Practices are open to the media with Brian Lee and the players available for interviews after each session. Please contact Will Stafford to make arrangements.

Credentials

Media credentials should be requested at least two days prior to the game. Passes will be available at the press gate located at the entrance of the LSU Soccer Complex. All requests should be made by contacting Will Stafford. Season passes can be requested in the same manner.

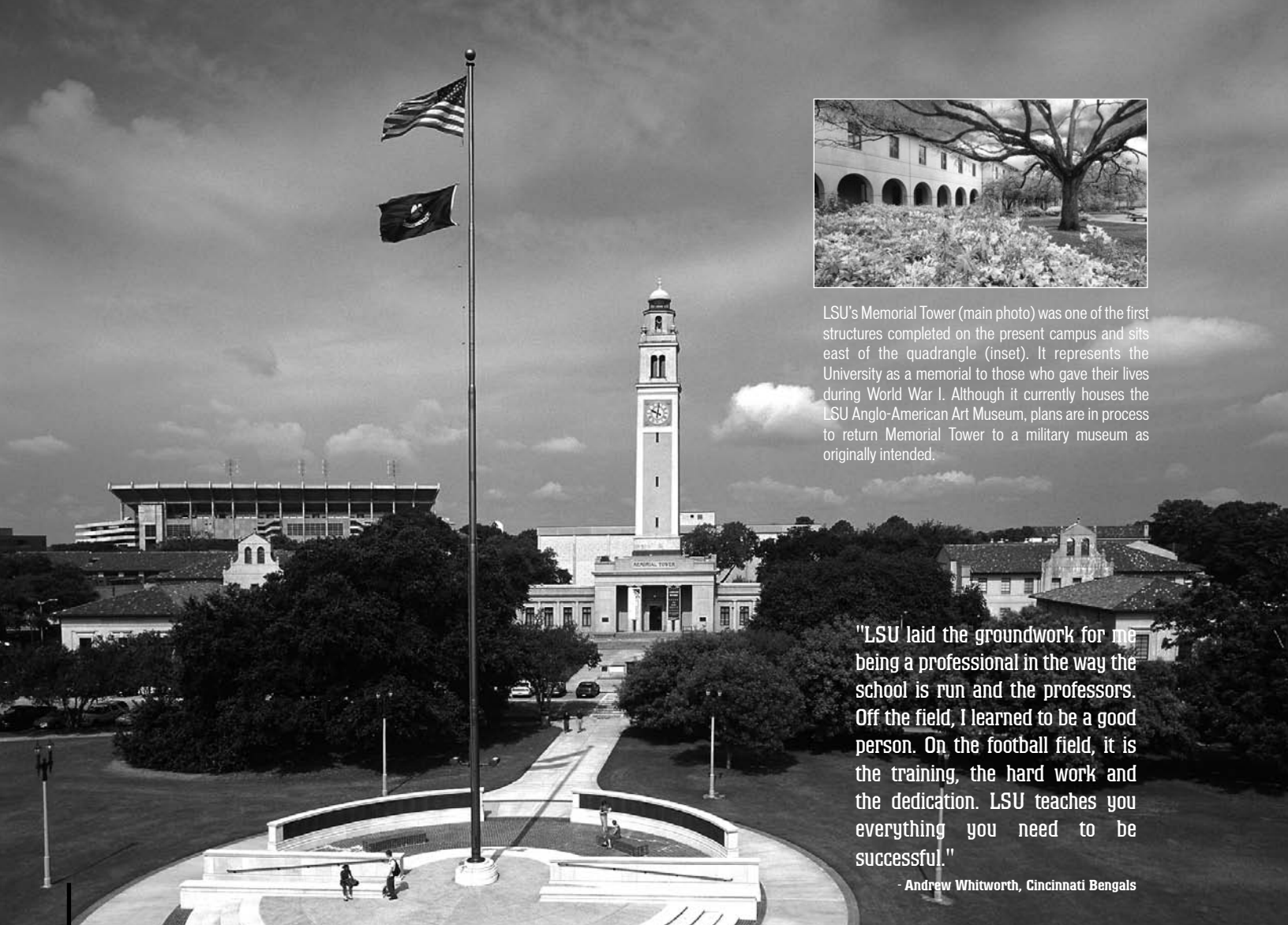

Maintaining LSU's commitment to providing the finest athletic facilities in the nation, the Tigers will begin their 12th season at the LSU Soccer Complex - a field that was christened on Sept. 13, 1996, when the Tigers hosted Southeastern Conference rival Tennessee.

The LSU Soccer Complex, located just a half mile from the Mississippi River, provides seating for 1,500 spectators. The Tigers set the single-game attendance record in 2005 when 1,689 fans witnessed the team play Ole Miss on Sept. 30 in its annual Cram the Complex campaign. In addition, the Tigers drew four of the top 10 attendances in stadium history a year ago, including a match against 14th-ranked Texas on Sept. 13 that drew a season high 1,669.

The stadium features a modern sound system and rows of hedges that were planted last year, while it has served as the host site of four prestigious tournaments in recent years and was most recently the site of the 2001 SEC Tournament. It has also played host to a pair of MLS games featuring the Chicago Fire and Colorado Rapids in 2003 and the New England Revolution in 2007.

The LSU soccer program boasts a modern and spacious locker room that includes locker rooms for the Tigers, as well as facilities for opponents and game officials. The complex also provides an on-site training room, a meeting room and lounge for the team and offices for the coaching staff.



RENOVATIONS

The locker room facility at the LSU Soccer Complex recently underwent an extensive \$200,000 renovation project that included the addition of a brand new visitor's locker room on the south end of the facility. The former visitor's locker room was expanded to 2,000 square feet and converted into a state-of-the-art squad room and lounge for the Tigers to enjoy.



Indoor Practice FACILITY

When the weather prevents the soccer team from practicing at the LSU Soccer Complex, the squad moves inside to the climate-controlled indoor football practice facility. The indoor facility was built as part of a \$15 million upgrade in the early 1990s and houses a 100-yard football field that was renovated with brand new Momentum Field Turf in the spring of 2006.



First Game

The LSU Soccer Complex was christened on September 13, 1996, when the Tigers played host to SEC Eastern Division rival Tennessee before a raucous crowd of 911 fans - the fourth largest crowd in the facility's 11-year history.

U.S. National Team member DaMarcus Beasley and the Chicago Fire squared off against the Colorado Rapids in a Major League Soccer exhibition game at the LSU Soccer Complex in 2003. The facility also hosted an exhibition game featuring the New England Revolution in 2007.



Brown Sets Career Scoring Record

Forward Artie Brown set the school's all-time goals and points record in a 3-0 shutout of Arkansas on Oct. 29, 2004. Brown finished her career with 40 goals and 90 points, surpassing the old mark of 36 goals and 82 points set by Jackie Cooper from 1995-96.



Cram The Complex

A record crowd of 1,689 fans crammed the LSU Soccer Complex on Sept. 30, 2005, to witness the Tigers play host to SEC Western Division rival Ole Miss. This shattered the previous high of 911 fans that saw the Tigers play their first game at the facility in 1996.
