A member of the LSU Sports Information Department will take interview requests during the second half of each game. Game information, including halftime and final game statistics, will be provided in the press box.

LSU SOCCER ON THE SEC NETWORK

The Southeastern Conference and ESPN recently signed a 20-year agreement through 2034 to create a multi-platform SEC Network which launched in August 2014. The SEC Network and its accompanying digital platform will air SEC content 24/7, including more than 1,000 events in its first year. Among those are two LSU Soccer matches during the 2014 season as the Tigers will play host to Arkansas on Sept. 28 and Alabama on Oct. 9 in a pair of home matches at the LSU Soccer Stadium that will be featured on the SEC Network.

In addition, LSU's road match at Georgia on Oct. 19 will air on ESPN, with additional home matches against Texas A&M on Sept. 26, Kentucky on Oct. 24, Florida on Oct. 26 and Auburn on Oct. 30 featuring on the SEC Digital Network platform that includes ESPN3.com and the "Watch SEC on ESPN" app on the internet and on all smart phones and tablets.

In 2012, the LSU Soccer program was awarded the Tiger Cup for the fourth year in a row by the Tiger Athletic Foundation for its outstanding community service efforts.



LSU SOCCER'S TIGER CUP STREAK SNAPPED IN 2013

Members of the LSU Soccer program were honored for the fourth-straight season as the team most deserving of the prestigious Tiger Cup with their performance on the field, in the classroom and in the community during the annual Tiger Athletic Foundation Academic Excellence Gala held in the spring of 2012.

The 2012 TAF Academic Excellence Gala was held at the Royal Cotillion Ballroom at the LSU Student Union as members from each of LSU's 19 varsity sports were honored during the festivities.

It marked the fourth-straight year in which members of the LSU Soccer program were named as the winners of the Tiger Cup after also receiving the award in 2009, 2010 and 2011.

In 2011, the Tigers captured their fourth SEC Western Division championship and fourth at-large berth into the NCAA Tournament in five seasons while

posting a 13-8-1 overall record with an 8-3 mark and 24 points in conference play. The Tigers earned a second-place finish in the final SEC team standings as the runner-up for the SEC Championship for the third time in four seasons.

In addition to their success on the field in 2011, members of the LSU Soccer program logged 568 hours of community service to rank No. 2 among all men's and women's athletic programs at LSU, which equals an average of 23.5 community service hours completed per player. The Tigers also maintained an impressive 3.173 cumulative team GPA for the 2011 spring and fall semesters.

LSU Soccer saw its run of winning four-straight Tiger Cups snapped in 2013 when the TAF Academic Excellence Gala was held at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center on the night of March 11.

WHAT IS THE TIGER CUP?

The Tiger Cup is an award presented by the Tiger Athletic Foundation each year to the athletic program at LSU that best represents the University in competition, in the classroom and in the community. The recipient of the Tiger Cup is determined by combining a team's final conference and national ranking with its performance on the field along with its cumulative team grade-point average and community service hours accumulated off the field during the previous academic year.

In order for student-athletes to be truly prepared for their careers, it is the goal of the Student Affairs and the Shaquille O'Neal Life Skills Program to ensure that each student-athlete will leave LSU with a professional resume, cover letter and interview experience. The program has three phases: career preparation, the "job project" and a career symposium. Many LSU student-athletes gain experience with career-developing jobs in the community during the summer months.

How can CHAMPS help?

The CHAMPS (Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success)/Life Skills program was developed by the NCAA to help prepare student-athletes for the challenges of life beyond the playing field. By focusing on "real life" skills and personal development, the CHAMPS program not only assists student-athletes with meeting daily challenges, but also enhances their growth in college years and beyond.

Health/Wellness

The goal of the Health & Wellness component of the Student Affairs division is to inform and educate student-athletes about the various health and wellness related issues that they will encounter throughout their tenure at LSU and beyond.

Diversity, Inclusion & Civic Engagement

The Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes strives to celebrate, highlight, affirm and embrace the diversity of LSU student-athletes. They provide an environment that is respectful of cultural, racial and ethnic differences by acknowledging their individuality and uniqueness. In addition, the programs emphasize the importance of giving back and citizenship by engaging in the University and surrounding community.

LSU student-athletes participate in a variety of community service projects including reading in schools, nursing home visits, hospital pediatric ward visits and speaking engagements.

The New LSU SOCCER STADIUM

The LSU Soccer Stadium has earned a reputation as being one of the more intimidating venues for an opposing team to compete in all of college soccer. That is evident in the fact that the Tigers boast a strong 42-13-12 home record with an impressive .716 winning percentage over the last seven seasons. LSU has entered a new era of SEC soccer after winning four SEC Western Division titles with four NCAA Tournament appearances since 2007. Divisions were eliminated for the 2012 season as it marked the first season in which teams competed as one unified SEC table.

On the strength of its recent success, the LSU Soccer Stadium has received extensive renovations in recent years as the program continues its ascent to the pinnacle of the SEC and the NCAA. The venue is now a home worthy of an emerging power in women's college soccer.

In March 2011, construction teams broke ground on Phase 2 of the renovation as \$2.3 million was invested to transform the facility while creating additional seating, installing new lighting and building a new press box for the media and concession stand and restrooms for the LSU supporters to enjoy.

By adding a second level of bleacher seating to the existing structure, the official capacity of the new-look LSU Soccer Stadium has increased to 2,197, easily accommodating a fanbase that has created one of the more intimidating home-field advantages in the SEC. In addition, new gates have been built on the west side of the complex with brick columns throughout. New gating has also been installed at the top of the bleachers.

Fans attending matches at the LSU Soccer Stadium will also benefit from the addition

of the permanent concession stand located directly below the press box. With the building of two new restrooms at the facility, it now features a total of four as men's and women's facilities are located at both ends of the stadium.

Members of the media also enjoy a brand new press box that has been constructed to make the covering of future matches a state-of-the-art experience. Not only has the size of the press box interior increased to 333 square feet, but hard-wired internet has been installed across the work space along with a wireless internet signal that has already been accessible in recent seasons. In addition, television cameras and videographers have access to the newly-installed crow's nest on the roof of the press box in a space that also features wired internet access.

The Tigers have been nearly unbeatable at the LSU Soccer Stadium under the direction of head coach Brian Lee as they enter the fall with a 48-15-14 home mark since 2006. The squad has only dropped 13 decisions at home in the last seven seasons as it followed an unbeaten 5-0-3 home slate in 2007 with an impressive 8-1 campaign in 2008, a 7-1-2 season in 2009, a 6-2-1 mark in 2010 and a stellar 7-1-1 season in 2011. They have logged a 5-5-3 home campaign in 2012 before a 4-3-2 mark a year ago.

In fact, LSU's home dominance is highlighted by a school record 18-game home unbeaten streak that came to an end on Oct. 26, 2008, with a 2-1 defeat to the No. 6-ranked Florida Gators.

2014 marks the 19th season in the life of the LSU Soccer Stadium, which was first opened on Sept. 13, 1996, when the Tigers hosted SEC rival Tennessee.

A new era was born in 2011 with the grand re-opening of the LSU Soccer Stadium as the Tigers set the attendance record on Sept. 9 when 2,542 supporters witnessed a 1-0 blanking of the Oregon Ducks to open the LSU Invitational. That smashed the previous attendance mark of 2,402 fans that saw the Tigers pitch a 3-0 shutout

of No. 6-ranked Tennessee for the team's first win over an opponent ranked among the Top 10 teams in the nation.

The Tigers then raised the bar again in their home opener two seasons ago when a new record of 2,624 fans turned out to witness the Tigers play visiting Rice to a 1-1 draw on Aug. 24, 2012.

In fact, the Tigers set the all-time attendance record three times during the 2007 season and finished the campaign ranked No. 10 nationally in average attendance and No. 7 in the country in average paid attendance while drawing 1,294 fans per match. LSU nearly matched that record when finishing the 2011 campaign ranked No. 17 in the nation with an average attendance of 1,174 fans in its nine matches at the LSU Soccer Stadium.

The program made history again in 2009 as the Tigers were awarded a No. 4 national seed in the NCAA Tournament and the former LSU Soccer Complex was selected as a regional host site of the NCAA First and Second Rounds for the first time, solidifying its reputation as one of the most intimidating venues in all of college soccer.





The LSU Soccer Stadium boasts a modern and spacious locker room that includes locker rooms for the Tigers, as well as facilities for opponents and game officials. The venue also provides an on-site training room, a meeting room and lounge for the team and offices for the LSU coaching staff.



LOCKER ROOM RENOVATIONS

The locker room facility at the LSU Soccer Stadium recently underwent an extensive \$200,000 renovation project that included the addition of a brand new visitor's locker room on the south end of the facility. The former visitor's locker room was expanded to 2,000 square feet and converted into a state-of-the-art squad room and lounge for the Tigers to enjoy. The facility underwent further renovations in the spring of 2007 as the LSU Athletic Department invested \$250,000 into a total reconstruction of the facility's playing surface. The field was flattened and covered with a hybrid Bermuda grass called Mississippi Choice similar to the sand-based playing surface in Tiger Stadium. It also features a brand new drainage and irrigation system to keep the field in pristine condition year round.



Indoor Practice FACILITY

When the weather prevents the team from practicing at the LSU Soccer Stadium, the squad moves inside to the climate-controlled indoor football practice facility. The indoor facility was built as part of a \$15 million upgrade in the early 1990s and houses a 100-yard football field that was renovated with brand new Momentum Field Turf in the spring of 2006.



Athletic TRAINING

Nutrition First

LSU is one of the few schools nationally that maintains a state-of-the-art nutritional program for today's student-athlete. Senior Associate Athletic Trainer Shelly Mullenix coordinates with LSU dining services to provide a balanced training table diet. LSU athletic trainers also meet one-on-one with student-athletes to give them expert nutritional information.

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facilities in all of collegiate athletics with both the Operations Center and the Broussard Center for Athletic Training in Tiger Stadium. Both are furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. The Operations Center training room features a full view of the practice fields, two hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill. The Broussard Center includes an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy and a hydrotherapy pool. It is also one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, vision center and dental center.



Hydrotherapy Treatment

An integral part of rehabbing and developing LSU student-athletes is the operations center's hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill in a fully-equipped Hydrotherapy room. The Broussard Training Center boasts the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports.

Broussard Athletic TRAINING CENTER



The two-story, 22,000-square-foot facility contains 20 treatment tables with the newest forms of modalities available, 14 taping stations, a 1,600-square-foot rehabilitation area which contains the latest rehabilitation equipment including the Cybex Norm, Woodway treadmills and Body Master select rise equipment. LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard (left), the legendary trainer whose career spanned more than 40 years at LSU.



Road To Recovery

LSU is one of the top schools in the nation to get its student-athletes back on the field in a timely manner following an injury. The athletic training staff takes a progressive approach to injury identification and thinks "outside of the box." LSU consults with allied health professionals and uses state-of-the-art surgical procedures that give an athlete a quicker recovery time while looking out for his or her future.



Dental Center

A fully functional dental center, staffed by Dr. Robin Levy and Dr. John Vance, is located inside the Broussard Center for Athletic Training.



Rehabilitation

LSU's Broussard Center for Athletic Training boasts some of the most technologically advanced equipment to aid the recuperation and rehabilitation of LSU's student-athletes.



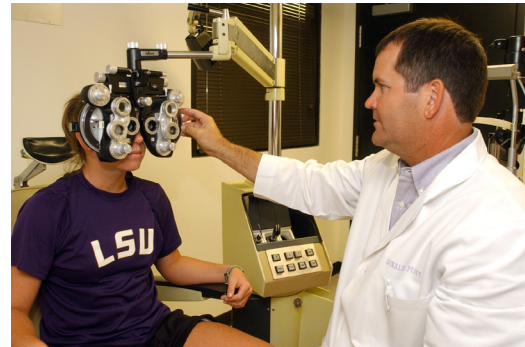
Real-Time X-Rays

A new state-of-the-art fluoroscope was added in the summer of 2008 that will provide LSU athletic trainers the opportunity to take x-rays on site in the Operations Center. The machine can provide real-time images of the internal structures of a patient.

The Operations Center houses one of the most complete strength training facilities in the nation. Completed in 2006, the weight room area includes 16 multi-purpose platform, bench, incline, squat and Olympic lifting stations, along with 12 dumbbell bench stations.

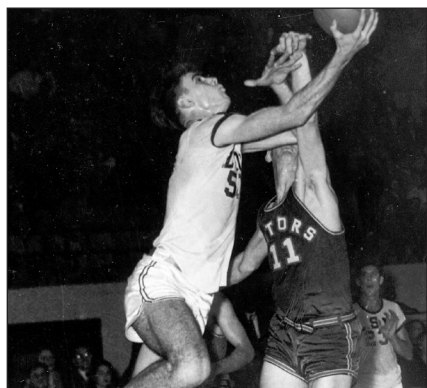

GREATS

The following nine individuals are the only athletes to have their jerseys retired by LSU. Men's basketball has retired the No. 23 for Pete Maravich, No. 50 for Bob Pettit, Jr., No. 33 for Shaquille O'Neal and No. 40 for Rudy Macklin. Women's basketball retired the No. 33 for Seimone Augustus. Football's only two retired jerseys are the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon and the No. 37 worn by Tommy Casanova. Baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of longtime coach and former athletics director Skip Bertman and the No. 19 for Ben McDonald. Casanova, Macklin and McDonald joined the prestigious list in May 2009. Augustus became the first woman in LSU Athletics history to have her jersey retired in January 2010.



50 Bob Pettit

Pettit led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and he later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-plus point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame, and in 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



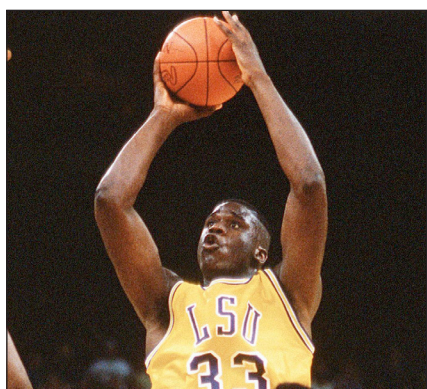
23 Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete," Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points a game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50-plus points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.



20 Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Billy Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss, 3-0, in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for a touchdown in a 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



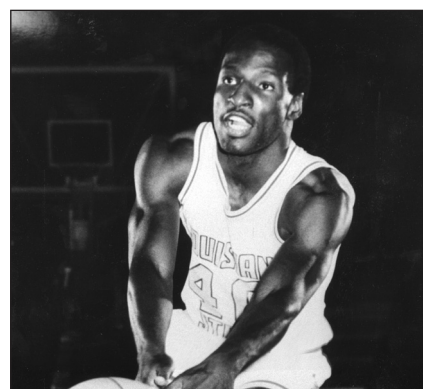
33 Shaquille O'Neal

Shaquille O'Neal was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the top 50 players in NBA history.



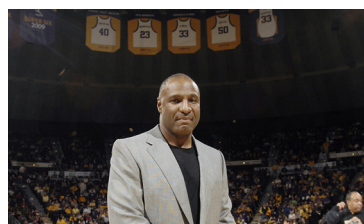
15 Skip Bertman

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Skip Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also coached the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, Korea, in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and served as LSU's athletics director for seven years. Bertman was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006.



40 Rudy Macklin

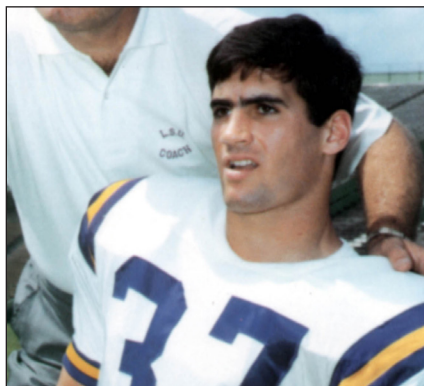
Rudy Macklin was a two-time basketball All-American selection during his Tiger career from 1976-81 during which time he became LSU's all-time leading rebounder with 1,276 boards and the second-leading scorer in school history behind only the legendary Pete Maravich with 2,080 points. He led the Tigers to two Elite Eight appearances and the 1981 Final Four in Philadelphia. He still holds the school single game rebound record with 32, a mark that may never be broken.

About LSU Retired Jerseys

The retirement of the jerseys of Casanova, McDonald, Macklin and Augustus comes under a new provision of the LSU jersey retirement bylaws that says the retirement of an athlete's jersey in a particular sport does not preclude a current student-athlete in that sport from wearing the jersey number in that or any other sport, subject to the discretion of the head coach. This provision applies only to jerseys retired after January 1, 2007, so the numbers worn by Maravich, Pettit, O'Neal, Cannon and Bertman may never again be worn by future student-athletes in their respective sports. To have a jersey retired at LSU, an athlete must have completed intercollegiate competition for LSU a minimum of five years prior to nomination. Athletes must have demonstrated truly unusual and outstanding accomplishments, exceeding and in addition to all criteria used for Hall of Fame selection. Nominees must have a unanimous vote of support from the Hall of Fame committee.



37 Tommy Casanova

Tommy Casanova is the only three-time All-American in the history of LSU football and is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame. During his Tiger career from 1969-71, Casanova personified versatility for his myriad of talents as he played offense, defense, returned punts and kickoffs. One of just two three-time All-SEC performers at LSU, he played six seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals of the NFL while earning his medical degree.



19 Ben McDonald

Ben McDonald won the prestigious Golden Spikes Award in 1989, given annually to the nation's most outstanding player, and is a member of the College Baseball Hall of Fame. He led LSU to two College World Series appearances. In 1989, McDonald was named National Player of the Year by Baseball America, The Sporting News and Collegiate Baseball. He was selected by the Baltimore Orioles as the No. 1 pick in the major league draft in 1989 and went on to enjoy a 10-year major league career with the Orioles and the Milwaukee Brewers.



33 Seimone Augustus

Seimone Augustus is the only women's basketball player in school history to earn State Farm Coaches Association All-America honors three times: 2004, 2005 and 2006. Augustus became LSU's first NCAA National Player of the Year, and she claimed the honor twice in 2005 and 2006. A 2006 graduate of LSU, Augustus was the 2012 WNBA Finals MVP after winning a world title. She also led the United States to Olympic gold medals at the 2008 Beijing and 2012 London Games.

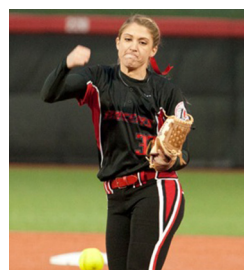

Shaquille O'Neal

A four-time NBA champion and 15-time All-Star, Shaquille O'Neal was one of the most dominant centers in NBA history. He announced his retirement from the NBA in June 2010 after a brilliant Hall of Fame career and has since become a television analyst on TNT. One of the most quotable figures on the planet, O'Neal earned his bachelor's degree from LSU in December 2000. In 2011, he penned his own biography, "Shaq Uncut, My Story," and then received his doctorate degree from Florida's Barry University in May 2012.

Lolo Jones

A three-time national champion hurdler at LSU, Lolo Jones continues to take the sporting world by storm. Jones became an inspirational figure as a two-time World Indoor Champion and the world record holder in the 60-meter hurdles with a time of 7.72. She competed in both the 2008 Beijing and 2012 London Olympic Games and became the first LSU athlete to ever grace the cover of Time Magazine in July 2012. A 2005 graduate of LSU, Jones is now a two-sport star. She was named to the U.S. National Bobsled Team that went on to claim gold at the 2013 FIBT World Championships and compete at the 2014 Winter Olympics in Sochi, Russia.

Eduardo Aguirre, Jr.

Named the first Director of U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) for the Department of Homeland Security in 2003, Aguirre, Jr., was the U.S. Ambassador to Spain from 2005 until 2009.



Lod Cook

Cook graduated from LSU with a bachelor's degree in mathematics in 1955 and then earned his Master's degree in petro engineering in 1955. Cook served as CEO of ARCO for nine years.



Seimone Augustus

A two-time NCAA Women's Basketball National Player of the Year, Augustus graduated from LSU in 2006. She is a two-time U.S. Olympic gold medalist and continues an All-Star pro career with the WNBA's Minnesota Lynx. She was named WNBA Finals MVP in 2012 after winning a WNBA title.



Carlos Roberto Flores

The president of Honduras from 1998-2002, Flores helped the nation recover after Hurricane Mitch devastated the country in 1998. Flores is married to the former Mary Carol Flake, also an alumnae of LSU.



James Carville

Carville received both a bachelor's degree and law degree from LSU and gained fame in the 1990s as the chief campaign strategist for Bill Clinton and Al Gore. Carville also penned a best-selling memoir titled "All's Fair: Love, War and Running for President."



Jim Flores

Flores graduated with two bachelor's of science degrees; one in corporate finance in 1981 and the second in petroleum land management in 1982. Flores serves as both chairman and CEO of Flores and Rucks, Inc., a publicly held independent oil and gas company.

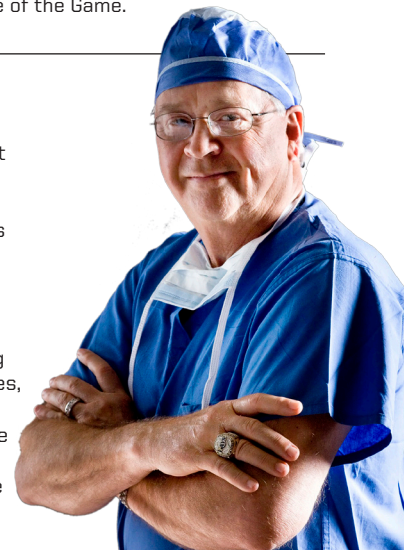


Mike Papajohn

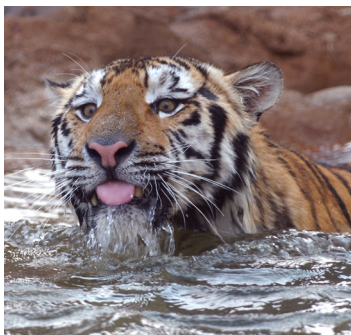
Suzanne Perron

On the Prowl

Mike the Tiger was recently ranked in the top three in a Bleacher Report poll of college football's top live mascots. Mike's habitat is one of the most visited attractions in the state of Louisiana located in the shadows of the north endzone of Tiger Stadium.



Mike THE TIGER

History of Mike

Few mascots in the country are as admired as Mike the Tiger. LSU's live Bengal mascot serves as the graphic image of all LSU athletic teams. The school has had six mascots, with the most recent, Mike VI, taking over the reign prior to the 2007 national championship football season.

LSU veterinarian Dr. David Baker began the search for the young tiger after his predecessor, Mike V, died in May 2007 of renal failure at the age of 17. The 9-year-old Bengal/Siberian mix, formerly known as "Roscoe," was donated to LSU by Great Cats of Indiana in Idaville, Indiana, a nonprofit sanctuary and rescue facility for big cats and other large carnivores.

Mike's ride through Tiger Stadium before home games in a travel trailer topped by the LSU cheerleaders is a school tradition. Before entering the stadium, his trailer on wheels is parked next to the opponent's locker room in the southeast end of the stadium. Opposing players must make their way past Mike's trailer to reach their locker room.

Tradition dictates that the Tigers will score a touchdown for every growl issued by Mike before a football game. For many years, Mike was prompted to roar by pounding on the cage. Objections of cruel punishment brought about the use of recorded growls

to play to the crowd before the games. That practice was discontinued shortly afterward and today Mike participates in the pregame tradition without provocation.

In the mid-1980's, pranksters cut the locks on Mike IV's cage and freed him in the early-morning hours just days before the annual LSU-Tulane clash. Mike roamed free, playfully knocking down several small pine trees in the area, before being trapped in the Bernie Moore Track Stadium where police used tranquilizer guns to capture and return the Bengal Tiger to his home.

The incident was reminiscent of a kidnapping of Mike I many years ago by Tulane students before a Tiger-Green Wave battle.

1936-1956

Mike I

The original Mike was purchased from the Little Rock Zoo in 1936 for \$750, with money contributed by the student body. Originally known as "Sheik" at the time of his purchase, his name was changed to Mike to honor Mike Chambers who served as LSU's athletic trainer when the first mascot was purchased. The first Mike was housed in the Baton Rouge Zoo for one year before a permanent home was constructed near Tiger Stadium. Mike I reigned for 20 years before dying of pneumonia.



Mike's Habitat

In 2005, a new environment (above) was created for Mike that is 15,000 square feet in size with lush planting, a large live oak tree, a beautiful waterfall and a stream evolving from a rocky backdrop overflowing with plants and trees. The habitat has, as a backdrop, an Italianate tower - a campanile - that creates a visual bridge to the Italianate architectural vernacular that is the underpinning of the image of the entire beautiful LSU campus. This spectacular habitat features state-of-the-art technologies, research, conservation and husbandry programs, as well as educational, interpretive and recreational activities. It is, in essence, one of the largest and finest Tiger habitats in the United States.



Sneaux Day

On Dec. 11, 2008, a winter storm blanketed Baton Rouge that hadn't been seen in decades. The early white Christmas gave Mike VI, LSU's live Bengal/Siberian tiger, a chance to relax and play in nearly two inches of accumulation.



1956-1958

Mike II

The second Mike served a brief reign, lasting only through the 1957 season before dying of pneumonia in the spring of 1958. He was born at the Audubon Zoo in New Orleans and came to LSU on Sept. 28, 1956. The young tiger was held overnight in Tiger Stadium and unveiled Sept. 29, the opening day of the football season.



1958-1976

Mike III

Just in time for the 1958 national championship season, Mike III was purchased from the Woodland Park Zoo in Seattle, Washington, following a "national search" by then-athletic director Jim Corbett. The student body contributed \$1,500 for the purchase of the tiger. Mike III served as mascot for 18 seasons, dying after the only losing season of his reign, as LSU posted a 5-6 record in 1975.



1976-1990

Mike IV

Mike IV reigned over Tiger athletics for 14 years after being donated to the school by August A. Busch III from the Dark Continent Amusement Park in Tampa, Florida, on Aug. 29, 1976. Born on May 15, 1974, Mike's age and health were determining factors in his retirement to the Baton Rouge Zoo in 1990. Mike IV died of old age in March of 1995 at the age of 21.



1990-2007

Mike V

Mike V was donated by Dr. Thomas and Caroline Atchison of the Animal House Zoological Park in Moulton, Alabama. Dr. Sheldon Bivin of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine traveled to Alabama and brought the baby tiger back to Baton Rouge. Born Oct. 18, 1989, the new tiger was introduced to LSU fans at a basketball game against Alabama in February of 1990. He officially began his reign on April 30, 1990, when he was moved into the tiger habitat across from Tiger Stadium. Mike V died on May 18, 2007, at the age of 17.



2007-present

Mike VI

Mike VI arrived in Baton Rouge on Aug. 25, 2007, thanks to the donation by Great Cats of Indiana. He was officially designated as the successor to Mike V on Sept. 8, when LSU played host to Virginia Tech. Six days later, on Sept. 14, 2007, a ceremony was held to honor Mike V and dedicate the habitat to Mike VI. The nine-year-old Bengal/Siberian mix, formerly known as "Roscoe," reigned over a football national title in his first year and most recently, a 2011 Southeastern Conference championship and perfect regular season.



Dr. F. King Alexander

President/Chancellor, LSU

LSU

Dr. F. King Alexander was named the incoming president and chancellor of Louisiana State University, which has an annual budget of \$3.4 billion and more than 54,000 students. He was appointed to the position by the LSU Board of Supervisors in March 2013 and assumed the position on July 1, 2013.

Prior to being named the incoming president, Dr. Alexander was president of California State University, Long Beach (2006-2013), one of the nation's largest public universities located in Southern California.

During his more than seven-year tenure at California State University, Long Beach, Dr. Alexander was twice named the California State University Student Association (CSSA) "President of the Year," which represents all 23 California State Universities and its more than 440,000 students.

Prior to becoming president of California State University, Long Beach, Dr. Alexander was president of Murray State University in Kentucky (2001-2005) and was a faculty member at the University of Illinois, Champaign-Urbana, where he was the director of the graduate higher education program.

A Kentucky native who grew up in North Florida, Dr. Alexander received his Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in higher education administration with a focus on finance and educational policy analysis, and a Master of Science degree from the University of Oxford, Oxford, England in comparative educational studies.

As a teacher and administrator, Dr. Alexander has received many honors, including the University of Wisconsin-Madison School of Education Alumni Achievement Award (2002) and has research

university faculty affiliations at the University of Wisconsin-Madison Center for the Study of Postsecondary Education (WISCAPE) and Cornell University Higher Education Research Institute (CHERI).

Alexander is an internationally-respected expert in higher education finance and public policy and frequently publishes in national journals and for organizations in this field. He has served as a reviewer, an editorial board member, and a university instructor and faculty member, teaching courses in higher education finance, law, history and current events.

Dr. Alexander also has been asked to represent public higher education colleges and universities on numerous occasions to the United States Congress on issues of college affordability, student indebtedness, and institutional efficiency and effectiveness in efforts to address many of the growing challenges facing American higher education. Due to his national recognition and involvement on higher education issues, Dr. Alexander has served on numerous U.S. higher education and statewide organizational leadership boards where he remains very active.

Dr. Alexander and his wife, Shenette, have three children: Kylie, Savannah and Madison.



Dr. Bill Demastes

Faculty Athletics Representative

Dr. Bill Demastes, a professor of English at LSU, is in his third year as Faculty Athletics Representative. Dr. Demastes earned his Ph.D. in English in 1986 from the University of Wisconsin-Madison with a Field of Study of Drama as Genre and a specialization in 20th-Century American and British Drama. He

earned his masters in English in June 1979 from the University of Georgia in Athens, where he specialized in 19th-Century American Literature.

At LSU, he served as Associate Dean of the College of Arts and

Sciences from 2001-2004 and Director of Undergraduate Studies for the Department of English from 1999-2001 and 2010-11. He has also served as Associate Chair of the Department of English (1998-99), Director of the Master of Arts in Liberal Arts Program (1996-2004) and Director of Graduate Studies in the Department of English (1992-94; 2006-06).

He was honored with the LSU Alumni Association Faculty Excellence Award in 2000 and in 2002 won the LSU Distinguished Faculty Award. He was named in 2009 an LSU Rainmaker which is given to the top 100 LSU Faculty. In 2010 and 2013, he received the Tiger Athletic Association Undergraduate Teaching Award University College, and in the summer of 2011, he was named the Harry Ransom Summer Fellowship recipient by the University of Texas.



Joe Alleva

LSU Vice Chancellor/Director of Athletics

Joe Alleva continues to bring unprecedented national recognition to LSU as Vice Chancellor and Director of Athletics. Under Alleva's leadership, LSU enjoys one of the country's premier athletics programs with success on and off the field of competition. Now in his seventh year at LSU, Alleva is dedicated to athletic and academic excellence, and he is committed to providing the opportunities and the resources necessary for student-athletes to excel in competition, in the classroom and in the community. Alleva joined the LSU family on April 4, 2008, after a highly successful tenure as director of athletics at Duke University for 10 years. Alleva's role at LSU was further expanded in August 2009 when vice chancellor was added to his title by the LSU Board of Supervisors. It is the first time in school history that the director of athletics has also held a vice chancellor position.

Alleva is currently serving a five-year term on the prestigious NCAA Men's Basketball Committee, enhancing his reputation as one of the most respected athletic administrators in the country. Alleva has been appointed to numerous national committees throughout his career, including the Football Bowl Certification Committee, the NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet and several Southeastern Conference and Atlantic Coast Conference committees.

Upon his arrival at LSU, Alleva unveiled a strategic master plan for the LSU athletics program – "LSU: Thru and True" – to ensure the advancement and future of LSU Athletics as an exemplary enterprise. The central mission of the plan is to create an environment for student-athletes to reach their ultimate potential, prepare them to be champions in life and to set out goals and values for the entire athletics program.

Living up to Alleva's mantra of "competition, classroom, community," LSU student-athletes in 2013-14 logged more than 4,732 hours in community service work across 21 sports through LSU's "Geaux Givers" program. And a total of 88 proud Tigers received their degrees from the university during LSU commencement ceremonies in December and May. LSU's overall graduation success rate for all student-athletes has grown from 69 percent in 2008 to 81 percent in 2013.

With a strong commitment to academics, Alleva ensures that the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes is a first-class facility that provides student-athletes the resources necessary for success in the classroom and personal development. And with an emphasis on community service and outreach programs, the implementation under Alleva's direction of the "Geaux Givers" fosters a relationship between the local community and LSU student-athletes, who regularly participate in philanthropic events. Alleva has bolstered the athletic department's L-Club program to reach out and connect with former student-athletes, and he has supervised the thriving "Project Graduation" program in which many former student-athletes have returned to LSU to earn their degrees.

Alleva's tenure has been distinguished by a number of significant athletic achievements, including four straight 10-win seasons by the football team, a

baseball national championship and two College World Series berths, two consecutive women's basketball Sweet 16 appearances, three gymnastics Super Six berths, a softball College World Series appearance and 15 NCAA Top 5 finishes indoors and outdoors by the men's and women's track and field teams.

LSU under Alleva's leadership claimed the 2009 baseball College World Series title, and the Tigers have earned 30 individual NCAA championships in the sports of men and women's track and field, gymnastics, men's golf and women's golf. LSU has captured 12 Southeastern Conference team championships, including the 2011 football crown, and the Tigers have won 80 individual SEC titles during Alleva's term. The Tigers in 2011-12 finished fourth in both the men's and women's Capital One Cup competition that identifies athletic excellence. LSU was one of only two schools in the country – and the only one in the SEC – to rank in the top four in both categories.

LSU's prominence was evident again in the final 2013-14 Learfield Sports Director's Cup standings that recognize the nation's best athletic programs, as the Tigers finished in the Top 25 for the ninth consecutive year. LSU was the only school in the SEC to post a 10 win-season (10-3) in football, a 20-win season (20-14) in men's basketball and a 40-win season (46-16-1) in baseball.

The 2013 LSU football team recorded its seventh 10-win season in nine years and defeated Iowa in the Outback Bowl, the men's basketball team earned 20 victories for the first time since 2009 and the baseball team won its fifth SEC Tournament title in seven years and was an NCAA Tournament National Seed for the third-straight season. The Lady Tiger basketball team earned his second consecutive Sweet 16 berth, and LSU gymnastics, led by National Coach of the Year D-D Breaux, enjoyed the finest season in its illustrious history,

finishing No. 3 in the nation.

The LSU men's golf team recorded its highest national finish since 1967 as the Tigers placed third at the NCAA Championships. The men's track and field team placed fourth and the women's team sixth at the NCAA Outdoor meet. The softball, volleyball, swimming and diving, women's tennis and women's golf teams each participated in NCAA postseason competition. The year was also highlighted by the inaugural season of the sand volleyball program, which gives more LSU female student-athletes the opportunity to compete at the intercollegiate level.

Alleva's vision will keep LSU among the nation's leaders in athletic facilities. In the fall of 2014, LSU opens the expansion of the South End Zone of Tiger Stadium – a project that adds premium seating, general public seating and two state-of-the-art video boards – continuing an effort to augment one of the most iconic venues in all of college sports. Since 2010, Alleva has directed an aggressive campaign to preserve and enhance the appearance of Tiger Stadium that has included the installation new windows, lighting systems, gating systems, and championship plazas.

Under Alleva's direction, LSU's world-renowned track and field program in 2010 received a new running surface in Bernie Moore Stadium, and extensive renovations to the Maddox Field House in the spring of 2014 give the Tigers a first-class indoor track and field venue. Alleva directed a major renovation to the University Club golf course that was completed in September 2010 and allows the LSU men's and women's golf teams to compete on one of the most challenging courses in the country. An overhaul of the LSU soccer facility was completed in the fall of 2011, converting the venue into fan-friendly venue that has attracted record-breaking crowds.

Future plans include a new gymnastics practice facility, a new tennis complex featuring indoor

and outdoor courts and a modern Nutrition Center for Student-Athletes, a facility that will house full-time chefs and nutritionists and provide the best dietary selections for all Fighting Tiger competitors.

Alleva is an innovator with bold ideas that benefit not only LSU but all of Greater Baton Rouge. He has been instrumental in the planning of the Bayou Country Superfest, a three-day country music concert and festival held in Tiger Stadium each spring. The event attracts more than 100,000 visitors to the LSU campus and makes a tremendous economic impact upon the local community.

Alleva became director of athletics at Duke in 1998 and his impressive tenure there propelled the university into the ranks of America's top all-around collegiate programs. Among his outstanding list of accomplishments includes the greatest 10-year period in Duke Athletics, winning more ACC and NCAA championships than in any other decade in school history.

Alleva, whose hometown is Suffern, New York, majored in Finance at Lehigh University and received his bachelor's degree in 1975. While at Lehigh, Alleva was the quarterback of the football team and team captain in 1974. Alleva also played on the Lehigh baseball team. He served as a graduate assistant football coach and earned an MBA in 1976.

While at Duke, Alleva played a key role in Durham's community sports scene. He started Little League Baseball in Durham over 20 years ago, and also began the American Legion baseball program.

He is a member of the North Carolina American Legion Hall of Fame, Suffern High School Hall of Fame and the Rockland County Hall of Fame.

Alleva and his wife, Annie, have three children, J.D., Jeff, and Jenny, and one granddaughter.



SEASON PREVIEW

LSU TIGERS FEATURE INTERNATIONAL FLAIR IN 2014 SEASON

There is but one word to describe the caliber of recruit making its way to Baton Rouge in recent seasons as head coach Brian Lee and his coaching staff look to lead the squad into the SEC title chase once again as he begins his 10th season at the helm in 2014.

That word? World-class.

Under Lee's direction, the Tigers most recently earned their third second-place finish in the race for the SEC regular season championship during the 2011 season as they said goodbye to a heralded senior class featuring a trio of All-SEC performers and Canadian internationals Taryne Boudreau, Allysha Chapman and Natalie Martineau. They were leaders of a class that scored SEC silver in 2008, 2009 and 2011 while tying a class record of 50 wins in four seasons at LSU.

Lee has certainly followed that formula in turning the Tigers into title contenders in years to come after signing 14 recruits with international experience on National Signing Day in the last three years in 2012, 2013 and 2014. That includes youth national team veterans hailing from Canada, England, Mexico, New Zealand and the United States looking to make their marks on the program in the coming seasons.

That international pedigree is what will lead the Tigers into the 2014 season as they look to challenge reigning SEC co-champions Florida and Texas A&M for conference supremacy once again this fall.

Alex Arlitt returns as the most experienced, and perhaps the most versatile, member of the squad as she has started each of LSU's 63 matches since arriving on campus as a freshman for the 2011 season. Arlitt has displayed the versatility to play any position in the midfield as both an attacking and defensive midfielder and on the back line as a central defender or right back starting matches in each position during her career.

An All-SEC contender in her final season with the Tigers, Arlitt will certainly serve a leadership role for the Tigers both on and off the pitch as the only senior in the 2014 squad. She is one of the team's top returning scorers with eight goals and seven assists in her three seasons with her time split between the back line and midfield.

While Arlitt enters the season as the only senior on the squad, the roster is littered with experienced internationals that will form what is sure to be one of the SEC's strongest squads for years to come as the Tigers push for their first SEC Championship in the program's history.

Six of the team's top seven scorers from a year ago return to form a potent attack, led by a pair of Canadian internationals and All-SEC performers in striker Summer Clarke and attacking midfielder Emma Fletcher. Clarke was the team's top scorer in her debut season a year ago with a total of 10 goals and three assists for 23 points, while Fletcher scored one goal of her own and set an LSU

freshman record with an SEC-leading 12 assists during her rookie campaign in 2013.

It was a debut performance that earned both Clarke and Fletcher a Second-Team All-SEC and SEC All-Freshman Team selection a year ago as two of the league's top young talents.

The Tigers actually made history in 2013 as the first team in SEC history to feature three freshmen on the All-SEC teams as Clarke and Fletcher were joined by fellow rookie debutant and Second-Team All-SEC selection Megan Lee. With Clarke leading the line and Fletcher anchoring the midfield, Lee proved to be a leader of the Tigers' back line as one of the NCAA's premier left backs in her first season in Baton Rouge.

A New Zealand international, Lee joined Clarke and Fletcher as Freshman All-Americans a season ago as each was named among the 22 rookies nationwide on TopDrawerSoccer.com's Freshman Best XI Teams. Clarke and Fletcher were also picked as Soccer America Second-Team All-Freshman selections in the wake of the 2013 season.

Mexican international Fernanda Pina replicated her freshman form as a sophomore a year ago as she has scored four goals in each of her two seasons in Baton Rouge while plying her trade on the wings. Pina, the team's third-leading scorer a year ago, has played in all 41 games over the past two seasons while making 27 starts as an LSU Tiger.

While Pina boasts international experience as a product from the Mexican U-17 and U-20 teams, the Tigers will also feature a capped member of the full Mexican Women's National Team in their midfield as Natalia Gomez-Junco dons the purple and gold for the first time in 2014.

A former All-Conference USA player at the University of Memphis, Gomez-Junco took a redshirt in her first season in the program a year ago after transferring to LSU from the University of Memphis following her sophomore season in 2012. In her two seasons at Memphis, she scored a total of 10 goals and 22 points, including an impressive eight goals as a freshman in 2011. Gomez-Junco earned her first career international cap at the senior level while competing with the senior Mexican Women's National Team at the 2013 Algarve Cup in Portugal.

Midfielder Heather Magee headlines a host of other Tigers returning to provide the squad with experience this fall. Magee, who scored two goals and dished out two assists playing mostly as a holding midfielder during the 2013 season, has started all 40 matches of her collegiate career.

Other Tigers returning to the squad in 2014 to provide the Tigers with depth at each level of the field are striker Lexi Gibbs, midfielders Haley Emerson and Mariel McLaughlin, defenders Gracie Campbell and Tori Sample

and goalkeepers Catalina Rubiano and Morgan Ruhl.

The Tigers are also excited to welcome one of the nation's top recruiting classes to Baton Rouge this fall as their heralded Class of 2014 has been rated as high as the No. 7-ranked class by TopDrawerSoccer.com in the wake of National Signing Day in February. LSU has now signed an impressive recruiting class ranking among the nation's Top 15 for the third-straight season.

Among those joining the program as part of the Class of 2014 are five internationals with striker Jorian Baucom (Scottsdale, Arizona), midfielder Christyna Pitre (Austin, Texas), defenders Jordane Carvery (Richmond Hill, Ontario, Canada) and Ella Williams (Leatherhead, Surrey, England) and goalkeeper Lily Alfeld (Christchurch, New Zealand) competing as rookies in 2014.

Also looking to earn their place in LSU's playing rotation this fall are midfielders Kristen Pavlick (Danville, California) and Madeline Ramsey (Rock Hill, South Carolina) and defenders Emma Meckfessel (Point Reyes Station, California) and Alexis Urch (Round Rock, Texas).

The Tigers are set to kick off the 2014 regular season on Aug. 22 with a home match with the Troy Trojans as fans will have their first chance to see this year's squad.

While preparing for a rigorous slate of SEC fixtures, the Tigers will compete against their nine-game non-conference schedule that features a trio of road fixtures at nationally-ranked BYU, Duke and Marquette.

BYU is the two-time defending West Coast Conference champion and was recently a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament when the Cougars made a run to the Elite Eight. Duke is proven as one of the NCAA's premier programs while following an appearance in the National Championship Game in 2011 with back-to-back berths in the NCAA's Elite Eight during each of the last two seasons. Marquette swept Big East regular season and tournament championships last season while also earning a No. 2 national seed in the NCAA Tournament.

LSU's 11-game SEC schedule is highlighted by a pair of home matches against the 2013 SEC Co-Champions as the Tigers play host to the Texas A&M Aggies on Friday, Sept. 26, and to the Florida Gators on Sunday, Oct. 26, at the LSU Soccer Stadium.

There's no question that the LSU Soccer program has firmly established itself among the nation's elite with its performance in recent seasons, and the Tigers are hungry for more as the 2014 season draws near. When Lee took over the program in December 2004, he committed himself to "build a program that annually contends for the SEC, qualifies for the NCAA College Cup and competes to win a national championship." With LSU's performance under his direction in nine seasons, his goals are now well within reach for a new generation of Tigers.

FORWARDS

Fans turning out to the LSU Soccer Stadium this fall will be treated to an LSU Tiger team featuring a dynamic attack that looks to fire the squad into SEC title contention in 2014.

With All-SEC striker and Canadian international Summer Clarke partnering with five-star recruit and U.S. Women's Youth National Team veteran Jorian Baucom, LSU's attack boasts a world-class front line that will pack a devastating 1-2 scoring punch for defenses throughout the SEC and NCAA for many years to come.

Clarke returns as the team's leading scorer from a year ago as she turned in one of the most prolific rookie seasons in the program's history while scoring 10 goals and dishing out three assists en route to earning Second-Team All-SEC and SEC All-Freshman Team selections during the 2013 season. She was also a Freshman All-American as both a Soccer America Second-Team All-Freshman and TopDrawerSoccer.com Freshman Best XI Second Team selection.

It was a rookie season that delivered on the

promise that saw Clarke join the program as a heralded Class of 2013 recruit and rising star in the Canadian Women's National Team system.

A native of Richmond, British Columbia, Clarke was the leading scorer for the U-17 Canadian Women's National Team throughout the 2012 season as she led her nation to the quarterfinal round at the 2012 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup in Azerbaijan. She has also spent time training with Canada's U-20 and senior squads during her time at LSU.

Clarke arrived on the national stage early in the SEC season a year ago when she scored five of LSU's seven goals in a weekend road sweep at Arkansas and Alabama to propel the squad to a six-game unbeaten streak at 5-0-1 to open up conference play.

Clarke scored her first career hat trick with the Tigers in a 5-3 win over the Razorbacks before scoring both goals in LSU's 2-1 extra time win over the Crimson Tide to firmly establish herself as one of the SEC's bright young stars in her debut season. That performance

earned Clarke selections as TopDrawerSoccer.com Women's National Player of the Week and SEC Offensive Player of the Week.

Comfortable playing through the middle as a single striker or on either side of the field in a multiple front formation, Clarke will provide the pace and precision to Baucom's power as they will complement one another in forming a prolific strike partnership Tiger fans will enjoy.

Baucom joins the LSU program as a five-star recruit and the No. 13-ranked recruit nationally by TopDrawerSoccer.com in the wake of her prep career as a record-setting goal scorer at Pinnacle High School in Phoenix, Arizona. A native of nearby Scottsdale, Baucom led her prep team to Arizona state championships in 2011 and 2014, which includes scoring a historic hat trick in the state final as a freshman.

But it was in national competition where Baucom earned her reputation as one of the top striker recruits in the United States as a member of the U.S. Women's National Team Player Pool from the U-14 through the

U-18 levels dating back to the 2010 season. She is also a veteran of the Region IV Olympic Development Program Team during her youth career.

Also making her return to the squad in 2014 is Prairieville, Louisiana, native and Dutchtown High School product Lexi Gibbs, a forward who earned her first collegiate experience with 12 appearances for the Tigers a year ago. Gibbs even scored her first career goal in LSU's 6-0 shutout of Louisiana-Monroe during the non-conference season, and earned her first career start on the road at 23rd-ranked Kentucky late in the SEC campaign.

"We're excited about the potential that this front line will provide our attack this season," said LSU head coach Brian Lee. "We believe we'll be much more dynamic going forward for the foreseeable future, and having players like Summer, Jorian and Lexi as attacking options will be a big reason why."

MIDFIELDERS

One look at the makeup of LSU's squad with each passing season of the Brian Lee era reveals that the success of the Tigers is built on the foundation of a strong midfield as they feature one of the SEC's elite units year in and year out.

Following in the footsteps of two-time SEC Player of the Year Malorie Rutledge and All-SEC performers Melissa Clarke and Natalie Martineau, Emma Fletcher carried the torch as one of the top attacking midfielders in the SEC and NCAA with an All-SEC rookie season in 2013.

The Canadian international enjoyed a record-setting debut season with the Tigers last fall, smashing LSU's freshman record with her SEC-leading 12 assists while facilitating LSU's attack from the traditional No. 10 role as the primary attacking midfielder behind the front line. Fletcher also scored one goal for 14 points as LSU's second-leading scorer on the season.

It was a performance that earned Fletcher recognition as a Second-Team All-SEC pick by the league's head coaches in 2013, as well as a Freshman All-American as a second-team honoree in the Soccer America All-Freshman and TopDrawerSoccer.com

Freshman Best XI teams.

Fletcher rejoins the Tiger squad this fall after leading Canada's Under-20 club at the 2014 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in August.

Along with Fletcher, the Tigers are blessed with a wealth of attacking options in midfield with Alex Arlitt, Natalia Gomez-Junco, Heather Magee and Fernanda Pina sure to contend for the same postseason honors in 2014.

Arlitt returns as the most experienced, and perhaps the most versatile, member of the squad as she has started each of LSU's 63 matches since arriving on campus as a freshman for the 2011 season. Arlitt has displayed the versatility to play any position in the midfield as both an attacking and defensive midfielder and on the back line as a central defender or right back starting matches in each position during her career.

LSU's midfield also features a pair of Mexican internationals who are sure to join in with Arlitt and Fletcher in attack as Gomez-Junco and Pina return for their junior seasons this fall. The duo recently trained with the senior Mexican Women's National Team during the spring season.

Pina replicated her freshman form as a sophomore a year ago as she has scored four goals in each of her two seasons in with the Tigers while plying her trade on the wings. Pina, the team's third-leading scorer a year ago, has played in all 41 games at LSU over the last two seasons while making 27 starts.

While Pina boasts international experience as a product from the Mexican U-17 and U-20 teams, Gomez-Junco is also a capped member of Mexico's senior squad as she wears the LSU uniform for the first time in 2014.

A former All-Conference USA player at the University of Memphis, Gomez-Junco took a redshirt in her first season in the program a year ago after transferring to LSU following her sophomore season in 2012. She scored 10 goals in two seasons at Memphis, including eight goals as a freshman in 2011. Gomez-Junco earned her first career international cap at the senior level as a member of Mexico's team competing at the 2013 Algarve Cup in Portugal.

Magee also provides the squad with valuable experience this fall as she has started all 40 matches of her collegiate career over the past two seasons. She scored two goals and dished out a pair of assists while

playing mostly as a holding midfielder during the 2013 season.

The midfield is sure to be the deepest unit on the field for the Tigers throughout the 2014 season with Haley Emerson and Mariel McLaughlin returning as letterwinners and a trio of recruits in Ohio State transfer Kristen Pavlick (Danville, California), Christyna Pitre (Austin, Texas) and Madeline Ramsey (Rock Hill, South Carolina) arriving in the fall.

A member of the U.S. Women's National Team player pool at the U-15, U-17 and U-18 levels during her prep career, Pitre signed with the Tigers as one of the top defensive midfield recruits in the country for the Class of 2014 as the No. 104-ranked player nationally by the staff at TopDrawerSoccer.com. Pitre joined Ramsey as members of the Region III Olympic Development Program Team as emerging youth standouts.

Pavlick received a redshirt during her rookie season at Ohio State a year ago and will line up as a redshirt freshman with the Tigers in her debut season in Baton Rouge this fall.

DEFENDERS

The Tigers return an All-SEC player at each level of the pitch as they head into the 2014 season, and the back line will be no exception as New Zealand international Megan Lee returns to lead a youthful defense that looks to stifle opposing attacks this fall.

It was a slow start to Lee's collegiate career as she missed the first seven games of the 2013 season while recovering from a severe ankle injury suffered in preseason training. But Lee bounced back in a big way as she debuted with the Tigers in late September and never looked back in an All-SEC campaign. Lee made 11 starts in 12 appearances in her first season with the Tigers in 2013.

A product of the New Zealand Women's National Team system at the U-17 and U-20 levels during her youth career, Lee was called into action with New Zealand's senior squad late in the 2013 season for the first time in her career as she joined the Football Ferns in their two-match series against the world's No. 1-ranked United States in late October.

Lee became just the second LSU Tiger in program

history to earn an international cap at the senior level when she featured as a late defensive substitution at left back in New Zealand's 1-1 draw against the United States in their series finale at Crew Stadium in Columbus, Ohio.

While emerging as one of the top young left backs in the SEC and NCAA with her efforts in 2013, Lee was honored as a Second-Team All-SEC performer by the league's head coaches, as well as one of the top rookies nationwide as a Second-Team selection in TopDrawerSoccer.com's Freshman Best XI teams following the campaign.

Alongside Lee, two other Tigers return to the squad with starting experience as they hope to earn their spot in the playing rotation once again with Gracie Campbell and Tori Sample lining up in defense again this fall.

A native of nearby Denham Springs, Louisiana, Campbell made 20 appearances with 13 starts in her debut season with the Tigers a year ago while seeing action as a central defender, left back and defensive midfielder during the 2013 campaign. She played

primarily in midfield during the SEC season, but will slot back in defense as she prepares for her sophomore season.

Sample saw her 2013 season cut short after eight games when she suffered a torn ACL in LSU's non-conference finale at Rice, and she looks to regain the form that earned her a starting role in central defense in each of the team's eight non-conference games a year ago. The highlight of her sophomore season was her defensive effort in a 1-0 shutout of the 13th-ranked USC Trojans that earned her a spot on the Minnesota Gold Classic All-Tournament Team.

There is no doubt that the Tigers will rely on youth to fill out their defensive lineup and also provide the team with much needed depth across the back line this year. But with youth comes great experience with Canadian U-20 standout Jordane Carvery and England U-19 veteran Ella Williams headlining LSU's Class of 2014.

A native of Richmond Hill, Ontario, Carvery is one of Canada's top young center backs as a veteran of her country's U-17 and U-20 squads. She arrived on campus

in August after lining for Canada at the 2014 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup.

Williams was a late addition to LSU's heralded recruiting class as she inked her National Letter of Intent in June with an impressive resume as an England youth international. A native of Leatherhead, Surrey, England, Williams is a former captain of England's U-15 team before being called up to the U-17 and U-19 squads ahead of her arrival at LSU.

Top 100 national recruit Alexis Urch of Round Rock, Texas, and all-conference junior college transfer Emma Meckfessel of Point Reyes Station, California, also join the program as part of LSU's Class of 2014 that was tabbed the No. 7-ranked recruiting class nationally from the editorial staff at Top DrawerSoccer.com.

Urch was the No. 55-ranked recruit in the United States by TopDrawerSoccer.com, while Meckfessel transferred to LSU in the summer following a two-year stint at the City College of San Francisco where she earned all-conference honors as a central defender.

GOALKEEPERS

The 2013 season brought the end to one of the most prolific careers for a goalkeeper in the history of the LSU Soccer program as Megan Kinneman once again provided the defensive foundation for the Tigers with her performance between the posts. Kinneman wrapped up a four-year career as one of the SEC's top keepers during her tenure in Baton Rouge.

Kinneman ended her time in Baton Rouge as LSU's school-record holder with 284 saves, while also ranking second in team history with 17 clean sheets to her credit in four seasons. Her 0.66 goals against average as a freshman in 2011 remains a single-season school record.

Not only that, but Kinneman even pitched in on the offensive end of the field as she fired home each of her three penalty kicks attempted in her final two seasons, including the winner in a 3-2 overtime win over Ole Miss in 2012 and a 1-0 shutout of No. 13-ranked USC in 2013.

Kinneman now plies her trade at the professional level as a trialist with the Houston Dash of the National Women's Soccer League with an eye on one day becoming a coach.

Erin McLeod, captain of the Houston Dash, recently said of Kinneman's experience with the team, "My fellow reserve goalkeeper, Megan Kinneman, came from Louisiana State via open tryouts and consistently shows that although she may be small of stature, she is easily one of the fiercest goalkeepers I have ever trained with and to be quite frank, is one step away from breaking out as a superstar at this level."

Those are big shoes to fill, but the Tigers will look to a pair of international goalkeepers to step into the starting role in place of Kinneman with Colombian international Catalina Rubiano returning for her second season in the program and New Zealand international and Class of 2014 recruit Lily

Alfeld highlighting LSU's No. 7-ranked recruiting class arriving on campus.

Rubiano was called into action with the Colombian Women's National Team for the first time in her career in the weeks leading up to the start of preseason training as part of the player pool in preparation for the 2014 South American Women's Football Championship, or simply the Copa America, being held in Ecuador in September.

The two-week training camp in the Colombian capital of Bogota was Rubiano's first experience competing at an international level as she returns to the squad after serving as a deputy to Kinneman in her debut season a year ago.

Alfeld, who hails from Christchurch, New Zealand, is certainly one of the world's top goalkeeper prospects with her performance at the youth level while competing with New Zealand at FIFA Women's World Cups at the U-17 and U-20 levels. In fact, Alfeld

was her nation's starting goalkeeper at the 2012 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup in Azerbaijan and 2014 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in Canada before her arrival in Baton Rouge.

Among her accolades was being named the "Player of the Match" in New Zealand's first match against Mexico in group play at the 2012 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup.

After earning seven international caps with New Zealand's U-17 squad, Alfeld has served as the starting goalkeeper for the Junior Football Ferns at the U-20 level in 2013 and 2014.

Hereford, Maryland, native and former national Top 100 recruit Morgan Ruhl returns to the team this season, but will be forced to miss the entire 2014 season after undergoing preseason surgery to repair a hip injury that has plagued her for much of her collegiate career.

2014 SEC Women's Soccer Tournament

For the third-straight season, the 2014 Southeastern Conference Women's Soccer Tournament features a 10-team field after qualifying eight teams in years prior to the league's expansion in 2012. The tournament expanded to 10 teams for the first time in 2012 with the addition of Missouri and Texas A&M to form a powerful 14-team league that only strengthens itself as one of the most powerful conferences in all of women's college soccer.

The top 10 teams on the final SEC table for the regular season will make the annual trip to the Orange Beach Sportsplex in Orange Beach, Alabama, for one of the premier conference tournaments in college soccer. The SEC Tournament Championship Game will be featured live on ESPNU on Sunday, Nov. 9.

Texas A&M is the defending SEC Tournament Champion, while the Aggies also shared the 2013 SEC regular-season title with the Florida Gators after posting matching 9-2 marks with 27 points in SEC play a season ago.



2014 NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament

The NCAA will select 64 teams to compete in the 2014 NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament. There are 31 conferences that will receive one automatic bid into the field of 64 teams. The remaining 33 teams selected for the postseason will receive at-large bids based on their performance during the regular season.

Following the conclusion of the conference tournaments, The first round of the NCAA Tournament is scheduled for Nov. 14-16 at 32 host sites yet to be determined. The second and third rounds will be held the following weekend from Nov. 21-23 at eight undetermined campus sites with four teams competing at each site. The NCAA quarterfinals will then be held Nov. 28-30. The 14th-annual NCAA Women's College Cup will be held in Boca Raton, Florida, with the semifinals on Friday, Dec. 5, and the championship game on Sunday, Dec. 7 at Florida Atlantic University Stadium.

This marks the first time in the history of the NCAA Division I Women's College Cup that the event will be held at FAU Stadium in Boca Raton, Florida.

THE VISION

LSU is the sleeping giant of college soccer. My vision for LSU is to build a program that annually contends to win the SEC, qualifies for the NCAA College Cup and competes to win a National Championship. The foundation that we've built has given us that opportunity to recruit and compete at the highest level of college soccer.

THE PHILOSOPHY

I believe in a commitment to excellence from our players, coaches and staff in all facets of the program. We will provide an environment in which our student-athletes can maximize their full potential as LSU students in competition, in the classroom and in the community.

The Brian Lee Era

When Brian Lee took the reigns of the LSU Soccer program in December 2004, he envisioned a program with the potential to be a perennial contender for the Southeastern Conference championship and an annual participant in the NCAA Tournament. His bold vision to transform LSU Soccer into a nationally-respected program has produced unprecedented results as the Tigers enter the 2014 campaign among the SEC's elite once again.

Lee now guides the Tigers into a new era of SEC soccer after winning four SEC Western Division championships and earning four trips to the NCAA Tournament over the past seven years. That includes an impressive three-year run for the program in 2007, 2008 and 2009 and its return near the top of the SEC table again in 2011. The Tigers have twice advanced to the second round for the NCAA Tournament in 2007 and 2009.

The Tigers have also proven themselves as perennial contenders for the SEC regular season championship while claiming second place in the final conference standings in 2008, 2009 and 2011 to match their best SEC finish in program history.

Only Florida has earned more first-place and second-place finishes in the SEC standings more times than LSU over the past eight seasons as the Gators (7) and Tigers (3) lead the league. The Tigers are also one of just two SEC teams to finish among the Top 8 of the final SEC standings in each of the past nine seasons as they again join Florida in achieving such a feat.

In Lee's nine seasons in Baton Rouge, the Tigers have posted a 97-64-31 overall record with a strong 49-36-16 mark against conference opponents. And since capturing its first SEC West title in 2007, LSU has posted a .608 winning percentage with a 42-25-12 record versus SEC teams in the regular season, including a school record eight SEC wins in 2009 and 2011.

The Tigers have been impressive against their division rivals in their run of four SEC West championships in seven seasons with a sparkling 23-7-6 mark for a .722 winning percentage in matches against division opponents in the regular season and SEC Tournament during that span.

Tigers Shine in National Spotlight

LSU soared to new heights in 2009 by matching the school wins record with a 15-4-5 overall mark and establishing a new school record with an 8-2-1 mark and 25 points in SEC play. For the second-straight season, the Tigers finished in second place in the final SEC standings and just one point shy of Florida for their first ever SEC championship. LSU then took a No. 2 seed to the SEC Tournament and advanced to the conference final for the first time in program history.

The Tigers were rewarded for their outstanding performance with a

No. 4 national seed in the NCAA Tournament, while serving as a regional host for the first time in team history and advancing to the NCAA Second Round for the second time in three seasons following a first ever appearance in the second round of the postseason in 2007.

Their effort helped land a No. 14 national ranking at the end of the 2009 season in the final Top 25 ranking released by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America. It marked the second year in a row for LSU to finish a campaign as high as No. 14 in the national rankings.

Midfielder Malorie Rutledge was at the center of LSU's emergence into the national spotlight. After being recruited by Lee as part of a heralded Class of 2006, the Sharpsburg, Georgia, product wrapped up her collegiate career in 2009 as the most decorated Tiger to step on the pitch. Rutledge earned consensus All-America accolades in 2008 and 2009, while also being picked as a two-time SEC Offensive Player of the Year and three-time First-Team All-SEC performer during her brilliant career.

Rutledge rewrote the school record books in four seasons in Baton Rouge while setting LSU career records with 46 assists and 102 points from 2006-09. She added 28 goals as the club's most prolific scorer in its 19 years of collegiate competition. Rutledge wrapped up her career with an NCAA-leading 18 assists as a senior in 2009 in shattering her own team single-season mark.

While Lee has coached 18 Tigers to 35 All-SEC selections in his nine seasons, LSU was recognized with a team-best five all-conference selections in 2009.

Joining Rutledge on the All-SEC squad were defender Chelsea Potts (first-team), midfielder Allysha Chapman (second-team), midfielder Melissa Clarke (second-team) and forward Carlie Banks (all-freshman). Both Clarke and Potts ended their collegiate careers in 2009 as three-time All-SEC performers following their senior season.

The Tigers nearly matched that performance in 2011 as they again finished runner-up for the SEC championship with a 13-8-1 overall record and their second-best league mark in program history at 8-3 with 24 points on the final SEC table. That earned the Tigers their fourth SEC West title and fourth at-large berth into the NCAA Tournament in five years.

Chapman led the charge for the Tigers in 2011 with her second First-Team All-SEC selection and third All-SEC honor in her collegiate career. She also made history by becoming the first LSU Tiger to be selected the SEC Defensive Player of the Year with her performance as one of the premier defensive talents in all of college soccer.

Five Tigers were again honored as All-SEC selections in 2011 as Chapman was joined on the squad by seniors Taryne Boudreau (first-team) and Natalie Martineau (second-team) and freshmen Alex Arlitt (all-freshman) and Jodi Calloway (all-freshman).

LSU Soccer made history once again in 2013 when it became the first

team SEC history to feature at least three freshmen on the All-SEC team in a single season with first-team, second-team or honorable mention all-conference honors. Striker Summer Clarke, midfielder Emma Fletcher and defender Megan Lee were each honored as Second-Team All-SEC performers in the wake of outstanding rookie seasons with the Tigers in 2013.

Clarke, Fletcher and Lee were also honored among the top freshmen nationally with their selection to Freshman All-American teams by Soccer America and TopDrawerSoccer.com.

Individually, Lee has coached five athletes to All-America honors and nine athletes to Freshman All-America honors in 20 seasons as a head coach. In addition, he has coached four Southern Conference Players of the Year, five Southern Conference Freshmen of the Year and three SEC Players of the Year, while guiding his athletes to a total of 85 all-conference selections since his first season as a head coach in 1994.

Despite finishing in 12th place in the final SEC standings in each of the previous two seasons prior to Lee's arrival in Baton Rouge, LSU Soccer has shown steady progress and continued staying power in their ascent to the top of the SEC as the squad finished in eighth place in 2005 and 2006, fourth place in 2007 and second place in 2008, 2009 and 2011.

The Tigers have also been a staple in the national rankings in recent seasons while cracking the Top 25 nationally in all major polls. LSU's climbed as high as No. 9 in 2008, No. 10 in 2009, No. 18 in 2010, No. 14 in 2011 and No. 25 in 2013 in the national rankings.

Tigers Battle Nation's Elite

Lee and his dedicated coaching staff have built a program with the ability to compete with anyone in women's college soccer. That was never more evident than in 2007 when LSU battled No. 4-ranked Texas to a 2-2 draw on the road in Austin and dominated No. 6-ranked Tennessee by a 3-0 margin at home for the program's first victory against an opponent ranked as one of the Top 10 teams in the country.

The Tigers were impressive again in 2009 when they earned a pair of shutout wins versus teams in the Top 10 of the polls with a 6-0 blanking of No. 8-ranked Georgia and a 1-0 shutout of No. 10-ranked South Carolina in a pair of matches played at the LSU Soccer Stadium. The Tigers and Gamecocks then battled to a 1-1 draw in the SEC Tournament final during the 2009 season as South Carolina took the tournament title with a marathon 8-7 decision in penalty kicks.

In 2011, LSU Soccer earned its fourth at-large NCAA Tournament berth in five seasons on the strength of a resume that featured a pair of shutout wins over No. 10 Tennessee and No. 11 Florida in conference play en route to a third runner-up finish in the final SEC standings.

With the Volunteers bringing a Top 10 national ranking to Baton Rouge



for the second time in three seasons, the Tigers were dominant in a 2-0 shutout to extend their unbeaten streak to four-straight in the series. The Tigers then made history with a trip to Gainesville, Florida, on Oct. 23 of the 2011 season as they pitched a 1-0 shutout for their first victory over the powerful Gators and hand Florida only its fourth defeat in SEC play at Pressly Stadium in its history.

The Tigers have since defeated a pair of nationally-ranked opponents in their inaugural meeting on the soccer pitch over the past two seasons with a 3-1 road triumph over 16th-ranked Missouri for their signature win of 2012 and a 1-0 shutout of 13th-ranked Southern California in a match played at a neutral site at the Minnesota Gold Classic a season ago.

The Tigers have more than proven themselves as an elite program during Lee's nine seasons in Baton Rouge as they have now scored eight wins and nine draws against ranked teams since the 2007 season.

LSU Soccer: A Box Office Smash

Lee's impact has not only been felt with unprecedented results on the field, but also at the box office as record crowds have packed the LSU Soccer Stadium week in and week out to watch the Tigers in action since his arrival in Baton Rouge.

The 2011 season witnessed the birth of a new era of LSU Soccer as the Tigers christened the new LSU Soccer Stadium on the night of Sept. 9 with a dramatic 1-0 shutout of the Oregon Ducks before a record crowd of 2,542 supporters on hand for the festivities. It proved a fitting end to a night of celebration of one of the top rising programs in all of college soccer as the squad opened a stadium that stands as one of the true jewels of the Southeastern Conference.

The Tigers wrapped up the 2011 campaign ranked among the Top 20 teams nationwide in average attendance while drawing an average of 1,174 fans in their nine matches played at the new LSU Soccer Stadium to stand as the NCAA's No. 17-ranked program at the box office.

They then raised their attendance record again in 2012 when 2,624 supporters witnessed a 1-1 draw with the visiting Rice Owls in their home opener on Aug. 24.

The 2007 season proved to be unlike any other in the history of the program as the Tigers were unbeaten at the LSU Soccer Stadium for the first time with a 5-0-3 record while drawing an average of 1,294 fans per match. That ranked LSU Soccer among the Top 10 teams in the country in average attendance for the first time as the team finished the season at No. 7 in the NCAA with average paid attendance. The Tigers set three single-game attendance records on the season, including a crowd of 2,402 in a 3-0 win over No. 6 Tennessee on Oct. 5, 2007.

LSU Soccer has been nearly unbeatable on its home turf while following an unbeaten season in 2007 with an 8-1 mark in 2008, a 7-1-2 mark in 2009, a 6-1-2 mark in 2010 and a 7-1-1 mark in 2011. The Tigers have posted a 42-12-13 record at the LSU Soccer Stadium since 2007.

Tigers Lead by Example

Not only have the Tigers proven to be one of the SEC's top programs with their effort on the field in nine seasons under Lee's direction, but they have also taken great pride in their performance off the field as they are the unquestioned University leaders in community service as winners of four-straight Tiger Cups in 2009, 2010, 2011 and 2012.

The Tiger Cup is presented each season by the Tiger Athletic Foundation as part of the annual TAF Academic Excellence Gala to the athletic program that best represents the University with its performance on and off the field. The winner of the Tiger Cup is determined using a point system based on a team's final conference and national ranking, cumulative team grade-point average and community service hours accumulated during the previous academic year.

Lee's athletes boast a proven track record in the classroom as his teams have earned eight NSCAA Team Academic Awards. A total of 122 student-athletes were selected to the Southern Conference Academic Honor Roll in his 11 years at Furman, while 103 Tigers have been named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll in his nine seasons in Baton Rouge.

LSU Soccer actually set a program record following the 2011 and 2013 seasons with 14 selections to the SEC Fall Academic Honor Roll each year, eclipsing its previous team best of 11 selections that had been matched four previous times in 2002, 2003, 2005 and 2007.

Lee Brings Proven Track Record to Tigers

Winning conference titles and leading a nationally prominent program are nothing new for the native of Cheltenham, England, who led the Furman Lady Paladins to six Southern Conference Championships and four NCAA Tournament appearances during his 11-year tenure after starting the program from scratch in 1994.

In 11 seasons, Lee's teams amassed a 144-80-10 overall record, including an impressive 76-16-3 mark in conference play. The Lady Paladins won undefeated in conference play three times (1999, 2000, 2002) and were just shy of perfection in 2003 after finishing the season with a 10-0-1 record in Southern Conference play.

For his many accomplishments, Lee was named the Southern Conference Coach of the Year five times and was named the NSCAA and Soccer Buzz Southeast Region Coach of the Year in 1999, the same year in which he was selected as a finalist for the NSCAA National Coach of the Year Award.

In addition to his experience coaching at the collegiate level, Lee served on the staff of the Region III Olympic Development Program Team from 1999-2008, while reaching the rank of assistant coach of the Region III ODP Team in 2006.

In 2014, Lee rejoined the coaching staff for the Region III ODP Team as the head coach of the Under-15 age group.

A successful athlete in his own right, Lee earned four letters with the Furman men's soccer team from 1989-92 as an integral part of three Southern Conference titles and was voted team captain and selected as the team's Most Valuable Player as a senior. He also led his team to its first ever NCAA Tournament appearance and a berth in the NCAA Sweet 16 in 1991.

Lee, 42, graduated from Furman in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in political science. He and his wife, the former Nancy Repsher of Westboro, Mass., and also a 1993 graduate of Furman, have two children - Aidan, 10, and Abby, 9.

"We certainly would not enjoy the kind of success we do now without the leadership that Debbie brings to this coaching staff. Her passion for the sport is unmatched by anyone I've ever worked with."

There is no doubt that in order for a program to compete for championships year in and year out, it must have an outstanding coaching staff in place to guide the way. In nine seasons as a member of Brian Lee's staff at LSU, Debbie Hensley has more than proven herself as one of the top assistant coaches in the country while helping lead the Tigers into national prominence as one of the premier programs in the Southeastern Conference.

It is for that reason that Hensley was promoted to the rank of associate head coach before the start of the 2008 campaign as she now enters her 10th season at LSU.

Adding Hensley to his staff was an easy decision for Lee when he took the head coaching position in December 2004 after coaching together at Furman for three years.

"We certainly would not enjoy the kind of success we do now without the leadership that Debbie brings to this coaching staff," Lee said. "She is an outstanding leader of young women, and she has helped us attract many of the best players in the country to LSU with her tremendous recruiting ability. Her passion for the sport is unmatched by anyone I've ever worked with."

That passion has certainly paid dividends on the field as Hensley has helped build LSU into the championship program it is today. In this new era of SEC soccer, the club has proven itself among the league's elite since winning its first SEC Western Division championship in 2007. LSU has claimed four division titles and earned four trips to the NCAA Tournament during the past seven seasons, including the 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2011 seasons.

LSU has also been on the cusp of claiming its first ever SEC championship with a trio of second-place finishes on the league table during that time. It includes a record-breaking 2009 season during which the Tigers finished in second place in the final conference standings for the second year in a row while tying their school record for wins with a 15-4-5 overall record and establishing a school record output with an 8-2-1 mark and 25 points in SEC play. LSU was close to matching that effort in 2011 as the SEC runner-up again with an 8-3 conference record.

In 2010, the Tigers advanced to the SEC Tournament semifinal for the fourth season in a row, joining the Florida Gators as the only programs in the SEC to advance to the semifinal round of the conference tourney in each season from 2007-10.

Hensley has been a driving force in that success as she has established a reputation as one of the nation's top recruiters attracting many of the best players in the country to Baton Rouge.

She led the way in LSU signing its first ever Top 25 recruiting class in 2005 as the Tigers were ranked No. 25 on the recruiting trail in her first season on staff. Hensley followed that effort in 2006 by helping Lee sign the first Top 10 recruiting class in the program's history with a crop of future stars ranked No. 7 nationally in the Soccer Buzz Magazine recruiting rankings.

The Class of 2006 is the most decorated class in the history of the LSU Soccer program as it completed its eligibility in 2009 with a class record of 50 wins in four seasons from 2006-09. The group captured three SEC West titles, earned three NCAA Tournament selections, placed No. 2 in the final SEC standings twice and combined for 10 All-America and 12 All-SEC picks in four seasons in Baton Rouge.

A foundation is in place for the Tigers to compete at the highest level of college soccer for years to come as they have welcomed three-straight recruiting classes to Baton Rouge for the 2012, 2013 and 2014 seasons that were all rated among the Top 15 classes nationally on National Signing Day.

The Tigers will line up with an international flair in 2014 as this year's squad features 10 players with international experience as products of the Women's National Team systems in Canada, England, Mexico, New Zealand and the United States. LSU's Class of 2014 earned a No. 7 national ranking by TopDrawerSoccer.com in the wake of Top 15 classes in 2012 and 2013.

"There's no doubt that recruiting is the lifeblood of any program at this level, and we are certainly fortunate to have someone like Debbie leading our recruiting efforts," Lee said. "She is an outstanding evaluator of talent and has the ability to target the players we feel can thrive in our program both on and off the field. That's been a key in building the foundation we have now."

Hensley compiled a 60-52-9 record in six years at Western Carolina after starting the program from scratch prior to the 1999 season. She led the Catamounts to a 10-9-1 record and a Southern Conference Tournament appearance in her inaugural season and was named the SoCon Coach of the Year in 2001 after guiding the team to the Southern Conference regular season title with a 16-6 overall record and 8-2 mark in league play.

Hensley coached seven players to 11 All-Southern Conference honors in her time at Western Carolina, a total that includes three first-team selections. In addition to her duties as head coach of the program, Hensley also served as university's Assistant Athletics Director and Senior Woman Administrator.

Prior to her stint at WCU, Hensley spent three seasons as an assistant coach under Lee at Furman where she recruited eight players who earned all-conference accolades in their careers.

Along with her coaching achievements, Hensley garnered recognition during her athletic career as a soccer and softball standout at Georgia Southern where she was a three-time first-team All-SoCon selection and led the conference in scoring as both a junior and a senior.

Hensley was selected to play in the Umbro Select College All-Star Classic after being named an NSCAA Regional All-American and All-Region honoree in 1995, and she was named the Georgia Female College Athlete of the Year by the Georgia Hall of Fame the same year.

The two-sport standout was also a first-team all-conference selection in softball as she set the Georgia Southern career record for stolen bases and runs scored. She graduated with a bachelor's degree in education from Georgia Southern in 1996 and a master's degree in health and exercise science from Furman in 1998.

With just over a month remaining before the start of the 2010 regular season, head coach Brian Lee hit a "home run" when he announced the hiring of former College of Charleston women's soccer head coach Kevin Dempsey to complete the Tigers' coaching staff before the start of the fall season.

It was an addition that paid immediate dividends for the Tigers as Dempsey coached the premier defensive unit in program history as they matched a program record for fewest goals allowed in a season with 16 and nearly set a school record with a 0.72 goals against average in 21 matches in 2010. In fact, the Tigers finished the season tied for the No. 1 spot in the SEC in goals allowed and wrapped up the season ranked No. 2 for goals against average among the league's 12 programs with their performance.

As the primary coach of LSU's defensive back line, Dempsey was instrumental in Canadian international Allysha Chapman earning her first career First-Team All-SEC selection as one of the leading defenders in the SEC.

Chapman made history as a senior in 2011 when she became the first Tiger in program history to be named the SEC Defensive Player of the Year while also earning her second First-Team All-SEC honor as one of the elite performers in all of college soccer. Chapman was joined on the All-SEC squad by a pair of rookie defenders in Texas natives Alex Arlitt and Jodi Calloway, who each earned selections to the SEC All-Freshman Team as two of the SEC's emerging talents.

Dempsey's defensive unit was a catalyst in the Tigers winning their fourth SEC Western Division championship in five seasons and earning a return trip to the NCAA Tournament for the fourth time in the team's history during the 2011 campaign. They finished the 2011 season with a 13-8-1 overall record and an 8-3 mark in league play for their third second-place finish on the SEC table in four seasons.

The LSU Soccer program has certainly been on the cusp of winning its first SEC championship as the club finished runner-up in the final conference standings in 2008, 2009 and 2011.

Dempsey has also hit the ground running on the recruiting trail while making an immediate impact for the Tigers, highlighted by recruiting classes in 2012 and 2013 that were ranked among the Top 15 classes in the country and a heralded Class of 2014 that earned the No. 7 national ranking by the staff at TopDrawerSoccer.com.

LSU Soccer made history once again a season ago when its recruiting Class of 2013 received unprecedented recognition on the All-SEC teams. LSU became the first team in SEC history to feature at least three freshmen on the All-SEC teams in a single season with first-team, second-team or honorable mention all-conference honors. Striker Summer

Clarke, midfielder Emma Fletcher and defender Megan Lee were each rewarded as Second-Team All-SEC performers in the wake of outstanding rookie seasons with the Tigers in 2013.

Clarke, Fletcher and Lee were also honored among the top freshmen nationally with their selection to the Freshman All-American teams by Soccer and TopDrawerSoccer.com.

Widely respected as one of the top recruiters in college soccer both nationally and internationally, Dempsey will continue as a driving force for the Tigers with the addition of world-class talent from across the globe in years to come.

In just the past three seasons, Dempsey has helped sign 14 athletes to National Letters of Intent to earn international experience at the youth level as part of the Women's National Team systems in Canada, England, Mexico, New Zealand and the United States.

Dempsey joined the LSU program following an outstanding nine-year stint as the head coach at the College of Charleston, where he led the Cougars to an 86-70-22 overall record and a 54-32-8 mark in Southern Conference play since 2001. That included an overall record of 24-12-6 in his final two seasons.

He teams with Lee and associate head coach Debbie Hensley to form the core of an outstanding coaching staff with a combined 35 years of head coaching experience at the NCAA Division I level. Lee has been a head coach at the NCAA Division I level for the past 20 seasons, while Hensley was the coach at Western Carolina for six seasons before joining Lee's staff at LSU.

The Cougars flourished in nine seasons under Dempsey's direction as they reached the postseason in each with nine appearances in the SoCon Tournament, including runner-up finishes in 2002 and 2009. The side earned 28 All-SoCon and All-SoCon Tournament selections under Dempsey.

The Cougars were also outstanding in the classroom during Dempsey's tenure while winning the NSCAA Team Academic Award in each of his nine seasons while posting a team GPA of 3.0 or higher. In addition, six Cougars were named NSCAA All-Region Scholar Athletes in his final two seasons at the College of Charleston, demonstrating his commitment to success both on and off the pitch.

"We are excited to have the experience that Kevin provides our program at LSU," Lee said. "He's already had a tremendous impact on our team and this community in his four years here. That is especially true with his ability to recruit world-class talent and attract the caliber of athlete we will need to challenge for SEC and national championships for years to come.

"I approach the staff just like the team with a goal to go out and recruit the best. Having Kevin as a member of our staff has been a homerun hire for our program. With Kevin joining Debbie (Hensley) and the rest of our staff, we're fortunate to have a staff in place that will continue to recruit and develop the best players in all of college soccer."

Dempsey boasts 16 years of head coaching experience at the collegiate level during which he compiled an overall record of 166-116-29 since 1994. Prior to his appointment at the College of Charleston, Dempsey served as the head coach of the women's program at Catawba College of NCAA Division II for seven seasons from 1994-2000 while compiling an overall record of 80-46-7, including a 34-13-3 mark in the South Atlantic Conference.

After helping the Indians win South Atlantic Conference regular season and tournament titles as an assistant coach in 1993, the team captured four SAC Tournament titles in his seven seasons as a head coach in 1994, 1997, 1998 and 1999. He also led Catawba College to the NCAA Division II Southeast Region Championship in 1997 before earning its place in the national quarterfinals of the NCAA Division II Women's Soccer Tournament that same year.

In all, Dempsey coached 10 NCAA Division II All-Americans, 17 All-South Region selections, four SAC Players of the Year and four SAC Freshmen of the Year during his seven-year tenure while the head coach at Catawba College.

In addition to his experience as a head coach at the collegiate level, Dempsey also served as head coach of the Under-15 Region III Olympic Development Program Team for seven years from 2003-09.

Dempsey graduated from Catawba College in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in history. He and his wife, Krista, have a 9-year-old son named Jack.

Former William Carey University men's and women's assistant and goalkeepers coach Carl Goody has joined Brian Lee's staff at LSU as a volunteer assistant coach for the 2014 season. Among Goody's primary responsibilities at LSU will be molding a young Tiger defense while coaching the team's goalkeepers and assisting with all other day-to-day duties with the program.

Goody served as an assistant and goalkeepers coach with both the men's and women's programs at William Carey University in Hattiesburg, Mississippi, for two seasons in 2012 and 2013.

As a member of the staff, the WCU women were the undefeated champions of the Southern States Athletic Conference in 2013 while posting a perfect 11-0 record in SSAC play. The squad also advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NAIA National Tournament while ending the campaign with an impressive 18-5 overall mark in 2013.

The WCU women have been led by an outstanding defense in recent seasons that has featured two-time First-Team All-SSAC and two-time NAIA All-American goalkeeper Linfah Jones. Goody also coached Jones to the SSAC Freshman of the Year honor in 2012 and a pair of SSAC Defensive Player of the Week honors over the past two seasons.

The WCU men featured an All-SSAC goalkeeper of their own as Goody also coached Charlie Laridan to a Second-Team All-SSAC selection and a pair of SSAC Defensive Player

of the Week honors in 2013.

While working with the men's and women's programs at WCU, he also served as Director of Goalkeeping with the Hattiesburg Youth Soccer Association for two seasons.

An accomplished goalkeeper in his own right, Goody followed his All-American collegiate career at William Carey as a trialist with Doncaster Rovers of the English Sky Bet Championship division and as a training member with DC United of Major League Soccer in 2012. He was also the team captain and Player of the Year with the Gulf Coast Texans of the National Premier Soccer League in 2013.

Goody wrapped up his collegiate career as First-Team NAIA All-American and First-Team All-SSAC and SSAC All-Tournament Team selection during his senior season in 2011. He set WCU's single-season school record of 12 clean sheets while leading the squad to the NAIA Final Four in the NAIA National Tournament in 2011. It was a senior season highlighted by a run of eight-straight clean sheets during his final season at WCU.

Goody graduated from William Carey University in 2011 with a Bachelor of Science in Health and Physical Education with a minor in business, while he is currently pursuing his Master of Science in Counseling Psychology and will graduate in February 2015. 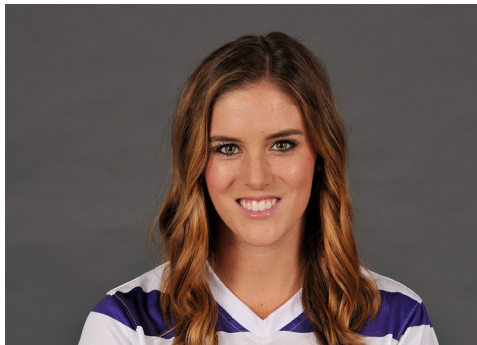

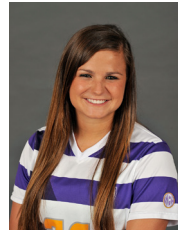

SEASON REVIEW



LSU's Rookie Trio Makes History with All-SEC Selections

For the first time in the history of the Southeastern Conference, three freshmen from the same school received All-SEC recognition in the same season as a trio of LSU rookies in striker Summer Clarke, midfielder Emma Fletcher and defender Megan Lee were named Second-Team All-SEC selections for their performance during the 2013 season. In addition to earning Second-Team All-SEC honors, both Clarke and Fletcher were also named to the SEC All-Freshman Team following the campaign. They are among nine true freshmen in the program's history to earn either a first-team or second-team All-SEC selection. Not before the 2013 season had one school had three freshmen on the All-SEC teams with two freshmen selections being the previous high for an SEC school.

Clarke, Fletcher, Lee Named Freshman All-Americans in 2013

Not only were they recognized as All-SEC performers following the 2013 season, but Summer Clarke, Emma Fletcher and Megan Lee were considered among the very best freshmen in women's soccer with their selections to the TopDrawerSoccer.com Freshman Best XI Teams during the postseason. Fletcher earned a first-team selection, and Clarke and Lee each earned second-team selections by TopDrawerSoccer.com. In fact, LSU Soccer was the only program to feature more than one player among the 22 freshmen honored by TopDrawerSoccer.com with their performance in 2013. In addition, both Clarke and Fletcher were chosen as Soccer America Second-Team All-Freshman performers in the wake of their debut seasons.

Fletcher Sets LSU Freshman Record for Assists

Fletcher enjoyed a record-setting freshman season with the Tigers as one of the SEC's top attacking midfielders while scoring one goal and serving up a team-leading 12 assists for 14 points on the campaign. Fletcher's 12 assists set a new LSU freshman record with her performance as she smashed the school's previous freshman mark of eight assists by Addie Eggleston in 2010. Fletcher was the SEC's top assist maker in 2013 as her 12 assists in all games and eight assists in SEC play topped the league's scoring charts for 2013.

2013 Season Ends in First Round at SEC Tournament

The No. 7-seeded LSU Tigers saw their 2013 season come to an end with a 1-0 extra time defeat to No. 10-seeded Auburn in the first round of the SEC Women's Soccer Tournament when Auburn's senior defender Bianca Sierra won it with a penalty kick in the 97th minute in the opening match of the tournament held at the Orange Beach Sportsplex in Orange Beach, Alabama. The Tigers (9-9-2, 5-5-1 SEC) went out in the first round of the SEC Tournament for the third-straight season following four-straight semifinals appearances from 2007-10. Sierra scored the only goal of the match on a penalty kick after a foul was whistled against LSU in the box in the 97th minute of the first extra time period. Sierra's penalty was fired down the middle as Auburn advanced to the quarterfinals.

Kinneman Goes Out Among All-Time Great Goalkeepers

The 2013 season closed the book on the career of one of the most prolific goalkeepers to ever wear the LSU uniform as Missouri City, Texas, native Megan Kinneman stepped onto the field as an LSU Tiger for the final time. Kinneman ended her collegiate career as LSU's school-record holder with 284 saves during her tenure, nearly 50 more than Mo Isom's 235 saves for the No. 2 spot on the school's all-time list. Kinneman also ranked second in team history with 17 clean sheets, while she also made the second-most appearances by a goalkeeper in team history with 60 appearances and 57 starts from 2010-13. She also contributed on the offensive end with three penalty-kick goals to her credit as she was a perfect 3-for-3 from the spot during her career.

Tigers Catch Fire to Start SEC Play in 2013

With a 1-0 home victory over the Missouri Tigers on Oct. 11 of last season, LSU extended its unbeaten streak to six-straight games to open up SEC play while taking the top spot on the league table with a 5-0-1 mark and 16 points at the halfway point of the 2013 season. It marked LSU's longest unbeaten streak to start SEC play in the program's history, as the Tigers also ran their unbeaten streak to nine-straight SEC regular-season matches dating back to the 2012 season with

their victory over Missouri. LSU's start to the 2013 SEC season also featured a 2-1 extra time win at Vanderbilt, a 1-1 home draw with Tennessee, a 3-2 home win over Mississippi State in extra time, a 5-3 win at Arkansas and a 2-1 extra time win at Alabama.

Canadian Clarke Receives National Acclaim to Start SEC Play

It can be said that rookie striker Summer Clarke announced her arrival in the Southeastern Conference while leading LSU to a road sweep with wins at Arkansas and Alabama early in the SEC season as she scored a hat trick in a 5-3 win over the Razorbacks on Oct. 4 and both goals in a 2-1 extra time win over the Crimson Tide on Oct. 6. By scoring five of the team's seven goals in the weekend sweep, Clarke was honored as the TopDrawerSoccer.com Women's National Player of the Week and the SEC Offensive Player of the Week with one of the truly remarkable offensive displays by an SEC striker during the 2013 season. She became the fourth player in the program's history to earn National Player of the Week honors with her performance.

Tigers Score Historic Shutout Victory over USC Trojans

Senior goalkeeper Megan Kinneman turned in one of the truly great performances of her collegiate career while making seven saves in goal and burying the deciding penalty kick in the 85th minute of play as the Tigers knocked off the previously unbeaten and 13th-ranked USC Trojans in their finale at the Minnesota Gold Classic held at the University of Minnesota. The Tigers snapped a two-game losing skid with their first signature win of the 2013 season with a victory in the inaugural match between the two programs on the soccer pitch. They handed the Trojans their first defeat of the 2013 season with their seventh win over a nationally-ranked opponent all-time.

LSU Soccer Kicks off 2013 Season in National Rankings

The Tigers kicked off the 2013 campaign ranked among the nation's top programs as the No. 25-ranked team nationally in the TopDrawerSoccer.com Preseason Top 25 released on Aug. 14 following their first week of preseason training. After briefly dropping out of the national rankings during the non-conference season, the Tigers returned to the TopDrawerSoccer.com Top 25 while retaking their No. 25 national ranking in the wake of a school-record six-game unbeaten streak to start SEC play. The Tigers raced out to a 5-0-1 mark in SEC play to run their overall record to 9-3-2 at the midway point of the SEC season.

LSU's Recruiting Class of 2014 Ranked No. 7 Nationally

The infusion of world-class talent into the LSU Soccer program continued on National Signing day in February when its Class of 2014 cracked the Top 10 nationally as the No. 7-ranked recruiting class in the country by the editorial staff at TopDrawerSoccer.com. The Tigers signed six international standouts to National Letters of Intent on National Signing Day with goalkeeper Lily Alfeld (Christchurch, New Zealand), striker Jorian Baucom (Scottsdale, Arizona), center back Jordane Carvery (Richmond Hill, Ontario, Canada), midfielder Christyna Pitre (Austin, Texas), midfielder Madeline Ramsey (Rock Hill, South Carolina) and defender Alexis Urch (Round Rock, Texas) officially joined the program. The Tigers later added England youth international central defender Ella Williams (Leatherhead, Surrey, England) to the class later in the 2014 spring season.

Spring Sees Tigers Train with National Teams for U-20 World Cup

Four members of the LSU Soccer program spent much of their spring and summer seasons training with their respective national teams in preparation for the 2014 FIFA Under-20 Women's World Cup held this August with Canada serving as the host nation. All-SEC and Freshman All-American midfielder Emma Fletcher and defender recruit Jordane Carvery each took part in a series of three national EXCEleration training camps with Canada's U-20 squad in February, April and June as they prepared to represent their country at the FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup. All-SEC left back Megan Lee and goalkeeper recruit Lily Alfeld were also among the player pool with New Zealand's U-20 team as they took part in a two-match tour of Brazil in the spring against Brazil's U-20 squad.

Kiwi Lee Earns First International Cap with Football Ferns

Rookie defender Megan Lee reached a career milestone late in the collegiate season when she featured as a late substitute in New Zealand's 1-1 draw with the world's No. 1-ranked United States to claim her first international cap for the Football Ferns in an international friendly match played in October at Crew Stadium in Columbus, Ohio. Lee missed two of LSU's SEC matches late in the season at home against Georgia on Oct. 25 and on the road at 23rd-ranked Kentucky on Oct. 27 while playing with New Zealand's Football Ferns in their two-match series against the United States. Lee came on as a late defensive substitution in stoppage time in the match that ended in a 1-1 draw to become just the second LSU Tiger in team history to earn an international cap at the senior level.

Tigers Tie Team Record with SEC Academic Honor Roll Selections

LSU Soccer tied a program record with 14 selections to the 2013 SEC Academic Honor Roll for the fall semester as the league office announced its academic honorees for their effort in the classroom during the 2013 spring, summer and fall semesters. It was the second time in three seasons that 14 Tigers were named to the SEC Fall Academic Honor Roll as they also received such recognition in 2011. Headlining LSU's selections were five members of its 2013 senior class in Nina Anderson, Addie Eggleston, Megan Kinneman, Danielle Murphy and Alex Ramsey. LSU's other selections included Alex Arlitt, Jodi Calloway, Gracie Campbell, Haley Emerson, Heather Magee, Mariel McLaughlin, Nicole McLaughlin, Fernanda Pina and Tori Sample. In addition, Summer Clarke, Emma Fletcher, Megan Lee and Rebecca Pongetti were each named to the SEC First-Year Academic Honor Roll in the summer following the 2013-14 academic and athletic season.

Arlitt Picks Up Academic All-District Selection by CoSIDA

Houston native Alex Arlitt has not only proven herself as a leader of the LSU Soccer program on the field during her three seasons with the Tigers, but she has also emerged as a leader in the classroom as well in the wake of her selection to the Capital One Academic All-District VI Team as announced by the College Sports Information Directors of America for the 2013 season. Arlitt was honored with a sparkling 3.87 cumulative grade-point average while pursuing her degree in accounting.

Tigers Receive NSCAA Academic Award for Classroom Excellence

Members of the LSU Soccer program were also honored by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America for their academic performance by earning the NSCAA Team Academic Award while maintaining a strong 3.05 cumulative team GPA for the 2012-13 academic year. The Tigers were among 593 women's programs nationwide to finish the year with at least a cumulative team GPA of 3.0 or higher in 2012-13. The NSCAA's selection included 13 of the 14 squads in the SEC as the Tigers joined the likes of Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi State, Missouri, Ole Miss, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas A&M and Vanderbilt. It marked the second year in a row that the Tigers claimed the NSCAA Team Academic Award after also maintaining a 3.21 GPA for 2011-12.

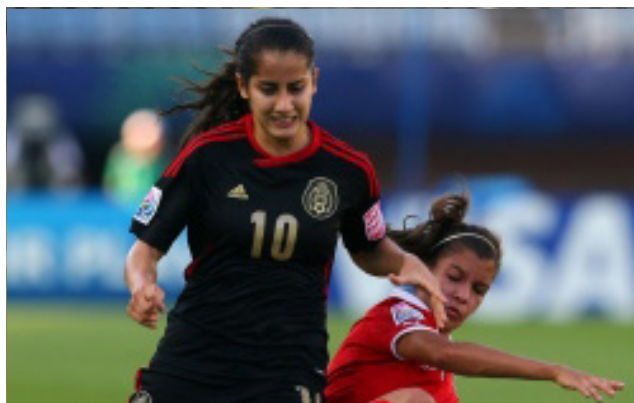

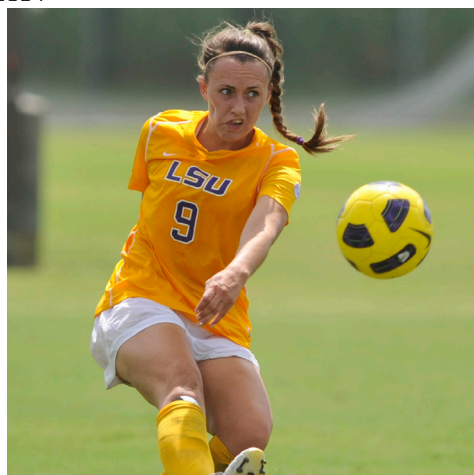

Each year, the Heisman Trophy Trust presents the famed Heisman Trophy to the most outstanding college football player in the country. In the sport of college soccer, athletes from across the country compete each season for the right to raise the Hermann Trophy as the premier soccer player in the NCAA as presented by the Missouri Athletic Club in St. Louis.

Considered the highest honor in intercollegiate soccer, the recipient of the Hermann Trophy is selected each year by Division I head coaches who are certified members of the National Soccer Coaches Association of America. After releasing the Hermann Trophy Watch List each preseason, the field is then cut to 15 semifinalists in November before three finalists are named prior to the NCAA Women's College Cup in early December.

The LSU Soccer program has been represented on the Hermann Trophy Watch List twice in its history as former Tiger All-American Malorie Rutledge was recognized as one of the top players in the country by the Missouri Athletic Club. While Rutledge never made the cut as one of the award's 15 semifinalists, she certainly earned a reputation as being one of the elite talents in all of college soccer with a brilliant four-year career from 2006-09.
