On A Mission: — LSU SOCCER IN HAITI

LSU SOCCER STARS SPEND CHRISTMAS IN HAITI

Before the Christmas holiday in December 2009, LSU Soccer stars Courtney Alexander and Natalie Ieyoub traveled to the Caribbean nation of Haiti for a week-long mission trip with the organization Lespwa Worldwide as they sought to bring joy to the native people. While working in the village of Messailler, the duo helped run a Vacation Bible School and assisted in construction projects for the school, church and orphanage within the complex in which they stayed. They also helped organize the soccer games for the local children to play.

Upon returning to the United States, Alexander described the love she had for the Haitian people by saying, "I had never even thought of going to Haiti before. My heart has always been for Africa. I knew immediately when I got home that I wanted to go back. I still do now more than ever. I wish I could go immediately. I think part of my heart will always be in Haiti."

Alexander and Ieyoub could have never imagined the destruction that would soon follow upon their return home as a cataclysmic earthquake that struck on Jan. 12, 2010, left the island in a state of ruin and the native people hopeless in the face of the devastation.

The organization Lespwa Worldwide derives its name from the Creole word meaning "hope," and both Alexander and Ieyoub wanted to return to show the Haitian people that there is hope for the future, for them and for their nation.

"I would definitely want to take another trip there," Ieyoub said. "There's just a lot of need right now. I think that since I've been there I can understand the damage and the amount of need that the country is in right now. I'd like to see the progress that Lespwa Worldwide is making during this tragedy. They're bringing a lot of hope to the people there. The word 'Lespwa' actually means 'hope."







ALEXANDER AND IEYOUB RETURN TO HAITI FOR EARTHQUAKE RELIEF



After the conclusion of the spring semester in June 2010, both Alexander and Ieyoub had the opportunity to return to Haiti for the first time since the earthquake to assist Lespwa Worldwide in its relief efforts. This time, they worked with the organization at its Mission of Hope headquarters in a village called Titayen to help with the reconstruction of the campus.

Along with LSU women's golfer Mary Michael Maggio, they helped construct the roof of a new school cafeteria, paint some of the new orphanage buildings and organize medical supplies for the on-site clinic. They also served as runners in the medical clinic and assistants in the prosthetics lab.

Not only that, but the trio was fortunate to visit orphanages in surrounding villages to spend time with

the Haitian children, playing soccer and making arts and crafts during their stay.

"It was great to go back and work alongside the Haitian people who have hope that their country can be rebuilt and who have an unwavering love and joy in Jesus when they literally have nothing else," Alexander said. "Mission of Hope has given them the chance to be equipped to help change their nation. You can see how the children now have a sense of responsibility and pride in their country like never had before. I didn't know you could fall in love with a place more than you already were, but it happened with me. It captured my heart in December, and it continues to hold a tight grip on me."

LSU SOCCER WINS FOURTH STRAIGHT TIGER CUP IN 2012

Members of the LSU Soccer program were honored for the fourth-straight season as the team most deserving of the prestigious Tiger Cup with their performance on the field, in the classroom and in the community during the 2012 Tiger Athletic Foundation Academic Excellence Gala held March 4.

The 2012 TAF Academic Excellence Gala was held at the Royal Cotillion Ballroom at the LSU Student Union as members from each of LSU's 19 varsity sports were honored during the festivities.

It marked the fourth-straight year in which members of the LSU Soccer program were named as the winners of the Tiger Cup at the TAF Academic Excellence Gala after also receiving the award in 2009, 2010 and 2011.

In 2011, the Tigers captured their fourth SEC Western Division championship and fourth at-large berth into the NCAA Tournament in five seasons while posting a 13-8-1 overall record with an 8-3 mark and 24 points in conference play. The Tigers earned a second-place finish in the final SEC team standings as the runner-up for the SEC Championship for the third time in four seasons.

In addition to their success on the field in 2011, members of the LSU Soccer program logged 568 hours of community service to rank No. 2 among all men's and women's athletic programs at LSU, which equals an average of 23.5 community service hours completed per player. The Tigers also maintained an impressive 3.173 cumulative team GPA for the 2011 spring and fall semesters.

WHAT IS THE TIGER CUP?

The Tiger Cup is an award presented by the Tiger Athletic Foundation each year to the athletic program at LSU that best represents the university in competition, in the classroom and in the community. The recipient of the Tiger Cup is determined by combining a team's final conference and national ranking with its performance on the field along with its cumulative team grade-point average and community service hours accumulated off the field during the previous academic year.




The Library

Media Training

LSU is one of the few schools where student-athletes go through media training to enhance their communication skills. Dr. Tommy Karam and Dr. Shirley White are two experts in the field who give training sessions to student-athletes here on campus. The Academic Center features a mock press conference setting to get student-athletes acclimated to giving interviews in front of both print and electronic media. Karam and White record the mock interviews on camera and then provide feedback, allowing student-athletes to become more comfortable and confident when doing actual interviews.





The New LSU SOCCER STADIUM

The LSU Soccer Stadium has earned a reputation as being one of the more intimidating venues for an opposing team to compete in all of college soccer. That is evident in the fact that the Tigers boast a brilliant 33-5-7 home record with an impressive .811 winning percentage over the last five seasons. LSU enters the 2012 season as winners of four of the last five SEC Western Division championships while making four NCAA Tournament appearances along with defending their home turf.

On the strength of its recent success, the LSU Soccer Stadium has received extensive renovations in the past two years as the program continues its ascent to the pinnacle of the SEC and the NCAA. The venue is now a home worthy of an emerging power in women's college soccer.

In March 2011, construction teams broke ground on Phase 2 of the renovation as \$2.3 million was invested to transform the facility while creating additional seating, installing new lighting and building a new press box for the media and concession stand and restrooms for the LSU supporters to enjoy.

By adding a second level of bleacher seating to the existing structure, the official capacity of the new-look LSU Soccer Stadium has increased to 2,197, easily accommodating a fanbase that has created one of the more intimidating home-field advantages in the SEC. In addition, new gates have been built on the west side of the complex with brick columns throughout. New gating has also been installed at the top of the bleachers.

Fans attending future matches at the LSU Soccer Stadium will also benefit from the

addition of the permanent concession stand located directly below the press box. With the building of two new restrooms at the facility, it now features a total of four as men's and women's facilities are located at both ends of the stadium.

Members of the media also enjoy a brand new press box that has been constructed to make the covering of future matches a state-of-the-art experience. Not only has the size of the press box interior increased to 333 square feet, but hard-wired internet has been installed across the work space along with a wireless internet signal that has already been accessible for the past four seasons. In addition, television cameras and videographers have access to the newly-installed crow's nest on the roof of the press box in a space that also featured wired internet access.

The Tigers have been nearly unbeatable at the LSU Soccer Stadium under the direction of head coach Brian Lee as they enter the fall with a sparkling 39-7-9 home mark since 2006. The squad has only dropped five decisions at home in the last five seasons as it followed an unbeaten 5-0-3 home slate in 2007 with an impressive 8-1 campaign in 2008, a 7-1-2 season in 2009, a 6-2-1 mark in 2010 and a 7-1-1 season a year ago. In fact, LSU's home dominance is highlighted by a school record 18-game home unbeaten streak that came to an end on Oct. 26, 2008, with a narrow 2-1 defeat to the sixth-ranked Florida Gators.

2012 marks the 17th season in the life of the LSU Soccer Stadium, which was first opened on Sept. 13, 1996, when the Tigers hosted SEC rival Tennessee.

And a new era was born in 2011 with the grand re-opening of the LSU Soccer Stadium as the Tigers set the attendance record on Sept. 9 when 2.542 supporters witnessed a 1-0 blanking of the Oregon Ducks to open the LSU Invitational. That smashed the previous attendance mark of 2,402 fans that saw the Tigers pitch a 3-0 shutout of sixth-ranked Tennessee for the team's first win over an opponent ranked among the Top 10 teams in the nation.

In fact, the Tigers set the all-time attendance record three times during the 2007 season and finished the campaign ranked No. 10 nationally in

average attendance and at No. 7 in the country in average paid attendance while drawing 1,294 fans per match. LSU nearly matched that record last fall while wrapping up the 2011 campaign ranked No. 17 in the nation with an average attendance of 1,174 fans in its nine matches at the LSU Soccer Stadium.

The program made history again in 2009 as the Tigers were awarded a No. 4 national seed in the NCAA Tournament and the former LSU Soccer Complex was selected as a regional host site of the NCAA First and Second Rounds for the first time, solidifying its reputation as one of the most intimidating venues in all of college soccer.

The stadium features a newly renovated locker room facility with a brand new visitor's locker room on the south end of the facility and a state-of-the-art squad room measuring 2,000 square feet that was completed in the summer of 2006. The playing surface underwent further renovations in the spring of 2007 as the LSU athletic department invested \$250,000 into a total reconstruction of the pitch. The field was flattened and covered with a hybrid Bermuda grass called Mississippi Choice similar to the playing surface in Tiger Stadium. It also features a brand new drainage and irrigation system to keep the field in pristine condition year round.



LSU Soccer Stadium



The LSU Soccer Stadium boasts a modern and spacious locker room that includes locker rooms for the Tigers, as well as facilities for opponents and game officials. The venue also provides an on-site training room, a meeting room and lounge for the team and offices for the LSU coaching staff.



LOCKER ROOM RENOVATIONS

The locker room facility at the LSU Soccer Stadium recently underwent an extensive \$200,000 renovation project that included the addition of a brand new visitor's locker room on the south end of the facility. The former visitor's locker room was expanded to 2,000 square feet and converted into a state-of-the-art squad room and lounge for the Tigers to enjoy. The facility underwent further renovations in the spring of 2007 as the LSU athletic department invested \$250,000 into a total reconstruction of the facility's playing surface. The field was flattened and covered with a hybrid Bermuda grass called Mississippi Choice similar to the sand-based playing surface in Tiger Stadium. It also features a brand new drainage and irrigation system to keep the field in pristine condition year round.



Indoor Practice FACILITY

When the weather prevents the soccer team from practicing at the LSU Soccer Stadium, the squad moves inside to the climate-controlled indoor football practice facility. The indoor facility was built as part of a \$15 million upgrade in the early 1990s and houses a 100-yard football field that was renovated with brand new Momentum Field Turf in the spring of 2006.



Athletic

Nutrition First

LSU is one of the few schools nationally that maintains a state-of-theart nutritional program for today's student-athlete. Senior Associate Athletic Trainer Shelly Mullenix coordinates with LSU dining services to provide a balanced training table diet. LSU athletic trainers also meet one-on-one with student-athletes to give them expert nutritional information.

—TRAINING

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facilities in all of collegiate athletics with both the Operations Center and the Broussard Center for Athletic Training in Tiger Stadium. Both are furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. The Operations Center training room features a full view of the practice fields, two hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill. The Broussard Center includes an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy and a hydrotherapy pool. It is also one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, vision center and dental center.



Hydrotherapy Treatment

An integral part of rehabbing and developing LSU student-athletes is the operations center's hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill in a fully-equipped Hydrotherapy room.

The Broussard training center boasts the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports.

Broussard Athletic TRAINING CENTER



The two-story, 22,000-square-foot facility contains 20 treatment tables with the newest forms of modalities available, 14 taping stations, a 1,600-square-foot rehabilitation area which contains the latest rehabilitation equipment including the Cybex Norm, Woodway treadmills and Body Master select rise equipment. LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard (left), the legendary trainer whose career spanned more than 40 years at LSU.

Road To Recovery
LSU is one of the top schools in the nation to get its student-athletes back on the field in a timely manner following an injury. The athletic training staff takes a progressive approach to injury identification and thinks "outside of the box." LSU consults with allied health professionals and uses state-of-the-art surgical procedures that give an athlete a quicker recovery time while looking out for his or her future.



Dental Center

A fully functional dental center, staffed by Dr. Robin Levy and Dr. John Vance, is located inside the Broussard Center for Athletic Training.



Rehabilitation

LSU's Broussard Center for Athletic Training boasts some of the most technologically advanced equipment to aid the recuperation and rehabilitation of LSU's student-athletes.



Real-Time X-Rays

A new state-of-the-art fluoroscope was added in the summer of 2008 that will provide LSU athletic trainers the opportunity to take x-rays on site in the Operations Center. The machine can provide real-time images of the internal structures of a patient.



Gameday Wellness

The full-time athletic training staff, along with 10 graduate assistants, prepares the players for gameday in the comfort of Tiger Stadium hours before kickoff.



Vision Center

Pharmacy






Tiger Stadium WEIGHT ROOM

The following nine individuals are the only athletes to have their jerseys retired by LSU. Men's basketball has retired the No. 23 for Pete Maravich, No. 50 for Bob Pettit, Jr., No. 33 for Shaquille O'Neal and No. 40 for Rudy Macklin. Women's basketball retired the No. 33 for Seimone Augustus. Football's only two retired jerseys are the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon and the No. 37 worn by Tommy Casanova. Baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of longtime coach and former athletics director Skip Bertman and the No. 20 for Ben McDonald. Casanova, Macklin and McDonald joined the prestigious list in May 2009. Augustus became the first woman in LSU Athletics history to have her jersey retired in January 2010.

Bob Pettit

Pettit led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame, and in 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



🗗 Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete" Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50-plus points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in



Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth guarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



Shaquille O'Neal

O'Neal was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



Skip Bertman


A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also coached the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, South Korea, in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and served as LSU's athletics director for seven years. Bertman was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006.

About LSU Retired Jerseys

The retirement of the jerseys of Casanova, McDonald, Macklin and Augustus comes under a new provision of the LSU jersey retirement bylaws that says the retirement of an athlete's jersey in a particular sport does not preclude a current student-athlete in that sport from wearing the jersey number in that or any other sport, subject to the discretion of the head coach. This provision applies only to jerseys retired after January 1, 2007, so the numbers worn by Maravich, Pettit, O'Neal, Cannon and Bertman may never again be worn by future student-athletes in their respective sports. To have a jersey retired at LSU, an athlete must have completed intercollegiate competition for LSU a minimum of five years prior to nomination. Athletes must have demonstrated truly unusual and outstanding accomplishments, exceeding and in addition to all criteria used for Hall of Fame selection. Nominees must have a unanimous vote of support from the Hall of Fame committee.

Rudy Macklin

Rudy Macklin was a two-time basketball All-American selection during his Tiger career from 1976-81 during which time he became LSU's all-time leading rebounder with 1,276 boards and the second-leading scorer in school history behind only the legendary Pete Maravich with 2,080 points. He led the Tigers to two Elite Eight appearances and the 1981 Final Four in Philadelphia. He still holds the school single-game rebound record with 32, a mark like many of the great records that may never be broken.



Tommy Casanova

Tommy Casanova is the only three-time All-American in the history of LSU football and is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame. During his Tiger career from 1969-71, Casanova personified versatility for his myriad of talents as he played offense, defense, returned punts and kickoffs. One of just two three-time All-SEC performers at LSU, he played six seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals of the NFL while earning his medical degree.

Ben McDonald

Ben McDonald won the prestigious Golden Spikes Award, given annually to the nation's most outstanding player, in 1989 and is a member of the College Baseball Hall of Fame. He led LSU to two College World Series appearances. In 1989, McDonald was named National Player of the Year by Baseball America, The Sporting News and Collegiate Baseball. He was selected by the Baltimore Orioles as the No. 1 pick in the major league draft in 1989 and went on to enjoy a 10-year major league career with the Orioles and the Milwaukee Brewers.

Seimone Augustus

Seimone Augustus is the only women's basketball player in school history to earn State Farm Coaches Association All-America honors three times: 2004, 2005 and 2006. Augustus became LSU's first NCAA National Player of the Year and she claimed the honor twice in 2005 and 2006. A 2006 graduate of LSU, Augustus was the 2012 WNBA Finals MVP after winning a world title. She also lead the United States to a gold medal at the 2008 Beijing Olympic Games.

Named the first Director of U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) for the Department of Homeland Security in 2003, Aguirre, Jr., was the U.S. Ambassador to Spain from 2005 until 2009.



James Carville

Carville received both a bachelor's degree and law degree from LSU and gained fame in the 1990s as the chief campaign strategist for Bill Clinton and Al Gore. Carville also penned a best-selling memoir titled "All's Fair: Love, War and Running for President."



Lod Cook

Cook graduated from LSU with a bachelor's degree in mathematics in 1955 and then earned his Master's degree in petro engineering in 1955. Cook served as CEO of ARCO for nine vears.



Carlos Roberto Flores

The president of Honduras from 1997-2001, Flores helped the nation recover after Hurricane Mitch devastated the country in 1998. Flores is married to the former Mary Carol Flake, also an alumnus of LSU.



Jim Flores

Flores graduated with two bachelor's of science degrees; one in corporate finance in 1981 and the second in petroleum land management in 1982. Flores is currently Chairman, President and CEO of Plains Exploration & Production Company.



Svlvia Fowles

Sylvia Fowles was a two-time State Farm All-American at LSU before going onto a career in the WNBA with the Chicago Sky. Fowles and Seimone Augustus became the first LSU basketball players to claim Olympic gold in 2008 and 2012 for the United States.

LSU Vice Chancellor/Director of Athletics

Joe Alleva continues to bring unprecedented national recognition to LSU as Vice Chancellor and Director of Athletics. Under Alleva's leadership, LSU enjoys one of the country's premier athletics programs with success on and off the field of competition. Now in his fifth year at LSU, Alleva is dedicated to athletic and academic excellence, and is committed to providing the opportunities and the resources necessary for studentathletes to excel in competition, in the classroom and in the community. LSU's prominence was evident in the final 2011-12 Capital One Cup standings that recognize the nation's best athletic programs. With a national championship and three Southeastern Conference titles during the year, the Tigers finished fourth in both the men's and women's Capital One Cup competition, one of only two schools in the country - and the only one in the SEC - to rank in the top four in both categories.

Alleva joined the LSU family on April 4, 2008, after a highly successful tenure as director of athletics at Duke University for 10 years. Alleva's role at LSU was further expanded in August of 2009 when vice chancellor was added to his title by the LSU Board of Supervisors. It is the first time in school history that the director of athletics has also held a vice chancellor position.

Alleva is currently serving a fiveyear term on the prestigious NCAA Men's Basketball Committee, reinforcing his position as one of the most respected athletic administrators in the country.

Upon his arrival at LSU, Alleva unveiled a strategic master plan for the LSU athletics program – "LSU: Thru and True" - to ensure the advancement and future of LSU Athletics as an exemplary program. The central mission of the plan is to create an environment for student-athletes to reach their ultimate potential, prepare them to be champions in life and to set out goals and values for the entire athletics program.

Alleva's vision will keep LSU among the nation's leaders in athletic facilities. He launched an aggressive fundraising campaign to replace several hundred windows on Tiger Stadium that were in disrepair and a new coating to the façade of the structure is bringing the old stadium to new life. A renovated gating system on the west side of the stadium will debut in the fall of 2012 to include a plaza that celebrates LSU's football national championships and recognition walls that honor Tiger All-Americans.

Also in the fall of 2012, LSU begins construction on an expansion of the South End Zone of the stadium – a project that will add premium seating, general public seating and two stateof-the-art video boards - continuing an effort to augment one of the most iconic venues in all of college sports.

Under Alleva's direction, LSU's world-renowned track and field program received a state-of the-art running surface in 2010 when a new track was installed in Bernie Moore Stadium. Extensive renovations to the Tiger soccer facility were completed last fall, and future plans include a new gymnastics practice facility. a tennis complex and renovations to the Maravich Center and Carl Maddox Field

Alleva directed a major renovation to the University Club golf course that was completed in September 2010 and allows the LSU men's and women's golf teams to compete on one of



the most challenging courses in the country. The renovated course helped prepare Tiger golfers John Peterson and Austin Ernst, respectively, to win 2011 NCAA men's and women's individual championships, marking the first time both titles were claimed by players from the same school. The Lady Tiger golfers have finished third at the NCAA Championships two years in a row, marking the highest finishes in LSU history.

LSU Athletics completed another highly successful year in 2011-12 as 18 of the Tigers' 20 varsity sports participated in NCAA post-season competition. The vear was highlighted by the football team's undefeated regular season, an SEC championship and an appearance in the BCS National Championship Game. The Lady Tiger track and field team captured the SEC and NCAA outdoor championships, while the LSU softball squad advanced to the Women's College World Series. The Fighting Tiger baseball team won the 2012 SEC championship, and LSU led the nation in attendance for the 17th straight season. The 2011-12 season marked the first time in school history that LSU won both the SEC title in both football and baseball in the same athletic year.

But the 2011-12 year was about more than just athletic success. Living up to Alleva's mantra of "competition. classroom, community," LSU studentathletes logged more than 3,700 hours in community service work across 20 sports through LSU's Geaux Givers program. And 62 proud Tigers received their degrees from the university during LSU commencement ceremonies in May.

Outstanding performances of the

2010-11 athletic season included the exploits of the Fighting Tiger football squad that posted an 11-2 mark including a Cotton Bowl victory - and finished the season ranked No. 8 in the nation. The year also featured Top 5 national finishes both indoors and outdoors by the men's and women's track and field teams.

In 2008-09, all 20 LSU sports competed in NCAA postseason play for the first time in school history and the Tiger baseball team won the national championship. LSU ranked second among Southeastern Conference teams in the Learfield Director's Cup All-Sports standings and finished in the Top 20 for the sixth year in a row.

With a strong commitment to academics, Alleva ensures that the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes is a first-class facility that provides student-athletes the resources necessary for success in the classroom and personal development. The facility was recently enhanced by the addition of a media training center that gives student-athletes valuable assistance in improving their communications skills.

And with a strong emphasis on community service and outreach programs, the implementation under Alleva's direction of the "Geaux Givers" program fosters a relationship between the local community and LSU studentathletes, who regularly participate in philanthropic events. In addition, Alleva has bolstered the department's L-Club program to reach out and connect with former student-athletes

Alleva oversees a staff of outstanding coaches and he has made critical additions to LSU's coaching staff over the past two years. He hired former LSU guard Johnny Jones in April to breathe new life and enthusiasm into the men's basketball program and recently added Julia Sell as the new women's tennis coach. Last vear, he lured the dynamic Nikki Caldwell to LSU to coach the Lady Tiger basketball team, and then hired Beth Torina to direct the Tiger softball program, both of whom immediately returned their respective programs to NCAA post-season success.

Alleva is an innovator with bold ideas that benefit not only LSU but all of Greater Baton Rouge. He has been instrumental in the planning of the Bayou Country Superfest, a two-day country music concert and festival held in Tiger Stadium each spring. The event attracts nearly 100,000 visitors to the LSU campus and makes a tremendous economic impact upon the local community.

Alleva has served on numerous national committees throughout his career including the Football Bowl Certification Committee, the NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet and several Southeastern Conference and Atlantic Coast Conference committees.

He became director of athletics at Duke in 1998 and his impressive tenure there propelled the university into the ranks of America's top allaround collegiate programs. Among his outstanding list of accomplishments includes the greatest 10-year period in Duke Athletics, winning more ACC and NCAA championships than in any other decade in school history.

Alleva, whose hometown is Suffern, N.Y., majored in Finance at Lehigh University and received his bachelor's degree in 1975. While at Lehigh, Alleva was the quarterback of the football team and team captain in 1974. Alleva also played on the Lehigh baseball team. He served as a graduate assistant football coach and earned an MBA in

While at Duke, Alleva played a key role in Durham's community sports scene. He started Little League Baseball in Durham over 20 years ago, and also began the American Legion baseball program.

He is a member of the North Carolina American Legion Hall of Fame, Suffern High School Hall of Fame and the Rockland County Hall of Fame.

Alleva and his wife, Annie, have three children, J.D., Jeff and Jenny.



YOUTHFUL TIGERS POISED FOR CHAMPIONSHIP RUN

After winning three-straight Southeastern
Conference Western Division championships and earning
three-straight NCAA Tournament appearances from
2007-09, LSU Soccer returned to its position among
the league's elite once again in 2011 by earning a fourth
division crown and postseason berth as one of the
premier programs in college soccer.

In fact, the Tigers finished runner-up for the SEC Championship for the third time in four seasons after posting an 8-3 mark with 24 points in SEC play to wrap up the regular season only a mere three points behind South Carolina for second place on the final league table.

Providing the foundation for another championship run was a senior quintet that wrapped up a successful four years in Baton Rouge by tying a class record with 50 wins.

And it was a star-studded senior class led by Allysha Chapman as a First-Team All-SEC selection and the SEC Co-Defensive Player of the Year and Taryne Boudreau as a First-Team All-SEC performer in her own right as the team's offensive star. Natalie Martineau was picked as a Second-Team All-SEC selection as one of the leading assist makers in the country, while senior stalwarts Mo Isom and Kellie Murphy wrapped up their careers as team captains.

Those returning to the team in 2012 knew it would be a crucial offseason for the Tigers to continue their ascent to the top of the SEC. With only six starters returning, an opportunity was there for the next generation of Tigers to step up and make their own mark on the program.

"After graduating an impact class of five standout seniors last fall, the spring season proved crucial in the continued development and maturity of our team," said LSU's eighth-year head coach Brian Lee. "That is what provides our student-athletes an opportunity to get back into the type of competition we need to prepare for the fall. The spring was certainly a test for many of our players to see who could fill that void left by our senior class.

"Our players have completed another intense offseason program that will be a key for this team as we go through preseason training. These have been the building blocks for us as we ready ourselves for another exciting season of LSU Soccer."

The Tigers will work to replace their Canadian connection as Boudreau and Martineau combined for 16 goals and 16 assists as the team's two leading scorers during the 2011 campaign. Among those looking to fill

the void in the attack are senior Carlie Banks, junior Addie Eggleston and sophomores Alex Arlitt and Kaley Blades.

Arlitt returns as perhaps the most versatile member of the squad in the wake of her rookie season in which she started all 22 matches for the Tigers a year ago while seeing action as an attacking midfielder, defensive midfielder and starting left back. She boasts the skill set to replace either Martineau in the attack or Chapman in defense as a leader of the midfield unit.

Eggleston is the team's top returning scorer from a year ago when she set her career-best with four goals and totaled 13 points on the campaign. Banks is the top returning assist maker for the Tigers after setting her career-high seven assists to rank second behind Martineau's 10 assists last fall. The trio of Banks, Blades and Eggleston teamed for nine goals and 15 assists in 2011

The Tigers also feature a trio of All-SEC candidates to anchor the defense as junior Alex Ramsey returns as the team's starting right back with 43 career starts to her credit and sophomore Jodi Calloway continues her development as one of the league's premier center backs following a selection to the SEC All-Freshman Team in 2011. Former SEC All-Freshman Team in 2011. Former SEC All-Freshman Team selection and rising junior Megan Kinneman is also the heir apparent in goal following Isom's departure.

While the Tigers return a solid nucleus from last year's squad, they also welcome a talented Top 10 recruiting class to campus for the second time in three seasons as each of their six incoming freshmen are sure to make an immediate impact this fall.

Headlining the class are two TopDrawerSoccer.com Top 100 recruits in the United States for the Class of 2012 and a pair of Under-20 internationals who played for Canada and Mexico during their prep careers.

Mexican U-20 international Fernanda Pina (Puebla, Mexico) will compete for a starting spot along the front line, while Canadian U-20 veteran Jade Kovacevic (Georgetown, Ontario) and Texas native Heather Magee (Colleyville, Texas) will impact the midfield as rookies in 2012. Magee joined the program as the nation's No. 31-ranked prep prospect by TopDrawerSoccer.com while freshman goalkeeper Morgan Ruhl was tabbed the No. 93-ranked recruit in 2012.

Also providing the Tigers with immediate depth this fall are two of the top prep prospects in the state of Florida in striker Colby Maffei of Tampa and Haley Emerson of Fort Myers.

"We certainly have some holes to fill after losing such a quality senior class following the end of last season, but we're excited to welcome another Top 10 recruiting class to campus to join a solid nucleus we have returning this fall," Lee said. "We're a young team, but we believe we've got the potential with this group to continue our pursuit of an SEC Championship."

The Tigers will kick off the 2012 campaign on Aug. 20 with an early-season road test against the Oklahoma Sooners of the Big 12 Conference as the two sides collide at the OU Soccer Complex in Norman as part of an exciting opener on Monday Night Futbol.

In order to prepare for another run at the SEC title, the Tigers will compete against a non-conference schedule that features six matches against teams that ended the 2011 season with a final RPI among the Top 100 teams in the country. After opening the season with a road fixture at Oklahoma, the Tigers return home to battle the likes of Florida International, Memphis, NC State, Rice and Stephen F. Austin which also finished in the final RPI Top 100 a season ago.

Memphis is the reigning Conference USA champion after posting a 22-1-1 overall record in 2011 en route to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. The Tigers also welcome NCAA Tournament qualifiers Florida International and Stephen F. Austin to Baton Rouge this fall.

LSU will then compete against an expanded 13-game SEC schedule that features a pair of former Big 12 powers in the Missouri Tigers and Texas AGM Aggies. The Tigers and Aggies kick off the SEC season on Sept. 14 at the LSU Soccer Stadium in one of eight league matches against NCAA Tournament qualifiers from a year ago. LSU's home slate is headlined by matches against such postseason veterans as Alabama, Auburn, Florida and Kentucky, while the Tigers will go on the road to battle defending SEC champion South Carolina, Georgia and Tennessee in the homestretch of the regular season.

There's no question that the LSU Soccer program has firmly established itself among the nation's elite with its performance during the last five seasons and the Tigers are hungry for more as the 2012 season draws near. When Lee took over the program in December 2004, he committed himself to "build a program that annually contends for the SEC, qualifies for the NCAA College Cup and competes to win a national championship." With LSU's performance for the past seven seasons, his goals are now well within reach for a new generation of Tigers.

FORWARDS

Providing the offensive spark for LSU's run to its fourth Southeastern Conference Western Division title in the last five seasons and its return trip to the NCAA Tournament a year ago was the emergence of Taryne Boudreau as one of the league's feared strikers. The First-Team All-SEC selection wrapped up her collegiate career as the team's leading scorer with 12 goals and six assists for 30 points after making the transition to the front line in 2011.

Boudreau even stepped up her game in SEC play as the league's leading scorer with nine goals and 22 points in 11 conference matches while guiding the Tigers to a runner-up finish in the final SEC standings with an 8-3 mark and 24 points on the table.

Despite Boudreau's departure following the 2011 season, the Tigers will compete with an experienced front line this fall with the return of senior Carlie Ranks, junior Addie Eggleston and sophomore Kaley Blades and their 102 career starts in the purple and gold. They are also the three top returning scorers from last year's squad with a combined nine goals

and 33 points in 2011.

Banks is the leader of the group as she opens her final campaign as an LSU Tiger with 60 starts in 67 career appearances for the Tigers over the past three seasons

A native of Peachtree City, Ga., Banks has tallied 14 goals and 40 points during her three years in Baton Rouge, including career single-season highs with seven goals and 18 points during her rookie campaign in 2009. Banks also proved herself as a facilitator of the offense last fall with a career-high seven assists to rank second on the team.

Eggleston is also a surefire All-SEC candidate as she opens her third season with the club in 2012. The former SEC All-Freshman Team selection is the team's top returning scorer with her career-high four goals as a sophomore a year ago. She is poised to continue her ascent on the SEC scoring charts with her seven goals and 13 assists in two seasons with

Blades looks to return to the form that earned

her recognition along with Eggleston as one of the nation's Top 50 recruits for the Class of 2010 after having her true freshman campaign cut short with a season-ending knee injury. Blades bounced back to play in 20 games a season ago while scoring three goals and nine points as a reserve striker.

Danielle Murphy also returns for her junior season after making eight appearances off the bench last fall as both a reserve striker and midfielder, while redshirt freshman Lexi Gibbs returns for her first opportunity to represent the Tigers on the pitch in 2012.

The Tigers feature one of the SEC's impact newcomers this season as Mexican Under-20 international Fernanda Pina will help fill the void up top left by Boudreau's departure. One of the most dynamic attacking players in North America to join the NCAA Division I ranks in 2012, Pina has competed as a member of the Mexican Women's National Team system for more than three years. She starred up front and in the midfield for

Mexico with appearances at the FIFA Women's World Cun at the U-17 level in 2010 before competing with the Mexican U-20 squad in 2012.

Pina burst onto the international stage at the 2010 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup while scoring two goals and dishing out one assist for Mexico in her two starts in group play.

The Tigers also welcome one of the top recruits in the Southeast to Baton Rouge this year as Colby Maffei of Tampa, Fla., will provide immediate depth up front as a four-star recruit in the Class of 2012 by TopDrawerSoccer.com. She also earned distinction as the No. 8-ranked prospect in the talent-rich state of Florida as a high school senior

MIDFIELDERS

Facilitating LSU's offense this fall is a youthful midfield led by the return of All-SEC candidate Alex Arlitt as arquably the most versatile member of this year's squad. While earning a selection to the SEC All-Freshman Team as one of the SEC's top rookies a year ago, Arlitt started all 22 matches as an attacking midfielder, defensive midfielder and left hack.

A native of Houston, Texas, Arlitt boasts a unique skill set to serve as a replacement for either Natalie Martineau in the attack or Allysha Chapman in defense as the squad is now without its All-SEC tandem providing a foundation in the midfield.

Chapman capped her collegiate career as the SEC Co-Defensive Player of the Year as one of the NCAA's elite defensive talents in 2011. Martineau was a team leader in the attack with a Second-Team All-SEC selection as one of the league's premier attacking midfielders.

Arlitt scored two goals and posted three assists in splitting her time between the offensive and defensive ends of the field as the team's top newcomer a year ago.

Junior Emily Cancienne is the team's only returning upperclassman in the midfield as she also looks to crack the playing rotation in defense with 21 starts in her 38 career appearances with the Tigers. The Baton Rouge native started all 21 matches as a freshman in 2010 before earning a spot on the field in 17 contests as a sophomore last fall.

Perhaps no unit will be impacted by first year Tigers more than the midfield as the squad welcomes the heralded Haley Emerson (Fort Myers Fla.), Jade Kovacevic (Georgetown, Ontario, Canada) and Heather Magee (Colleyville, Texas) into the

Kovacevic joins the program with an international pedigree as a product of the Canadian Women's National Team system during her prep career. She will debut with the Tigers during the early-season slate after making the trip to Japan in August with the Under-20 Canadian Women's National Team for the 2012 FIFA U-20 Women's World

Before being called up to the U-20 Canadian Women's National Team in each of the last two years, Kovacevic emerged on the international stage with three caps in group play at the 2010 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup held in the Caribbean nation of Trinidad & Tobago.

Magee has also earned her share of international experience with the U-17 U.S. Women's National Team player pool in 2009. A product of Grapevine High School, she signed with LSU as one of the nation's Top 40 recruits in the Class of 2012 as she was the No. 31-ranked prospect for TopDrawerSoccer com and the No. 39-ranked recruit in the ESPNHS 150.

A three-star recruit from Fort Myers High School, Emerson was featured as an ESPNRise Player to Watch and TopDrawerSoccer.com Player to Watch as a high school senior.

Redshirt freshman Victoria Sample was sure to be a factor in the midfield rotation during her rookie season last fall before suffering a season-ending knee injury in preseason training. After returning to fitness, Sample will again provide the program with depth in the midfield along with sophomore Nicole Mclaughlin and freshman Mariel Mclaughlin.

Junior Danielle Murphy is sure to split her time between the front line and midfield as she also saw action on the wing as a top reserve late in the season a year ago. Murphy has made 20 appearances in the last two seasons as she embarks on her junior campaign this fall.

DEFENDERS

Despite losing their defensive leader in the midfield with Allysha Chapman's departure following the 2011 season, the Tigers will be anchored by a seasoned back line that is sure to emerge as one of the SEC's best defensive units again this fall with three full-time starters returning and as many as eight players looking to crack the playing rotation in 2012.

Junior Alex Ramsey is the leader of the group as the most experienced member of LSU's back line with 42 starts under her belt in her two seasons with the Tigers. She cracked the starting 11 as LSU's right back during her rookie campaign in 2010 before making a transition over to the left side as one of the SEC's premier left backs as a sophomore in 2011.

Ramsey will make the move back to the right side this year with the emergence of fellow junior Nina Anderson as LSU's starting left back during the spring campaign.

A physical presence on the back line, the left-footed Anderson saw action as a reserve wing midfielder during her freshman and sophomore seasons with 32 appearances before moving to the back this spring. Anderson's athleticism is sure to provide another dimension to the squad's back line as she will look to join in the attack at times from her left back position.

Sophomore All-SEC candidate Jodi Calloway is the lynchoin in the middle of the defense in the wake of a 2011 season in which she was selected to the SEC

Calloway, who missed her true freshman season in 2010 with a torn ACL suffered during the summer before her arrival in Baton Rouge, emerged as one of the nation's top young center backs while returning to form with 22 starts a season ago. She certainly gave supporters a glimpse of her untapped potential after joining the program as a TopDrawerSoccer.com Top 100 recruit in the country for the Class of 2010 as the No. 77-ranked prep prospect nationally.

Alex Arlitt joined Calloway as a member of the 2011 SEC All-Freshman Team after moving to the back line full-time midway through her rookie season when she finished the year as the club's starting right back. But with Anderson's emergence at left back in the spring and Ramsey's return to the right side of the field, Arlitt is likely to transition back to the midfield as a sophomore while providing the Tigers with experienced defensive help as needed.

Also providing depth on the right side of the line is junior Shannon McLain, who cracked the starting

lineup in 12 of 18 matches for the Tigers a year ago. The Tigers must find a replacement in the middle

following the departure of team captain Kellie Murnby in the wake of the 2011 season, Murnby made 54 starts in her 87 appearances as a Tiger, including 43 starts in her final two seasons as one of the team's starting center backs.

Senior Reyna Lubin appeared to have the inside track in the spring, but her availability in the fall season is unknown after suffering a torn ACL in her knee at the onset of the spring season in February.

While playing as a wing midfielder in her first three seasons as an LSU Tiger, senior Natalie Ieyoub is penciled in as the starter at left center back beside Calloway entering the season. Sample is also sure to get a look in the middle for depth at the nosition

GOALKEEPERS

The 2011 season saw the end of an era as Mo. Isom closed the books on a brilliant career as the most decorated goalkeeper in the history of the LSU Soccer program. In her four seasons in Baton Rouge, Isom made 69 starts in 73 appearances while wrapping up her tenure as LSU's career record holder with 43 wins, 30 shutouts, 235 saves and 0.86 goals against average from the 2008-11 seasons. She certainly helped provide a foundation for a team that claimed three division titles with three runner-up finishes for the SEC Championship during her career.

Isom also etched her name in the SEC record books as her 30 career shutouts rank No. 4 on the league's all-time list, while her school record 12 shutouts in 2009 remains tied for No. 3 on the SEC's single-season list to rank among the league's all-time greats.

While most programs might be left wondering what's next after losing a defensive anchor like Isom, the Tigers are blessed with a wealth of talent and depth in goal for the 2012 season as junior Megan Kinneman teams with freshman Morgan Ruhl for one of the SEC's top units.

Kinneman emerged as one of the top young goalkeepers in the country with the effort she showed as a freshman in 2010 as she turned a record-breaking season into All-SEC consideration and a selection to the SEC All-Freshman Team. While cracking LSU's starting 11 in 14 games as a rookie, Kinneman set a new school single-season record with a 0.66 goals against average as the No. 1-ranked goalkeeper in the SEC for the 2010 campaign.

A native of Missouri City, Texas, Kinneman has started 17 of 19 games in two seasons as an LSU Tiger after joining the program as a TopDrawerSoccer.com Top 100 recruit nationally for the recruiting Class of 2010. She was the nation's No. 96-ranked recruit overall and No. 9-ranked goalkeeper recruit during her senior season at Flkins High School

Like Kinneman, Ruhl joined the LSU program as a national recruit as she also earned her reputation as a TopDrawerSoccer.com Top 100 recruit nationally in the Class of 2012.

As a senior at The McDonogh School in Hereford, Md., Ruhl finished the 2012 season as the No. 93-ranked prep prospect in the United States and the No. 11-ranked gnalkeeper recruit for her graduating class. She has earned experience

at the highest levels of youth soccer in the United States, which includes a stint with the Under-15 U.S. Women's National Team in 2009.

"We're fortunate to have two goalkeepers of this quality to help anchor our defense in the 2012 season," Lee said. "That kind of competition is only going to make our defense better as we compete for an SEC championship again this fall. You must have that kind of depth to make a run in this league, and we certainly feel like we have that in

2012 SEC Women's **Soccer Tournament**

Monday-Sunday Oct. 29-Nov. 4 Orange Beach, Ala. Orange Beach SportsPlex

The 2012 Southeastern Conference Women's Soccer Tournament will feature an extended field for the first time following the addition of Missouri and Texas A&M this fall. The top 10 teams from the slate of 14 SEC squads will make the trip to the Orange Beach Sportsplex in Orange Beach, Ala., for one of the premier conference tournaments in NCAA soccer. The SEC Tournament Championship Game is scheduled for a live television broadcast on ESPNU on Nov. 4 at 2 p.m. CT.



2012 NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament

The NCAA will select 64 teams to compete in the 2012 NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament. There are 28

conferences that will receive one automatic bid into the field of 64 teams. The remaining 36 teams selected for the postseason will receive at-large bids based on their performance during the regular season.

The first round of the NCAA Tournament is scheduled for Nov. 9-11 at 32 host sites yet to be determined. The second and third rounds will be held the following weekend from Nov. 16-18 at eight undetermined campus sites. The NCAA quarterfinals will then be held Nov. 23-25. The 12th-annual NCAA Women's College Cup will be held in San Diego, Calif., with the semifinals on Friday, Nov. 30 and the championship game on Sunday, Dec. 2 at the Torero Stadium.

THE VISION

LSU is the sleeping giant of college soccer. My vision for LSU is to build a program that annually contends to win the SEC, qualifies for the NCAA College Cup and competes to win a National Championship. The foundation that we've built these last seven years has given us that opportunity to compete at the highest level of college soccer.

THE PHILOSOPHY

I believe in a commitment to excellence from our players, coaches and staff in all facets of the program. We will provide an environment in which our student-athletes can maximize their full potential as students in competition, in the classroom and in the community.

The Brian Lee Era

When Brian Lee took the reigns of the LSU Soccer program in December 2004, he envisioned a program with the potential to be a perennial contender for the Southeastern Conference championship and an annual participant in the NCAA Tournament. His bold vision to transform LSU Soccer into a nationally-respected program has produced unprecedented results as the Tigers enter the 2012 campaign as the reigning SEC Western Division champions and NCAA Tournament qualifiers from a season ago.

In fact, Lee has guided the Tigers to the SEC West crown and an at-large berth into the NCAA Tournament in four of the last five seasons, including an impressive three-year run for the program in 2007, 2008 and 2009. The Tigers have twice advanced to the NCAA Second Round in both the 2007 and 2009 seasons.

The Tigers have also proven themselves as perennial contenders for the SEC regular season championship, while claiming second place in the final league table during the 2008, 2009 and 2011 seasons to match their best conference finish in program history.

In Lee's seven seasons in Baton Rouge, the Tigers have posted a 79-47-25 overall record with an impressive 39-25-13 mark in conference play. And since capturing its first SEC West title in 2007, LSU Soccer has posted a .664 winning percentage with a 32-14-9 record against teams in the Southeastern Conference, including a school record eight SEC wins in 2009 and 2011.

The Tigers have been dominant against their division rivals in their run of four SEC West championships in five seasons with a nearly flawless 20-4-5 mark with a .776 winning percentage in matches played in the regular season and SEC Tournament during that span.

Tigers Shine in National Spotlight

LSU soared to new heights in 2009 by matching the school wins record with a 154+5 overall mark and establishing a new school record with an 8-2-1 mark and 25 points in SEC play. For the second-straight season, the Tigers finished in second place in the final SEC standings and just one point shy of Florida for their first ever SEC championship. LSU then took a No. 2 seed to the SEC Tournament and advanced to the conference final for the first time in program history.

The Tigers were rewarded for their outstanding performance with a No. 4 national seed in the NCAA Tournament, while serving as a regional host for the first time in team history and advancing to the NCAA Second Round for the second time in three seasons following a first ever appearance in the second round of the postseason in 2007.

Their effort helped land a No. 14 national ranking at the end of the 2009 season in the final Top 25 ranking released by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America. It marked the second year in a row for LSU to finish a campaign as high as No. 14 in the national rankings.

World-class midfielder Malorie Rutledge was at the center of LSU's emergence into the national spotlight. After being recruited by Lee as part of a heralded Class of 2006, the Sharpsburg, Ga., product wrapped up her collegiate career in 2009 as the most decorated Tiger to step on the pitch. Rutledge earned consensus All-America accolades in 2008 and 2009, while also being picked as a two-time SEC Offensive Player of the Year and three-time First-Team All-SEC performer during her brilliant career

Rutledge rewrote the school record books in four seasons in Baton Rouge while setting LSU career records with 46 assists and 102 points from 2006-09. She added 28 goals as the club's most prolific



scorer in its 17 years of collegiate competition. Rutledge wrapped up her career with an NCAA-leading 18 assists as a senior in 2009 in shattering her own team single-season mark.

While Lee has coached 14 Tigers to 27 All-SEC selections in his seven seasons, LSU was recognized with a team-best five all-conference selections in 2009.

Joining Rutledge on the All-SEC squad were defender Chelsea Potts (first-team), midfielder Allysha Chapman (second-team), midfielder Melissa Clarke (second-team) and forward Carlie Banks (all-freshman). Both Clarke and Potts ended their collegiate careers in 2009 as three-time All-SEC performers following their senior season.

The Tigers nearly matched that performance in 2011 as they again finished runner up for the SEC championship with a 13-8-1 overall record and their second-best league mark in program history at 8-3 with 24 points on the final SEC table. That earned the Tigers their fourth SEC West title and fourth at-large berth into the NCAA Tournament in the last five seasons.

Chapman led the charge for the Tigers in 2011 with her second First-Team All-SEC selection and third All-SEC honor in her collegiate career. She also made history by becoming the first LSU Tiger to be selected the SEC Defensive Player of the Year with her performance as one of the premier defensive talents in all of college soccer.

Five Tigers were again honored as All-SEC selections a year ago as Chapman was joined on the squad by seniors Taryne Boudreau (first-team) and Natalie Martineau (second-team) and freshmen Alex Arlitt (all-freshman) and Jodi Calloway (all-freshman).

Individually, Lee has coached five athletes to All-America honors and six athletes to Freshman All-America honors in 18 seasons as a head coach. In addition, he has coached four Southern Conference Players of the Year, five Southern Conference Freshmen of the Year and three SEC Players of the Year, while guiding his athletes to a total of 79 all-conference selections since his first season as a head coach in 1994.

Despite finishing in 12th place in the final SEC standings in each of the previous two seasons prior to Lee's arrival in Baton Rouge, LSU Soccer has shown steady progress and continued staying power in their ascent to the top of the SEC as the squad finished in eighth place in 2005 and 2006, fourth place in 2007 and second place in 2008, 2009 and 2011.

The Tigers have also been a staple in the national rankings in each of the last four seasons while cracking the Top 25 in all three major polls. They have climbed as high as No. 9 in 2008, No. 10 in 2009, No. 18 in 2010 and No. 14 in 2011 in the national rankings. They have now been ranked among the Top 20 teams in the country for 24 weeks over the last four seasons to continue their ascent to the pinnacle of women's college soccer.

Tigers Battle Nation's Elite

Lee and his dedicated coaching staff have built a program with the ability to compete with anyone in women's college soccer. That was never more evident than in 2007 when LSU battled No. 4-ranked Texas to a 2-2 draw on the road in Austin and dominated No. 6-ranked Tennessee by a 3-0 margin at home for the program's first victory against an opponent ranked as one of the Top 10 teams in the country.

The Tigers were impressive again in 2009 when they earned a pair of shutout wins versus teams in the Top 10 of the polls with a 6-0 blanking of No. 8-ranked Georgia and a 1-0 shutout of No. 10-ranked South Carolina in a pair of matches played at the LSU Soccer Stadium. The Tigers and Gamecocks then battled to a 1-1 draw in the SEC Tournament final during the 2009 season.

In 2011, LSU Soccer earned its fourth at-large NCAA Tournament berth in five seasons on the strength of a resume that featured a pair of shutout wins over No. 10 Tennessee and No. 11 Florida in conference play en route to a third runner-up finish in the final SEC standings.

With the Volunteers bringing a Top 10 national ranking to Baton Rouge for the second time in three seasons, the Tigers were dominant in a 2-0 shutout to extend their unbeaten streak to four-straight in the series. The Tigers then made history with a trip to Gainesville, Fla., on Oct. 23 as they pitched a 1-0 shutout to score their first victory over the powerful Gators and hand Florida only its fourth defeat in SEC play at Pressly Stadium in its history.

The Tigers have more than proven themselves against elite competition in Lee's tenure as they have scored six wins and nine draws against nationally-ranked opponents since 2007.

LSU Soccer: A Box Office Smash

Lee's impact has not only been felt with unprecedented results on the field, but also at the box office as record crowds have packed the LSU Soccer Stadium week in and week out to watch the Tigers in action since his arrival in Baton Rouge.

The 2011 season witnessed the birth of a new era of LSU Soccer as the Tigers christened the new LSU Soccer Stadium on the night of Sept. 9 with a dramatic 1-0 shutout of the Oregon Ducks before a record crowd of 2,542 supporters on hand for the festivities. It proved a fitting end to a night of celebration of one of the top rising programs in all of college soccer as the squad opened a stadium that stands as one of the true jewels of the Southeastern Conference.

The Tigers wrapped up the 2011 campaign ranked among the Top 20 teams nationwide in average attendance while drawing an average of 1,174 fans in their nine matches played at the new LSU Soccer Stadium to stand as the NCAA's No. 17-ranked program at the box office.

The 2007 season proved to be unlike any other in the history of the program as the Tigers were unbeaten at the LSU Soccer Stadium for the first time with a 5-0-3 record while drawing an average of 1,294 fans per match. That ranked LSU Soccer among the Top 10 teams in the country in average attendance for the first time as the team finished the season at No. 7 in the NCAA with average paid attendance. The Tigers set three single-game attendance records on the season which includes a previous record crowd of 2,402 for its 3-0 win over No. 6 Tennessee on Oct. 5, 2007.

LSU Soccer has been nearly unbeatable on its home turf while following an unbeaten season in 2007 with an 8-1 mark in 2008, a 7-1-2 mark in 2009, a 6-1-2 mark in 2010 and a 7-1-1 mark in 2011 for a combined 33-4-8 record at the LSU Soccer Stadium over the past five seasons.

Tigers Lead by Example

Not only have the Tigers proven to be one of the SEC's top programs with their effort on the field in seven seasons under Lee's direction, but they have also taken great pride in their performance off the field as they are the unquestioned University leaders in community service as winners of four-straight Tiger Cups in 2009, 2010, 2011 and 2012

The Tiger Cup is presented each season by the Tiger Athletic Foundation as part of the annual TAF Academic Excellence Gala to the athletic program that best represents the University with its performance on and off the field. The winner of the Tiger Cup is determined using a point system based on a team's final conference and national ranking, cumulative team grade-point average and community service hours accumulated during the previous academic year.

Lee's athletes boast a proven track record in the classroom as his teams have earned six NSCAA Team Academic Awards. A total of 122 student-athletes were selected to the Southern Conference Academic Honor Roll in his 11 years at Furman, while 73 Tigers have been named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll in his seven seasons in Baton Rouge.

LSU Soccer actually set a program record following the 2011 season with its 14 selections to the SEC Fall Academic Honor Roll, eclipsing its previous team best of 11 selections that had been matched four previous times in 2002, 2003, 2005 and 2007. It was that performance in the classroom that earned the Tigers the NSCAA Team Academic Award for the 2011 season

Lee Brings Proven Track Record to Tigers

Winning conference titles and leading a nationally prominent program are nothing new for the native of Cheltenham, England, who led the Furman Lady Paladins to six Southern Conference Championships and four NCAA Tournament appearances during his 11-year tenure after starting the program from scratch in 1994.

In 11 seasons, Lee's teams amassed a 144-80-10 overall record, including an impressive 76-16-3 mark in conference play. The Lady Paladins went undefeated in conference play three times (1999, 2000, 2002) and were just shy of perfection in 2003 after finishing the season with a 10-0-1 record in Southern Conference play.

For his many accomplishments, Lee was named the Southern Conference Coach of the Year five times and was named the NSCAA and Soccer Buzz Southeast Region Coach of the Year in 1999, the same year in which he was selected as a finalist for the NSCAA National Coach of the Year Award.

In addition to his experience coaching at the collegiate level, Lee served on the staff of the Region III Olympic Development Program Team from 1999-2008, while reaching the rank of assistant coach of the Region III ODP Team in 2006.

A successful athlete in his own right, Lee earned four letters with the Furman men's soccer team from 1989-92 as an integral part of three Southern Conference titles and was voted team captain and selected as the team's Most Valuable Player as a senior. He also led his team to its first ever NCAA Tournament appearance and a berth in the NCAA Sweet 16 in 1991.

Lee, 41, graduated from Furman in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in political science. He and his wife, the former Nancy Repsher of Westboro, Mass., and also a 1993 graduate of Furman, have two children - Aidan, 8, and Abby, 6.

There is no doubt that in order for a program to compete for championships year in and year out, it must have an outstanding coaching staff in place to guide the way. In seven seasons as a member of Brian Lee's staff at LSU, Debbie Hensley has more than proven herself as one of the top assistant coaches in the country while helping to lead the Tigers to national prominence as one of the premier programs in the Southeastern

It is for that reason that Hensley was promoted to the rank of associate head coach before the start of the 2008 campaign as she now enters her eighth season at LSU.

Adding Hensley to his staff was an easy decision for Lee when he took the head coaching job in December 2004 after coaching together at Furman for three years.

"We certainly would not enjoy the kind of success we do now without the leadership that Debbie brings to this coaching staff," Lee said. "She is an outstanding leader of young women, and she has helped us attract many of the best players in the country to LSU with her tremendous recruiting ability. Her passion for the sport is unmatched by anyone I've ever worked with."

That passion has certainly paid dividends on the field as Hensley has helped build LSU into the championship program it is today. The Tigers enter the 2012 season as winners of the SEC Western Division championship in four of the last five seasons, while also earning an at-large berth into the NCAA Tournament in each season in 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2011.

LSU is also on the cusp of claiming its first SEC Championship after finishing runner-up in the final league standings in three of the last four seasons. That includes a record-breaking 2009 campaign in which the Tigers finished in second place on the table for the second year in a row, while making a school record for wins with a 15-4-5 overall record and establishing a school record with an 8-2-1 mark and 25 points in conference play. They nearly matched that effort in 2011 when they were again the SEC runners-up with an 8-3 conference record.

In 2010, the Tigers advanced to the SEC Tournament semifinal for the fourth season in a row as they joined the powerful Florida Gators as the only programs in the SEC to advance to the semifinal round of the conference tourney in each season from 2007-10.

Hensley has been a driving force in that success as she has established a reputation as one of the nation's top recruiters attracting many of the best players in the country to Baton Rouge.

She led the way in LSU signing its first ever Top 25 recruiting class in 2005 as the Tigers were ranked No. 25 on the recruiting trail that year. Hensley followed that effort in 2006 by helping Lee to sign the first Top 10 recruiting class in the history of the LSU soccer program with a crop of future stars ranked No. 7 nationally in the Soccer Buzz Magazine recruiting rankings.

The Class of 2006 is the most decorated class in the history of the LSU soccer program as it completed its eligibility in 2009 with a class record of 50 wins in four seasons from 2006-09. The group captured three SEC West titles, earned three NCAA Tournament selections, placed second in the final SEC standings twice and combined for 10 All-America and 12 All-SEC picks in four seasons in Baton Rouge.

And the future of the program remains bright for years to come as the Tigers welcomed a pair of Top 10 recruiting classes to campus in 2010 and 2012 that are sure to build the foundation of another championship run this fall.

Hensley helped recruit a Class of 2010 that included five TopDrawerSoccer.com Top 100 players nationally, as well as four of the Top 15 players in the state of Texas and the No. 1-ranked prospect from Florida, South Carolina and Louisiana. After guiding the Tigers to another division title and return trip to the NCAA Tournament last fall, this talented junior class is poised to add to its resume as one of the premier classes in the history of the LSU

Following in its footsteps is a heralded six-member Class of 2012 featuring four standout prospects with international experience as members of youth national teams in Canada, Mexico and the United States and giving the Tigers an international flair for years to come.

"There's no doubt that recruiting is the lifeblood of any program at this level, and we are certainly fortunate to have someone like Debbie leading our recruiting efforts," Lee said. "She is an outstanding evaluator of talent and has the ability to target the players we feel can thrive in our program both on and off the field. That's been a key in building the foundation we have now."

Hensley compiled a 60-52-9 record in six years at Western Carolina after starting the program from scratch prior to the 1999 season. She led the Catamounts to a 10-9-1 record and a Southern Conference Tournament appearance in her inaugural season and was named the SoCon Coach of the Year in 2001 after guiding the team to the Southern Conference regular season title with a 16-6 overall record and 8-2 mark in league play.

Hensley coached seven players to 11 All-Southern Conference honors in her time at Western Carolina, a total that includes three first-team selections. In addition to her duties as head coach of the program, Hensley also served as university's Assistant Athletics Director and Senior Woman Administrator.

Prior to her stint at WCU, Hensley spent three seasons as an assistant coach under Lee at Furman where she recruited eight players who earned all-conference accolades in their careers.

Along with her coaching achievements, Hensley garnered recognition during her athletic career as a soccer and softball standout at Georgia Southern where she was a three-time first-team All-SoCon selection and led the conference in scoring as both a junior and a senior.

Hensley was selected to play in the Umbro Select College All-Star Classic after being named an NSCAA Regional All-American and All-Region honoree in 1995, and she was named the Georgia Female College Athlete of the Year by the Georgia Hall of Fame the same year.

The two-sport standout was also a first-team all-conference selection in softball as she set the Georgia Southern career record for stolen bases and runs scored. She graduated with a bachelor's degree in education from Georgia Southern in 1996 and a master's degree in health and exercise science from Furman in 1998.

Assistant Coach \ COACHES

With just over a month remaining before the start of the 2010 regular season, head coach Brian Lee hit a "home run" when he announced the hiring of former College of Charleston women's soccer head coach Kevin Dempsey to complete the Tigers' coaching staff before the start of the fall season.

It was an addition that paid immediate dividends for the Tigers as Dempsey coached the premier defensive unit in program history as they matched a program record for fewest goals allowed in a season with 16 and nearly set a school record with a 0.72 goals against average in 21 matches in 2010. In fact, the Tigers finished the season tied for the No. 1 spot in the SEC in goals allowed and wrapped up the season ranked No. 2 for goals against average among the league's 12 programs with their performance.

As the primary coach of LSU's defensive back line, Dempsey was instrumental in Canadian international Allysha Chapman earning her first career First-Team All-SEC selection as one of the leading defenders in the Southeastern Conference.

Chapman made history as a senior in 2011 when she became the first Tiger in program history to be named the SEC Defensive Player of the Year while also earning her second First-Team All-SEC honor as one of the elite performers in all of college soccer. Chapman was joined on the All-SEC squad by a pair of rookie defenders in Texas natives Alex Arlitt and Jodi Calloway, who each earned selections to the SEC All-Freshman Team as two of the SEC's emerging talents.

Demosey's defensive unit was a catalyst in the Tigers winning their fourth SEC Western Division championship in five seasons and earning a return trip to the NCAA Tournament for the fourth time in the team's history a year ago. They wrapped up the 2011 season with a 13-8-1 overall record and an 8-3 mark in league play for their third runner-up finish in the final SEC standings.

The LSU Soccer program is on the cusp of its first SEC Championship after earning second-place finishes in three of the last four seasons in 2008, 2009 and 2011.

Dempsey has also hit the ground running on the recruiting trail while making an immediate impact for the Tigers, highlighted by a Class of 2012 that was ranked among the Top 10 recruiting classes in the NCAA. Widely respected as one of the top recruiters nationally and internationally, Dempsey will continue to be a driving force in attracting world-class talent from across the globe to Baton Rouge for many years to come.

Dempsey joined the LSU program following an outstanding nine-year stint as the head coach at the College of Charleston, where he led the Cougars to an 86-70-22 overall record and a 54-32-8 mark in Southern Conference play since 2001. That included an overall record of 24-12-6 in his final two seasons.

He teams with Lee and associate head coach Debbie Hensley to form the core of an outstanding coaching staff with a combined 33 years of head coaching experience at the NCAA Division I level. Lee has been a head coach at the NCAA Division I level for the past 18 seasons, while Hensley was the coach at Western Carolina for six seasons before joining Lee's staff at LSU.

The Cougars flourished in nine seasons under Dempsey's direction as they reached the postseason in each with nine appearances in the SoCon Tournament, including runner-up finishes in 2002 and 2009. The side earned 28 All-SoCon and All-SoCon Tournament selections under Dempsey.

The Cougars were also outstanding in the classroom during Dempsey's tenure while winning the NSCAA Team Academic Award in each of his nine seasons while posting a team GPA of 3.0 or higher. In addition, six Cougars were named NSCAA All-Region Scholar Athletes in his final two seasons at the College of Charleston, demonstrating his commitment to success both on and off the pitch.

"We are excited to have the experience that Kevin provides our program at LSU," Lee said. "He's already had a tremendous impact on our team and this community in his two years here. That is especially true with his ability to recruit world-class talent and attract the caliber of athlete we will need to challenge for SEC and national championships for years to come.

"I approach the staff just like the team with a goal to go out and recruit the best. Having Kevin as a member of our staff has been a homerun hire for our program. With Kevin joining Debbie (Hensley) and the rest of our staff, we're fortunate to have a staff in place that will continue to recruit and develop the best players and people in all of college soccer."


Dempsey boasts 16 years of head coaching experience at the collegiate level during which he compiled an overall record of 166-116-29 since 1994. Prior to his appointment at the College of Charleston, Dempsey served as the head coach of the women's program at Catawba College of NCAA Division II for seven seasons from 1994-2000 while compiling an overall record of 80-46-7, including a 34-13-3 mark in the South Atlantic Conference.

After helping the Indians win South Atlantic Conference regular season and tournament titles as an assistant coach in 1993, the team captured four SAC Tournament titles in his seven seasons as a head coach in 1994, 1997, 1998 and 1999. He also led Catawba College to the NCAA Division II Southeast Region Championship in 1997 before earning its place in the national quarterfinals of the NCAA Division II Women's Soccer Tournament that same year.

In all, Dempsey coached 10 NCAA Division II All-Americans, 17 All-South Region selections, four SAC Players of the Year and four SAC Freshmen of the Year during his seven-year tenure while the head coach at Catawba

In addition to his experience as a head coach at the collegiate level, Dempsey also served as head coach of the Under-15 Region III Olympic Development Program Team for seven years from 2003-09.

Dempsey graduated from Catawba College in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in history. He and his wife, Krista, have a 7-year-old son named Jack.

Buete has probestrated the rise of one of the state's premier club programs over the past 12 years as the BRSC has captured more than 40 Louisiana state titles among all age groups since the summer of 2000. SEASON REVIEW



Tigers Solidify Status among SEC's Elite in 2011

For the third time in four seasons, the LSU Soccer team finished as the Southeastern Conference runner-up after posting an 8-3 mark with 24 points in 11 conference matches during the 2011 season. The Tigers came up just three points short of their first SEC crown as the South Carolina Gamecocks took the title with a 9-2 mark and 27 points during the conference season. LSU matched its best league finish after also earning a second-place finish on the final SEC table in back-to-back seasons in 2008 and 2009. The squad recorded its second-best conference record in program history while finishing the season just one point shy of its 25 points with an 8-2-1 record for a runner-up finish in the SEC standings in 2009. The Tigers were 7-3-1 in conference play in 2008.

Tigers Continue SEC West Dominance with Division Title

The LSU Soccer program has dominated the SEC Western Division in recent years while winning four division championships during the past five seasons. After winning a three-peat of SEC West titles from 2007-09, the Tigers captured the program's fourth division crown with an 8-3 mark and 24 points in conference play during the 2011 campaign. LSU clinched the SEC West title with a 1-0 shutout of the 11th-ranked Florida Gators on Oct. 23 en route to an eight-point advantage over Auburn in the final division standings. Auburn finished the season with a 5-5-1 record and 16 points to finish well back in second place in the SEC West and in seventh place in the final SEC regular season standings. Since winning their first SEC Western Division crown in 2007, the Tigers have posted a 21-4-4 overall record against their division foes in matches played in the regular season and SEC Tournament.

LSU Soccer Earns Fourth NCAA Berth in 5 Seasons

On the strength of their runner-up finish in the final 2011 SEC standings, the Tigers earned an at-large berth into the NCAA Division I Women's Soccer Tournament for the fourth time in five seasons with the announcement of the field of 64 on Nov. 7. The Tigers faced the No. 3-seeded Texas A6M Aggies in the NCAA Tournament for the second time in three seasons in a first-round match played at Ellis Field in College Station, Texas. LSU's 2011 season came to an end with a 4-0 defeat to the Aggies in front of 2,384 supporters at Ellis Field. The Tigers also earned an NCAA Tournament berth in three-straight seasons from 2007-09.

Tigers in SEC Title Race in Regular-Season Finale

After clinching the SEC Western Division title with a 1-0 shutout of Florida on Oct. 23, the Tigers made the trip to Fayetteville, Ark., for their regular-season finale against the Arkansas Razorbacks in the hunt for the program's first SEC championship. With a win over the Razorbacks and a South Carolina defeat at Florida, the Tigers would clinch a share of the SEC crown on the final day of the regular season on Oct. 28. The Tigers trailed only the Gamecocks by three points on the SEC table as they took the field for their final match of the conference season as they posted a 7-3 mark with 21 points in 10 league matches. While the Tigers took care of their own business with a 3-0 shutout of the Razorbacks, the Gamecocks made history with their first ever win in Gainesville as they took down the five-time defending SEC champion Gators by a 2-1 margin to win their first conference championship.

Chapman Makes History as SEC Defensive Player of the Year

Senior Allysha Chapman wrapped up her collegiate career in 2011 as one of the all-time Tiger greats while earning three All-SEC selections as one of the elite defensive talents in all of college soccer in her three seasons in Baton Rouge. After claiming second-team honors as a sophomore in 2009, Chapman captured back-to-back first-team all-conference honors as a junior in 2010 and as a senior in 2011 as the SEC's premier defensive midfielder during her tenure. She made history a year ago as the first LSU Tiger to be selected as the SEC Defensive Player of the Year for her performance. Chapman received SEC Co-Defensive Player of the Year honors with South Carolina goalkeeper Sabrina D'Angelo and Auburn defender Julie King.

Boudreau Sparks LSU Offense in Senior Season

Canadian international Taryne Boudreau provided the offensive spark for the Tigers during her senior season in 2011 as she set career highs with 12 goals and 30 points as the team's leading scorer on the campaign. Boudreau was actually the SEC's leading scorer in conference play while scoring nine goals and 22 points in 11 league matches in leading the Tigers to their fourth SEC West crown and third runner-up finish in the final SEC standings in team history. That performance earned Boudreau her first career All-SEC selection as she received first-team honors as one of the SEC's most prolific scorers for the 2011 season.

Boudreau's Goal Gives Tigers Historic Victory in Gainesville

The LSU Soccer team made history on a beautiful Sunday afternoon in Gainesville by shutting out the 11th-ranked Florida Gators by a score of 1-0 to clinch its fourth SEC Western Division championship with its first win over Florida in program history. Boudreau certainly made LSU's first shot count with an impressive 40-yard strike following a goal kick in the 33rd minute of play. That is all the scoring the Tigers would need to come away with the victory and a precious three points for their effort as they withstood an offensive attack by the Gators over the final 57 minutes of play. It was an impressive victory for the Tigers as they handed the Gators only their fourth SEC home defeat at James G. Pressly Stadium in their program's 17-year history.





Martineau Wraps Up Collegiate Career as All-SEC Performer

Joining her fellow Canadians as a member of the All-SEC squad following the 2011 season was Tiger senior Natalie Martineau. In the wake of a senior season in which she scored four goals and dished out a career-high 10 assists as one of the SEC's premier midfielders, Martineau picked up a Second-Team All-SEC selection from the league's 12 head coaches a year ago. Her 10 assists ranked No. 2 for the season on the SEC scoring list, while it also cracked the top five at No. 4 on LSU's all-time single-season scoring list. Martineau is among three Tigers selected to the All-SEC team in 2011 as Boudreau and Chapman each earned first-team honors.

Rookies Arlitt, Calloway among SEC's Top Freshmen in 2011

While senior Allysha Chapman might have garnered most of the headlines in leading the Tigers on the defensive end as the SEC's Co-Defensive Player of the Year in 2011, the team also featured two of the league's emerging stars with the performance of freshmen Alex Arlitt and Jodi Calloway anchoring the defensive back line. Each earned a selection to the SEC All-Freshman Team after leading a defense that pitched eight shutouts and posted a 1.24 goals against average on the campaign. After playing much of the season in the midfield, Arlitt transitioned to the back line as LSU's starting right back in the latter half of the season. Calloway proved herself as the SEC's top young center back while anchoring the Tigers in the middle of the line.



Record Crowd Opens New LSU Soccer Stadium

Senior Taryne Boudreau electrified a record crowd of 2,542 fans in the grand opening of the brand new LSU Soccer Stadium with her left-footed wonder strike in the 82nd minute to lead the Tigers to a 1-0 shutout of the Oregon Ducks in their 2011 home opener on Sept. 9. Boudreau chested down a deflected ball in the midfield, turned and drove a left-footed blast into the upper right corner of the net from 30 yards at the 81:20 mark. Her effort ignited a roar like never before from the 2,542 supporters turning out at the LSU Soccer Stadium, shattering the program's previous attendance record of 2,402 fan on hand for LSU's 3-0 blanking of No. 6 Tennessee on Oct. 5, 2007, for the team's first victory over a top-10 ranked opponent.

Tigers Crack NCAA's Top 20 in Attendance for 2011 Season

The Tigers wrapped up the 2011 campaign ranked among the Top 20 teams nationwide in average attendance while drawing an average of 1,174 fans in their nine matches played at the new LSU Soccer Stadium to stand as the NCAA's No. 17-ranked program at the box office. LSU Soccer has been nearly unbeatable on its home turf at the LSU Soccer Stadium while following an unbeaten 5-0-3 season in 2007 with an 8-1 mark in 2008, a 7-1-2 mark in 2009, a 6-1-2 mark in 2010 and a 7-1-1 mark in 2011 for a combined 33-4-8 home record over the past five seasons. The Tigers set a program record in 2007 while drawing an average of 1,294 fans per match.



LSU Soccer Signs Top 10 Recruiting Class for 2012

In the wake of a 2011 campaign in which the LSU Soccer program again proved itself as an SEC championship contender, the Tigers solidified their position among the league's elite for years to come with one of the NCAA's Top 10 recruiting classes after signing six prep standouts to National Letters of Intent for the Class of 2012. Joining the program as incoming freshmen are Haley Emerson (Fort Myers, Fla.), Jade Kovacevic (Beorgetown, Ontario, Canada), Colby Maffei (Tampa, Fla.), Heather Magee (Colleyville, Texas), Fernanda Pina (Puebla, Mexico) and Morgan Ruhl (Hereford, Md.). Kovacevic and Pina are certainly jewels of the class after securing international experience with their respective Under-20 national teams. Magee (No. 31) and Ruhl (No. 80) were also ranked among the Top 100 prep recruits in the United States for the Class of 2012 by TopDrawerSoccer.com.

Tigers Win Fourth-Straight Tiger Cup at Annual Academic Gala

The Tiger Athletic Foundation hosts its Academic Excellence Gala each year to honor LSU's student-athletes who pursue excellence on and off the field, and for the third year in a row, the LSU Soccer program was honored as the recipient of the prestigious Tiger Cup for its performance on the field, in the classroom and in the community. The 2012 TAF Academic Excellence Gala was held on March 4 at the Cotillion Ballroom at the LSU Student Union. The recipient of the Tiger Cup is determined by combining a team's final conference and national ranking with its performance on the field, along with its cumulative team grade-point average and community service hours off the field during the previous academic year. While finishing as runners-up for the SEC Championship and earning an at-large berth into the NCAA Tournament in 2011, the LSU Soccer team totaled 568 community service hours to rank No. 2 among all athletic programs at LSU, as well as a 3.173 cumulative team GPA for the previous academic season.

LSU Soccer Sets Record on SEC Academic Honor Roll

The LSU Soccer team established a new program record when 14 student-athletes were honored as members of the 2011 Southeastern Conference Fall Academic Honor Roll for their efforts in the classroom during the 2011 spring, summer and fall semesters. With 14 SEC Academic Honor Roll selections, the Tigers shattered their previous team record of 11 selections that had been equaled four other times 2002, 2003, 2005 and 2007. 


