

Frequently Asked Questions: Hiring an Attorney

Answers to common questions about choosing and working with a legal professional.

Q: How do I know if I need an attorney?

A: If you are facing a legal issue, it is often advisable to consult with an attorney. They can assess your situation, explain your rights and options, and guide you through the legal process.

Q: What should I look for in an attorney?

Q: What information should I prepare before meeting an attorney?

Q: What happens during an initial consultation?

Q: What are different ways attorneys charge for their services?

A: Common billing structures include hourly rates, contingency fees (where the attorney gets a percentage of the settlement or award), and flat fees for specific services. Understand which method applies to your case.

Q: Can I afford to hire an attorney?

A: Many attorneys offer free initial consultations, allowing you to discuss your case without immediate cost. Some may also offer payment plans or work on a contingency basis, making legal representation more accessible.

Q: What is a contingency fee agreement?

A: A contingency fee agreement means the attorney's fee is contingent upon winning your case. If you win, the attorney receives a pre-agreed percentage of the settlement or award. If you lose, you typically do not pay attorney fees.

Q: How important is communication with my attorney?

A: Clear and consistent communication is vital. Your attorney should keep you informed about your case's progress, and you should feel comfortable asking questions and providing updates.

Q: What if I'm not satisfied with my attorney?

A: If you are unhappy with your attorney's representation, you have the right to seek a second opinion or change legal counsel. Discuss your concerns with your current attorney first, if possible.
