# ILLINOIS SOCCER AND TRACK STADIUM

The Fighting Illini are entering their 13th season at the beautiful Illinois Soccer and Track Stadium. The Orange and Blue competed at the First and Stadium Multiplex during the 1997 and 1998 seasons before moving to the renovated stadium - which includes the outdoor track and field facilities - in 1999.

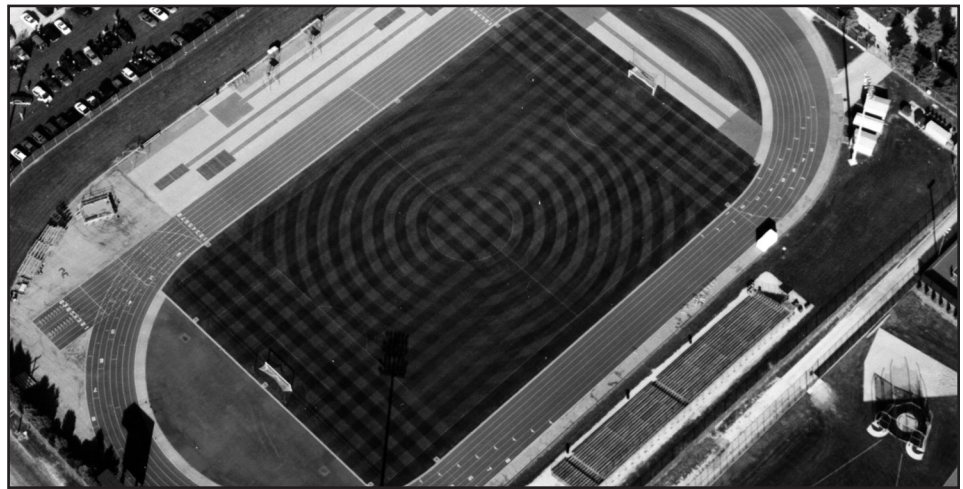
Future upgrades are planned for the Illinois Soccer and Track Stadium, including seating capacity for more fans, locker rooms and a press box. The project is being handled by JJR Architects of Chicago. The first phase, which included lights and a throwing area for field events during the track and field season, cost \$1.2 million. Phase II includes 6,000 seats on the home side, an additional 2,000 seats on the visitors side, restrooms and a concession stand.

The Illini have been dominant at home since moving into the Illinois Soccer and Track Stadium, compiling an overall record of 85-24-5. Since its opening, the stadium has featured one undefeated record (2004) and four consecutive one-loss seasons (2005-08). In 2007, the Orange and Blue shutout a school-record seven consecutive opponents at the Illinois Soccer Stadium from Sept. 2 through Oct. 19, compiling 650 consecutive shutout minutes.

2010 saw the Illini best eight opponents at home, tied for the second most in program history. Illinois shutout No. 23 Louisville, 3-0, one of four clean sheets on the season, while; in total, Wright State, Ball State, LSU, Purdue, Indiana, Iowa and Northwestern all fell victim to the Illini in Champaign as Illinois propelled itself to yet another NCAA Tournament bid.

The 2006 season saw the Illini put together a 7-1-0 home record with five shutouts and a new attendance record of 7,261 fans. On Oct. 1, No. 15 Illinois took down No. 9 Penn State, 3-2, in front of a school-record 2,667 fans, boosted by the joining of the match with the Illinois Homecoming Kickoff celebration.

In 2004, the Illini completed their first undefeated



season at home with a record of 8-0-1. In the final match at Illinois Soccer Stadium, the Illini posted a thrilling 2-1 victory over Nebraska in the third round of the NCAA Tournament, sending the Orange and Blue on to the Elite Eight. In addition, the victory also occurred in front of a then-record 1,046 fans.

In 2000, the Illinois Soccer and Track Stadium was the site of the Big Ten Women's Soccer Tournament in addition to the Illini hosting the Xavier Muskateers in the NCAA Tournament First Round. In 2001, the Illini welcomed Evansville, Syracuse and eventual National Champion Santa Clara in the first two rounds of the NCAA Tournament and in 2003, the Illini hosted Western Michigan, Purdue and DePaul in first and second round NCAA Tournament action.

When Illinois decided to add soccer, the athletic department, led by former Athletic Director Ron Guenther, Associate Athletic Director Dana Brenner, coaches and student-athletes, conducted a feasibility study. The first two years included the use and improvement of the campus recreational fields along Stadium Drive, followed by the construction and renovation of the new Illini Stadium. The field includes Kentucky Bluegrass with a sand base for quick drainage and is noted for its playing surface and built-in irrigation.

## FIGHTING ILLINI AT THE NEXT LEVEL

### EMILY ZURRER - CANADIAN NATIONAL TEAM

Former Illini Emily Zurrer (2005-08) became the first Illinois soccer player to compete in the Olympics when she suited up for her native Canada at the 2008 Games in Beijing, China. Zurrer was a staple in the Canadian lineup in Beijing, starting all four games at defense. Canada went 1-1-1 in pool play before falling to the United States in the quarterfinals. Zurrer was also a key defender on the Canadian squad as Team Canada fought for and earned a berth in the 2011

Women's World Cup, while finishing undefeated at the 2011 CONCACAF Tournament at 5-0. Canada did not give up a single goal during the qualification stretch with Zurrer among the backline starters.

Zurrer earned her first cap with the Canadian National Team in 2004 when she was still in high school and had continued to compete regularly with Team Canada since then, balancing her standout career at Illinois with her tasks as a national team player. Zurrer remains a member of the Canada Women's National Team while she competes for the Vancouver Whitecaps of the United Soccer Leagues.

Zurrer starred for Illinois in the backfield from 2005-08, ending her illustrious career as the program's first three-time All-American. During her time in with the Orange and Blue, Zurrer also earned NSCAA/adidas and Soccer Buzz All-Great Lakes Region, Big Ten Player of the Year, All-Big Ten, Big Ten All-Freshman Team and Big Ten All-Tournament Team honors.

### ELLA MASAR - MAGICJACK

After two productive seasons with the Chicago Red Stars of Women's Professional Soccer, former Illini Ella Masar (2004-07) is in her first season with magicJack - a year in which her abilities on the field translated into highlight reel plays, including a ESPN SportsCenter Top-10 goal against the Western New York Flash.

During her two years with the Red Stars, Masar led the team in goals in 2010 with eight and totaled 18 points in 38 games played. In 14 matches with magicJack during the 2011 season, including 13 starts, Masar has tallied four goals - the third most on the team behind Abby Wambach and Christen Press. Masar's strong play on the attack has contributed to magicJack's 8-6-2 overall record through 16 games and helped secure the squad a berth in the 2011 postseason.



Ella Masar has developed into an effective and consistent offensive threat in Women's Professional Soccer during her three seasons in the league.

Prior to her success with Chicago, Masar earned a spot on the U.S. National Team, seeing her first action as a substitute during the United States' victory over the German National Team, 1-0, on Oct. 29, 2009 in Augsburg, Germany.

From 2004-07, Masar amassed 27 goals and 20 assists to finish her career ranked third among Illini in points with 74. She earned accolades as a two-time All-American, Big Ten Player of the Year, NSCAA/adidas All-Great Lakes Region and Soccer Buzz All-Great Lakes Region award recipient.

# JANET RAYFIELD

## HEAD COACH - TENTH SEASON



After nine seasons and 113 victories as head coach of the Fighting Illini, Janet Rayfield has established the University of Illinois soccer team as one of the premier programs in the nation. Seasons after season, her Illini squads have broken school records and set new benchmarks for conference and national levels of success.

The 2010 season saw Rayfield guide the Illini to a 13-5-1 overall finish, as well as their seventh NCAA tournament appearance since assuming head coaching duties before the 2002 season and yet another top-25

national ranking. Throughout the regular season, Illinois exhibited the dominance against non-conference opponents and visiting foes that has made the Orange and Blue successful throughout the program's history. Illinois rolled through its out-of-conference slate, accumulating a 7-1-0 record with six shutout victories to enter Big Ten play as the 20th-ranked team in the nation by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA). Following non-conference action, Rayfield guided the Illini through a treacherous conference schedule to earn another NCAA Tournament bid. In order to secure postseason play, Rayfield totaled six Big Ten victories, including a key come-from-behind win at eventual College Cup participant Ohio State, ranked No. 17 in the nation at the time with an undefeated conference mark and only one home loss to that point in the season.

In 2010, Rayfield created a dynamic offense, integrating talented newcomers with established veteran attacking players, while maintaining the shutdown defense that has highlighted her tenure with Illinois. The 32 goals produced by the Illinois offense marked the second-highest seasonal total in program history as the defense stifled opponents, holding foes to only 16 goals in 19 games, the third-fewest ever for an Illinois team. For her efforts, Rayfield earned the NSCAA Great Lakes Region Coach of the Year Award, the second time she earned regional coaching honors as Soccer Buzz named Rayfield its 2003 regional award recipient.

Following a successful 2010 collegiate season, United States Women's National Team head coach Pia Sundhage called upon Rayfield twice more to assist in leading the senior U.S. squad during international competition. In the spring of 2011, Rayfield traveled to Portugal to serve as a technical assistant during Team USA's championship run through the Algarve Cup. While in Portugal with the U.S. National Team, Rayfield was responsible for maintaining athlete tracking devices and programs, including player positioning systems and software and heart-rate monitors, as well as providing video packages of practices and games for the Team USA staff to disseminate and build game plans around.

Following the Algarve Cup, Rayfield was asked by Sundhage to return to the U.S. staff for the 2011 World Cup - traveling to Germany for over three weeks with Team USA from late June through mid-July. While in Germany, Rayfield served as an advance scout for the U.S., documenting the tendencies, decisions and tactics of potential elimination-round opponents for Sundhage and the rest of the coaching staff. Rayfield's work proved to be paramount to the success of Team USA as the Illini

head coach scouted Brazil on three occasions leading up to the U.S.'s impressive last-minute, game-tying goal and penalty kick shootout victory over the Brazilians in the quarterfinals. In total, Rayfield scouted eight games featuring 10 different nations, including Brazil, Germany, France and England.

Throughout the 2009 season, different Illini stepped up to secure victories against one of the most difficult schedules in the country. The Illini faced 12 eventual 2009 NCAA Tournament participants, including five Big Ten teams. The Illini were able to defeat 2009 NCAA Tournament participants Illinois State, UC Santa Barbara, Milwaukee and Michigan State by a combined score of 15-1.

Illinois also saw the emergence of young talent on both sides of the field. Sophomore Marissa Mykines and freshmen Niki Read and Shayla Mutz found success on offense - finishing second, third and fifth, respectively, in points. On defense, in their first season as starters, junior Krystin Miller and sophomores Caitlin Dombart and Julie Ewing held opponents to fewer goals, shots and shots on goal than the Illini offense produced. After completing her final season with the Orange and Blue, senior Jackie Santacaterina was rewarded for her successful career with the opportunity to play alongside former Illini Ella Masar in the Women's Professional Soccer league. Santacaterina became the fourth Illini drafted into the WPS when the Chicago Red Stars chose her with the 60th pick. Prior to the season, during the summer of 2009, Rayfield earned another opportunity to assist the U.S. Women's National Team and head coach Pia Sundage.

Success in the classroom continued to be a trend among Illini soccer athletes in 2009. Seniors Courtney Bell and Alexandra Kapicka and juniors Danielle Kot, Cory Steigerwald and Miller earned NSCAA Scholar All-Central Region honors while Miller was also named ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All District. In total, 14 Illini earned recognition through the conference for their outstanding work as students with Academic All-Big Ten awards.

The 2008 season was an absolute success, as Illinois made a trip to the NCAA Round of 16 for the third time in the past five seasons. Three Illini earned All-Big Ten honors, including first-team defender Emily Zurrer and second-team honorees midfielder Jackie Santacaterina and defender Danielle Kot. Zurrer also became the first Illini to earn All-American honors three years in a row. Additionally, Soccer Net News named goalkeeper Alexandra Kapicka a National Player of the Year finalists.

2008 was also a special year for the Illini because of the development of Women's Professional Soccer. Three Illini who played under Rayfield's tutelage were drafted, including Ella Masar, Mary Therese McDonnell and Christen Karniski. Rayfield's seventh season with the Illini also marked the first opportunity for her to coach with the U.S. Women's National Team - spending time as an assistant during two of its matches against Canada.

In 2007, Rayfield led the Illini to their fifth-straight NCAA Tournament appearance, advancing to at least the second round for the fourth year in a row. The squad featured seven All-Big Ten selections, including three named to the Big Ten All-Freshman Team, both of which were the most in school history. The Illini also had two representatives named National Soccer Coaches Association of America Scholar All-Americans in McDonnell and Kara Gostisha. In addition, McDonnell also earned the school's prestigious Big Ten Medal of Honor while her sister, Shannon, was honored with the Fighting Illini Spirit Award.

Rayfield guided the 2006 squad to a school record-tying 16 wins, a top-10 ranking, a No. 3 seed in the NCAA Tournament and a berth in the Round of 16. That Illini team also became the first in the history of the Big Ten to boast the conference Offensive and Defensive Players of the Year and the Freshman of the Year in Ella Masar (offensive), Emily Zurrer (co-defensive) and Chichi Nweke (freshman). In addition, Masar was named a second-team All-America selection by the NSCAA, while Zurrer was a third-team selection by the NSCAA.

The 2005 season was not any different, despite entering the season

with more question marks than in previous years. The Illini wasted no time answering those doubts, defeating No. 17 Nebraska, 1-0, early in the season. The Orange and Blue proceeded to extend its streak of first-round Big Ten Tournament wins to seven and qualify for its third-straight NCAA Tournament and fifth in the last six years. Illinois defeated No. 20 Florida in the first round on the Gators' home field, advancing to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the second-straight year.

After the season, senior defender Christen Karniski became one of the most decorated Illini in school history, earning recognition as the Big Ten co-Defensive Player of the Year, second team All-American by the NSCAA and Soccer Buzz, and first team Scholar All-America by NSCAA among her 10 post-season awards.

The Illini were just as successful in 2004 as Rayfield led her team to its best postseason record in school history, advancing to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament. The Illini finished the season with a record of 4-0 against the always-powerful Big 12 Conference, which included a 2-1 come-from-behind upset over ninth-seeded Texas A&M in the second round of the NCAA tournament. The squad also set a school record for consecutive wins (7), with Tara Hurless earning All-America status for the second-straight year.

In 2003, Rayfield led the Illini to one of the best seasons in program history with a 16-4-2 record, a top-10 national ranking, the program's first Big Ten Tournament title and a top-16 seed in the NCAA Tournament. In addition, the 2003 Illini featured two All-Americans in goalkeeper and current assistant coach Leisha Alcia and forward Tara Hurless, a first for Illinois. For her efforts, Soccer Buzz named Rayfield Great Lakes Region Coach of the Year.

Former Director of Athletics Ron Guenther hired Rayfield to serve as the third head coach in Illinois soccer history on June 25, 2002. During Rayfield's first season with the Illini, the Orange and Blue maintained their dominance at home, tallying a 7-2-0 record at Illinois Soccer Stadium. Rayfield quickly earned her first win over a nationally ranked team with the Illini, shutting out No. 25 Cincinnati, 3-0, on Sept. 8 - only four games into Rayfield's career with Illinois. In total, the Illini defeated three top-25 opponents as Illinois dropped No. 13 Purdue, 3-2, in the final regular season contest to earn a bid in the 2002 Big Ten Tournament before defeating top-seeded and No. 11 nationally ranked Penn State, 4-3, in the opening round of the conference tournament.

Rayfield not only has a wealth of soccer experience but also a fierce determination to succeed and an immense amount of respect from her peers. Rayfield served as President of the National Soccer Coaches Association of America, an organization that includes over 16,000 members, in 2003-04. In addition, she continues to assist at the youth national team level whenever possible.

A United States Soccer Federation 'A' Licensed Coach, Rayfield was an assistant at Illinois in 1999 under former head coach Tricia Taliaferro and helped the Illini to a 12-8-1 record and the school's first-ever trip to the Big Ten Tournament semifinals. That season, the Illini entered the NSCAA poll for the first time and climbed as high as No. 15 in the nation.

Rayfield returned to Illinois in 2002 after serving two years as a United States National Staff Coach for Region II. Her duties on the U.S. National staff consisted of player identification, player development and coaching education within the Midwest region. During that time, she also served as a U-19 and U-16 National Team Assistant Coach.

During her playing days, Rayfield was one of the best to compete in the sport. She played collegiately at the University of North Carolina from 1979-82 and helped build the program into a perennial national

champion from humble beginnings. Rayfield was the leading scorer on the Tar Heels as a freshman in 1979, the first year the program competed at a varsity level. Rayfield went on to lead the Tar Heels to the 1981 AIAW National Championship and a 23-0 record in only their third season. That year, Rayfield took home the Nike Player of the Year award, All-America honors and was named one of the top-10 soccer players in the nation, male or female, by Soccer America.

As a senior in 1982, Rayfield led the Tar Heels to the first-ever NCAA women's soccer championship and a 19-2-0 overall record. That championship would be the first of 20 NCAA national titles in the storied history of the North Carolina program.

During her career at North Carolina, Rayfield was a captain all four years and led the Tar Heels to an overall record of 73-9-0 in that span. She also left her mark all over the North Carolina record books. Today, Rayfield still ranks in the top three in seven different offensive categories, including holding the school records for most goals in a game (6) and most points in a game (12), both set against the Chapel Hill Club in 1979. She also currently ranks second to Mia Hamm in career goals with 93, third in career points with 223, third in single-season points with 74 in 1981 and tied for third in single-season goals with 30 in both 1979 and 1981.

After earning a Bachelor of Science degree in Mathematical Sciences from North Carolina in 1983, Rayfield worked as a Senior Software Engineer for E-Systems in Garland, Texas, where she wrote numerous computer programs and worked her way up to management level.

When she wasn't working as a software engineer, Rayfield was still heavily involved with the game she loves. She played seven seasons with the Ladies' Football Club in Dallas and was the captain on six of those squads, leading them to National Titles in 1985, '87 and '89. During that same time, she was head coach of the Texas Spirit Soccer Club that won several Washington (D.C.) area and Dallas Cup titles.

In 1990, Rayfield returned to the collegiate ranks to coach at the University of Arkansas. After three years as an assistant, she was named head coach of the Razorbacks in January of 1993. In six seasons at the helm of the Razorback program, she coached the 1996 SEC West Champions, two SEC Tournament finalists, four All-Region players, six All-SEC players, and 27 Academic All-SEC performers while compiling an overall record of 45-64-7.

At Arkansas, Rayfield earned a Master of Science in Exercise Science/ Biomechanics and also served as a United States Youth Soccer Association Olympic Development staff coach and as a scout for both the U.S. Women's World Cup and Olympic teams. While doing all of this, she was still able to continue her playing career, as she led the Dallas Sting Soccer Club to the Over-30 National Championship in 1993.

Illinois player named a first-team All-American, earning the honor from the NSCAA, Soccer Buzz, CSTV and Soccer Times following the 2003 season.

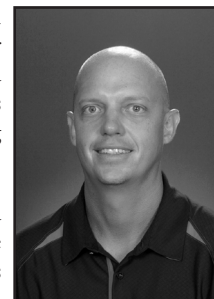

## 2011 SEASON PREVIEW

### INTRODUCTION

Illinois head coach Janet Rayfield and the rest of the Illini Soccer squad look to secure the eighth NCAA Tournament appearance in Rayfield's 10th season at the helm of the program following another successful campaign in 2010.

The Orange and Blue return the majority of their offensive personnel from last season, with the graduation of defensive standouts Danielle Kot and Krystin Miller dictating changes to the backline. However, an experienced core of defensive and middle-of-the-field players will offset the losses and offer the promise of another successful season for Illinois soccer. Illinois will look to employ a fluid player movement system on the field, with student-athletes shifting between positions depending on the opponent and locations on the field depending on game situations as the Illini make use of a fast-paced style in 2011.

### FORWARDS

Illinois returns its starting forward pair in juniors Niki Read and Shayla Mutz as well as the majority of its 2010 reserve players and will introduce a group of new strikers this season.

Read and Mutz, who both started all 19 matches last season, were pivotal in key victories throughout the 2010 slate, combining for six goals and eight assists on the year. Mutz ended the season with four goals, including the game-winner in overtime against Iowa, and two assists. Read added the deciding tallies against No. 17 Ohio State and Northwestern while tying for the team lead with six assists, including game-winning passes against Wright State, Ball State, Cincinnati, Iowa and Michigan State.

Sophomore Megan Pawloski, the second-leading scorer on the Illini in her first season with five goals and two assists, returns for her second year. Pawloski averaged 1.28 points per game during her freshman campaign, coming off the bench in each of Illinois' 19 contests. In 2010, Pawloski was joined as a substitute at forward by then-sophomore Marissa Holden, who tallied her first collegiate goal against No. 23 Louisville, while Holden's classmate, Nicole Denenberg, saw time on the attack in all 19 contests, making nine starts on the year. Denenberg tallied her first collegiate goal, the game-winner, against Wright State and finished the season with four points courtesy of the tally against the Raiders and two assists.

Illinois graduates striker Jordan Hilbrands, who started 39 of the 65 games she played for the Orange and Blue during her career. Hilbrands tallied three goals in seven games during 2010, seeing limited action during her senior campaign due to injury. In total, Hilbrands recorded 11 goals and two assists for 24 points over her four seasons.

Redshirt sophomore Jannelle Flaws has recovered from a knee injury suffered at the conclusion of her senior season of high school and will see time at forward, while incoming freshman Megan Green will also serve as an attacking player for the Illini during 2011.

"We will employ certain players like Shayla and Niki in multiple formations and positions and we will have players who stretch defenses and play away from the ball to be an option," Rayfield said. "We always have to find someone who can stretch the defense and we will put pieces around those players that are fast-moving and hard to track - players like Shayla making runs off the ball and Megan Pawloski playing both rolls, a target to find, run at you and get behind the defense. We have a lot of dangerous personalities in our attacking core and the role of those playing forward each day, the goal scoring piece of that puzzle, is going to be an important one. We are going to create chances, as we are too dangerous, too mobile and too quick not to do so. Players like Megan [Pawloski], Marissa [Holden] and Jannelle [Flaws] will be in the front line with the expectation being they get in the box and on the end line."

### MIDFIELDERS

An experienced core of Illini combined with a nucleus of newcomers to produce a strong middle of the pitch for the Orange and Blue in 2010. Despite the loss of Laura Knutson to graduation, the midfield will remain a strength during the upcoming season due to the infusion of new talent combined with the abilities of returning players.

Big Ten Freshman of the Year Vanessa DiBernardo produced an outstanding rate as a center midfielder throughout 2010, earning recognition from the Big Ten Conference, the National Soccer Coaches Association of America, Top Drawer Soccer and Soccer News Net as a result. DiBernardo led the Big Ten in goals (11) and points (27), while also finishing first in goals per game (0.58) and points per game (1.42) as a starter in each of the Orange and Blue's matches.

Senior Marissa Mykines returns for her fourth season with the Orange and Blue after finishing tied for first among all Illini in assists (6) during 2010. Mykines used her pure speed and ability as a distributing player to help lead Illinois to its 13-win season, assisting on the game-winner at Yale and the game-tying goal at No. 17 Ohio State.

Senior Jackie Guerra, Denenberg, sophomore walk-on Allie Osoba and freshmen Katie Reed, Aliina Weykamp, Noelle Leary, Green and Meyer will all add depth to the talented group.

"It is hard to separate the midfielders and forwards as separate groups among our current attacking players," Rayfield said. "Our front six or seven, depending on how many we choose to play with, are such a collective unit and are so interchangeable that it is our expectation for that group to be interchangeable and be versatile and keep our movement constant. This will be a short passing team that is going to connect not with 60 yard passes, but three 20 yard passes that happen quickly. That type of ball movement is what we are looking for to make this team successful and that's going to mean our center midfielders; Vanessa [DiBernardo], Marissa [Mykines], Nicole [Denenberg], Jackie [Guerra] and so many others, so many can play in there, will have to want the ball constantly. I think this will be a huge piece of being able to play that type of style. We have players that can threaten from the midfield, who do not need to rely on forwards to be dangerous. We can have the entire unit playing out of the midfield and have them run at people with the ball."

### THE DEFENSE

The Illini return three defensive players who saw at least 750 minutes on the 2010 Illini backline to offset the losses of four-year starter Danielle Kot and two-year starter Krystin Miller. With an infusion of new talent and position shifting among experienced players added to the presence of seniors Julie Ewing and Jenna Carosio, redshirt sophomore Christina Farrell and sophomore Cassidy Brown, the Orange and Blue defense appears ready to shut down opponents in 2011.

"The biggest change in terms of personnel will be that Jenna [Carosio] will move and play in the back," Rayfield said. "This is a change we anticipated for at least a year knowing that the change is going to take place. It isn't a position she hasn't trained for and that is a positive aspect of the switch. She has stepped in well and we didn't come into the season unaware of who would be playing on the backline for us. We knew a year ago that when [Danielle] Kot and [Krystin] Miller left, Jenna would be taking their place in the center back. Jenna is a veteran player playing a new position, but one she has been preparing for over the last couple years. She has stepped right in and felt very confident and comfortable. We have put a defense around her that's very comfortable with their own experience."

Ewing enters her third year as a starter on defense, while Farrell and Brown combined to fill an outside defensive role in 2010, with Farrell slotting into the starting lineup perfectly following Brown's season-ending injury at Wisconsin in the 12th game of the 2010 slate.

Senior Caitlin Dombart, junior Kristen Gierman and freshman Mackenzie

Taylor, Stephanie Pouse, Green and Weykamp will vie for minutes and look to add depth to the Illinois defense during the upcoming season.

“Kassidy [Brown] had valuable minutes last season before sustaining an injury,” Rayfield said. “Christina Farrell earned valuable minutes and Caitlin Dombart is a senior with previous valuable playing time. We have experienced players and freshman and sophomore classes that are learning behind them, but talented enough to step in and make the defensive unit deep or play should we need them to. Those players are in a great situation in that they are capable of playing this level of soccer but do not have to step in immediately because of an experienced core ahead of them.”

### KEEPERS

With the graduation of three-year starter and fifth-year senior Alexandra Kapicka, the starting goalkeeper role will become a battle between junior Steph Panozzo, sophomore Lauren Parkin and freshman Lizzi Sanscrainte.

Panozzo is the only one of the three with collegiate-level experience entering 2011, only allowing one goal in 236:29 minutes in net for a 0.38 goals-against average. In 2010, Panozzo earned victories over Loyola-Chicago and Ball State while splitting time in net with Kapicka as the Illini went 4-1 in contests Panozzo saw time during.

“Our goalkeeping situation is similar to our defense with Steph [Panozzo] stepping in as a young college goalkeeper, but she has international experience and she has been here several years and is a experienced goalkeeper,” Rayfield said. “Although her number of minutes or starts in the position may be small, her experience in terms of college soccer is vast, so I think if we can rely on that experience our defense will be solid and that will be important.”

Both Parkin and Sanscrainte sustained success in goal during their scholastic and club-level careers, each earning multiple all-conference, all-section and all-area honors. In addition, Sanscrainte spent two seasons training at the Olympic Development Program Goalkeeper Academy while Parkin was an all-state selection following her senior season.

### SCHEDULE

University of Illinois soccer head coach Janet Rayfield and her staff compiled a challenging fall schedule, including opponents from the Pac-12, Big 12 and BIG EAST in addition to the difficult 11-game Big Ten slate. A rematch with 2010 NCAA Tournament foe USC at Illinois Soccer and Track Stadium, as well as home contests with 2010 postseason participants Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan highlight the upcoming season.

“We want to position ourselves with respect to the region and country for any postseason tournament comparisons and selections the committee will be completing,” Rayfield said. “I think you will see a West Coast-heavy non-conference schedule because we wanted to position ourselves relative to the West Coast teams. The Big Ten plays a lot of Midwest and East Coast teams so there are common comparisons there, but the West Coast schedule will give us a national look in terms of where we fit across the country when it comes to NCAA tournament selection time.”

After opening the fall with an exhibition game at Big 12 Conference rival Missouri on August 12, the Illini host former staff member and current Gonzaga assistant coach Billy Barmes and the rest of the Bulldogs on August 19 for the Illinois Soccer and Track Stadium opener before Toledo travels to Champaign on August 21. The Orange and Blue follow with consecutive road games at Ball State on August 26 and Louisville on August 28 to complete competition during the first month of the season.

The Illini host Southern California and Colorado as part of the Illini/Boilermaker Cup from Sept. 2-4, facing the Trojans on Friday, Sept. 2 and the Buffaloes on Sunday, Sept. 4. In two seasons, the Orange and Blue are 3-1 overall in Illini Challenge Cup action, tallying victories over Iowa State

and Dayton in 2008, while topping UC Santa Barbara in 2009.

Following the Illini/Boilermaker Cup, the Orange and Blue take to the road for five consecutive contests, the longest regular season stretch away from Champaign in the program's history. Illinois begins the campaign in Baton Rouge, La., taking part in the LSU Tournament with Pepperdine and Oregon, challenging the Waves on Sept. 9 and Ducks on Sept. 11. Following the trip to LSU, the Illini begin Big Ten competition at Iowa on Sept. 18, before heading to Ohio State for a Sept. 23 contest followed by a game at Penn State to complete the road swing on Sept. 25.

“Another goal is for the schedule to do as much as it can to prepare you for the conference slate to come,” Rayfield said. “The variety of teams you can play in non-conference play and tough competition prepares you for the Big Ten season. We are challenging ourselves at home with nationally-ranked USC as well as Colorado and challenging ourselves on the road with Oregon and Pepperdine at LSU. These are teams you do not know much about and, in the case of Oregon and Pepperdine, are teams at a neutral site much like an NCAA Tournament-like arena. It's another experience that will be good for us to have, hopefully it challenges us and prepares us – giving us an opportunity to do the things we want to in the NCCA Tournament.”

Illinois continues its season against the Indiana Hoosiers on Sept. 30, playing its first home contest in 26 days in the process. Illinois concludes the back-to-back home game series by hosting Purdue on Oct. 2. After heading to East Lansing, Mich., to face Michigan State on the road for the second consecutive season, the Illini head home for two more games. The Minnesota Gophers will take to the Illinois Soccer Stadium pitch on Oct. 14 before the Orange and Blue and Wisconsin face off in Champaign on Oct. 16.

The Illini conclude the road portion of the regular season with an Oct. 20 game against in-state rival Northwestern before facing Nebraska as a Big Ten opponent for the first time on Oct. 23. Previously, Illinois earned victory in both contests with the Cornhuskers, downing Nebraska, 2-1, during NCAA Tournament competition on Nov. 20, 2004 and again the following season, 1-0, on Sept. 2, 2005. Illinois concludes the regular season with Senior Night against Michigan on Oct. 29. During the Rayfield era, the Orange and Blue are 8-1-0 overall when playing in the final regular season home game at Illinois Soccer and Track Stadium.

The Big Ten conference reintroduces the women's soccer Big Ten Tournament in 2011 after a two-year hiatus, with Northwestern serving as the current host-site. The top-eight regular season finishers earn seeding in the tournament, as the quarterfinal round occurs on Nov. 2, the semifinals follow on Nov. 4 and the Big Ten Tournament Championship unfolds on Nov. 6.

The 2011 NCAA Tournament First and Second Rounds take place from Nov. 11-13, while the Sweet Sixteen follows on Nov. 18-20 and the Elite Eight from Nov. 25-27. The 2011 Women's College Cup, held at Kennesaw State University in Kennesaw, Ga., concludes the season with the Final Four on Dec. 2 before the NCAA Championship on Dec. 4.

**LAST TIME OUT**

The Illini concluded the 2010 season with a loss to USC in the NCAA Tournament First Round at host-site Notre Dame University in South Bend, Ind. By dropping the game, Illinois concluded the season with a 13-5-1 overall record and 6-3-1 mark in Big Ten play.

After the Trojans produced three goals, Shayla Mutz created the lone Illini tally of the match by converting an attempt from inside the USC box in the 80th minute. The Orange and Blue continued to pressure the Trojans over the final ten minutes by recording seven shots; however, they were unable to cut the deficit further.

**NODS OF APPROVAL**

Illinois received considerable individual awards throughout the year. Senior co-captain Danielle

Kot earned the first accolade of 2010, taking home Big Ten Conference Defensive Player of the Week honors on Aug. 23 after a stellar performance against Loyola-Chicago to open the season.

After the Orange and Blue defense posted four consecutive shutouts, senior co-captain Krystin Miller became the second Illini to earn Defensive Player of the Week from the Big Ten on Sept. 20. In the same week, Miller was also recognized on College Soccer 360's Primetime Performers weekly release and Top Drawer Soccer's Team of the Week for her efforts in shutting down LSU, 1-0, and No. 23 Louisville, 3-0.

Vanessa DiBernardo earned a multitude of awards during the season in recognition of her immediate impact for the Illini. DiBernardo was first tabbed Freshman of the Week on Aug. 30 for her one-goal matches against Wright State and Ball State as well as Freshman and Co-Offensive Player of the Week on Sept. 13 for her two-goal game at Cincinnati. DiBernardo secured yet another Offensive and Freshman Player of the Week combination with her four-goal game against Purdue on Oct. 1.

Upon completion of the regular season, DiBernardo was awarded the Big Ten Freshman of the Year Award in addition to a spot on the All-Big Ten First Team and a unanimous selection to the All-Freshman Team. DiBernardo also earned a spot on the NSCAA All-Region First Team and was tabbed as a finalist for the Soccer News Net Women's Player of the Year. The Naperville, Ill., native was joined on the All-Freshman Team by classmate Megan Pawloski, who earned the nod after producing five goals and two assists in 841 minutes of action.

**THE NEWEST MEMBER OF THE CLUB**

Senior defender Danielle Kot earned membership in the exclusive 7,000 minutes-played club against Michigan State, becoming the sixth player to do so in the history of the program, joining former Illini greats Christen Karniski (7,710), Leisha Alcia (7,698), Kelly Campbell (7,556), Emily Zurrer (7,487) and Mary Therese McDonnell (7,352) as the newest member.

To earn entrance into the club, an athlete must play an average of 1,750 minutes per season during a four-year career - which equates to 19.5 full contests in each season. Kot recorded a career-high 2,131 minutes as a sophomore in 2008. The Brookfield, Wis., native's seasonal playing time totals also include 1,794 (2007), 1,770 (2009) and 1,576 minutes (2010). Kot concluded her 80-game career with 7,271 total minutes, an average of 90:48 per game due to the Illini's 15 overtime contests since 2007.

**IMMEDIATE IMPACT**

Four Fighting Illini first-year players made an immediate impact on the field for the Orange and Blue, with freshman forward Megan Pawloski, midfielder Vanessa DiBernardo and defender Cassidy Brown and redshirt-freshman defender Christina Farrell finding considerable success during their initial seasons at Illinois.

DiBernardo earned Big Ten Freshman of the Year and All-Big Ten First Team honors after leading the conference with 11 goals and 27 points in only 19 games played. The Waubonsie Valley graduate set the Illinois record for goals in a game and points in a single contest with her four-tally performance against Purdue, accounting for every Illini goal during the 4-1 victory.

Pawloski earned Big Ten All-Freshman honors after finishing second on the Orange and Blue with 12 points on five goals and two assists. Pawloski, who saw time in all 19 contests but did not start, accumulated her points total in only 841 total minutes. As a result, the Althoff Catholic graduate averaged 1.3 points per game, one of the most productive totals in the Big Ten.

Brown slotted into an outside defensive back role at the onset of the season, starting 11 of the 12 games the Lake Zurich, Ill., native played in before suffering a season-ending knee injury at Wisconsin. Brown was instrumental in the Illini finishing non-conference play with a 7-1-0 overall record as the Illinois defense limited the opposition to three total goals in eight games.

While competing for time as a defensive substitute throughout much of the initial 12 contests, Farrell took hold of a starting defensive role when Brown was injured at Wisconsin. Farrell averaged nearly 85 minutes per contests over the final seven games, including playing the entirety of six, as Illinois fought for and earned its seventh NCAA Tournament bid under head coach Janet Rayfield.

**SHUTTING OUT THE STARS**

The Illinois defense combined to hold Big Ten non-Illini points leaders Laura Heyboer (MSU), Laurie Nosbusch (Wis.), Tani Costa (PSU), Katie Bethke (Minn.), Paige Maxwell (OSU) and Danielle Toney (PSU) to five points on two goals and one assist in 13 shots. Combined, these six opponents scored 51 goals and tallied 27 assists for 129 points against other defensive units.

With the remaining seven non-Illini athletes who round out the points leaderboard for the conference; Olivia Stander (MSU), Christine

Nairn (PSU), Nkem Ezurike (Mich.), Paige Maxwell (OSU), Carly Samp (Ind.), Shari Eckstrom (Minn.), Molly Rouse (Minn.), and Tiffany Cameron (OSU), the Illini backline only allowed two goals on 22 shots.

In total, the Orange and Blue defense held this group of 13 dynamic scorers responsible for 269 points on 106 goals and 57 assists to just four goals and one assist when facing Illinois.

### MAKING THE LAST PASS

When Vanessa DiBernardo converted the game-winning goal against Michigan State, Niki Read earned her team-leading sixth assist on the season. During the NCAA Tournament First Round game with USC, Marissa Mykines joined Read as a team-leader in assists when she earned her sixth on Shayla Mutz's tally.

Read's and Mykines' six assists each are the most for an Illini since Chichi Nweke tallied seven during the 2007 season. Read now has 16 points on eight assists and four goals through 35 games while Mykines has earned 22 points on six goals and 10 assists in 60 career games. Kelly Buszkiewicz set the single-season program record for assists in 1998 when she tallied 10 in her second year playing for Illinois.

### BOUNCEBACK QUEENS

The Illini finished undefeated at 4-0-0 in games directly following a loss in 2010, only the second time in team history they have accomplished this feat (2003). In 2010, Illinois outscored its opponents, 7-1, after dropping a regular season game.

### 2010 SEASON AT A GLANCE

The Illini improved considerably in 2010, ending with an overall record of 13-5-1 to go with a 6-3-1 finish in Big Ten games to earn their seventh NCAA Tournament berth under head coach Janet Rayfield.

Illinois began the season with consecutive victories over Loyola-Chicago, Wright State and Ball State - outscoring the opposition, 8-1, during the three contests. Freshman Vanessa DiBernardo established herself as a legitimate scoring threat out of the midfield during this season-opening win streak, notching three goals and one assist.

After dropping their first contest of the season in overtime at Connecticut, the Illini responded with shutouts of Yale, Cincinnati, LSU and No. 23 Louisville to finish regular season non-conference play with a 7-1-0 record.

Illinois dropped its first conference match of the season to Minnesota, snapping a streak of 430 consecutive shutout minutes. Following

the loss, the Orange and Blue responded with a five game unbeaten streak, downing Purdue, Indiana, Iowa and No. 17 Ohio State while tying with Wisconsin after playing through double overtime. During this stretch, DiBernardo broke the program record for goals and points in a game by notching every Illini tally during the team's 4-1 win over the Boilermakers. To conclude this five game stretch of dominance, Illinois earned a last-minute victory, 2-1, over the eventual-NCAA Tournament College Cup-bound Buckeyes in their final regular season home game, only the second and final home loss of the season for Ohio State.

To round out its conference wins and earn fourth place in the Big Ten, Illinois earned identical shutout victories, 1-0, over Michigan State and Northwestern. DiBernardo tallied the lone goal against the Spartans, while sophomore Niki Read provided the difference against the Wildcats.

In the NCAA Tournament Opening Rounds, Illinois was bracketed with eventual 2010 NCAA Champion Notre Dame, Mountain West Conference Champion New Mexico and USC, falling to the nationally ranked Trojans in South Bend, Ind.

Throughout the 2010 season, the Illini improved in nearly every offensive statistical measure from their 2009 performance - recording more points, goals, assists, shots, shots per game, and corner kicks. On defense, Illinois held its opponents to a lower goals scored total, shot percentage and fewer shots attempts. In net, Alexandra Kapicka concluded her career with another great season, allowing only 15 goals in 1,522 minutes for a goals-against average of 0.89. The Arlington Heights, Ill., native stopped 82% of the shots she faced, making 68 total saves en route to an 11-5-1 record and six individual shutouts.

# NCAA TOURNAMENT HISTORY (9-9-1 IN NINE APPEARANCES)

## 2000

### ILLINOIS 2, XAVIER 0

#### FIRST ROUND // CHAMPAIGN, ILL.

Illinois made the most of its first NCAA Tournament berth, shutting out Xavier to end the Musketeers' 14-match unbeaten streak and advance to a second-round showdown with Big Ten champion Penn State. Sophomore Laura Freeman netted a pair of goals, one in the 17th minute and another in the 46th minute and the Illini defense stonewalled Xavier for the program's first NCAA Tournament victory.

### PENN STATE 1, ILLINOIS 0 (OT)

#### SECOND ROUND // UNIVERSITY PARK, PA.

The Illini took Big Ten champion Penn State into extra time, but Nittany Lion midfielder Erin Miller put in a soaring shot from the top of the 18-yard box in the 100th minute that was the difference. Illinois goalkeeper Sarah Anderson came up with seven saves on the afternoon.

## 2001

### SYRACUSE 1, ILLINOIS 0

#### FIRST ROUND // CHAMPAIGN, ILL.

Illinois hosted an NCAA first-round match for the second straight year, but this time found itself on the losing end of a shutout, falling 1-0 to Syracuse. The teams played a scoreless first half, but the Orangewomen's Erica Mastrogiacomo sliced through the Illini defense in the 50th minute for the deciding goal.

## 2003

### WESTERN MICHIGAN 2, (16) ILLINOIS 0

#### FIRST ROUND // CHAMPAIGN, ILL.

The Illini continued their streak of hosting NCAA first-round matches, but lost their second straight home opener, 2-0 to Western Michigan. The victory was the Broncos' first in the NCAA Tournament and 10th in a row. On a blustery night, WMU freshman Chantal Robinson blasted a 25-foot rocket off a free kick that broke Illinois' school-record scoreless minutes streak of 631:07. The Broncos then scored from close range in the 85th minute to ice the game.

## 2004

### ILLINOIS 2, RICE 0

#### FIRST ROUND // COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS

Illinois broke its first-round drought, taking out Rice 2-0 as senior Tara Hurless became the Illinois career goal-scoring record holder by scoring both goals. Hurless knocked in a 20-yarder from the right side in the 23rd minute and the Illini defense held the Owls to one first-half shot as Illinois led 1-0 at halftime. Hurless then knocked in an 8-yarder in the 85th minute to grab the goal-scoring record and finish off the Illini win.

### ILLINOIS 2, #7 TEXAS A&M 1

#### SECOND ROUND // COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS

The Illini fell behind early but rallied with two goals in the final 23 minutes to advance to the Sweet Sixteen for the first time in school history after a 2-1 win at ninth-seeded and seventh-ranked Texas A&M. The Aggies scored in the 19th minute and kept Illinois off the board until Natasha Karniski tied the match at 1 in the 67th minute. Just one minute, 15 seconds later, Andrea Ridgeway knocked in the go-ahead goal, but A&M drew a penalty kick in the 77th minute. All-American Illini keeper Leisha Alcía saved it and Illinois finished out the upset to advance to the Round of 16.

### ILLINOIS 2, NEBRASKA 1

#### SWEET SIXTEEN // CHAMPAIGN, ILL.

Illinois managed its first home NCAA Tournament win since 2000 due to a penalty-kick goal by defender Sarah Brown in the 86th minute, taking down Nebraska 2-1. Midfielder Paula Faherty got the Illini on the board early with a goal in the 21st minute off a rebound of a corner kick, but the Huskers responded with a goal in the 29th minute. With extra time looming, forward Jessica Bayne drew a foul in the 18-yard box and Brown pounded home the penalty kick for the game-winner.

### #4 SANTA CLARA 2, ILLINOIS 0

#### ELITE EIGHT // SANTA CLARA, CALIF.

As the only unseeded team to reach the quarterfinal round of the 2003 NCAA Tournament, Illinois met expectations against Santa Clara as the Broncos advanced to the College Cup with a 2-0 win. Santa Clara notched the first goal off a free kick in the 39th minute, sending the game to halftime with a 1-0 Bronco lead. Santa Clara then staged an early charge in the second half, scoring just 45 seconds in for the final 2-0 margin.

## 2005

### ILLINOIS 1, #20 FLORIDA 0 (2 OT)

#### FIRST ROUND // GAINESVILLE, FLA.

Rachel Frank notched her second shutout of the season in only her fourth game and Laura Redmond knocked in the game-winner in the 102nd minute as the Illini moved into the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the second straight year. Frank and the Illini defense kept the Illinois season alive, as the back-up keeper made a season high-tying six saves, including a pair of tough saves in the first half and another just after halftime to keep the game scoreless. After a much more aggressive Illini team pressured the Gators during the overtimes, Christen Karniski sent a corner kick toward the box, where Ella Masar flicked it to Redmond, who beat the Florida keeper and tapped in the golden goal.

### #11 (3) FLORIDA STATE 2, ILLINOIS 1

#### SECOND ROUND // GAINESVILLE, FLA.

Illinois' postseason run ended with a 2-1 loss to eventual College Cup participant and 11th-ranked Florida State in the NCAA second round. FSU scored first as forward Sel Kuralay blasted a 25-yarder from the top of the box over keeper Rachel Frank's head in the 30th minute. In the 64th minute, Illini defender Kelly Campbell stole the ball from Seminole forward India Trotter inside the 18-yard box, but Trotter regained possession and put in a eight-yarder for a 2-0 lead. Ella Masar pulled the Illini within a goal in the 76th minute went far post from 14 yards, but FSU held on for the 2-1 win.

## 2006

### #15 (3) ILLINOIS 2, SOUTHEAST MISSOURI STATE 0

#### FIRST ROUND // ST. LOUIS

Third-seeded and 15th-ranked Illinois overcame a choppy start and withstood a one hour, 38-minute lightning delay in the first half to eliminate Southeast Missouri State, 2-0, in the NCAA first round. Paula Faherty got the Illini on the board when she received a serve in the right slot, took a touch and fired in a shot at 36:41 for her first goal of the season. Jackie Santacaterina added an insurance goal in the 50th minute when she one-timed a serve from Ella Masar off the end line.

### #15 (3) ILLINOIS 4, SAINT LOUIS 1

#### SECOND ROUND // ST. LOUIS

Chichi Nweke scored a goal and an assist in 29 minutes of action as Illinois took a 2-0 halftime lead on its way to a 4-1 win that sent the third-seeded Illini to their second Round of 16 match in program history. Nweke scored in the 19th minute on a shot that ricocheted off a SLU defender and past the keeper, putting the Illini up 1-0. Less than three minutes later, Nweke dribbled up the left flank before passing to Ella Masar, who split two defenders, turned and fired a rocket off the inside of the right post for a 2-0 halftime lead. The Billikens cut the lead to 2-1 in the 54th minute, but Eva Strickland scored in the 61st minute and Brittany Garrett notched her first career goal in the 79th minute as the Illini pulled away for the 4-1 victory.

### #5 (2) FLORIDA STATE 1, #15 (3) ILLINOIS 0

#### SWEET SIXTEEN // TALLAHASSEE, FLA.

Florida State scored in the 20th minute and held on for dear life, turning away a number of near-misses by the Illini in the second half as the second-seeded Seminoles bounced the third-seeded Illini from the NCAA Tournament for the second-straight year. Illinois limited FSU to only nine shots, but the Illini managed to put just one of their six shots on frame as the Orange and Blue saw one of the best seasons in program history come to an end.

## 2007

### ILLINOIS 1, LOUISVILLE 0 (OT)

#### FIRST ROUND // SOUTH BEND, IND.

After a defensive battle through 90 minutes against the Louisville Cardinals left the two teams knotted at zero, the Illini wasted little time in the overtime period as senior forward Ella Masar headed in the golden goal in the 92nd minute to propel Illinois into the second round. Sophomore forward Chichi Nweke drove the ball down the right flank before crossing to Masar inside the six for her record-tying seventh game-winning goal of the season.

### #11 (4) NOTRE DAME 2, ILLINOIS 0

#### SECOND ROUND // SOUTH BEND, IND.

Illinois advanced to the second round for the fourth consecutive year but came up short against host Notre Dame in a 2-0 loss. The Irish notched their first goal in the 27th minute and added the second just before the half on a heart-breaking own goal for the Orange and Blue. Despite holding Notre Dame to just one shot on frame in the second half, the Illini were unable to find the back of the net as their season came to an end.

## 2008

### ILLINOIS 1, MEMPHIS 0 (2OT)

#### FIRST ROUND // COLUMBIA, MO.

Illinois and Memphis battled into the second overtime before Illini forward Jordan Hilbrands netted the golden goal in the 103rd minute to propel the Orange and Blue into the second round of the NCAA Tournament. The first half was a stalemate, as the teams went back and forth with possession in the midfield. The Orange and Blue defense withstood a late second-half attack from the Tigers, sending the game into overtime still scoreless. In the overtime period, Memphis collected three corner kicks but was unable to capitalize as the Illinois defense staved off the Tigers to send it to the second overtime and set up Hilbrands' game-winner.

## SWEET SIXTEEN // CHAPEL HILL, N.C.

Illinois battled hard against North Carolina, holding the top-seeded team to one goal in the first half before falling, 3-0, in the NCAA Round of 16 at Fetzer Field. Illinois goalkeeper Alexandra Kapicka delivered another solid performance, turning away five shots on goal. UNC took the lead in the 32nd minute after an unlucky Illinois own goal, then added to the lead with two goals in the second half within a two-minute span. The Illini had a few chances late in the game, but were unable to crack the Tar Heel defense.

## #22 USC 3, #13 ILLINOIS 1

## FIRST ROUND // SOUTH BEND, IND.

After falling behind by three goals late, Shayla Mutz produced her first post-season points by converting an attempt within the Southern California box off a feed from Marissa Mykines in the 80th minute. The Illini continued to pressure over the final 10 minutes by producing seven more shots; however, the Orange and Blue were unable to cut the deficit further.

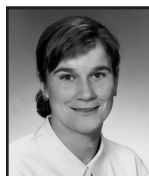
