The Tiger Cup



In 2012, the LSU Soccer program was awarded the Tiger Cup for the fourth year in a row by the Tiger Athletic Foundation for its outstanding community service efforts.

LSU SOCCER'S TIGER CUP STREAK SNAPPED IN 2013

Members of the LSU Soccer program were honored for the fourth-straight season as the team most deserving of the prestigious Tiger Cup with their performance on the field, in the classroom and in the community during the annual Tiger Athletic Foundation Academic Excellence Gala held in the spring of 2012.

The 2012 TAF Academic Excellence Gala was held at the Royal Cotillion Ballroom at the LSU Student Union as members from each of LSU's 19 varsity sports were honored during the festivities.

It marked the fourth-straight year in which members of the LSU Soccer program were named as the winners of the Tiger Cup after also receiving the award in 2009, 2010 and 2011.

In 2011, the Tigers captured their fourth SEC Western Division championship and fourth at-large berth into the NCAA Tournament in five seasons while posting a 13-8-1 overall record with an 8-3 mark and 24 points in conference play. The Tigers earned a second-place finish in the final SEC team standings as the runner-up for the SEC Championship for the third time in four seasons.

In addition to their success on the field in 2011, members of the LSU Soccer program logged 568 hours of community service to rank No. 2 among all men's and women's athletic programs at LSU, which equals an average of 23.5 community service hours completed per player. The Tigers also maintained an impressive 3.173 cumulative team GPA for the 2011 spring and fall semesters.

LSU Soccer saw its run of winning four-straight Tiger Cups snapped in 2013 when this year's TAF Academic Excellence Gala was held at the Pete Maravich Assembly Center on the night of March 11.

WHAT IS THE TIGER CUP?

The Tiger Cup is an award presented by the Tiger Athletic Foundation each year to the athletic program at LSU that best represents the University in competition, in the classroom and in the community. The recipient of the Tiger Cup is determined by combining a team's final conference and national ranking with its performance on the field along with its cumulative team grade-point average and community service hours accumulated off the field during the previous academic year.



The New LSU SOCCER STADIUM

The LSU Soccer Stadium has earned a reputation as being one of the more intimidating venues for an opposing team to compete in all of college soccer. That is evident in the fact that the Tigers boast a strong 38-10-10 home record with an impressive .741 winning percentage over the last six seasons. LSU enters a new era of SEC soccer in 2013 as winners of four SEC Western Division titles with four NCAA Tournament appearances during that span. The 2013 season marks the first in which SEC teams will not be divided into divisions while also competing for the league championship.

On the strength of its recent success, the LSU Soccer Stadium has received extensive renovations in recent years as the program continues its ascent to the pinnacle of the SEC and the NCAA. The venue is now a home worthy of an emerging power in women's college soccer. In March 2011, construction teams broke ground on Phase 2 of the renovation as \$2.3 million was invested to transform the facility while creating additional seating, installing new lighting and building a new press box for the media and concession stand and restrooms for the LSU supporters to enjoy.

By adding a second level of bleacher seating to the existing structure, the official capacity of the new-look LSU Soccer Stadium has increased to 2,197, easily accommodating a fanbase that has created one of the more intimidating home-field advantages in the SEC. In addition, new gates have been built on the west side of the complex with brick columns throughout. New gating has also been installed at the top of the bleachers.

Fans attending future matches at the LSU Soccer Stadium will also benefit from the

addition of the permanent concession stand located directly below the press box. With the building of two new restrooms at the facility, it now features a total of four as men's and women's facilities are located at both ends of the stadium.

Members of the media also enjoy a brand new press box that has been constructed to make the covering of future matches a stateof-the-art experience. Not only has the size of the press box interior increased to 333 square feet, but hard-wired internet has been installed across the work space along with a wireless internet signal that has already been accessible in recent seasons. In addition, television cameras and videographers have access to the newly-installed crow's nest on the roof of the press box in a space that also features wired internet access.

10. 1,628 Aug. 28, 2009 vs. Southern Miss (LSU won 3-0) The Tigers have been nearly unbeatable at the LSU Soccer Stadium under the direction of head coach Brian Lee as they enter the fall with a 44-12-12 home mark since 2006. The squad has only dropped 10 decisions at home in the last six seasons as it followed an unbeaten 5-0-3 home slate in 2007 with an impressive 8-1 campaign in 2008, a 7-1-2 season in 2009, a 6-2-1 mark in 2010 and a stellar 7-1-1 season in 2011 before an even 5-5-3 campaign a year ago.

In fact, LSU's home dominance is highlighted by a school record 18-game home unbeaten streak that came to an end on Oct. 26, 2008, with a narrow 2-1 defeat to the sixth-ranked Florida Gators.

2013 marks the 18th season in the life of the LSU Soccer Stadium, which was first opened on Sept. 13, 1996, when the Tigers hosted SEC rival Tennessee.

A new era was born in 2011 with the grand re-opening of the LSU Soccer Stadium as the Tigers set the attendance record on Sept. 9 when 2,542 supporters witnessed a 1-0 blanking of the Oregon Ducks to open the LSU Invitational. That smashed the previous attendance mark of 2,402 fans that saw the Tigers pitch a 3-0 shutout of sixth-ranked Tennessee for the team's first win over an opponent ranked among the Top 10 teams in the nation.

The Tigers then raised the bar again in their home opener in 2012 when a new record of 2,624 fans turned out to witness the Tigers play visiting Rice to a 1-1 draw on Aug. 24 of a season ago.

In fact, the Tigers set the all-time attendance record three times during the 2007 season and finished the campaign ranked No. 10 nationally in average attendance and No. 7 in the country in average paid attendance while drawing 1,294 fans per match. LSU nearly matched that record when finishing the 2011 campaign ranked No. 17 in the nation with an average attendance of 1,174 fans in its nine matches at the LSU Soccer Stadium.

The program made history again in 2009 as the Tigers were awarded a No. 4 national seed in the NCAA Tournament and the former LSU Soccer Complex was selected as a regional host site of the NCAA First and Second Rounds for the first time, solidifying its reputation as one of the most intimidating venues in all of college soccer.



LSU Soccer Stadium



The LSU Soccer Stadium boasts a modern and spacious locker room that includes locker rooms for the Tigers, as well as facilities for opponents and game officials. The venue also provides an on-site training room, a meeting room and lounge for the team and offices for the LSU coaching staff.



LOCKER ROOM RENOVATIONS


The locker room facility at the LSU Soccer Stadium recently underwent an extensive \$200,000 renovation project that included the addition of a brand new visitor's locker room on the south end of the facility. The former visitor's locker room was expanded to 2,000 square feet and converted into a state-of-the-art squad room and lounge for the Tigers to enjoy. The facility underwent further renovations in the spring of 2007 as the LSU Athletic Department invested \$250,000 into a total reconstruction of the facility's playing surface. The field was flattened and covered with a hybrid Bermuda grass called Mississippi Choice similar to the sand-based playing surface in Tiger Stadium. It also features a brand new drainage and irrigation system to keep the field in pristine condition year round.



Indoor Practice FACILITY

When the weather prevents the team from practicing at the LSU Soccer Stadium, the squad moves inside to the climate-controlled indoor football practice facility. The indoor facility was built as part of a \$15 million upgrade in the early 1990s and houses a 100yard football field that was renovated with brand new Momentum Field Turf in the spring of 2006.

Nutrition First

LSU is one of the few schools nationally that maintains a state-of-theart nutritional program for today's student-athlete. Senior Associate Athletic Trainer Shelly Mullenix coordinates with LSU dining services to provide a balanced training table diet. LSU athletic trainers also meet one-on-one with student-athletes to give them expert nutritional information.

LSU boasts the largest and most complete athletic training facilities in all of collegiate athletics with both the Operations Center and the Broussard Center for Athletic Training in Tiger Stadium. Both are furnished with the latest in technology and equipment. The Operations Center training room features a full view of the practice fields, two hot/ cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill. The Broussard Center includes an on-site x-ray room, an in-house pharmacy and a hydrotherapy pool. It is also one of the few collegiate training centers with a full-service pharmacy, vision center and dental center.



Hydrotherapy Treatment

An integral part of rehabbing and developing LSU student-athletes is the operations center's hot/cold jacuzzis and an underwater treadmill in a fully-equipped Hydrotherapy room. The Broussard Training Center boasts the largest hydrotherapy pool in both collegiate and professional sports.

The two-story, 22,000-square-foot facility contains 20 treatment tables with the newest forms of modalities available, 14 taping stations, a 1,600-square-foot rehabilitation area which contains the latest rehabilitation equipment including the Cybex Norm, Woodway treadmills and Body Master select rise equipment. LSU's multi-million dollar athletic training facility is named in honor of Dr. Martin J. Broussard (left), the legendary trainer whose career spanned more than 40 years at LSU.

Road To Recovery

The athletic training staff takes a progressive approach to injury identification and thinks "outside of the box." LSU consults with allied health professionals and uses state-of-the-art surgical procedures that give an athlete a quicker recovery time while looking out for his or her future.



Dental Center

A fully functional dental center, staffed by Dr. Robin Levy and Dr. John Vance, is located inside the Broussard Center for Athletic Training.



Rehabilitation

LSU's Broussard Center for Athletic Training boasts some of the most technologically advanced equipment to aid the recuperation and rehabilitation of LSU's student-athletes.



Real-Time X-Rays

A new state-of-the-art fluoroscope was added in the summer of 2008 that will provide LSU athletic trainers the opportunity to take x-rays on site in the Operations Center. The machine can provide real-time images of the internal structures of a patient.



Gameday Wellness

The full-time athletic training staff, along with 10 graduate assistants, prepares the players for gameday in the comfort of Tiger Stadium hours before kickoff.

The following nine individuals are the only athletes to have their jerseys retired by LSU. Men's basketball has retired the No. 23 for Pete Maravich, No. 50 for Bob Pettit, Jr., No. 33 for Shaquille O'Neal and No. 40 for Rudy Macklin. Women's basketball retired the No. 33 for Seimone Augustus. Football's only two retired jerseys are the No. 20 worn by Billy Cannon and the No. 37 worn by Tommy Casanova. Baseball retired the No. 15 in honor of longtime coach and former athletics director Skip Bertman and the No. 20 for Ben McDonald. Casanova, Macklin and McDonald joined the prestigious list in May 2009. Augustus became the first woman in LSU Athletics history to have her jersey retired in January 2010.

50 Bob Pettit

Pettit led LSU to its first NCAA Final Four in 1953 and later became the first player in NBA history to exceed the 20,000-point barrier. Pettit is a member of the NBA Hall of Fame, and in 1997, he was named as one of the Top 50 players in NBA history.




23 Pete Maravich

"Pistol Pete" Maravich still holds the NCAA record for career points with 3,667 and for career scoring average with 44.2 points per game. He was selected the National Player of the Year in 1970 after leading the Tigers to the NIT Final Four. He scored 50-plus points an amazing 28 times. He went on to a 10-year professional career and was selected as one of the NBA's 50 greatest players in 1997.



20 Billy Cannon

One of the true legends of college football in the South, Cannon was the 1959 Heisman Trophy winner and helped the Tigers to the 1958 national title. Cannon's most memorable performance came in 1959 against Ole Miss when No. 1 LSU trailed No. 3 Ole Miss, 3-O, in the fourth quarter. He fielded a punt, broke seven tackles and returned it 89 yards for a touchdown in a 7-3 victory. He went on to a successful 11-year professional career.



33 Shaquille O'Neal

O'Neal was the first pick in the 1992 NBA Draft. He was named MVP of the league in 2000 and was a three-time NBA Finals MVP after leading the Los Angeles Lakers to three World Championships. At LSU, O'Neal averaged 21.6 points and 13.6 rebounds per game for his career, and in 1991, he was named the World's Amateur Athlete of the Year as well as SEC Athlete of the Year and National Player of the Year. In 1997, he was named as one of the Top 50 players in NBA history.



15 Skip Bertman

A legend in the college baseball ranks, Bertman created a dynasty at LSU, guiding the Tigers to five national titles in a 10-year stretch from 1991-2000. He also coached the United States to a bronze medal at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta and was an assistant on the gold-medal-winning U.S. squad in Seoul, South Korea, in 1988. Bertman retired from coaching following the 2001 season and served as LSU's athletics director for seven years. Bertman was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006.



40 Rudy Macklin


Rudy Macklin was a two-time basketball All-American selection during his Tiger career from 1976-81 during which time he became LSU's all-time leading rebounder with 1,276 boards and the secondleading scorer in school history behind only the legendary Pete Maravich with 2,080 points. He led the Tigers to two Elite Eight appearances and the 1981 Final Four in Philadelphia. He still holds the school single-game rebound record with 32, a mark that, like some of the great records in any sport, may never be broken.

About LSU Retired Jerseys

The retirement of the jerseys of Casanova, McDonald, Macklin and Augustus comes under a new provision of the LSU jersey retirement bylaws that says the retirement of an athlete's jersey in a particular sport does not preclude a current student-athlete in that sport from wearing the jersey number in that or any other sport, subject to the discretion of the head coach. This provision applies only to jerseys retired after January 1, 2007, so the numbers worn by Maravich, Pettit, O'Neal, Cannon and Bertman may never again be worn by future student-athletes in their respective sports. To have a jersey retired at LSU, an athlete must have completed intercollegiate competition for LSU a minimum of five years prior to nomination. Athletes must have demonstrated truly unusual and outstanding accomplishments, exceeding and in addition to all criteria used for Hall of Fame selection. Nominees must have a unanimous vote of support from the Hall of Fame committee.



37 Tommy Casanova

Tommy Casanova is the only three-time All-American in the history of LSU football and is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame. During his Tiger career from 1969-71, Casanova personified versatility for his myriad of talents as he played offense and defense while returning punts and kickoffs. One of just two three-time All-SEC performers at LSU, he played six seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals of the NFL while earning his medical degree.



19 Ben McDonald

Ben McDonald won the prestigious Golden Spikes Award, given annually to the nation's most outstanding player, in 1989 and is a member of the College Baseball Hall of Fame. He led LSU to two College World Series appearances. In 1989, McDonald was named National Player of the Year by Baseball America, The Sporting News and Collegiate Baseball. He was selected by the Baltimore Orioles as the No. 1 pick in the Major League Draft in 1989 and went on to enjoy a 10-year major league career with the Orioles and the Milwaukee Brewers.



33 Seimone Augustus

Seimone Augustus is the only women's basketball player in school history to earn State Farm Coaches Association All-America honors three times in 2004, 2005 and 2006. Augustus became LSU's first NCAA National Player of the Year and she claimed the honor twice in 2005 and 2006. A 2006 graduate of LSU, Augustus was the 2012 WNBA Finals MVP after winning a world title. She also led the United States to Olympic gold medals in Beijing in 2008 and in London in 2012.

Shaquille O'Neal

A four-time NBA champion and 15-time All-Star, Shaquille O'Neal is one of the most dominant centers in NBA history. He announced his retirement from the NBA in June 2010 after a brilliant Hall of Fame career and has since become a television analyst on TNT. One of the most quotable figures on the planet, O'Neal earned his bachelor's degree from LSU in December 2000. In 2011, he penned his own biography, "Shaq Uncut, My Story," and then received his doctorate degree from Florida's Barry University in May 2012.

A three-time national champion hurdler at LSU, Lolo Jones continues to take the sporting world by storm. Jones became an inspirational figure as a two-time World Indoor Champion and the American record holder in



the 60-meter hurdles with a time of 7.72. She competed in both the 2008 Beijing and 2012 London Olympic Games and became the first LSU athlete to ever grace the cover of Time Magazine in July 2012. On the Prowl

Mike the Tiger was recently ranked in the top three in a Bleacher Report poll of college football's top live mascots. Mike's habitat is one of the most visited attractions in the state of Louisiana, and is located in the shadows of the north endzone of Tiger Stadium.

History of Mike

Few mascots in the country are as admired as Mike the Tiger. LSU's live Bengal mascot serves as the graphic image of all LSU athletic teams. The school has had six mascots, with the most recent, Mike VI, taking over the reign prior to the 2007 national championship football season. LSU veterinarian Dr. David Baker began the search for the young tiger after his predecessor, Mike V, died in May 2007 of renal failure at the age of 17. The eight-year old Bengal/Siberian mix, formerly known as "Roscoe," was donated to LSU by Great Cats of Indiana in Idaville, Ind., a nonprofit sanctuary and rescue facility for big cats and other large carnivores.

Mike's rīde through Tiger Stadium before home games in a travel trailer topped by the LSU cheerleaders is a school tradition. Before entering the stadium, his trailer on wheels is parked next to the opponent's locker room in the southeast end of the stadium. Opposing players must make their way past Mike's trailer to reach their locker room.

Tradition dictates that the Tigers will score a touchdown for every growl issued by Mike before a football game. For many years, Mike was prompted to roar by pounding on the cage. Objections of cruel punishment brought about the use of recorded growls

to play to the crowd before the games. That practice was discontinued shortly afterward, and today, Mike participates in the pregame tradition without provocation.

In the mid-1980s, pranksters cut the locks on Mike IV's cage and freed him in the early-morning hours just days before the annual LSU-Tulane clash. Mike roamed free, playfully knocking down several small pine trees in the area, before being trapped in the Bernie Moore Track Stadium where police used tranquilizer guns to capture and return the Bengal Tiger to his home.

The incident was reminiscent of a kidnapping of Mike I many years ago by Tulane students before a Tiger-Green Wave battle.

1936-1956

Mike I

The original Mike was purchased from the Little Rock Zoo in 1936 for \$750, with money contributed by the student body. Originally known as "Sheik" at the time of his nurchase, his name was changed to Mike to honor Mike Chambers who served as LSU's athletic trainer when the first mascot was purchased. The first Mike was housed in the Baton Rouge Zoo for one year before a permanent home was constructed near Tiger Stadium. Mike I reigned for 20 years before dving of pneumonia.



Mike's Habitat

In 2005, a new environment (above) was created for Mike that is 15,000 square feet in size with lush planting, a large live oak tree, a beautiful waterfall and a stream evolving from a rocky backdrop overflowing with plants and trees. The habitat has, as a backdrop, an Italianate tower - a campanile - that creates a visual bridge to the Italianate architectural vernacular that is the underpinning of the image of the entire beautiful LSU campus. This spectacular habitat features state-of-the-art technologies, research, conservation and husbandry programs, as well as educational, interpretive and recreational activities. It is, in essence, one of the largest and finest Tiger habitats in the United States.





Sneaux Day

On Dec. 11, 2008, a winter storm that hadn't been seen in decades blanketed Baton Rouge. The early white Christmas gave Mike VI, LSU's live Bengal/Siberian tiger, a chance to relax and play in nearly two inches of accumulation.



1956-1958

Mike II

The second Mike served a brief reign, lasting only through the 1957 season before dying of pneumonia in the spring of 1958. He was born at the Audubon Zoo in New Orleans and came to LSU on Sept. 28, 1956. The young tiger was held overnight in Tiger Stadium and unveiled Sept. 29, the opening day of the football season.



1958-1976

Mike III Just in time for the 1958 national

championship season, Mike III was purchased from the Woodland Park Zoo in Seattle, Wash., following a "national search" by then-athletic director Jim Corbett. The student body contributed \$1,500 for the purchase of the tiger. Mike III served as mascot for 18 seasons, dying after the only losing season of his reign, as LSU posted a 5-6 record in 1975.



1976-1990

Mike IV reigned over Tiger athletics for 14 years after being donated to the school by August A. Busch III from the Dark Continent Amusement Park in Tampa, Fla, on Aug. 29, 1976. Born on May 15, 1974, Mike's age and health were determining factors in his retirement to the Baton Rouge Zoo in 1990. Mike IV died of old age in March 1995 at the age of 21.



Mike V

Mike V was donated by Dr. Thomas and Caroline Atchison of the Animal House Zoological Park in Moulton, Ala. Dr. Sheldon Bivin of the LSU School of Veterinary Medicine traveled to Alabama and brought the baby tiger back to Baton Rouge. Born Oct. 18, 1989, the new tiger was introduced to LSU fans at a basketball game against Alabama in February 1990. He officially began his reign on April 30, 1990, when he was moved into the tiger habitat across from Tiger Stadium. Mike V died on May 18, 2007, at the age of 17.



2007-present




Mike VI arrived in Baton Rouge on Aug. 25, 2007, thanks to the donation by Great Cats of Indiana. He was officially designated as the successor to Mike V on Sept. 8 when LSU played host to Virginia Tech. Six days later, on Sept. 14, 2007, a ceremony was held to honor Mike V and dedicate the habitat to Mike VI. The eight-year-old Bengal/ Siberian mix, formerly known as "Roscoe," reigned over a football national title in his first year and. most recently, a 2011 Southeastern Conference championship and perfect regular season.

In its storied athletics history, LSU has produced 46 NCAA national team championships and 123 Southeastern Conference team championships. The 2012-13 athletic year was another successful one. Paul Mainieri's baseball team tied the school record for wins with 57 while claiming its second-straight SEC Tournament championship (above) and reaching the College World Series. The gymnastics team under the direction of D-D Breaux advanced to the Super Six for the third time in school history as **Rheagan Courville** (top left) claimed the NCAA vault national title. Les Miles guided LSU football to its third straight 10-win season. Nikki Caldwell's LSU Lady Tiger basketball squad reached the Sweet 16 for the first time since 2008. Meanwhile, track star **Kimberlyn Duncan** (top right) claimed NCAA indoor and outdoor national titles in the 200 meters.

Alleva is currently serving a fiveyear term on the prestigious NCAA Men's Basketball Committee, reinforcing his position as one of the most respected athletic administrators in the country.

Upon his arrival at LSU, Alleva unveiled a strategic master plan for the LSU athletics program – "LSU: Thru and True" – to ensure the advancement and future of LSU Athletics as an exemplary program. The central mission of the plan is to create an environment for student-athletes to reach their ultimate potential, prepare them to be champions in life and to set out goals and values for the entire athletics program.

Alleva's vision will keep LSU among the nation's leaders in athletic facilities. He launched an aggressive fund-raising campaign to replace several hundred windows in Tiger Stadium that were in disrepair, and a new coating to the facade of the structure has given the old stadium new life. A renovated gating system on the west side of the stadium debuted in the fall of 2012 to include a plaza that celebrates LSU's football national championships and recognition walls that honor Tiger All-Americans. A new plaza will open on the north end of the stadium in the fall of 2013, further enriching the experience of visitors to the LSU campus.

A new lighting system was installed prior to last season that turns the upper archways of the north end of the stadium purple and gold and lights the iconic "LSU" on the stadium's north scoreboard. In addition, "Tiger Stadium" in 10-foot tall illuminated letters sits just below the west upper deck facing Nicholson Drive.

Also in the fall of 2012, LSU began construction on an expansion of the South End Zone of the stadium – a project that will add premium seating, general public seating and two state-of-the-art video boards – continuing an effort to augment one of the most iconic venues in all of college sports. The project will be completed in time for the start of the 2014 football season.

Under Alleva's direction, LSU's world-renowned track and field program received a state-of the-art running surface in 2010 when a new track was installed in Bernie Moore Track Stadium and extensive renovations to the LSU Soccer Stadium were completed in the fall of 2011.

Alleva directed a major renovation to the University Club golf course that was completed in September 2010 and allows the LSU men's and women's golf teams to compete on one of the most challenging courses in the country. The renovated course helped prepare Tiger

LSU Vice Chancellor/Director of Athletics

Joe Alleva continues to bring unprecedented national recognition to LSU as Vice Chancellor and Director of Athletics. Under Alleva's leadership, LSU enjoys one of the country's premier athletics programs with success on and off the field of competition. Now in his sixth year at LSU, Alleva is dedicated to athletic and academic excellence, and is committed to providing the opportunities and the resources necessary for student-athletes to excel in competition, in the classroom and in the community. Alleva joined the LSU family on April 4, 2008, after a highly successful tenure as director of athletics at Duke University for 10 years. Alleva's role at LSU was further expanded in August 2009 when vice chancellor was added to his title by the LSU Board of Supervisors. It is the first time in school history that the director of athletics has also held a vice chancellor position.

golfers John Peterson and Austin Ernst, respectively, to win 2011 NCAA men's and women's individual championships, marking the first time both titles were claimed by players from the same school. The LSU men's team in 2013 played host to an NCAA Regional for the first time in the school's illustrious golf historv.

Future plans include a new gymnastics practice facility, a new tennis complex featuring indoor and outdoor courts, and a state-of-the-art Nutrition Center for Student-Athletes, a facility that will house full-time chefs and nutritionists and provide the best dietary selections for all Fighting Tiger competitors.

LSU's prominence was evident in the final 2012-13 Learfield Sports Director's Cup standings that recognize the nation's best athletic programs, as the Tigers finished in the Top 20 for the eighth consecutive year.

The year was highlighted by another 10-win season and bowl appearance for the Fighting Tiger football team, which recorded a double-digit victory total for the sixth time in eight years. The men's basketball program was rejuvenated by first-year coach Johnny Jones, who directed the Tigers to a 19-12 mark while placing LSU back into consideration for a postseason berth. Women's basketball continued its rise under second-year coach Nikki Caldwell, who guided the Lady Tigers to LSU's first Sweet 16 berth in five years.

The 2013 Fighting Tiger baseball team established a school record for victories with 57 and earned the school's 16th College World Series appearance while capturing SEC Western Division and SEC Tournament titles. The softball squad won the SEC West and played host to an NCAA Regional in Tiger Park before record crowds. The LSU gymnastics team reached the prestigious Super Six for the third time in six seasons, and the women's track team, led by Bowerman Award winner and national sprint champion Kimberlyn Duncan, placed fourth in the final NCAA Outdoor standings.

But the 2012-13 year was about more than just athletic success. Living up to Alleva's mantra of "competition, classroom, community," LSU studentathletes logged more than 4,475 hours in community service work across 20 sports through LSU's Geaux Givers program. And a total of 89 proud Tigers received their degrees from the University during LSU commencement ceremonies in December and May.

The Tigers in 2011-12 finished fourth in both the men's and women's Capital

One Cup competition that identifies athletic excellence. LSU was one of only two schools in the country – and the only one in the SEC – to rank in the top four in both categories.

Eighteen of the Tigers' 20 varsity sports participated in NCAA postseason competition in 2011-12. The year was highlighted by the football team's undefeated regular season, an SEC championship and an appearance in the BCS National Championship Game. The Lady Tiger track and field team captured the SEC championship while the LSU softball squad advanced to the Women's College World Series. The Fighting Tiger baseball team won the 2012 SEC championship, and LSU led the nation in attendance for the 17th-straight season. The 2011-12 season marked the first time in school history that LSU won the SEC title in both football and baseball in the same athletic year.

Outstanding performances of the 2010-11 athletic season included the exploits of the Fighting Tiger football squad that posted an 11-2 mark – including a Cotton Bowl victory – and finished the season ranked No. 8 in the nation. The year also featured Top 5 national finishes both indoors and outdoors by the men's and women's track and field teams.

In 2008-09, all 20 LSU sports competed in NCAA postseason play for the first time in school history and the Tiger baseball team won the national championship. LSU ranked second among Southeastern Conference teams in the Learfield Director's Cup All-Sports standings and finished in the Top 20 for the sixth year in a row.

With a strong commitment to academics, Alleva ensures that the Cox Communications Academic Center for Student-Athletes is a first-class facility that provides student-athletes the resources necessary for success in the classroom and personal development. The facility was recently enhanced by the addition of a media training center that gives student-athletes valuable assistance in improving their communications skills.

And with a strong emphasis on community service and outreach programs, the implementation under Alleva's direction of the "Geaux Givers" program fosters a relationship between the local community and LSU studentathletes, who regularly participate in philanthropic events. In addition, Alleva has bolstered the department's L-Club program to reach out and connect with former student-athletes.

Alleva oversees a staff of outstanding coaches and he has made

critical additions to LSU's coaching staff in recent years. He hired former LSU guard Johnny Jones in April 2012 to breathe new life and enthusiasm into the men's basketball program and last year added Julia Sell as the new women's tennis coach. In 2011, he lured the dynamic Nikki Caldwell to LSU to coach the Lady Tiger basketball team and then hired Beth Torina to direct the Tiger softball program, both of whom immediately returned their respective programs to NCAA postseason success.

Alleva is an innovator with bold ideas that benefit not only LSU but all of Greater Baton Rouge. He has been instrumental in the planning of the Bayou Country Superfest, a two-day country music concert and festival held in Tiger Stadium each spring. The event attracts nearly 100,000 visitors to the LSU campus and makes a tremendous economic impact upon the local community.

Alleva has served on numerous national committees throughout his career including the Football Bowl Certification Committee, the NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet and several Southeastern Conference and Atlantic Coast Conference committees.

He became director of athletics at Duke in 1998 and his impressive tenure there propelled the University into the ranks of America's top allaround collegiate programs. Among his outstanding list of accomplishments includes the greatest 10-year period in Duke Athletics, winning more ACC and NCAA championships than in any other decade in school history.

Alleva, whose hometown is Suffern, N.Y., majored in Finance at Lehigh University and received his bachelor's degree in 1975. While at Lehigh, Alleva was the quarterback of the football team and team captain in 1974. Alleva also played on the Lehigh baseball team. He served as a graduate assistant football coach and earned an MBA in 1976.

While at Duke, Alleva played a key role in Durham's community sports scene. He started Little League Baseball in Durham more than 20 years ago, and also began the American Legion baseball program.

He is a member of the North Carolina American Legion Hall of Fame, Suffern High School Hall of Fame and the Rockland County Hall of Fame.

Alleva and his wife, Annie, have three children, J.D., Jeff, and Jenny. Joe and Annie recently welcomed their first grandchild, Harper, the daughter of Jenny and husband Kyle Young.



YOUTHFUL TIGERS FEATURE INTERNATIONAL FLAIR IN 2013 SEASON

There is but one word to describe the caliber of recruit making its way to Baton Rouge in recent seasons as head coach Brian Lee and his coaching staff look to lead the squad into the SEC title chase once again as he begins his ninth season at the helm in 2013. That word? World-class.

Under Lee's direction, the Tigers most recently earned their third second-place finish in the race for the SEC regular season championship during the 2011 season as they said goodbye to a heralded senior class featuring a trio of All-SEC performers and Canadian internationals Taryne Boudreau, Allysha Chapman and Natalie Martineau. They were leaders of a class that scored SEC silver in 2008, 2009 and 2011 while tying a class record of 50 wins in four seasons at LSU.

Lee has certainly followed that formula in turning the Tigers into title contenders in years to come after signing nine recruits with international experience on National Signing Day in 2012 and 2013. That includes youth national team veterans hailing from Canada, Mexico, New Zealand and the United States looking to make their mark on the program for years to come.

That youth will team with a strong crop of upperclassmen to lead the Tigers into the 2013 season as they charge toward the top of the table in this new era of SEC soccer.

"The Southeastern Conference and college soccer as a whole is just so much stronger today than it's really ever been," Lee said. "With the success we've enjoyed in our time here, this program has been able to attract some of the best youth players from across the globe to remain in the championship picture year in and year out. That shows the power of the LSU brand.

"We've been so very close to winning our first SEC championship and breaking through in the NCAA Tournament here these last several years. We continue to work toward that here this season and on into the future with the next generation of LSU Soccer."

The Tigers are blessed with senior leadership on each level of the field with the likes of Megan Kinneman, Addie Eggleston and Alex Ramsey returning for their final season in the squad this fall. Kinneman reestablished herself as one of the SEC's premier goalkeepers with her efforts a season ago, and she will look to lead the defense with Eggleston who returns to the lineup as the team's starting right back. Ramsey will drive the engine in the central midfield.

This senior trio has combined for 143 starts in 167 career appearances for the Tigers over the past three seasons as they look to set the pace again this fall. The Tigers also feature two experienced juniors who look to battle one another for the top spot in the defensive midfield this season as Alex Arlitt and Jodi Calloway are the only Tigers to start all 43 matches for the club over the past two seasons.

Arlitt is arguably the most versatile Tiger on the 2013 roster with the ability to star for the team in either attacking or defensive midfield roles or in central defense as a leader of the back line. Despite playing mostly a defensive role for the Tigers as a sophomore a year ago, Arlitt even tied as the team's leading goal scorer with a career-high four goals on the 2012 campaign.

She turned in one of the great individual performances in the program's history in a 3-2 overtime victory over Ole Miss a year ago when she almost single-handedly brought the Tigers back from a 2-0 halftime deficit for a historic win in 0xford. Arlitt scored LSU's first goal for the match early in the second half, assisted the game-tying goal minutes later and drew the penalty in overtime that led to the winning soot kick in a defeat of their SEC rivals.

Like Arlitt, Calloway has also cracked LSU's starting 11 as either a defensive midfielder or center back in all 43 fixtures over the past two seasons as she also owns a wealth of experience at the NCAA Division I level.

"The teams we've had here in recent years have all blended together a mixture of talented upperclassmen to give us the experience and leadership we need along with the young players we are working to integrate into program," Lee said. "We're fortunate to have that kind of experience and leadership once again as we prepare for a new season."

After getting their first taste of college soccer with strong freshman seasons a year ago, Heather Magee and Fernanda Pina return as the team's starting wingers as they will help generate the attack in the midfield as part of the strongest unit on the field.

Pina matched Arlitt's output with four goals to tie as the team's leading goal scorer in her debut season with the Tigers. Her 12 total points also tied for the top spot on the club's scoresheet last season. Magee enjoyed a measure of success of her own as each of her two goals scored were game-winners to match Pina's winning output in 2012.

And Lee and his staff certainly strengthened each level of the squad with the addition of five world-class talents on National Signing Day in February to solidify another Top 15 recruiting class for the second-straight season.

Joining the program is a quartet of FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup veterans with striker Summer Clarke (Canada), attacking midfielder Emma Fletcher (New Zealand) and left back Megan Lee (New Zealand) and center back Rebecca Pongetti (Canada) starting for their countries in the tournament held in the Eastern European nation of Azerbaijan last fall. The Tigers also welcome a capped member of the Mexican Women's National Team into the program as junior transfer Natalia Gomez-Junco makes her way to Baton Rouge following her two-year stint at the University of Memphis.

Gomez-Junco, who is likely to redshirt during the 2012 season, is an attacking midfielder with a strong international pedigree making seven career appearances for Mexico at the FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in 2010 and 2012. She recently earned her first two international caps as a member of Mexico's senior squad at the Algarve Cup held in Portugal this past spring.

"We're very excited about the youth that will be featured in the squad this season," Lee said. "Our staff has done a tremendous job of identifying and recruiting some truly world-class players into the program these last couple of seasons, which is what we'll need to return to the top of the table. We'll follow up with an even stronger recruiting class again this season."

The Tigers are set to kick off the 2013 regular season on Aug. 23 with a home match with in-state rival Louisiana Tech as fans will have their first chance to see this year's squad.

While preparing for a rigorous slate of SEC fixtures, the Tigers will compete against their eight-game nonconference schedule highlighted by a Monday Night Futbol contest with BYU on Sept. 2 as the Cougars are just one year removed from earning a No. 1 national seed and claiming a spot in the Elite Eight of the 2012 NCAA Division I Women's Soccer Tournament.

Also headlining the non-conference schedule is a trip to Minneapolis, Minn., on Sept. 6-8 for an appearance at the Minnesota Gold Classic where the Tigers will face the Minnesota Golden Gophers and USC Trojans in their first road test of the season.

LSU will then compete against its 11-game SEC schedule that features five games versus NCAA Tournament teams from last year, including Tennessee and Missouri at home and Florida, Kentucky and Texas A&M all on the road in a four-game stretch late in the season.

There's no question that the LSU Soccer program has firmly established itself among the nation's elite with its performance during the last six seasons and the Tigers are hungry for more as the 2013 season draws near.

When Lee took over the program in December 2004, he committed himself to "build a program that annually contends for the SEC, qualifies for the NCAA College Cup and competes to win a national championship." With LSU's performance for the past eight seasons, his goals are now well within reach for a new generation of Tigers.





FORWARDS

Head coach Brian Lee and his staff certainly strengthened each level of the squad for the 2013 season by signing a heralded recruiting class on National Signing Day in February of which all five players have starred at the FIFA Women's World Cup at the Under-17 and Under-20 level prior to their arrival in Baton Rouge for the fall season.

And perhaps no recruit will make more of an impact with the Tigers during the campaign than Canadian U-17 international Summer Clarke as the striker joins the program as a record-setting goal scorer for her country at the international level.

One of the bright young stars emerging in the Canadian Women's National Team system, Clarke is a dynamic center forward who led Canada's U-17 squad into the guarterfinal at the 2012 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup as one of the Top 8 teams in the tournament held in Azerbaijan. She even scored the game-winning goal in the 51st minute in a 1-0 shutout of Columbia

in leading Canada beyond the group stage of the championship.

Clarke was the catalyst in Canada qualifying for the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup last fall while setting a U-17 national record with six goals scored at the 2012 Confederation of North, Central American & Caribbean Association Football Women's U-17 Championships in the spring of 2012. It was that offensive output that led Canada to a silver-medal-winning second-place team finish at the CONCACAF U-17 Championships while earning a World Cup berth.

Clarke then became one of just three members of Canada's U-17 squad invited to train as a member of the senior Canadian Women's National Team during its December training camp

With such an illustrious international pediaree. Clarke is certainly one of the players who will drive the offensive engine for the Tigers during her rookie season. A native of Richmond, British Columbia, Clarke is a product of the R.C. Palmer Secondary School and also a graduate of the U-18 Elite Girls residency program with the Vancouver Whitecaps.

Clarke will look to fill the boots left by striker Carlie Banks. who ended her career with a strong senior season a year ago. In her four seasons with the Tigers from 2009-12, Banks tallied a total of 16 goals and dished out 14 assists as the leading scorer of her graduating class.

"We're very excited about Summer's potential and what she will bring to the program for years to come, Lee said of Clarke's signing on National Signing Day. "Our staff has rated Summer as one of the top forwards in the world at the youth level during the recruiting process, and she certainly backed that up with a strong performance for Canada at the U-17 World Cup for 2012 to really cement her place in the national team system.

"Summer has a great chance to come in and not only make an impact on our program, but also on the SEC and maybe even nationally this fall. She's very athletic and fits in extremely well with how we like to play in terms of passing and moving. Probably the best part of her game is her ability to move without the ball and positively influence her teammates on the field in the way she plays the game. She also scores big goals, and we're certainly excited to see that."

Providing some much-needed senior leadership for the Tigers in their attack this season is Danielle Murphy as the Lake Charles native returns as one of the team's key reserves for her final season wearing the purple and gold shirt. Murphy has made 31 career appearances with five starts for the Tigers since 2010 while netting two goals and recording three assists in the attack.

Also providing depth along the front line will be redshirt sophomore striker Lexi Gibbs as she looks to earn her first action at the NCAA Division I level following a stellar prep career with Dutchtown High School in Prairieville, La.

MIDFIELDERS

One look at the makeup of LSU's squad with each passing season of the Brian Lee era reveals that the success of the Tigers is built on the foundation of a strong midfield as they feature one of the SEC's top units year in and year out. In fact, of the 17 first-team or second-team All-SEC honors earned by the Tigers in eight previous seasons under Lee's direction, 12 have gone to the midfield as the group leads the charge in attack and provides the first line of defense.

Facilitating LSU's offense this fall is a youthful midfield led by the return of sophomores Heather Magee and Fernanda Pina on the wings and incoming freshman Emma Fletcher stepping into the attacking role. The Tigers are also blessed with veteran strength in the middle of the pitch as senior Alex Ramsey will play centrally and junior Alex Arlitt looks to protect the back line in a more defensive role as arguably the most versatile member of the squad.

And with returning letterwinners Jodi Calloway and Emily Cancienne providing the team with veteran depth in the middle, the midfield is sure to pace the Tigers once again in 2013.

A native of Houston, Texas, Arlitt is one of only two Tigers to start all 43 matches for the team over the past two seasons as she boasts a unique skill set to join in the attack or lead the way in defense as a lynchpin in the middle of the field.

Despite playing much of her sophomore season as the team's defensive midfielder or as a dominant center back, Arlitt tied as the team's leading goal scorer in 2012 with a career-high four goals on the campaign while doubling her freshman output. Arlitt turned in one of the memorable performances in the program's history in LSU's 3-2 come-from-behind overtime victory over Ole Miss after trailing 2-0 at halftime in Oxford last season. She scored LSU's first goal in the 52nd minute, assisted the game-tying goal in the 59th minute and drew the penalty that led to the winner in overtime in the 93rd minute as the Tigers came away with a victory over their rivals.

Arlitt actually tied Pina as the team's leading goal scorer as the Mexican international had four goals and four assists for a team-leading 12 points in her rookie season with the Tigers.

Pina appeared in all 21 matches for the Tigers while making 12 starts on the wing with an ability to play on either side of the field. She even led the team with two game-winning goals during her freshman season a year ago in leading the Tigers to home wins over Stephen F. Austin and Arkansas. Magee, who is slotted on the opposite wing, also netted two game-winners in 2012 against Houston and Memphis in the non-conference while starting 20 matches on the season.

Fletcher will link with Magee and Pina in the attack as she also brings an international pedigree to the squad as a veteran of youth national teams in Canada and New Zealand during her prep career. A native of Victoria, British Columbia, Fletcher starred as a member of New Zealand with three starts at the 2012 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup in Azerbaijan last fall.

After earning eight international caps with New Zealand's Young Football Ferns over the past two years, Fletcher was called into camp during the spring with the U-20 Canadian Women's National Team as part of its EXCELeration camp program. That's where she stood out in a trio of national camps used to identify the pool for

the FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in 2014. Ramsey returns for her senior season as the most experienced member of LSU's midfield unit with 61 . starts in 63 appearances during her collegiate career. Like Arlitt, Ramsey has been an integral member of LSU's midfield and defensive back line during her time in Baton Rouge.

The Tigers are also excited to welcome a capped member of Mexico's Women's National Team into the program as junior transfer Natalia Gomez-Junco will redshirt this season following a two-year stint at the University of Memphis.

A dynamic attacking midfielder, Gomez-Junco is a former All-Conference USA athlete at Memphis who arrived on campus in January ahead of the spring season. After appearing in seven matches for Mexico at the FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in 2010 and 2012, Gomez-Junco was a member of the Mexico's senior squad that competed at the 2013 Algarve Cup in Portugal where she earned her first and second international caps at the senior level.

DEFENDERS

Addie Eggleston is a veteran who has cracked the starting lineup on each level of the field during her collegiate career with the Tigers, and she looks to lead the defensive back line for her senior season as the team's starting right back after emerging at the position a year ago.

Eggleston, who has earned 55 starts in 64 career appearances for the Tigers since 2010, is the lone member of LSU's projected starting back line with a collegiate start in defense to her credit after emerging as the squad's starting right back midway through the 2012 campaign. She's still an offensive threat with seven goals and 15 assists in her three seasons at LSU.

A converted striker, Eggleston's asset is speed as she patrols the right side of the field for the Tigers while demonstrating an ability to generate attacked down the right side.

While Eggleston is the only Tiger returning to the squad with starting experience on the back line at the NCAA level, the Tigers will feature a world-class

back line as they welcome a pair of FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup veterans into the lineup. Incoming freshmen Megan Lee and Rebecca Pongetti earned starts for New Zealand and Canada, respectively, as they lined up in tournament held last year in the nation of Azerbaijan.

Lee is poised to crack the lineup as Eggleston's counterpart on the left side of the field as she joins the program as a pure left-footed left back with a strong international pedigree. Lee is an experienced veteran of New Zealand's Young Football Ferns competing in each of the last two FIFA U-17 Women's World Cups in 2010 and 2012 while earning a total of 15 international caps at the U-17 level through the 2012 season.

One of the bright young stars in all of New Zealand football, Lee earned a call-up to New Zealand's senior squad for its international tour of Australia and Japan back in June.

Like Lee, Pongetti also saw action at the 2012 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup as one of Canada's starting center backs in each of its four matches in a run to the quarterfinals. A former captain of the U-15 Canadian Women's National Team, Pongetti earned 10 caps for Canada at the U-17 level as a heralded product from Hamilton, Ontario,

Pongetti is even turning her attention to the 2014 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup hosted by Canada next year after earning invitations to two of the three national EXCELeration camps in the spring as she is poised to join Canada's U-20 player pool for the tournament.

Partnering with Pongetti in central defense to open the season is sophomore Tori Sample as she makes a permanent move to the back line after seeing action in 18 matches a year ago as an attacking midfielder and part-time right back in her first season with the Tigers. Sample ranked as one of the team's top scorers as a redshirt freshman after netting two goals and recording a trio of assists for seven points on the 2012 campaign.

While Jodi Calloway is set to start the season in the defensive midfield, she also provides LSU experienced

43 matches over the past two seasons while playing primarily as one of the team's center backs. Callows showed skill playing the holding role in the midfield for the Tigers late in her sophomore season. Also providing back line depth for the Tigers this fall

depth in the middle of its defense after starting all

is junior Nicole McLaughlin, while senior Nina Anderson will miss the season after suffering a season-ending knee injury early in the spring. Anderson made 18 starts in 20 appearances as LSU's left back a season ago.

"We're excited to see the progression of our back line unit through the 2013 season," Lee said. "We'll be very young in spots, but we've got a lot of talent coming into the squad this fall as we look to reload our back line. Addie will give us some great leadership at the back, and we also add some world-class talent with Megan Lee and Rebecca Pongetti joining us this fall."

GOALKEEPERS

Megan Kinneman's reemergence as a defensive leader a year ago certainly propelled the Tigers throughout the 2012 season as she regained her freshman form and staked her claim as one of the elite goalkeepers in the Southeastern Conference once again.

Kinneman made an immediate impact on the program while starting each of LSU's final 14 matches during her freshman season in 2010 while posting a team single-season record with a 0.66 goals against average and conceding just 10 goals as a rookie. After making only three starts in her five appearances as a sophomore in 2011, Kinneman regained her starting role last year and started all 21 matches between the posts as a true team leader.

While playing 2,028 minutes in goal for the Tigers and finishing the season with her 1.20 goals against

average, Kinneman also set a single-season career high with 117 saves to rank No. 2 among all SEC goalkeepers during the 2012 season.

And Kinneman even earned her share of recognition on the offensive end of the field as a leading penalty kick taker for the Tigers a year ago as she converted each of her two attempts from the penalty spot for two goals on the season. She netted the team's lone goal in a parrow 2-1 home defeat to the 18th-ranked Kentucky Wildcats before scoring the game-winning Golden Goal in a 3-2 come-from-behind overtime victory on the road against the Ole Miss Rebels

A native of Missouri City, Texas, Kinneman is rounding back into form after sitting out a 2013 spring season while nursing a shoulder injury suffered at the end of her junior season.

Those competing for the spot as Kinneman's deputy in goal this fall will be first-year sophomore Catalina Rubiano and redshirt freshman Morgan Ruhl as the Tigers are blessed with a trio of talented goalkeepers on this year's squad.

Like Kinneman, Ruhl joined the LSU program as a national recruit as she also earned her reputation as a TopDrawerSoccer.com Top 100 recruit nationally in the Class of 2012

As a senior at The McDonogh School in Hereford. Md., Ruhl finished the 2012 season as the No. 93-ranked prep prospect in the United States and the No. 11-ranked goalkeeper recruit for her graduating class. She has earned experience at the highest levels of youth soccer in the United States, which includes a stint with the Under-15 U.S. Women's National Team in 2009. Ruhl was a redshirt candidate in her debut

season with the Tigers a year ago.

A product of St. Mary's Dominican High School in New Orleans, Rubiano has joined the LSU program as a sophomore following stints at the University of Hawaii and University of New Orleans prior to her arrival in Baton Rouge. She guided her high school squad to a Louisiana state championship at the Division I level during her senior season in 2011.

"We're fortunate to have three goalkeepers of this quality to help anchor our defense in the 2012 season," Lee said. "That kind of competition is only going to make our defense better as we compete for an SEC championship again this fall. You must have that kind of depth to make a run in this league, and we certainly feel like we have that in goal."

2013 SEC Women's Soccer Tournament Monday-Sunday

The 2012 Southeastern

Conference Women's Soccer Tournament will feature an expanded 10-team field for the second year in a row after qualifying eight teams in years prior to 2012. The touranment expanded to 10 teams for the first time last season with the SEC's addition of Missouri and Texas ABM to form a powerful 14-team league as one of the most powerful conferences in all of women's college soccer.

The top 10 teams on the final SEC table of the regular season will make the annual trip to the Orange Beach Sportsplex in Orange Beach, Ala., for one of the premier conference tournaments in NCAA soccer. The SEC Tournament Championship Game will be featured live on ESPNU on Sunday, Nov. 10, as the Florida Gators are the defending SEC regular season and tournament champions.

2013 NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament First Round: Nov. 15-17

Second & Third Rounds: Nov. 22-24 Quarterfinals: Nov. 29-Dec. 1 Women's College Cup: Dec. 6-8

The NCAA will select 64 teams to compete in the 2013 NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament. There are 31 conferences that will receive one automatic bid into the field of 64 teams. The remaining 33 teams selected for the postseason will receive at-large bids based on their performance during the regular season.

Following the conclusion of the conference tournaments, The first round of the NCAA Tournament is scheduled for Nov. 15-17 at 32 host sites yet to be determined. The second and third rounds will be held the following weekend from Nov. 22-24 at eight undetermined campus sites with four teams competing at each site. The NCAA quarterfinals will then be held Nov. 29-Dec. 1. The 13th-annual NCAA Women's College Cup will be held in Cary, N.C., with the semifinals on Friday, Dec. 6, and the championship game on Sunday, Dec. 8 at WakeMed Soccer Park.

This marks the first time since 2010 that the College Cup will be held in Cary, N.C., as the North Carolina Tar Heels are the defending national champions.

THE VISION

LSU is the sleeping giant of college soccer. My vision for LSU is to build a program that annually contends to win the SEC, qualifies for the NCAA College Cup and competes to win a National Championship. The foundation that we've built in our time here has given us that opportunity to compete at the highest level of college soccer.

THE PHILOSOPHY

I believe in a commitment to excellence from our players, coaches and staff in all facets of the program. We will provide an environment in which our student-athletes can maximize their full potential as students in competition, in the classroom and in the community.

The Brian Lee Era

When Brian Lee took the reigns of the LSU Soccer program in December 2004, he envisioned a program with the potential to be a perennial contender for the Southeastern Conference championship and an annual participant in the NCAA Tournament. His bold vision to transform LSU Soccer into a nationally-respected program has produced unprecedented results as the Tigers enter the 2013 campaign among the SEC's elite once again.

Lee now guides the Tigers into a new era of SEC soccer after winning four SEC Western Division championships and earning four trips to the NCAA Tournament over the past six years. That includes an impressive three-year run for the program in 2007, 2008 and 2009 and its return to the top of the SEC table again in 2011. The Tigers have twice advanced to the second round for the NCAA Tournament during the 2007 and 2009 seasons.

The Tigers have also proven themselves as perennial contenders for the SEC regular season championship while claiming second place in the final conference standings in 2008, 2009 and 2011 to match their best SEC finish in program history.

Only Florida has earned more Top 2 finishes in the final SEC standings than LSU over the past eight seasons as the Gators (6) and Tigers (3) lead the league. The Tigers are also one of just three SEC teams to finish among the Top 8 of the final SEC standings for each of the past eight seasons under Lee's direction, joining the likes of Florida and Auburn.

In Lee's eight seasons in Baton Rouge, the Tigers have posted an 88-55-29 overall record with a strong 44-31-15 mark against conference opponents. And since capturing its first SEC West title in 2007, LSU has posted a .625 winning percentage with a 37-20-11 record versus SEC teams in the regular season, including a school record eight SEC wins in 2009 and 2011.

The Tigers have been impressive against their division rivals in their run of four SEC West championships in six seasons with a sparkling 23-7-6 mark for a .722 winning percentage in matches against division opponents in the regular season and SEC Tournament during that span.

Tigers Shine in National Spotlight

LSU soared to new heights in 2009 by matching the school wins record with a 15-4-5 overall mark and establishing a new school record with an 8-2-1 mark and 25 points in SEC play. For the secondstraight season, the Tigers finished in second place in the final SEC standings and just one point shy of Florida for their first ever SEC championship. LSU then took a No. 2 seed to the SEC Tournament and advanced to the conference final for the first time in program history.

The Tigers were rewarded for their outstanding performance with a No. 4 national seed in the NCAA Tournament, while serving as a regional host for the first time in team history and advancing to the NCAA Second Round for the second time in three seasons following a first ever appearance in the second round of the postseason in 2007.

Their effort helped land a No. 14 national ranking at the end of the 2009 season in the final Top 25 ranking released by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America. It marked the second year in a row for LSU to finish a campaign as high as No. 14 in the national rankings.

Midfielder Malorie Rutledge was at the center of LSU's emergence into the national spotlight. After being recruited by Lee as part of a heralded Class of 2006, the Sharpsburg, Ga., product wrapped up her collegiate career in 2009 as the most decorated Tiger to step on the pitch. Rutledge earned consensus All-America accolades in 2008 and 2009, while also being picked as a two-time SEC



Offensive Player of the Year and three-time First-Team All-SEC performer during her brilliant career. Rutledge rewrote the school record books in four seasons in Baton Rouge while setting LSU career records with 46 assists and 102 points from 2006-09. She added 28 goals as the club's most prolific scorer in its 17 years of collegiate competition. Rutledge wrapped up her career with an NCAA-leading 18 assists as a senior in 2009, shattering her own team single-season mark.

While Lee has coached 15 Tigers to 28 All-SEC selections in his eight seasons, LSU was recognized with a team-best five all-conference selections in 2009.

Joining Rutledge on the All-SEC squad were defender Chelsea Potts (first-team), midfielder Allysha Chapman (second-team), midfielder Melissa Clarke (second-team) and forward Carlie Banks (all-freshman). Both Clarke and Potts ended their collegiate careers in 2009 as three-time All-SEC performers following their senior season.

The Tigers nearly matched that performance in 2011 as they again finished runner-up for the SEC championship with a 13-8-1 overall record and their second-best league mark in program history at 8-3 with 24 points on the final SEC table. That earned the Tigers their fourth SEC West title and fourth at-large berth into the NCAA Tournament in a five-year span.

Chapman led the charge for the Tigers in 2011 with her second First-Team All-SEC selection and third All-SEC honor in her collegiate career. She also made history by becoming the first LSU Tiger to be selected the SEC Defensive Player of the Year with her performance as one of the premier defensive talents in all of college soccer.

Five Tigers were again honored as All-SEC selections in 2011 as Chapman was joined on the squad by seniors Taryne Boudreau (first-team) and Natalie Martineau (second-team) and freshmen Alex Arlitt (all-freshman) and Jodi Calloway (all-freshman).

Individually, Lee has coached five athletes to All-America honors and six athletes to Freshman All-America honors in 19 seasons as a head coach. In addition, he has coached four Southern Conference Players of the Year, five Southern Conference Freshmen of the Year and three SEC Players of the Year, while guiding his athletes to a total of 80 all-conference selections since his first season as a head coach in 1994.

Despite finishing in 12th place in the final SEC standings in each of the previous two seasons prior to Lee's arrival in Baton Rouge, LSU Soccer has shown steady progress and continued staying power in their ascent to the top of the SEC as the squad finished in eighth place in 2005 and 2006, fourth place in 2007 and second place in 2008, 2009 and 2011.

The Tigers have also been a staple in the national rankings in recent seasons while cracking the Top 25 nationally in all major polls. LSU climbed as high as No. 9 in 2008, No. 10 in 2009, No. 18 in 2010 and No. 14 in 2011 in the national rankings.

Tigers Battle Nation's Elite

Lee and his dedicated coaching staff have built a program with the ability to compete with anyone in women's college soccer. That was never more evident than in 2007 when LSU battled No. 4-ranked Texas to a 2-2 draw on the road in Austin and dominated No. 6-ranked Tennessee by a 3-0 margin at home for the program's first victory against an opponent ranked as one of the Top 10 teams in the country.

The Tigers were impressive again in 2009 when they earned a pair of shutout wins versus teams in the Top 10 of the polls with a 6-0 blanking of No. 8-ranked Georgia and a 1-0 shutout of No. 10-ranked South Carolina in a pair of matches played at the LSU Soccer Stadium. The Tigers and Gamecocks then

battled to a 1-1 draw in the SEC Tournament final during the 2009 season as South Carolina took the tournament title with a marathon 8-7 decision in penalty kicks.

In 2011, LSU Soccer earned its fourth at-large NCAA Tournament berth in five seasons on the strength of a resume that featured a pair of shutout wins over No. 10 Tennessee and No. 11 Florida in conference play en route to a third runner-up finish in the final SEC standings

With the Volunteers bringing a Top 10 national ranking to Baton Rouge for the second time in three seasons, the Tigers were dominant in a 2-0 shutout to extend their unbeaten streak to four-straight in the series. The Tigers then made history with a trip to Gainesville, Fla., on Oct. 23 as they pitched a 1-0 shutout to score their first victory over the powerful Gators to hand Florida only its fourth defeat in SEC play at Pressly Stadium in its history.

And with a 3-1 road triumph over 16th-ranked Missouri in the inaugural match between the two teams for their signature win of 2012, the Tigers have more than proven themselves as an elite program during Lee's eight seasons in Baton Rouge as they have now scored seven wins and nine draws against nationally-ranked opponents since 2007.

LSU Soccer: A Box Office Smash

Lee's impact has not only been felt with unprecedented results on the field, but also at the box office as record crowds have packed the LSU Soccer Stadium week in and week out to watch the Tigers in action since his arrival in Baton Rouge.

The 2011 season witnessed the birth of a new era of LSU Soccer as the Tigers christened the new LSU Soccer Stadium on the night of Sept. 9 with a dramatic 1-0 shutout of the Oregon Ducks before a record crowd of 2,542 supporters on hand for the festivities. It proved a fitting end to a night of celebration of one of the top rising programs in all of college soccer as the squad opened a stadium that stands as one of the true jewels of the Southeastern Conference.

The Tigers wrapped up the 2011 campaign ranked among the Top 20 teams nationwide in average attendance while drawing an average of 1,174 fans in their nine matches played at the new LSU Soccer Stadium to stand as the NCAA's No. 17-ranked program at the box office.

They then raised their attendance record again in 2012 when 2,624 supporters witnessed a 1-1 draw with the visiting Rice Owls in their home opener on Aug. 24.

The 2007 season proved to be unlike any other in the history of the program as the Tigers were unbeaten at the LSU Soccer Stadium for the first time with a 5-0-3 record while drawing an average of 1,294 fans per match. That ranked LSU Soccer among the Top 10 teams in the country in average attendance for the first time as the team finished the season at No. 7 in the NCAA with average paid attendance. The Tigers set three single-game attendance records on the season which includes a crowd of 2,402 for its 3-0 win over No. 6 Tennessee on Oct. 5, 2007.

LSU Soccer has been nearly unbeatable on its home turf while following an unbeaten season in 2007 with an 8-1 mark in 2008, a 7-1-2 mark in 2009, a 6-1-2 mark in 2010 and a 7-1-1 mark in 2011. The Tigers have posted a 38-9-11 record at the LSU Soccer Stadium since 2007.

Tigers Lead by Example

Not only have the Tigers proven to be one of the SEC's top programs with their effort on the field in seven seasons under Lee's direction, but they have also taken great pride in their performance off the field as they are the unguestioned University leaders in community service as winners of four-straight Tiger Cups in 2009, 2010, 2011 and 2012.

The Tiger Cup is presented each season by the Tiger Athletic Foundation as part of the annual TAF Academic Excellence Gala to the athletic program that best represents the University with its performance on and off the field. The winner of the Tiger Cup is determined using a point system based on a team's final conference and national ranking, cumulative team grade-point average and community service hours accumulated during the previous academic year.

Lee's athletes boast a proven track record in the classroom as his teams have earned seven NSCAA Team Academic Awards. A total of 122 student-athletes were selected to the Southern Conference Academic Honor Roll in his 11 years at Furman, while 85 Tigers have been named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll in his eight seasons in Baton Rouge.

LSU Soccer set a program record following the 2011 season with its 14 selections to the SEC Fall Academic Honor Roll, eclipsing its previous team best of 11 selections that had been matched four previous times in 2002, 2003, 2005 and 2007.

Lee Brings Proven Track Record to Tigers

Winning conference titles and leading a nationally prominent program are nothing new for the native of Cheltenham, England, who led the Furman Lady Paladins to six Southern Conference Championships and four NCAA Tournament appearances during his 11-year tenure after starting the program from scratch in 1994.

In 11 seasons, Lee's teams amassed a 144-80-10 overall record, including an impressive 76-16-3 mark in conference play. The Lady Paladins went undefeated in conference play three times (1999, 2000, 2002) and were just shy of perfection in 2003 after finishing the season with a 10-0-1 record in Southern Conference play.

For his many accomplishments, Lee was named the Southern Conference Coach of the Year five times and was named the NSCAA and Soccer Buzz Southeast Region Coach of the Year in 1999, the same year in which he was selected as a finalist for the NSCAA National Coach of the Year Award.

In addition to his experience coaching at the collegiate level, Lee served on the staff of the Region III Olympic Development Program Team from 1999-2008, while reaching the rank of assistant coach of the Region III ODP Team in 2006.

A successful athlete in his own right. Lee earned four letters with the Furman men's soccer team from 1989-92 as an integral part of three Southern Conference titles and was voted team captain and selected as the team's Most Valuable Player as a senior. He also led his team to its first ever NCAA Tournament appearance and a berth in the NCAA Sweet 16 in 1991.

Lee, 42, graduated from Furman in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in political science. He and his wife, the former Nancy Repsher of Westboro, Mass., and also a 1993 graduate of Furman, have two children - Aidan, 9, and Abby, 8.

Her passion for the sport is unmatched by anyone I've ever worked with." There is no doubt that in order for a program to compete for championships year in and year out, it must have an outstanding coaching staff in place to guide the way. In eight seasons as a member of Brian Lee's staff at LSU, Debbie Hensley has more than proven herself as one of the top assistant coaches in the country while helping lead the Tigers into national prominence as one of the premier programs in the Southeastern Conference.

It is for that reason that Hensley was promoted to the rank of associate head coach before the start of the 2008 campaign as she now enters her ninth season at LSU.

Adding Hensley to his staff was an easy decision for Lee when he took the head coaching job in December 2004 after coaching together at Furman for three years.

"We certainly would not enjoy the kind of success we do now without the leadership that Debbie brings to this coaching staff," Lee said. "She is an outstanding leader of young women, and she has helped us attract many of the best players in the country to LSU with her tremendous recruiting ability. Her passion for the sport is unmatched by anyone I've ever worked with."

That passion has certainly paid dividends on the field as Hensley has helped build LSU into the championship program it is today. The Tigers enter a new era of SEC soccer in 2013 as a club that has proven itself among the league's elite since winning their first SEC Western Division championship in 2007. LSU has claimed four division titles and earned four trips to the NCAA Tournament in a six-year span in 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2011.

LSU has also been on the cusp of claiming its first ever SEC championship with a trio of runner-up finishes on the league table over the past five seasons. That includes a record-breaking 2009 campaign in which the Tigers finished in second place in the final conference standings for the second year in a row while tying their school record for wins with a 15-4-5 overall record and establishing a school record output with an 8-2-1 mark and 25 points in SEC play. LSU was close to matching that effort in 2011 as the SEC runner-up again with an 8-3 conference record.

In 2010, the Tigers advanced to the SEC Tournament semifinal for the fourth season in a row as they joined the powerful Florida Gators as the only programs in the SEC to advance to the semifinal round of the conference tourney in each season from 2007-10.

Hensley has been a driving force in that success as she has established a reputation as one of the nation's top recruiters while attracting many of the best players in the country to Baton Rouge.

She led the way in LSU signing its first ever Top 25 recruiting class in 2005 as the Tigers were ranked No. 25 on the recruiting trail that year. Hensley followed that effort in 2006 by helping Lee sign the first Top 10 recruiting class in the program's history with a crop of future stars ranked No. 7 nationally in the Soccer Buzz Magazine recruiting rankings.

The Class of 2006 is the most decorated class in the history of the LSU Soccer program as it completed its eligibility in 2009 with a class record of 50 wins in four seasons from 2006-09. The group captured three SEC West titles, earned three NCAA Tournament selections, placed No. 2 in the final SEC standings twice and combined for 10 All-America and 12 All-SEC picks in four seasons in Baton Rouge.

And the future of the program shines bright for years to come as the Tigers have welcomed a trio of recruiting classes to campus for the 2010, 2012 and 2013 seasons considered to be among the Top 15 in all of college soccer on National Signing Day.

Hensley helped recruit a Class of 2010 that featured five TopDrawerSoccer.com Top 100 players nationally, as well as four of the Top 15 players in the state of Texas and the No. 1-ranked prospects from Florida, Louisiana and South Carolina. This talented senior class is poised to wrap up its collegiate career this fall as one of the premier classes in the program's history.

Following in its footsteps are heralded classes in 2012 and 2013 featuring a combined nine prospects with international experience as members of youth national teams in Canada, Mexico, New Zealand and the United States to give LSU an international flair for years to come.

"There's no doubt that recruiting is the lifeblood of any program at this level, and we are certainly fortunate to have someone like Debbie leading our recruiting efforts," Lee said. "She is an outstanding evaluator of talent and has the ability to target the players we feel can thrive in our program both on and off the field. That's been a key in building the foundation we have now."

Hensley compiled a 60-52-9 record in six years at Western Carolina after starting the program from scratch prior to the 1999 season. She led the Catamounts to a 10-9-1 record and a Southern Conference Tournament appearance in her inaugural season and was named the SoCon Coach of the Year in 2001 after guiding the team to the Southern Conference regular season title with a 16-6 overall record and 8-2 mark in league play.

Hensley coached seven players to 11 All-Southern Conference honors in her time at Western Carolina, a total that includes three first-team selections. In addition to her duties as head coach of the program, Hensley also served as the University's Assistant Athletics Director and Senior Women's Administrator.

Prior to her stint at WCU, Hensley spent three seasons as an assistant coach under Lee at Furman where she recruited eight players who earned all-conference accolades in their careers.

Along with her coaching achievements, Hensley garnered recognition during her athletic career as a soccer and softball standout at Georgia Southern where she was a three-time first-team All-SoCon selection and led the conference in scoring as both a junior and a senior.

Hensley was selected to play in the Umbro Select College All-Star Classic after being named an NSCAA Regional All-American and All-Region honoree in 1995, and she was named the Georgia Female College Athlete of the Year by the Georgia Hall of Fame the same year.

The two-sport standout was also a first-team all-conference selection in softball as she set the Georgia Southern career record for stolen bases and runs scored. She graduated with a bachelor's degree in education from Georgia Southern in 1996 and a master's degree in health and exercise science from Furman in 1998.

Assistant Coach 🔪 COACHES

With just over a month remaining before the start of the 2010 regular season, head coach Brian Lee hit a "home run" when he announced the hiring of former College of Charleston women's soccer head coach Kevin Dempsey to complete the Tigers' coaching staff before the start of the fall season.

It was an addition that paid immediate dividends for the Tigers as Dempsey coached the premier defensive unit in program history as they matched a program record for fewest goals allowed in a season with 16 and nearly set a school record with a 0.72 goals against average in 21 matches in 2010. In fact, the Tigers finished the season tied for the No. 1 spot in the SEC in goals allowed and wrapped up the season ranked No. 2 for goals against average among the league's 12 programs with their performance.

As the primary coach of LSU's defensive back line, Dempsey was instrumental in Canadian international Allysha Chapman earning her first career First-Team All-SEC selection as one of the leading defenders in the Southeastern Conference.

Chapman made history as a senior in 2011 when she became the first Tiger in program history to be named the SEC Defensive Player of the Year while also earning her second First-Team All-SEC honor as one of the elite performers in all of college soccer. Chapman was joined on the All-SEC squad by a pair of rookie defenders in Texas natives Alex Arlitt and Jodi Calloway, who each earned selections to the SEC All-Freshman Team as two of the SEC's emerging talents.

Demosey's defensive unit was a catalyst in the Tigers winning their fourth SEC Western Division championship in five seasons and earning a return trip to the NCAA Tournament for the fourth time in the team's history during the 2011 campaign. They finished the 2011 season with a 13-8-1 overall record and an 8-3 mark in league play for their third second-place finish on the SEC table in four seasons.

The LSU Soccer program has certainly been on the cusp of winning its first SEC championship as the club finished runner-up in the final conference standings in 2008, 2009 and 2011.

Dempsey has also hit the ground running on the recruiting trail while making an immediate impact for the Tigers, highlighted by a pair of recruiting classes in 2012 and 2013 considered among the Top 15 classes in the country in each of the last two years. Widely respected as one of the top recruiters in all of college soccer both nationally and internationally, Dempsey will continue to be a driving force with the addition of world-class talent from across the globe for many years to come.

In just the last two seasons, Dempsey has helped sign nine athletes to National Letters of Intent who have earned international experience at the youth level with the national team systems in Canada, Mexico, New Zealand and the United States.

Dempsey joined the LSU program following an outstanding nine-year stint as the head coach at the College of Charleston, where he led the Cougars to an 86-70-22 overall record and a 54-32-8 mark in Southern Conference play since 2001. That included an overall record of 24-12-6 in his final two seasons.

He teams with Lee and associate head coach Debbie Hensley to form the core of an outstanding coaching staff with a combined 34 years of head coaching experience at the NCAA Division I level. Lee has been a head coach at the NCAA Division I level for the past 19 seasons, while Hensley was the coach at Western Carolina for six seasons before joining Lee's staff at LSU.

The Cougars flourished in nine seasons under Dempsey's direction as they reached the postseason in each with nine appearances in the SoCon Tournament, including runner-up finishes in 2002 and 2009. The side earned 28 All-SoCon and All-SoCon Tournament selections under Dempsey.

The Cougars were also outstanding in the classroom during Dempsey's tenure while winning the NSCAA Team Academic Award in each of his nine seasons while posting a team GPA of 3.0 or higher. In addition, six Cougars were named NSCAA All-Region Scholar Athletes in his final two seasons at the College of Charleston, demonstrating his commitment to success both on and off the pitch.

"We are excited to have the experience that Kevin provides our program at LSU," Lee said. "He's already had a tremendous impact on our team and this community in his three years here. That is especially true with his ability to recruit world-class talent and attract the caliber of athlete we will need to challenge for SEC and national championships for years to come.

"I approach the staff just like the team with a goal to go out and recruit the best. Having Kevin as a member of our staff has been a home run hire for our program. With Kevin joining Debbie (Hensley) and the rest of our staff, we're fortunate to have a staff in place that will continue to recruit and develop the best players and people in all of college soccer."

Dempsey boasts 16 years of head coaching experience at the collegiate level during which he compiled an overall record of 166-116-29 since 1994. Prior to his appointment at the College of Charleston, Dempsey served as the head coach of the women's program at Catawba College of NCAA Division II for seven seasons from 1994-2000 while compiling an overall record of 80-46-7, including a 34-13-3 mark in the South Atlantic Conference.

After helping the Indians win South Atlantic Conference regular season and tournament titles as an assistant coach in 1993, the team captured four SAC Tournament titles in his seven seasons as a head coach in 1994, 1997, 1998 and 1999. He also led Catawba College to the NCAA Division II Southeast Region Championship in 1997 before earning its place in the national quarterfinals of the NCAA Division II Women's Soccer Tournament that same vear.

In all, Dempsey coached 10 NCAA Division II All-Americans, 17 All-South Region selections, four SAC Players of the Year and four SAC Freshmen of the Year during his seven-year tenure while the head coach at Catawba College

In addition to his experience as a head coach at the collegiate level, Dempsey also served as head coach of the Under-15 Region III Olympic Development Program Team for seven years from 2003-09.

Dempsey graduated from Catawba College in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in history. He and his wife, Krista, have an 8-year-old son named Jack.

After joining Brian Lee's coaching staff as a volunteer assistant coach prior to the 2012 season, Baton Rouge Soccer Club Executive Director Gary Buete returns to work with the development of LSU's talented group of goalkeepers during the 2013 season.

Buete has orchestrated the rise of one of the state's premier club programs over the past 13 years as the BRSC has captured more than 40 Louisiana state titles among all age groups since the summer of 2000. It has also doubled in participation from 3,500 players when Buete was appointed executive director to nearly 7,000 players in the organization during the 2013 season.

A seven-year veteran of the Region III Olympic Development Program Team coaching staff, Buete is the head coach for the 2000 age group and has also served as the assistant coach for the 1998 and 1999 groups in the Region III ODP system for three years. 



SEASON REVIEW



Youth Movement Fuels Tigers in 2012 Season

The future of the LSU Soccer program was certainly on display during the 2012 season as the Tigers ended the campaign with a berth in the first round of the SEC Tournament while posting a 9-8-4 overall record and 5-6-2 mark in SEC play on the season. The squad's top five scorers, and six of its top seven scorers for the year, were freshmen and sophomores as the Tigers competed with one of the SEC's more youthful rosters in 2012. Sophomore Alex Arlitt and freshman Fernanda Pina were the leading scorers as each found the back of the net four times on the season, while Pina tied fellow freshman Jade Kovacevic with 12 points as the team's leading point scorers for the year. Kovacevic dished out a team-leading six assists along with her three goals en route to claiming Second-Team All-SEC honors for her performance. Also among the program's leading scorers were Arlitt with nine points, freshman Colby Maffei with eight points, freshman Tori Sample with seven points and freshman Heather Magee with five points.

2012 Season Ends in First Round at SEC Tournament

Just when it seemed LSU and Ole Miss would play to overtime for the second time in 11 days, Rebel striker Rafaelle Souza scored the game-winning goal with just 43 seconds to play in regulation to hand the Rebels a 1-0 victory in their opening-round match of the SEC Tournament held Oct. 29 at the Orange Beach Sportsplex in Orange Beach, Ala. The Tigers suffered their first defeat to the Rebels in four years as they saw their five-game unbeaten streak in the series snapped with Souza's heroics in the final minute. LSU's run of three-straight wins entering the postseason was also snapped as they fell for the first time in more than two weeks.

Tigers Score Historic Road Victory at No. 16 Missouri

Led by a trio of goal scorers in junior Nina Anderson, freshman Colby Maffei and freshman Tori Sample, the Tigers completed their first SEC road sweep since 2009 with a 3-1 win over the 16th-ranked Missouri Tigers at Audrey J. Walton Soccer Stadium on Oct. 21 of last season. It marked the inaugural meeting between the two sides on the pitch as LSU earned its first win over a nationally-ranked opponent in five tries during the 2012 season. After falling behind by a 1-0 score in the 24th minute, the Tigers scored three unanswered goals thanks to Sample in the 24th minute, Maffei in the 38th minute and Anderson in the 64th minute to secure perhaps the team's most impressive victory of the season. It was LSU's first victory over a nationally-ranked opponent since a 1-0 shutout over the 13th-ranked Florida Gators in Gainesville on Oct. 23 of the 2011 season.

Tigers Wrap Up Regular Season with Impressive Streak

While struggling to a 2-6-2 mark through 10 conference matches in 2012, the Tigers clawed their way back into the postseason picture by reeling off three-straight victories to end the regular season. After earning a road sweep with a 3-2 victory over the Ole Miss Rebels in 0Xford, Miss., on Oct. 19 and scoring a 3-1 defeat of the 16th-ranked Missouri Tigers in Columbia, Mo., on Oct. 21, LSU capped its regular season with a 3-2 win over the Arkansas Razorbacks on Oct. 25 on its home turf at the LSU Soccer Stadium in Baton Rouge to earn the No. 8 seed in the SEC Tournament. The Tigers finished the season with a 5-6-2 mark and 17 points in league play.

Tigers Welcome Aggies to SEC in Conference Opener

The Tigers surrendered the only goal of the match off the head of Texas AGM defender Rachel Lenz off a corner kick in the 13th minute of play as they suffered a 1-0 setback to the 10th-ranked Aggies in their SEC opener before 1.910 supporters at the LSU Soccer Stadium. The sixth-largest crowd in the stadium's history was on hand to witness the Aggies emerge victorious in their SEC debut as the Tigers saw their four-game unbeaten streak snapped by their division rivals. The teams combined for just seven shots on target in a match lacking in opportunity as the Aggies held a slight 4-3 advantage in shots on goal on the final scoresheet.

Record Crowd Watches Tigers Draw Rice in Home Opener

A record crowd of 2,624 fans packed the LSU Soccer Stadium to witness the Tigers play the Rice Owls to a 1-1 draw as sophomore striker Kaley Blades scored the equalizer in the 74th minute in the team's home opener for the 2012 season. With the Tigers trailing the Owls by a 1-0 margin late in the second half, Blades drew the Tigers level at the 73:10 mark when she buried a rebound from inside the six-yard box after the initial shot by freshman winger Fernanda Pina. The Tigers shattered their previous attendance record by nearly 100 fans as the previous record of 2,542 supporters witnessed LSU's 1-0 shutout of the Oregon Ducks in the opening match for the new LSU Soccer Stadium on Sept. 9, 2011.

Arlitt Opens Season with Golden Goal at Oklahoma

In the dying minutes of a match that seemed destined to end in a deadlock, sophomore midfielder Alex Arlitt pounced on a loose ball outside the box and buried a 20-yard strike into the back of the net to lift the Tigers to a 1-0 double overtime victory over the Oklahoma Sooners in LSU's 2012 season opener in Norman, Okla. With the clock nearing the two-minute warning, Arlitt sized up a tantalizing ball rolling outside the penalty area and buried the game-winner at the 107:24 mark of the match. The Tigers extended their winning streak to four-straight against the Sooners since 2008 and remained unbeaten in six matches with a 5-0-1 mark all-time.

Kinneman Emerges as Team Leader in Junior Season

Junior goalkeeper Megan Kinneman re-established herself as the team's defensive leader between the posts with a stellar junior season in which she started all 21 matches for the Tigers in 2012. While pitching five shutouts on the year, Kinneman set a new career single-season high with 117 saves to rank No. 2 among all SEC goalkeepers during the campaign. Not only did she first set a career single-game high with 10 saves against Memphis, but she also turned in the defensive highlight of the year by saving a penalty kick in the 29th minute to lead LSU to a 2-1 victory in their non-conference finale. Kinneman then raised her career high to 15 saves in a 2-2 draw at Georgia





during the SEC season. But Kinneman's impact was also felt on the offensive end as she converted each of her two penalty kick attempts on the year with the game-winning Golden Goal in the 93rd minute in a 3-2 win over Ole Miss on Oct. 19 and the team's only goal in a 2-1 overtime setback to 18th-ranked Kentucky on Sept. 23.

Canadian International Joins Squad after U-20 World Cup

The Tigers welcomed Class of 2012 standout recruit Jade Kovacevic to Baton Rouge following her stint with the Under-20 Canadian Women's National Team in group play at the 2012 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup held in Japan. Canada took three points from three matches for third place in Group C while finishing short of the knockout stages. Kovacevic certainly made the most of her collegiate debut against the Houston Cougars on Sept. 2 as she scored the second goal of the match in a 2-0 victory for the Tigers with a one-time volley from eight yards in the 40th minute. It proved to be the start of a brilliant freshman season in which Kovacevic won a first career all-conference honor as a Second-Team All-SEC performer in 2012.

Kovacevic Earns All-SEC Honors in Freshman Season

As the No. 8-seeded Tigers prepared for their first-round match against Ole Miss at the SEC Tournament, Kovacevic learned of her selection as a Second-Team All-SEC and SEC All-Freshman Team performer in the wake of an outstanding freshman season in 2013. It marked the ninth-straight



season in which at least one LSU Tiger was recognized as an all-conference performer as Kovacevic became the sixth true freshman in team history to garner a first-team or second-team All-SEC selection. Kovacevic tied as the squad's leading scorer with 12 points on the year, including three goals and a team-leading six assists in her 16 starts for the season.

World Cup Veterans Headline LSU's Recruiting Class of 2013

On National Signing Day in February, the Tigers welcomed a Class of 2013 with an international flair as five world-class recruits signed National Letters of Intent to join the squad for the 2013 season. Joining the LSU Soccer program as part of a heralded class were striker Summer Clarke (Richmond, British Columbia, Canada), midfielders Emma Fletcher (Victoria, British Columbia, Canada) and Natalia Gomez-Junco (Monterrey, Mexico) and defenders Megan Lee (Massey, Auckland, New Zealand) and Rebecca Pongetti (Hamilton, Ontario, Canada). LSU's recruiting class combined for 16 games played with 15 starts for their countries at the FIFA U-20 and U-17 Women's World Cups held during the 2012 season. Gomez-Junco, a transfer from the University of Memphis, starred for Mexico at the FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in 2010 and 2012, while Clarke and Pongetti started for Canada and Fletcher and Lee started for New Zealand at the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup in 2012.



Gomez-Junco Makes History with Mexican National Team

Tiger transfer Natalia Gomez-Junco made history with her two appearances for the senior Mexican Women's National Team at the 2013 Algarve Cup held in March as she became LSU's first footballer to earn an international cap at the senior level while competing against Portugal and Wales in the event held in Algarve, Portugal. Gomez-Junco cracked Mexico's starting midfield in a 1-0 defeat to Wales on March 8 before coming off the bench in the second half to help seal a 3-0 shutout of Portugal on March 11. While the Tigers have featured past, present and future standouts for the United States, Canada, Mexico and New Zealand at the U-15, U-17, U-20 and U-23 levels, Gomez-Junco became the first player in program history to represent her country at the senior level.

LSU Recruits Called into National Team Duty in Spring Season

Gomez-Junco wasn't the only LSU Soccer recruit to earn national team experience during the spring and summer as Lee earned her first action with the senior New Zealand Women's National Team and both Fletcher and Pongetti were called into camps with the U-20 Canadian Women's National Team in 2013. Lee joined the senior Football Ferns in their three-match international tour of Australia and Japan in late June, while also competing for New Zealand's U-20 squad late in the summer. Fletcher and Pongetti received invitations to train in Canada's series of EXCELeration camps held in Portland, Ore., in March, Morgantown, W. Va., in May and Vancouver, British Columbia, in June. Canada's U-20 EXCELeration camps helped identify the player pool for selecting its team for the 2014 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup which the country will host.

12 Tigers Earn SEC Academic Honor Roll Selection for 2012

The LSU Soccer program featured an impressive 12 representatives on the SEC Academic Honor Roll following the 2012 season for their outstanding performance in the classroom during the fall semester. Their 12 selections came just one year after the Tigers set a new program record with 14 honor roll selections following the 2011 season. Among those honored by the Southeastern Conference following the 2012 fall semester were Nina Anderson, Alex Arlitt, Carlie Banks, Bonnie Campbell, Emily Cancienne, Natalie Ieyoub, Megan Kinneman, Shannon McLain, Nicole McLaughlin, Danielle Murphy, Alex Ramsey and Tori Sample.

Tigers Receive NSCAA Academic Award for Classroom Excellence

Members of the LSU Soccer program were also honored by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America for their academic performance by earning the NSCAA Team Academic Award while maintaining a strong 3.21 cumulative team grade-point average for the 2011-12 academic year. The Tigers were among 504 women's college soccer programs nationwide to finish the year with a cumulative team GPA of at least 3.0 or higher in 2011-12. The NSCAA's selection included 12 of the 14 squads in the SEC as the Tigers joined the likes of Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi State, Missouri, Ole Miss, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas A&M and Vanderbilt. The NSCAA announced the team academic award winners on Nov. 20 following the 2012 season.

Each year, the Heisman Trophy Trust presents the famed Heisman Trophy to the most outstanding college football player in the country. In the sport of college soccer, athletes from across the country compete each season for the right to raise the Hermann Trophy as the premier soccer player in the NCAA as presented by the Missouri Athletic Club in St. Louis.

Considered the highest honor in intercollegiate soccer, the recipient of the Hermann Trophy is selected each year by Division I head coaches who are certified members of the National Soccer Coaches Association of America. After releasing the Hermann Trophy Watch List each preseason, the field is then cut to 15 semifinalists in November before three finalists are named prior to the NCAA Women's College Cup in early December.

The LSU Soccer program has been represented on the Hermann Trophy Watch List twice in its history as former Tiger All-American Malorie Rutledge was recognized as one of the top players in the country by the Missouri Athletic Club. While Rutledge never made the cut as one of the award's 15 semifinalists, she certainly earned a reputation as being one of the elite talents in all of college soccer with a brilliant fouryear career from 2006-09.
