Series Notes: Alabama and LSU will meet for the 85th time in series history when the two teams square off on Saturday night in Baton Rouge. The Crimson Tide owns a 53-26-5 all-time advantage despite losing last year's shootout between Nos. 1 and 2, 46-41. That win by the Tigers snapped UA's eight-game winning streak that included a 29-0 win in the Tide's last visit to Baton Rouge. Alabama head coach Nick Saban is 10-5 in his career against LSU, including a 10-4 mark at Alabama. LSU head coach Ed Orgeron is 1-6 all-time against the Crimson Tide, including a 1-3 mark during his time in Baton Rouge.

ALABAMA ATHLETICS COMMUNICATIONS

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TOUGH TO GET SABAN'S TIDE TWICE: During his tenure at Alabama, head coach Nick Saban has suffered 23 total losses. Of those 23 losses, the Crimson Tide and Saban have had the opportunity to face the team that beat them at a later date on 19 occasions. In those 19 rematches, Alabama owns a 17-2 mark when avenging its previous loss. The only two times the Crimson Tide has fallen in back-to-back games against the same opponent is LSU (2010-2011) and Ole Miss (2014-2015). Alabama has not had the opportunity to bounce back from a loss against Clemson (2018), LSU (2019), Ohio State (2014) and Utah (2009). The Tide avenged its most recent loss against Auburn in 2019 with a dominant 42-13 win last weekend over the Tigers.

ALABAMA'S D AT TIGER STADIUM: Alabama heads to Baton Rouge this weekend where the Tide defense has been dominant as of late. A 29-0 win over then-No. 3/4 LSU on UAs last visit to Baton Rouge on Nov. 3, 2018, extended an impressive run by the Crimson Tide defense. With the shutout in 2018, Alabama has not surrendered a touchdown in its last 11 quarters of play (and one overtime possession) at Tiger Stadium. LSU last found the end zone at home against Alabama with a touchdown pass at the 2:07 mark of the first quarter in UA's 20-13 overtime win in 2014, a span of 165 minutes and seven seconds. The Tide has outscored the Tigers 59-6 over those 11 quarters in Baton Rouge. Entering Saturday, LSU has been shut out at Tiger Stadium only four times in the last 28 years (including the 2020 season). All four have come at the hands of the Crimson Tide.

SABAN'S ROAD RECORD: Head coach Nick Saban owns a 77-32-1 (.705) mark in road games across his four career stops, including a 49-9 (.845) mark while at Alabama. Saban has notched seven perfect road records (2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2016 and 2018) and has lost more than one game on the road in only two seasons (2007, 2010). Alabama came away with a 48-17 win at Tennessee on Oct. 24 to go 3-0 away from home in 2020 and has now won 35 of its last 39 road games dating back to the 2011 campaign.

SABAN IN SEC ROAD GAMES: Head coach Nick Saban owns a 59-16 (.787) mark in SEC road games across his time at LSU and Alabama, including a 47-8 (.873) record with the Crimson Tide. Saban has notched eight perfect SEC road seasons (2003, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2016 and 2018).

UNRANKED, NO PROBLEM UNDER SABAN: With its 63-3 win over Kentucky on Nov. 21, Alabama has defeated 96 consecutive unranked teams under head coach Nick Saban, the longest streak in FBS history. The current streak began with a win over Colorado on December 30, 2007 in the Independence Bowl. The previous record was 72 games, shared by Miami (Fla.) (1984-95) and Florida (1989-2000). Over the 96-game stretch, only Ohio State has single-digit losses to unranked opponents with nine. Under Saban, Alabama holds a 100-3 (.971) (96-3, .970 after vacations) mark against unranked opponents.

ALABAMA IN THE AP POLL: Alabama's No. 1 ranking in this week's Associated Press Top 25 Poll marks the 209th consecutive week that the Crimson Tide has appeared in the poll. That streak is the longest active streak in college football. The 209 weeks more than doubles second-place Clemson with the Tigers appearing in the poll for 98 consecutive weeks. Ohio State previously held the second-longest streak behind the Crimson Tide but did not appear in the Week 2 iteration of the poll. Prior to their absence, the Buckeyes had appeared in the AP rankings for 132 straight weeks. Alabama's 209 straight weeks tops the Crimson Tide's previous program-long streak of 71 straight weeks under head coach Gene Stallings in the mid-1990s.

ALABAMA IN THE AP SINCE 2008: Alabama opened the 2008 season at No. 24 in the Associated Press Preseason Poll. The Crimson Tide began that year with a dominant 34-10 win over then-No. 9 Clemson in Atlanta, Ga. Since that win over the Tigers, Alabama has not been ranked lower than No. 17 in 207 polls that have followed since. According to College Poll Archive, the Tide has now spent 96.2 percent of the 12-plus years ranked in the top 10, bettering No. 2 Ohio State (76.1 percent) over that stretch. A whopping 86.6 percent of that time Alabama has been ranked in the top five. The next best team is the Buckeyes at 46.4 percent. The Crimson Tide has also been ranked No. 1 a total of 95 times since 2008, or 45.5 percent of the time. Only 13 other teams have earned the No. 1 ranking over that time, with the second-most appearances coming from Clemson at 23.

ALABAMA vs. AP TOP 25 IN 2020: Following last weekend's win over then-No. 22 Auburn, Alabama is the only team in the country with three wins against teams ranked in the Associated Press Top 25 at the time of kickoff. The Crimson Tide is also one of just three teams in the nation with two wins against the current AP Top 25, joining Northwestern and Oklahoma State. Alabama first defeated then-No. 13 Texas A&M, 52-24, in Tuscaloosa on Oct. 3 before taking down then-No. 3 Georgia, 41-24, two weeks later at Bryant-Denny Stadium. Despite the losses to Alabama, both teams currently rank in the top 11 of this week's poll with the Aggies sitting at No. 5 while the Bulldogs are No. 11.

MORE THAN A DECADE AT NO. 1: With Alabama's Nov. 8 ranking at No. 1, the Crimson Tide has been ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press poll at least once each season since 2008. The 13-year streak is the longest in the history of the AP rankings. The previous long streak was seven seasons by Miami (Fla.) from 1986-92. The Crimson Tide began the 2020 campaign ranked at No. 3 in the AP.

SABAN AT NO. 1: Among active head coaches during the 2020 campaign, Alabama head coach Nick Saban has coached the most games as the Associated Press Poll's No. 1 team. Saban has coached 82 games as the nation's top-ranked team entering this weekend's matchup at LSU, which is 61 more games than second-place Dabo Swinney, who has totaled 21 games at No. 1. Third on the list is Kansas' Les Miles, who has coached 14 games as the top-ranked team in the AP Poll. The fourth coach on the list is Texas A&M's Jimbo Fisher who coached 10, all coming during the 2013-14 seasons at Florida State. Ranking fifth is a trio of coaches at seven games in UCLA's Chip Kelly, LSU's Ed Orgeron and Ohio's Frank Solich.

SABAN vs. AP TOP 25: The Crimson Tide's dominant 42-13 win over then-No. 22 Auburn on Nov. 28 was Nick Saban's 87th career win and 64th at Alabama vs. the Associated Press Top 25. That victory over the Tigers pushed Saban past Joe Paterno for the most career wins against the AP Top 25. Last season, Saban's win over then-No. 24 Texas A&M moved him ahead of Florida State legend Bobby Bowden for second all-time. Alabama's Paul "Bear" Bryant is fourth at 66. Former Duke, Florida and South Carolina coach Steve Spurrier is fifth at 64. Saban's winning percentage against AP ranked teams (.874) tops Bryant (.592), Bowden (.557), Spurrier (.529) and Paterno (.512).

DOMINATING THE AP TOP 25: Alabama's 42-13 win over then-No. 22 Auburn on Nov. 28 was head coach Nick Saban's 20th career win by 25-plus points against a ranked opponent. That total ties Bobby Bowden for the most wins by 25-plus in the Associated Press Poll era (since 1936). Saban is also tied with Nebraska's Tom Osborne for the all-time lead with 20 career wins by 20-plus points against AP top-15 opponents, 17 of which have come while at Alabama.

ALWAYS IN THE HUNT: Since the 2008 season, Alabama has played in 149 of 152 regular season games that have had national championship implications. The final three games of the 2010 season marked the only three regular season contests without direct national championship implications over the last 13 seasons.

ONE AND ONLY: Since 2014, the start of the College Football Playoff era, Alabama has only lost one game by 13-plus points. The Crimson Tide's only loss by 13-plus points or more in that time period came in the Crimson Tide's 16-44 loss to Clemson in the College Football Playoff National Championship on Jan. 7, 2019. To compare, Clemson has three losses by 13-plus points in the same time span while Oklahoma has four and Ohio State has five.

WINNING IN 2020: Despite an all-Southeastern Conference schedule and the challenges a league-only slate presents, Alabama has continued its winning ways. Following the release of the first College Football Playoff rankings, the Crimson Tide is the only team in the nation with three wins against teams ranked in the initial CFP poll. Alabama is also the only Power 5 program with four wins over teams with a winning record. The Tide joins Cincinnati, Coastal Carolina and Louisiana as the only four schools in the nation to hold that distinction.

20 OF 39: The Dec. 1 release of the College Football Playoff Rankings had the Crimson Tide as the nation's top-ranked team. That No. 1 ranking marked the 20th week in the 39-week history of the CFP Rankings that Alabama has been the nation's top team, according to the CFP committee. Those 20 weeks at No. 1 are more than every other team combined in CFP history.

ALABAMA HAS MOST WINS SINCE 2008: Dating back to the start of the 2008 season, Alabama has won 158 games, which is the most in the Football Bowl Subdivision. The Crimson Tide won 12 games in 2008, followed by a perfect 14-0 record in 2009, a 10-3 mark in 2010 and a 12-1 record in 2011. Alabama finished 13-1 in 2012 and 2017, 11-2 in 2013 and 2019, 12-2 in 2014, and 14-1 in 2015, 2016 and 2018. Ohio State is second with 142 wins followed closely by Clemson at 141. Boise State ranks fourth with 137 victories, while Oklahoma rounds out the top five, totaling 135 over that span.

NON-OFFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS IN THE SABAN ERA: Jordan Battle's 45-yard interception return for a score against Kentucky on Nov. 21 marked Alabama's 78th non-offensive touchdown of the Nick Saban era and the third in 2020. Since Saban's arrival in 2007, no team in college football has totaled more non-offensive scores than the Crimson Tide. During Saban's tenure, Alabama recorded a single-season record 15 in 2016, which led the Football Bowl Subdivision and was the most in a season by any FBS team in the last 20 years. The Crimson Tide also scored a non-offensive touchdown in 10 consecutive games dating from to the CFP Semifinal vs. Michigan State on Dec. 31, 2015, to the Texas A&M game on Oct. 22, 2016, and had 14 non-offensive touchdowns in that span – four interceptions, four punt returns, five fumble recoveries and a kickoff return.

ALABAMA IN THE CFP RANKINGS

The College Football Playoff was introduced during the 2014 season with the first ever rankings being released on Oct. 28, 2014. The selection committee members meet weekly on Mondays and Tuesdays to produce rankings. The committee's rankings are announced on ESPN each Tuesday evening for the final six weeks of the season. Alabama is one of only two teams to have appeared in five of the six College Football Playoffs along with Clemson. The Crimson Tide (6-3) and Tigers (6-3) are also tied for the CFP record for most wins with six apiece. The next closest teams are Ohio State (2-2) and LSU (2-0) with two wins. Alabama claimed CFP National Championships in both 2015 and 2017.

ALABAMA IN THE AP POLL

Alabama has been ranked in 820 of the 1,182 Associated Press college football polls since 1936, according to the AP Poll Archive. The Crimson Tide owns a 500-132-8 (.788) all-time record in games when ranked in the Associated Press college football poll, including a 141-20 (.876) mark under head coach Nick Saban. Alabama is also ranked in the AP poll for the 209th consecutive week, topping its previous streak set in the mid-1990s when UA was ranked for 71 straight weeks under head coach Gene Stallings. Alabama has started seven seasons at No. 1 (2018, 2017, 2016, 2013, 2010, 1978, 1966).

FIRST TIME STARTERS: The Crimson Tide had one student-athlete make his first career start in the matchup with Kentucky on Nov. 21 as tight end Jahleel Billingsley got the nod. Billingsley joined a collection of 13 players that have made their first career start this season. That group of 13 includes: Brian Branch (Mississippi State); Slade Bolden and Charlie Scott (Tennessee); DeMarcco Hellams (Georgia); Christopher Allen and John Metchie III (Ole Miss); and Chase Allen, Will Anderson Jr., Emil Ekiyor Jr., Sam Johnson, Malachi Moore, Carl Tucker and Daniel Wright (Missouri).

FIRST TIME PLAYERS: In Alabama's Nov. 21 matchup with Kentucky, two student-athletes made their first career appearance in the crimson and white with offensive linemen Damieon George Jr. and Seth McLaughlin each seeing time. The duo joined a group of 23 Crimson Tide players who have earned their first career playing time this season including freshmen Chase Allen (PK), Will Anderson Jr. (LB), Javon Baker (WR), Brian Branch (DB), Jamil Burroughs (DL), Javion Cohen (OL), DJ Douglas (DB), Traeshon Holden (WR), Sam Johnson (P), Thaiu Jones-Bell (WR), Demouy Kennedy (LB), Jah-Marien Latham (DL), Jase McClellan (RB), Malachi Moore (DB), Drew Sanders (LB), Trey Sanders (RB), Tim Smith (DL), Roydell Williams (RB) and Bryce Young (QB), along with junior Ronald Williams Jr. (DB) and seniors Joshua Lanier (WR), Charlie Scott (P) and Carl Tucker (TE).

LEADING THE WAY TO THE NFL: Alabama has had more draft picks over the last 12 drafts (93) than any other college in the nation. An impressive 33 of those picks have been first-round selections. The list of 93 features seven Super Bowl champions, 22 Pro Bowl selections, nine First Team All-Pro members and one Offensive Rookie of the Year. The 2020 Draft featured nine former Alabama standouts that heard their name called across the three-day event. Following the 2020 edition, the Crimson Tide has now had 41 players taken in the last four NFL Drafts, marking four consecutive years that Alabama has had nine or more players drafted.

2020 NFL DRAFT: The Crimson Tide saw nine former players selected in the 2020 NFL Draft, including four first-round picks in Tua Tagovailoa (No. 5, Miami Dolphins), Jedrick Wills Jr. (No. 10, Cleveland Browns), Henry Ruggs III (No. 12, Las Vegas Raiders) and Jerry Jeudy (No. 15, Denver Broncos). Xavier McKinney (No. 36, New York Giants), Trevon Diggs (No. 51, Dallas Cowboys) and Raekwon Davis (No. 56, Miami Dolphins) followed in round two. Linebackers Terrell Lewis (No. 84, Los Angeles Rams) and Anfernee Jennings (No. 87, New England Patriots) rounded out the Tide's selections, each going in the third round. Alabama has now had at least nine players selected in four consecutive drafts and has produced multiple first-round picks in nine of the last 12 NFL Drafts with single first-round selections in 2009, 2015 and 2016.

OFF-THE-FIELD NOTES

ALABAMA DEGREES: Alabama's success on the field over the past 13 seasons under Nick Saban has coincided with the Tide's success in the classroom. The 2020 squad is no exception as Alabama entered the season with 15 players who already had degrees in hand heading into Fall Camp. The list of 15 includes: Deonte Brown, Joseph Bulovas, Logan Burnett, Ben Davis, Landon Dickerson, Joe Donald, Thomas Fletcher, Miller Forristall, Mac Jones, Alex Leatherwood, Joshua McMillon, Chris Owens, DeVonta Smith, Carl Tucker and Daniel Wright. Additionally, Forristall and Owens each earned both their bachelor's and master's degrees prior to the start of the 2020 slate. Since 2013, UA has seen 173 degrees earned (graduate and undergraduate) by players who were still suiting up for the Crimson Tide after having graduated. Since the 2010 season, Alabama has seen an impressive 26 players earn a master's degree before stepping foot on the field for the final time.

GRADUATING WITH THE BEST: The Alabama football team has not only been dominant on the field, but also in the classroom. In May of this year, the Crimson Tide posted a program record Academic Progress Rate (APR) mark of 990, which bettered the national average for Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) teams by 22 points. Alabama football also earned public recognition from the NCAA for their APR score figuring in the top-10 percentile nationally among all football teams. The Tide also moved up to an 85 in the most recent Graduation Success Rate (GSR) figures released last October. Those numbers covered student-athletes who attended the University during 2009-12. Alabama's 85 ranked third amongst Southeastern Conference football programs, marking the 11th year in a row that the Tide football squad has ranked in the top four in the SEC by GSR.

ALABAMA SHARES 2019 AFCA ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT AWARD: The Alabama football program was among six recipients of the 2019 American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Academic Achievement Award. It marked the second time in the last three years the Crimson Tide earned the recognition. Alabama was one of six football programs to receive the honor last year, joining the Air Force Academy, Clemson, Louisville, Rice and Utah. The NCAA's single-year Academic Progress Rate (APR) is used to select the winner and all six schools posted perfect scores of 1,000 for 2017-18. Each student-athlete receiving athletically related financial aid earns one point for staying in school and one point for being academically eligible. A team's total points are divided by points possible and then multiplied by 1,000 to equal the team's Academic Progress Rate. The award recognized the CFA-member Football Bowl Subdivision institution with the highest graduation rate among members of its football team. When the CFA disbanded in 1997, the AFCA stepped in to present the award.

DICKERSON, WILLS JR. EARN CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT HONORS: Offensive linemen Landon Dickerson and Jedrick Wills Jr. were both voted to the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-District IV team. It was the second such honor for Wills Jr. and the first for Dickerson. Now pursuing his master's in business administration (MBA), Dickerson previously earned his undergraduate degree in management with a 3.68 GPA at Florida State. Wills Jr. carried a 3.44 GPA while pursuing a degree in finance. Following their selections a year ago, Alabama football has now tallied 19 CoSIDA All-District honors since 2009, including Academic All-America honors eight times under head coach Nick Saban, the most notable being Barrett Jones, the only four-time honoree in CoSIDA Football Academic All-America history.

HARRIS NAMED WITTEN COLLEGIATE MOTY SEMIFINALIST: Najee Harris was selected as one of 20 semifinalists for the fourth annual Jason Witten Collegiate Man of the Year Award on Nov. 17. The award focuses primarily on a player's leadership, both on and off the field. The semifinalists have all demonstrated leadership by exhibiting exceptional courage, integrity and sportsmanship. The finalists will be named on Dec. 16 with the winner being announced at the award ceremony on Feb. 16, 2021. The winner of the Jason Witten Collegiate Man of the Year Award will also receive a \$10,000 contribution in his name to his school's athletic scholarship fund.

ACADEMIC PROWESS: The Tide has been a model of success on the football field, but the team has generated plenty of accolades in the classroom as well. Below are some of the academic highlights under Nick Saban.

- A total of 15 Crimson Tide players will take the field with their degrees in hand for the season opener against Missouri.
- Earned Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 85 in 2018-19 ranked third among SEC football programs.
- In 2018, Alabama ranked among the national leaders with 22 graduates on its roster during postseason play. The Tide led the nation in graduates on its roster during postseason play in 2015 (29), 2014 (22) and 2013 (28).
- Alabama's five national title football teams under Nick Saban (2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017) included 114 players who had earned their degrees prior to game time.
- The 2014 team was recognized as one of the nation's top academic programs, ranking third in the annual academic rankings of the top 25 college football teams produced by New America, a Washington D.C. think-tank.
- The 2011 BCS national championship team had 21 graduates playing in the bowl game, which was the second most in the country.
- That 2011 team led the SEC with 38 student-athletes being named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll.
- The 2009 BCS national championship team led the country with 11 graduates playing in the bowl game.
- In 2017-18, Alabama finished second in the number of football student-athletes being named to the SEC First-Year Academic Honor Roll with 10 honorees. Alabama topped that list in 2009, 2010 and 2011 and shared the top spot in the 2015-16 academic year.

DICKERSON NAMED SEMIFINALIST FOR WILLIAM V. CAMPBELL TROPHY: Offensive lineman Landon Dickerson was selected as a semifinalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy, awarded to the college football player who possesses the best combination of academics, community service and on-field performance. He is one of 199 candidates nominated for the award. Now in graduate school, Dickerson wrapped up his undergraduate degree at Florida State University with a 3.684 cumulative grade-point average in sports management. His efforts helped him to graduate Cum Laude from FSU in just three years. While in Tallahassee, he was selected to the Dean's List five times and named to the ACC All-Academic Team in 2016. Arriving in Tuscaloosa in 2019, Dickerson enrolled in the University's MBA program and was selected to the CoSIDA Academic All-District IV team in 2019 in addition to earning SEC First-Year Academic Honor Roll recognition as a redshirt junior. In addition to his standout efforts in the classroom, he has taken part in nearly 40 hours of community service across his two schools while also being selected to Alabama Football's Leadership Group for his senior season.

CRIMSON TIDE IN THE COMMUNITY: Last season, Alabama worked 100-plus hours of community service in Tuscaloosa and the surrounding areas. The team volunteered its time across numerous areas during the 2019 season including in schools, hospitals, local food banks, retirement homes, with Habitat for Humanity and on campus.

ALABAMA IN THE COACHES POLL

The Crimson Tide has enjoyed much success in the coaches rankings over the past half century. The United Press International debuted the coaches poll in 1950 and ran the poll through the 1990 season. USA TODAY has administered the poll for the past 30 seasons (1991-2020), and in 2014, Amway became the title sponsor. Alabama was ranked No. 1 in the 2010 preseason coaches' poll after starting out the 2009 preseason poll at No. 5. Alabama remained in the top five the entire season, reaching No. 1 after defeating Florida in the SEC Championship and holding the position to claim the national championship after defeating Texas in Pasadena. The Tide then claimed the No. 1 spot to close out the 2011, 2012, 2015 and 2017 seasons. The Tide has compiled four UPI (1961, 1964, 1973 and 1979) and six USA TODAY (1992, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015 and 2017) coaches poll national titles.

ALLSTATE AFCA GOOD WORKS TEAM NOMINEE NAJEE HARRIS: Najee Harris was nominated for the 2020 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team. The award is one of the most esteemed off-the-field honors in college football and recognizes nominees across all NCAA and NAIA divisions for the 2020 season. While at UA, Harris has been one of the Crimson Tide football team's most active members in the community. He has recorded nearly 50 hours of community service, highlighted by his volunteer efforts with the Alberta Head Start Unity Project where he has served as a positive role model for the children, reading to and mentoring the youth. Additionally, Harris and his teammates visited Fun Spot America in Orlando, Fla., for the Vrbo Citrus Bowl Day for Kids. Following that, Harris participated in the Dance Marathon for the Children's Miracle Network to help raise money for the Children's of Alabama hospital. His most recent volunteer effort saw the senior attend a "Night to Shine" as a prom buddy. The event is an unforgettable prom night experience for people with special needs and is hosted around the world in more than 720 host churches across 50 states and 34 countries.

HARRIS NAMED WITTEN SEMIFINALIST: Najee Harris was selected as one of 20 semifinalists for the fourth annual Jason Witten Collegiate Man of the Year Award on Nov. 17. The award focuses primarily on a player's leadership, both on and off the field. The semifinalists have all demonstrated leadership by exhibiting exceptional courage, integrity and sportsmanship. The finalists will be named on Dec. 16 with the winner being announced at the award ceremony on Feb. 16, 2021. The winner of the Jason Witten Collegiate Man of the Year Award will also receive a \$10,000 contribution in his name to his school's athletic scholarship fund.

FORRISTALL SELECTED TO WUERFFEL TROPHY WATCH LIST: Tight end Miller Forristall was tabbed to the 2020 Wuerffel Trophy Watch List, joining a group of 114 candidates up for the honor given to the college football player who best combines exemplary community service with athletic and academic achievement. The redshirt senior has contributed over 200 hours of service across various communities during his time at the Capstone. He took two separate mission trips with the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) and Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA). While on those two trips, Forristall spent a week in Costa Rica coaching football camps while also helping to educate the community on healthy habits and conditions and followed that by traveling to a Nicaraguan Refugee Camp with fellow FCA student-athletes. In addition to his mission work, Forristall participated in hospital visits and community service events as part of the Tide's bowl trips during his time with the football team.

FORRISTALL NAMED TO SENIOR CLASS AWARD LIST: Redshirt senior Miller Forristall was named as a candidate for the Senior CLASS Award on Nov. 13. He is one of 30 candidates for the award. An acronym for 'Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School', the award focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities. The list will be narrowed to 10 finalists at the end of the regular season with the winner being announced during bowl season.

ALABAMA ATHLETICS AS A WHOLE: The University of Alabama has built a total program, winning championships on the field and bringing home plenty of academic awards in the classroom.

- Since 2008, Crimson Tide athletics teams have won 11 national championships in five different sports and 26 SEC championships in eight different sports. That tally includes two College Football Playoff National Championships and five SEC team titles in four different sports over the last five years. Overall, the Crimson Tide has won 27 national championships and 106 conference titles.
- Alabama Athletics tallied more than 150 graduates over the past academic year. That number includes an NCAA and World champion, 25 All-Americans and eight Academic All-Americans, as well as 16 master's degrees between winter, spring and summer graduates. The Tide's latest NCAA Graduation Success Rate was 91, two points higher than the year before, and stood third among SEC schools.
- On a department-wide basis, Alabama's more than 600 student-athletes averaged over a 3.5 grade-point average during 2019-20. All 17 programs earned better than a 2.9 GPA with 16 earning better than a 3.0 and 11 achieving a 3.5 GPA for the year, marking the 10th year in a row that at least five teams have met that standard.
- Alabama was also prolific when it came to the SEC Academic Honor Roll, coming away with the 385 honors during the 2019-20 academic year. The Tide had 78, 60 and 127 student-athletes named to the SEC Fall, Winter and Spring Academic Honor Rolls, respectively, and 120 named to the First-Year Academic Honor Roll.
- The Crimson Tide was once again among the national leaders when it comes to Academic All-America honors, totaling 12 during the 2019-20 academic year. With a dozen in 2019-20, Alabama is the only school to earn double-digit honors the last seven years in a row, totaling an NCAA-best 78 over that span. The Tide also leads the nation in Academic All-America honors since 2000 with 156 and is No. 1 in the SEC and fifth all-time with 192.
- Alabama student-athletes were voted the SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year for their respective sports a conference-record eight times during the 2019-20 academic year. Crimson Tide student-athletes from 13 different teams have earned SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year recognition for their respective sports a conference-best 60 times since the honor's inception in 2003, tallying more than a dozen better than the next closest school.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

35-OR-MORE IN 21 STRAIGHT: The Crimson Tide scored 42 points in last Saturday's matchup with then-No. 22/22/19 Auburn. That total marked the 21st straight game that Alabama's offense has scored 35-or-more points, which is the longest streak in major-college football history. Oregon scored at least 35 points in 15 consecutive games from Nov. 5, 2011 through a Nov. 17, 2012 loss to Stanford by a score of 17-14. Alabama's last game of not posting 35-or-more points came in the Tide's 44-16 loss to Clemson in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game on Jan. 7, 2019.

SCORING 38-PLUS ON THE ROAD: Included in Alabama's 20 straight games of 35-or-more points is a streak of seven straight road games with 38-plus points scored. That streak ties the current Ohio State team for the second-longest stretch of 38-or-more points on the road in the Associated Press Poll Era (since 1936). The only program with a longer run was Oregon with the Ducks posting a nine-game streak from 2011-13.

BIG POINTS vs. THE SEC: Alabama defeated Kentucky by a 60-point margin with a final score of 63-3 on Nov. 21. The win against the Wildcats was the Crimson Tide's seventh 50-plus point victory over a Southeastern Conference opponent under head coach Nick Saban. Since Saban's arrival in 2007, the rest of the SEC has combined for six 50-point victories in league play over that span.

700+ YARDS OF TOTAL OFFENSE: The Crimson Tide posted 723 yards of total offense at Ole Miss on Oct. 10. That total ranks as the second-most yards ever produced by an Alabama offense in a single game. Alabama amassed 417 yards passing and 306 yards rushing against the Rebels, making them the first team since Oklahoma in 2016 to pass for 400 yards and rush for 300 yards against a Power 5 opponent. The all-time record for yards in a game by a UA offense is 833 at home in Tuscaloosa against Virginia Tech on Oct. 27, 1973.

600+ YARDS OF TOTAL OFFENSE: Alabama eclipsed the 600-plus yard mark by rolling up 723 yards of total offense against Ole Miss on Oct. 10. The Crimson Tide has gone over the 600-yard marker only seven times prior to the matchup with the Rebels, most recently at Vanderbilt on Sept. 23, 2017, when the UA produced 677 yards of offense against the Commodores.

500+ YARDS OF TOTAL OFFENSE: Alabama recorded 509 yards of total offense against Kentucky on Nov. 21, marking the 38th time in the last 79 games, dating to the start of the 2015 season, that the Crimson Tide has eclipsed the 500-yard mark. In 2018, UA totaled 500 or more yards in 12-of-15 games to set a single-season record. The Tide followed that up by eclipsing 500 yards of offense in nine of the 13 games of the 2019 campaign. Alabama has gone over the 500-yard marker in five of seven games so far this season.

QUICK STRIKE: Alabama is leading all Power 5 programs in scoring average at 48.5 points per game (through eight games) and more often than not those touchdowns have come in the blink of an eye. The Crimson Tide has scored 52 touchdowns this year with four coming from the defense. The Tide offense is averaging six touchdowns per game (48 touchdowns) with an astonishing 32 of those scores coming on drives of less than three minutes – or 67.7 percent. Of those 32 drives under three minutes, 29 of those have been in under 2:30 and 19 have been in less than two minutes. Alabama also has 17 touchdown drives in five plays or less with 12 of those in four plays or less.

TICK, TICK, BOOM: Explosive plays have been a big part of Alabama's offense in 2020. The Crimson Tide has produced 68 passing plays of 15 yards or more and 51 rushes of 10 yards or more. That includes 28 passes of 25 yards or more (27 by Mac Jones) and 21 rushes of 15 yards or more. Jones and Alabama have also connected on 17 passes of at least 35 yards with nine of those going for touchdowns. Wide receiver DeVonta Smith has a team-leading 25 receptions that have covered at least 15 yards with five scores on those plays, including strikes of 66, 58 and 53 yards. On the ground, Najee Harris has 29 rushes of at least 10 yards with five runs of 33 yards or more.

75-PLUS FOR A SCORE UNDER SARK: Since Steve Sarkisian took over as offensive coordinator in 2018, the Crimson Tide has had an FBS-leading six different players catch a touchdown pass of 75 yards or more. So far this season, the Alabama offense has posted three, including a 90-yard connection for Jaylen Waddle against Georgia on Oct. 17. That scoring strike joined an 87-yard and 78-yard scoring play against Texas A&M on Oct. 3. The 87-yarder came from Waddle and was preceded by a 78-yarder from John Metchie III for the first score of the game.

STACKING UP 100s: Alabama's explosive offense has produced 11 individual 100-plus yard receiving performances through eight games this season, including at least one 100-plus yard receiver in every game. The Crimson Tide has also had multiple players in the same game over the 100-yard mark in three contests in 2020. Those numbers by the Tide wideouts are even more impressive due to the fact that they have come against SEC defenses. For perspective, Alabama's offense produced 11 100-plus yard efforts through 13 games last season and did so 13 times in 15 games during 2018 across conference and non-conference pairings.

TWO OVER 100: With 100-plus yard receiving performances from both senior DeVonta Smith (167) and junior Jaylen Waddle (161) against Georgia on Oct. 17, Alabama has now recorded 12 games in program history with two receivers over the 100-yard mark. The performance against the Bulldogs was Alabama's third time this season with two wideouts posting 100-plus yards, joining the Oct. 10 performance from Smith (164) and Waddle (120) at Ole Miss in addition to the Oct. 3 output against Texas A&M from sophomore John Metchie III (181) and Waddle (142). Alabama's 12 total games with two over 100 yards includes one game in 2019 and three in 2018. Prior to 2018, the Crimson Tide had only seen receiving duos post 100 or more receiving yards in the same game five times in history and only once in the Nick Saban era.

FIRST-HALF 100s: DeVonta Smith recorded 104 yards receiving in the first half of the Nov. 21 Iron Bowl against then-No. 22/22/19 Auburn, including a first quarter that saw the senior total 92 yards on only two catches, one of which was a 66-yard touchdown reception. With Smith's 104-yard half, Crimson Tide wideouts have totaled 100-plus yards in the first half on 10 occasions in UA's last 21 games, including the first three games to start the 2020 campaign and five of eight contests overall this season.

400+ PASSING, 150+ RECEIVING x2, 150+ RUSHING: Alabama's offense showed no signs of slowing down despite playing the nation's top-ranked defense when the Crimson Tide squared off with then-No. 3/3 Georgia on Oct. 17. The Tide racked up 564 yards of total offense, including 417 passing and 147 on the ground. Mac Jones totaled all 417 passing yards, including connections with DeVonta Smith for 167 yards and Jaylen Waddle for 161 yards through the air. Najee Harris led the UA rushers, recording a career-high 31 carries for 152 yards rushing. With the impressive output from the Tide's four starters, Alabama became the first SEC team over the last 20 years with a 400-yard passer, two 150-plus yard receivers and a 150-yard rusher in the same game.

OPENING DRIVE TOUCHDOWNS: Running back Najee Harris carried from a yard out for a Crimson Tide touchdown on Alabama's opening drive against Kentucky on Nov. 21. With that score, the Crimson Tide extended its winning streak to 37 straight games when scoring a touchdown on the first offensive possession of the game. The Tide's last loss after finding the end zone on its first drive was to the Oklahoma Sooners in the 2014 Allstate Sugar Bowl.

SCORING STREAK CONTINUES: Alabama extended its school record for consecutive games with a score to 263 thanks to DeVonta Smith's 66 catch-and-run for a score on the Crimson Tide's second offensive possession of the Nov. 28 Iron Bowl matchup with then-No. 22/22/19 Auburn. The Crimson Tide was last held off the scoreboard in a 9-0 loss to Auburn on Nov. 18, 2000. Alabama has a 208-55 (.791) record over the course of the current streak.

BALL PROTECTION: In the last 175 games dating to the start of the 2008 season, Alabama has turned the ball over only 190 times (104 fumbles, 86 interceptions) for 1.09 turnovers per game. Since 2009, the Tide has turned the ball over only 172 times in 161 games (1.07/game). That number since 2009 includes 68 interceptions in 4,130 attempts (1 INT every 60.7 attempts) by UA starting quarterbacks and 30 fumbles in 4,197 carries (one fumble lost every 139.9 carries) by the Tide's top two running backs.

WHO? MAC JONES: Following the Nov. 28 Iron Bowl against then-No. 22/22/19 Auburn, redshirt junior Mac Jones has totaled 12 starts across his Alabama career. Through those 12 starts his passing numbers are impressive when compared to his predecessors Tua Tagovailoa and Jalen Hurts. Jones is the only player in the group of three to eclipse the 400-yard mark at least once across his first 12 starts (three times, vs. A&M - Oct. 3; at Ole Miss - Oct. 10; vs. Georgia - Oct. 17) and is averaging 325.0 yards per game across that stretch to lead the trio. Below is a look at Jones compared to his former teammates.

JONES' IMPRESSIVE PACE IN 2020: Through eight games this season, Mac Jones has totaled 2,728 yards and 23 touchdowns while sporting a 76.2 completion percentage. His passing yards are the most by any Alabama quarterback through the first eight games of a season in program history, surpassing Tua Tagovailoa's previous program mark of 2,584 passing yards through the first eight contests of 2019. Jones' 23 touchdowns through the air are third with the top total being Tua's 2019 record of 31 scores. In addition, Jones' 76.2 completion percentage is the program-high mark by a quarterback with at least 40 attempts through the first eight games in the last 20-plus years. He passed Tagovailoa's 2018 number of 70.9 (166-234).

MAC vs. THE PACK: Alabama quarterback Mac Jones has been one of the nation's top-rated passers. The redshirt junior has continued to impress as the season has worn on and looks to continue that impressive pace. Below is a look at Jones' 2020 numbers against current NCAA Division I quarterbacks along with past Heisman winners.

AT HIS BEST, AGAINST THE BEST: Mac Jones has started three games this season against teams ranked in the top 25 of all major polls at the time of the game, leading Alabama to wins over then-No. 3/3 Georgia (41-24), then-No. 13/13 Texas A&M (52-24) and then-No. 22/22/19 Auburn (42-13). In those three matchups, Jones has combined to post a collegiate passer efficiency rating of 232.75 (144.73 NFL) after throwing for 1,154 yards and 13 touchdowns compared to two interceptions while completing 72.9 percent (62-of-85) of his passes. He has five career starts against top 25 competition, including 2019 starts at then-No. 15/16/16 Auburn and against then-No. 14/17/17 Michigan in the Vrbo Citrus Bowl. Across his five starts against ranked opponents, Jones is 104-of-149 (70.0) and has averaged 363.2 passing yards per game (1,816 yards) with 20 touchdowns and four picks while maintaining a passer rating of 211.10.

MAC CAN BRING YOU BACK: Alabama has maintained a lead in a majority of its minutes played so far this season, but in the time that the Tide has trailed, Mac Jones has shined. When Alabama has been behind in games during the 2020 campaign, Jones is 28-of-33 (84.4 percent) passing for 469 yards. Of those 28 completions, 24 accounted for UA first downs and 12 of his passes gained 15-plus yards. Alabama has trailed in both the Ole Miss and Georgia games.

JONES GOES OVER 400 PASSING...AGAIN: Mac Jones finished the Oct. 17 game against then-No. 3/3 Georgia with 417 passing yards on the night. His performance against the Bulldogs marked his third consecutive 400-plus yard performance this season and the third of his career. Thanks to his efforts against UGA, Jones now owns three of Alabama's nine all-time 400-plus yard passing performances and is tied with Tua Tagovailoa (2017-19) for the most 400-yard passing performances in Alabama history. Tagovailoa's all came during his junior campaign in 2019.

JONES' 400-YARD PASSING GAMES IN THE SEC RANKS: Mac Jones is on the cusp of a Southeastern Conference record with his three 400-yard passing games. The league's single-season mark for 400-yard passing games is four which has been accomplished three times in SEC history - Tim Couch (1998), Johnny Manziel (2013) and Joe Burrow (2019).

DON'T SLEEP ON MAC'S DEEP BALL: Mac Jones has been efficient this season when throwing the deep ball. He is currently 22-of-40 (55.0) with three drops (adjusted completion percentage of 62.5) and has accumulated 991 yards with 11 touchdowns (second nationally) and two interceptions on passes thrown more than 20 yards beyond the line of scrimmage. That comes out to a 118.8 NFL passer rating and a 343.86 mark by NCAA standards.

MR. 85-PLUS, MAC JONES: Redshirt junior quarterback Mac Jones has totaled four passing touchdowns of 85 yards or more during his Alabama career to set the program-high total. Jones first connected with Jaylen Waddle for a 94-yarder against Louisiana on Sept. 29, 2018. The quarterback followed a year later by finding Jerry Judy for an 85-yard score to open the Vrbo Citrus Bowl against Michigan on Jan. 1 to close out last season. Jones found Waddle for an 87-yarder against Texas A&M on Oct. 7 and most recently connected with Waddle for a 90-yard score against then-No. 3/3 Georgia on Oct. 17. Brodie Croyle and AJ McCarron are each tied for second with two passing touchdowns of 85 yards or more. McCarron holds the Alabama record for longest passing touchdown in program history at 99 yards when he connected with Amari Cooper against Auburn on Nov. 30, 2013.

JONES SETS UA CONSECUTIVE COMPLETIONS MARK: Mac Jones completed 19 consecutive passes across the Oct. 17 matchup with Georgia and into the Tennessee game a week later. The 19 straight completions set a new Alabama record for consecutive completions, surpassing Greg McElroy's all-time mark of 16. Jones finished 8-of-8 to close out the Georgia game and began the contest in Knoxville by completing 11 passes in a row before an incomplection to break the streak. Jones also completed 13 straight earlier this season across the Texas A&M and Ole Miss matchups, a number that ranked third all-time by a UA signal-caller.

HIGH PRAISE FOR SMITTY FROM PFF: Senior DeVonta Smith has received exceptional grades from Pro Football Focus this season. According to the site, Smith is the top-rated wideout in college football with a 93.6 overall grade. He is currently on-pace to be the highest-rated single-season wide receiver in PFF history. Alabama's Amari Cooper earned a 93.3 PFF rating on his way to winning the Biletnikoff Award in 2014. Smith has totaled a team-high 1,074 yards (third nationally) and 12 touchdowns (first) on a team-best 72 catches (third) this season. Included in those stats are 55 first downs converted on his 72 receptions (76.4 percent), a total that is tops in college football. He also has 550 yards after the catch, or 7.64 per reception, to lead the nation. Even more impressive is the fact that Smith has only two drops across his 85 targets in 2020.

SMITH RACKING UP YAC: DeVonta Smith has totaled 1,074 yards through eight games this season. The senior has picked up 550 of those yards after the catch, or 51.2 percent of his yardage total. Smith's 550 yards leads all NCAA Division I wide receivers and is 45 more than Ole Miss' Elijah Moore who is second in the country at 505. Smith and Moore are the only wideouts in the nation with 500-plus yards after the catch.

HE'S HEATING UP: DeVonta Smith has put together a monster season in 2020 but his numbers have been near unbelievable over his last three contests. The senior has recorded 518 yards and eight touchdowns on 27 catches across that stretch. In the three games against Mississippi State (Oct. 31), Kentucky (Nov. 21) and then-No. 22/22/19 Auburn (Nov. 28), Smith has totaled 144 or more receiving yards and at least seven catches while post multiple touchdown receptions in all three games.

SIX-GAME STRETCH FOR SMITTY: Despite starting the season with back-to-back solid games, DeVonta Smith has leveled up in his last six starts. Since the start of the Ole Miss game, Smith has totaled 922 receiving yards and 11 touchdowns on 58 receptions. He's averaging 9.7 receptions per game and 15.9 yards per catch over that stretch along with 153.7 receiving yards per game and 1.8 touchdowns. All five of his 100-plus yard performances have come during the six games, including a 203-yard effort against Mississippi State. The senior has also posted seven-plus catches in all six games while totaling two-or-more touchdowns in four of those contests.

SMITH SETS ALABAMA, SEC CAREER TD RECORD: DeVonta Smith's touchdown reception in the second quarter against Kentucky on Nov. 21 was the 32nd of his career, officially making him the new Alabama and Southeastern Conference record holder. Smith passed former Alabama wideout Amari Cooper (2012-14) who held the record for the Crimson Tide with 31. Cooper and Smith were both tied with Chris Doering (1992-95) for the SEC record prior to the matchup with the Wildcats. Smith continued against UK by scoring one more touchdown to add to his lead. He has totaled 35 career touchdowns entering the LSU contest.

1K for DEVONTA: Senior wideout DeVonta Smith has totaled 1,074 receiving yards through eight games during in 2020. The 1,000-plus yard performance is the second of his career after the Louisiana native tallied 1,256 receiving yards as a junior. The back-to-back seasons of 1,000-plus receiving yards make him just the fourth wideout in Alabama history to post 1,000 receiving yards in multiple seasons joining Jerry Judy (2018-2019), Amari Cooper (2012, 2014) and DJ Hall (2006-07). Cooper holds the UA single-season receiving yards record with 1,727 on 124 catches in 2014.

SMITH IN 2020: DeVonta Smith has put together an impressive 2020 season for the Crimson Tide. Despite playing against only SEC defenses, the senior's numbers are placing him near the top of the Alabama single-season receiving ranks. Below is a look at where Smith ranks.

SMITTY OVER 100 AGAIN: DeVonta Smith finished the Iron Bowl against then-No. 22/22/19 Auburn on Nov. 28 with 171 yards receiving to go over the 100-yard marker for the fifth time this season. Those five 100-plus yard performances give him 10 for his career as he entered his senior campaign with five in hand. Smith totaled two in 2018 and followed that up with three as a junior a season ago. His 10 100-plus yard performances tie for the third-most in Alabama history.

METCHIE STEPPING UP: Second-year wideout John Metchie III has filled in nicely this season following the departures of first-rounders Jerry Jeudy and Henry Ruggs III. He has continued to step up in the absence of Jaylen Waddle. Metchie is currently producing the nation's best passer rating (145.8) when targeted among Power 5 receivers (second in the FBS). He has become one of Mac Jones' favorite deep targets, averaging 19.0 yards per target. Seventeen of the sophomore's 31 total receptions have been passes of 15-plus yards, to tie for the fifth-most in Division I, while he is averaging 19.03 yards per catch to rank 12th in the Power 5 and 25th overall in the FBS (minimum of five games played).

HARRIS FOR SIX: Najee Harris has racked up 17 rushing touchdowns in only eight games during the 2020 season. Those 17 scores on the ground tie with Trent Richardson (2011) for the most in Alabama history across the first eight games to start a season. Harris totaled 16 rushing touchdowns through his first seven games of 2020 which were the most by any Southeastern Conference player through seven games over the last 20 seasons. He also recorded 14 touchdowns through the first five games to tie with Lamar Jackson for the second-most scores through his team's first five games over the last 25 seasons. Ricky Williams was the only player with more, totaling 20 in 1998.

NAJ YOU SEEM HIM, NOW YOU DON'T: Najee Harris has proven to be tough to tackle throughout his career and this season is no different. According to Pro Football Focus, the senior tailback has forced 59 missed tackles through eight games to rank fourth in the nation in that category. Harris also owns a 33.7 percent forced missed tackle rate which ranks him in the top 10 nationally and better than the NCAA average of 21.6 percent.

HARRIS MOVING UP THE CHARTS: Najee Harris exploded onto the scene in 2019 after taking over Alabama's starting tailback job. In that junior season, he accumulated 1,224 rushing yards to propel him into the top-15 for career rushers at UA while his 13 rushing touchdowns also moved him into the top-15. After carrying 11 times for 96 yards and one touchdown against then-No. 22/22/19 Auburn last weekend, Harris has totaled 3,270 rushing yards and 37 touchdowns for his career. Those numbers include 783 yards and four scores as a sophomore to go with 370 yards and three touchdowns as a freshman, in addition to his junior totals. Alabama's all-time leader for career rushing yards is Derrick Henry with 3,591 from 2013-15 while the career rushing touchdowns leader is split between Mark Ingram (2008-10) and Henry at 42.

12 IN A ROW WITH A TD FOR NAJEE: With Najee Harris' one-yard rushing score in the first quarter of the Oct. 24 matchup at Tennessee, the senior notched a rushing touchdown in 12 straight games dating back to the Oct. 19 matchup with the Volunteers last season. Over the 12-game streak, Harris accumulated 26 rushing touchdowns and two-or-more scores in eight of those games. He also totaled 1,368 yards on 238 carries during that stretch. Included in those numbers were his 14 touchdowns through the first five games of this season which were a new Alabama program record for rushing scores through the first five games of a season.

HARRIS' TOUCHDOWN STREAK - WHERE IT RANKS: Najee Harris rushed for a touchdown in 12 straight games from the Oct. 19, 2019 matchup against Tennessee through this season's contest against the Vols on Oct. 24. The 12 games rank as the second-longest streak in Alabama history and ranked third in Southeastern Conference annals. The Crimson Tide's all-time record is 20 straight games by Derrick Henry from 2014-15, which is also the league-high mark. Ranking second in SEC history is Tim Tebow, who notched a rushing score across 14 games from 2006-07.

VS. AUBURN

MULTIPLE WEEKLY HONORS FOR JONES: Mac Jones picked up numerous weekly honors for his play in the 2020 edition of the Iron Bowl. The Crimson Tide signal-caller was selected as one of the Manning Stars of the Week and named to the Davey O'Brien Great 8 List. In addition to being named to each list, Jones was selected as the SEC Offensive Player of the Week and was named the O'Brien National Quarterback of the Week two days later. The honors flooded in thanks to his record-setting day against Auburn on Nov. 28. Jones totaled a career-high five touchdown passes to tie the all-time record for passing touchdowns in the rivalry game, connecting from 66, 7, 24, 58 and 24 yards out. He finished 18-of-26 for 302 yards and averaged 16.8 yards per completion, connecting on six throws of 24 yards or better.

JONES TIES IRON BOWL RECORD: Mac Jones finished his Iron Bowl on Nov. 28 with five passing touchdowns. The five touchdowns through the air tie for the second-most in a single game, trailing only Tua Tagovailoa's six against Ole Miss on Sept. 28, 2019. Jones' five scores matched Tagovailoa (2018) for the Iron Bowl record for passing touchdowns.

QUICK DRIVES vs. THE TIGERS: The 2020 Iron Bowl saw then-No. 22/22/19 Auburn possess the ball on offense for 36:30 compared to Alabama's 23:30. The time of possession did not affect the Crimson Tide offense, however, as UA posted 42 total points on six touchdowns. Of those six touchdowns, five came on drives that lasted the Alabama offense less than 2:30. The Tide's first touchdown capped a 1:51 drive and was followed by scoring drives of 2:21, 2:27, 1:28 and 2:07. Alabama's only drive eclipsing the 2:30 mark came in the fourth quarter as the Tide ate up 5:10 of clock with the game already well in hand.

CAPPING THE DRIVE WITH BIG PLAYS: Alabama's offense totaled six touchdowns in the Iron Bowl with five of those scores coming from 24-or-more yards out. The Crimson Tide recorded touchdowns through the air on passes of 66, 58, 24 and 24 along with a rush of 39 for a score. Alabama's other touchdown came on a seven-yard pass which was set up by a drive that featured a 26-yard reception from DeVonta Smith and a 25-yard reception from Najee Harris. The Harris catch pushed UA into the red zone where Mac Jones connected with John Metchie III for the seven-yard score.

VS. KENTUCKY

SMITH EARNS SEC HONORS: Senior DeVonta Smith was selected as the Southeastern Conference Offensive Player of the Week following the Crimson Tide's matchup with Kentucky. The senior wideout etched his name atop the SEC and Alabama record books for career touchdown catches. He tallied two scores on the day his first touchdown moving him into sole possession of the career touchdown receptions mark, passing Amari Cooper and Chris Doering for the league record. In the contest with Kentucky, Smith totaled nine catches for 144 yards to go with his two scores. He averaged 16.0 yards per catch and registered five explosive plays of 18 yards or more, including a long grab of 35. The Amite, La., native added two punt returns for a combined 50 yards with a long return of 41 by day's end.

SMITH SETS ALABAMA, SEC CAREER TD RECORD: DeVonta Smith's touchdown reception in the second quarter against Kentucky on Nov. 21 was the 32nd of his career, making him the new Alabama and SEC record holder. Smith passed former Alabama wideout Amari Cooper (2012-14) who held the record at UA with 31. Cooper and Smith were both tied with Chris Doering (1992-95) for the SEC record prior to the matchup with the Wildcats. Smith added one more touchdown late in the game to pad his lead.

HARRIS FROM 42: Najee Harris scored from 42 yards out for his second touchdown of the day against Kentucky on Nov. 21. The 42-yard rush was the longest scoring play of his career and his longest run across his four seasons.

NAJEE FOR TWO-OR-MORE: Najee Harris rushed for two touchdowns against Kentucky on Nov. 21, marking the fifth time this season he has recorded two-or-more rushing scores in a game. Harris has also tallied at least one rushing touchdown in seven of the Tide's eight games so far.

MCCLELLAN JUST SHY OF 100: Jase McClellan recorded the first stats of his young career, carrying the ball 10 times for 99 yards against Kentucky on Nov. 21. The freshman running back also tallied his first career touchdown in the contest. His 99 rushing yards were the fourth-most all-time in school history for a debut effort by a Crimson Tide rusher. Only Siran Stacy (169), Eddie Lacy (113) and T.J. Yeldon (111) produced more in their first game recording a carry.

VS. MISSISSIPPI STATE

SMITTY OVER 200 AGAIN: Wide receiver DeVonta Smith totaled 203 receiving yards in the Crimson Tide's Oct. 31 matchup with Mississippi State. The 200-plus yard performance was the third of Smith's career and was the 10th instance in program history. His three 200-plus yard receiving games tie Amari Cooper for the most in Alabama history. Smith holds the Crimson Tide's program record with 274 yards on 11 catches against Ole Miss on Sept. 29 of last season. That 2019 campaign also saw him total 213 yards on seven receptions against LSU on Nov. 9.

FOUR MORE SCORES FOR DEVONTA: DeVonta Smith totaled four touchdowns to go with his 203 yards against Mississippi State on Halloween. His four scoring grabs rank as the second-most in a single game in Alabama history, trailing only his own record of five which came against Ole Miss on Sept. 29 last year. Smith also became the only player in Southeastern Conference history with multiple career games with four or more receiving touchdowns.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

LAST 18 QUARTERS FOR THE TIDE DEFENSE: Alabama's defense has come into its own over the last 18 quarters of football (4.5 games). Since halftime of a 41-24 win over then-No. 3/3 Georgia on Oct. 17, Alabama has only allowed 33 points (0 to UGA; 17 at Tennessee; 0 vs. Mississippi State; 3 vs. Kentucky; 13 vs. Auburn) or 7.3 points per game. The Crimson Tide has allowed an average of just 65.6 yards per quarter (1,181 yards in 18 quarters) in that same time frame or 262.4 yards per game. The impressive stretch as of late has helped propel Alabama into the SEC's top spot for scoring defense at 18.5 points per game.

SHUTOUTS SINCE 2007: Since head coach Nick Saban arrived in 2007, Alabama has recorded 24 shutouts, including 12 in Southeastern Conference play. With its 41-0 win over Mississippi State on Halloween night, the Crimson Tide defense has 10 more shutouts than its nearest competitor over that span. Ranking second in shutouts during that time is Ohio State with 14.

PITCHING THE SHUTOUT vs. STATE: Alabama's shutout effort against Mississippi State on Oct. 31 was the Crimson Tide's first defensive shutout since Nov. 10, 2018, also against the Bulldogs. That game resulted in a 24-0 win over State. The shutout on Halloween was also the first time in Mississippi State head coach Mike Leach's career that the offensive mastermind was held to zero points. His career as a head coach spanned 197 games prior to Halloween night in Tuscaloosa.

STINGY FIRST-HALF DEFENSE ON HALLOWEEN: The Alabama defense limited Mississippi State to only 38 yards of offense through the first half of the Oct. 31 matchup with the Bulldogs. That total is the fewest yards allowed in the first half by a UA defense since the 2016 team limited Auburn to only 31 yards on Nov. 26. The Crimson Tide also outgained the Bulldogs by 299 yards through those first two halves of play.

SECOND-HALF SHUTOUT OF THE DAWGS: Alabama's defense allowed 24 points in the first half of the Oct. 17 showdown with Georgia. The Crimson Tide returned from the halftime break to post a shutout of the Bulldogs offense on the way to a 42-21 victory. After allowing 268 yards of offense through the first two quarters, including 91 rushing yards, the Crimson Tide defense rebounded to limit UGA to only 146 yards in the second half and just 54 on the ground. Alabama also forced two interceptions in the second half, both of which came on the Tide's half of the field to halt the driving Bulldogs.

DEFENSE GETTING PRESSURE: Sacks aren't the only way a defense can affect the quarterback and Alabama's defense has been proof of that this season. Alabama ranks ninth in the Southeastern Conference and 84th nationally in team sacks with 1.75 per game (14 on the year), but the Crimson Tide is one of the nation's best at affecting the quarterback with pressure. The Alabama defense has accounted for 156 total pressures in eight games (19.5 per game), according to Pro Football Focus, along with 32 additional hits on the quarterback and 108 hurries. Freshman outside linebacker Will Anderson Jr. leads the nation with 13 quarterback hits while also pacing the SEC with 36 pressures. He is also third in the conference with 22 quarterback hurries.

TURNOVERS, TURNOVERS, TURNOVERS: Alabama's defense forced two turnovers in the Crimson Tide's Iron Bowl win over then-No. 22/22/19 Auburn on Nov. 28, as freshmen Malachi Moore and Brian Branch each picked off a Tiger pass. With the two interceptions, the Crimson Tide has forced at least one turnover in 74 of the last 80 contests dating back to the start of the 2015 season. During the current run, Alabama has forced 134 turnovers (89 interceptions, 45 fumbles) and returned 29 of those miscues for touchdowns.

HOLDING OPPONENTS UNDER 200: Kentucky's 179 yards of total offense on Nov. 21 marked the 52nd time in the last 175 games under Nick Saban (since the start of the 2008 season) that the Crimson Tide defense has held the opposition to fewer than 200 yards of total offense.

HOLDING OPPONENTS UNDER 300: The Crimson Tide defense limited Kentucky to only 179 yards of total offense in Alabama's 63-3 victory over the Wildcats on Nov. 21. The victory over UK marked the 114th time in 188 games (60.6 percent) under head coach Nick Saban that the Tide has held an opponent to less than 300 yards of total offense. More recently, the Crimson Tide has kept 26 of its last 50 opponents below 300 yards, dating back to the 2017 campaign.

10 POINTS OR LESS: Alabama's trademark has been its defense ever since head coach Nick Saban's arrival on campus in 2007. Since that first season in Tuscaloosa, Saban-coached defenses have held the Crimson Tide's opponents to 10 points or less on 93 occasions. Dating back to the start of the 2015 season, UA's defense has limited the opposition to 10 or fewer points 37 times across 80 total contests.

HARD TO FIND THE END ZONE AGAINST THE TIDE: Since the start of the 2009 season, no team has allowed fewer touchdowns than the Crimson Tide. Alabama has surrendered only 260 touchdowns over the last 161 games. That is 65 fewer than the second most in the nation (Wisconsin with 325).

TOUGH SLEDDING ON THE GROUND: Alabama's defense has been a force in the run game since head coach Nick Saban's arrival on campus. More recently, the Crimson Tide has given up just 48 rushing scores in the last 80 games, dating to the start of the 2015 season. The Crimson Tide allowed 11 rushing touchdowns in 2018 after allowing nine rushing touchdowns in 2017. The Tide defense led the nation in 2016 with only five rushing touchdowns allowed, one year after giving up only seven rushing scores through 15 games in 2015, the second-lowest total in the country. Since head coach Nick Saban arrived in 2007, the Crimson Tide has allowed 106 rushing touchdowns. Iowa is No. 2 in that category, giving up 152 since 2007, followed by Ohio State at 162 and Utah, who ranks fourth, at 164. TCU (178) rounds out the group at No. 5.

RUSHING DEFENSE: Alabama has surrendered only 28 individual 100-yard rushing performances dating back to the 2005 season, a mark that is the fewest in the nation. Since head coach Nick Saban's arrival in 2007, the Tide has allowed 23 players to rush for more than 100 yards in a game.

HARRIS SELECTED AS BUTKUS AWARD SEMIFINALIST: Christian Harris was selected as one of 16 semifinalists for the Butkus Award, the Butkus Foundation announced on Monday, Nov. 30. The sophomore leads the Crimson Tide defense in tackles with 57, including a team-high 42 solo stops. He ranks second on UA in quarterback hurries with six and is third in sacks with 2.0 (-17 yards). Harris has added 4.5 tackles for loss (-20 yards) to go with two pass breakups this season. Finalists for the Butkus will be announced Dec. 7 with winners announced on or before Dec. 22.

PS2 ISN'T PLAYING GAMES IN 2020: Patrick Surtain II has been one of the nation's top corners since stepping foot on campus. The junior has continued that trend in 2020, grading out as Pro Football Focus' top corner and No. 7 overall defender at 86.1, which is second in the Power 5 (minimum 448 defensive snaps). Surtain has allowed 25 yards or fewer in seven of eight games played in 2020 while posting an 85.6 coverage grade (according to Pro Football Focus) which ranks second in the FBS. Surtain has played coverage on 334 total snaps and is third in the nation in coverage snaps per target (10.9). He has been targeted 29 times with 14 completions and has allowed just 156 yards with one touchdown through eight games. Surtain's lockdown skills have forced one interception that he returned for a score while the junior has limited opposing quarterbacks to a lowly passer rating of 61.9 when targeting him in coverage.

SURTAIN vs. STATE: Junior corner Patrick Surtain II locked down his half of the field in the Crimson Tide's Oct. 31 matchup with Mississippi State. Despite employing a pass-happy attack on offense, the Bulldogs targeted Surtain only one in his 47 coverage snaps. That one target resulted in a pick-six for the Tide defender.

MALACHI IN THE SLOT: Freshman defensive back Malachi Moore has put together an impressive resume in his short time on campus. The first-year defender has already recorded three interceptions to lead Alabama in addition to breaking up a team-high tying six passes. Moore has moved all over the field but when he is lined up in the slot, he has excelled. According to Pro Football Focus, the freshman leads the nation in forced incompletions from the slot.

MOORE INTERCEPTIONS FOR THE FRESHMAN: First-year defender Malachi Moore has made an immediate impact since stepping foot on campus. The freshman defensive back has already forced four turnovers this season, including three interceptions. Those three picks make him the first Alabama freshman since 2015 to intercept multiple passes. That 2015 season saw Minkah Fitzpatrick, Ronnie Harrison and Marlon Humphrey (redshirt freshman) all record multiple interceptions. Humphrey finished with three picks that season while Fitzpatrick and Harrison each recorded two. Moore has also forced one fumble which he then recovered for a scoop-and-score of 28 yards against Tennessee on Oct. 24.

MALACHI SHINES IN IRON BOWL: Defensive back Malachi Moore shined in his first ever Iron Bowl as the true freshman helped Alabama limit then-No. 22/22/19 Auburn to only 227 yards passing. According to Pro Football Focus, Moore was tasked with 32 coverage snaps and six targets, allowing just one catch for a gain of seven yards while forcing an interception. His pick stalled an AU scoring drive just before halftime.

ANOTHER SEC HONOR FOR MOORE AFTER STATE: Malachi Moore picked up his second SEC Freshman of the Week honor following the Crimson Tide's Oct. 31 matchup with Mississippi State. The defensive back played a key role in shutting out State's high-powered offense. Moore made a team-high eight tackles, including one for loss (-2 yards), while adding two pass breakups. He joined his teammates in forcing the Bulldog passers into a 28-of-48 night for just 163 yards passing with two interceptions.

MOORE EARNS SEC FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK AFTER A&M: Malachi Moore was selected as the SEC Freshman of the Week following his standout play against Texas A&M on Oct. 3. The first-year player tied for third on the UA defense with six tackles and led the Tide with two pass breakups. His day was highlighted by an interception in the end zone to halt an Aggie drive. The pick was the first of his Crimson Tide career.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

PERFECT SO FAR FOR REICHARD: Alabama placekicker Will Reichard is currently perfect on all kicking attempts during the 2020 season. The sophomore is 60-for-60 overall, including 8-of-8 on field goals to go with 52 made PATs in as many attempts. Reichard has also contributed on kickoffs, totaling 2,118 yards on 38 boots for a 55.7 yards per kick average with seven touchbacks.

NINE IN A ROW FOR REICHARD: Dating back to last season, placekicker Will Reichard has made nine straight field goals, including all eight attempts in 2020. The streak of nine straight makes is the fourth-longest in the country. Ahead of the sophomore are two kickers tied at 10 in a row with the leader being Arizona State's Cristian Zendejas at 13 straight made field goals.

REICHARD FROM 50-PLUS: Will Reichard connected on a 52-yard field goal to close out the first half of the Crimson Tide's Oct. 17 matchup with then-No. 3/3 Georgia. The made field goal was the sophomore's career-long score and Alabama's first from 50-or-more yards since Adam Griffith hit from 50 against Auburn on Nov. 28, 2015.

OPPONENT FIELD GOAL STREAK BROKEN: In the Crimson Tide's Oct. 3 matchup with Texas A&M, the Aggies' Seth Small became the first opposing kicker to miss a field goal against Alabama since Georgia's Rodrigo Blankenship missed from 30 yards out in the third quarter of the 2018 SEC Championship Game (Dec. 1, 2018). Opponents had made 25 consecutive field goals, including 20-of-20 across the 2019 season.

SERIES NOTES

THE ALABAMA-LSU SERIES: Alabama and LSU will meet for the 85th time in series history when the two SEC West rivals square off on Saturday night. The Crimson Tide maintains a 53-26-5 (.661) all-time advantage in a series that dates back to the 1895 season. Since 2005, the LSU-Alabama games have been true battles, with eight of those games being decided by seven points or less, including last season's matchup in Tuscaloosa. During head coach Nick Saban's tenure in Tuscaloosa, seven of the 13 duels between the two teams have been decided by that same narrow margin, with three of those games going into overtime. Alabama went 16-2 (.889) against LSU from 1964-81, including a series-best 11-game winning streak from 1971-81. Alabama snapped a five-game series skid with the 27-21 overtime win in Baton Rouge in 2008 and followed that with a 24-15 win in Tuscaloosa in 2009. In 2011, the Tide fell to the Tigers 9-6 in overtime in the regular-season contest before meeting for the BCS National Championship, where Alabama came out on top, 21-0. Alabama then produced one of the more memorable victories with a come-from-behind 21-17 victory at Tiger Stadium in 2012 as AJ McCarron found T.J. Yeldon on a screen pass for a 28-yard touchdown with 51 seconds remaining in the game. Alabama pulled away in the second half for a convincing 38-17 win in 2013. In 2014, a stunning last-minute drive in the fourth quarter by Blake Sims produced a game-tying field goal to send the 2014 matchup into overtime. The Crimson Tide would secure the win, 20-13, as Sims found DeAndrew White in the corner of the end zone for a six-yard score to push UA ahead for the win in Baton Rouge. In 2015, Derrick Henry rushed for three touchdowns and the Tide defense limited LSU to just 182 yards in a 30-16 Alabama win. During the 2016 matchup, Jalen Hurts engineered two fourth-quarter scoring drives to break open a scoreless tie as No. 1-ranked Alabama downed the 15th-ranked Tigers, 10-0, at Tiger Stadium. Hurts followed that up one year later by leading the Crimson Tide to a 24-10 win at home against the 19th-ranked Tigers. The Tide last traveled to Baton Rouge in 2018, with the Alabama defense suffocating LSU's offense into a 29-0 shutout win. Last season's matchup was a shootout between No. 1 and No. 2 as the Tigers came out victorious, 46-41, on the way to becoming the eventual national champions.

SABAN VS. LSU: Alabama head coach Nick Saban is 10-5 (.667) in his career against LSU and has won eight of the last nine meetings against the Bayou Bengals with last year's loss in Tuscaloosa snapping an eight-game winning streak by the Crimson Tide. Before his arrival in Tuscaloosa, Saban-coached teams were 0-1 against LSU, losing 46-25 to the Tigers while at Michigan State in the 1995 Independence Bowl in Shreveport, La. Saban was the head coach at LSU from 2000-04 and compiled a 48-16 (.750) record, leading the Tigers to two SEC Championships during his tenure. In 2003, Saban coached the Tigers to a 13-1 record and a 21-14 win over Oklahoma in the BCS National Championship Game played at the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans, La.

ALABAMA-LSU AT VARIOUS SITES: The Alabama-LSU series has been played at six different sites since the initial meeting in 1895. The city of Baton Rouge has hosted the most games in the series (39), with Alabama posting a 28-9-2 record on the LSU campus. New Orleans is the only other Louisiana city to host the series, with Alabama and LSU playing to a 7-7 tie in New Orleans in 1921 and the Crimson Tide claiming the 2011 national championship inside the Superdome, 21-0, over the Tigers. Four Alabama cities have played host to this rivalry, including Tuscaloosa (13-8), Mobile (1-2-1), Montgomery (2-0) and Birmingham (8-7-1).

ALABAMA-LSU SERIES IS A LONG ONE: The LSU series is tied for the third-longest series in school history. The two teams first met on Nov. 23, 1895, the 15th game in Crimson Tide history, and the 2020 game will mark the 85th meeting between the two teams. Only Mississippi State (105), Tennessee (103) and Auburn (85) have played Alabama more than LSU entering this weekend's matchup. The series with the Bayou Bengals is also the fourth-oldest in UA history with a current SEC member, trailing only Auburn (1892), Ole Miss (1894) and Georgia, which played Alabama for the first time on Nov. 2, 1895, three weeks before the Tide's first game with LSU.

SABAN MOVING UP SEC WINS LIST: Alabama head coach Nick Saban's 131 conference wins (including SEC championship games) ties for second on the SEC career conference wins list. Saban ranks first in league history in SEC regular season winning percentage at .824 (131-28). He is also second in SEC history in winning percentage in all games at .842 (207-39). Saban is also second on the league's career wins list at 207 victories.

145-8 UNDER SABAN WHEN LEADING AT THE HALF: Under head coach Nick Saban, Alabama is 145-8 (.948) when leading at the half. The Crimson Tide has held the lead in 62 of its last 80 games dating back to the start of the 2015 season. UA is also 129-4 (.970) when leading by seven or more points at the break during the Saban era.

ALABAMA'S TV RECORD: The Crimson Tide's matchup with then-No. 22/22/19 Auburn on Nov. 28 was the Tide's 439th televised game. Alabama has compiled a 299-136-4 (.686) all-time record in televised games (not including pay-per-view, tape-delayed or closed-circuit telecasts).

158 NATIONAL TV APPEARANCES IN 174 GAMES: Alabama's appearance on CBS for the Nov. 28 Iron Bowl was the UA's 158th nationally televised game since the start of the 2008 season, including every contest since the start of 2014.

SABAN LEADS IN WINS VS. TOP-FIVE TEAMS: Alabama's 41-24 win over then-No. 3/3 Georgia on Oct. 17 was Nick Saban's 25th career victory against a team ranked in the top five of the Associated Press Top 25 Poll, the most in college football history. Saban's 25-14 career record in top-five contests gives him a .641 winning percentage, which is also college football's best. Following Saban on the all-time victory list are Bobby Bowden (18/.378 winning percentage), Barry Switzer (15/.516), Woody Hayes (15/.516), Steve Spurrier (15/.429) and Lou Holtz (15/.419). Saban's record includes six wins in the College Football Playoff: No. 3 Michigan State (38-0) and No. 1 Clemson (45-40) in 2015; No. 4 Washington (24-7) in 2016; No. 1 Clemson (24-6) and No. 3 Georgia (26-23) in 2017; and a 45-34 victory over fourth-ranked Oklahoma in 2018. Alabama also went 3-0 in BCS National Championship Games (vs. Texas, 37-21, 2009; vs. LSU, 21-0, 2011; vs. Notre Dame, 42-14, 2012).

BEATING THE BEST: The Crimson Tide is 63-17 (.788) against the Associated Press Top 25 since the start of 2008. Alabama is 3-0 against the Top 25 this season with a 41-24 win over then-No. 3 Georgia on Oct. 17, a 52-24 win over then-No. 13 Texas A&M on Oct. 3 and a 42-13 victory in the Iron Bowl against then-No. 22 Auburn. The Tide finished 2-2 against ranked opponents in 2019, one year removed from going 5-1 against ranked opponents in 2018. Alabama was tasked with a gauntlet schedule in 2017 that featured 10 teams ranked in the AP Poll, going 9-1 and outscoring those opponents by an average score of 38.0-17.3.

AGAINST THE TOP 10: Alabama owns an 80-77-1 all-time record against teams ranked in the top-10 of the Associated Press Poll. Among the 114 teams who have squared off with top-10 opponents at least 10 times in their program's history, the Crimson Tide is the only one with a winning record. Since the start of the 2008 season, the Crimson Tide has posted a 31-11 (.738) overall record against top-10 teams, including a 16-5 (.762) mark versus the top 10 since the inception of the College Football Playoff. In Saban's five national championship seasons at Alabama, his teams have gone 17-2 against top-10 opponents.

OUTSIDE THE TOP 15: In addition to its 96-game winning streak against unranked teams, Alabama has lost just two games to teams ranked outside the top 15 in the Associated Press poll since the start of the 2008 season (No. 19 South Carolina in 2010, No. 16 Auburn in 2019). For perspective, no team in the FBS has lost fewer than 10 games to teams outside the top 15 in that same time frame.

50-PLUS vs. RANKED OPPONENTS: Under Alabama head coach Nick Saban, the Crimson Tide has posted 50-plus points against Associated Press Top 25 teams on five occasions. Most recently, UA dominated then-No. 13 Texas A&M, 52-24, on Oct. 3 of this season. Below is a look at Saban's 50-plus point games vs. ranked teams.

RETURNING SUCCESS: The Alabama Crimson Tide returned 18 starters and 55 lettermen for the 2020 season. On offense, 27 letterwinners and eight starters returned while the defense welcomed back 23 lettermen and another seven starters. In addition, Alabama has three starting specialists returning. The offense welcomes back a bevy of experience, including Najee Harris, Alex Leatherwood and DeVonta Smith, who all elected to forego the NFL Draft and return for their senior seasons. Harris is joined by fellow senior rusher Brian Robinson Jr. to provide UA with one of the top running back combos in the nation. The offense also features the explosive wide receiver pairing of Smith and junior Jaylen Waddle to go with redshirt senior tight end Miller Forristall. Alabama's defense welcomes back its leader in the middle in senior Dylan Moses along with fellow veteran Joshua McMillon. The two backers will help direct a defensive front that returned redshirt junior LaBryan Ray, who missed most of the 2019 season due to injury. Ray is joined by sophomores Christian Barmore, DJ Dale, Justin Eboigbe and Byron Young who all saw significant playing time a season ago. The back end of the defense is led by one of the nation's top cornerback prospects in junior Patrick Surtain II who will be tasked with directing an inexperienced secondary. Alabama's specialist group is headlined by Waddle, who is the reigning SEC Special Teams Player of the Year and provides UA with a scoring threat each time he touches the ball in the return game.

NEW HIRES: Saban's 2020 coaching staff features only one new face in Freddie Roach. Most recently at Ole Miss from 2018-19, Roach was hired to direct Alabama's defensive line. He returns to the Capstone after serving as the Tide's director of player development from 2015-17. Roach's first stint on the Alabama coaching staff came from 2008-10 as an assistant strength and conditioning coach. As a player for the Crimson Tide, Roach was a four-year letterman at linebacker from 2002-05. He was named the National Freshman of the Year in addition to earning Freshman All-America accolades and was twice tabbed as a second team All-SEC honoree.

SEC RECORD: Alabama extended its record for most consecutive 10-win seasons in SEC history to 13 when it defeated Western Carolina 66-3, on Nov. 23 of last season. The Crimson Tide finished 11-2 on the year following a win in the Vrbo Citrus Bowl over Michigan. UA had a 12-2 record in 2008, 14-0 in 2009, 10-3 in 2010, 12-1 in 2011, 13-1 in 2012, 11-2 in 2013, 12-2 in 2014, 14-1 marks in 2015, 2016 and 13-1 in 2017 and a 14-1 mark in 2018.

LONGEST TOP-FIVE STREAK: The Crimson Tide's Nov. 24, 2019, ranking at No. 5 in the Associated Press Top 25 marked the 68th consecutive AP poll in which Alabama had been ranked in the top-five. That stretch of top-five rankings was the longest streak in the poll's history, surpassing the previous record of 54 straight weeks set by Miami from Oct. 8, 2000 through Oct. 26, 2003. Alabama's run in the top-five began on Nov. 8, 2015, following a dominant 30-16 victory by the seventh-ranked Tide over then-No. 4 LSU at Bryant-Denny Stadium and concluded in a 45-48 loss at then No. 16 Auburn on Nov. 30. During that span, the Crimson Tide maintained a 57-5 (.919) record and claimed two national championships to go with three Southeastern Conference titles.

LONGEST ACTIVE TOP-10 STREAK: Alabama's No. 5 ranking in the Nov. 24 Associated Press Top 25 Poll marked the 74th consecutive week the Tide appeared in the AP top-10, which led the Football Bowl Subdivision for most consecutive weeks in the top-10 in the writers' poll. The streak was ended following Alabama's loss at Auburn on Nov. 30. Prior to the 2019 set of rankings released prior to the season, Alabama's last appearance below No. 10 was the week of Sept. 27, 2015, when the Tide was No. 13 heading to a matchup at Georgia, which resulted in a 38-10 UA victory over the No. 8 Bulldogs.

ALABAMA vs. NO. 1: Alabama is tied with Miami for the most wins all-time against the Associated Press Poll's No. 1 team since the poll was introduced in 1936. The Crimson Tide has compiled nine wins against the AP's top-ranked team in program history, most recently against No. 1 Clemson in the 2017 College Football Playoff Semifinal at the Allstate Sugar Bowl. Six of those nine wins have come during the Nick Saban era with the first being Alabama's victory over defending national champion Florida in the 2009 SEC Championship Game to send the Crimson Tide to the BCS National Championship Game against Texas. Three of the next four occurred in national title games, including LSU (2011), Notre Dame (2012) and Clemson (2015). The sixth win during the Saban era came when the Crimson Tide took down top-ranked Mississippi State inside Bryant-Denny Stadium on Nov. 15, 2014.

THE 2010s WERE THE TIDE'S DECADE: Alabama won 124 games during the 2010s to lead all NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision teams and tie for college football's all-time mark. Ohio State was second on the wins list during the last decade with 116. Alabama has been the wins leader in two other decades in program history, including the 1960s (85 wins) and 1970s (103 wins). Predating the creation of the NCAA, Penn won 124 games and Harvard won 116 as major college football powers in the 1890s.

10-YEAR RUN: Nick Saban entered 2018 with a 125-14 (.899) record over his previous 10 seasons in Tuscaloosa (2008-17), which is the best of any major college school over a 10-year span since Bud Wilkinson and Oklahoma in the late 1940s through the late 1950s. UA's 125 wins over that decade are the most for any FBS school during a 10-year span in the Associated Press poll era (since 1936).

SABAN AMONG 20-YEAR LEADERS: Alabama's 45-40 win over Clemson in the 2016 College Football Playoff Championship Game was head coach Nick Saban's 191st victory in his first 20 years as a college head coach. That total is the second-most in FBS history for a coach in the first 20 seasons of his career. Former Nebraska head coach Tom Osborne won 195 games in the opening two decades of his tenure in Lincoln. Long-time Penn State head coach Joe Paterno ranks third with 187. Saban's five national championships in 20 seasons tops both Osborne (none) and Paterno (one).

SABAN AND FIRST ROUND NFL DRAFT PICKS: Since the advent of the NFL Draft, Alabama head coach Nick Saban has produced the most first-rounders of any NCAA Division I head coach. Saban has coached a total of 38 players who were chosen in the opening round of the draft, including 33 while at Alabama. This year's four selections in the 2020 NFL Draft extended Saban's all-time mark. He has now produced five more first-rounders than second-place Joe Paterno. With the first-round selection of quarterback Tua Tagovailoa in the 2020 NFL Draft, Saban has produced at least one first-rounder at every starting position on offense and defense during his illustrious collegiate head coaching career.

CRIMSON TIDE PLAYERS ON NFL ROSTERS: The Alabama football program is again well-represented in the NFL during the 2020 season with numerous former players on league rosters. The Tide has 72 former players (active, injured reserve, practice squad) working on an NFL roster. Heading into Week 1 of the new league year, 57 of those players were on an active roster - a total that led all of college football programs. In the last 12 NFL Drafts (including 2020), Alabama has had 96 players selected, including 33 players in first round and 30 across the second and third rounds.

- Saban has compiled a 256-65-1 (.797) record as a college head coach to date (251-65-1, .793 after vacations). He has six national championships – five at Alabama – nine conference championships and 20 of his teams have played in postseason bowl games, including a trip to the BCS National Championship Game following the 2003, 2009, 2011 and 2012 seasons and the College Football Playoff Semifinals in five of the last six seasons including the last four CFP National Championship Games.

- Saban is the only coach to win four BCS national championships, the only coach to win back-to-back BCS national championships and one of only two coaches to win multiple CFP National Championships. He has won six titles in his last 15 years coaching college football, most recently capturing the CFP National Championship following the 2017 season. Saban is one of three college coaches in the poll era (since 1936) to win three national championships in four years. He is also just the second coach in the poll era to win six national championships (Paul "Bear" Bryant) and the first to ever win five titles in a nine-year span.

- In 2009, Saban produced Alabama's first national championship in 17 years by guiding the Crimson Tide to a 14-0 season with dominant wins over Florida in the SEC championship and Texas in the Citi BCS National Championship Game. He then followed that up with his second BCS championship in three years with a 21-0 shutout of LSU following the 2011 season at the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. He made it back-to-back BCS national championships in 2012 with a 42-14 win over Notre Dame in the Discover BCS National Championship Game. He took down Clemson 45-40 to capture title No. 5 following the 2015 season in the CFP National Championship Game. He captured his sixth national championship - and fifth at Alabama - in 2017 with a 26-23 overtime win over Georgia in the 2018 CFP National Championship Game.

- In addition to the on-field success, the 2011 team was also recognized with the Disney Spirit Award, which was presented to snapper Carson Tinker, for the team's response to the community following the tornado that devastated Tuscaloosa on April 27, 2011. The Tide also had extensive success in the classroom that year with 38 SEC Academic Honor Roll selections, a league record, and produced an Academic All-American in Barrett Jones.

- A five-season run at LSU (2000-04) produced a record of 48-16 (.750), one national championship (2003), two Southeastern Conference championships and three SEC West Division championships. The Tigers constructed a 28-12 (.700) record against SEC opponents under Saban's guidance. He was named the 2003 National Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and earned both the Paul W. "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award by the Football Writers Association of America.

- Saban served as head coach at Michigan State from 1995-99, his second stint at the East Lansing school as he also spent 1983-87 as the Spartans' defensive coordinator/secondary coach. Saban led MSU to a 34-24-1 (.585) record as head coach, including four postseason appearances. In 1999, Saban led his final Spartans team to a No. 7 national ranking as MSU finished in a tie for second in the Big Ten. The Spartans defeated Notre Dame, Michigan, Ohio State and Penn State in the same year for the first time since 1965 and recorded six wins at home for the first time since the 1912 season.

- Saban's first head coaching position came at the University of Toledo in 1990, as he guided the Rockets to a record of 9-2 that year, finishing as co-champions of the Mid-American Conference. The Rockets ranked among the NCAA leaders in both total defense (12th at 284.8 yards) and scoring defense (16th at 16.2 points) and missed posting an undefeated record by a mere five points.

- A native of Fairmont, W.Va., Saban is a 1973 graduate of Kent State University where he earned a bachelor's degree in business. He earned a master's degree in sports administration from Kent State in 1975. Born October 31, 1951, Saban and his wife, the former Terry Constable, have two children, Nicholas and Kristen. They have one granddaughter, Amélie, and one grandson, James.

- At Michigan State, the Sabans started the Nick's Kids Foundation, which is dedicated to raising awareness for deserving organizations throughout the state of Alabama and the southeast. Thanks to the generosity of the donors and the efforts of Nick and Terry Saban, the Nick's Kids Foundation has donated nearly \$9 million dollars to many deserving organizations and causes since arriving in Tuscaloosa.

- Personally, Nick and Terry have given over \$1 million dollars to their First Generation Scholarship at The University of Alabama and have pledged \$1 million dollars to The Crimson Standard Initiative. They have also made major contributions to their church, St. Francis Catholic Church, to build the Saban Catholic Student Center that was completed in August of 2016.
