SUBJECT: CONVERSION FROM AN AT-LARGE ELECTORAL SYSTEM FOR MEMBERS OF

THE MPWD BOARD OF DIRECTORS TO A SYSTEM BASED ON FIVE (5) DIVISIONS

PURSUANT TO THE CALIFORNIA VOTING RIGHTS ACT

RECOMMENDATION:

1. Receive Presentation by MPWD Consultant Redistricting Partners.

- 2. Open the Public Hearing.
- 3. Receive Public Input on MPWD Draft Maps and Order of Elections.
- 4. Review Remaining Dates, Steps, and Processes for Transitioning to Division-Based Elections.
- 5. Close the Public Hearing.

BACKGROUND:

What is the California Voting Rights Act?

The California Voting Rights Act (CRVA) takes the principles of the Federal Voting Rights Act and expands it. The CRVA prohibits the use of at-large election systems in local government if there is racially polarized voting.

- "At-large" is defined as anything other than a system in which an elected official resides and is only elected by members of that district (zone or division).
- "Racially polarized voting" is determined through an analysis that quantifies the amount of voting, which can be shown to be correlated to race.

MPWD Electoral System

- The MPWD Board of Directors is currently comprised of five (5) Directors who serve four-year staggered terms and are elected in even-numbered years, pursuant to California Water Code Sections 30500 and 30501, and California Elections Code Section 10505.
- The MPWD's enabling legislation (California Water Code Sections 30292 et seq.) mandated that the Directors be elected at-large.

- In 2020, the Board had no information as to whether polarized voting existed in the MPWD service area; however, it decided to be proactive and forego the process of obtaining demographic data to make that determination, and instead voluntarily chose to change the electoral system to a zone-based system from its current at-large system to ensure the fairest and most-inclusive elections process.
- There was not sufficient time for the MPWD to meet the Department of Elections deadline of June 1, 2020, for an electoral system change for the November 2020 election. Therefore, the MPWD intended to have its Directors elected by new zones beginning in November 2022. Three (3) Director positions are set to be on the ballot in November 2022 and the remaining two (2) in November 2024.
- Due to the global COVID-19 emergency pandemic the U.S. 2020 Census results were not expected to be timely delivered by the July 31, 2021, deadline. In fact, the census data was not published until September 2021.

Here is a timeline of past Board action and activities related to the MPWD electoral conversion process:

June 25, 2020: The Board approved Resolution 2020-19 Approving the Intention to Change from

At-Large to Zone-Based Elections for Election of Members of the Board of Directors Commencing in November of 2022. (Attached for information.)

May 27, 2021: The Board approved a contract for professional services between the MPWD and

Redistricting Partners (RP) for the Zone-Based Election Process Demography,

and a total project budget in the amount of \$46,200.

October 28, 2021: The Board received a presentation by Consultant Redistricting Partners of two

(2) draft preliminary Division maps for MPWD November 2022 Board Member

Elections.

DISCUSSION:

In continuance of its electoral conversion process, this evening the Board will hold the first of three (3) public hearings scheduled to solicit input regarding the MPWD's proposed Division maps. Consultant Redistricting Partners will make its presentation based on the data compiled from the 2020 U.S. Census.

The attached Public Hearing Notice was posted at the MPWD and its website on January 19, 2022. It was e-blasted on Nextdoor throughout Belmont and neighboring communities (including San Carlos). And it was published in the Daily Journal on January 21, 2022, and January 26, 2022.

The following was lifted from the notice and highlights the public hearing schedule and planned activities and actions:

Public Hearing Schedule

Thursday, January 27, 2022, at 6:30PM Thursday, February 24, 2022, at 6:30PM Thursday, March 24, 2022, at 6:30PM

At the first public hearing on January 27, 2022, the MPWD, with the assistance of its demographer consultant, will present the updated census data for the MPWD's service area, identification of significant neighborhoods and communities, and two (2) draft maps of the five (5) potential election

divisions. The MPWD is interested in gathering input on the proposed composition, population, geography, and communities of interest.

The second public hearing scheduled for February 24, 2022, will allow for a second presentation of MPWD draft map options and further opportunity to provide input. One of the map options will be considered for further discussion.

The third and final public hearing scheduled for March 24, 2022, the Board of Directors will review the final draft map and consider approval.

The draft maps and related information to the MPWD's redistricting process were made available for public review in advance of the scheduled public hearing and posted at the MPWD's website: www.midpeninsulawater.org

For information, the City of Belmont initiated its redistricting process after receiving a July 30, 2021, letter from a southern California attorney alleging violations under the CRVA due to using an at-large election system. The City's first public hearing on January 11, 2022, presented the process and gathered public input. The next public hearing is scheduled on January 25, 2022. A draft map will be presented on February 8, 2022, and an outreach presentation on February 19, 2022. A second map will be presented on February 22, 2022, and a final vote and reading of an ordinance is scheduled on March 8, 2022. The City Counsel has expressed interest in an at-large directly elected Mayor.

RESOLUTION NO. 2020-19

APPROVING THE INTENTION TO CHANGE FROM AT-LARGE TO ZONE-BASED ELECTIONS FOR ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS COMMENCING IN NOVEMBER OF 2022

* * *

MID-PENINSULA WATER DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the Mid-Peninsula Water District is a Water District duly organized and operating pursuant to the County Water District Law, California Water Code sections 30000 to 33901 et seq.; and

WHEREAS, the California Legislature in the County Water District Law provided for the formation, governance, and operation of County Water Districts, and the Mid-Peninsula Water District was established in 1929 with boundaries including the City of Belmont, portions of the City of San Carlos, and portions of unincorporated San Mateo County; and

WHEREAS, under the District's enabling legislation (Cal. Water Code sections 30000 to 33901), the Board of Directors (Board) of the Mid-Peninsula Water District (District) provides for the development and provision to its customers of a sufficient quantity of high quality water in the most cost-effective, reliable, and environmentally sensitive manner; and

WHEREAS, the Board seeks to manage the District in a manner to maximize efficiency and to ensure delivery of quality services to residents of the district it serves; and

WHEREAS, the Board currently is comprised of five (5) directors who serve four-(4) year staggered terms and are elected in even-numbered years pursuant to Cal. Water Code sections 30500 and 30501, and Cal. Elections Code section 10505; and

WHEREAS, the District's enabling legislation (Cal. Water sections 30292 et seq.) mandated that the directors be elected at large; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to be as responsive a body as possible to the needs of the water district it serves; and

WHEREAS, voter participation in the election process for Board members is of the utmost importance, and the Board desires to encourage the fullest voter participation in elections of Board members; and WHEREAS, the Board desires that its members represent the interests and wishes of all residents within the jurisdiction of the District, and that the community have confidence that the Board continues to represent the interests and wishes of the District; and

WHEREAS, while the Board has no information as to whether polarized voting exists in the District, the Board has elected to forego the process of obtaining demographic data to make that determination, and instead desires to change the electoral system for election to the District Board to a zone-based system from the current at-large system to ensure the fairest and most-inclusive electoral system; and

WHEREAS, it is the District's intention to establish five (5) zones which: are in compliance with one person, one vote requirements; are intended to ensure the opportunity of the District's minority groups with respect to their effective exercise of the electoral franchise; and, include consideration of topography, geography, cohesiveness, contiguity, integrity and compactness of territory, non-disturbance to existing precincts for purposes of implementation, as well as maintaining vital communities of interest; and

WHEREAS, in moving to zone elections, the District's Board desires to engage the community in the dialogue as to how the zones should be drawn and in what order they should elect new directors; and

WHEREAS, the Board intends to authorize legal counsel to retain a demographer to assist the District in drawing maps for zone-elections; and

WHEREAS, the District will hold several duly-noticed hearings throughout the District to hear from the community on questions of zone boundaries and the order of zone elections; and

WHEREAS, those in the District's service area, this County, the State of California, these United States, and the world now face a pandemic that has disrupted the public health, commerce, and lives of all people; and

WHEREAS, in March 12, 2020 and March 17, 2020 Emergency Orders, the Governor specifically recognized the impracticality of engaging in activities requiring public participation by allowing public entities to hold public meetings telephonically thereby relaxing some provisions of the Brown Act, and by suspending deadlines for those entities already engaged in the process of converting their systems for electing board or council members from at-large systems to district or zone-based systems; and

WHEREAS, the District must provide its information to the San Mateo County Department of Elections for the November 2020 election before June 1, 2020; and

WHEREAS, there is insufficient time for the District to meet the Department of Elections deadline given the need to schedule at least five (5) public hearings and the ongoing pandemic; and

WHEREAS, the United States is currently conducting a nationwide census, the results of which reportedly will be sent to states by July 31, 2021, although this deadline may be delayed by as a result of the ongoing pandemic; and

WHEREAS, in order to incorporate the census results into the decisions regarding establishment of zones and order of elections, the District intends to have its directors elected from the new zones beginning in November 2022; and

WHEREAS, three (3) Director positions are set to be on the ballot in November of 2022, and the remaining two (2) in November of 2024.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The Board hereby resolves and announces its intent to change the system of election of its Board of Directors from at-large to a zone-based system;
- 2. The District will hold at least two (2) public hearings in accordance with Cal. Elections Code section 10010 to discuss and seek public input on the proposed boundaries of the zones or in the zone-based system;
- 3. The District will utilize the services of a demographer to assist it in the drawing of zones for the new proposed zone-based system;
- 4. It is the District's intention to establish five (5) zones which: are in compliance with one person, one vote requirements; are intended to ensure the opportunity of the District's minority groups to exercise effectively the electoral franchise; and, include consideration of topography, geography, cohesiveness, contiguity, integrity and compactness of territory, non-disturbance to existing precincts for purposes of implementation, as well as maintaining vital communities of interest;
- 5. The District will draw one or more draft maps and publish at least the first draft map in accordance with Cal. Elections Code section 10010 before consideration at its first public hearing at which maps are considered;
- 6. Any revised draft map to be considered at a subsequent public hearing will be published in accordance with Cal. Elections Code section 10010 before the subsequent public hearing;
- 7. In any event, maps will be considered at a minimum of three (3) public hearings;
- 8. It is the District's intent to have its directors elected from the new zones beginning in November 2022;
- 9. In determining the final sequence of zone or district elections that is, which three (3) zones will be on the ballot in 2022 and which two (2) zones will be on the ballot in 2024, the District shall give special consideration to the purposes of the California Voting Rights Act Cal. Elections Code section 14025 et seq.;

- 10. The District intends to determine and set the new zones for election of members of its Board and set the final sequence of elections from those zones, as soon as practicable, but in time such that the first three (3) zones can elect Directors in November of 2022;
- 11. The date of the commencement of the public hearing process necessarily depends on the timing of the availability of the results of the U.S. census, but the District's intention is to commence said process as soon as the census data becomes available;
- 12. The District will complete its process ninety (90) days after it commences its process; and
- 13. The Board directs the General Manager to take all necessary steps to facilitate the implementation of zone boundaries for election of Directors to the District.

What is Redistricting

Definition

Redistricting is the process of adjusting district lines every 10 years after the release of the U.S. Census. The well-known examples are Congress and the legislature.

Within the U.S., redistricting has become an extremely politicized process and has been the subject of more high-profile Supreme Court decisions than any other part of our elections system.



Traditional Redistricting Principles

Preventing a Districting from Becoming a Gerrymander


There are a number of criteria that have been used nationally and upheld by courts.

- Relatively equal size people, not citizens
- Contiguous districts should not hop/jump
- Keep districts compact appearance/function
- Maintain "communities of interest"
- Follow city/county/local government lines




