



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

Led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame and in 1997 he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.

"Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50+ points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.



SHAQUILLE O'NEAL



One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner that helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



SKIP BERTMAN

The first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft, O'Neal was named the MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds during his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history. Currently plays for Miami Heat.

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also skippered the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and serves as LSU's athletics director.

LSU's Success in each of its 20 sports is evident with this outstanding list of Tigers.



JOSH REED

Reed re-wrote the SEC record books with a record 94 receptions for 1,740 yards on his way to winning the Biletnikoff Award in 2001. He was a consensus first-team All-America selection and led the nation in yards per game (145.0). Reed finished his career with then an SEC record 3,001 yards receiving on 167 catches.

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ESTHER JONES

A 21-time All-American while a LSU, Jones won a gold medal as a member of the United States' 4x100-meter relay team at the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona.



NICKI ARNSTAD

The 2002 NCAA Floor Exercise Co-Champion, Arnstad became the first LSU gymnast to win a national title in modern history. She was a four-time All-American and won the NCAA Central Regional floor and all-around titles in 2002.



PETA-GAYE DOWDIE

A 19-time All-American. Dowdie was a member of three NCAA Championship teams during her time at LSU and went on to compete for her native Jamaica at the 2000 Sydney Olympics.



BRITNI SNEED

One of three four-time first-team All-SEC selections in conference history, Sneed was a two-time SEC Player of the Year and was a three-time NFCA All-American, leading the Tigers to the Women's College World Series in 2001



WALTER DAVIS

A two-time Olympian, Davis helped LSU to national titles in 2001 and 2002. Named the SEC Male Athlete of the Year in 2002, he won six NCAA titles and earned nine All-America honors.



DAVID TOMS

The two-time SEC Player of the Year, Toms has gone on to a successful career on the PGA Tour. Among his PGA Tour victories was a thrilling win at the PGA Championship in August



MARIE FERDINAND

The eighth pick overall in the 2001 WNBA draft by the Utah Starzz. A Kodak All-American in 2000-01, she helped the Lady Tigers to the Elite Eight in 2000 and to the NCAA Tournament three times. She is a two-time WNBA all-star selection.



TODD WALKER

Capped his LSU career as the SEC's all-time leader in hits, runs, RBI, and total bases. Walker, who is a member of the All-Time College World Series Team, led LSU to the national title in 1993.



MEREDITH DUNCAN

The nation's top collegiate golfer in 2002, Duncan left LSU as the school's best female golfer. She earned first-team All-America honors as a senior in 2002 and won the United States Women's Amateur Championship in 2001.



MARCUS SPEARS

The 20th pick overall by the Dallas Cowboys, Spears was a First-Team All-American. He was a semifinalist for the Bednarik and Lombardi Awards as well as the Lott Trophy. Spears was also named First-Team All-SEC and led the team in sacks and tackles for loss his senior year.

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Dr. William L. Jenkins

President, LSU

On April 1, 1999, Dr. William L. Jenkins, formerly Chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College, became president of the LSU System, which includes nine institutions on 10 campuses in five cities, as well as 10 public hospitals in 10 cities.



A native of South Africa, Dr. Jenkins studied at the University of Pretoria, where he received his professional veterinary medicine degree in 1958 and specialist credentials in 1968. He received his Ph.D. degree from the University of Missouri, Columbia, in 1970. After practicing veterinary medicine for four years, he joined the faculty at the University of Pretoria, advancing through the ranks to become professor and head of the Department of Veterinary Physiology, Pharmacology, & Toxicology in 1971.

He moved to the United States in 1978 and joined the faculty in the Department of Veterinary Physiology & Pharmacology at Texas A&M. He was then appointed dean of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine in 1988, and was named LSU's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs in September 1993.

When he was appointed LSU's fifth chancellor in November 1996, Dr. Jenkins reorganized the campus administration to be more effective and more responsive, and oversaw the development of a strategic plan to guide the University in its preparation for the challenges of the next century.

Over the years, Dr. Jenkins has received numerous teaching and service awards and recognitions, having been named the 1997 Communicator of the Year by the Public Relations Association of Louisiana and a Distinguished Alumnus by the University of Missouri in 1999. The regional chapter of Toastmasters International also presented him with its 1999 Communication and Leadership Award, and he was awarded the Vision of Excellence Award 2000 by the New Orleans Regional Chamber of Commerce and the New Orleans Chapter of MetroVision. In addition, the University of Pretoria awarded an honorary doctoral degree to Dr. Jenkins in September 2000.

Dr. Jenkins has been and continues to be a member of many professional organizations and select committees. Most recently he served on the National Institute of Health's Alcohol Abuse and Misuse on College Campuses Committee and on a special Steering Committee of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to review accreditation criteria for colleges and universities. Dr. Jenkins also is a member of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges' Committee on Food and Society and currently serves on the Governor's Advisory Commission on Coastal Restoration and Conservation.


His current community engagement includes serving on the boards of the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities, Greater Baton Rouge Chamber of Commerce, Academic Distinction Fund, Council for a Better Louisiana, Arts Council of Greater Baton Rouge, The Nature Conservancy of Louisiana, and the Baton Rouge board of the National Conference for Community and Justice.

Dr. Jenkins and his wife, Peggy, have four children - Sharon, Gwynn, Anthea, and Warren - and nine grandchildren.

Sean O'Keefe

Chancellor, LSU

Sean O'Keefe has been appointed chancellor of Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College, becoming the seventh chancellor to lead the state's flagship University.



Nominated by President George W. Bush and confirmed by the United States Senate, Sean O'Keefe was appointed by the President as the 10th Administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration on December 21, 2001, his fourth Presidential appointment. As Administrator, O'Keefe led the NASA team and managed its resources as NASA sought to advance exploration and discovery in aeronautics and space technologies.

O'Keefe joined the Bush Administration on inauguration day and first served as the Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget until December 2001, overseeing the preparation, management and administration of the Federal budget and government wide-management initiatives across the Executive Branch.


Prior to joining the Bush Administration, O'Keefe was the Louis A. Bantle Professor of Business and Government Policy, an endowed chair at the Syracuse University Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs. He also served as the Director of National Security Studies, a partnership of Syracuse University and Johns Hopkins University, for delivery of executive education programs for senior military and civilian officials. Appointed to these positions in 1996, he was previously Professor of Business Administration and Assistant to the Senior Vice President for Research and Dean of the Graduate School at the Pennsylvania State University.

Appointed as the Secretary of the Navy in July 1992 by President George Bush, O'Keefe had previously served as Comptroller and Chief Financial Officer of the Department of Defense since 1989. Before joining then Defense Secretary Dick Cheney's Pentagon management team in these capacities, he served on the United States Senate Committee on Appropriations staff for eight years, and was Staff Director of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee.

For his exemplary service, President Bush and Secretary Cheney presented him the Distinguished Public Service Award in 1993. In addition, he was the 1999 faculty recipient of the Syracuse University Chancellor's Award for Public Service; recipient of the Department of the Navy's Public Service Award in December 2000; and has been awarded honorary doctorate degrees from several prestigious educational institutions.

He is the author of several journal articles, contributing author of "Keeping the Edge: Managing Defense for the Future" released in October 2000, and in 1998 co-authored "The Defense Industry in the Post-Cold War Era: Corporate Strategies and Public Policy Perspectives."

O'Keefe earned his Bachelor of Arts in 1977 from Loyola University in New Orleans, Louisiana, and his Master of Public Administration degree in 1978 from The Maxwell School. O'Keefe and his wife Laura have three children - Lindsey, Jonathan and Kevin.

Iready a Louisiana Legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has made the seamless transition into the athletics director's chair with the same enthusiasm, vision and demand for excellence that were trademarks of his stellar coaching career.

In just three years as LSU's director of athletics, Bertman has already added to his impressive list of on-the-field achievements. Under his direction, LSU enjoyed arguably the greatest athletics year in the history of the institution in 2003-04. Three teams won national championships, nine teams finished in the nation's top ten, and fourteen teams ranked in the top 25. LSU teams also enjoyed improved grade point averages across the board, making the LSU student-athlete experience a success on and off the fields of competition.

While supervising the Tigers' progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

Bertman is now in the midst of upgrading LSU's athletics complex. Working hand in hand with the Tiger Athletic Foundation, Bertman has already overseen the completion of the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes while launching renovations to Tiger Stadium and the Pete Maravich Assembly Center, and beginning construction on a new Football Operations Center.

It was also Bertman who took the bold but essential move to implement a seat contribution program in Tiger Stadium to fund facility improvements and ensure the financial stability of the LSU Athletics Department for the next decade.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' \$52 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a Baseball America poll published in 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes and he was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters -- Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertman's have three grand-children -- Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard, and Samuel Aaron, the son of Drew and Lisa Pate.



Together the new staff feels that they have put together the components that should have the Lady Tigers making an appearance in the SEC Tournament and contending for their first-ever NCAA Tournament bid.

With those goals in mind, Lee and his staff have already taken the first steps in obtaining those goals, bringing in the highest ranked recruiting class in school history.

"With the addition of this new crop of signees, we feel that this could be one of the

most talented LSU classes," said Lee.

Those signees combined with the six returning starters and 13 returning letterwinners should give the Tigers a bright future heading into the 2005 season.

In this year of new beginnings, LSU will depend on seniors Kate Ripple, Holly Davis and Tara Mitnick, as well as its talented pool of incoming freshmen, as it attempts to take the program to the next level.

The incoming class brings with it a national team member in Melissa Clarke of the United States' U19

In addition, of the eight freshmen signed, Jackie Moseley and Roslyn Jones were named high school All-Americans, while Jones was selected as the state player of the year in Louisiana. Lucy Martin was also named the state player of the year in Georgia.

"We believe all of our freshmen will come in fighting for a starting spot while looking to make an impact on our team," said Lee. "With the freshmen coming in and being competitive, we think it's only going to make our upperclassmen work harder and get better."

Along with some new faces, the Tigers will feature a new system and a new style of play this season.

"We have a system, but our main focus is on our style of play," said Lee. "We are focused on playing a more patient, possession-oriented game."

With the loss of LSU's all-time leading goal scorer, in departed senior Artie Brown, as well as starter Stacy Bishop and key reserve Michelle De Cespedes, the Tigers' frontline will feature a slew of fresh faces in 2005.

Lee will look to newcomers Lucy Martin and Sammy Sanderson as well as returnees Joleen Phillips and Elena Sutherland, who has moved from defender to forward this season, to help fill the void.

"Lucy is a very talented and experienced goal scorer," said Lee. "She is going to be a player that we will look to put the ball in the net for us."

Martin, a native of Peachtree, Ga., holds the Georgia state record for career goals scored and was named the state's 2004 player of the year.

Phillips returns as the only player in the bunch with collegiate experience at the forward position. Coming off an ACL injury, Phillips will look to return to her previous form that saw her play in 27 games and score four goals in two seasons for the Tigers.

Competing with Vogler, will be freshmen Jackie Moseley and Jessica Jimenez.

Moseley is a high school All-American and All-County MVP selection out of McKinney, Texas. Jimenez, a native of Slidell, La., was a two-position player in high school.



2005 SEC Women's Soccer Tournament

he 2005 SEC Soccer Tournament will feature the top eight teams from the slate of 12 league squads. The conference is divided into East and West regions. Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, South Carolina, Tennessee and Vanderbilt comprise the Eastern Division, while Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, LSU, Mississippi and Mississippi State make up the Western Division. The top team from each division will be seeded one and two based on conference record. Seeds three through eight will be determined by conference winning percentage, regardless of division.



2005 NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament

The NCAA will select 64 teams out of the more than 280 schools which sponsor Division I women's soccer to compete in the 2005 NCAA Tournament. The following 28 conferences will receive automatic qualifications to the field: America East, Atlantic Coast, Atlantic 10, Atlantic Sun, BIG EAST, Big Sky, Big Ten, Big 12, Big South, Big West, Colonial Athletic Association, Conference USA, Horizon League, Ivy League, Metro Atlantic Athletic, Mid-American, Mid-Continent, Missouri Valley, Mountain West, Northeast, Ohio Valley, Pacific-10, Patriot League, Southeastern, Southern, Southland, West Coast and Western Athletic. The remaining 36 teams will be chosen at-large based on their performance throughout the season.

The tournament's first and second rounds will be played on Nov. 11 and 13 at regional sites to be determined. The third round will be played Nov. 18-20 also at undetermined regional sites. The quarter-final round will be played

Nov. 25-27. The seventh NCAA
