CENTRO LEGAL, INC Program Review Summary

I. GUIDELINES/CONCERNS:

The agency mission has not been updated since 1985. It needs to be reexamined in light of changes taking place in the agency.

Except for the Community Education program, the target population is well defined, problem statements are specific, and services are not available in any significant manner elsewhere, especially for family cases. Measures of results are in place for two programs and the client evaluation survey, which is sent at the close of the case, has been redesigned.

The number of clients has increased. Word of mouth and community education may be generating more clients than are manageable. Greater utilization of computer resources makes it possible to obtain better information.

The Community Education program contains no measurable results and appears, because of the expanded use of radio and cable TV promotion, to generate organizational recognition as much as providing legal community education.

The current director has taken significant steps to improve management and is acting on the recommendations of an independent study done by a management consultant. The agency is making an honest and substantial effort to turn things around, but we need to monitor to see that financial controls are adequate and in place.

The Neighborhood Justice Center fills an important niche in the provision of legal services to the minority community. By virtue of their staff composition they are innately sensitive to the needs of their clients. They are able to gain the respect and trust of their clients because of their cultural sensitivity-a fundamental prerequisite to ensure competent and able representation.

Members of the minority community facing criminal charges feel vulnerable and are often wary of the system. For this reason, the public defender system often fails to meet their particular needs.

The Neighborhood Justice Center has earned a well deserved reputation for quality legal representation, and their attorneys are respected by the private bar, clients, and the judges in Ramsey County.

The Neighborhood Justice Center has consistently cooperated with our agency to provide assistance, whenever possible, to our clients. We have found their attorneys and paralegals to be committed, conscientious and consistently helpful.

Although our agencies fulfill different roles, we are all committed to improving the judicial system's response to minority and low income clients. Centro Legal is pleased, once again, to extend its full support to the continued work of the Neighborhood Justice Center.

As follow-up to your allocations letter, I feel it is important to share with you the comments, recommendations and observations that came out of this year's review process.

The New Funding Committee wants to be assured that the funding provided by the St. Paul United Way is for the St. Paul office, and urges that the objectives for 1986 reflect clearly what results can be expected in St. Paul as a consequence of the funding.

United Way funds will be disbursed on a 1/12th basis on the 15th of each month. Before the first disbursement can be made, the United Way must have a copy of the agency's 501(c)(3) IRS status letter. If a new position is to be created, the United Way should be informed of the date of employment, the salary, and the details of the job description.

Other documents that will be needed are:

Agency By-Laws; Personnel Policies; Affirmative Action Plan; Roster of 1986 agency board members and their business affiliation; 1986 board meeting minutes; and 1986 quarterly financial reports.

United Way staff will be in touch with the agency's executive director after the first of the year to respond to any questions and follow-up on any of the comments.

The future of human services in the Saint Paul Area is being shaped by accelerating changes in the community's needs, by shifts in traditional sources of funding, by changes in what donors value and expect, and by increasing competition for already scarce dollars.

In response to these conditions, the United Way of the Saint Paul Area's Strategic Plan calls for a funding system that places increased emphasis on directing resources to address community needs and effective community problem solving efforts. This system, known as our Targeted Funding process, moves the United Way from an approach of funding agencies and programs to a system that is based on the goals and results of specific services. The foundation of the system rests on defining the most effective use of United Way resources in order to achieve specific and targeted goals. This innovative strategy was formulated through input from donors, agencies and United Way volunteers. As we begin to enter the second year of operating within Targeted Funding, we are continuing to tailor this system to reflect community need and constituency desires.

The United Way funding process is volunteer-driven, with over 250 people involved in the planning and funding stages. As a volunteer, I feel it is important for leaders of funded agencies to dialogue with United Way volunteers about Targeted Funding and the changes it may produce. To accomplish this goal, we are inviting volunteers and staff from each agency to join us in an information and dialogue session. Each meeting will be limited to representatives from 3 to 4 agencies. Hopefully, we will have the opportunity to meet with board members from each agency by October, 1990.

You, as Chief Volunteer Officer, and another board member, along with your Chief Professional Officer are invited to join us in one of our first meetings. This will provide you with an opportunity to discuss Targeted Funding and ask questions about the United Way and its role in our community.



As follow-up to your allocations letter, I feel it is important to share with you the comments, recommendations and observations that came out of this year's review process.

As the United Way moves to program funding, agencies will need to define more specifically the program(s) for which they are requesting funds. The agency's presentation to the Review Committee focused on the need for funding for immigration services. The program proposal objectives and data should be organized and presented to reflect this. It may be desirable to define services in two or more programs. The agency should work with the United Way staff on this.

As you know the United Way was unable to meet the agency's funding request. The volunteer liaisons will be following up on what effect the allocation has on the number of clients served. Finally, the agency needs to identify the ethnicity of the primary client, that is, the person for whom service is actually provided, not the person who contacts the agency on behalf of someone else.

United Way staff will be in touch with the agency's executive director after the first of the year to respond to any questions and follow-up on any of the comments.

Agencies seeking new or continued funding through the United Way must comply with or agree to the following 10 conditions.

1. Be Incorporated, Not-for-Profit and I.R.S. Tax Exempt

Agencies receiving United Way dollars must be not-for-profit organizations that have been declared tax exempt by the Internal Revenue Service and have a 501(c)(3) status. In addition, each agency must annually submit a properly signed "Affidavit of Compliance" with the charitable regulations of the State of Minnesota.

2. Offer Health or Human Service Programs in Targeted Areas

The Emphases Statement of the United Way of the Saint Paul Area.provides guidance about program result areas and special focus programs to which it will target its funds.

3. Provide Community Service Based on Documented Need(s)

The agency/program request should be based upon an identifiable current need, demand, or problem in the community within United Way target and service areas. Services which are supported by United Way dollars should be clearly defined and their impact documented by the organization applying for or receiving funds. Services should be targeted toward an identifiable population and/or geographic locale within the east metropolitan service area of the United Way.

4. Be Non-Discriminatory

Discrimination by race, creed, color, sex, age, or religion is prohibited. Each organization receiving United Way dollars must have an up-to-date non-discrimination policy.

5. Have Active, Rotating Volunteer Leadership that Represents Diverse Elements of the Community

The agency's board of directors or governing body should consist of volunteers who participate in the policy-making processes, represent the diverse elements of the community, periodically rotate off the board on a planned basis and meet, at least, quarterly. Members of the volunteer governance structure should not receive financial remuneration from the program(s) or service(s) they oversee.

6. Have Sound Financial and Program Management

It is critical for United Way support that there is demonstrated ability to manage the programs and services in accordance with generally accepted accounting procedures, e.g., American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA) Guide. The organization must provide copies of its annual audit on an accrual basis using an independent certified public accountant or accounting firm.

7. Agree to Support and Cooperate with the United Way

The relationship between the United Way and agencies should be one of partnership. This partnership revolves around cooperative efforts in fund raising, community problem solving, communications, and fund distribution.

8. Agree to Provide Timely Financial and Program Information

Agencies share the responsibility of being accountable to the community for the expenditure of voluntary dollars. Periodic and timely reporting of financial and program data to the United Way concerning operating costs, revenues, reserves, and service statistics will help to assure credibility with the contributing public.

9. Agree to Inform the United Way about Major Expansion or Reduction in Program, Services, Facilities, or Staff

In order to effectively support programs in targeted areas, the United Way needs to be notified of any major expansion or reduction of programs or services. Discussion or negotiation on how to best manage such major changes is highly desirable but the United Way should not be expected to assume any financial responsibility for those changes.

10. Agree to Obtain Prior Approval from the United Way before Engaging in Supplemental Voluntary Fund Raising Support

Efforts by agencies to develop voluntary sources of revenue should be carried out in such a manner as to assure that:

- The United Way giving base in the community will not be adversely affected:
- Agency financing efforts are consistent with mutually agreed upon policies between the United Way and the agency; and
- The United Way is fully informed and supports, in advance, major financing efforts undertaken by the agency.

As follow-up to your allocations letter, I feel it is important to share with you the comments, recommendations and observations that came out of this year's review process.

As the United Way moves to program funding, agencies will need to define more specifically the program(s) for which they are requesting funds. The agency's presentation to the Review Committee focused on the need for funding for immigration services. The program proposal objectives and data should be organized and presented to reflect this. It may be desirable to define services in two or more programs. The agency should work with the United Way staff on this.

As you know the United Way was unable to meet the agency's funding request. The volunteer liaisons will be following up on what effect the allocation has on the number of clients served. Finally, the agency needs to identify the ethnicity of the primary client, that is, the person for whom service is actually provided, not the person who contacts the agency on behalf of someone else.

United Way staff will be in touch with the agency's executive director after the first of the year to respond to any questions and follow-up on any of the comments.

Agency/Program Review Summary

I. Guidelines/Concerns:

Last year's panel wished to be assured that United Way funding is for the St. Paul office. Client data, as provided for the three county area show a total of 480 clients in 1986 while 1985 (pre-United Way funding) reports show 344 clients. There is an additional professional staff reported in 1986 as opposed to 1985.

The panel also requested that objectives clearly reflect the results that can be expected in St. Paul as a consequence of funding. The liaison believes that the agency still needs to formulate more clearly its objectives, performance measures, quality factors and program assessment. The 1985 audit has not been received.

Liaisons current concerns are as follows:

Agency is on provisional status. What is its unique service? What are its management controls?

Continued funding and expansion of client services. Minimal targeting.

Liaisons make the following comments regarding the guidelines:

 $\overline{\text{Board}}$: Good representation, actively involved, especially in actual administration, decision making and planning. May need to delegate more.

Long Range Planning and Mission: Not clear that there is a formal mission statement. Planning is done, but it could be more systematic. Develop a Southeast Asian representative program. Encourage pro-bono assistance from Immigration Lawyers Association and preventative legal counseling.

Staff Policies: Board is conducting a thorough review of policies. Need to establish accountability criteria. Well trained staff. Great responsibility at all levels. Performance appraisal yet to be discussed.

Facilities and Resources: Good location - accessible and appropriate. Space is too limited. Tight budget limits availability of supplies.

Marketing and Outreach: Much is accomplished for the target population by the location, but non-English speaking, especially immigrants, could be targeted more. Could do more community outreach.

<u>Data Management</u>: Case closing sheet collects basic statistical data on each client. Considering different reporting requirements of various funders.

Agency Evaluation: Informally through board review and client feedback. It would not be possible to provide license or certification by an independent evaluator.

Dear Ms. Gomez-Bethke:

As follow-up to your allocations letter, I feel it is important to share with you the comments, recommendations and observations that came out of this year's review process.

As the United Way moves to program funding, agencies will need to define more specifically the program(s) for which they are requesting funds. The agency's presentation to the Review Committee focused on the need for funding for immigration services. The program proposal objectives and data should be organized and presented to reflect this. It may be desirable to define services in two or more programs. The agency should work with the United Way staff on this.

As you know the United Way was unable to meet the agency's funding request. The volunteer liaisons will be following up on what effect the allocation has on the number of clients served. Finally, the agency needs to identify the ethnicity of the primary client, that is, the person for whom service is actually provided, not the person who contacts the agency on behalf of someone else.

United Way staff will be in touch with the agency's executive director after the first of the year to respond to any questions and follow-up on any of the comments.
