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About HWC

The Health & Wellness Center (HWC) is the largest rural Community Health Center (CHC) in Oklahoma. We have been proudly serving southeastern Oklahoma since 2005. The Health & Wellness Center serves close to 34,000 patients annually and operate out of 7 healthcare clinics, 3 pharmacies, and 3 residential substance use recovery facilities. Clinic locations include Checotah, Eufaula, Poteau, Sallisaw, Stigler, Warner, and Wilburton.

In 2021 HWC was given the opportunity to add Adventure Head Start to the growing list of services offered. Roughly 20 locations and 43 class rooms throughout southeastern Oklahoma serve nearly 700 children and their families.

The Oaks of McAlester provides substance use disorder services & residential treatment along with The Pines of Poteau, the newest addition to our residential treatment facilities is the HWC Detox, housed within The Oaks.

HWC has grown over the years and is nearing 20 years of service in southeastern Oklahoma. The Health & Wellness Center's mission is to provide comprehensive services, enrich lives by investing in our communities, and improve quality of life.

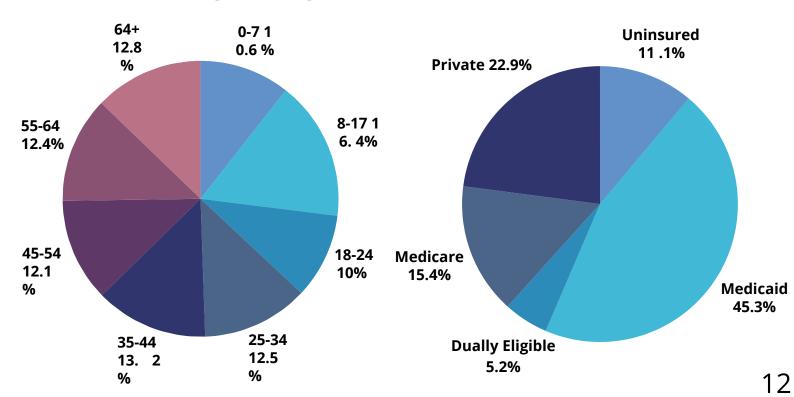

Accelerated Cancer Screening (AxCS)



- Provide cancer screening to all consumers.
- In 2023 the grant allowed for 1,417 Colorectal Cancer Screenings,
 1,766 Cervical Cancer Screenings, and 1,212 Breast Cancer Screenings.



Primary Care HIV Prevention (PCHP)

- Assist in the initiative to reduce new HIV infections
- In 2023 a total of 4,016 HWC consumers were screened for HIV.
 Along with that, 1,181 take home screenings kits were distributed to community members.

Mental Health Awareness Training (MHAT)

- MHAT is focused on expanding and enhancing awareness training efforts to better prepare
 individuals, to identify mental illness, employ de-escalation techniques, establish referral
 linkages, and connect individuals to available community resources.
