## Logline

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A dream-like journey over Victoria's salt lakes

## Synopsis

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Eagle Eye is a dream-like journey over Victoria's salt lakes, filmed on Wamba Wamba country. Merging stunning imagery, ambient music, and Aboriginal storytelling, it transforms the lakes' shifting hues into a meditation on colour, rhythm, and culture. Think Baraka for Australian salt lakes.

## Director's Statement

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Eagle Eye emerged from my journey as a fine art drone photographer, capturing the natural beauty of Victoria's salt lakes. For over four years, I've developed a unique technique—transforming these landscapes into abstract art without altering the photographs from their original colour or form. This process became a personal exploration, uncovering layers of story and meaning within untouched natural imagery. The success of my photographic work inspired me to extend this vision into the moving image.

Music has always been integral to my creative process. Ben Last, a local electronic music producer for over 30 years, incorporates theta waves into sound journey workshops, providing the ideal soundscape for Eagle Eye. His ethereal compositions reflect the dream-like qualities of my cinematography. And the rhythmic nature of his work enabled me to synchronise the film's story beats with the beats in the music - matching the shifts, reveals and transitions in the visuals with the music's rhythmic pulse, for an immersive experience.

A pivotal moment came when I met with an old friend, Dion Brownfield, a music producer who works in remote indigenous communities and helped launch the career of Baker Boy. He introduced me to Uncle Ron, a cultural custodian of the Wamba Wamba people, on whose land these salt lakes sit. Uncle Ron shared that his community had lost their salt-lake dreaming stories. After seeing my work, he felt inspired to write a new one, both for his people and for the film. This collaboration adds a profound layer to the project, merging ancient and contemporary storytelling to reconnect with the spirit of the land.

Eagle Eye refers to the top-down perspective from which Aboriginal dot-paintings are viewed - from the height of a soaring eagle, much like the view from my drone. With Eagle Eye, my aim is to honour this tradition, offering a cinematic interpretation that weaves together natural landscapes, ethereal rhythm and timeless culture.

## Wamba Wamba

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The Wamba Wamba are an Aboriginal Australian people in north-Western Victoria and south-western New South Wales, including in the Mallee and the Riverina regions. Traditional Wamba-Wamba territory occupied the area around the Loddon River, reaching northwards from Kerang to Swan Hill, Victoria, and including the area of the Avoca River, southwards towards Quambatook. In a northeasterly direction, their territory ran up, over the New South Wales-Victorian border to Boooroban, Moulamein, and extended to the vicinity of Barham, Lake Boga and Boora in Victoria.

When I first met with Uncle Ron Murray about a dreaming story, he said his people had lost their salt lake dreaming stories due to colonisation. But after seeing my work, he felt inspired to write a new one, both for his people and for the film. With this collaboration, we now find ourselves merging ancient and contemporary storytelling to connect with the spirit of the land.

### ***Eagle Eye* Selected for Prestigious St Kilda Film Festival Screening**

Acclaimed fine art drone photographer and now filmmaker Eamon Wyss will premiere his immersive short film *Eagle Eye* at the prestigious St Kilda Film Festival, with a special screening at the historic St Kilda Town Hall on Saturday, 13 June at 2:30pm.

Widely regarded as Australia's longest-running and most respected short film festival, the St Kilda Film Festival has become a launching platform for some of the country's most celebrated filmmakers. Selection into the festival represents a major achievement for emerging and independent Australian cinema, with the program showcasing outstanding short films from across the nation.

*Eagle Eye* was selected for its visionary fusion of abstract drone cinematography, mesmerising electronic music and First Nations storytelling — a cinematic experience unlike anything else currently emerging from the Australian screen landscape.

Filmed across the extraordinary salt lakes of Wamba Wamba Country in regional Victoria, *Eagle Eye* transforms natural landscapes into abstract moving art without digitally altering the imagery. The result is a hypnotic and meditative journey through Country, entwined with rhythm and story.

The film emerged from Wyss's nationally recognised practice as a fine art drone photographer, where he spent more than five years exploring the salt lakes from above. Inspired by the visual language of Aboriginal dot painting and aerial photography traditions, Wyss sought to translate his still-image work into an immersive cinematic form.

“Being selected for St Kilda Film Festival is an incredible honour,” says Wyss. “This film was created independently over two years through collaboration, experimentation and a shared appreciation of the land. To have it recognised by one of Australia's premier film festivals means a lot us.”

A defining creative collaboration on the project came through Uncle Ron Murray, cultural custodian of the Wamba Wamba people, who wrote an original contemporary dreaming story for the film after sharing that their traditional salt-lake stories had been lost over time. The project also features an

ethereal electronic score by veteran producer Ben Last, whose rhythmic compositions became central to the film's immersive structure.

*Abstract Landscapes. Ancient Perspective. Immersive Cinema.*

Following the screening, audiences are invited to attend a special Filmmaker Q&A from 4:45pm–5:15pm, where Eamon Wyss will be joined by collaborators and special guests to discuss the making of *Eagle Eye*, including the film's unique visual process, the intersection of drone cinematography and storytelling, and the collaboration with Wamba Wamba cultural voices.

Blending abstract art, experimental cinema and ancient perspectives on landscape, *Eagle Eye* offers audiences a rare and deeply sensory cinematic experience — one that invites viewers to see the Australian landscape from the height of a soaring eagle.

*Director, Producer, Cinematographer*



Eamon Wyss is a Melbourne-based film director and cinematographer with a passion for capturing Victoria's salt lakes through drone photography. With experience as an assistant director and associate producer in several short films, *Eagle Eye* marks his directorial debut and serves as a proof of concept for a future feature-length project using the same visual and storytelling techniques. Also throughout his career, Eamon worked as an event producer, a UX designer, and more recently as a fine art drone photographer of Victorian salt lakes, showcasing his artwork in exhibitions and art fairs throughout Australia.

### **Uncle Ron Murray**

*Writer, Performer*



Uncle Ron Murray is a senior cultural custodian of the Wamba Wamba people, based in Castlemaine. He has performed around the world as a didgeridoo soloist, and is passionate about keeping Aboriginal stories, art and culture alive. Ron is also a storyteller and mentor, lecturing on Indigenous issues concerning employment, history, the environment, justice, cultural heritage, arts practice, and the positive contributions of Indigenous people to Australian society.

### **Benjamin Last**

*Music Composer*



Benjamin Last (*aka Ben Temple Step*) is a music producer and stage performer, pioneering explorations in tribal-ethno-electronic music. Ben freelances as a producer, DJ and sound healer. As an artist, he explores 'sound' as a sacred, vibrational, alchemical tool, evoking a state of mind that invites audiences to embrace their creative expression.

**Andrea Buck**

*Executive / Mentor Producer*



Andrea Buck is an award-winning and ACCTA nominated film producer and writer, working in Hollywood, Australia and Africa. Sarah James is a fiddler/ vocalist/ educator who performs as part of the Celtic-Indigenous folk music duo, Kinja with her husband, respected didgeridoo musician Ron Murray. As a classical violist, she has been a member of the Resonance String Orchestra since 2021 and performed *Vivaldi's Four Seasons* with the Bendigo Symphony Orchestra at the Castlemaine State Festival 2023. Sarah has been a lecturer in Criminology over many years, teaching in the field of Indigenous justice/human rights. In recent years, she has been working as a theatre producer. Recent producer credits include *The Whisper* (fortyfivedownstairs theatre 2024 and Melbourne Fringe Festival 2022), *Billy's Choice* (Melbourne Fringe Festival 2021) and *Soul of Possum* (fortyfivedownstairs 2025).

## **Brodie Murray**

Brodie Murray is an award winning Wamba Wamba multidisciplinary artist, playwright and performer based in Naarm. His plays such as *Soul of Possum*, have been presented by Fortyfivedownstairs, Yirramboi and the Melbourne Fringe Festival. *Soul of Possum* was recently published as a hardcopy script by Playlab Theatre.

## The Salt Lakes of Wamba Wamba Country

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### Lake Tyrrell



Lake Tyrrell — Victoria’s largest salt lake — is around 120,000 years old, lying just north of Sea Lake, 420 kilometres northwest of Melbourne. Dry for much of the year with a shallow covering of water in winter, the lake is renowned as one of Australia’s best places for star observation and navigation. For thousands of years, the local Aboriginal people have called it *Skymirror*. To them, their ancestors dwell among the stars, and when the night sky reflects upon the lake’s surface, walking across it feels like walking

with their ancestors.

### Lake Wahpool



Lake Wahpool is a large salt lake in the Buloke Shire, in the Malle Region of Victoria. The lake often changes colour throughout the year, from velvet red, to hot pink and even light blue. It’s stand alone island in the middle gives it a unique character.

### Lake Timboram



Lake Timboram lies 50 kilometres west of Swan Hill. At certain times of the year, it becomes the only salt lake in Victoria to display every colour at once — blue, pink, red, orange, and yellow shimmering together across its salty bed.

Other lakes filmed for the Eagle Eye short film include Lake Lulla near Manangatang, and Spencer’s lake near the town of Lake Charm

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Wyss Films is a new film production company founded in 2024 by cinematographer / director / producer Eamon Wyss, and is based in Melbourne, Australia

Eagle Eye is the company's debut film and serves as a proof of concept for a future feature-length project employing the same visual and storytelling techniques.
