

On A Mission: — LSU SOCCER IN HAITI

LSU SOCCER STARS SPEND CHRISTMAS IN HAITI

Before the Christmas holiday in December 2009, LSU soccer stars Courtney Alexander and Natalie leyoub traveled to the Caribbean nation of Haiti for a week-long mission trip with the organization Lespwa Worldwide as they sought to bring joy to the native people. While working in the village of Messailler, the duo helped run a Vacation Bible School and assisted in construction projects for the school, church and orphanage within the complex in which they stayed. They also helped organize the soccer games for the local children to play.

Upon returning to the United States, Alexander described the love she had for the Haitian people by saying, "I had never even thought of going to Haiti before. My heart has always been for Africa. I knew immediately when I got home that I wanted to go back. I still do now more than ever. I wish I could go immediately. I think part of my heart will always be in Haiti."

Alexander and leyoub could have never imagined the destruction that would soon follow upon their return home as a cataclysmic earthquake that struck on Jan. 12, 2010, left the island in a state of ruin and the native people hopeless in the face of the devastation.

The organization Lespwa Worldwide derives its name from the Creole word meaning "hope," and both Alexander and leyoub wanted to return to show the Haitian people that there is hope for the future, for then and for their nation.

"I would definitely want to take another trip there," leyoub said.
"There's just a lot of need right now. I think that since I've been there I can understand the damage and the amount of need that the country is in right now. I'd like to see the progress that Lespwa Worldwide is making during this tragedy. They're bringing a lot of hope to the people there. The word 'Lespwa' actually means 'hope."







ALEXANDER AND IEYOUB RETURN TO HAITI FOR EARTHQUAKE RELIEF



After the conclusion of the spring semester in June 2010, both Alexander and leyoub had the opportunity to return to Haiti for the first time since the earthquake to assist Lespwa Worldwide in its relief efforts. This time, they worked with the organization at its Mission of Hope headquarters in a village called Titayen to help with the reconstruction of the campus.

Along with LSU women's golfer Mary Michael Maggio, they helped construct the roof of a new school cafeteria, paint some of the new orphanage buildings and organize medical supplies for the on-site clinic. They also served as runners in the medical clinic and assistants in the prosthetics lab.

Not only that, but the trio was fortunate to visit orphanages in

surrounding villages to spend time with the Haitian children, playing soccer and making arts and crafts during their stay.

"It was great to go back and work alongside the Haitian people who have hope that their country can be rebuilt and who have an unwavering love and joy in Jesus when they literally have nothing else," Alexander said. "Mission of Hope has given them the chance to be equipped to help change their nation. You can see how the children now have a sense of responsibility and pride in their country like never had before. I didn't know you could fall in love with a place more than you already were, but it happened with me. It captured my heart in December, and it continues to hold a tight grip on me."



Media Training
LSU is one of the few schools where student-athletes go through media training to enhance their communication skills. Dr. Tommy Karam and Dr. Shirley White are two experts in the field who give training sessions to student-athletes here on campus. The Academic Center features a mock press conference setting to get student-athletes acclimated to giving interviews in front of both print and electronic media. Karam and White record the mock interviews on camera and then provide feedback, allowing student-athletes to become more comfortable and confident when doing actual interviews.





The New LSU SOCCER COMPLEX

The LSU Soccer Complex has earned a reputation as being one of the more intimidating venues for an opposing team to compete in all of college soccer. That is evident in the fact that the Tigers boast a brilliant 26-4-6 home record with an impressive .805 winning percentage over the last four seasons. LSU enters the 2011 season as winners of three of the last four SEC Western Division titles and veterans of three NCAA Tournament appearances in as many seasons while defending their home turf.

On the strength of its recent success, the LSU Soccer Complex will face extensive renovations in the coming years as the program continues its ascent to the pinnacle of the SEC and the NCAA. It'll truly be a home worthy of an emerging power in women's college soccer.

In March 2011, construction teams broke

ground on Phase 2 of the renovation as \$2.3 million has been invested to transform the facility in creating additional seating, installing new lighting and building a new press box for the media and concession stand and restrooms for the LSU supporters to enjoy.

By adding a second level of bleacher seating to the existing structure, the official capacity of the new-look LSU Soccer Complex will increase to 2,197, easily accommodating a fanbase that has created one of the more intimidating homefield advantages in the SEC. In addition, new gates have been built on the west side of the complex with brick columns throughout. New gating has also been installed at the top of the bleachers.

Fans attending future matches at the LSU Soccer Complex, will also benefit from the

addition of the permanent concession stand located directly below the press box. The facility also features two new restrooms for a total of four as men's and women's facilities are located at both ends of the stadium.

Members of the media will also enjoy the brand new press box that has been installed to make the covering of future matches a state-of-the-art experience. Not only will the press box double in size to 333 square feet, but hard-wired internet has been installed across the work space to go along with a wireless internet signal that has already been accessible throughout the facility. In addition, television cameras and videographers have access to a crow's nest on the roof of the press box that also featured wired internet.

The Tigers have been nearly unbeatable at the LSU Soccer Complex under the direction of head coach Brian Lee as they enter the fall with a sparkling 32-6-8 home mark since 2006. The squad has only dropped four decisions at home in the last four seasons as it followed an unbeaten 5-0-3 home slate in 2007 with an impressive 8-1 campaign in 2008, a 7-1-2 season in 2009 and a 6-2-1 mark in 2010. In fact, LSU's home dominance is highlighted by a school record 18-game home unbeaten streak that came to an end on Oct. 26, 2008, with a narrow 2-1 defeat to the sixth-ranked Florida Gators.

The start of the 2011 season marks the 16th season in the life of the LSU Soccer Complex - a field that was christened on Sept. 13, 1996, when the Tigers played host to rival Tennessee.

The Tigers set the single-game attendance record on Oct. 5, 2007, when 2,402 fans witnessed a 3-0 upset of sixth-ranked Tennessee for their first ever win over an opponent ranked among the Top 10 teams in the nation. In fact, the Tigers set the alltime attendance record three times during the 2007 season and finished the fall ranked No. 10 nationally in average attendance and No. 7 nationally in average paid attendance while drawing 1,294 fans per match.

The program made history again in 2009 as the Tigers were awarded a No. 4 national seed in the NCAA Tournament and the LSU Soccer Complex was selected as a regional host site of the NCAA First and Second Rounds for the first time in its existence, solidifying its reputation as one of the most intimidating venues in all of college soccer.

The stadium features a newly renovated locker room facility with a brand new visitor's locker room on the south end of the facility and a state-of-theart squad room measuring 2,000 square feet that was completed in the summer of 2006. The playing surface underwent further renovations in the spring of 2007 as the LSU athletic department invested \$250,000 into a total reconstruction of the pitch. The field was flattened and covered with a hybrid Bermuda grass called Mississippi Choice similar to the playing surface in Tiger Stadium. It also features a brand new drainage and irrigation system to keep the field in pristine condition year round.





The LSU Soccer Complex boasts a modern and spacious locker room that includes locker rooms for the Tigers, as well as facilities for opponents and game officials. The complex also provides an on-site training room, a meeting room and lounge for the team and offices for the LSU coaching staff.



LOCKER ROOM RENOVATIONS

The locker room facility at the LSU Soccer Complex recently underwent an extensive \$200,000 renovation project that included the addition of a brand new visitor's locker room on the south end of the facility. The former visitor's locker room was expanded to 2,000 square feet and converted into a state-of-the-art squad room and lounge for the Tigers to enjoy. The facility underwent further renovations in the spring of 2007 as the LSU athletic department invested \$250,000 into a total reconstruction of the facility's playing surface. The field was flattened and covered with a hybrid Bermuda grass called Mississippi Choice similar to the sand-based playing surface in Tiger Stadium. It also features a brand new drainage and irrigation system to keep the field in pristine condition year round.



Indoor Practice **FACILITY**

When the weather prevents the soccer team from practicing at the LSU Soccer Complex, the squad moves inside to the climate-controlled indoor football practice facility. The indoor facility was built as part of a \$15 million upgrade in the early 1990s and houses a 100-yard football field that was renovated with brand new Momentum Field Turf in the spring of 2006.



Athletic Student TRAINING

Nutrition First

LSU is one of the few schools nationally that maintains a state-of-the-art nutritional program for today's student-athlete. Senior Associate Athletic Trainer Shelly Mullenix coordinates with LSU dining services to provide a balanced training table diet. LSU athletic trainers also meet one-on-one with student-athletes to give them expert nutritional information.

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facilities in all of collegiate athletics with both the Operations Center and the Broussard Center for Athletic Training in Tiger Stadium. Both are furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. The Operations Center training room features a full view of the practice fields, two hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill. The Broussard Center includes an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy and a hydrotherapy pool. It is also one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, vision center and dental center.



Hydrotherapy Treatment

An integral part of rehabbing and developing LSU student-athletes is the operations center's hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill in a fully-equipped Hydrotherapy room. The Broussard training center boasts the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports.

The two-story, 22,000-square-foot facility contains 20 treatment tables with the newest forms of modalities available, 14 taping stations, a 1,600-square-foot rehabilitation area which contains the latest rehabilitation equipment including the Cybex Norm, Woodway treadmills and Body Master select rise equipment. LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard (left), the legendary trainer whose career spanned more than 40 years at LSU.

Real-Time X-Rays

A new state-of-the-art fluoroscope was added in the summer of 2008 that will provide LSU athletic trainers the opportunity to take x-rays on site in the Operations Center. The machine can provide real-time images of the internal structures of a patient.



Gameday Wellness

The full-time athletic training staff, along with 10 graduate assistants, prepares the players for gameday in the comfort of Tiger Stadium hours before kickoff.



The following nine individuals are the only athletes to have their jerseys retired by LSU. Men's basketball has retired the No. 23 for Pete Maravich, No. 50 for Bob Pettit, Jr., No. 33 for Shaquille O'Neal and No. 40 for Rudy Macklin. Women's basketball retired the No. 33 for Seimone Augustus. Football's only two retired jerseys are the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon and the No. 37 worn by Tommy Casanova. Baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of longtime coach and former athletics director Skip Bertman and the No. 20 for Ben McDonald. Casanova, Macklin and McDonald joined the prestigious list in May 2009. Augustus became the first woman in LSU Athletics history to have her jersey retired in January 2010.

50 Bob Pettit

Pettit led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame, and in 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.




23 Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50-plus points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.



20 Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss 3-0 in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for the 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



33 Shaquille O'Neal

O'Neal was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



15 Skip Bertman

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also coached the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea, in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and served as LSU's athletics director for seven years. Bertman was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006.

About LSU Retired Jerseys

The retirement of the jerseys of Casanova, McDonald, Macklin and Augustus comes under a new provision of the LSU jersey retirement bylaws that says the retirement of an athlete's jersey in a particular sport does not preclude a current student-athlete in that sport from wearing the jersey number in that or any other sport, subject to the discretion of the head coach. This provision applies only to jerseys retired after January 1, 2007, so the numbers worn by Maravich, Pettit, O'Neal, Cannon and Bertman may never again be worn by future student-athletes in their respective sports. To have a jersey retired at LSU, an athlete must have completed intercollegiate competition for LSU a minimum of five years prior to nomination. Athletes must have demonstrated truly unusual and outstanding accomplishments, exceeding and in addition to all criteria used for Hall of Fame selection. Nominees must have a unanimous vote of support from the Hall of Fame committee.


Rudy Macklin 40

Rudy Macklin was a two-time basketball All-American selection during his Tiger career from 1976-81 during which time he became LSU's all-time leading rebounder with 1,276 boards and the second-leading scorer in school history behind only the legendary Pete Maravich with 2,080 points. He led the Tigers to two Elite Eight appearances and the 1981 Final Four in Philadelphia. He still holds the school single game rebound record with 32, a mark like some of the great records in any sport that may never be broken.



Tommy Casanova 37 Tommy Casanova is the only three-time All-American in

Tommy Casanova is the only three-time All-American in the history of LSU football and is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame. During his Tiger career from 1969-71, Casanova personified versatility for his myriad of talents as he played offense, defense, returned punts and kickoffs. One of just two three-time All-SEC performers at LSU, he played six seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals of the NFL while earning his medical degree.



Ben McDonald 19

Ben McDonald won the prestigious Golden Spikes Award, given annually to the nation's most outstanding player, in 1989 and is a member of the College Baseball Hall of Fame. He led LSU to two College World Series appearances. In 1989, McDonald was named National Player of the Year by Baseball America, The Sporting News and Collegiate Baseball. He was selected by the Baltimore Orioles as the No. 1 pick in the major league draft in 1989 and went on to enjoy a 10-year major league career with the Orioles and the Milwaukee Brewers.



Seimone Augustus 33

Seimone Augustus is the only women's basketball player in school history to earn State Farm Coaches Association All-America honors three times: 2004, 2005 and 2006. Augustus became LSU's first NCAA National Player of the Year and she claimed the honor twice in 2005 and 2006. A 2006 graduate of LSU, Augustus was the WNBA's No. 1 draft pick in 2006. She went on to lead the United States to a gold medal at the 2008 Beijing Olympic Games.



Sylvia Fowles was a two-time State Farm All-American at LSU before going onto a career in the WNBA with the Chicago Sky. Fowles and Seimone Augustus became the first LSU basketball players to claim Olympic gold when they did so in 2008 for the United States.

LSU Vice Chancellor/Director of Athletics



Joe Alleva continues to bring unprecedented national recognition to LSU as Vice Chancellor and Director of Athletics. Under Alleva's leadership, LSU enjoys one of the country's premier athletics programs with success on and off the field of competition. Now in his fourth season at LSU, Alleva is dedicated to athletic and academic excellence, and is committed to providing the opportunities and the resources necessary for student-athletes to excel in competition, in the classroom and in the community.

Alleva joined the LSU family on April 4, 2008, after a highly successful tenure as director of athletics at Duke University for 10 years. Alleva's role at LSU was further expanded in August of 2009 when vice chancellor was added to his title by the LSU Board of Supervisors. It is the first time in school history that the director of athletics has also held a vice chancellor position.

Alleva was recently appointed to a five-year term on the prestigious NCAA Men's Basketball Committee, reinforcing his position as one of the most respected athletic administrators in the country.

Upon his arrival at LSU, Alleva unveiled a strategic master plan for the LSU athletics program -- "LSU: Thru and True" -- to ensure the advancement and future of LSU Athletics as an exemplary program. The central mission of the plan is to create an environment for student-athletes to reach their ultimate potential, prepare them to be champions in life and to set out goals and values for the entire athletics program.

Alleva's vision for LSU athletics facilities includes plans to enhance the appearance of Tiger Stadium and transform the North Stadium Drive corridor into a showplace for the university. Under his direction, LSU's world-renowned track and field program received a state-of the-art running surface last year when a new track was installed in Bernie Moore Stadium. Extensive renovations to the Tiger soccer facility will be completed this fall, and future plans include a new gymnastics practice facility, a tennis complex, and renovations to the Maravich Center and Carl Maddox Field House.

Alleva directed a major renovation to the University Club golf course that was completed in September 2010 and allows the LSU men's and women's golf teams to compete on one of the most challenging courses in the country. The renovated course helped prepare Tiger golfers John Peterson and Austin Ernst, respectively, to win 2011 NCAA men's and women's individual championships, marking the first time both titles were claimed by players from the same school. The Lady Tiger golfers were third in the final team standings, marking the highest finish in LSU history.

LSU Athletics completed another highly successful year in 2010-11, highlighted by a Fighting Tiger football squad that posted an 11-2 mark - including a Cotton Bowl victory and finished the season ranked No. 8 in the nation. The 2010-11 athletic year also featured Top 5 national finishes both indoors and outdoors by the men's and women's track and field teams.



In 2008-09, all 20 LSU sports competed in NCAA postseason play for the first time in school history and the Tiger baseball team won the national championship. This past year LSU ranked second among Southeastern Conference teams in the Learfield Director's Cup All-Sports standings and finished in the Top 20 for the sixth year in a row.

Alleva ensures that the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes is a first-class facility that provides student-athletes the resources necessary for success in the classroom and personal development. The facility was recently enhanced by the addition of a media training center that gives student-athletes valuable assistance in improving their communications skills. And with a strong emphasis on community service and outreach programs, the implementation under Alleva's direction of the "Geaux Givers" program fosters a relationship between the local community and LSU student-athletes, who regularly participate in philanthropic events.

In addition, Alleva has bolstered the department's L-Club program to reach out and connect with former student-athletes.

Alleva oversees a staff of outstanding coaches and he made two critical additions to LSU's coaching staff in the off-season. He lured the dynamic Nikki Caldwell to LSU to coach the Lady Tiger basketball team and then hired Beth Torina to direct the Tiger softball program, bringing a new wealth of knowledge and passion to the LSU women's sports program.

Alleva is an innovator with bold ideas that benefit not only LSU but all of Greater Baton Rouge. He has been instrumental in the planning of the Bayou Country Superfest, a two-day country music concert and festival held in Tiger Stadium each spring. The event attracts nearly 100,000 visitors to the LSU campus and makes a tremendous economic impact upon the local community.

Alleva has served on numerous national committees throughout his career including the Football Bowl Certification Committee, the NCAA Division I Championships/ Competition Cabinet and several Southeastern Conference and Atlantic Coast Conference committees.

He became director of athletics at Duke in 1998 and his impressive tenure there propelled the university into the ranks of America's top all-around collegiate programs. Among his outstanding list of accomplishments includes the greatest 10-year period in Duke Athletics, winning more ACC and NCAA championships than in any other decade in school history.

Alleva, whose hometown is Suffern, N.Y., majored in Finance at Lehigh University and received his bachelor's degree in 1975. While at Lehigh, Alleva was the quarterback of the football team and team captain in 1974. Alleva also played on the Lehigh baseball team. He served as a graduate assistant football coach and earned an MBA in 1976.

While at Duke, Alleva played a key role in Durham's community sports scene. He started Little League Baseball in Durham over 20 years ago, and also began the American Legion baseball program.

He is a member of the North Carolina American Legion Hall of Fame, Suffern High School Hall of Fame and the Rockland County Hall of Fame.

Alleva and his wife, Annie, have three children, J.D., Jeff, and Jenny.

Dr. John V. Lombardi

President, Louisiana State University System



Dr. John V. Lombardi is the fifth individual to serve as the President of the Louisiana State University System. As its Chief Executive Officer, Dr. Lombardi oversees 11 institutions, including five academic campuses, as well as 10 public hospitals located throughout the state. He is also a Professor of History at Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College.

Dr. Lombardi was born in Los Angeles, Calif., and attended Pomona College where he earned his bachelor's degree. He received his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in history from Columbia University. He joined the faculty in the Department of History at Indiana University, where he later served as Dean of International Programs and Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. In 1987, he became Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at the Johns Hopkins University. From 1990-1999, Dr. Lombardi was President of the University of Florida. Prior to his appointment as President of the LSU System, he served as Chancellor of the University of Massachusetts Amherst.

He is a Latin American historian, with a special interest in Venezuela. Dr. Lombardi is also one of the country's foremost authorities in higher education, serving as Co-Editor of The Top American Research Universities. He is the author of numerous professional publications, and along with his wife, Cathryn, co-authored a teaching atlas on Latin American History. He has taught courses in history, intercollegiate sports, and university management.

Dr. Michael V. Martin

Chancellor, LSU



Dr. Michael V. Martin assumed the chancellorship of Louisiana State University and A&M College on August 1, 2008. Prior to his appointment as LSU's eighth chancellor, Dr. Martin established a distinguished career in higher education, serving most recently as president of New Mexico State University.

Before arriving at NMSU in 2004, Dr. Martin served for six years as vice president for agriculture and natural resources at the University of Florida, leading the university's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences. He was elevated to senior vice president of the University of Florida shortly before being selected as NMSU's president. Previously, he was vice president for agricultural policy and the dean of the College of Agricultural, Food and Environmental Sciences at the University of Minnesota. He began his academic career at Oregon State University as a faculty member in the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics.

An academic leader dedicated to the land-grant mission, Dr. Martin is recognized as a strong voice for higher education. In 2007, he received the Justin Smith Morrill Memorial Award, named after the author of the bill creating land-grant universities, which honors outstanding service on behalf of the land-grant mission. Only six individuals have been designated to receive this award since it was first given in 1980. For his leadership in improving the quality of life for New Mexico citizens and future generations, he was awarded the 2008 Distinguished Leadership Award by Leadership New Mexico.

Other recent awards include his recognition as a powerbroker by The New Mexico Business Weekly in 2006, being named Outstanding Alumnus of Minnesota State University Mankato in 2006, and receiving the NMSU Social Justice Award in 2005.

Dr. Martin is involved in a wide array of professional and community organizations and activities.

An active scholar, Dr. Martin has authored numerous book chapters and articles for academic journals, trade publications, and the popular press and recently published pieces for The Chronicle of Higher Education and University Business.

Some of his philosophy is summed up in the following quote: "It is the tradition of land-grant universities to be non-traditional," written as part of a 2001 article titled "The Land-Grant University in the 21st Century," published in the Journal of Agricultural and Applied Economics. He traced the history of the land-grant movement from the mid-1800s and concluded that "the fundamental land-grant principles of accessibility, practical as well as classical education, research and discovery in the public interest, and connectedness to all the people remain powerful and profound."

A native of Crosby, Minn., Dr. Martin earned a bachelor's degree in business and economics and a master's degree in economics at Mankato State College (Minnesota State University) in Minnesota. He received his Ph.D. in applied economics from the University of Minnesota in 1977.

Dr. Martin and his wife, Jan, have two children, both adopted from South Korea. Amanda, a

graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, is a graphic artist in Saint Paul, Minn. Sam, who holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Minnesota and a master's from Sarah Lawrence College, is a genetics counselor at Beth Israel Hospital in New York City.



YOUTHFUL TIGERS MATURE FOR 2011 CHAMPIONSHIP RUN

While competing with one of the more youthful rosters in the Southeastern Conference during the 2010 season, the Tigers saw their run of three-straight SEC Western Division championships and three-straight NCAA Tournament appearances come to an end after recording an 8-8-5 overall record with a 4-4-3 mark and 15 points for a sixth-place finish in the final league standings. That performance also earned the Tigers a second-place finish in the SEC West.

A league-high seven freshmen cracked LSU's starting lineup during the 2010 season following the departure of a heralded senior class that earned 50 wins in the four previous seasons from 2006-09. It was a senior class that had also finished runner-up to Florida for the SEC regular season championship in back-to-back seasons in 2008 and 2009.

Despite their youth, the Tigers advanced to the SEC Tournament semifinal for the fourth-straight season before falling in a penalty kick shootout to the 16th-ranked and No. 2-seeded South Carolina Gamecocks. LSU joined Florida as the only two programs in the conference to appear in the SEC Tournament semifinal in each of the last four seasons.

After playing some of their best soccer of the season at the end of the 2010 campaign, the Tigers carried that momentum into the 2011 spring season in which they lined up against many of the nation's premier programs in a challenging six-game slate.

The Tigers wrapped up the spring campaign with a 3-2-1 overall mark, highlighted by the 1-0 shutout of the powerhouse Texas Longhorns in Houston on March 26. LSU also played to within one goal of two teams that earned a place in the NCAA Elite Eight during the 2010 NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament in national powers Florida State and Oklahoma State. LSU opened the spring season with a 1-0 defeat to the Cowgirls before wrapping up the campaign with another 1-0 defeat at the hands of the Seminoles on April 9.

In fact, LSU's lineup in its spring finale against the College Cup veteran Seminoles featured five freshmen, including Addie Eggleston on the front line, Jodi Calloway, Shannon McLain and Alex Ramsey on the back line and

"Our program really took a big step forward in the spring while competing against some of the elite programs in our sport," said LSU head coach Brian Lee. "Florida State, Oklahoma State and Texas are three Top 20 programs and College Cup contenders year in and year out. We certainly showed that we're right there in that mix. That experience will pay big dividends for our team as we prepare for another championship run this fall.

"It was also a very important spring for our freshman class as they made that transition to their sophomore season. They just continue to make great strides in our program. It's been easy to see the individual development of many of our players as they've continued to mature throughout our offseason program. The work they have put into fitness is evident."

The pieces are certainly in place for the Tigers to challenge the likes of Florida and South Carolina for this year's SEC championship as their most notable weakness from a year ago is sure to be a strength this fall with 10 starters returning to form an experienced unit with an eye on SEC supremacy. In fact, LSU features 15 players on its 2011 roster with starting experience.

LSU returns nearly all of its offensive output from the 2010 season, as 23 of 25 goals and 71 of 78 points scored last fall are sure to kick start the attack this fall.

Senior midfielder Natalie Martineau and junior striker Carlie Banks make their return as LSU's leading goal scorers from a season ago with five goals apiece for the 2010 campaign. Also, Eggleston is sure to join in the attack as an All-SEC candidate on the front line following a rookie season last fall when she scored three goals and a teamleading eight assists and 14 points.

Redshirt freshman Kaley Blades is also anxious for her return to the lineup in the wake of a 2010 season cut short after only four games by injury when she suffered a torn ACL in her knee against the Virginia Tech Hokies on Sept. 5. Blades was the team's leading goal scorer at the time of her injury with two goals and one assist for five points in four matches.

The future of the LSU defense was certainly on display this spring as Kinneman anchored the defensive unit in goal following a freshman campaign in 2010 in which she was named to the SEC All-Freshman Team as one of the nation's top young goalkeepers. She posted six shutouts in 14 starts last fall while setting an LSU single-season record with a 0.66 goals against average.

Calloway, McLain and Ramsey joined senior leader Kellie Murphy along the back line in the spring. Calloway and Murphy held down the middle with McLain earning the start at right back and Ramsey playing left back for much of the spring. LSU's defense proved to be one of the best in the SEC a season ago while allowing just 16 goals to its opponents in 21 matches in 2010.

The emergence of Calloway as a defensive leader this spring allowed Taryne Boudreau to make her return to the midfield as she is poised for a stellar senior season in 2011. Boudreau, who started all 21 games at center back

last fall, is more naturally suited for a spot in the midfield with her ability to score goals and distribute the ball to her teammates in the attacking third.

Boudreau has strengthened a midfield unit that also features two other Canadians in Martineau and senior All-SEC performer Allysha Chapman. Chapman is fresh off a 2010 season in which she earned her second career All-SEC honor with a first-team selection, while Martineau ended the season as the team's leading goal scorer with five goals in her first season at LSU.

"Having Jodi Calloway back from injury is a huge addition to our program," Lee said. "What she's really done for us with her emergence on the back line is allow us to become an even more dangerous team in the final third in creating and scoring goals. Having Taryne Boudreau up in the attack is tremendous in our ability to create those opportunities. We're certainly much more dangerous now than we were last season."

The Tigers will kick off the 2011 campaign with an early-season road test against the four-time defending Conference USA Tournament champion Memphis Tigers on Aug. 19 as both sides collide at the Mike Rose Soccer Complex in their season opener.

In order to prepare for a run at the SEC championship, the Tigers will compete against an impressive nonconference schedule that features five other teams that ended the 2010 season with a final RPI among the Top 100 teams in the country. This includes home fixtures against the likes of Oklahoma, Oregon and Pepperdine, as well as road matches with Houston and Rice. Both Memphis and Oklahoma competed in the NCAA Tournament a season ago.

The Tigers will then compete against an SEC schedule that features three matches against NCAA Tournament teams from a year ago. Highlighting LSU's home slate in 2011 is an Oct. 20 derby against South Carolina, while the Tigers are also set to go on the road this fall to battle five-time defending SEC champion Florida and Auburn in a pair of challenging matches.

There's no question that the LSU soccer program has firmly established itself among the nation's elite with its performance during the last four seasons and the Tigers are hungry for more as the 2011 season draws near. When Lee took over the program in December 2004, he committed himself to "build a program that annually contends for the SEC, qualifies for the NCAA College Cup and competes to win a national championship." With LSU's performance for the past six seasons, his goals are now well within reach for a new generation of Tigers.

FORWARDS

Despite losing the services of team captain Courtney Alexander to graduation following the 2010 season, the Tigers are sure to be much improved in the attack on the front line this fall as juniors carlie Banks and Reyna Lubin, sophomore Addie Eggleston and freshmen Kaley Blades and Alex Cook provide the team with a wealth of scoring talent at the forward position in 2011.

Eggleston returns as the team's most dangerous attacker from a year ago when she scored three goals and dished out a team-high eight assists in her rookie campaign en route to picking up a selection to the SEC All-Freshman Team. She also wrapped up the 2010 campaign as the club's top point scorer with 14 points while starting 20 of 21 games for the Tigers.

The Houston native is poised for a breakout sophomore campaign as she looks to lead the attack while competing for postseason recognition again this fall as one of the SEC's rising stars.

While the Tigers welcome back their top assist maker and point scorer from a season ago in Eggleston, they also welcome back their top two goal scorers for 2011 as Banks tied midfielder Natineau with a team-high five goals on the campaign. Perhaps the highlight of the 2010 season came in the semifinal round at the SEC Tournament when Banks netted the game-tying goal during the second half in a 1-1 draw with 17th-ranked and No. 2-seeded South Carolina to force a shootout in LSU's bid to advance to the conference final for the second-straight season.

Banks provides the experience up top for the Tigers as she has started 40 of 45 games for her career as she has scored a total of 12 goals in two seasons in Baton Rouge.

The Tigers are also anxious for the return of Blades to the playing rotation as the Largo, Fla., native saw her freshman season cut short after four

games when she sustained a tom anterior cruciate ligament in her knee in a Sept. 5 match against Virginia Tech. Blades was tied for LSU's leading goal scorer at the time of her injury with two goals in the first four matches of the year.

Lubin is sure to be one of LSU's top options off the bench as she returns this fall after scoring a career high three goals during her sophomore season in 2010. That includes an impressive two-goal performance in a 6-2 win over Mississippi State a year ago for her first career multi-goal game.

"We're very excited about the talent we have returning in the fall, especially from our younger players," said LSU head coach Brian Lee. "We all started to see the kind of ability Addie Eggleston has down the stretch last season, and she continued to develop in that role in the spring. We're also anxious to get Kaley Blades back in the lineup after missing most of the season a year ago. We really missed

her quality in the attack when we struggled to score goals last year.

"We have several very good options to give us the punch we need up top. We'll also have a bit more depth at that position with members of our recruiting class ready to join the program."

Cook joins the program as one of the premier offensive recruits in the country for the Class of 2011 as she signed with the Tigers from Petal High School in Petal, Miss., as a TopDrawerSoccer.com Top 100 recruit nationwide. Cook was a four-star recruit and the No. 88-ranked player in the country for the 2011 recruiting class by the staff at TopDrawerSoccer.com.

Other incoming freshmen who look to earn a spot in the playing rotation on the front line during the 2011 season include Bonnie Campbell (Plantation, Fla.), Lexi Gibbs (Prairieville, La.) and Ashley Libys (Pass Christian, Miss.).

MIDFIELDERS

Fans are sure to enjoy a Canadian flare in the LSU midfield this season as a trio of senior stars will lead the team's most improved unit in 2011, including two-time All-SEC selection Allysha Chapman in the defensive midfield and All-SEC hopefuls Taryne Boudreau and Natalie Martineau in the middle as they look to facilitate the LSU attack going forward.

Chapman has made her name as arguably the top left back in the SEC during her first two seasons with the Tigers, but the Courtice, Ontario, native will join the midfield as LSU's starting defensive midfielder. Lee has decided to move Chapman into the midfield in the wake of the spring season that saw the emergence of sophomore Alex Ramsey as the team's starting left back.

Chapman actually helped ignite what was at times a stagnant LSU attack in 2010 with her move

into the left midfield as she finished the season with a career high three assists.

Boudreau has also benefitted from LSU's depth along the back line as she makes a return to the midfield following a 2010 season in which she started all 21 matches as one of the Tigers' starting center backs. Boudreau, who competed as LSU's starting defensive midfielder in her first two seasons with the program in 2007 and 2009, was able to rejoin the unit thanks to the emergence of redshirt freshman Jodi Calloway as a dominant center back.

A native of Sherwood Park, Alberta, Boudreau made an immediate impact as an attacking midfielder in the spring season as she was the team's offensive star in a 3-2-1 campaign while competing against many of the nation's premier programs. Boudreau provided the highlight of the spring by

scoring the game-winning goal in a 1-0 shutout of the powerhouse Texas Longhorns on March 26.

Martineau proved to be a welcomed addition in her first season with the program in 2010 as she finished the season tied as the team's leading goal scorer with five goals on the campaign.

While playing primarily as an attacking midfielder, Martineau started all 21 matches with the Tigers a season ago after transferring to LSU from the University of Montevallo of Division II prior to the 2010 season. She led the team with three game-winning goals on the year, including a double overtime strike in a 1-0 victory over Kentucky on Oct. 8 of last season.

"Our fans will enjoy what they see from this group this fall," Lee said. "I feel like we're a more dangerous team going forward this season. Having a weapon like Taryne Boudreau back for us in the attack is tremendous in our ability to create more goal-scoring opportunities. It's also big that we have the luxury of moving Chappy into the midfield full-time."

The Tigers feature experienced depth in the midfield, led by sophomore Emily Cancienne who returns this fall after starting all 21 games of her true freshman season in 2010 as a defensive midfielder and center back. Cancienne is sure to fill the same role for the Tigers this fall.

The Tigers return two other part-time starters in junior Natalie leyoub and sophomore Nina Anderson. Also competing for time this season are sophomore Danielle Murphy and freshmen Alex Arlitt (Houston, Texas), Nicole McLaughlin (Cocoa Beach, Fla.), Tori Sample (Houston, Texas), Campbell and Gibbs.

DEFENDERS

The Tigers featured one of the elite defensive units in the SEC during the 2010 season as they equaled the team's single-season record for goals allowed with 16 and nearly set a new team record with their 0.72 goals against average in 21 matches. Their 16 goals allowed tied Florida for the top spot in the SEC while their goals against average trailed only the Gators for the No. 1 spot in the SEC during the 2010 season.

Two starters return along the back line with senior leader Kellie Murphy in the center and sophomore Alex Ramsey at left back. Both Murphy and Ramsey started all 21 matches a year ago to help lead one of the SEC's top lines of defense.

After playing sparingly as a reserve midfielder

as a true freshman in 2010, sophomore Shannon McLain took advantage of her opportunity to compete through the 2011 spring season in grabbing the starting spot at right back following Ramsey's transition to the left side.

Perhaps the most important development in strengthening LSU's starting 11 in the spring season saw the emergence of redshirt freshman Jodi Calloway as Murphy's counterpart in the middle of the Tiger defense.

After missing the entire 2010 campaign with a severe knee injury suffered in playing with her club team leading up to her true freshman season, Calloway emerged as a dominant force in the middle of the LSU defense during the spring season. That

allowed senior Taryne Boudreau to return to her natural position in the midfield. Calloway is poised to anchor a defense ready to hold onto its reputation as one of the best in the Southeastern Conference.

"Having Jodi Calloway back from injury is a huge addition to our program this fall," Lee said. "What she's really done for us with her emergence on the back line is allow us to become a much more dangerous team in the attack in creating and scoring goals. When you consider the fact that we've moved probably our top two defenders from last season into the midfield, it shows the kind of talent and depth we have on the back line. We were very impressed with this group for the way it performed throughout the spring season."

The Tigers solidified their depth along the back line in June when it was announced that University of Missouri transfer Molly Bear decided to join the program for the 2011 season.

Bear, a native of Glendale, Ariz., joined the program following a 2010 season at Missouri in which she received a redshirt in her first season at the collegiate level. The former member of the Region IV Olympic Development Program Team player pool provides immediate depth to the back line as she competes for playing time at center back as a redshirt freshman.

GOALKEEPERS

While the Tigers will feature one of the most talented back lines in the SEC this fall, they are also blessed with a pair of All-SEC caliber goalkeepers in senior star Mo Isom and sophomore standout Megan Kinneman to anchor perhaps the league's top defensive unit in 2011.

Kinneman emerged as one of the top young goalkeepers in the country with the effort she showed as a freshman last fall as she turned a record-breaking season into All-SEC consideration and a selection to the SEC All-Freshman Team. After making her collegiate debut in a Sept. 17 road contest against No. 21-ranked Illinois, Kinneman started 14-straight matches while posting a total of six shutouts and allowing just 10 goals to LSU's opponents in 2010. She also set a new team single-

season record with a 0.66 goals against average in nearly 1,362 minutes to rank No. 1 among all goalkeepers in the Southeastern Conference.

A native of Missouri City, Texas, Kinneman certainly showed the form that earned her a selection as a TopDrawerSoccer.com Top 100 recruit in the country as part of the recruiting Class of 2010. She ranked No. 96 nationwide and No. 9 nationally among goalkeeper recruits during an outstanding senior campaign at Elkins High School.

Kinneman continued to shine during the 2011 spring season as she started all six matches in goal for the Tigers as she will again compete with Isom for the starting job this fall.

Isom has proven herself as one of the leading goalkeepers in the history of the SEC as she has

posted 31 career wins with 22 shutouts and a 0.78 goals against average in her three seasons at LSU. She has also started 50 of 51 games during her career with the Tigers as she ranks among the SEC's all-time career leaders at the goalkeeper position.

In fact, Isom ranks No. 3 in league history with her 0.78 career goals against average. She is also tied for the No. 8 spot on the league's all-time career list with 22 shutouts.

A product of Lassiter High School in Marietta, Ga., Isom is working to regain the form she showed as an All-SEC contender and member of the Under-23 U.S. Women's National Team player pool in her first two seasons. She sustained an Achilles injury that limited her effectiveness in goal during her junior season last fall. "We're in a unique situation in that we have two All-SEC caliber goalkeepers leading our defense this season," Lee said. "That kind of competition is only going to make our defense better as we compete for an SEC championship this fall. That is the kind of depth you have to have for a run through a league like the Southeastern Conference. We're comfortable with either leading our defense and are excited for the competition we'll see all season long."

The SEC Tournament Championship Game is scheduled for a live television broadcast on ESPNU on Nov. 6 at 2:30 p.m. CT.



2011 NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament

The NCAA will select 64 teams to compete in the 2011 NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament. There are 28 conferences that will receive

one automatic bid into the field of 64 teams. The remaining 36 teams selected for the postseason will receive at-large bids based on their performance during the regular season.

The first rounds of the NCAA Tournament is scheduled for Nov. 11-13 at 32 host sites yet to be determined. The second and third rounds will be held the following weekend from Nov. 18-20 at eight undetermined campus sites. The NCAA quarterfinals will then be held Nov. 25-27. The 11th-annual NCAA Women's College Cup will be held in Kennesaw, Ga., with the semifinals on Friday, Dec. 2 and the championship game on Sunday, Dec. 4 at the Kennesaw State Soccer Stadium.

THE VISION

LSU is the sleeping giant of college soccer. My vision for LSU is to build a program that annually contends to win the SEC, qualifies for the NCAA College Cup and competes to win a National Championship. The foundation that we've built these last six years has given us that opportunity.

THE PHILOSOPHY

I believe in a commitment to excellence from our players, coaches and staff in all facets of the program. We will provide an environment in which our student-athletes can maximize their potential as students, athletes and people.

When Brian Lee took the reigns of the LSU soccer program in December 2004, he envisioned a program with the potential to be a perennial contender for the Southeastern Conference championship and an annual participant in the NCAA Tournament. His bold vision to transform LSU soccer into a nationally-respected program has produced unprecedented results as the Tigers enter the 2011 campaign as SEC Western Division champions and NCAA Tournament veterans in three of the last four seasons.

While competing with the most youthful roster in the SEC during the 2010 campaign, the Tigers advanced to the SEC Tournament semifinal for the fourth-straight season. LSU is one of only two programs in the league to earn a spot into the semifinal round of the SEC Tournament in each of the last four seasons, joining five-time defending SEC champion Florida.

LSU soared to new heights in 2009 by matching the school wins record with a 15-4-5 overall mark and establishing a new school record with an 8-2-1 mark and 25 points in SEC play. For the second-straight season, the Tigers finished in second place in the final SEC standings and just one point shy of Florida for their first ever SEC championship. LSU then took a No. 2 seed to the SEC Tournament and advanced to the conference final for the first time in program history.

The Tigers were rewarded for their outstanding performance with a No. 4 national seed in the NCAA Tournament, while serving as a regional host for the first time in team history, and advanced to the NCAA Second Round for the second time in three seasons.

Their effort helped land a No. 14 national ranking at the end of the 2009 season in the final Top 25 ranking released by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America. It marked the second year in a row for LSU to finish as high as No. 14 in the national rankings.

In fact, the Tigers have been a staple in the national rankings in the past three seasons as they have spent time in the Top 25 of all three major polls, climbing as high as No. 9 in 2008 and No. 10 in 2009. They have been ranked among the Top 20 teams in the country for 22 weeks over the last three seasons, while continuing their ascent to the pinnacle of women's college soccer.

But it has been their performance in conference play that has established the Tigers as an undeniable threat in the SEC championship picture. LSU has finished runner-up to Florida for the conference title in two of the last three years, including a narrow one-point decision for the league championship in 2009. Under Lee's direction, LSU posted a remarkable 20-7-6 SEC record in winning three-straight SEC West titles from 2007-09, including a sparkling 13-2-3 mark in games played against SEC Western Division opponents.

The Tigers are now 24-11-9 in SEC play since 2007, with a dominant 17-2-4 mark versus their rivals in the SEC Western Division.

Despite finishing in 12th place in each of the two years prior to Lee's arrival, the Tigers have shown steady progress in their ascent to the top of the SEC as the team



finished eighth place in 2005 and 2006, fourth place in 2007 and second place in 2008 and 2009. They have experience on their side as they look to rejoin the SEC championship chase in 2011 after placing sixth for the final league table a season ago.

On the strength of winning three-straight SEC West championships from 2007-09, LSU garnered its share of national acclaim while earning the right to compete in the NCAA Tournament in each season. The Tigers advanced to the NCAA Second Round in 2007 and 2009.

Lee and his dedicated coaching staff have built a program with the ability to compete with anyone in women's college soccer. That was never more evident than in 2007 when LSU battled No. 4-ranked Texas to a 2-2 draw on the road in Austin and dominated No. 6-ranked Tennessee by a 3-0 margin at home for the program's first victory against an opponent ranked as one of the top-10 teams in the country.

The Tigers were impressive again in 2009 when they earned a pair of shutout wins versus teams in the Top 10 of the polls with a 6-0 blanking of No. 8-ranked Georgia and a 1-0 shutout of No. 10-ranked South Carolina at the LSU Soccer Complex. They then drew South Carolina in the SEC Tournament final by a score of 1-1.

The Tigers have more than proven themselves against elite competition as they have won four matches while drawing eight against nationally-ranked opponents since 2007.

World-class midfielder Malorie Rutledge was at the center of LSU's turnaround. After being recruited by Lee to LSU as part of the Class of 2006, the Sharpsburg, Ga., product wrapped up her collegiate career in 2009 as the most decorated Tiger to step on the pitch. Rutledge earned a pair of consensus All-America accolades, while also being named a two-time SEC Offensive Player of the Year and three-time First-Team All-SEC performer during her brilliant career.

Rutledge also rewrote the LSU record books in four seasons as she set two school records with 46 assists and 102 points, while also scoring 28 goals from 2006-09. Lee has coached 11 of his athletes to 22 All-SEC selections in six seasons as LSU was recognized with a team-best five all-conference selections in 2009. Joining Rutledge on the All-SEC squad were defender Chelsea Potts (first team), midfielder Allysha Chapman (second team), midfielder Melissa Clarke (second team) and forward Carlie Banks (all-freshman). Seniors Clarke and Potts each finished their collegiate careers as three-time All-SEC performers.

Chapman followed with her first career First-Team All-SEC selection in 2010 as she was one of three Tigers to be recognized. Addie Eggleston and Megan Kinneman were each chosen as part of the SEC All-Freshman Team following their rookie seasons.

Lee's impact has not only been felt with unprecedented results on the field, but also at the box office as record crowds have packed the LSU Soccer Complex week in and week out to see the Tigers in action since his arrival in Baton Rouge.

The 2007 season proved to be unlike any other in the history of the LSU Soccer Complex as the Tigers were unbeaten for the first time with a 5-0-3 record while drawing an average of 1,294 fans per match. That number ranked LSU among the Top 10 teams in the nation in average attendance for the first time as the team finished the season ranked No. 7 in the NCAA in average paid attendance. The Tigers also set three single-game attendance records while setting the bar with a record crowd of 2,402 for its historic 3-0 victory over No. 6 Tennessee on Oct. 5, 2007.

And they have been nearly unbeatable on their home turf while following an unbeaten 5-0-3 home schedule in 2007 with an 8-1-0 mark in 2008, a 7-1-2 record in 2009 and 6-1-2 mark in 2010 for a combined 26-3-7 record at the LSU Soccer Complex over the past four seasons.

Not only have the Tigers proven to be one of the SEC's top programs with their effort on the field in six seasons under Lee's direction, but they have also taken great pride in their performance off the field as they are the unquestioned University leaders in community service as winners of threestraight Tiger Cups in 2009, 2010 and 2011.

The Tiger Cup is presented each season by the Tiger Athletic Foundation as part of the annual TAF Academic Excellence Gala to the athletic program that best represents the University with its performance on and off the field. The winner of the Tiger Cup is determined using a point system based on a team's final conference and national ranking, cumulative team grade-point average and community service hours accumulated during the previous academic year.

Winning conference titles and leading a nationally prominent program are nothing new for the native of Cheltenham, England, who led the Furman Lady Paladins to six Southern Conference Championships and four NCAA Tournament appearances during his 11-year tenure after starting the program from scratch in 1994.

In 11 seasons, Lee's teams amassed a 144-80-10 overall record, including an impressive 76-16-3 mark in conference play. The Lady Paladins went undefeated in conference play three times (1999, 2000, 2002) and were just shy of perfection in 2003 after finishing the season with a 10-0-1 record in Southern Conference play.

Individually, Lee has coached five athletes to All-America honors and six athletes to Freshman All-America honors in 17 seasons as a head coach. In addition, he has coached four SoCon Players of the Year, five SoCon Freshmen of the Year and two SEC Players of the Year, while guiding his athletes to a total of 74 all-conference selections since his first season as a head coach in 1994.

Also a proven recruiter, Lee produced four Top 50 recruiting classes in his last five seasons at Furman, including the nation's 12th-ranked signing class in 2002. That tradition continued with his arrival at LSU as he landed the program's first ever Top 50 recruiting class in the spring of 2005. Lee followed that effort by signing the top-ranked class in the SEC and the seventh-ranked class in the NCAA in 2006, as well as the No. 1 class among SEC West teams for the second-straight season. It marked LSU's first Top 10 recruiting class in program history.

And the future remains bright for years to come as Lee recruited yet another Top 10 class in the country with the Class of 2010. The Tigers welcomed five TopDrawerSoccer.com Top 100 players in the country to campus in 2010, as well as four of the Top 15 prep players in the state of Texas, and the No. 1 recruit from Florida, South Carolina and Louisiana.

Lee's athletes have proven to be just as successful in the classroom as his teams have earned five NSCAA Team Academic Awards. A total of 122 student-athletes were selected to the Southern Conference Academic Honor Roll in his 11 years at Furman, while 59 Tigers have been named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll over the last six years.

For his many accomplishments, Lee was named the Southern Conference Coach of the Year five times and was named the NSCAA and Soccer Buzz Southeast Region Coach of the Year in 1999, the same year in which he was selected as a finalist for the NSCAA National Coach of the Year Award. In addition to his experience coaching at the collegiate level, Lee served on the staff of the Region III Olympic Development Program Team from 1999-2008, while reaching the rank of assistant coach of the Region III ODP Team in 2006.

A successful athlete in his own right, Lee earned four letters with the Furman men's soccer team from 1989-92 where he was an integral part of three Southern Conference titles and was voted team captain and selected as the team's Most Valuable Player as a senior. He also led his team to its first ever NCAA Tournament appearance and a berth in the Sweet 16 in 1991.

Lee, 38, graduated from Furman in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in political science. He and his wife, the former Nancy Repsher of Westboro, Mass., and also a 1993 graduate of Furman, have two children - Aidan, 8, and Abby, 6.

COACH LEE ON HENSLEY:

Her passion for the sport is unmatched by anyone I've ever worked with."

There is no doubt that in order for a program to take the next step and compete for championships year in and year out, it must have an outstanding coaching staff in place to guide the way. In six seasons as a member of Brian Lee's staff at LSU, Debbie Hensley has more than proven herself as one of the top assistant coaches in the country in leading the Tigers to national prominence as one of the premier programs in the Southeastern Conference.

It is for that reason that Hensley was promoted to the rank of associate head coach before the start of the 2008 campaign as she now enters her seventh season at LSU.

Adding Hensley to his staff was an easy decision for Lee when he took the head coaching job in December 2004 as the two coached together at Furman for three years.

"We certainly would not enjoy the kind of success we do now without the leadership that Debbie brings to this coaching staff," Lee said. "She is an outstanding leader of young women, and she has helped us attract many of the best players in the country to LSU with her tremendous recruiting ability. Her passion for the sport is unmatched by anyone I've ever worked with."

That passion has certainly paid dividends on the field as Hensley has helped build LSU into the championship program it is today. The Tigers enter the 2011 season as winners of the SEC Western Division championship in three of the last four seasons, while making three-straight trips to the NCAA Tournament in 2007, 2008 and 2009. The Tigers enjoyed a record-breaking 2009 season in which they finished in second place in the final SEC standings for the second year in a row, while matching a school record for wins with a 15-4-5 overall record and establishing a new school record with an 8-2-1 mark and 25 points in conference play.

In 2010, the Tigers advanced to the SEC Tournament semifinal for the fourth season in a row as they join five-time defending SEC champion Florida as the only programs in the league to advance to the semifinal round of the conference tourney in each season since 2007.

Hensley has been a driving force in that success as she has established a reputation as one of the nation's top recruiters attracting many of the best players in the country to Baton Rouge.

She led the way in LSU signing its first ever Top 25 recruiting class in 2005 as the Tigers were ranked No. 25 on the recruiting trail that year. Hensley followed that effort in 2006 by helping Lee to sign the first Top 10 recruiting class in the history of the LSU soccer program with a crop of future stars ranked No. 7 nationally in the Soccer Buzz Magazine recruiting rankings.

The Class of 2006 is the most decorated class in the history of the LSU soccer program as it completed its eligibility in 2009 with a class record of 50 wins in four seasons from 2006-09. The group captured three SEC West titles, earned three NCAA Tournament selections, placed No. 2 in the final SEC standings twice and combined for 10 All-America and 12 All-SEC picks in four seasons in Baton Rouge.

And the future of the program remains bright for years to come as the Tigers welcomed another Top 10 recruiting class to campus in 2010. Hensley helped recruit a 10-member Class of 2010 that included five TopDrawerSoccer.com Top 100 players in the country, four of the Top 15 players in Texas, and the No. 1-ranked recruit from Florida, South Carolina and Louisiana. This talented sophomore class is sure to provide the foundation of LSU's success for the three seasons.

"There's no doubt that recruiting is the lifeblood of any program at this level, and we are certainly fortunate to have someone like Debbie leading our recruiting efforts," Lee said. "She is an outstanding evaluator of talent and has the ability to target the players we feel can thrive in our program both on and off the field. That's been a key in building the foundation we have now."

Hensley compiled a 60-52-9 record in six years at Western Carolina after starting the program from scratch prior to the 1999 season. She led the Catamounts to a 10-9-1 record and a Southern Conference Tournament appearance in her inaugural season and was named the SoCon Coach of the Year in 2001 after guiding the team to the Southern Conference regular season title with a 16-6 overall record and 8-2 mark in league play.

Hensley coached seven players to 11 All-Southern Conference honors in her time at Western Carolina, a total that includes three first-team selections. In addition to her duties as head coach of the program, Hensley also served as university's Assistant Athletics Director and Senior Woman Administrator.

Prior to her stint at WCU, Hensley spent three seasons as an assistant coach under Lee at Furman where she recruited eight players who earned all-conference accolades in their careers. Along with her coaching achievements, Hensley garnered recognition during her athletic career as a soccer and softball standout at Georgia Southern where she was a three-time first-team All-SoCon selection and led the conference in scoring as both a junior and a senior.

Hensley was selected to play in the Umbro Select College All-Star Classic after being named an NSCAA Regional All-American and All-Region honoree in 1995, and she was named the Georgia Female College Athlete of the Year by the Georgia Hall of Fame the same year.

The two-sport standout was also a first-team all-conference selection in softball as she set the Georgia Southern career record for stolen bases and runs scored. She graduated with a bachelor's degree in education from Georgia Southern in 1996 and a master's degree in health and exercise science from Furman in 1998.

With just over a month remaining before the start of the 2010 regular season, head coach Brian Lee hit a "home run" when he announced the hiring of former College of Charleston women's soccer head coach Kevin Dempsey to complete the Tigers' coaching staff before the start of the fall season.

It was an addition that paid immediate dividends for the Tigers as Dempsey coached the premier defensive unit in program history as they matched a program record for fewest goals allowed in a season with 16 and nearly set a school record with a 0.72 goals against average in 21 matches in 2010. In fact, the Tigers finished the season tied for the No. 1 spot in the SEC in goals allowed and wrapped up the season ranked No. 2 for goals against average among the league's 12 programs with their performance.

As the primary coach of LSU's defensive back line, Dempsey was instrumental in Canadian international Allysha Chapman earning her first career First-Team All-SEC selection as one of the leading defenders in the Southeastern Conference.

Dempsey has also proven his worth as a lead recruiter for the Tigers since arriving in July 2010 as he seeks to bring a national and international flavor to Baton Rouge. He is widely respected for his ability to not only identify and evaluate elite talent, but also to attract many of the premier youth players from the United States and around the world to Baton Rouge.

Dempsey joined the LSU program following an outstanding nine-year stint as the head coach at the College of Charleston, where he led the Cougars to an 86-70-22 overall record and a 54-32-8 mark in Southern Conference play since 2001. That included an overall record of 24-12-6 in his final two seasons.

He teams with Lee and associate head coach Debbie Hensley to form the core of an outstanding coaching staff with a combined 32 years of head coaching experience at the NCAA Division I level. Lee has been a head coach at the NCAA Division I level for the past 17 seasons, while Hensley was the coach at Western Carolina for six seasons before joining Lee's staff at LSU.

"I'm really appreciative to Brian for the opportunity to join the staff at LSU. He and Debbie have done an amazing job of transforming LSU into one of the elite programs in the country, and I just want to help them continue in that tradition and win a SEC championship," Dempsey said.

"We had a fantastic nine years at CofC. It's never easy to leave a place that you love. We appreciate all of the support we've received over the years, from our fans and players to our staff and administration. The program is in a much better position today than when we arrived. I am proud of that."

The Cougars flourished in nine seasons under Dempsey's direction as they reached the postseason in each with nine appearances in the SoCon Tournament, including runner-up finishes in 2002 and 2009. The side earned 28 All-SoCon and All-SoCon Tournament selections under Dempsey.

The Cougars were also outstanding in the classroom during Dempsey's tenure while winning the NSCAA Team Academic Award in each of his nine seasons while posting a team GPA of 3.0 or higher. In addition, six Cougars were named NSCAA All-Region Scholar Athletes in his final two seasons at the College of Charleston, demonstrating his commitment to success both on and off the pitch.

"We are excited that Kevin has brought his experience with him to LSU," Lee said. "He's already had a positive impact on our team and this community in the short time he has been in Baton Rouge. I approach the staff just like the team with a goal to go out and recruit the best. I think this has been a home run hire for our program. With Kevin joining Debbie (Hensley) and the rest of our staff, we've assembled a staff that will continue to recruit and develop the best players and people in all of college soccer."

Dempsey boasts 16 years of head coaching experience at the collegiate level during which he compiled an overall record of 166-116-29 since 1994. Prior to his appointment at the College of Charleston, Dempsey served as the head coach of the women's program at Catawba College of NCAA Division II for seven seasons from 1994-2000 while compiling an overall record of 80-46-7, including a 34-13-3 mark in the South Atlantic Conference.

After helping the Indians win South Atlantic Conference regular season and tournament titles as an assistant coach in 1993, the team captured four SAC Tournament titles in his seven seasons as a head coach in 1994, 1997, 1998 and 1999. He also led Catawba College to the NCAA Division II Southeast Region Championship in 1997 before earning its place in the national quarterfinals of the NCAA Division II Women's Soccer Tournament that same year.

In all, Dempsey coached 10 NCAA Division II All-Americans, 17 All-South Region selections, four SAC Players of the Year and four SAC Freshmen of the Year during his seven-year tenure while the head coach at Catawba College.

In addition to his experience as a head coach at the collegiate level, Dempsey also served as head coach of the Under-15 Region III Olympic Development Program Team for seven years from 2003-09

Dempsey graduated from Catawba College in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in history. He and his wife, Krista, have a 6-year-old son named Jack.

Prior to the start of the 2010 season, LSU soccer head coach Brian Lee announced the addition of Premier Development League veteran Brandon Gwin as a volunteer assistant coach with his staff to assist with the development of LSU's talented group of goalkeepers.

Under Gwin's direction, freshman Megan Kinneman enjoyed one of the most prolific seasons in goal for the Tigers in program history as she made 14 starts with six shutouts while setting a new LSU single-season record with a 0.66 goals against average. That performance earned Kinneman a selection to the SEC All-Freshman Team following the 2010 regular season.


In fact, the Tigers pitched nine shutouts in 21 matches during the 2010 season as junior Mo Isom added three shutouts in seven starts with a 0.83 goals against average of her own. "We have two outstanding goalkeepers on our roster with Mo Isom and Megan Kinneman ready to compete for us this season, and we know that Brandon will help them reach their full potential. Megan emerged for us last year as one of the top young goalkeepers in college soccer, and we are certainly excited with the work that Brandon has done in developing our talent at the position."



Youthful Tigers Lay Foundation for Future Success

Despite seeing its run of three-straight SEC Western Division championships and NCAA Tournament appearances come to an end in 2010, a youthful LSU soccer team continued to lay the foundation for future success while competing with perhaps the youngest roster in the Southeastern Conference. While advancing to the SEC Tournament semifinal for the fourth-straight season, the Tigers ended the year with an 8-8-5 overall record and a 4-4-3 mark with 15 points in conference play against the strongest schedule in program history. The 2010 schedule featured a school record nine matches against NCAA Tournament teams with LSU posting a 1-6-2 mark in those matches. The Tigers also played a record nine matches against nationally-ranked opponents in 2010.

LSU Advances to SEC Tournament Semifinal for Fourth-Straight Season

After defeating No. 3-seed Tennessee in overtime by a score of 1-0 in the opening round, the No. 6-seeded Tigers earned a berth in the semifinal round of the SEC Women's Soccer Tournament for the fourth-straight season. That's where LSU's 2010 season came to a heartbreaking end as it suffered a 4-3 defeat in penalty kicks after battling the No. 16-ranked and No. 2-seeded South Carolina Gamecocks to a 1-1 draw in regulation. With their run to the SEC Tournament semifinal, the Tigers joined Florida as the only teams in the league to qualify for the conference semifinal in each of the last four seasons dating back to 2007. LSU finished in the top half of the final SEC standings for the fourth-straight season with its sixth-place finish in 2010. The Tigers also earned a fourth-place finish in 2007 before back-to-back second-place finishes in the SEC standings in 2008 and 2009.

Tigers Run Home Unbeaten Streak to 15-Straight Games

The Tigers continued their home dominance while finishing the 2010 season with a 6-2-1 record in a total of nine games played at the LSU Soccer Complex. Since its emergence into the national spotlight over the last four seasons, LSU is an impressive 26-4-6 with a .805 winning percentage on its home turf since 2007. That includes an impressive 15-game home unbeaten streak as the Tigers posted an 11-0-4 mark from a 3-0 shutout of Southern Miss on Aug. 28, 2009, through a 1-0 double overtime win over Kentucky on Oct. 8 of the 2010 season. That is the second-longest home unbeaten streak in team history as the Tigers were unbeaten for 18-straight games at the LSU Soccer Complex for more than two years from Oct. 13, 2006, to Oct. 26, 2008.

Chapman is Latest Tiger Named First-Team All-SEC

Junior defender Allysha Chapman was honored for her performance during the 2010 season with a First-Team All-SEC selection prior to the start of the 2010 SEC Women's Soccer Tournament in early November. Chapman picked up her second career All-SEC award after receiving a second-team selection in her first season with the program in 2009. A native of Courtice, Ontario, Canada, Chapman became the fourth different Tiger to earn First-Team All-SEC recognition in six seasons under head coach Brian Lee, joining the great Malorie Rutledge (2007, 2008, 2009), Michelle Makasini (2007) and Chelsea Potts (2009). Chapman anchored what might be the best defensive unit in team history as the Tigers tied a program history for fewest goals allowed in a season with 16. The Tigers also nearly set a new team single-season record with a 0.72 goals against average in 21 matches.

LSU's Canadian Connection Leads Tigers in 2010 Campaign

While Chapman was honored with a First-Team All-SEC selection in 2010, fellow Canadians Taryne Boudreau and Natalie Martineau emerged as team leaders for the Tigers with their performance a year ago. Boudreau joined Chapman as a member of LSU's back line, which proved to be one of the SEC's elite defensive units in 2010. The Tigers matched a program record for fewest goals allowed in a single season with 16, while they also nearly set a new team single-season record with a 0.72 goals against average that ranked No. 1 in the SEC for the 2010 season. With Boudreau and Chapman leading the way on the defensive end, Martineau set the pace on the offensive end of the field as she finished the season as the team's leading goal scorer with five goals and 11 points on the year. Each is sure to provide the foundation for another successful season for the Tigers this fall.

Eggleston, Kinneman Named to SEC All-Freshman Team

Two members of LSU's highly-touted freshman class were also honored for their performance during the 2010 season as striker Addie Eggleston and goalkeeper Megan Kinneman were each named to the SEC All-Freshman Team. Eggleston wrapped up her rookie campaign as the team's leading point scorer as she scored three goals and dished out a team-high eight assists for 14 points from her position on the front line. Kinneman started the last 14 games of the season in goal for the Tigers as she emerged as one of the top young goalkeepers in the country while pitching six shutouts and recording a 0.66 goals against average in 1,362 minutes of action last fall. She finished the 2010 season with a 6-4-4 mark during her rookie campaign.

Kinneman Sets Records in Goal in Breakout Freshman Season

Kinneman, a native of Missouri City, Texas, quickly gained a reputation as one of the SEC's elite goalkeepers with her awareness and shot-stopping ability between the posts. In 14 starts for the Tigers, Kinneman allowed just 10 goals in nearly 1,362 minutes of play for a goals against average of 0.66. That CAA set a new LSU single season record and ranked No. 1 among all goalkeepers in the SEC for the 2010 season. What's even more impressive is that five of her six shutouts came against SEC opponents, including a 0-0 draw with Alabama on Oct. 1, a 1-0 double overtime win against Kentucky on Oct. 8, a 0-0 draw with Ole Miss on Oct. 15, a 1-0 shutout of Arkansas on Oct. 29 and a 1-0 overtime win against Tennessee in the first round of the SEC Tournament on Nov. 4.

LSU Soccer Earns Fourth-Straight Win in Auburn Derby

With a pair of goals scored by juniors Natalie Martīneau and Kellie Murphy and a stout defensive effort throughout the match, LSU won its fourth-straight match against arch-rival Auburn with a thrilling 2-1 victory on Oct. 3, 2010, at the LSU Soccer Complex. That signature victory of the 2010 season also ran LSU's home unbeaten streak to 14-straight games. LSU's four-game winning streak over Auburn also includes a 2-1 overtime win in Baton Rouge on Oct. 10, 2008, a 2-0 shutout in Auburn on Oct. 4, 2009, and a 1-0 shutout in the SEC Tournament semifinal in Orange Beach, Ala., on Nov. 6, 2009, en route to a first appearance in the SEC Tournament final.

Chapman Named National Primetime Performer of the Week

In leading a defensive effort that posted a 0-0 shutout on the road against 10th-ranked BYU in Provo, Utah, on Sept. 9 and a 1-0 shutout at home against in-state rival Louisiana-Lafayette in Baton Rouge on Sept. 12, junior All-SEC performer Allysha Chapman was named the SEC Defensive Player of the Week and a CollegeSoccar360.com Primetime Performer of the Week on Sept. 14 on the strength of her performance as a member of LSU's back line. Chapman is the third LSU Tiger in the last two seasons to be named one of the CollegeSoccar360.com Primetime Performer of the Week as she joins striker Carlie Banks and goalkeeper Mo Isom in 2009.

Eggleston Shines in Collegiate Debut in 2010 Opener

In her collegiate debut on Aug. 22, 2010, freshman striker Addie Eggleston scored two goals and dished out three assists to lead the 20th-ranked Tigers to a dominating 8-0 shutout of the South Alabama Jaguars in its season opener at the LSU Soccer Complex. It only took Eggleston a little more than 16 minutes to match the LSU school record for assists in a single game as she made the final pass on each of LSU's first three goals to open the game. She also scored the first two goals of her career in the 51st and 72nd minutes in the second half. That performance earned Eggleston an SEC Freshman of the Week accolade and a selection to the TopDrawerSoccer.com Women's College Team of the Week the following week.

Tigers Receive Top 20 Preseason Ranking for 2010

LSU received a preseason national ranking in the Soccer Times Top 25 for the second year in a row as the Tigers were tabbed the No. 20-ranked team in the country prior to the start of the 2010 season. The Tigers were also ranked No. 25 in the country by Soccer Times to start the 2009 campaign. LSU climbed to as high as No. 18 in the national rankings during the 2010 season following its 8-0 shutout of South Alabama in its season opener, running its streak to 10-straight weeks with a Top 20 national ranking. The Tigers then dropped to No. 23 in the Soccer Times Top 25 following a 1-0 road defeat to the Memphis Tigers on Aug. 28. LSU's streak of earning a national ranking in at least one major poll came to an end at 11-straight weeks early in 2010.

Tigers Battle Nation's Elite in Challenging 2011 Spring Season

The Tigers certainly matured through a 2011 spring season that featured one of the more challenging schedules in the country with matches against perennial powers from the ACC and Big 12 conferences. The Tigers wrapped up the spring campaign with a 3-2-1 overall mark, highlighted by a 1-0 shutout of the powerhouse Texas Longhorns in Houston on March 26. LSU also played to within a goal of two programs that advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight during the 2010 NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament in yearly powers Florida State and Oklahoma State as the Tigers are poised to challenge for the SEC championship this fall.

LSU Soccer Complex Receives Facelift in Offseason

After breaking ground on the long-awaited renovations to the LSU Soccer Complex in March, the facility will offer fans a gameday experience like never before as the home of the Tigers has been transformed with additional seating and new lighting, as well as the building of new concession stands, press box and restrooms. By adding a second level of bleacher seating to the existing structure, the official capacity of the new-look LSU Soccer Complex will increase to 2,197, easily accommodating a fanbase that has created one of the more intimidating home-field advantages in the SEC. In addition, new entry gates have been built on the west side of the complex, featuring brick columns throughout. Fans will also enjoy a new permanent concession stand built directly below the press box.

Tigers Win Third-Straight Tiger Cup at Academic Gala

The Tiger Athletic Foundation hosts its Academic Excellence Gala each year to honor LSU's student-athletes who pursue excellence on and off the field, and for the third year in a row, the LSU soccer program was honored as the recipient of the prestigious Tiger Cup for its performance on the field, in the classroom and in the community. The 2011 TAF Academic Excellence Gala was held on Feb. 14 at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center. The recipient of the Tiger Cup is determined by combining a team's final conference and national ranking with its performance on the field, along with its cumulative team grade-point average and community service hours off the field during the previous academic year. Members of the LSU soccer team racked up more than 735 community service hours to rank No. 1 among all athletic programs at LSU, as well as a 3.085 cumulative team GPA for the previous academic season.

Tigers Recognized for Academic Performance in 2010

While leading the LSU soccer team on the field throughout the 2010 season, the duo of senior Courtney Alexander and sophomore Carlie Banks were also honored for their performance in the classroom with their selection to the 2010 ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District VI Second-Team by the College Sports Information Directors of America. Alexander maintained a 3.74 grade-point average during her collegiate career as she graduated with her degree in kinesiology. Banks has maintained an impressive 3.70 cumulative GPA as she is also pursuing a degree in kinesiology at LSU. The duo were also among nine Tigers to be named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll in 2010, including Allysha Chapman, Natalie leyoub, Mo Isom, Hannah Jobe, Kellie Murphy, Amy Porter and Alex Ramsey.


