The slogan for LSU's 2003 season is "Aim High," and while the women's soccer team plans to that in their quest for success, they do even more to ensure that this season is one to remember.

Coming off a 12-win campaign, fourth-year head coach Fotopoulos, the Tigers look to clinch top of the fierce Southeastern Conference and contend for their first league school history. LSU returns a wealth of talent and has brought in its best recruiting class in school history in order to make it happen.

"There's no question that if you look at the past history of this program that we had a lot of good players come through Fotopoulos." But on paper this is the best recruiting class that LSU has ever put together in its short eight-year existence. As a coaching staff, we are really excited about the players coming in and believe our future looks bright."

Despite the loss of three of the best players in the program's history, in Ashley Mitnick, Leigh McGovern and Mandy Heintz, from last year's squad, the current roster is more than capable of building on the recent success experienced by the Tigers. The 2003 team is very balanced as the roster features 12 underclassmen and 15 juniors and seniors. LSU also returns seven starters from last season's team that was billed the SEC's top defensive unit. The Tigers finished the 2002 campaign ranked first in the conference in both fewest goals and points allowed.

The Tigers continued their success during the spring of 2003, posting a 9-0-4 mark, to go undefeated for the second straight spring season. Junior Artie Brown highlighted spring play, scoring a hat trick in the Tigers' 4-0 victory over the Baton Rouge Soccer Academy. The shutout marked just one of seven that would be recorded by junior goalkeeper Robyn DesOrmeaux during the spring campaign.

"This was another huge spring for us," said Fotopoulos. "Not only did we get a lot of work done, but we had a fun time as well. I think that we grew as a team and we also got a chance to compete against some really good competition."

Fotopoulos returns for his fourth year at the helm of the Tiger program, having posted a 34-19-6 record during his first three campaigns in Baton Rouge. Fotopoulos, etched his name in the LSU soccer annals, becoming the winningest coach in program history with a season opening 2-0 victory over Stephen F. Austin on Aug. 31, 2002. This year, Fotopoulos eyes his team's third SEC Tournament appearance during his tenure, in addition to LSU's first-ever bid to the NCAA Tournament.

## FORWARDS

The front line will have to cope without the presence of departed senior Mandy Heintz, an All-SEC selection who led the conference in both goals and points in 2002. Also named to the SEC All-Tournament team, the LSU Team MVP produced, without question, the greatest offensive season by any player in school history, forcing the Tigers to look to more than just one player to help fill the void left behind.

Junior Artie Brown highlights LSU's returning forwards as she enters the season with 13 goals and 26 starts in her 38 games as a Tiger. Brown led the team in points and goals as a freshman and is one of just six players in LSU history to have ever recorded so in her collegiate debut, as a freshman at McNeese State.

Rachel Cohen will team with Mandy Heintz in the Tigers' front line. Cohen, a freshman on the team with seven assists, finished her final year ranked second in the SEC in career assists (18) and points (42).

"The leadership of both Rachel Cohen and Mandy Heintz gives me confidence and hope

that our front line can be very aggressive and dangerous this season," said Fotopoulos.

With junior Suzanne Drake being the Tigers' only other returner with significant front line playing experience, LSU will look to sophomore Christine Haman as well as several key freshmen to step up and help fill the void created by Heintz's departure. Haman saw action in just two games last season while recovering from a torn ACL suffered during her freshman season.

Incoming freshmen Stacy Bishop and Joleen Philips will also look to make an impact this year. Bishop, a product out of Land O'Lakes, Fla., is heralded as one of the best players to come out of the state in years. Bishop finished her career with 192 goals and was unanimously named the Pasco County Player of the Year in each of her four seasons as a prep.

"Stacy is without question one of the best target forwards that I've seen coming out of high school in the country," said Fotopoulos. "Her size, her strength and her ability to finish are great. Even with Mandy Heintz leaving, I feel very confident that we won't miss a beat with Stacy Bishop coming into our lineup."

Philips, a native of Indianapolis, Ind., was named the state's 2002 Player of the Year after guiding her Cathedral High School team to its fourth-straight city championship. She completed her career with 34 goals and 25 assists.

"Joleen is just another great forward that I think is going to be an outstanding addition to our front line," said Fotopoulos. "She is a proven goal scorer and we feel that she is a player that could contribute on the front line right away."

Fellow freshmen Jordan Parker, a native of Houston, Texas, should also see considerable action on the front line this season. Named her team's MVP at Stratford High School, Parker was also a first-team all-district selection.

## MIDFIELDERS

Fotopoulos feels the overall strength of his 2003 team will likely lie in the midfield position, as he views it as the most important part of LSU's sophisticated system in terms of both offensive and defensive setups. Senior Stephanie Keating highlights the position after starting all 20 games during her inaugural season as a Tiger. The former transfer from the University of



Florida was a Second-Team All-SEC selection, as well as an SEC All-Tournament team honoree a year ago after leading the team in assists (10) and ranking second in goals scored (7).

"Stephanie Keating without question is one of the best players in the SEC and we feel that she will have a fantastic season for us," said Fotopoulos. "She gives us a lot of confidence because we know that she is a player that we can count on."

The midfield position is senior-laden as fourth-year players Jen deHay, Kasey Dexter, Laura Klatter, and Elizabeth Marschall all return for their final seasons at LSU. Junior Danielle Keath and sophomore Krsitin Frischhertz will be counted on to complement Keating, while providing additional stability at the position.

Keath, who started 19 of 20 games for the Tigers' in 2002, became the sixth LSU player in school history to record a hat trick, accomplishing the feat against Alabama A&M last year. Frischhertz played in 17 games for LSU a year ago and was named the team's Co-Freshman of the Year for her efforts.

Fotopoulos calls sophomore transfer Kate Ripple this season's "sleeper" at the position. A transfer from Big 12 powerhouse Texas A&M, Ripple played in 13 games, recording three goals for the Aggies last year. A Baton Rouge native, Ripple attended Parkview Baptist High School where she was a five-time all-state selection and two-time district MVP. Bringing an impressive resume to the table, Ripple should be an immediate contributor, while contending for a starting spot.

## DEFENDERS

Coming off one of the best defensive seasons in school history, LSU will once again count on the position to be one of the strengths of this year's team. The loss of seniors Ashley Mitnick and Leigh McGovern will be tough on the defense, but the Tigers have a plethora of talent waiting to shine. Sophomore Tara Mitnick will be looked to to anchor the Tiger defense. The younger sister of Ashley Mitnick had a tremendous freshman campaign starting all 20 games for LSU a year ago. For her accomplishments on the field, the Georgia native was named to the Freshman All-Central Region team by Soccer Buzz, in addition to earning LSU's Co-Freshman of the Year award.

"We are hoping that Tara Mitnick can pick up where she left off last season and continue to be one of the top defenders in the SEC," said Fotopoulos.

Junior Chelsea Agar started all 20 games a year ago and will be another solid member of the Tigers' defense this season.

In this position, Fotopoulos expects a big contribution from incoming freshmen, Ashleigh Gunning, Christina Best, Stephanie Ford and Michelle De Cespedes.

Gunning, a product of Baton Rouge High School, was the state MVP as a junior, while Best, a native of Littleton, Colo., guided her team to a state title in 2000.

"Christina is definitely one of those players who will fill an immediate void for us," said Fotopoulos. "I feel that she will bring immediate athleticism and experience to our back line."

Ford is another hometown product, coming from Parkview Baptist High School. Heralded as one of the state's top players a year ago, Ford is also expected to see the field immediately.

De Cespedes is a native of Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., and was considered one of the top-five players to come out of Florida last season. Named the 2003 Class 3A State Player of the Year, De Cespedes recorded 199 points as a prep.

## GOALKEEPERS

After a stellar sophomore campaign, Robin DesOrmeaux returns for her junior season as the Tigers' starting goalkeeper. The Lafayette, La., native was an integral part of the SEC's top defensive unit a year ago, posting an 11-5-3 record in 19 starts. She recorded 56 saves and allowed just 16 goals, the fewest by any conference goalkeeper last season.

Despite her collegiate experience, DesOrmeaux will undoubtedly be pushed by incoming freshman Heather Zurburg. A talented and athletic goalkeeper out of Gainesville, Fla., Zurburg comes to Baton Rouge as a three-time all-district selection that holds the Gainesville area shutout record, with 49.

"We as a coaching staff hope that both players will push each other to make our position of goalkeeper very good," said Fotopoulos. "Heather has a lot of size and a lot of athleticism and has great experience at the club level, while Robyn has a chance to become one of the all-time greatest keepers in LSU history and hopefully one of the top keepers in the conference."

## SCHEDULE

The Tigers' 2003 schedule is once again nothing short of difficult as the Tigers face a grueling Southeastern Conference slate, as well as non-conference matches that feature defending Division II National Champion, Christian Brothers University, and Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference power Loyola (Md.). The Tigers will also square off with in-state rivals Louisiana-Lafayette, McNeese State, Nicholls State, Tulane, and Southeastern Louisiana.

LSU opens the season at home with a non-conference match against Coastal Carolina on Aug. 29. The Tigers then face Jackson State, McNeese State, Birmingham Southern and Loyola in succession at the LSU Soccer Complex, to conclude a string of five straight home contests.

LSU hits the road for the first time on Sept. 12 as the Tigers travel to New Orleans to battle Tulane for the first time since the 2000 season. The Tigers continue the six-game road stretch that pits them against Big 12 power Texas, UL-Lafayette and Southeastern Louisiana throughout September.

The Tigers then open SEC play at Kentucky on Oct. 3, before completing their conference opening weekend against Vanderbilt in Nashville, Oct. 5.

The Tigers return home for two straight weekends of SEC play, beginning Oct. 10 with a crucial game against arch rival Ole Miss. LSU will then face Mississippi State on Oct. 12.

The following weekend, Georgia and Tennessee visit Baton Rouge (Oct. 17 and 19), as the Tigers face both teams for the first time in two seasons.

LSU finishes off the month of October with a visit to the state of Alabama, facing the Crimson Tide and the Tigers of Auburn in two key Western Division matches.

LSU then takes a short break from conference play, traveling to Thibodaux, La., Oct. 29, for an in-state contest with Nicholls State, before concluding SEC play at Arkansas on Halloween.

The Tigers wrap up the regular season, Nov. 2, with a home match against Christian Brothers.

Postseason play begins Nov. 6-9 at the 2003 SEC Tournament in Orange Beach, Ala.

The following 28 conferences will receive automatic qualifications to the field: America East, Atlantic Coast, Atlantic 10, Atlantic Sun, BIG EAST, Big Sky, Big Ten, Big 12, Big South, Big West, Colonial Athletic Association, Conference USA, Horizon League, Ivy League, Metro Atlantic Athletic, Mid-American, Mid-Continent, Missouri Valley, Mountain West, Northeast, Ohio Valley, Pacific-10, Patriot League, Southeastern, Southern, Southland, West Coast and Western Athletic. The remaining 36 teams will be chosen at-large based on their performance throughout the season.

The tournament's first and second rounds will be played on Nov. 14 and 16 at regional sites to be determined. The third round will be played Nov. 21-23 also at undetermined regional sites. The quarterfinal round will be played Nov. 28-30. The fifth NCAA women's College Cup will be held in Cary, N.C., with the semifinals on Friday, Dec. 5, and the championship game on Sunday, Dec. 7, at SAS Stadium, the home of the WUSA's Carolina Courage.

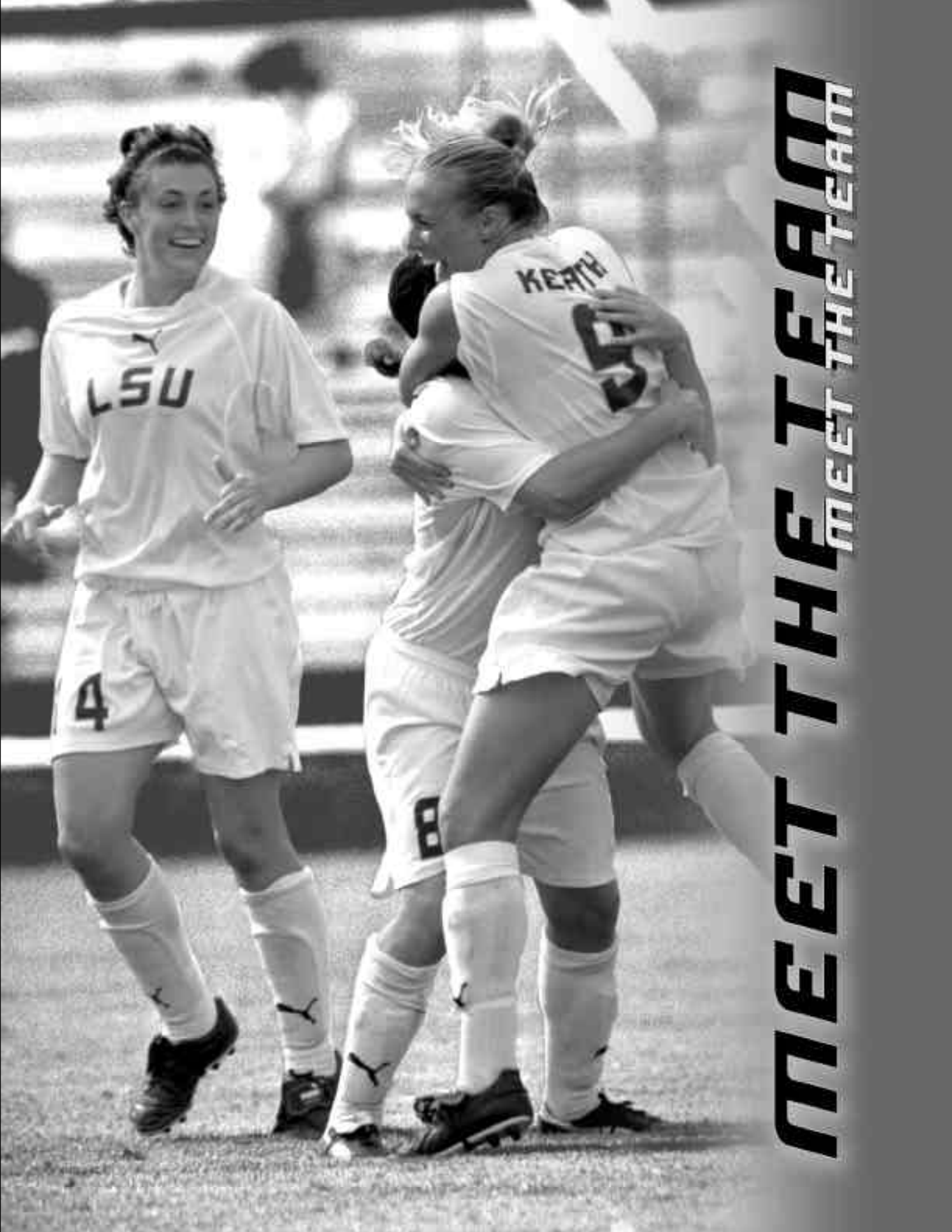

## George Fotopoulos

**Fourth Season**  
**Overall Record: 54-33-7**  
**LSU Record: 34-19-6**



In just three seasons as the head coach at LSU, George Fotopoulos has taken the Tiger soccer program to new heights. In 2000, his inaugural season at the helm of the LSU soccer program, Fotopoulos led the Tigers to a school-record 15 wins and a Southeastern Conference Tournament berth. With an overall record of 15-6, the Tigers posted their first winning season since 1996 and the 10-game turnaround earned the Tigers the title of Soccer Buzz's "Most Improved Team" in NCAA Division I.

Last season, LSU went 12-5-3 and earned its first win in school history over a top-15 opponent, defeating No. 15 Florida State, 2-1, in just the third game of the season. The win was enough to garner the Tigers a No. 10 ranking in the NSCAA Central Regional standings the day after the historic win over the Seminoles. LSU also became the first No. 8 seed in SEC Tournament history to upset the top seed in first round action, as the Tigers defeated No. 1 Auburn, 1-0.

Fotopoulos became LSU's all-time winningest coach in the Tigers' inaugural match of the 2002 season, as the Tigers blanked Stephen F. Austin, 2-0, Aug. 31, 2002, in

Nacogdoches, Texas. The win gave him 34 victories at LSU, passing Miriam Hickey for first on the all-time list.

LSU's fourth-year head coach has made it his goal to instill a winning attitude in the Tigers and he has already been successful in that category. He expects only the best from his athletes and gives them the same. His name and reputation in the soccer world allows him to recruit some of the nation's top athletes and has helped him turn the LSU program around. The Tigers represent eight different states

this season. Fotopoulos has also recruited successfully in the state as the current roster includes nine Louisiana natives.

Fotopoulos came to LSU after accumulating a 20-14-1 record in two seasons at Division II University of Tampa. In 1998, he directed a first-year Tampa program to a 9-7-1 record and turned the Spartans into a nationally competitive program in just their second year of existence. Tampa finished 11-7 in Fotopoulos' final season.

A 1992 graduate of the University of Tampa, Fotopoulos played forward for the Spartans for two years after transferring from Old Dominion, where he played from 1987-89. He was twice named a First-Team All-Sunshine State Conference selection and as a senior was voted the National Soccer Coaches Association of America

(NSCAA) National Field Player of the Year after leading the Spartans to the Division II national championship game in 1992.

Fotopoulos was a member of the United States Open championship club, the St. Petersburg Kickers, in 1989 and the A-League Tampa Bay Cyclones in 1995.

Heavily involved in Florida's club soccer program before his arrival at LSU, Fotopoulos directed the Tampa Bay Heather to the United States Youth Soccer Association (USYSA) national championships in the Under-19 and Under-20 age divisions. Fotopoulos placed over 125 Florida youth players on college teams. He also worked closely with the Florida Olympic Development Program throughout the 1990's.

Fotopoulos has a United States Soccer Federation (U.S.S.F.) "A" license, the highest level a coach can receive, and holds an NSCAA Advanced National Diploma. He was a member of the 2001 USYSA Region III staff and is currently a state staff coach for the Louisiana Olympic Developmental Program.

His wife, Danielle, owns the NCAA record for career points (284) and career goals (118), men or women, and currently is a member of the Carolina Courage of the Women's United Soccer Association. She is ranked second all-time in career points in the WUSA, and in 2002, Danielle scored 11 goals and added 10 assists to become the first player in WUSA history to post a double-double. She led the WUSA in points during the post-season, and led the Courage to the 2002 Founders Cup. Fotopololous is also a two-time WUSA All-Star.

In the summer of 1999, Danielle was a member of the United States Women's World Cup team that brought home the championship with a thrilling shootout victory over China, capping a run the captured the hearts of a nation.

Fotopoulos married Danielle on June 8, 1996. The couple gave birth to their first child, Alexia, on November 18, 2000.

## Ricky Zambrano

Assistant Coach  
Second Season



Ricky Zambrano enters his second season as an assistant coach at LSU after heading the men's team at St. Thomas University from 1998-2001. His responsibilities include serving as the team's recruiting coordinator. In addition, he is heavily involved in community relations as well as marketing and promotions. Zambrano's on-field duties include goalkeeper training, and handling the Tigers' defense.

Under his watchful eye, the Tiger defense ranked first in the Southeastern Conference in 2002, allowing the fewest goals (16) and points (44) in the league.

In his highly-successful tenure at St. Thomas, Zambrano accumulated a 47-30-3 overall record and led his team to Florida Sun Conference Championships in both 1998 and 2000.

St. Thomas finished the season ranked among the NAIA's top-25 in three of Zambrano's four seasons and in 2000 he piloted the Bobcats to a No. 5 ranking in the NAIA national poll. Zambrano garnered numerous coaching honors at St. Thomas and was named the Florida Sun Conference Co-Coach of the Year in 1998.

Zambrano holds several school records at St. Thomas, including highest all-time winning percentage (.606), most wins in a season (16), set in 2000, most conference wins in a season (11), set in both 1998 and 2000, most consecutive wins in a season (8), set in 2000, and most shutouts in a season (7), set in 1998 and matched again in 2000. In addition, Zambrano led the Bobcats to their highest national ranking in school history. The team went on to finish 12th that season, its highest final national ranking in school history. Prior to becoming the head men's soccer coach at St. Thomas, Zambrano served as the team's assistant coach from 1995-98.

Off the field, Zambrano received an NSCAA Advanced National Diploma in 2003 and received a U.S.S.F. National "B" Coaching license in 2000. He holds



national memberships in the U.S.S.F. Coaches Organization, National Soccer Coaches Association and the Latin American Soccer Coaches Association (LASCA). Zambrano is currently a state staff coach for the Louisiana Olympic Developmental Program. He also serves as a scout for Region III in the United State Soccer Federation (U.S.S.F.) Minority Program and previously served as a state staff coach for the Florida Olympic Developmental Program.

A 1996 graduate of St. Thomas University, Zambrano played midfield for the Bobcats from 1992-95. He was a member of the 1993 Florida Sun Conference championship team and also participated in the conference semifinals in 1994 and 1995.

Zambrano earned his bachelor of arts degree in sports administration from St. Thomas University in 1996 and then received his master's of science degree in management in the spring of 2000.

Entering her fourth full season as the assistant women's soccer coach, Tracy Hay continues to be a catalyst for the Tigers' recent success. Her responsibilities include team budgeting, travel and fund raising. Hay's on-field duties include handling the Tigers' individual and team defense.

Hay has assisted George Fotopoulos in crafting one of the best defenses in the history of the LSU soccer program. Last season she was an instrumental part of the Tigers' 12-win season in which the Tiger defense led the conference in fewest goals allowed (16) and fewest points scored (44).

In her first season as LSU's assistant coach, Hay helped guide the Tigers to a school-record 15-6 overall mark and the team's third trip to the Southeastern Conference Tournament. The Tigers allowed only 22 goals during the 2000 season, a number that proved to be the fewest among SEC schools that year.

Hay came to LSU in the spring of 2000 after serving as a volunteer assistant coach at the University of Texas at Dallas for one season.

Under her maiden name, Tracy Ward, Hay played collegiate soccer for the Florida Gators where she was a member of three SEC Championship squads. She was a starting defender on the Gators' 1998 NCAA Championship squad and was a three-time member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll. Hay received the Gator Soccer Award for her excellent performance both on and off the field in 1998. She also received the Gator Community Service Award in 1997.

Hay also played competitively for the Tampa Town N' Country Heather club team that won national titles during both 1995 and 1996 seasons. Hay was also a member of the Florida Olympic Development Program from 1992-1994.

## Season of Firsts

**A Year of Hard Work Leads to Unprecedented Success**

As the final seconds ticked off of the clock at the Seminole Soccer Complex in Tallahassee, Fla., the LSU players started to celebrate a momentous occurrence in Tiger soccer history - the program's first win over a top-15 ranked opponent. On Sept. 8, LSU knocked off the 15th-ranked Florida State Seminoles, 2-1, in only its third contest of the 2002 season. The ground-breaking victory served as a catalyst for the young Tiger team and helped give LSU the impetus that it needed to make the 2002 campaign a "Season of Firsts."

"Today and for the next 24 hours is the greatest day in LSU soccer history," beamed head coach George Fotopoulos after the upset victory over Florida State. "These girls worked so hard and each and every one of them left everything they had out here on the field. I'm extremely pleased with how we played. We beat the No. 15 team in the nation and I'm not saying that we're anywhere, but we just feel that we've taken a step for our program. It's a little step, but it's a definite step forward and I'm just so proud of the girls."

The victory did indeed prove to be a step forward for the LSU soccer program.

On Sept. 9, just one day removed from the Tigers' first win over a ranked opponent, LSU made history again by being ranked 10th in the highly competitive Central Regional rankings put out by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America. The recognition marked the first time that the Tigers were regionally ranked. LSU would eventually climb as high as the No. 6 position in the Central Region on Oct. 7.

Coach Fotopoulos, in only his third season at the helm of the LSU soccer program, became the winningest head coach in Tiger history on Aug. 31, as LSU opened its 2002 campaign with a 2-0 shutout victory against Stephen F. Austin on the road in Nacogdoches, Texas. With the win, Fotopoulos surpassed the Tigers' first head coach, Miriam Hickey, and accumulated the 23rd victory of his tenure at LSU. The win against Stephen F. Austin also marked the Tigers' fifth consecutive victory to begin a season. In LSU's first five contests, the Tigers' outscored their opponents by a total of 20-1.

On Sept. 6, LSU began play in the highly competitive 2002 Seminole Classic. The four team tournament consisted of the Missouri Tigers and a pair of perennial

powerhouses in No. 23 Miami and the 15th-ranked Florida State Seminoles. In Friday's opener, LSU held Miami to a scoreless tie for 83 minutes before the nation's 23rd-ranked team scored the game-winning goal with only 6:45 remaining in regulation to earn a 1-0 victory. Despite the heartbreaking loss, Coach Fotopoulos continued to be optimistic about his team's play, in particular their defensive performance.

"I feel that we played very well. Our team showed great heart and they (Miami) were just able to pick up a late goal on us. We played extremely hard defense the entire game and I'm proud of the intensity that we showed. Miami is an impressive offensive team and we kept them without a goal for 83 minutes. We were really close to a shutout, but they just made a great play."

LSU continued to display its relentless defense in its next contest as the Tigers limited 15th ranked Florida State to one goal in a 2-1 victory over the homestanding Seminoles. In the win, junior Mandy Heintz earned her second of nine season-

high, game-winning goals and gave the Tigers an early lead with 30:57 remaining in the second half. LSU's standout from San Antonio, Texas, showed her jumping prowess as she headed an Elizabeth Marshall corner kick into the bottom right-hand corner of the net for the victory.

After knocking off Florida State in the finale of the 2002 Seminole Classic, the Tigers returned to Baton Rouge for a three-game homestand in which they faced off against in-state rivals Loyola (N.O.), Louisiana-Monroe and Nicholls State. On Sept. 11 the Tigers paid tribute to the United States of America by wearing special-made red, white and blue uniforms in a 7-0 triumph over Loyola. LSU's blanking of Loyola was the first of six-consecutive shutouts for the Tigers, as the team reeled off blowout victories against Louisiana-Monroe (4-0), Nicholls State (9-0), McNeese State (3-0), Troy State (7-0) and Alabama A&M (9-0).

The Tigers opened Southeastern Conference play on Oct. 4 with a road contest against the Ole Miss Rebels. Over the years, LSU and Ole Miss have consistently played highly competitive matches and the 2002 version was more of the same. With the score of the game knotted at 1-1, LSU's Heintz took an entry pass from Jenn deHay and nudged a shot passed the Rebels' goaltender Brittany Gillespie with 6:43 remaining to solidify the Tigers' second-straight victory over Ole Miss.

"We played a very good team in Ole Miss," said Fotopoulos. "They came into the game with an undefeated record and they are an extremely well coached team. It was a battle, but I think that works to our favor because our team just works hard and we are a blue-collared team. I don't care if we win ugly, as long as we win."

Shortly after stunning Ole Miss in front of nearly 1,000 raucous Rebel fans, LSU traveled to Starkville, Miss., to face the Mississippi State Bulldogs. Playing under the relentless October sun, the Tigers improved to 2-0 in SEC play and 10-1 overall by turning in a dominant 3-1 victory to complete the weekend sweep. Again, LSU's Heintz proved to be the star of the game as she scored both her 19th and 20th goals of the season in the win.

LSU remained on the road for a second-straight weekend beginning on Oct. 11, as the Tigers flew to Gainesville, Fla., for a matchup against the defending SEC Champion Florida Gators. Coming into the contest, Florida held a decisive 4-0 all-time record against the Tigers and had only relinquished one goal in 360 minutes. With the Gators leading by a score of 1-0, LSU's Stephanie Keating took a picture-perfect, give-and-go pass from Heintz and beat Florida's goalkeeper Jordan Kellgren to equalize the score at 1-1. With only Kellgren standing in the way of a tie score

in the vital SEC matchup, Keating faked to her left and drove a shot into the lower-right corner of the net. The Tigers' key goal with only 8:34 remaining in the contest helped LSU remain undefeated in 10 straight games and proved to be the deciding factor in its first draw in school history against Florida.

"There's no question that this was a huge game for us," Fotopoulos said. "I don't want to say that a tie is as big as a win, but right now for LSU it is. I mean, the last time that we came into this stadium we lost 11-0. I actually thought we were going to win tonight, but I'm extremely proud of our seniors. They really wanted this game and I think that they were able to walk off this field with respect."

After earning its ground-breaking tie against the Gators, LSU fell into a midseason slump with losses against SEC foes South Carolina, 2-0, Alabama, 2-1, and the eventual conference champion Auburn Tigers, 3-2. LSU, which owned a 10-4-1 overall record and a 2-3-1 mark against SEC opponents heading into a cross-divisional matchup against the Vanderbilt Lady Commodores, was just one victory shy of earning its third SEC Tournament appearance in school history. Playing on the rain-soaked turf of the LSU Soccer Complex, the Tigers couldn't capitalize on numerous scoring chances against Vanderbilt as LSU fought to its second 1-1 draw of the 2002 campaign.

LSU defeated the Louisiana-Lafayette Ragin' Cajuns, 2-0, in its final non-conference game of the season. With the victory, the Tigers increased their undefeated streak against in-state rivals to 15 straight matches. LSU won its ninth-consecutive home game against an in-state opponent and the Tigers remained undefeated against Louisiana rivals for more than three years since falling to Tulane, 3-0, in 1999.

"It was just good for us to come out and get a win tonight," said Fotopoulos. "We know that we have a huge game coming up against Arkansas on Sunday, so we rested some players more than we usually would, but everyone played well. We didn't have any serious injuries, we got a victory and we should have some more confidence after tonight."

The Tigers entered their final SEC contest of the season with an 11-4-2 overall record and a 2-3-2 mark against conference opponents. With either a victory or a draw versus Arkansas, LSU would qualify for its fourth SEC Tournament appearance and its second in three seasons under the tutelage of Fotopoulos. Prior to the 2002 campaign, LSU's previous postseason appearance came in 2000 after the Tigers posted a school-record 15-6 overall mark in Fotopoulos' inaugural season. LSU lost to Kentucky, 2-0, in the first round of the 2000 SEC Tournament held in Athens, Ga.

In front of 440 enthusiastic fans at the LSU Soccer Complex, the Tigers posted a thrilling 1-1 tie with the Arkansas LadyBucks to earn the No. 8 seed in the 2002 SEC Tournament. On Senior Day, LSU's four talented seniors in Leigh McGovern, Ashley Mitnick, Melissa Shelton and Heintz each turned in outstanding performances in their final outing in front of the home crowd. McGovern and Shelton proved to be dominant forces on their respective ends of the field, while Heintz and Mitnick combined to record one of the most defining moments of LSU's 2002 season.

With the Tigers' trailing 1-0, Heintz gathered a long pass, challenged three LadyBack defenders in the box and fell victim to an Arkansas foul on her shot attempt. The foul in the box prompted a penalty kick at the 39:38 mark in the contest and Mitnick, LSU's senior co-captain and penalty kick specialist, tied the crucial SEC finale with a shot past the keeper. The goal proved to be Mitnick's fourth of the season and the 20th of her illustrious four-year career. She scored on each of her two penalty kick attempts during the season.

"This team really deserved to go (to the SEC Tournament)," said Fotopoulos. "I believe that we are one of the top teams in the SEC and Arkansas played us really tough today. I'm extremely proud of how our kids played hard and how they always find a way. I mean, those ties against both Florida and Vanderbilt proved to be huge for us this season."

LSU continued to rewrite the record book at the 2002 SEC Tournament as the Tigers posted their first postseason victory in school history with 1-0 upset win against top-seeded Auburn. With the victory, LSU became the first No. 8 seed to knock off a No. 1-seeded opponent in nine seasons of the SEC Tournament. The Tigers moved on to face Florida in the second round of competition held at the Ole Miss Soccer Stadium in Oxford, Miss., where LSU missed numerous scoring chances in a 2-0 loss. During the hotly contested match, LSU had four shots hit either the post or the crossbar in what would prove to be the end of the Tigers' most successful season in school history.

The Tigers accomplished numerous firsts during the 2002 campaign including a win versus a ranked opponent, a No. 6 NSCAA regional ranking and an SEC Tournament victory. In only three seasons at the helm of the LSU soccer program, Coach Fotopoulos has the Tigers competing against some of the SEC's top teams and winning. After looking back at the 2002 season, the future looks bright for LSU as the Tigers will attempt to build upon their momentous record-breaking campaign and strive to achieve yet another "Season of Firsts."

## The Southeastern Conference

• The SEC had seven schools receive NSCAA/adidas College Team Academic Awards (teams which maintain a GPA of 3.0 or higher) -Arkansas, Kentucky, LSU, Ole Miss, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Vanderbilt. In addition, Georgia defender Carolyn Cayard was a first-team selection on the NSCAA Scholar All-America squad.

• Tennessee's Keeley Dowling was named second-team All-America by the NSCAA in 2002, while Auburn's Megan Rivera was selected to the NSCAA All-America third team. The SEC placed four athletes on Soccer Buzz All-America teams. Dowling was the lone first-team selection, while Rivera earned second-team honors. Florida's Danielle Murphy and Auburn's Sarah Steinmann were named to the third team and honorable mention team, respectively.

• The Southeastern Conference placed 14 players on NSCAA All-Region squads. The SEC placed five athletes on first teams, as well as six on second teams. Tennessee's Keeley Dowling was named to the Central Region first team. Kentucky's Elizabeth Ramsey was a Great Lakes first-team selection. Auburn teammates Megan Rivera and Sarah Steinman along with Florida's Danielle Murphy were all named to the South Region's first team.

• The SEC has had at least two teams advance to postseason play for seven of the last eight years. Nine of the league's teams (Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Ole Miss, South Carolina, Tennessee and Vanderbilt) have made at least one NCAA Tournament appearance since 1994. Four teams (Auburn, Kentucky, Ole Miss and Tennessee) advanced to the 2002 NCAA Tournament.

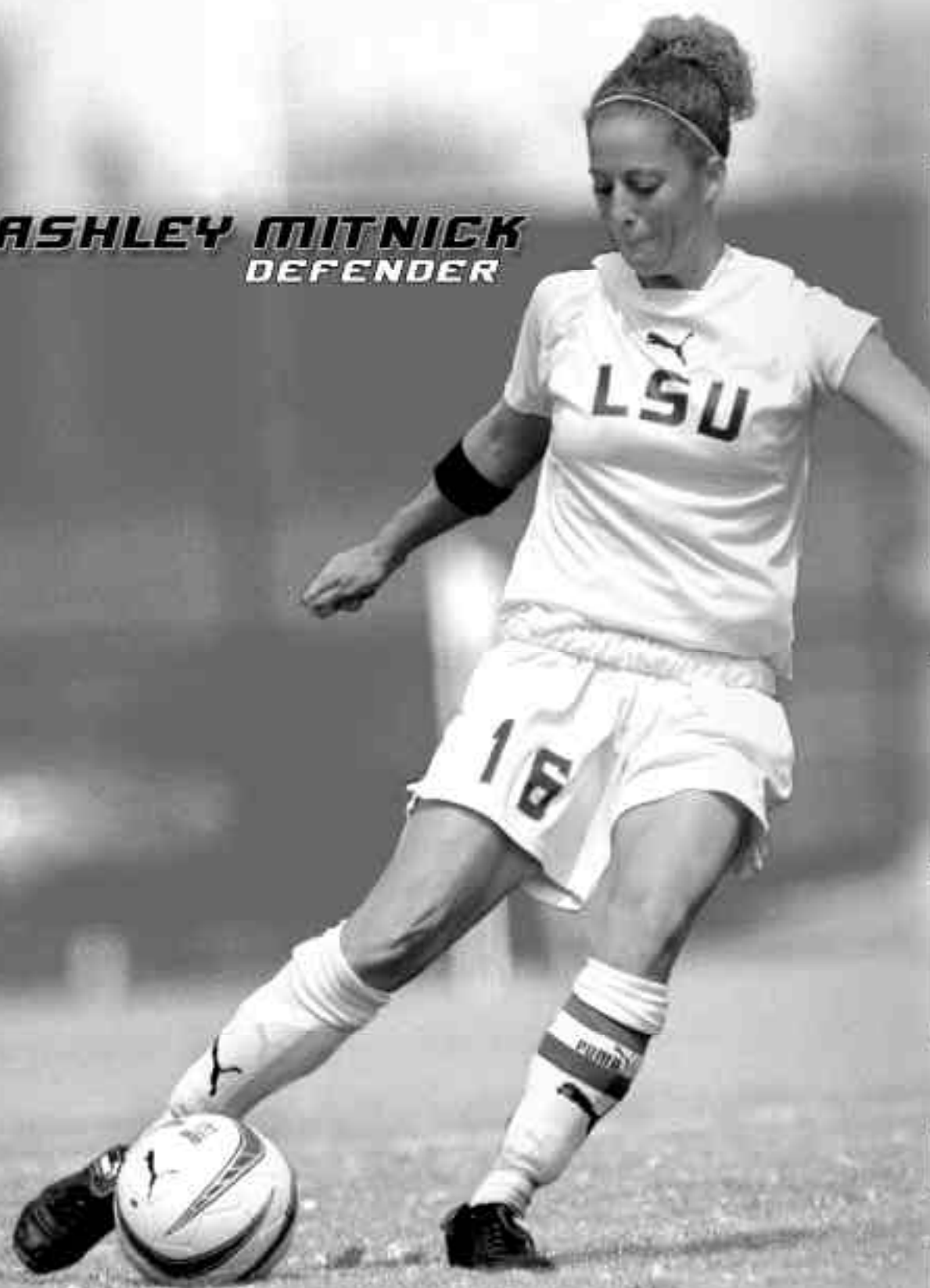

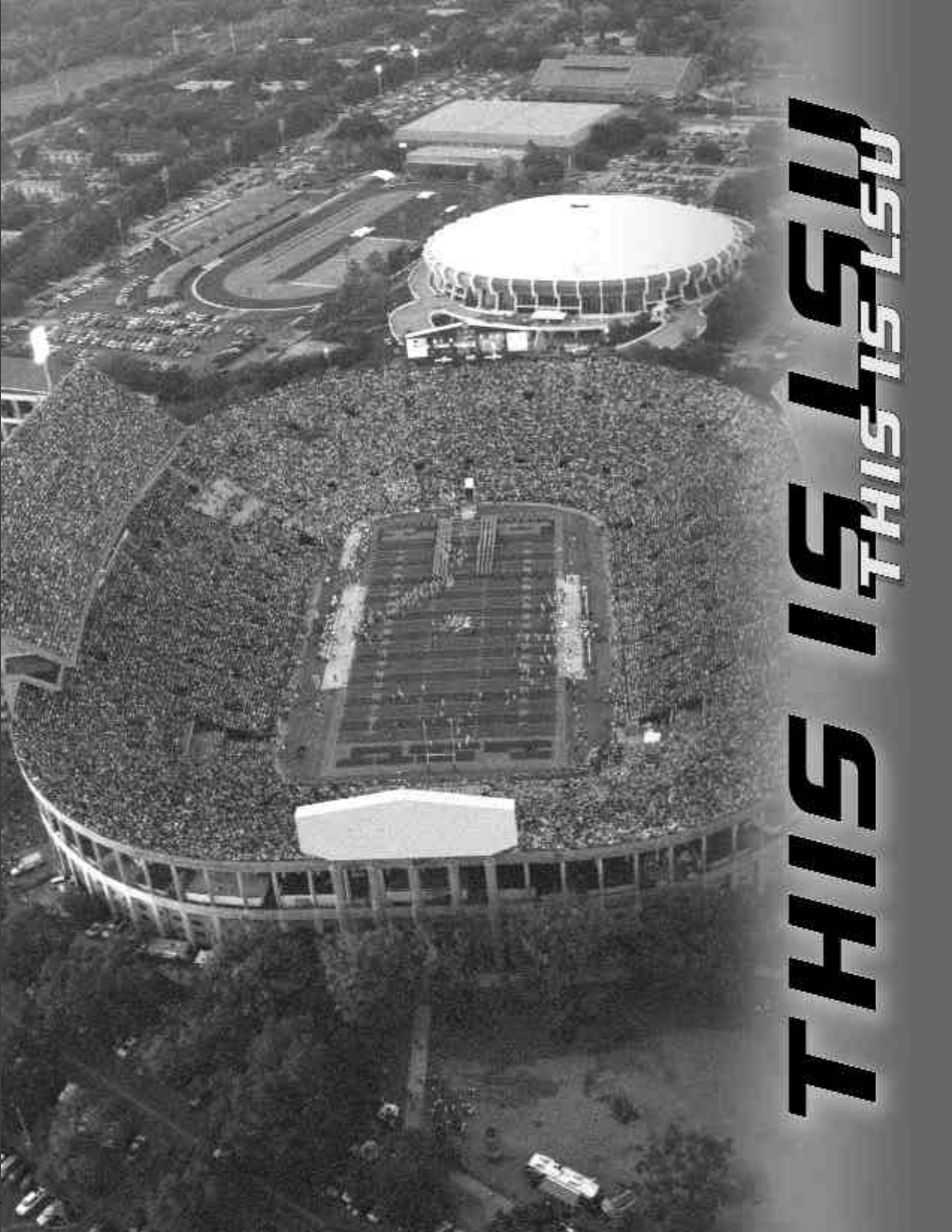

**L**ouisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College has, throughout its 143-year history, served the people of Louisiana, the region, the nation, and the world through extensive multipurpose programs encompassing instruction, research and public service. The University continuously develops programs of breadth and quality that make it one of the nation's outstanding educational institutions.

The University influences the educational, economic, social and cultural lives of its citizens throughout the state – indeed, in some way, it touches the life of every person in Louisiana.

Because of its designation as a Research I University – the top category of the Carnegie Foundation's ranking of research institutions – LSU ranks in the top two percent of the nation's colleges and universities. The Research I designation is shared by only 59 public and 29 private universities across the nation. One of only 25 universities nationwide designated as both a land-grant and sea-grant college, LSU is also actively pursuing space-grant status.

History and tradition began with LSU's founding in 1853 by the General Assembly of Louisiana as the Louisiana State Seminary of Learning and Military Academy near Pineville, Louisiana. The institution opened January 2, 1860. When the Civil War began, the school's first superintendent, William Tecumseh Sherman, resigned to assume a command in the Union Army. Fire demolished the Seminary in 1869 and the school moved to Baton Rouge.

In 1870, the Seminary was renamed Louisiana State University. In 1874, under the United States Morrill Act, the Louisiana State Agricultural & Mechanical College was established in New Orleans. The two institutions were merged by the Legislature in 1877 to become Louisiana State University and Agricultural & Mechanical College.

Construction on the present campus began in 1922 and the first classes were held in 1926. LSU experienced major growth in the 1930s and 1940s, expanding its student body, curricula and services. During the 1960s, the University

began to place increasing emphasis on research.

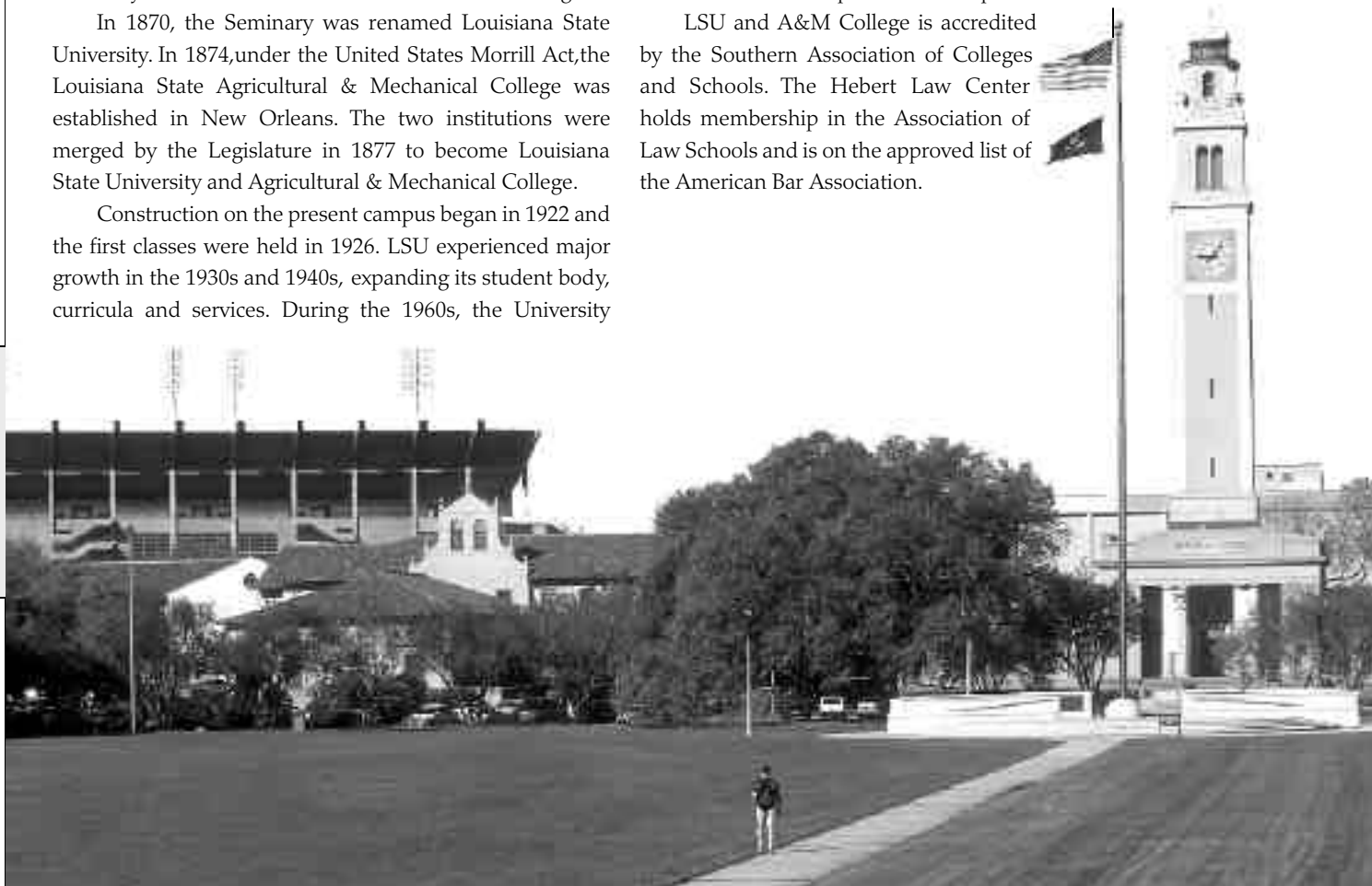
Recognizing the importance and extent of statewide agricultural activities of units in the LSU System, the LSU Board of Supervisors in 1972 established the Center for Agricultural Sciences & Rural Development. This unit was renamed the LSU Agricultural Center in 1982. Components of the LSU Agricultural Center include the Louisiana Agricultural Experiment Station, the Louisiana Cooperative Extension Service, International Programs and Administrative Services.

The primary mission of the LSU Agricultural Center is to conduct research in agricultural and natural resource development and to provide off-campus extension education that disseminates technological, economic, and management information to Louisiana residents.

In 1977, the Paul M. Hebert Law Center, established as the LSU Law School in 1906, was made an autonomous division of the LSU System. The Law Center provides legal education characterized by an unyielding demand for academic excellence. Its unique curriculum, based on civil law as well as substantial elements of common law, provides law graduates with qualifications and training for not one, but two legal systems.

LSU, located on more than 2,000 acres in the southern part of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is bordered on the west by the Mississippi River. The University's more than 250 principal buildings are grouped on a 650-acre plateau that constitutes the main part of the campus.

LSU and A&M College is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The Hebert Law Center holds membership in the Association of Law Schools and is on the approved list of the American Bar Association.

A \$15 million renovation to the Gym Armory not only made it among the nation’s premier centers, but put it at the forefront. Improvements to the existing center give LSU student-athletes the best opportunity for success by providing access to the latest technology, as well as an array of expanded services.

The LSU women’s soccer program, under the tutelage of fourth-year head coach George Fotopolous, strives for excellence both on and off the field. Last season, a team-record 11 Tigers were named to the Southeastern Conference Academic Honor Roll and improved LSU’s total number of honorees to 55 since the program’s inception in 1995.

Junior Mandy Heintz led the way for the Tigers in 2002, earning her third-straight Academic All-SEC honor. Coach Fotopolous, along with the entire LSU Athletic Department, realizes that in a student-athletes life, the player is a student first and an athlete second.

LSU has had 25 student-athletes make the honor roll since 2000, the first season under Fotopolous. Nine student-athletes made the LSU Director’s Cup List last season, which is presented to those who have maintained a 3.0 grade point average over the previous academic year.

On April 5, 2003 the LSU Soccer Complex played host to a Major League Soccer exhibition match between the Chicago Fire and the Colorado Rapids.

Maintaining LSU's commitment to providing the finest athletic facilities in the nation, the Tigers will begin their eighth season at the state-of-the-art LSU Soccer Complex. The field was christened on September 13, 1996, when the Tigers hosted Southeastern Conference rival, Tennessee.

The LSU Soccer Complex, located just a half mile from the Mississippi River, provides seating for 1,500 spectators.

In addition, the stadium features a brand-new scoreboard, a modern sound system and is one of the only facilities in the SEC equipped with lights.

The LSU Soccer Complex has served as the host site of four prestigious tournaments in recent years and was most recently the sight of the 2001 SEC Tournament.

### LSU Indoor Facility

When the weather prevents the soccer team from practicing at the LSU Soccer Complex, the team moves inside to the climate-controlled football practice facility. LSU student-athletes benefit from one of the most modern indoor facilities in the nation. Located at the site of LSU's outdoor football practice fields, the indoor facility was built as part of a \$15 million upgrade of the LSU physical plant in the late 1980s and early 1990s and houses a full 100-yard football field.

### Locker Room

The LSU soccer program boasts a modern, spacious, state-of-the-art locker room that includes locker rooms for both the Tigers and the visiting team, as well as a changing room for the game officials. There is also an on-site training room, a meeting room for the Tigers and offices for the LSU coaching staff.

**LSU** boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facility in all of collegiate athletics. Focused on aggressive rehabilitation, the Broussard Center for Athletic Training is furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. Some of the features of the 23,000-square foot facility include an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy, as well as state of the art hydrotherapy pools. The Broussard Center for Athletic Training is

equipped with the largest hydrotherapy pools in both collegiate and professional sports and is one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, as well as on-site x-ray room. LSU is also the only school in college athletics with a training room equipped with a full-service vision center. The facility is named in honor of legendary trainer Dr. Martin J. Broussard, who served as LSU's athletic trainer for several decades.





Strength and conditioning can be the heart and soul of an athletic program's success, and LSU has taken great strides to improve its strength program and facilities.

LSU student-athletes enjoy one of the finest

strength and conditioning facilities in the nation with a 10,000-square foot weight room located on the North side of Tiger Stadium. The weight room features the latest in both strength training and cardiovascular training equipment.

Already a Louisiana legend and one of the greatest college baseball coaches of all time, J. Stanley "Skip" Bertman has augmented his impressive list of achievements in two seasons as LSU's director of athletics. While supervising the Tigers' magnificent progress on the playing fields, he has begun to implement measures necessary to realize his vision of building the LSU athletics department into the best in the country. Bertman's bold and innovative plans promise to keep the Tigers among the nation's elite in all phases of collegiate athletics.

LSU's programs enjoyed remarkable success under Bertman's direction in 2002-03, as 16 of the Tigers' 20 sports participated in NCAA post-season competition. That accomplishment, along with improved graduation rates, increased team grade point averages and the construction of new academic facilities, foreshadow even more significant deeds in Bertman's tenure.

Bertman was named LSU's athletics director on January 19, 2001. With Bertman, LSU gained an athletics director who provides the leadership and experience necessary to manage the Tigers' nearly \$40 million budget.

Bertman guided LSU to five NCAA baseball titles, and his teams drew huge crowds to venerable Alex Box Stadium, as the Tigers led the nation in attendance in each of his final six seasons (1996-2001).

He also served as head coach of the 1996 U.S. Olympic team which captured the bronze medal in Atlanta.

Bertman continues to be honored for his remarkable coaching tenure, as he was inducted in June, 2002, into the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in January, 2003.

In a **Baseball America** poll released in January, 1999, Bertman was voted the second greatest college baseball coach of the 20th century, trailing only Rod Dedeaux of Southern California. Bertman and Dedeaux are the only coaches to win five CWS titles.

He had previously earned stellar recognition as one of the nation's brightest assistant coaches while at the University of Miami (Fla.) for eight seasons (1976-83). Before working at Miami, Bertman was renowned for his coaching excellence. In 11 seasons at Miami Beach High School, he directed the Hi-Tides to a state championship and two runners-up finishes. He was named Florida's Coach of the Year on three occasions.

In 1975, Bertman coached at Miami-Dade Downtown, leaving after one season to join legendary head coach Ron Fraser at Miami. The move was a homecoming of sorts, as Bertman spent his collegiate playing days with the Hurricanes as an outfielder and catcher from 1958-60. He earned his B.A. in health and physical education from Miami in 1961 and received his master's degree from UM in 1964.

Bertman and his wife Sandy are the parents of four daughters - Jan, Jodi, Lisa and Lori. The Bertman's have two grandchildren - Sophie Faith and Isaac Stanley, the children of Emile and Lori Bertman Guirard.
