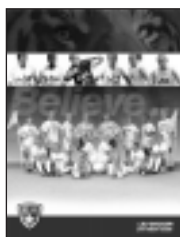

Reason to Believe

A winning season is an obvious goal for any athletic team, but for most, bigger aspirations exist. That is true for the LSU soccer team. The Tigers are coming off of a 10-9-1 season which included a multitude of positive moments and accomplishments. But the program seeks much more in 2004, and that sense of hunger has created a true "Reason to Believe."

The Tigers enter the 2004 season still attempting to propel themselves to the top of the always-competitive Southeastern Conference. LSU was a mere 2-7 in conference matches in 2003, but that record was deceiving. The Tigers dropped three matches by just one goal and two others by scores of 2-0.

The Tigers will be led by co-head coaches George and Danielle Fotopoulos this season, one of the rare husband-wife head coaching combos in collegiate soccer.

George Fotopoulos enters his fifth season with the program after serving as head coach for the past four years, compiling a 44-28-7 record. His wife Danielle, who served as a volunteer assistant coach last season, will look to utilize her knowledge and credibility to bolster the Tigers' staff. The former University of Florida standout is the NCAA's all-time leader in both points and goals for men or women. Fotopoulos was a member of the United States Women's World Cup Team that won gold in 1999.

The seven starters and 17 letterwinners the Tigers return from last season include their two top goal-scorers, their starting goalkeeper and the majority of their defense. LSU will need to replace seven letterwinners and four starters from last season, but seven newcomers -- six true freshmen and one junior transfer -- will help fill the void.

FORWARDS

The strength of LSU's team will be found at this position, as the Tigers' top two offensive weapons, senior Artie Brown and sophomore Stacy Bishop, both return in 2004.

Brown, a Baton Rouge native who has tallied 26 goals in her three seasons at LSU, led the team with 13 goals and 29 points a year ago. Brown's totals, which ranked second and fifth, respectively, among the SEC garnered her LSU's Offensive MVP award and her third straight All-Louisiana honor.

"We hope that Artie will continue where she left off during her junior year and have a stellar senior season," said George Fotopoulos. "She has been one of our most productive forwards in the last three years. She has had a very good career here. She's earned all-conference (2001 All-SEC second team) honors, while garnering many other accolades. I expect that she will finish her career as one of the top forwards in LSU history."

Bishop, a native of Land O'Lakes, Fla., returns after a superb freshman season. In 2003 she recorded 12 goals, including four game-winners, plus five assists for a total of 29 points. Bishop displayed her offensive prowess early on as she notched a five-goal performance in only the second game of her career, a 12-0 LSU victory over Jackson State. Bishop's five goals for 10 points established single-game school records in both categories and helped her earn 2003 Louisiana Freshman of the year honors.

"Any positive play we get from Stacy will be great," said Fotopoulos. "She still has some learning and growing to do, but in time I believe she has the ability to separate herself as one of the top forwards in the conference."

Adding depth to the forward position will be sophomores Michelle DeCespedes and Joleen

Philipps, who each contributed significantly a year ago. DeCespedes, who was limited to 16 games while battling an early season leg injury, still produced five goals and an assist. Philipps saw action in 19 games last season, scoring four goals. Alongside Brown and Bishop, both DeCespedes and Philipps will be counted on heavily in 2004 to in order for the Tigers to be a successful offensive unit.

MIDFIELDERS

The Tigers' midfield will be highlighted by returning starter Kate Ripple, but will also include two new members. Senior Chelsea Agar and sophomore Ashleigh Gunning, two of LSU's top defenders from a year ago, move to the position.

"We are changing our system of play and our team is going to be very defensive-minded," said Fotopoulos. "In our new system we're really trying to make our midfield into a second line of defense, with our first line being our back four."

The change will undoubtedly benefit players such as Agar and Gunning, who will use their speed and athleticism as former defenders to enhance the new system.

"Our flank midfield positions are also going to be very strong," said Fotopoulos. "I think people like Kate Ripple and Christine Haman will be counted on. We are also possibly looking at Tara Mitnick to move into the midfield, which would give us nothing but strength at that position."

Ripple played in all 20 games for the Tigers a year ago, notching one goal while contributing three assists in her first season with the Tigers. For her efforts, Ripple was named to the All-Louisiana second-team and was awarded the team's strength and conditioning award.

Haman and sophomore Julie Neumann will again be counted on after contributing significant minutes in 2003. Two true freshmen, Caroline Vanderpool and Marie Hastings, also look to make

an impact in the Tigers' midfield. Vanderpool, a native of Quebec, comes to Baton Rouge after playing on the U19 Canadian National team. Hastings, a native of Gainesville, Fla., joins the Tigers after earning second-team all-state accolades as a senior.

DEFENDERS

The defense that has always been a focal point of Fotopoulos' system was evidenced in 2003, when the Tigers recorded six shutouts and did not allow more than three goals in any conference match.

Even with LSU's top defenders moving to the midfield, the unit will still be formidable.

Tara Mitnick, a 2003 Soccer Buzz All-Central Region third team selection, is arguably the most skilled defender on LSU's roster. Seniors Suzanne Drake and Danielle Keath could each have considerable playing time at this position after both played more offensive-minded roles in 2003.

Sophomores Stephanie Ford and Jordan Parker should add depth to the Tigers' defense this season. Ford played in 12 games as a freshman.

Three new faces -- junior Holly Davis and freshmen Elena Sutherland and Sara Pollock -- will also join the backfield this season.

Davis, a junior transfer from nationally-ranked Texas A&M, could become one of the Tigers' best overall defenders after playing in 28 games in two seasons with the Aggies.

"Holly brings a great amount of experience to the team. She helped lead Texas A&M to a final-eight appearance back in 2002 and I expect she will compete for our starting left back position," said Fotopoulos.

Sutherland, of Sugarland, Texas, and Pollock, of Baton Rouge, are expected to compete for a starting job.

GOALKEEPERS

Robyn DesOrmeaux, a two year starter in the net for the Tigers, enters the 2004 season as LSU's top returning goalkeeper. The senior from Carencro, La., was named the Tigers' Defensive MVP last season, after leading a unit that recorded six shutouts.

"I think Robyn is somebody that we relied on greatly last year. She was our defensive MVP and she kept us in a lot of games," said

Fotopoulos. "Right now she's our No. 1 because she has a tremendous amount of experience and is someone that we are comfortable can be a difference-maker in our back line."

However, sophomore Heather Zurburg, who played in five games a year ago, will push for playing time along with true freshmen Keeli Cahalan and Valerie Vogler.

"We also return Heather Zurburg and bring in some new goalkeepers, so this may be the first time in a long time that Robyn will be pushed and tested a little," said Fotopoulos.

"Keeli is a highly-touted goalkeeper out of the state of Florida," said Fotopoulos. "She brings a lot of quickness and good ball-handling ability, and will compete for the starting goalkeeper position."

Vogler, a three-year starter at Oakville Senior High in St. Louis, was a first-team all-conference selection in 2001 after helping her team to a district championship that year.

"With the size and strength that is necessary to compete in the SEC, Valerie will also be competing for our goalkeeper position," added Fotopoulos.

SCHEDULE

As is always the case for teams in the Southeastern Conference, the schedule is grueling. According to Fotopoulos, the Tigers will play their most difficult schedule in the program's 10-year history.

LSU's schedule includes 11 SEC opponents and nine non-conference foes. The Tigers will have the advantage of facing 11 of those opponents at home.

"This is, without question, the most difficult schedule in LSU soccer history," said Fotopoulos. "We are playing nine teams that went to the 2003 NCAA Tournament. We have been building our roots for five years and now it is time to see if we can compete nationally."

The Tigers open the season at home with a weekend that features in-state rivals Southeastern Louisiana on Aug. 27 and Nicholls State on Aug. 29.

The following two weeks, LSU will welcome both Tulane and Stephen F. Austin to Baton Rouge before opening the road schedule in Columbus,

Ohio. LSU will square off with Ohio State and Dayton in the Buckeye Classic, Sept. 10-12.

The Tigers will remain on the road the following weekend when they travel to Boulder, Colo., to take on Colorado and Wyoming in the Colorado Classic Sept. 17 and 19.

The Tigers return home to open conference play versus Kentucky and Vanderbilt on Sept. 24 and 26 before taking to the road for two-straight SEC weekends.

LSU will travel to Ole Miss and Mississippi State (Oct. 1 and Oct. 3), followed by visits to both Georgia and Tennessee (Oct. 8 and Oct. 10).

LSU will play five of its last six games at home. The Tigers will face conference foes Alabama, Auburn, Florida and Arkansas at the LSU Soccer Complex and play South Carolina in Columbia. The Tigers wrap up the regular season Oct. 31 against Southern in the Mayor's Cup.

Postseason action will begin Nov. 3-7 at the SEC Tournament in Orange Beach, Ala.

The top team from each division will be seeded one and two based on conference record. Seeds three through eight will be determined by conference winning percentage, regardless of division.

2004 NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament

The NCAA will select 64 teams out of the more than 280 schools which sponsor Division I women's soccer to compete in the 2004 NCAA Tournament. The following 28 conferences will receive automatic qualifications to the field: America East, Atlantic Coast, Atlantic 10, Atlantic Sun, BIG EAST, Big Sky, Big Ten, Big 12, Big South, Big West, Colonial Athletic Association, Conference USA, Horizon League, Ivy League, Metro Atlantic Athletic, Mid-American, Mid-Continent, Missouri Valley, Mountain West, Northeast, Ohio Valley, Pacific-10, Patriot League, Southeastern, Southern, Southland, West Coast and Western Athletic. The remaining 36 teams will be chosen at-large based on their performance throughout the season.

The tournament's first and second rounds will be played on Nov. 12 and 14 at regional sites to be determined. The third round will be played Nov. 19-21 also at undetermined regional sites. The quarterfinal round will be played Nov. 26-28. The sixth NCAA Women's College Cup will be held in Cary, N.C., with the semifinals on Friday, Dec. 3, and the championship game on Sunday, Dec. 5, at SAS Stadium, the home of the WUSA's Carolina Courage.

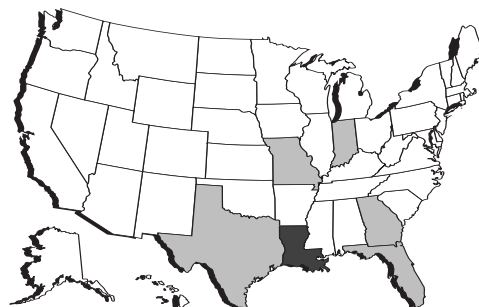

Danielle Fotopoulos is a household name to the majority of collegiate soccer fans in the nation, and now her name is officially associated with LSU. Fotopoulos and her husband George Fotopoulos will form one of the few husband-wife coaching combinations in the country.

Fotopoulos assisted the Tigers last season in a volunteer role, but is now prepared to help the LSU soccer program achieve unprecedented success. Fotopoulos, a star at the University of Florida from 1996-98, is the NCAA all-time leader in both points (284) and goals (118) in a career for both men and women. The native of Altamonte Springs, Fla., led the Gators to the 1998 national title as she scored the game-winning goal on a free kick in overtime versus North Carolina in the title game. She was subsequently named the 1998 Collegiate Player of the Year. Fotopolous was also named to Soccer America's College Team of the Decade for the 1990's.

Fotopoulos began her career at SMU, playing for the Mustangs from 1994-95 before transferring to Florida. She was a First-Team All-America selection for the Gators in 1998 and also led the nation in scoring in 1996. During her illustrious collegiate career, Fotopoulos was a three-time All-America selection, a two-time Soccer America Collegiate MVP, and was named the Southeastern Conference Player of the Year three times. Her teammate on the 1998 Florida squad was Tracy Hay, an assistant coach at LSU from 2000-03.

She was a founding player in the Women's United Soccer Association (WUSA) in 2001 and played for three seasons with the Carolina Courage. She also helped lead her Carolina team to the 2002 Founder's Cup, as she led the WUSA in points during the season. Fotopoulos ranks second all-time in WUSA history in points, notching 20 goals and adding 16 assists. She was also a two-time WUSA All-Star.

Fotopoulos will work closely with her husband and assistant coach Ricky Zambrano to help elevate the LSU program to the top of the Southeastern Conference.

Fotopoulos was a member of the 1996 Olympic team that won a gold medal and was part of the 1999 World Cup championship club, which defeated China in a thrilling shootout victory.

She was the recipient of the 11th annual Saint Leo University Women in Sports Achievement Award in Feb. 2004. Fotopoulos has been featured twice in Sports Illustrated's "Faces in the Crowd."

George and Danielle were married on June 8, 1996. They have one child, Alexia, who will turn four in November. The couple is expecting another child in July of 2004.

George Fotopoulos will join his wife Danielle as co-head coach of the LSU women's soccer program in 2004 after serving four seasons as head coach. Entering the 2004 campaign, Fotopoulos owns a 44-28-7 record at LSU, and is the all-time winningest coach in school history. During his first season at the helm of the LSU soccer program in 2000, Fotopoulos led the Tigers to a school-record 15 wins and a Southeastern Conference Tournament berth. With an overall record of 15-6, the Tigers posted their first winning season since 1996 and the 10-game turnaround earned the Tigers the title of Soccer Buzz's "Most Improved Team" in NCAA Division I.

In 2002, LSU went 12-5-3 and earned its first win in school history against a top-15 opponent, beating No. 15 Florida State, 2-1, in just the third game of the season. The win was enough to earn the Tigers a No. 10 ranking in the NSCAA Central Regional the day after the historic win. LSU also became the first No. 8 seed in SEC Tournament history to upset the top seed in the first round as the Tigers defeated No. 1 Auburn, 1-0.

Fotopoulos became LSU's all-time winningest coach in the Tigers' first match of the 2002 season. LSU blanked Stephen F. Austin, 2-0, in Nacogdoches, Texas. The win gave him 34 victories at LSU, passing Miriam Hickey for first on the all-time list.

Fotopoulos has made it his goal to instill a winning attitude in the Tigers and he has already been successful in that category. He expects only the best from his athletes and gives them the same. His name and reputation in the soccer world allow him to recruit some of the nation's

top athletes and have helped him turn the LSU program around. Fotopoulos came to LSU after accumulating a 20-14-1 record in two seasons at Division II University of Tampa. In 1998, he directed a first-year Tampa program to a 9-7-1 record and turned the Spartans into a nationally competitive program in just the next season. Tampa finished 11-7 in Fotopoulos' final season.

The Tigers raced to a 7-0-1 start last season before finishing 10-9-1, LSU's third winning season in four years under Fotopoulos.

A 1992 graduate of the University of Tampa, Fotopoulos played forward for the Spartans for two years after transferring from Old Dominion. He was named First-Team All-Sunshine State Conference twice. He was voted the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) National Field Player of the Year as a senior in 1992 after leading the Spartans to the Division II national championship game.

Fotopoulos was a member of the United States Open championship St. Petersburg Kickers in 1989 and played in the A-League for the Tampa Bay Cyclones in 1995. Fotopoulos was heavily involved in club soccer in the state of Florida before his arrival at LSU. He directed the Tampa Bay Heather soccer club to United States Youth Soccer Association (USYSA) national championships in the Under-19 and Under-20 age divisions. Fotopoulos placed over 125 Florida youth players on college teams. He also worked closely with the Florida Olympic Development Program throughout the 1990's.

Fotopoulos has a United States Soccer Federation (U.S.S.F.) "A" license, the highest level a coach can receive, and holds an NSCAA Advanced National Diploma. He was a member of the 2001 USYSA Region III Staff and is currently a state staff coach for the Louisiana Olympic Developmental Program.

Ricky Zambrano is entering his third season as an assistant coach at LSU after heading the men's team at St. Thomas University from 1998-2001. His responsibilities include serving as the team's recruiting coordinator in addition to being heavily involved in community relations and marketing and promotions. Zambrano's on-field duties include goalkeeper training and assisting with the handling of the Tigers' defense.

Under his watchful eye, the Tiger defense ranked first in the Southeastern Conference in 2002, giving up the fewest goals and points, allowing just 16 goals and 44 points.

In his highly successful tenure at St. Thomas, Zambrano accumulated a 47-30-3 overall record and led his team to Florida Sun Conference Championship titles in both 1998 and 2000.

St. Thomas finished the season ranked among the NAIA's top 25 teams in three of Zambrano's four seasons and in 2000 he piloted the Bobcats to a No. 5 ranking in the NAIA national poll. Zambrano garnered numerous coaching honors at St. Thomas and was named the Florida Sun Conference Co-Coach of the Year in 1998.

Zambrano holds several school records at St. Thomas, including highest all-time winning percentage (.606), wins in a season (16), set in 2000, most conference wins in a season (11), set in both 1998 and 2000, and most consecutive wins in a season (8), set in 2000. His team also set a school record by posting seven shutouts in 1998 and 2000. He led the team to its highest national ranking the school had ever achieved during a season, as St. Thomas earned a No. 5 ranking in The NAIA in 2000, and his club finished No. 12 in The NAIA that season, its highest final ranking in school history. Prior to becoming the head men's soccer coach at St. Thomas, Zambrano served as the team's assistant coach from 1995-98.

He received an NSCAA Advanced National Diploma in 2003 and received a U.S.S.F. National "B" Coaching license in 2000. He holds national memberships in the U.S.S.F. Coaches Organization, National Soccer Coaches Association, and the Latin American Soccer Coaches Association (LASCA). Zambrano is currently a state staff coach for the Louisiana Olympic Developmental Program. He serves as a scout for Region III in the United State Soccer Federation (U.S.S.F.) Minority Program and was a state staff coach for the Florida Olympic Developmental Program.

A 1996 graduate of St. Thomas University, Zambrano played midfield for the Bobcats from 1992-95. He was a member of the 1993 Florida Sun Conference championship team and also participated in the conference semi-finals in 1994 and 1995.

He earned his bachelor of arts degree in sports administration from St. Thomas University in 1996 and then received his master's of science degree in management in the spring of 2000.

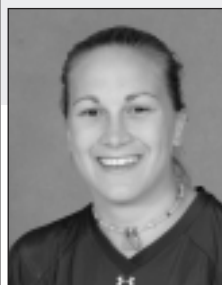

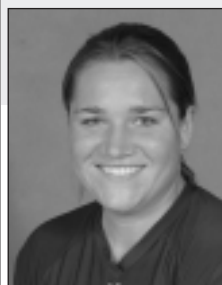

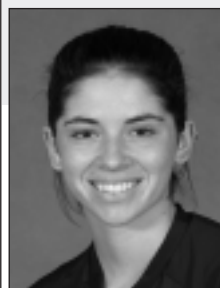

SEASON REVIEW

A Learning Experience

Expectations were overwhelmingly high for the 2003 LSU soccer team, possibly as high as anytime in the program's history. The Tigers were coming off a 2002 season in which they went 12-5-3 and won their first SEC Tournament match in school history. LSU head coach George Fotopoulos and his staff felt the program was turning the corner toward becoming a top contender in the rugged Southeastern Conference.

The Tigers' 2003 season may not have met all expectations, but it still contained much excitement and success. LSU posted a 10-9-1 record and scored the third-most goals in a season in school history (56). LSU also allowed just 27 goals in 2003, the third-fewest in school history.

LSU opened the season with five straight victories and entered conference play at 7-1-1 with a lone overtime loss against nationally-ranked Texas. The Tigers, led by freshman standout Stacy Bishop and junior Artie Brown, recorded 36 goals in those first nine matches. In the same stretch, the Tiger defense limited the opposition to a mere seven goals.

The Tigers began the season with a thrilling 2-1 win over Coastal Carolina in the nightcap of the Tiger Classic I Tournament. Senior midfielder Stephanie Keating took a pass from freshman Stacy Bishop to break the 1-1 tie in the 89th minute and secure the season-opening triumph. Just two days later LSU coasted to the Tiger Classic I Tournament title, defeating Jackson State,

12-0. With the victory, the Tigers established a new school record for goals scored in a game and moved to 2-0 for the first time since 2000.

LSU would also hold their next three opponents scoreless to notch their longest shutout streak since the 2000 season. In that span, the Tigers defeated McNeese State, 7-0, and later blanked Birmingham-Southern, 3-0, and Loyola (Md.), 2-0, to claim the title in the Tiger Classic II.

LSU surrendered its first goal of the season at Tulane on Sept. 12 as the Tigers and Green Wave battled to a 1-1 tie in double overtime.

The Tigers stayed on the road that weekend as LSU made a highly anticipated trip to Austin, Texas, to face No. 11 Texas at Mike A. Myers Stadium. The Tigers shocked the home crowd, racing to a 3-1 halftime lead. However, Texas' talent took over in the second half as the Longhorns tied up the match before eventually winning just 53 seconds into the overtime period.

LSU rebounded the following weekend, taking care of in-state rivals Louisiana-Lafayette and Southeastern Louisiana on the road while making final preparations for conference play.

The Tigers traveled to Kentucky on Oct. 3 to kickoff the SEC slate. Facing the Wildcats for the first time since the 2000 SEC Tournament, LSU allowed a goal in each half and was unable to muster a score on offense as Kentucky took the 2-0 win and dropped LSU to 7-2-1 and 0-1 in the SEC. The Tigers wrapped up a frustrating opening weekend in the SEC with a 1-0 loss to Vanderbilt.

The Tigers returned to Baton Rouge to take on Western-division rivals Ole Miss and

Mississippi State the following weekend. LSU fell to Ole Miss, 3-0, on Friday night. But the Tigers recovered Sunday with a solid 2-1 win over Mississippi State. Stephanie Keating and Artie Brown recorded goals in the contest as LSU improved to 7-2 all-time against the Bulldogs.

LSU posted its second-straight conference win with a convincing 4-1 victory over Georgia on Oct. 17. Keating netted two first-half goals and Brown scored her 11th goal of the season to improve LSU to 9-4-1 overall and 2-3 in conference play. Two days later, Tennessee overpowered LSU, 3-0, to end the Tigers' brief winning streak. Despite the setback, LSU still entered its final conference weekend with a chance to finish above .500 and qualify for the SEC Tournament.

The Tigers got off to a fast start in their Oct. 24 match at Alabama. Brown set a school record by scoring just 21 seconds into the game. However, the tide quickly turned on LSU as Alabama scored the next three goals to hang on for the 3-2 win.

LSU then completed the conference weekend with a road trip to Auburn for the 14th-ranked Tigers' Senior Day. Auburn proved too tough for LSU, grabbing the 2-0 victory.

Taking a break from SEC action, LSU entered its Nov. 29 match at Nicholls State with a sparkling 7-1-1 mark against non-conference opponents and a 4-0 all-time record versus the in-state rival. However, the hangover from the Auburn loss remained and the Colonels shocked LSU, 2-1, in Thibodaux.

The Tigers made a final stop in Arkansas on Halloween night to finish up both its road and conference schedules. The two teams

seemed to score at will in the first half and Arkansas took a 3-2 lead into the locker room. The scoring rush stopped in the second half, and the Lady Razorbacks kept their lead. The lossLSU with a 2-7 mark in the conference and 9-9-1 record overall.

Needing a win versus crosstown-rival Southern to secure a second-straight winning season, the Tigers came up with just that on Senior Day. LSU scored a school record six first-half goals, including a hat trick from senior Rachel Cohen to defeat Southern, 9-0.

The Tigers were recognized for their many accomplishments both on and off the field when their season was finished. LSU placed five players on the 2003 All-Louisiana squad, led by Bishop, Brown and Keating on the first-team. Cohen and sophomore Kate Ripple earning second-team accolades. In addition, Bishop was honored as the state's Freshman of the Year. Tara Mitnick was named to the Soccer Buzz All-Central Region Third-Team.

Seven members of the team were selected to the 2003 SEC Fall Academic Honor Roll, while the team received the NSCAA Team Academic Award for the second straight season.

Junior Chelsea Agar furthered LSU's success off the field. Agar was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-District VI First Team and later chosen as a Third-Team Academic All-American. Agar, a biochemistry major, notched a perfect 4.0 GPA.

On the field, Stacy Bishop made an immediate impact in her first season in Baton Rouge. The forward scored 12 goals and tied a team-high 29 points. Those totals included four game-winning goals and five assists. Bishop also established school records for goals and points in a single game,

recording five and 10, respectively, in LSU's 12-0 win over Jackson State.

Seniors Rachel Cohen and Stephanie Keating each broke the school record for career assists during the 2003 season. Cohen and Keating each flew past former Tiger Tara Mitnick's previous record of 19. Cohen recorded four assists during the season to end her career with 22, while Keating led the team with nine assists to finish with a school-record 23.

Artie Brown wrapped up a successful junior season, contributing a team-high 13 goals and 29 points. Brown's goal and assist totals both ranked among the top five in the conference. For her efforts, Brown was selected to the All-Louisiana First Team and named the team's Offensive MVP. Brown was also named to the SEC Good Works Team for her extensive volunteer work in the Baton Rouge community.

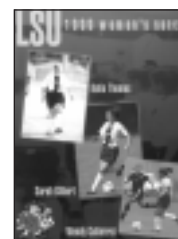

The LSU Honors College provides intellectual opportunity and challenge for academically able and intellectually motivated undergraduate students. History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning and Military Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The institution opened January 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the school's first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. The seminary reopened in 1869, but was soon destroyed by fire. The institution moved to Baton Rouge, opening on Nov. 1, 1869.

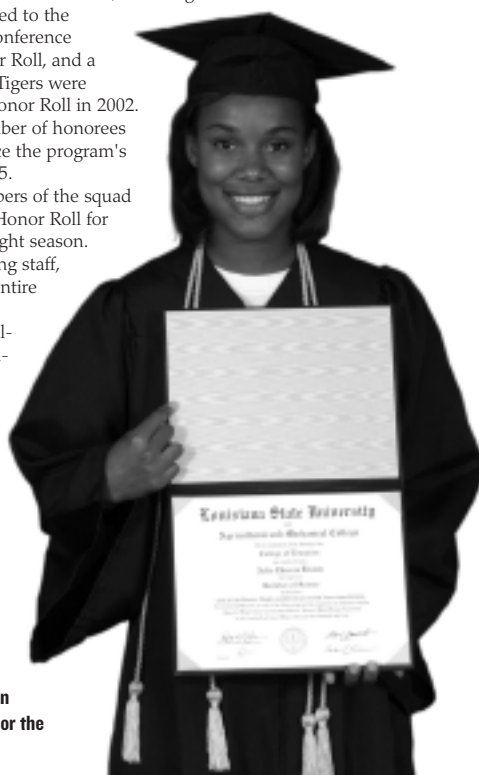

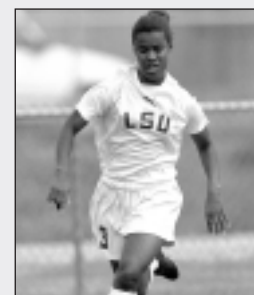

LSU SOCCER COMPLEX

Maintaining LSU's commitment to providing the finest athletic facilities in the nation, the Tigers will begin their eighth season at the state-of-the-art LSU Soccer Complex. The field was christened on September 13, 1996, when the Tigers hosted Southeastern Conference rival, Tennessee.

The LSU Soccer Complex, located just a half mile from the Mississippi River, provides seating for 1,500 spectators.

In addition, the stadium features a brand-new scoreboard, a modern sound system and is one of the only facilities in the SEC equipped with lights.

The LSU Soccer Complex has served as the host site of four prestigious tournaments in recent years and was most recently the sight of the 2001 SEC Tournament. The Complex also hosted an MLS game last spring between the Chicago Fire and the Colorado Rapids.

LSU Indoor Facility

When the weather prevents the soccer team from practicing at the LSU Soccer Complex, the team moves inside to the climate-controlled football practice facility. Located at the site of LSU's outdoor football practice fields, the indoor facility was built as part of a \$15 million upgrade of the LSU physical plant in the late 1980s and early 1990s and houses a full 100-yard football field.



Locker Room

The LSU soccer program boasts a modern, spacious, state-of-the-art locker room that includes locker rooms for both the Tigers and the visiting team, as well as a changing room for the game officials. There is also an on-site training room, a meeting room for the Tigers and offices for the LSU coaching staff.





The Jack and Priscilla Andonie Museum is home to LSU's Athletics history. The museum, located at the Lod Cook Alumni Center on LSU's campus, is full of artifacts and memorabilia from the Andonie's personal collection gathered by the couple over the past three decades that total about 13,000 pieces. The museum features 51 separate displays that include at least one area in the room for each of LSU's sports. There are also displays featuring LSU's five retired jerseys, the "Early Years" of LSU athletics, the Tiger Band and the Golden Girls, cheerleaders and Mike the Tiger. The center piece of the museum, which will change at least once a year, features "The Road to the National Championship," a game-by-game recap of the 2003 LSU football team's national championship season. Included in the display is a replica of the ADT National Championship trophy, coach Nick Saban's sideline headset, and an official game ball signed by the team.

Focused on aggressive rehabilitation, the Broussard Center for Athletic Training is furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. Some of the features of the 23,000-square foot facility include an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as state of the art hydrotherapy pools. The Broussard Center for Athletic Training is equipped with the largest hydrotherapy pools in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, as well as on-site x-ray room.

LSU is also the only school in college athletics with a training room equipped with a full-service vision center. The facility is named in honor of legendary trainer Dr. Martin J. Broussard, who served as LSU's athletic trainer for several decades.

The SKIP BERTMAN Legacy

Bertman's unyielding desire to succeed drove him to the pinnacle of his profession, and his astute knowledge of the game -- obtained from over 40 years of coaching -- combined with his steadfast determination and irrepressible enthusiasm transformed LSU Baseball into the nation's premier program.

Already a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has made the seamless transition into the athletics director's chair with the same enthusiasm, vision and demand for excellence that were trademarks of his stellar coaching career.

In just three years as LSU's director of athletics, Bertman has already added to his impressive list of on-the-field achievements. Under his direction, LSU enjoyed arguably the greatest athletics year in the history of the institution in 2003-04. Three teams won national championships, nine teams finished in the nation's top ten, and fourteen teams ranked in the top 25. LSU teams also enjoyed improved grade point averages across the board, making the LSU student-athlete experience a success on and off the fields of competition.

While supervising the Tigers' progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

Bertman is now in the midst of upgrading LSU's athletics complex. Working hand in hand with the Tiger Athletic Foundation, Bertman has already overseen the completion of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes while launching renovations to Tiger Stadium and the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, and beginning construction on a new Football Operations Center.

It was also Bertman who took the bold but essential move to implement a seat contribution program in Tiger Stadium to fund facility improvements and ensure the financial stability of the LSU Athletics Department for the next decade.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' \$52 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a Baseball America poll published in 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes and he was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters - Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertmans have three grandchildren - Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard, and Samuel Aaron, the son of Drew and Lisa Pate.

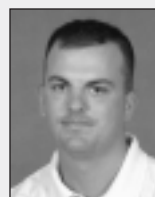

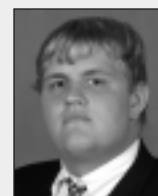

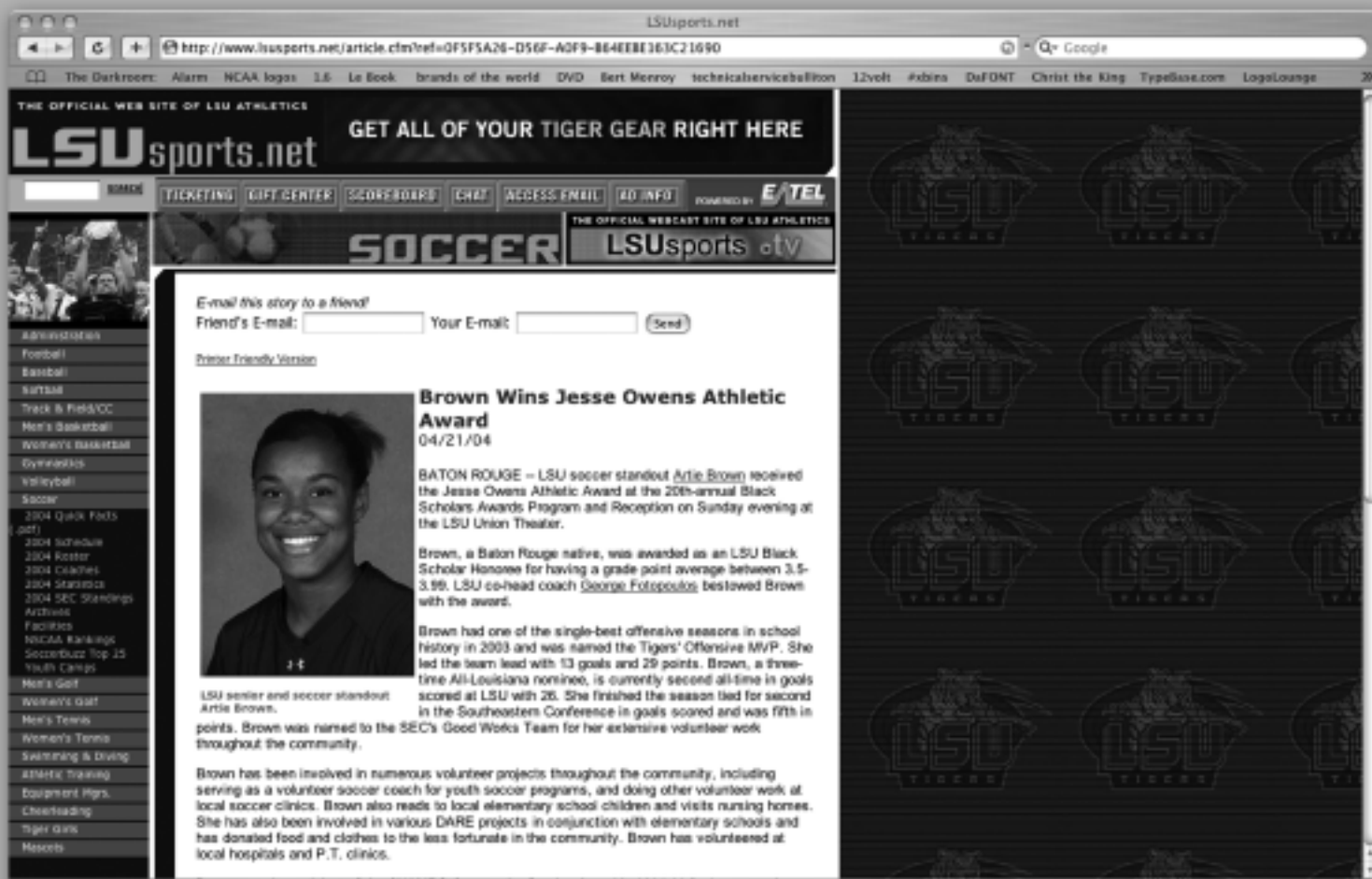
