

A HARVEST OF FAMILY GIFTS

THEME: Sharing the gifts that each one of us gives to ourselves, our

brothers and sisters, mom and dad. Recognizing the ministries

of every day family life.

SETTING: Parish hall/dining area. Potluck supper with tables decorated

with gifts of Family Life. (See Gifts)

OPENING PRAYER: Led by parent.

Creator of life, you gave us a family to live with, to love, to nurture us and encourage us. Help us to discover the gifts each of us has, so that we may share these talents with our family, friends and community. We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.

CELEBRATION: Families sit together and share supper. It would be appropriate to bring food that has been grown in family gardens

or made by family members. Favorite family recipes could be posted on dining room walls along with examples of family gifts. (i.e. Older children babysitting younger children, siblings coming to an agreement over a conflict, a ride to the park, mom/

dad watching their child's sport activity.)

AS A FAMILY: Try to think of gifts God has given each one of us to share as family. Take colored pens (on each table) draw a symbol

or word for family gifts on centerpiece. Share as a group your

family gifts.

GIFT: As a centerpiece and gift for each family (beforehand take medium size boxes and wrap in white paper. Place bows and

ribbon on boxes - leave plenty of room for family gift pictures,

symbols, words.)

WORK BEFOREHAND: Decorate parish hall with pictures of family life, posters, candles, etc. The recipe corner may be enhanced by including

paper/pencils for those who wish to make copies. The gift boxes (centerpieces) may be decorated any way you wish but remember to leave plenty of room for families to draw on the

boxes.

OTHER SUGGESTIONS: Perhaps a parent or member of parish staff could share a story about family gifts. Humorous or interesting

stories will allow other families to share what their family gifts are and family tales behind these "gifts". Example: Family member shares how much the whole family appreciates Dad for taking out the garbage every week - an often dirty job - but necessary! Thanking God for the smallness but beauty of

sharing little tasks around the house.





Lent provides a wonderful time for us to respond to the Lord's call, to open our hearts in response to any interior change the Lord may ask of us. It is a time of challenge, a time to take risks.

Sin is a reality. The more we sin, the less we love. It is a lack of love that affects others in society and affects us in our own personal lives. The less we love, the less we are for the other. Do we see how our lack of love keeps us from responding to the Lord's call?







Parish RENEW Coordinators and Committee Chairpersons are cordially invited to join the Archbishop, Vicar Bishops, their pastors and others to prayerfully begin our RENEW journey. We regret that due to space limitations at the Cathedral entire Parish RENEW Teams (i.e. Committee members) cannot be included.

Cathedral parking is limited. The Cathedral and Chancery parking lots as well as the Chancery Annex lot (328 W. 6th St.) are available. Other parking will be on the streets surrounding the Cathedral. Please car pool.

Pass It On

Back to School

RENEW curriculum from K thru 12th grade will be mailed out next week. Please pass it on to your director of education, school principal or both when it arrives.

PUBLICITY

Bulletin Covers and Inserts

In cooperation with liturgical Publications the RENEW office has offered every parish the service of bulletin covers and bulletin/flyer inserts sheets to use in a variety of ways. The samples have been mailed to the parish office. If you have not seen them ask to look at the samples then decide how you can use them to help you promote RENEW. Consider a RENEWS Letter to your parishioners or use the inserts to promote large group activities, take home materials your committee has designed or any other ideas you can come up with. Have you determined how the promotional items will be used in your parish? Remember other committees need to know what is available to their people (e.g., Small Group may want to have candles for their leaders to purchase).

A New Promotional

A 9 minute video on RENEW is available for purchase - Cost \$20.00. The video, produced by the Archdiocese Communication Office, includes brief comments, reflectoins and experiences. The video includes comments by a variety of people including Archbishop Roach. See the attached flyer for more information and details concerning purchase.

Ask for God's blessings as you help your parish understand RENEW.

We know you have been working hard organizing and recruiting Small Group Leaders. Please be sure that leaders have an overview of RENEW before training.

Many parishes report difficulty getting leaders for small groups. Remember a face-to-face invitation increases involvement 30%.

The imaging prayer of the gospel story of Martha and Mary is included for your training session II if you choose to use it. The prayer was led by Sr. Mary Zirbes and helped set the theme of reflection and hospitality in small faith sharing groups.



TAKE HOME

If you are considering having a lending library of books and music during the "Lords Call" ask your coordinators for the book list and music in the resource directory. Also, you might want to organize a bible sale with the Small Group Committee and maybe develop a simple guide to finding scripture. Lets not assume everyone has a good bible and can find their way around in it easily.

If you are going to distribute either the prayer leaflet and/or the take home booklet published by Paulist Press, these need to be ordered as soon as possible. They promise delivery by the end of September. If you use the booklet, keep in mind that you may need to do something creative each week to remind people and encourage its use.

Pray and share at all your meetings.




LARGE GROUP

If you scheduled a large group activity remember the importance of getting the date of this activity onto the parish calendar and into the hands of the Publicity Committee. Use Liturgical Publications offer to supply a bulletin insert with the weekly focus across the top. Ask to see the samples in the parish office. One version has room for parish activities and news.

We hope the Resource Directory will be helpful and we encourage you to use the Human Resource Directory being compiled by the Adult Education Center. Keep praying - it makes you smile!

P.S. The Harvest of Family Gifts, page 5 of the Resource Directory is an idea for a large group activity that includes families. Don't forget to include oneparent families as well as extended family members.



LITURGY

By now, we hope you have received the liturgy aid from Paulist Press. As you prepare for Season I, keep in mind that Sign-Up-Sunday and Prayer Network will need to meet with you to plan liturgies for their Sundays. We have included a liturgy suggestion for commissioning catechist and the RENEW Team. (Remember that in some parishes Sign-Up-Sunday and Catechetical Sunday are on the same day).

Have you received your liturgy material? Check with your pastor - it was mailed to the parish office or rectory.

Continue to pray as a committee.

SIGN-UP SUNDAY

Are you ready?

Sign-up Sunday is everyone's day to celebrate preparatory efforts to date and to invite the entire parish community to develop a closer relationship with Christ through the RENEW process. Encourage broad envolvement and ownership in planning and participating on that day by the entire Parish RENEW Team.

- * All RENEW Committees can be visible with the RENEW Tree or buttons and have a role.
- * Roles: greeters, readers, card distributors, card collectors, prayers of faithful, processional/recessional, banners carried, etc.
- * As a team, think through every role and who will carry out that role. All liturgy participants (e.g. priest, homiliests, liturgists, organists) can be invited in the planning of a "blue-print" for that day.
- * Consider the benfit of having a rehearsal everyone will have a clear understanding of their role. No surprises.
- * Liturgy committee can enhance the celebration through readings which invite the people to a commitment to community, prayer and involvement.
- * After sign-up cards are designed and printed, publicize the card so that people are familiar with it (two weeks before the Sign-up Sunday).
- * In Addition to publicity efforts through the bulletin and newsletters, consider the use of banners, signs, hand-outs, etc.

That Day

- * Arrive early
- * Make sure the facilities are prepared
- * Welcome all people assisting
- * Have roles listed out in writing

This includes:

- * Greeters
- * Banners, balloons
- * Posters, signs
- * Opening song
- * Opening prayer
- * Homily on the "The Lords Call"

- * Speaker explaining Small Groups and signing up
- * Identify those already signed-up
- * Cards distributed (or placed) in the pew
- * Time set aside for people to fill out card
- * Cards collected before or after \$ collection
- * Cards brought to the altar
- * Prayers of Faithful
- * Closing Prayer
- * Closing Song
- * Tables at each exit with information on RENEW
- * People assigned to tables to answer questions

The Liturgy

All aspects of the liturgy for that day should enhance the invitation to experience personal and parish renewal. On that day, from the time people arrive in the parking lot until they say good-bye, the atmosphere should be one of hospitality, invitation and prayerful celebration.



TELEPHONE

Telephone callers need an orientation to RENEW and a good understanding of what happens in a small group if they are going to invite people to be a part of a small group. It would be helpful to include an experience of a small group in their orientation. Callers need to role play both positive and negative responses to be comfortable with their task. Telephone training booklets are available from the RENEW Office. Stress personal prayer. develops a peaceful attitude.

HOME VISIT

Home visitors need an orientation to RENEW, role playing of positive and negative experiences and something to leave with the person they have called on. A prayer card and the Season I Bulletin Insert might be a suggestion. Home visits increase small group participation 30%. Home Visit training booklets are available. Good luck to your home visitors. They are evangelizers who really can make a difference.



PRAYER NETWORK

Prayer is the starting point and power of RENEW and all spiritual renewal. We are hearing many stories about prayer from people. Many people are making an effort to make prayer an important part of their daily lives. We're off to a prayerful start. Have your Protestant friends been asked to pray for our RENEW effort?

Your efforts should now be centered on Prayer Commitment Sunday. We have sold over 40,000 prayer cards to date. Does everyone have one in your parish? Two very good resources for prayer and prayer services can be found at St. Patricks Guild: Gathering Prayers and Prayer Services for Parish Meetings by Debra Hintz. If your committee is offering prayer service help to other committees these books (creatively illustrated) would help you out.



EVALUATION

One form of ongoing evaluation is to take an active part in team meetings. You are helpful to other committees by helping them set goals. As committees complete their tasks, i.e. Home Visit, Telephone, Sign-Up-Sunday, your committee can begin to wrap up Season I rather than wait until November. These committees can begin to evaluate their efforts while they are fresh in their minds.

RENEW PRESS CONFERNCE

Media representatives have been invited to attend a press conference with Archbishop Roach and RENEW Team members at 10:00 AM, September 17. Television, Metropolitan Newspapers, Catholic Bulletin, "Good Company", "Almanac" and John Gallos will have an opportunity to hear about and cover the big news of RENEW.



AROUND THE DIOCESE

Father Robert Kapoun, pastor of St. Scholastica, Heidelberg reports the Good News. St. Scholastica held an early Sign-Up-Sunday on August 30. This small rural parish from the Sourthern Vicariate counts 100 units. Sixty (60) people have signed up to share their faith journey. Thats 25% more than hoped for. We're praying for you.

Congratulations to St. Ritas, Cottage Grove a growing suburban parish in the East Vicariate who dedicated their new church on Sunday September 7. Archbishop John Roach celebreated the dedication and liturgy with St. Rita's parishioners God bless you as you continue your journey of faith in a new worship space and renewed dedication to Jesus in your hearts.

PAULIST PRESS - RETURN POLICY ON ALL RENEW MATERIALS

- We encourage buying of RENEW materials carefully and prudently.
 Overbuying is expensive both for the publisher and the customer.
- We recognize that, in some instances, overbuying will be unavoidable. Should this occur, we will accept and give full credit for returns which meet the following terms:
 - a) In returning materials, please send a copy of the related invoice with a note indicating what is being returned. This should be attached to the package of returned materials.
 - b) All materials must be received in resaleable condition. Shrink-wrapped products must be returned intact. Book covers must be in 100% condition. Material must be free from all marks such as official stamps.
 - c) All materials must be packaged carefully to prevent damage by the U.S. Post Office, UPS, etc.
 - d) Damaged or used materials will not be accepted for credit.
 - e) Cost of packaging and mailing of return materials will be the responsibility of the customer.

FOURTH: Take parish lists, both active and inactive, and

perhaps names surfaced by the pastoral staff. Prayer-

fully consider all as possibilities.

FIFTH: As you ponder these names, be on constant alert for

persons who have never been invited to participate, people who have recently experienced some conversion

or reconciliation.

SIXTH: Consider a broad base. RENEW committees should

represent an effort directed to the total parish.

SEVENTH: As you move to final selections, after prayerful

consideration, it will be a matter of judgment. Don't rule out any person, look prayerfully at each one. Remember the talents and qualities that you see as important for the RENEW tasks and match the person

to the task.

LOOK FOR ...

- + Prayerful persons, desirous of spiritual challenge
- + Good leadership qualities good relational qualities
- + Not over involved
- + Persons who have recently experienced some conversion, recently joined the Church, recently gone through reconciliation with the Church
- + Some organizational ability
- + Some "new" faces
- + A "mix" of parish (men, women, young, older, involved, noninvolved, divorced, single, married...) search out a broad based group, variety of interests
- + Some "old faithfuls"
- + Previously non-involved, perhaps never invited

PROJECTED PARISH EXPENSES

MATERIALS

Parish Materials

A complete set of RENEW materials costs \$100. It is recommended that larger parishes purchase two sets. In addition, it is recommended that two extra copies of the following be purchased (again, by larger parishes):

Leadership Books \$10		each
Overview Books	5.95	each
Liturgy Aids (set of 5)	24.75	each

Given these recommendations, the total cost of written materials (depending on parish size) for the entire period of RENEW would be \$150 to \$390.

Small Faith-Sharing Groups: Participants Expenses

Individual participants in the Small Groups are asked to pay for the cost of their own materials. The cost per person for the entire two and one-half year period of RENEW is \$5.00 to \$12.00 (\$1.00 to \$2.40 per season). This variance depends on the amount of optional material (e.g. Take-Home Booklets, Prayer Leaflets, etc.) you choose to utilize in your parish.

Optional Audiovisual Material

RENEW orientation filmstrips/audiotapes are \$125 per set. These sets are especially useful in the beginning stages of RENEW.

A Small Group Leader Training video-cassette is also available for \$49.50.

ADDITIONAL EXPENSES

Archdiocesan Assessment

Each participating parish is asked to contribute an annual assessment for the purpose of offsetting some - but not all - of the cost of RENEW to the Archdiocese. These funds will be used for such things as: training sessions for Parish Renew Team and small group leaders, written materials, archdiocesan publicity, printing costs, etc.

The requested assessment is as follows:

Variable Costs

Additional expenses are a function of parish size, number of small group participants and the promotional and other activities generated by the PARISH RENEW TEAM.

As a general rule of thumb, you can expect that about one-third of the adult members of your parish community will be involved in the small faith-sharing groups.

The following endeavors will generate additional expenses in the typical RENEW parish:

Printing (newsletters, bulletin inserts, brochures, posters, etc.)
Publicity
Postage and Mailings
Liturgy
Hospitality
Large Group Activities
Office Supplies

RENEW OVERNIGHTS

Three to four (or more) selected parish leaders come to an "overnight" presentation at which they learn a great deal about RENEW --- its purposes, theology, spirituality, methods and outcomes. They become the nucleus of the PARISH RENEW TEAM who go back to the parish and bring the leadership of the parish to a final decision on RENEW. If the decision is positive, they call forth and form the PARISH RENEW TEAM.

Cost per person for the RENEW OVERNIGHT is: \$60 single room 45 double room

A Final Note

Parishes which have completed RENEW have not cited expense as a negative factor. In fact, they uniformly say that it is well worth the money spent.



Lenten Renewal Reflection



Fourth Sunday of Lent March 9, 1986

READING I Joshua 5:9, 10-12

The Lord said to Joshua, "Today I have removed the reproach of Egypt from you."

While the Israelites were encamped at Gilgal on the plains of Jericho, they celebrated the Passover on the evening of the fourteenth of the month. On the day after the Passover they ate of the produce of the land in the form of unleavened cakes and parched grain. On that same day after the Passover on which they ate of the produce of the land, the manna ceased. No longer was there manna for the Israelites, who that year ate of the yield of the land of Canaan.

Reflection

The Land of Canaan, known as "the promised land," was a promise to Abraham; it became a hope for his children and a goal for their descendants, as they wandered in the desert for 40 years after escaping out of Egypt.

The first five books of the Bible, or the Pentateuch, take us up to the borders of that Promised Land, which Moses saw but never entered (Dt. 34:1-4). In the Book of

Joshua, the land finally becomes a possession.

Joshua was successful because he was faithful. He observed the commandments, and God saw to it that such fidelity was repaid. Giver and recipients had important roles to play before "the gift" could be kept. The land would become Israel's possession when they remembered that they were God's possession.

As our narrative begins, the Israelites have crossed the Jordan at Gilgal, close to Jericho. For the first time, they are standing on their own land. Once they have

occupied it and driven out the inhabitants, it will be theirs forever.

God has kept his promise, and the wanderings come to an end. When the journey started, the waters of the sea parted to let them out of Egypt. Now, at journey's end, the waters of the Jordan roll back, and they enter Canaan.

In their new home, they observe their first Passover. That term acquires new significance now, for they have passed over the Jordan. At this time of the year,

the river would have been swollen, more a sea than a river.

But they are, once again, safe on the other side of a body of water that was once an obstacle. The land stretches out before them, and that land is now to become theirs. As proof of this, they eat "unleavened cakes and parched grain" that the land has provided.

The manna that God once provided is no more. In its place is the nourishment that their own land can provide. Like the produce of the soil, they were becoming, "the

land's."

In Israel's historical development, the modern believer can find an analogous understanding of the sacraments, especially the eucharist. Like the manna, the eucharistic bread of life sustains the faithful on life's journey until the ultimate passover from life through death to fuller, everlasting life.

Personal Meditation Questions:

- 1. What does this passage teach us about a God who always welcomes us home?
- 2. How many times have we felt a sense of relief and uttered words such as, "Home at last!" or "There's no place like home!" Share with one another how you feel when you come home especially after a long journey.
- 3. Celebration of gratitude to God should mark all of the special moments of life. How can we as individuals and families better celebrate homecomings?
- 4. In what ways have you thought about the ultimate passover from life through death to fuller, everlasting life as a "coming home"?

The Laity's Call to Preach

Surprise! All Catholics are called to proclaim the Gospel all their life. How about you? What would it take for you to become a proclaimer of the Word of God?

OPENING IMAGE

once a month, four couples, all Catholics, all in their early 30s, meet in one of their homes for an evening together: cards, talk, Trivial Pursuit, and snacks. All made a Marriage Encounter weekend, and they thought meeting once a month was a good way to keep their marriages strong.

On one of these evenings, Joe, aged 31, got off on his regular tirade against the two priests in his parish and how horrible their Sunday sermons were. As usual he didn't stop there. Next came his criticism of their cars, their stereos and their golf habit.

Calmly, but strongly, Donna, one of the other members of the group, spoke up. "Joe, let's all be honest. We all have our cars and our stereos. I don't play golf, but I do go to aerobics class twice a week and you play racquet ball. And as for preaching the Gospel, I wonder if anybody on my street or where I work even knows I'm a Catholic.

Silence.

Donna went on. (It was quite a surprise, because she was always the quiet one of the group.) "Why should priests be the only ones who are supposed to live simply? Joe, you and Marie don't have any kids yet and you've been married six years now. I don't know why, but it sure makes winter trips to the Caribbean that much easier, and you said you were going to France next summer. Not bad. You have that nice video camera, and you brag about having two video recorders so you can edit out your shots. Not bad. Not bad."

Silence.

Donna continued—as everyone sat there nervous and stunned. "What about Jesus' words about how hard it is for the rich to get into the Kingdom—how it is like a camel trying to fit through the eye of a needle? Was he talking about us? I always remember that sentence Thomas More said to Richard Rich in the movie "A Man For All Seasons." Remember how Richard lied and perjured himself and was rewarded with Wales? And Thomas More said something like, "Richard, Jesus said, 'What does it profit a man if he gains the whole world and suffers the loss of his soul?' But for Wales, Richard, for Wales?"

After that there was more silence till someone broke the tension and said, "Well, we have to get home. We told the baby-sitter we would be back by 11:00." People started cleaning up the room and headed for home.

QUESTIONS FOR PRAYER AND DISCUSSION

- Do most people usually expect more of clergy and religious than they do of laypeople? If so, why? Do people put clergy and religious on pedestals because they need role models or because it allows them to demand less of themselves?
- Why are many laypeople hesitant to preach, to speak openly of their faith? What does the reluctance of many people to proclaim their faith reveal about what that faith means to them? Why are most people more eager to recommend a movie they enjoyed than a faith they believe will lead them to heaven?
- How much do feelings of inadequacy keep you from preaching the Gospel? Why would God leave to sinful human beings the task of spreading his goodness and truth? Is the work of spreading the news of salvation in good hands?
- How well does your parish proclaim the Gospel where you live? Does the rest of the community perceive you as a group dedicated to following Jesus, or do you blend in with the mainstream of society? How much should Christians stand out as a sign of contradiction in American society.

our weeks later at the group's next get-together, Joe, the man with the two VCRs spoke to Donna privately. "Donna, we appreciated your remarks last month. They really hit home. We couldn't sleep that night. Marie and I have thought over what you said, and we're finally talking about having a family again. I guess it takes all of us a long time to get our priorities straight. Thanks."

"Hey, Joe," Donna said, "I wasn't just talking to you. I was talking to myself as well. My husband, Tony, and I are still trying to get our act together too."

Donna proclaimed the Word of God—and was probably unaware that she had. All of us are called to wake up and do the same. "Go into the whole world and proclaim the good news to all creation" (Mark 16:15).

"Here I am, Lord. Send me!"

LL Christians are called to be prophets, preachers, proclaimers of the Word of God—to be evangelizers—not only in their homes, but also in the marketplace. This call of ALL Christians to proclaim the Gospel—the Good News of Jesus Christ—is one of the great UNPREACHED messages of the church.

PRACTICAL APPLICATIONS

s in humor and in telling a joke, timing is everything when it comes to preaching the Gospel. Telling a friend at the right time he or she is drinking too much or that an affair will destroy a marriage and hurt children is Gospel preaching. When was the last time any of us suggested prayer, faith, or going to church to someone we saw having a problem? When was the last time we had the courage to speak up in the defense of someone who was being torn down? If we are aware of our calling to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ, we will see opportunities to help our neighbor and we will say something at the right time.

"Lord, make me an instrument of your peace.
Where there is hatred, let me sow love;
Where there is injury, pardon;
Where there is doubt, faith;
Where there is despair, hope;
Where there is darkness, light;
and where there is sadness, joy."

Study that prayer of St. Francis and you'll see that one of the main ways of being an instrument of peace, love, pardon, faith, hope, light, and joy is to be present to another with a helping word. That's Gospel preaching.





SUMMARY OF SOCIAL MINISTRY CAUCUS

January 30, 1986

Thank you for your participation in the Social Ministry Caucus last Thursday evening. Your suggestions and ideas are summarized below.


- 1. There should be a correlation between global and local issues.
- We need more neighborhood involvement. We could have a neighborhood forum to discuss the needs of Social Ministry and perhaps do a needs assessment to determine what might develop to address concerns important in neighborhoods, especially in regard to local justice issues. These should be genuine input and carried out immediately.
- 3. The neighborhood representatives and the communicators need to become better acquainted, perhaps through invitations to their respective homes, so that the "comfort level" for working together is increased.
- 4. Develop a telephone tree for better communication.
- 5. Begin with the "safe" activities in Social Ministry before proceeding to involvement in the more controversial justice issues.
- 6. Involve Renew groups in a networking kind of process.
- 7. Develop neighborhood teams.
- 8. The parish should be a school of formation, and the whole parish should be involved in Social Ministry.
- 9. There is a need for support groups in the parish.
- 10. The neighborhood reps should consider a new project.
- 11. Recognize the volunteer work that people do. Reinforce a sense of self-esteem in volunteers by rewarding their contributions.
- 12. Initiate brainstorming session in neighborhood representatives' meeting.New Ideas should emerge out of this group, e.g., bring Christmas cheer to
 the hospitalized, or have a party for needy kids in the parish. A communication system should be developed. Also an awareness should be developed
 as to what reps are.
- 13. Restore neighborhood councils.
- 14. Develop programs based on input from parishioners.
- 15. When discussing controversial justice issues, respect diversity, and do not expect everyone to be at the same place.
- 16. Opportunities should be provided for experiential learning to connect the personal and the public e.g., get people involved in Loaves & Fishes (idea of working on a specific, initially non-controversial, project).

Third Sunday of Lent March 2, 1986

READING I Exodus 3:1-8, 13-15

Moses was tending the flock of his fatherin-law Jethro, the priest of Midian. Leading the
flock across the desert, he came to Horeb, the
mountain of God. There an angel of the Lord
appeared to him in fire flaming out of a bush. As
he looked on, he was surprised to see that the
bush, though on fire, was not consumed. So
Moses decided, "I must go over to look at this
remarkable sight, and see why the bush is not
burned."

When the Lord saw him coming over to look at it more closely, God called out to him from the bush, "Moses! Moses!" He answered, "Here I am." God said, "Come no nearer! Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place where you stand is holy ground. I am the God of your father," he continued, "the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, the God of Jacob." Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God. But the Lord said, "I have witnessed the affliction of my

people in Egypt and have heard their cry of complaint against their slave drivers, so I know well what they are suffering. Therefore I have come down to rescue them from the hands of the Egyptians and lead them out of that land into a good and spacious land, a land flowing with milk and honey."

"But," said Moses to God, "when I go to the Israelites and say to them, "The God of your fathers has sent me to you," if they ask me, "What is his name?" what am I to tell them?" God replied, "I am who am." Then he added, "This is what you shall tell the Israelites: I AM sent me to you."

God spoke further to Moses, "Thus shall you say to the Israelites: The Lord, the God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, the God of Jacob, has sent me to you.

"This is my name forever; this is my title for all generations."

Reflection

In the film 2001: A Space Odyssey, director Stanley Kubrick uses huge, black monoliths or slabs to indicate milestones in human history. In two eerie scenes, first an ape and then an astronaut reach out toward the monoliths as if trying to grasp the mystery of the objects, and, in turn, the mystery of their own futures.

The first reading today has that atmosphere of awe and mystery. A man fleeing his past reaches out toward burning shrubbery and discovers his future -- and much

more than that. He comes face to face with his God.

It is your privilege to read a classic of religious experience and a marvelous piece of literature. To read it well, enter in spirit into the overwhelming drama of the

reading. It is a dramatic story.

Continuing a pattern that began with Abraham, God intervenes once again in history through a human agent. Since no one can see God and live as they did before, Moses now begins a profound personal transformation, which will continue until his death. God called Moses by name, and revealed his own name to Moses. This revelation marks another step forward in God's self-revelation to his people. Now he is known by name. He is seen as a personal God, one who is very interested in people, in their troubles and their deliverance. Through Moses, Yahweh will continue to live, act, call forth, and save.

Personal Meditation Questions:

- 1. Through Moses God rescued his people from their suffering at the hands of the Egyptians. How does God respond to the sufferings of people in our own time?
- 2. The Exodus is a symbol of the Christian's journey. Temptations often turned the Israelites from their path. What temptations turn us as Christians aside from our journey to wholeness and holiness?
- 3. The God who is all things to all peoples has many names and faces. How do you image or name God?
- 4. Created in the image and likeness of a God who names himself, "I Am Who I Am", how do we name ourselves? In other words, who am I?

Reflection

There are some strange stories in our book. Today we have one of them the story of Abraham. A wonderful first line: "God took Abraham outside." That's how the stories about Abraham are told. That's how it got repeated generation to generation: long ago, in our father Abraham's time, God was right there to say, "Come on, Abraham, let's go outside and look at the stars." Then five animals are slain, three of them split in half and Abraham sleeps until dark (even though earlier in the story he was counting the stars!). This is making a covenant: you split the dead animals in half and pass between the halves. If either of us breaks this bargain, may it happen to that one as it happened to this goat.

Why on earth do we bother to tell such a story? It was an old tale already when Moses lived. That is perhaps part of what is to be treasured about all the Abraham stories: they were told in the slave quarters in Egypt, told hundreds of years later in the promised land, told in Babylon when Abraham's descendants were taken there captive, told after the return and during the years when Greeks and Romans lorded it over Israel. Soon thereafter they were being told not by one people but by two and then by three as Christians and Moslems took to themselves the Abraham stories.

So we have this ancestor honored on both sides of many battles, by Christian inquisitors and Jewish martyrs, by devout Arab Moslems and devout Jews. Now they have been told again in death camps of Nazi Germany, repeated in a reborn Israel, pondered by Christians in tiny communities in Latin America and Africa.

All have puzzled over Abraham and called him father, this wandering immigrant whom God liked to take outside to count stars. One thing we do in Lent is attend to our roots.

Personal Meditation Questions:

- 1. What do we learn about Abraham from this incident? What one virtue of Abraham stands out here? Do we think of this moment as part of our own history?
- 2. Have you ever had religious experiences? What were they like? What set them apart from your everyday experiences? For the Christian, is it possible to separate everyday experiences from religious experiences, or is everything a religious experience?
- 3. Have you ever had an experience that made you reform your life? What kind of experience was it one of fear, love, guilt, happiness, a brush with death? Did the reform take hold, or were you soon back to your old ways?





Second Sunday of Lent February 23, 1986




READING I Genesis 15:5-12, 17-18

God took Abram outside and said: "Look up at the sky and count the stars, if you can. Just so," he added, "shall your descendants be." Abram put his faith in the Lord, who credited it to him as an act of righteousness.

He then said to him, "I am the Lord who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans to give you this land as a possession." "O Lord God," he asked, "how am I to know that I shall possess it?" He answered him, "Bring me a three-year-old heifer, a three-year-old she-goat, a three-year-old ram, a turtledove, and a young pigeon." He brought him all these, split them in two, and placed each half opposite the other; but the birds he did not cut up. Birds of prey swooped down on the carcasses, but Abram stayed with them. As the sun was about to set, a trance fell upon Abram, and a deep, terrifying darkness enveloped him.

When the sun had set and it was dark, there appeared a smoking brazier and a flaming torch, which passed between those pieces. It was on that occasion that the Lord made a covenant with Abram, saying: "To your descendants I give this land from the Wadi of Egypt to the Great River [the Euphrates]."

Catholic Americans, like the majority of their fellow citizens, are a believing people in spite of our secularity. We continue to profess faith in a personal God, in Jesus Christ, and in the work of the Holy Spirit. The American Catholic continues to believe in life after death, in heaven and hell, and in prayer as a way of being in communion with God. In this respect, American Catholics are much like the Irish of both the South and North of Ireland; they too have retained their faith. On the other hand, fellow Catholics in the rest of Europe have considerably less faith in those realities that are explicitly supernatural: Study after study, comparing the United States with Western Europe, finds that people in the United States, and Catholics in particular remain people for whom God is important and religion is significant.

We would, nonetheless, be foolish to deny the significant problems we face in *living* according to that faith. Profession of faith is not the same as living the faith; it takes spirituality to turn the profession of faith into a life of faith. And spirituality is our challenge.

Loss of Spirituality

While people in the United States retain faith in God, that faith tends to be marginal, and increasingly so, to the rest of their lives. The Gallup organization, in particular, has found in its surveys that only one in ten Americans is strongly spiritual, that is, only 10 percent score high on a combination of those questions that ask how important religion is in one's life and how much of an impact it has on one's family and work. But we need not depend on public opinion measures to know that there is a seriously growing gap between faith and life. As a matter of fact, various other studies and personal experience give evidence that there is a considerable loosening of the connections between the two.

Church and parish life once embraced many realms of people's lives. Furthermore, American Catholics traditionally found the meaning of life in relation to their

family and neighborhood, rather than in the labor of their jobs. Today the church is less of a self-contained community; now a significant portion of American Catholics measure the success of their lives by their careers. The measure of spirituality is the extent to which it guides a person's understanding of the world and the extent to which it provides a basis for discipline in one's life. Thus, Christian spirituality is a matter of meaning and behavior. Belief, then, is not the characteristic American problem, but the scope of spirituality, the extent to which our understanding and behavior are guided by our belief, surely is.

am talking, of course, about the process of secularization. For secularization does not mean specifically the loss of faith, but the isolation of faith and religion from the rest of life. It signals the compartmentalization of life into various segments and the removal of religious norms from our everyday activities. In general, there is evidence of secularization not only in the limited extent to which Catholics' personal faith influences their public behavior, but in the ways in which the church itself measures its own performance.

The church in its social services and educational enterprise has largely adopted the criteria of performance belonging to academic and professional disciplines, . public opinion, or governmental bodies. Don't we measure the effectiveness of our hospitals primarily by the standards of the medical profession and by reimbursement guidelines? Hasn't there been a considerable shift in the measures by which we judge our schools, adopting values and curricula that allow them to compete according to the criteria established for public school achievement? Hasn't a considerable amount of the social ministry of the church, at both the parish and diocesan level, moved the church into housing and welfare projects that have little explicit relationship to the building up of the church community? There are many reasons for these shifts, not the least being funding that prohibits explicit connections between these services and the church community. These apparent

necessities notwithstanding, we have changed and been changed in ways not always faithful to our own priorities.

Secularization is not simply a process that has affected the culture "out there"; it is a process that has affected church culture as well. Thus, church efforts to address precisely our challenge of faith must be directed not so much at shoring up doctrine and orthodoxy, however important these may be, but at reestablishing the link between faith and life, or, as I have suggested above, at reconstructing Catholic spirituality.

Spirituality and Community

Spirituality depends on community. This is true theologically and sociologically, for we believe that God acts in and through the community of the church, and research findings make clear that living according to our faith depends on the support of a community. The work of Reverend Andrew Greeley and others indicates that support of one's spouse and family of origin, or of some other important community, is almost essential for active faith and participation in the church. Other studies further indicate that some communal support is necessary for maintaining a way of life that is distinct from that of the larger culture. Sociologist Peter Berger has described this as the establishment of a plausibility structure, that is, a way of thinking and acting, shared among a group of people, that enables people to maintain a minority position with confidence in the face of contrary cultural pressures.

If spirituality is a problem for us, it may well be partly because community has become a problem. To what extent has the Catholic community undergone erosion? How much do Catholic Americans retain a communal approach to their faith? To what extent have they adopted the individualist ethos of the American culture?

Considerable evidence suggests erosion of church community. Most obviously, we have lost about onethird of American Catholics from regular participation in the Sunday Eucharist. But in addition, many American Catholics have adopted a pick-and-choose attitude about church teaching, selectively adopting their own rules for personal and social behavior. Today's American Catholics clearly have a more voluntary approach than their parents to the way and degree they will participate in church life, whether this is a matter of church teaching, of parish membership, or of the level of participation in parish life. It has been a long time since we could assume that American Catholics would uncritically accept the teachings or the authority of the church, or demonstrate an unquestioning sense of loyalty and responsibility to the church community at any level, including the parish.

urthermore, we should note that preachers may be as selective as parishioners about church teaching. Some seem to avoid preaching on sexual ethics, while others avoid social ethics. In short, within church structures as well as outside of them, among parishioners and pastors, with regard to teaching and behavior, extensive evidence indicates that American Catholicism has acquired a less communal cast than it once had. Surely, many of those shared factors, such as immigrant status, low income, and discrimination, that fostered an intense community life have dwindled. Now, American Catholics have become part of other communities that have acquired significance for them, communities associated with their middle-class status and income level, with the neighborhoods in which they live, or with their vocational or avocational interests. The church is no longer needed as an enclosed, protective, and exclusive community.

What I am saying is not new: these movements and tendencies have been experienced by people at every level of the church for some years now. In fact, individual pastoral efforts, renewal programs, and actions taken by the leadership of the church are an attempt to counter these trends, to restore a greater sense of church community.

Making Choices

It has been my proposal that the great American Catholic challenge is the challenge of spirituality and that strong spirituality requires a strong community. Recognizing that Catholic community has undergone serious erosion, many in the church are trying to restore it. Different approaches are attempted. In parish after parish, diocese after diocese, actions are being taken to foster church community, actions that respectively reflect various approaches to community. In choosing one or another approach, we determine the shape of tomorrow's church. I am clearly urging one approach to community, that of solidarity, admittedly more elusive and demanding than the alternatives. For the alternatives, each in its own way, represent reductionism—a determination to minimize complexity and ambiguity. It is this more elusive and demanding approach that is more faithful to our tradition and pertinent to our situation. It calls for an adult church, where lay people, indeed all, are treated as adults. It is, I believe, in fact, a commitment to the principles of Vatican II that will ensure that we remain faithful to this project and persist in this fellowship.



PLANNING RENEW IN YOUR PARISH

"FROM THIS DAY FORWARD"!

Here you are, participants in a RENEW Overnight. You are no doubt full of questions regarding RENEW and the exact nature of your role in this process which is leading to a decision regarding the adoption of RENEW by your parish community.

Perhaps the best way to define that role is by listing the tasks that are yours:

- Your primary task is to use this OVERNIGHT to gain as much information about RENEW as you can. You will need this information to instruct others in your parish about RENEW's purposes, methods and outcomes.
- While you are here, you will have opportunities for prayer and reflection on ways in which the Holy Spirit is calling the Church and your parish to renewal. You will be asked to consider how RENEW could serve as a means to further that renewal.
- You and the other members of your parish who are here are the principal investigators of RENEW! As such you have been invited by Archbishop Roach to participate in this investigative process and to prayerfully consider how you will:
 - A. bring your parish community to a decision on RENEW
 AND/OR
 - B. how you will invite support and generate commitment to RENEW in your parish once a decision has been made.
 - C. Note calendar of timelines.

Should the decision on whether to adopt RENEW be a positive one, you will then serve as the "nucleus" of your PARISH RENEW TEAM. As such you will serve as the convenors and initiators of RENEW. The following tasks will be yours as you move the process along in your parish:

NOTES

A. Communication

- RENEW is based on and builds on prayer - you will need to ask your parish community to pray.
- You will communicate your experience of the Overnight and your personal commitment to RENEW with other parishioners (e.g. priests, staff, council, other parish organizations).
- 3. You will need to inform the larger parish community about RENEW. They will need to be convinced of the value and potential of the RENEW process. You will decide on the means and content of this communication utilizing the resources at your disposal (e.g. pulpit parish bulletin, newsletter, etc.).
- B. Schedule and Conduct Initial Parish Team-Building Meetings
 - Encourage individual and team prayer.
 The RENEW publication, "We Praise You
 O Lord", assists in making prayer and
 faith sharing an integral part of
 these meetings.
 - Select your RENEW PARISH TEAM Coordinator(s). (See handout: "Parish RENEW Committees" or RENEW publication: "The Leadership Book".)
 - Establish a calendar/schedule for future meetings -- dates and places.
 - Encourage and support one another.
 Share ideas, written materials, feelings, hope, enthusiasm.
 - Study the responsibilities of the PARISH RENEW TEAM Committees.
 - Begin to surface candidates (names) for PARISH RENEW TEAM leadership. Ask parish priests and staff people to assist in this process.
 - 7. Decide on a <u>method of inviting</u> people to participate in various leadership and committee roles. Decide who will do the inviting.

- Schedule a date for the first meeting of the PARISH RENEW TEAM.
- Choose your <u>Model</u> of PARISH RENEW TEAM Leadership (see suggested diagrams/models).
- Keep a journal (written records, photographs).

C. Selection of PARISH RENEW TEAM

 Team nucleus and coordinator(s) gather for prayer and discernment. Utilize names already surfaced and available parish lists of parishioners (refer to suggestions in forming the PARISH RENEW TEAM).

REMEMBER

- -- diversity
- -- include people who may not be active in existing parish groups/ organizations
- -- match the gifts and talents of the person to the task(s)
- -- the chairperson of each PARISH RENEW TEAM Committee will go to the Archdiocesan Training Sessions
- -- following this training, they will form and facilitate their own individual committees
- -- communicate the first meeting date of the PARISH RENEW TEAM.

D. First Meeting of the PARISH RENEW TEAM

- 1. Pray as a Team.
- Share the content/spirit of the RENEW OVERNIGHT.
- 3. Explain the RENEW process.
- 4. Share RENEW literature.
- Communicate the importance of teamwork to the success of RENEW.
- Communicate the importance of and the dates/locations of PARISH RENEW TEAM Training.

E. PARISH RENEW TEAM Training

- These sessions are held regionally (by deanery), are sponsored by the Archdiocesan RENEW Team for all members of PARISH RENEW TEAM(S).

III. The story of Rodrigo

Rodrigo is a Chicano man, now 45 years old, who grew up in a small city in the Western United States. His father was an alcoholic and family life was filled with physical abuse. The family lived in a degrading poverty, which remains etched in Rodrigo's memory. During his teen years, Rodrigo's behavior got him time in reformatories. He stayed in school only to the 8th grade. By the time he was 14 he was getting drunk with friends.

As Rodrigo looks back over his life today he does not have much success to point to. He sees a history of chronic alcoholism. When he was not serving time in prison, he was drinking heavily. His work experience has been sporadic at best. In the mid-1970's he began to get help for his alcoholism. There was a period when he was sober for 2 years, an important part of this being counseling and medication for depression. Since 1980 he has some periods of 2 or 3 months sober but has always returned to drinking. He gets to feeling unhappy with himself after a time trying to live without alcohol.

Over the last 3 months, Rodrigo has gone through a Chemical Dependency Treatment program, and has gone to live at a halfway house. He has begun to build a support system of sober people and wants to find a job that will use some vocational training he has had and which will give him some satisfactious financial stability. He would like to have a place of his own to live and hopes to have the opportunity to get married and find some stability in life. It is not easy for him to take the initiatives to achieve these goals, perhaps because he finds it difficult to believe in his potential, even through he knows he has a lot of good in him.

III. Historia de Rodrigo (Español)

Rodrigo, un chicano que ahora tiene 45 años, se crió en una ciudad pequeña en el oeste de los Estados Unidos. Su padre era alcohólico y en la vida familiar hubo mucha violencia. Vivían en la extrema pobreza, la cual es todavía un recuerdo vivo para él. En su juventud, Rodrigo pasó algún tiempo en albergues de menores por su delincuencia. Llegó nada más hasta el octavo grado en la escuela. A los 14 años comenzó a emborracharse con los amigos.

Hoy, mirando atrás sobre su vida, Rodrigo encuentra que ha tenido muy pocos éxitos. Mas bien ve una historia de alcoholismo crónico. Cuando no estaba en la prisión, tomaba recio. Su historia de empleos ha sido muy esporádica. A la mitad de la década de los 70, por primera vez recibió ayuda para su alcoholismo. Hubo un período en el que estuvo sóbrio por 2 años, recibió ayuda psiquiátrica y tomó pastillas para su depresión. Desde 1980 ha tenido algunas épocas de 2 o 3 meses en que ha dejado de tomar pero siempre ha vuelto a recaer. Parece que no se siente bien consigo mismo después de un tiempo sin tomar.

Durante los últimos 3 meses, Rodrigo ha pasado por un programa de ayuda para la dependencia química, y ahora vive en un centro de recuperación. Ha comenzado a reconstruir una red de apoyo de personas sóbrias y quiere hallar un trabajo donde pueda utilizar el entrenamiento vocacional que recibió de joven. Piensa en un futuro en que pueda tener su propia casa y una esposa; una vida, en fin, que no sería tan inestable como la del pasado. Sin embargo, no encuentra fácil el tomar las iniciativas para lograr estas metas. Quizás es porque tiene que luchar para creer en su propio potencial, aunque se da cuenta de que hay muchas cosas buenas en él.

PENTAGON IMPORTS KOREAN FETUSES FOR NEUTRON BOMB TESTS

While the Department of Health, Education and Welfare is busy trying to cut off access to abortions for poor women in the United States, another department of the US government has plunged into the fetus import business in a big way. During a recent visit to Tokyo, Deputy Secretary-General of the United Nations Sean

McBride announced that the Pentagon has so far imported 45,000 human fetuses from South Korea for the purpose of testing the effects of the neutron bomb on fresh human tissue.

"I gather that corpses are not fresh enough for this function," McBride said, adding that while he didn't know yet who was profiting from the macabre trade he could see it developing into a regular industry. McBride said that his attention was first drawn to the situation by a small paragraph in the Washington Post. "It was me ly an official denial of an earlier report, which had suggested that some of the fetuses were alive," he said.

A visiting executive of the South

A visiting executive of the South Korean Red Cross, which administers 23 hospitals, privately confirmed the report, but cautioned that an investigation within Korean President Park Chung Hee's authoritarian state would be "quite impossible."

To Sterilize Millions

The United States is seeking to provide the means by which one quarter of the fertile women in the world can be sterilized, the director of the Federal Government's Office of Population said here yesterday.

As many as 100,000,000 women around the world might be sterilized if U.S. goals are met, Dr. R. T. Ravenholt, the

director, said.

One of the programs that the U.S. is using in trying to reach this goal, Dr. Ravenholt said, is a federally financed training program for foreign doctors at Washington University Medical School. The main purpose of the program is to train doctors in "advanced fertility management techniques," including sterilization, Dr. Ravenholt said.

Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore also participates in the program, called PIEGO (Program for International Education in Gynecology and Obstetrics).

Dr. Ravenholt made his remarks during an interview at the Chase-Park Plaza Hotel. He was in St. Louis to attend the annual meeting of the Population Association of America.

Dr. Ravenholt listed four reasons, (including the protection of U.S. economic Linterests, why the U.S. should lead world

population control efforts.

First, he said, a decline in the growth rate in poor countries will increase those nations's standard of living. "Resources divided by population equals well being," Dr. Ravenholt. "We're trying to lower the denominator in that equation."

Second, the U.S. has a "moral responsibility to take leadership" because it was largely American medical advances which created the population explosion by lowering the world's death rate. "We will be in a reprehensible position unless we help these poor countries balance their births and deaths," he said.

Third, population control is needed to maintain "the normal operation of U.S. commercial interests around the world."

Without our trying to help these countries with their economic and social development, the world would rebel against the strong U.S. commercial presence," he said. "The self-interest thing is a compelling element."

Fourth, continuation of the population explosion would result in such terrible socio-economic condition abroad that revolutions would result. These revolutions could be harmful to the U.S., Dr.

Ravenholt, suggested.

Dr. Ravenholt made his comments about sterilizing one quarter of the world's fertile women in the following context. Where sterilization services are readily available, about one quarter of the fertile women who are living with men tend to take advantage of them. He cited the U.S. and India as countries

where this pattern has been noted.
If sterilization services were made readily available world-wide, he said, then about one quarter of the world's approximately 570,000,000 fertile women living with men would accept sterilization, he suggested.

Dr. Ravenholt expressed concern about criticism leveled at PIEGO during the last year by a small group of Washington University students, faculty and staff members. The group has attacked PIEGO on political grounds and has called for Washington University to its involvement in the program.

Among the critics are: Garland Allen, associate professor of biology; Miriam Golomb, a post-doctoral fellow in biochemistry, and Andrew Goodman, a second year medical student.

The critics have contended that the best way to improve the standard of living in poor countries is to promote economic development and a more equitable division of resources.

In fact, the critics say, there would be no overpopulation problem if food and resources were distributed more equally. The critics say that Cuba was considered "overpopulated" until the Castro revolution there; then the economy was reorganized and more workers - more people were needed.

The critics say they don't oppose

sterilization, but that they think it should not be spearheaded by the U.S. for reasons of U.S. self-interest.

The true motive of the U.S. program, they contend, is to protect the status quo and forestall revolutions which promote socio-economic equality.

Dr. Ravenholt called the critics "a really radical extremist group lashing out at a responsible program." He said he thought the critics wanted to see the world situation deteriorate further "so that revolution will occur."

However, Dr. Ravenholt gave credence to one of the arguments made by the critics — that PIEGO is basically a training program in female sterilization.

Washington University officials have denied this. Last year, Dr. Arpad I. Csapo, co-director of the PIEGO program here, told the Post-Dispatch that the study of sterilization was only a minor part of the program. Dr. William H. Danforth, chancellor of the university, characterized the program as a broad brush-up course in newer gynecologicalobstetrical techniques.

Asked directly if female sterilization training was the main goal of the program, Dr. Ravenholt said that the main purpose was to train doctors in "advance techniques of fertility management," and went on to say that "surgical sterilization has become increasingly important in recent years" as one of those techniques.

PIEGO is one of several programs sponsored by the U.S. Office of Population to control growth abroad, Dr. Ravenholt said. The Office of Population is part of the U.S. Agency for International Development (AID), an arm of the Department of State.

About 30 countries have bilateral agreements with the U.S. Government to provide population control programs, Dr. Ravenholt said. "This is our preferred route," he commented.

In some countries, however, "political ensitivity" makes it impossible for the U.S. to negotiate such agreements. In

those cases, he said, efforts are made to set up population programs under the aegis of other organizations, such as the United Nations Fund for Population Activities) and the International Planned Parenthood Federation Both groups receive heavy U.S. funding, he said.

In countries where there is opposition to U.S. involvement in population affairs, the opposition generally comes from leftist or religious elements or both, Dr. Ravenholt said.

In the six years since PIEGO was created, Dr. Ravenholt said, more than 500 doctors from about 60 countries have been trained. He said the program operates on a yearly budget of up to

Dr. James C. Warren, co-director of the PIEGO program at Washington University, recently told the Post-Dispatch that about 70 foreign doctors are being trained at the university this year. Altogether, more than 200 students have been enrolled here since 1973, he said.

Critics of the program have documents which they say show that PIEGO will have paid Washington University \$2,666,-797 for its services by the end of 1977.

Dr. Ravenholt acknowledged yesterday that some of the doctors trained in PIEGO come from nations like Chile and Iran where human rights mean little, and where forced sterilizations were a theoretical possibility. He said that Indian doctors had been trained in the program, but that most of the forced sterilizations that recently took place there had been performed on men, a form of sterilization not taught in PIE-

He added that PIEGO strongly emphasizes that the sterlizations should be voluntary. "This doesn't provide an absolute guarantee that someone won't abuse the purpose," he conceded.

Critics of the program say they are worried about the threat of forced sterilizations in many of the countries from which PIEGO participants come.

1.2. Doctrinal Reflection

Jesus evangelizes the poor. As the pope has told us, the evangelical commitment of the Church, like that of Christ, should be a commitment to those most in need (Luke 4:18–21; OAP:III,3). Hence the Church must look to Christ when it wants to find out what its evangelizing activity should be like. The Son of God demonstrated the grandeur of this commitment when he became a human being. For he identified himself with human beings by becoming one of them. He established solidarity with them and took up the situation in which they find themselves—in his birth and in his life, and particularly in his passion and death where poverty found its maximum expression (Phil. 2:5–8; LG:8; EN:30; Med-JU:1,3).

For this reason alone, the poor merit preferential attention, whatever may be the moral or personal situation in which they find themselves. Made in the image and likeness of God (Gen. 1:26–28) to be his children, this image is dimmed and even defiled. That is why God takes on their defense and loves them (Matt. 5:45; James 2:5). That is why the poor are the first ones to whom Jesus' mission is directed (Luke 4:18–21), and why the evangelization of the poor is the supreme sign and proof of his mission (Luke 7:21–23).

1.2. Reflexión Doctrinal Jesús evangeliza a los pobres

El Hijo de Dios demostró la grandeza de ese compromiso al hacerse hombre, pues se identificó con los hombres haciéndose uno de ellos, solidario con ellos y asumiendo la situación en que se encuentran, en su nacimiento, en su vida y, sobre todo, en su pasión y muerte donde llegó a la máxima expresión de la pobreza 1.

Por esta sola razón, los pobres merecen una atención preferencial, cualquiera que sea la situación moral o personal en que se encuentren. Hechos a imagen y semejanza de Dios ² para ser sus hijos, esta imagen está ensombrecida y aun escarnecida. Por eso Dios toma su defensa y los ama ³. Es así como los pobres son los primeros destinatarios de la misión ⁴ y su evangelización es por excelencia señal y prueba de la misión de Jesús ⁵.

Dear Irene:

When we trained the Hispanic RENEW Team there was considerable discussion about reaching the Hispanic Community in the Archdiocese. Guadalupe parish relates primarily to the community in West St. Paul. A second concentration is around Ascension Parish in North Minneapolis and Holy Rosary in South Minneapolis. All the other Hispanics seem to be scattered throughout the Twin Cities. For that reason and because there is need for personal contact and affirming outreach the most significant first step for RENEW with the Hispanic Community seems to be visitation of Hispanics in their homes.

Visitation implies transportation and time. In discussion we affirmed the need for one, two or three people to be hired for a period of 3-6 months or more to make the contacts and invite people into the RENEW process. Volunteers who visit may need mileage paid.

At this time I want to encourage you again to make every effort with out-reach to the Hispanic Community so that RENEW can be a reality for them as much as for the other people of the Archdiocese.

If I can be of any further assistance please know that I am ready to do so (291-4469).







I. Felipe's Story (English)

Felipe was 32 years old when the opportunity presented itself to emigrate from Cuba to the United States. Because he had been unwilling to be drafted for fear of being sent to Angola, and on one occasion had gotten into a scuffle with police who were arresting him, he was seen as "dangerous" and was forced to spend several years in prison. Prisoners were offered a chance to join the "Freedom Flotilla". For Felipe it was a way getting our of Cuba, reaching out for a promise and a hope of a better life.

Upon arriving in the United States he was sent to Wisconsin. Six months in Fort Chaffee did not dampen his spirits. However; slowly, anger and loneliness began to build up. Separation from parents and brothers and sisters was difficult, especially since there was little hope of ever being reunited. Language presented what seemed like an insurmountable barrier. Jobs available were at minimum wage and were always the hardest work. Some experiences could only be interpreted as discrimination. This was not unexpected after the publicity which the Mariel refugees had received. Alcohol became an easy friend, but one with a dark side. While drinking it was easier for the anger to come out in agressive acts and Felipe was arrested for an assault. Only after a number of incidents did Felipe accept admission to an alcoholism treatment program, which has enabled him to begin to find different ways to deal with his anger and relate more openly with Rita, the American woman who has lived with him for over 2 years.

Old behaviors are not gone from Felipe's life: agressivity, closing up inside himself and an occasional slip into drinking. At present he is, however, a little better able to believe in a new life here, a little more willing to open himself to the help offered to him.

I. La historia de Felipe (Español)

Felipe tenía 32 años cuando por fin surgió la oportunidad de venir a los Estados Unidos. En Cuba su situación estaba difícil porque se había negado a inscribirse en el servicio militar, pensando que lo podrían mandar para Angola. Esto causó que lo encarcelaran por varios años, y que le consideraran como persona "peligrosa". A los presos se les ofreció la oportunidad de entrar en le "Freedom Flotilla". Para Felipe fue la manera de alcanzar una promesa de Libertad, de poder encontrar una vida mejor.

Los seis meses en Fort Chaffee no le quitaron los ánimos. Pero comenzó a sentir la decepción y la soledad. La separación de sus padres y sus hermanos era difícil y mas porque le quedaba poca esperanza de que pudiera verlos en el futuro. El idioma le parecía una barrera insuperable. Los trabajos que podía conseguir eran a sueldo mínimo y los más duros. Además tuvo experiencias que sólo se podrían interpretar como una discriminación, cosa que no nos sorprendía del todo, después de la publicidad negativa que acompañaba a los pasajeros del Mariel. El alcohol hizo presa de Felipe y fue para él un amigo fácil pero dañino. Mientras tomaba, estaba más propenso a soltar el enojo que tenía adentro en actos agresivos: En algunas oportunidades fué detenido por conducta desordenada o por un asalto. Fue entoncés que pasó por un programa para el alcoholismo, el cual le ha ayudado a manejar algo mejor su enojo. También le ayudó a relacionarse más abiertamente con Rita, una Americana que ha sido su compañera por más de 2 años.

Ciertos comportamientos viejos no han desaparecido de la vida de Felipe: La agresividad, el encerramiento en sí mismo, una recaída en tomar de vez en cuando, todavía resurgen. Sin embargo, él ahora es más capaz de creer en comenzar una vida nueva aquí en los Estados Unidos y está un poco más dispuesto a abrirse a la ayuda que se le brinde.







Coordinators

Looking ahead to Season II, some words of advice. Don't let meetings, paperwork, etc. be an obstacle. Emphasize relationships, prayer, and spiritual growth. Feedback we have received indicates teams that met often with quality prayer time experienced harmony, light heartedness had fewer organizational problems. Let the Holy Spirit renew...remember..."Ask and you shall receive."

Please inform the RENEW office of changes or additions on your parish team roster.

Set up a schedule of regularly held RENEW Team meetings in preparation for Season II.

Talk regularly with your committee chairpersons.

Don't be afraid to ask your pastor for his support.

Pray daily for your own renewal and that of the parish.



Home Visit

In cooperation with several ministries of the Archdiocese dealing with people who are disabled (deaf, blind, mentally handicapped, mobility impaired), we are preparing a manual for RENEW Home Visitors to help raise awareness of the special needs of the handicapped and to offer suggestions to help you feel at ease during your visit.

Do you know your work for the Lord really makes a difference. Great goodwill is created by reaching out to parishioners in a very personal way. Warm and friendly visits say we want to know them better. Your committee is extremely important if the parish is really serious about evangelizing; reaching out to the lonely, sick, home bound, breaved, alienated, etc.

Telephone

A complete telemarketing manual, "How to Get Appointments by Telephone" is available from George Kirscht, the man who presented the telphone workshop for RENEW last April. Address: PO Box 4057, Hopkins, MN 55343 (935-1635) - Cost: \$14.00 post paid.

Consider setting up a recorded phone message for RENEW. Included might be a different spiritual explanation of the theme Our Response to the Lord each day. Also RENEW news, i.e., Large Group Activities, a daily prayer, the scripture of the day etc. Let the home bound of your parish experience RENEW this way.

Don't forget to call people who asked to be called another time. Pray always.

Sign-up Sunday

You did a great job!!!

Sign-up Sunday at St. Paul's in Zumbrota was typical of many parishes. It was exciting!! Helium filled RENEW ballons, RENEW pencils for all to sign-up with, banners and welcome buttons: Every family received a scotch pine - some delivered by Home Visit people. The RENEW Bulletin insert was mailed to each home. Each small group is identified by the name of a tree.

All of this planning and hard work helped St. Paul's and many other parishes sign-up over 50% of their community members.

Be sure parishioners understand they must sign-up again for Season II either on Sign-up Sunday or in their small groups through their Season I leader. Don't assume group members from Season I understand this. They may think this is not necessary.

Sign-up Sunday Season II February 8, 1987

Phone calls to those who haven't re-signed should prove to be effective.

To encourage new people to sign-up and to affirm those who have already re-signed consider asking those who have resigned to stand up after the homily on Sign-up Sunday. An effective witness to the value of faith sharing in small groups.

Prayer Nework

The Network is growing thanks to you, and does it work!!

Consider working with the Large Group Activity Committee and sponsor a Prayer Symposium for Season II. Four different speakers might be invited to present explanations of Ignation, Charismatic, Poustina and Franciscan prayer attitudes. Watch for ideas for Prayer Commitment Sunday at the January orientation.

NOTE: Prayer Committment Sunday comes the week BEFORE Sign-up Sunday.



Evaluation

By now you have more than likely collected evaluations from the committee chairs and have compiled a parish evaluation.

Many parishes have used the results to update censes files, identify active and inactive parishioners and to begin to identify and develop outreach needs. Some parishes asked the telephone committee to do random telephone surveys of RENEW's impact. This is another excellent example of personal contact with parishioners.

Are you planning a parish RENEW Team evaluation session to share ideas about how to work together better - REMEMBER you have the overall picture of your parishes RENEW activities. Pray together as a committee.



Take Home

Several parishes have been very creative with Take Home material. Some have shared it with us. If you would like to share yours we would be happy to have it.

We plan to have a group of people put together an idea packet for Season II. It will be avilable at the January orientation sessions. Your creativity would be welcome.

We encourage you to be aware and personally in touch with every committee chair. You already know that publicity is the key to promoting the combined efforts of the entire teams. There is no end to the creative approach and positive attitudes used throughout the diocese.

The Catholic Bulletin is interested in your stories...community activities as well as personal stories of spiritual growth. If you want to include pictures use black and white film. Send us your stories and encourage people in your parish to write to us about their spiritual journey.

The Season II Bulletin Insert included in this mailing is available for order. Cost: \$3.50 per hundred. Please use it. Also consider this; have a RENEW booth to sell promotional items, a coffee and donuts after masses, donate a portion of the proceedes to area foodshelves as an action response.

Do a publicity wrap-up of Season I for your parish bulletin or newsletter. We have a new 17 X 22 poster for Season II available. The design and color is an enlargement of the Bulletin Insert front page. Cost: sixty cents each.

Consider writing a letter of invitation to every alienated catholic in your area.

Liturgy

Liturgy materials will be mailed to your parish office - attention Liturgy Chairperson. Because many parishes failed to receive the liturgy aids. Marianna is sending a new listing to Paulist Press. We hope this helps to service you better.

A note to RENEW parishes doing RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults), an adult catechumenate for the unchurched. Rev. Tom Caroluzza published a helpful phamplet "RENEW AND THE RCIA." This short work answers some fundamental questions on the integration of these two renewal strategies. It's available through our office. Also, liturgy committees doing both are encouraged to share ideas for RCIA rites and RENEW.

Small Group



Have you experienced the Joy that comes from laboring for the Lord? We pray you have. We do not have complete statistics of the small group participation to share with you at this time. To date, 123 parishes have reported 37,031 people are in Small Groups. 61 parishes have not let us know their numbers. Could we hear from you?

Many parishes saw value in bringing Small Group Leaders together for sharing faith and support of each other. Many groups have let us know what they need and want for Season II. We have those needs in mind as we plan for the February orientation sessions. Thanks for being generous with your evaluations and comments, we want to hear from you. If you were caught short with too few prepared leaders, plan now to recruit more people. Also plan to order sharing options as soon as possible (by December 15). Order form included in this mailing.

You will notice Season II options each contain Scripture references, however each option has a slightly different format.

We plan to add Scripture commentaries, sharing questions and a simple prayer format as manual supplements for Season II - to be distributed at the February orientations.

Season II involves one evening of orientation for Small Group Leaders.

Vicariate Support Committee

In order to more effectively serve the 183 RENEW parish teams, the Archdiocesan Team has divided some of its tasks and responsibilities along vicariate lines. Bev Quintavalle will be working with the Eastern Vicariate, Marge McInerny in the West and Sister Mary Zirbes in the South.

To increase their effectiveness and provide for more frequent contacts and assistance to RENEW parishes, a <u>Vicariate Support Committee</u> is also being formed in each vicariate.

Members will be assigned a specific number of parishes to contact on a regular basis. Their task will be to serve a valuable liaison function between the RENEW Office and individual parish teams. They will regularly touch base with their parish contacts, gather information and, upon request, arrange for assistance and/or consultation with the Archdiocesan Team. They will also assist the Team in setting up and conducting deanery meetings and orientation sessions. They will prove to be valuable helpers in the areas of assessment and evaluation.

The Vicariate Support Committees will also serve more long-range purposes. They will meet periodically with their Bishop Vicar. Together they will consider ways to promote and foster the goals of RENEW as well as how they might be of service to the leadership and other people involved in RENEW. They will be one of many groups who will be looking beyond RENEW and how we might build upon what has begun through RENEW. They will be busy!
