and vs. Mississippi State.

### TOEFIELD CONTINUES TO CLIMB 100-YARD RECORD BOOK

With 111 yards against Miami (Ohio), LaBrandon Toefield moved into a fifth place tie with Steve Van Buren for most 100-yard games in a career with seven. Ranking ahead of Toefield in 100-yard games are Harvey Williams (8), Charles Alexander (16), Dalton Hilliard (20) and Kevin Faulk (22).

### CORBELLO RUNS STREAK TO EIGHT STRAIGHT; MOVES TO SECOND

John Corbello ran his streak of successful field goals to eight straight with a 26-yard kick against Mississippi State on Saturday. Corbello is a perfect 5-for-5 this year and he made his final three field goals last season. Corbello's streak would have been snapped in the fourth quarter against MSU as he missed a 19-yard attempt that banged off the right upright. However, MSU was offsides on the play and LSU decided to go for the TD after the penalty. Corbello earned SEC Special Teams Player of the Week following his school-record tying four field goals vs. Miami (Ohio). For his career, Corbello has converted 38 field goals, which ranks second in LSU history. David Browndyke holds the school record with 61 field goals.

### **GROUND GAME SCORES AGAIN**

LSU has recorded at least one rushing touchdown in 13 of the last 14 games. A streak of 12 straight games with a rushing touchdown came to halt in the Miami (Ohio) game, but LSU found the endzone on the ground again this past Saturday in the victory over Mississippi State. Before the Miami (Ohio) game, the last time the Tigers did not score a touchdown on the ground was Sept. 29, 2001 at Tennessee.

### **GAINING ON THE GROUND**

LSU's 293 rushing yards against The Citadel were the most in a game for the Tigers under head coach Nick Saban. The previous mark under Saban was 262 against Utah State last season. The last time LSU had at least 290 rushing yards was in 1999 against North Texas when the Tigers amassed 350 yards on the ground. In 29 games under Saban, the Tigers have rushed for 200 yards or more five times (Tulane and Utah State in 2001, The Citadel, Miami (Ohio) and Mississippi State in 2002) and they are 5-0 in those games.

### **GROUND ATTACK**

The Tigers have gained at least 200 yards on the ground in three straight games following the 256 net rushing yards on Saturday against Mississippi State. It is the first time since 1997 (Ole Miss, Kentucky and Alabama) an LSU team has rushed for over 200 yards in three straight games.

### SPREADING IT OUT

A trademark of the Jimbo Fisher offense is spreading the ball around and the Tigers have done a good job of that thru four games this year as 11 different players have caught at least one pass. Michael Clayton leads all LSU receivers with 18 receptions for 202 yards and two touchdowns. Of the 11 different receivers for the Tigers this year, six are wide outs, three are running backs, and two are tight ends. Last year, 15 different players caught passes for the Tigers and in 2000, 13 players caught at least one pass.

### YOUTH IN THE TRENCHES

LSU may have one of the youngest pairs of offensive and defensive lines in the nation this season. On the offensive side of the ball, the Tigers start a freshman, a sophomore,

pair of juniors and a single senior in the trenches. The defensive line starters consist of two true sophomores, a junior and a lone senior. When looking at the Tigers depth chart, LSU gets even younger. Four of the five offensive line backups are freshmen while only center John Young is older, a senior. Defensively, two juniors and two freshmen represent the second unit.

### SIX TRUE FRESHMEN HAVE SEEN ACTION

Through four games, six true freshmen - LB Cameron Vaughn, DL Kyle Williams, RB Jason Spadoni, OL Nate Livings, OL Terrance McGill and WR Skyler Green - have seen action for the Tigers. Vaughn and Williams have played in all four games this year, while Spadoni, Livings and McGill saw their first action against The Citadel and also played against Miami (Ohio) and Mississippi State. Green played his first game as a Tiger against MSU. In addition to the six true freshman that have played this year, nine other Tigers have seen action for the first time this year.

### **DEVERY GETS FIRST RECEIVING TD VS. STATE**

Converted running back Devery Henderson caught the first TD pass of his career against Mississippi State with a 36-yard reception from Matt Mauck. Henderson, who actually stumbled just before catching the pass, played running back for the Tigers for two years before moving to wide receiver last spring. The TD was the fourth of his career, three of which have come on the ground.

### WEBSTER MAKES HIS PICKS

Junior cornerback Corey Webster, a converted wide receiver, not only collected his first career interception against Mississippi State on Saturday, but tabbed his second too. Webster's first pick came late in third quarter when he returned a Kevin Fant pass 26-yards to set up a John Corbello field goal. His second came in the fourth quarter when he pulled a Fant pass down in the endzone to halt a MSU drive. Webster currently leads the SEC in interceptions with 0.67 a contest.

### ONE IF BY LAND, ONE IF BY PUNT RETURN

Domanick Davis recorded his fifth multi-touchdown game of his career on Saturday against Mississippi State. The senior running back/return specialist had a 78-yard punt return for a touchdown in the first quarter and later added a 5-yard touchdown run in the second quarter for his two scores. Davis' career-best is four touchdowns in a game when he rushed for four in the 2002 Sugar Bowl against Illinois.

### **TOE-ING THE LINE**

Junior running back LaBrandon Toefield is three touchdowns away from cracking the top five in career rushing touchdowns by an LSU player. Toefield has 26 career rushing touchdowns, while Harvey Williams and Garry James are tied for sixth place just one ahead of Toefield. Rondell Mealey and Terry Robiskie are tied for fourth with 29.

### "TOE" AND "DOUBLE D" TIGERS DYNAMIC DUO

LSU's backfield tandem of junior LaBrandon Toefield and senior Domanick Davis could be the best pair in the Southeastern Conference. Both are preseason All-SEC selections and both have over 1,000 rushing yards in their career. Toefield has gained 1,989 yards and scored 26 touchdowns in his career, while Davis has collected 1,405 rushing yards and 16 rushing touchdowns in his career. Combined the pair have 3,394 yards and 42 touchdowns in 63 games.

### TRIPLE THREAT IN THE BACKFIELD

With the emergence of freshman Joseph Addai, LSU's running back corps has turned into a triple threat. LSU's backfield of Addai, LaBrandon Toefield and Domanick Davis combined for 257 yards and three TDs against The Citadel. Addai led the Tigers with 88 yards, while Toefield added 85 and Davis 84. It's the first time in school history that LSU has had three running backs rush for 80 yards or more in the same game. So far this season, the trio has combined for 708 yards and five TDs.

### **TOEFIELD AMONG THE TOP 10**

With his 73 yards Saturday against Mississippi State, LaBrandon Toefield moved closer to eighth place on LSU's career rushing yards list. The junior is 177 yards away from moving into eighth and has 1,989 yards in his career. With 11 more yards he will become the ninth player in school history to reach 2,000 rushing yards in a career.

### **DOMANICK FINALLY BREAKS ONE**

Domanick Davis had a punt return for a touchdown called back in each of LSU's first two games this season, but the senior return specialist finally got his due on Saturday against Mississippi State. Davis fielded a punt from MSU's Jared Cook at the LSU 22-yard line and proceeded to return it 78 yards for his second punt return of his career and lead LSU to a 31-13 victory over the Bulldogs. Davis now leads the SEC in punt return yards and ranks fourth in the nation with 19.6 yards per return.

### DOMANICK DAVIS KEEPS ALL-PURPOSE STREAK ALIVE

Domanick Davis kept his streak of games with at least 100 all-purpose yards alive as he recorded a career-high 286 yards against Mississippi State. Davis has now recorded at least 100 all-purpose yards in nine straight games dating back to the Alabama game last year. Against MSU, Davis had 122 yards on 18 rushes, 128 yards on 4 punt returns and 36 yards on 1 kickoff return. The 286 yards marked the fourth-best all-purpose total for a single game in LSU history. The record is 376 set by Kevin Faulk against Houston in 1996.

### DOMANICK CREEPS UP SEC AND LSU KO RETURN YARDAGE CHART

With a 36-yard kickoff return against Mississippi State, Domanick Davis moved into sixth place all-time in SEC history in kickoff returns with 1,761 yards. Davis passed James Brooks of Auburn (1,726 yards) to move into sixth. Davis now is 20 yards away from becoming LSU's all-time leader in kickoff return yards and he needs 503 yards to break the SEC mark. Robert Dow holds the LSU record with 1,780 yards, while Mark Johnson of Vanderbilt holds the league mark with 2,263 yards.

### DAVIS'S BIG DAY MOVES HIM CLOSER TO LSU CAREER MARKS

Following his big game against Mississippi State, Domanick Davis is poised to overtake a few LSU career records. The senior is now second in career punt return yards list with 940 and needs eight yards to overtake Eddie Kennison's record of 947. Davis is also second in kickoff return yards with 1,761 and needs 20 yards to surpass Robert Dow's record of 1,780 yards. Davis collected 286 all-purpose yards against Mississippi State to give him 4,412 in his career. The Breaux Bridge, La., native is 102 all-purpose yards shy of passing Charles Alexander (4,513) and moving into third-place.

### **MYERS ON THE MOVE**

Senior receiver Jerel Myers enters the Louisiana-Lafayette game in fourth-place on the LSU career receptions list. The Houston, Texas, native has 134 receptions and passed Tony Moss with one catch against Virginia Tech. Myers is 19 receptions away from third and 51 away from breaking the record of 183 held by Wendell Davis.

### **CLAYTON'S STILL GOING**

Sophomore receiver Michael Clayton has caught a pass in all 17 games (including the 2002 Sugar Bowl) he has played in his career. During that streak Clayton has pulled down at least five receptions in eight games, including at least five catches in the first three games in the 2002 season. He had five catches against both Virginia Tech and The Citadel and a season-best seven in the win over Miami (Ohio).

### **JAMES ON A ROLL**

Senior All-America linebacker Bradie James is the mark of consistency. The West Monroe, La., native has recorded at least one tackle in all but one of the 39 games in which he has played. The only game that he did not make a stop was against Houston in 1999. Since that game, he has made at least one tackle in 27 consecutive games (including the 2000 Peach and 2002 Sugar bowl games), including 14 games with 10 or more stops. James collected a career-high 19 tackles in the season-opener against Virginia Tech and had a 18 tackles against The Citadel.

### CORBELLO KICKING TO THE TOP

Senior place kicker John Corbello in now fifth in career scoring in LSU history. He kicked a career-best four field goals and added three extra points in the victory over Miami (Ohio) to give him a career-best 15 points in the game. He added a field goal and three extra points against Mississippi State to give him 220 points in his career. Corbello is 35 points away from passing Charles Alexander (254) for fourth. Corbello ranks second in school history with 38 career field goals, 23 shy of David Browndyke's mark of 61.

# PURPLE HAZE

- LSU has held each of its four opponents to fewer than 250 total yards this year. It is the first time since 1970 that a Tiger defense has held four consecutive opponents under 250 yards.
- The Tigers have not had a 100-yard rusher against them in eight games, since Dwone Hicks of Middle Tennessee reached the century mark last year.
- No SEC running back has gone over 100 yards against LSU in 10 games. The last back to do so was Brandon Holmes of Arkansas, who did so at the end of the 2000 season.

# DOMINANT DAVIS

You can call LSU head coach Nick Saban the complete package. Brought to Baton Rouge following the 1999 season to revive what many considered a sleeping giant, Saban has transformed the LSU football program into one that wins championships, while graduating players at the same time.

Armed with a plan that gives his players a chance to be successful on the field as well as the classroom, Saban's impact on the program has been immediate and it's been powerful.

In just two short years at LSU's head coach, Saban's on-field success has been unmatched as he has guided the Tigers to 18 victories, a pair of bowl wins, including one in a BCS game, and the 2001 Southeastern Conference title.

Off the field, Saban has spearheaded a fundraising effort that has raised more than \$15 million for a state-of-the-art academic center for student-athletes. The new LSU Academic Center for Student-Athletes is all part of Saban's plan to give his players the best opportunity to best successful when they finish their football career.

Saban didn't waste anytime making his impact felt as the he guided a team coming off back-to-back losing seasons to an 8-4 mark and a win over 15th-ranked Georgia Tech in the Peach Bowl to rekindle the fire of a proud football tradition in Baton Rouge.

Saban's influence on the Tigers went much further in 2001 as he led LSU to the school's first outright Southeastern Conference title since 1986 with a 31-20 win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC title game and followed that win a 47-34 victory over Illinois in the Sugar Bowl, LSU's first New Year's Day Bowl win since 1968.

Beating Tennessee to win the league title is one thing, but the fashion in which Saban and the Tigers did so speaks volumes on the impact he has had on his squad. Playing without two of their offensive standouts, quarterback Rohan Davey and running back LaBrandon Toefield, not only did the Tigers respond to Saban's challenge to step up, they were dominant, outscoring the high-powered Vols offense 21-3 in the second half. LSU's defense allowed just 50 yards rushing.

Losing Davey and Toefield and still overcoming the adversity to win the title game, or any game for that matter, has been a trademark of Saban-coached teams. Teaching the players to trust and believe in each other has been a characteristic that Saban has branded on his squad. Saban preached to his team to play for 60 minutes, to become a dominant team on every play of every game, and to not worry about what the scoreboard read. The players responded.

After the Tigers dropped a 35-24 decision to Ole Miss in Baton Rouge in late October, LSU was practically counted out of the SEC Western Division race. Saban, however, pressed on saying the Tigers would continue to focus on getting better, playing one game at a time, and not worrying about anybody but the next opponent. It worked as the Tigers began to peak during their November run, a stretch that saw LSU win at Alabama, then beat nationally-ranked foes Arkansas and Auburn at home to advance to the SEC title game.

The win over second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC Championship game and then No. 7 Illinois in the Sugar Bowl were just two more steps along the way for the Tigers as Saban continues to restore the winning tradition to an LSU program that will soon be a fixture among the nation's elite in college football.

Prior to LSU, Saban spent five years as the head coach at Michigan State, where he built the Spartans into a perennial BigTen contender after going to four bowl games in five seasons.

LSU delivered its most dominant performance of the season as the Tigers rolled to a 42-0 win over Mississippi State in Starkville. **Josh Reed** caught 10 passes for 146 yards and two touchdowns, while **Rohan Davey** threw for 255 yards and three TDs as the Tigers took a 14-0 halftime lead and blew it open with a 21-point third quarter. The shutout was the first for the Tigers in an SEC road game since shutting out Alabama 27-0 at Tuscaloosa in 1997. The margin of victory was the highest for LSU in an SEC game since 1986. The Tiger defense forced four turnovers with all four resulting in touchdowns for LSU. **Damien James** picked off his nation's best fifth pass in the contest.

- LSU began playing football in Tiger Stadium in 1924 and is currently in its 79th year in the venerable stadium on Saturday Night.
- In Homecomeing games, LSU is 49-25-3 all time. The Tigers have won eight of their last 10 homecoming games, including a 30-14 victory over Middle Tennessee last year.
- LSU has won six straight games at home dating back to its homecoming victory over Middle Tennessee State last year. That is the second home win streak of at least six games for the Tigers since 2000.
- Under Nick Saban, the Tigers have posted a 14-3 home record, including a 4-1 mark against ranked opponents. Against conference foes, Saban is 7-2 in Death Valley. In home games at night, LSU is 11-2 since Saban took over.
- More than 85,000 fans have attended each of LSU's last 15 home games. In that span, the Tigers have eclipsed the 90,000 mark nine times, including a school-record 92,141 for last year's Auburn contest, which LSU won 27-14.
- A school-record 63,017 season tickets were sold this year, not counting the more than 15,000 seats reserved for students. Last year, 62,600 season tickets were sold.
- Since national attendance figures began being kept in 1957, LSU has ranked in the top 20 all 45 seasons. The Tigers have been in the top 15 for 43 of the 45 years and in the top 10 on 37 occasions, including 32 straight from 1957-88. Fourteen times, LSU has ranked in the top five in the nation, including the last two.
- Since 1960, LSU owns a stellar 179-60-4 (.745) record in traditional Tiger Stadium night games. On the other hand, the Tigers are just 14-20-3 (.419) at home during the day in that span.

### **TIGERS FALL TO VIRGINIA TECH IN OPENER**

A combination of turnovers and special team miscues doomed LSU on Sunday as the Tigers dropped a 26-8 decision to Virginia Tech in Blacksburg, Va. A pair of blocked punts and an interception resulted in 16 Virginia Tech points as the Tigers fell behind 24-0 in the game before scoring early in the fourth quarter on a 1yard run by LaBrandon Toefield. LSU's defense limited Virginia Tech to just 231 yards of total offense, including only 65 yards through the air. However, the Tigers managed only 214 yards of offense, 103 on the ground and 134 through the air. Toefield led LSU with 46 yards on 10 carries, while quarterback Matt Mauck connected on 15 of 35 passes for 134 yards. Michael Clayton led LSU with five receptions for 49 yards.

### TIGERS FACE THE CITADEL

LSU rushed for 293 yards and four TDs to cruise to a 35-10 win over The Citadel on Saturday in Tiger Stadium. LaBrandon Toefield, Domanick Davis and Joseph Addai - all went over 80 yards rushing as the Tigers put together the most yards on the ground in a game since rushing for 350 in a 1999 win over North Texas. ### TIGERS DOMINATE MIAMI (OHIO) 33-7

From the opening kickoff to the final horn, LSU dominated Miami (Ohio) in every phase of the game, posting a 33-7 victory over the RedHawks. Led by the running of LaBrandon Toefield and passing of Matt Mauck, LSU's balanced offensive attack compiled 422 yards (207 rushing, 215 passing). John Corbello tied a school-record with four field goals, including two in the first seven minutes that gave the Tigers a 6-0 lead. Mauck connected with Michael Clayton on an 8-yard scoring pass late in the first quarter to push the lead to 13-0. Miami pulled to within 16-7 with 50 seconds left in the half, but the Tigers responded with a 5-play, 71-yard drive, capped off by a Mauck-to-Clayton TD pass that covered 24 yards, giving LSU a 23-7 halftime lead. LSU added a field goal and a TD in the third quarter for the final margin of 33-7. Toefield led LSU with 111 yards rushing, while Mauck passed for career-highs of 215 yards and 3 TDs.

### **DOMINANT DAVIS LEADS LSU PAST STATE, 31-13**

Domanick Davis returned a punt 78 yards for a TD and rushed for 122 yards and another score as the Tigers rolled past Mississippi State, 31-13. Davis gave the Tigers a 7-0 lead on his punt return just two minutes into the game. MSU responded with a field goal and a TD to take a 10-7 advantage early in the second quarter. Davis hit paydirt with a 5-yard plunge to give the Tigers a 14-10 lead at halftime. The second half belonged to LSU as the Tigers stretched the lead to 21-10 on a 39-yard TD pass from Matt Mauck to Devery Henderson Mauck capped the scoring for LSU with a 2-yard run midway through the fourth quarter. For the game, Davis finished with a 286 all-purpose yards, which included 128 yards on punt returns. The Tigers piled up 256 yards rushing, while limiting MSU to only 88 yards on the ground and 249 total yards.
