Josh Reed grabbed the national spotlight with 19 catches for 293 yards, both SEC records, as the Tigers won in Tuscaloosa for the first time since 1997.

RECORDS FALL AS REED, DAVEY LEAD LSU OVER TIDE

Rohan Davey threw for an LSU record 528 yards on a school-record 35 completions, while Josh Reed shattered both school and SEC records with 19 receptions and 293 yards as the Tigers upended Alabama, 35-21, in Tuscaloosa. LSU broke a 21-21 tie with four seconds left in the third quarter when Davey hit Reed on a 25-yard scoring pass. LaBrandon Toefield scored three short-yardage touchdowns on the ground and put an exclamation point on his day with a six yard score midway through the fourth quarter to provide the final margin of victory. Defensively, linebacker Bradie James led the Tigers with 14 tackles, 13 of which were solo, while Jarvis Green added seven tackles and a pair of sacks in the victory. Ryan Clark posted the seventh interception of his career. With the win, LSU ran its road record to 3-1.

Notes on the Game

- Josh Reed set LSU and SEC records for single game receptions and yardage, catching 19 passes for 293 yards. Reed broke Wendell Davis' 15-year-old record of 14 receptions against Ole Miss in 1986, while passing Todd Kinchen's school record of 248 yards receiving against Mississippi State in 1991. The previous SEC records were 17 receptions, accomplished twice (most recently in 1995), and 269 yards by Craig Yeast of Kentucky in 1998.
- Rohan Davey broke Tommy Hodson's LSU single game record for passing yards, throwing for 528 yards. Hodson threw for 438 yards against Tennessee in 1989.
- The 528 yards by Davey are the most yards passing against an Alabama team, as were his 35 completions (breaking Archie Manning's record of 34).
- Davey's 540 yards of total offense (528 passing, 12 rushing) tied Archie Manning's (Ole Miss) SEC-record for a single game set on Oct. 4, 1969, versus Alabama.
- Davey's 35 completions broke the LSU record of 33 set by Jeff Wickersham in 1983. Davey's 44 attempts were well shy of the school record of 58 by Josh Booty on Sept. 19, 1999, against Auburn. However, Davey's mark ranked in a tie for seventh in school history with Jesse Daigle (Nov. 16, 1991 vs. Mississippi State).
- Josh Reed became the first Tiger to record back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons, surpassing the mark on a 16-yard reception in the second quarter. The reception gave Reed 1,004 yards on the season at the time. Reed joined Joey Kent of Tennessee, who recorded back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons in 1995 and 1996 as the only other player in SEC history to accomplish the feat.
- Toefield scored at least three touchdowns for the third time on the season (three vs. Tulane, three vs. Utah St., three vs. Alabama).

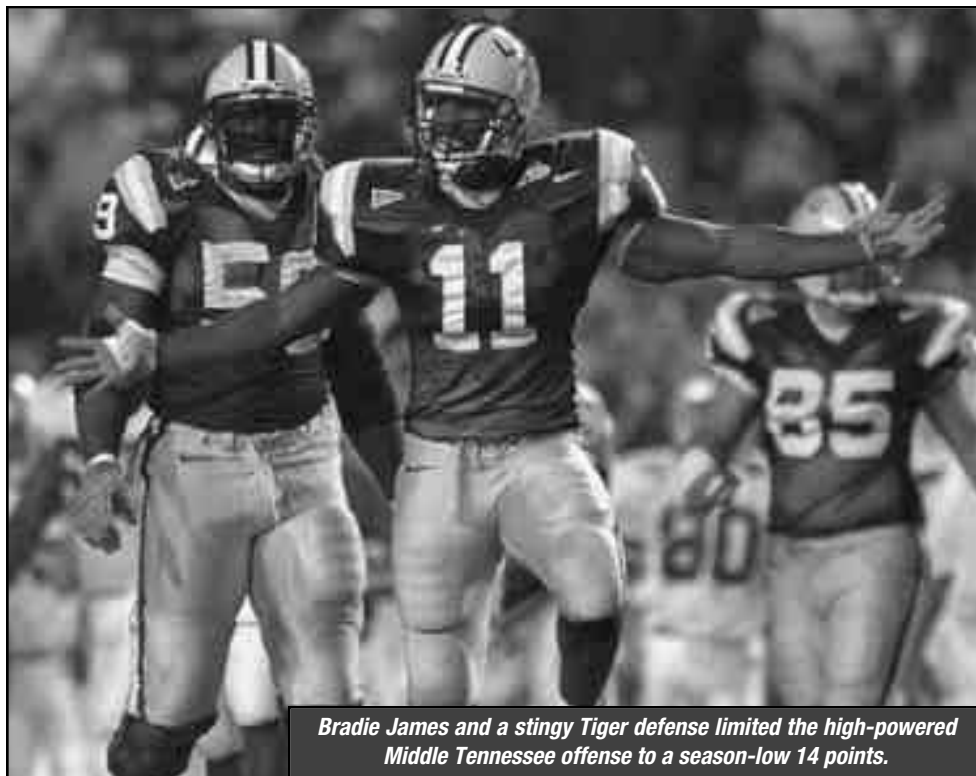

LSU DUO SETS RECORDS AS MTSU FALLS

Rohan Davey became LSU's single-season passing record holder while Josh Reed did the same in receiving yardage as the Tigers posted a 30-14 win over Middle Tennessee on Homecoming. Davey completed 26-of-37 passes for 318 yards and a touchdown strike to surpass Tommy Hodson as LSU's single-season passing yardage record holder. Davey broke the mark of 2,655 set by Hodson in 1989. Reed caught 9 passes for 120 yards to break the record of 1,244 set by

Wendell Davis in 1986. Davey finished the contest with 2,659 yards passing while Reed moved his season total to 1,311 yards receiving. LSU never trailed in the contest as the Tigers scored touchdowns the first four times they touched the ball. LaBrandon Toefield scored three touchdowns, all in the first half, as the Tigers built a 27-7 halftime lead. John Corbello added a 42-yard field goal in the second half to complete the scoring for the Tigers.

Notes on the Game

- With their sixth win of the season, the Tigers improved to 6-3 and became bowl eligible with two games remaining on the 2001 regular season schedule. It also ensured LSU head coach Nick Saban of at least a .500 season for the eighth time in as many years as a collegiate head coach.
- On a 15-yard pass from Rohan Davey in the second quarter, Josh Reed broke the LSU single season record for receiving yardage. Reed broke the 15-year-old record of 1,244 by Wendell Davis set in 1986, accomplishing the feat in only nine games. The catch gave Reed 1,245 yards at the time. He finished the game with 1,311 yards for the season.
- With 318 yards passing, Davey broke the LSU season passing record with 2,659 yards, breaking Tommy Hodson's single season record of 2,655 set in 1989. He also had 325 yards of total offense and broke the LSU season record for total offense with 2,643, passing Tommy Hodson with 2,604 yards of total offense in 1989.
- With two touchdowns, LaBrandon Toefield became the first Tiger since Kevin Faulk in 1998 to record four multiple-touchdown games in the same season. Toefield had three against Tulane, four against Utah State and three against Alabama prior to the Middle Tennessee game.
- With two first half touchdowns passes, Rohan Davey moved his career total to 25, moving from an eighth place tie with Y.A. Tittle, passed Josh Booty and into a sixth-place tie with Jeff Wickersham.

LSU OUTLASTS ARKANSAS IN SHOOTOUT

LaBrandon Toefield rushed for 173 yards and three touchdowns while Rohan Davey passed for 359 yards and three scores as the Tigers held off 24th-ranked Arkansas, 41-38, in Tiger Stadium. Toefield scored on a 62-yard run just four plays into the contest, however the Tigers kept the Razorbacks in the game with five turnovers, including three in the first half. Arkansas led 13-7 early in the second quarter before the Tigers came back to take a 20-19 lead at halftime. The Tigers stretched their lead to 41-25 with 8:21 to play on a 17-yard TD run by Toefield, his 18th of the season, which broke the LSU record for single-season rushing touchdowns. Arkansas scored a pair of touchdowns in the final 6:29 of the contest, the last with 2:27 to play, but the Razorbacks never got the ball back again. Josh Reed broke the SEC single-season receiving record, as he caught seven passes for 183 yards to run his total for the year to 1,494 yards.



LaBrandon Toefield scored three touchdowns on the day, including this 62-yarder on the fourth play of the game. His final touchdown on the day, his 18th of the year, broke the LSU single season record for rushing touchdowns.

Notes on the Game

- On a 33-yard reception in the second quarter, Josh Reed set the SEC record for receiving yards in a season, passing the 1,357 by Travis McGriff of Florida in 1998. The reception gave Reed 1,383 yards at the time. On the same play he moved into second place on the all-time LSU career receiving yardage list passing Eric Martin, who had 2,625 yards from 1981-84.
- With 183 yards in the game, Reed went on to break the LSU career receiving record. He finished the game with 2,755 career yards. The previous record of 2,708 yards held by Wendell Davis (1984-87) was broken on a 22-yard reception in the fourth quarter.
- LaBrandon Toefield's 17-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter was his third of the game and 18th of the season breaking Charles Alexander's 24-year-old LSU record of 17 set in 1977. It marked the fifth multiple-TD game of the season for the sophomore. His 18 touchdowns tie him with Herschel Walker of Georgia (1981) for second most in SEC history. He is one short of the SEC record.
- Toefield also broke Charles Alexander's LSU record for points in a season (104 in 1977) with his three TD performance, giving him 108 points for the year.
- Rohan Davey moved past former teammate Josh Booty and into sixth place on the all-time LSU passing yardage list on his 60-yard strike to Michael Clayton. The pass gave him 3,957 career yards at the time. Booty threw for 3,951 yards from 1999-2000. Davey moved past 4,000 career yards on his 38-yard touchdown pass to Josh Reed in the fourth quarter.
- Michael Clayton hauled in a 60-yard touchdown pass from Rohan Davey in the third quarter, his sixth touchdown reception of the year and his seventh touchdown overall. Clayton's seven TDs are the most by a Tiger true freshman since Dalton Hilliard posted 16 in 1982 - 11 rushing and five receiving.

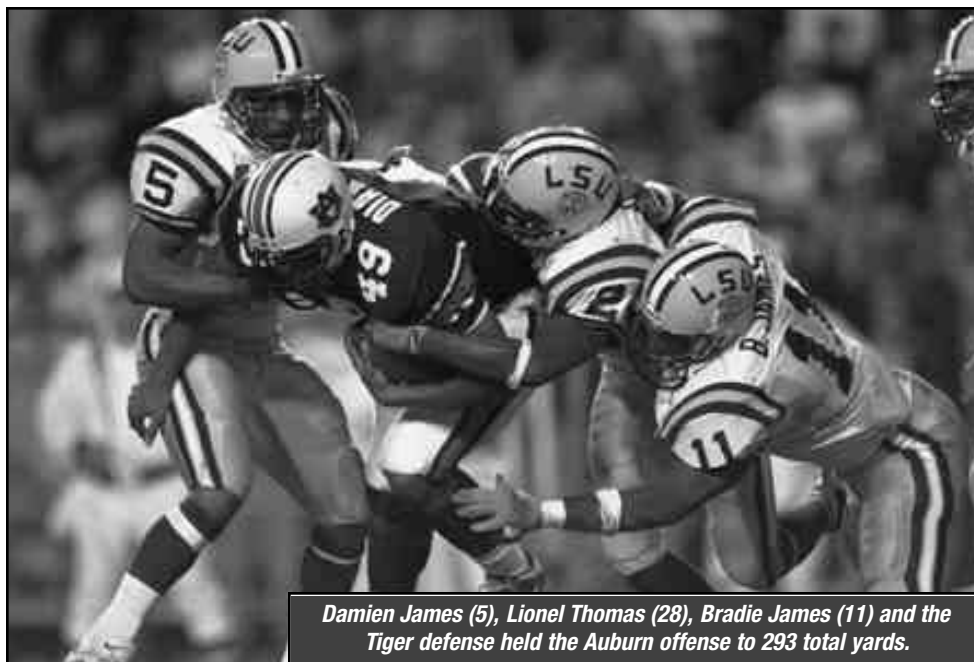

LSU CLAIMS SEC WEST TITLE WITH WIN

LaBrandon Toefield rushed for 120 yards and scored his SEC-record tying 19th rushing touchdown of the season while Josh Reed caught 10 passes for 186 yards as LSU beat Auburn, 27-14, to clinch a berth in the SEC Championship game. LSU jumped on Auburn early as the Tigers used some trickery, opting for an onside kick on the game's first play. LSU recovered and scored six plays later for a 7-0 lead. Auburn responded with a

72-yard touchdown pass from Jason Campbell to Tim Carter on its first possession to tie the game at 7-7. From there it was all LSU as the Tigers increased the lead to 14-7 early in the first quarter on a Rohan Davey to Reed pass. LSU stretched the margin to 21-7 just before halftime on a 7-yard run by Domanick Davis. A pair of field goals by John Corbello put the game out of reach at 27-7 early in the fourth quarter.

Notes on the Game

- LSU clinched a share of the SEC Western Division championship with Auburn, and thanks to the head-to-head victory, advanced to the SEC Championship game.
- The division championship was LSU's third; the Tigers shared the West title with Alabama in 1996 and Auburn in 1997, but was shut out of the title game by dropping the head-to-head matchups.
- With a two-yard touchdown on the Tigers' opening possession, LaBrandon Toefield tied the SEC record for most rushing touchdowns in a season with 19. The mark tied him with Garrison Hearst of Georgia (1992) and Shaun Alexander of Alabama (1999).
- Toefield ended the night with 120 yards on 29 carries, his sixth career 100-yard game. LSU improved to 6-0 when Toefield rushes for 100 or more yards.
- On his first reception of the game, a 14-yarder from Rohan Davey, Josh Reed broke the LSU single-season record for receptions with 81. He entered the game tied for the mark with Wendell Davis, who posted 80 catches in 1986.
- With a 17-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter, Reed moved into a tie for third place on the all-time LSU touchdown receptions list with his 17th career TD. The touchdown tied him with Ken Kavanaugh who caught 17 TDs from 1937-39.
- On the same touchdown, Rohan Davey moved past Bert Jones and into sole possession of fifth place on the all-time LSU touchdown pass list with his 29th career strike. It was also his 18th of the season, tied for the third highest single season total in LSU history.
- The attendance of 92,141 was a Tiger Stadium record, the third time in seven home games that the mark fell. LSU first broke the record in the season opener against Tulane, then again with 92,010 against Florida. It marked the fourth time this season that LSU drew better than 90,000 fans and the seventh time since the stadium was expanded to its current capacity prior to the 2000 season.

LSU DEFEATS NO. 2 VOLS FOR SEC TITLE

Matt Mauck filled in for an injured Rohan Davey and rushed for a pair of touchdowns as the Tigers upset second-ranked Tennessee in the SEC Championship Game, 31-20, at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta. Mauck entered in the first quarter and staked the Tigers to a 7-0 lead on a 4-yard run. The Tigers rallied from a 17-10 halftime deficit, outscoring the Vols 21-3 in the second half. Mauck's 13-yard touchdown run less than a minute into the fourth quarter gave the Tigers a 24-17 lead

they would not surrender. After the Vols cut the lead to 24-20, Domanick Davis, filling in for an injured LaBrandon Toefield, put an exclamation point on the victory with a 1-yard touchdown plunge on fourth down to provide the final score. Davis accumulated 149 all-purpose yards on the evening. Bradie James led the Tigers' defense with 10 tackles. Mauck was named the MVP of the game for his effort, as the Tigers claimed their first outright SEC title since 1986.

Notes on the Game

- LSU won its first SEC Championship since 1988 (8-4, 6-1) and first outright conference title since 1986 (9-3, 6-1). The Tigers tied with Auburn in 1988. The Tigers clinched their first Sugar Bowl appearance since the 1986 season (1987 game).
- LSU coach Nick Saban became just the fifth coach, joining Florida coach Steve Spurrier, former Tennessee coach Bowden Wyatt, former Ole Miss coach Johnny Vaught and former LSU coach Mike Archer to win the SEC title in one of their first two seasons. Vaught is the only coach to win it in his first season.
- On a 15-yard reception in the second quarter, Josh Reed became the SEC's all-time leader in receiving yardage, passing Boo Williams of Vanderbilt, who recorded 2,964 yards from 1985-88. The catch gave Reed 2,968 yards at the time. He later became the first man in SEC history to surpass 3,000 yards, as he finished with 3,001.
- Josh Reed moved into the top five in NCAA history in single-season receiving yardage on the same reception, tying Troy Edwards of Louisiana Tech, who recorded 1,707 yards in 1997 for fifth place. He took sole possession of fifth place on a 9-yard reception in the fourth quarter. He finished the day with 1,720 yards this season.
- Rohan Davey broke the LSU single-season record for completions on his second completion of the day. The throw gave him 210 at the time, breaking the previous mark of 209 by Jeff Wickersham in 1985.
- The 4-yard touchdown run by Matt Mauck was the first rushing touchdown of his career and was the first rushing touchdown by a Tiger quarterback since Herb Tyler ran for a 3-yard touchdown on Oct. 31, 1998 in a 37-31 overtime loss to Ole Miss. Mauck added a second touchdown on a 13-yard run in the fourth quarter becoming the first Tiger QB since Tyler on Oct. 17, 1998 against Kentucky to rush for more than one TD in a game.
- Domanick Davis went over 1,000 all-purpose yards for the third consecutive season on his 23-yard punt return in the second quarter. The return gave him 1,021 at the time. He posted totals of 1,052 and 1,435 in his freshman and sophomore seasons, respectively.

TIGERS WIN SHOOTOUT ON NEW YEAR'S DAY

LSU's high-powered offense led by quarterback Rohan Davey and Josh Reed proved to be too much for seventh-ranked Illinois as the Tigers rolled to a 47-34 win over the Fighting Illini. The win marked LSU's first New Year's Day bowl victory since a win over Wyoming in the 1968 Sugar Bowl.

LSU, behind the arm of Davey and the running of tailback Domanick Davis, jumped on the Illini early as the Tigers hit paydirt on a 4-yard Davis run at the 7:22 mark of the first quarter. Davis followed with second-quarter touchdown runs of 25 and 16 yards to give the Tigers a 20-0 lead just 20 minutes into the contest.

Davey hit Reed with a 5-yard TD pass with 4:42 left in the first half and then found Robert Royal for a 7-yard scoring strike just before halftime to give the Tigers a 34-7 cushion at the break.

Illinois pulled to within 41-28 midway through the fourth quarter, but Davis' fourth touchdown run, a Sugar Bowl record, put the game away for the Tigers at 47-28. Illinois added a final score with just over five minutes left with the game well out of reach.

For the game, Davey passed for a Sugar Bowl-record 444 yards by connecting on 31 of 53 attempts. Davey also added three TD passes for the Tigers. Davis rushed for 122 yards and four touchdowns, while Reed caught 14 passes for 239 yards, both Sugar Bowl records, and a pair of touchdowns in what proved to be his final game in an LSU uniform. As a unit, LSU racked up a Sugar Bowl-record 595 yards of total offense and the Tigers' 34 first half points were the most points in a half in a Sugar Bowl contest. In all, LSU set eight Sugar Bowl marks in the victory.

Notes on the Game

- LSU moved to .500 all-time in bowl appearances, improving to 16-16-1 in bowl games. LSU won its fifth consecutive bowl game, its longest consecutive streak of wins in bowls.
- In addition, LSU improved to 4-7 all-time in the Sugar Bowl. LSU won its first Sugar Bowl title since defeating Wyoming 20-13 in 1968.
- With 47 points, the Tigers set an LSU bowl record for points, surpassing the previous mark of 45 against the Nick Saban-led Michigan State Spartans in the 1995 Independence Bowl.
- Josh Reed broke the LSU bowl record and Sugar Bowl record for receiving yards on a 14-yard reception in the third quarter. The catch gave him 179 yards at the time, bettering Ray Perkins' Sugar Bowl record of 178 yards in 1967. He broke Andy Hamilton's LSU bowl record of 165 yards receiving set in the 1971 Sun Bowl. He finished with 239 yards.
- Reed also broke the LSU record for receptions in a bowl game on a 32-yard touchdown reception in the third quarter, his 10th reception of the night. He broke the mark of nine which he previously held with Wendell Davis ('87 Gator Bowl) and Andy Hamilton ('71 Orange Bowl). He went on to break the Sugar Bowl record of 12 previously held by Chuck Dicus of Arkansas in 1969. He finished with 14 receptions.
- Rohan Davey broke the Sugar Bowl record for passing yards, becoming the first man in the 68-year history of the bowl to pass for over 400 yards. His total of 444 surpassed the previous record of 394 by Danny Wuerffel in 1995. Davey also broke the LSU bowl record of 229 yards passing by Mike Hillman in

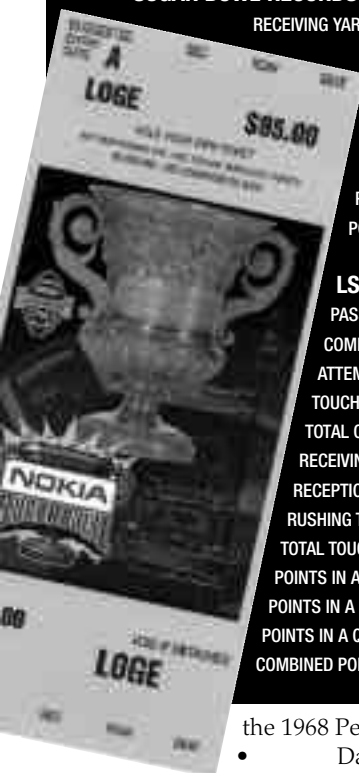

- Davey also broke the Sugar Bowl record of 28

completions, finishing the game with 31. His mark also broke the LSU bowl mark of 20 by Jeff Wickersham in the 1985 Sugar Bowl.

- LSU's 27 points in the second quarter were the most in Sugar Bowl history by any team in any quarter. In addition, LSU's 34 first half points were a Sugar Bowl record for points in a half.

- Davis broke the LSU record for rushing touchdowns in a bowl game on his 16-yard scoring run in the second quarter. Six players in LSU history had scored two rushing touchdowns in a bowl game. Rondell Mealey was the last Tiger to score two touchdowns in a bowl game, doing so en route to earning MVP honors at the 1997 Independence Bowl. Davis added to his total with a Sugar Bowl record fourth rushing touchdown in the fourth quarter.

- Domanick Davis' 4-yard touchdown run in the first quarter marked the 10th time in 13 games this season that the Tigers scored first. The Tigers entered with an 8-1 mark when scoring first with their lone loss coming at Tennessee on Sept. 29.

- Rohan Davey posted the seventh 300-yard passing game of his career. He finished with 300 yards or better in six of 13 games this season.

- Josh Reed posted the 18th 100-yard game of his career and his 11th in 13

games this season.

- Davis' 31-yard touchdown run in the second quarter gave LSU a 13-0 lead – its largest lead in its 11 Sugar Bowl appearances. The previous high was a 10-point lead over Nebraska in the 1985 Sugar Bowl, as the

Tigers jumped out to a 10-0 lead before falling 28-10.

- LSU's 34 points in the first half surpassed their highest single game output in a Sugar Bowl. Their previous high came in a 20-13 victory over Wyoming in the 1968 Sugar Bowl.

- Nick Saban improved to 6-0 all-time against Illinois. LSU improved to 6-3-1 all-time against Big Ten opponents.

- LSU improved to 18-1 under Nick Saban when scoring 20+ points – 10-1 this season with the only loss coming against Ole Miss when the Tigers fell 35-24. LSU has won 19 of its last 20 games overall when scoring better than 20 points.

- LSU scored 20+ points in the first half for the seventh time in 13 games this season and for the fourth time in their last five games.

- With an 18-yard reception in the first quarter, Josh Reed extended his streak of consecutive games with at least one reception to 28. Since moving to receiver prior to the Tigers game at Alabama in the ninth week of the 1999 season, Reed has caught at least one pass in every game at the position. In addition, Jerel Myers' first quarter reception gave him at least one in 15 straight games, the second longest streak on the Tigers. Myers has now caught at least one pass in 35 of 36 career games (including bowls).

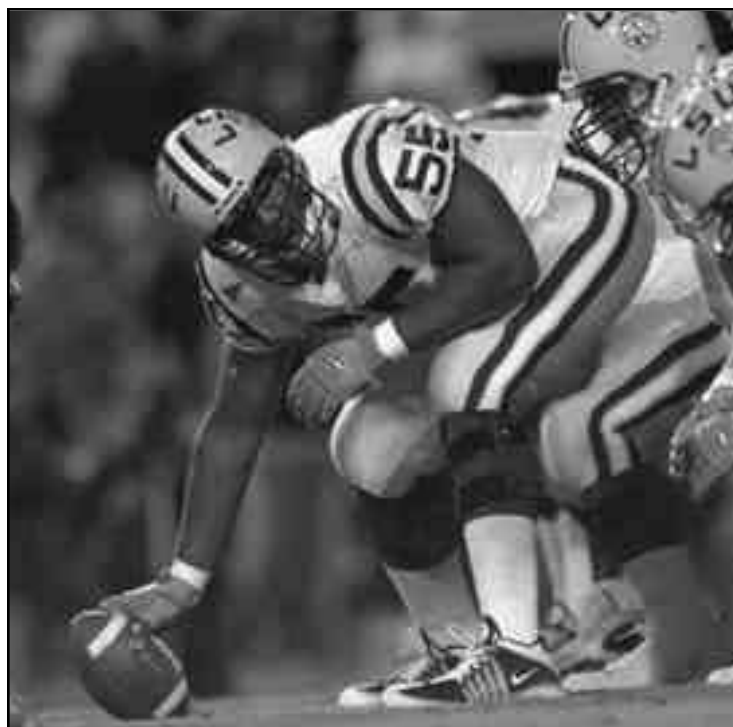
