

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RE: Television and Us

"Although Hispanic Americans may be well on their way to becoming the nation's largest minority, they remain oddly invisible on television prime time. Occasionally Latinos pop out in weekly series as a jiving junkie or as a comedy stereotype with a funny accent, but they are generally excluded from being the centerpieces of sitcoms, action-adventures and television movies. When they are allowed to step forward, the initial shock of recognition can be somewhat jolting."

Such were the opening lines of a review written by John J. O'connor, principal TV reviewer for The New York Times on Monday, April 14, 1986. The show he was reviewing was the PBS WNET/Channel 13's American Playhouse presentation of The House of Ramón Iglesias by José Rivera. Similar past pronouncements offered on the same subject have fallen on deaf ears. Perhaps because they were being made by those of us dedicated to opening doors for Hispanics in the entertainment industry, or possibly, because no one wanted to listen. I guess that's why I found it interesting and encouraging that a reviewer of Mr. O'Connor's stature should make such a public observation.

For years, the television industry has behaved as though Hispanics are not a part of the television viewing audience; yet it is the number one source of entertainment for this community. For years, the television industry has ignored the vast number of talented Hispanics who can write, film, direct, and perform diverse roles; yet, except for those bit parts described in Mr. O'Connor's review, Hispanic artists have not been meaningful participants in the medium. And, for some time, the entertainment field has failed to acknowledge that we represent a substantial component of the citizenry of this country, and as such are a part (or trying to be) of every facet of life in the United States that should be reflected in the images portrayed through the visual medium. We have stories to tell, experiences to share, and examples to set that are important not just to our respective communities, but to the non-Hispanic population as well

What is even sadder is that Spanish-language television does not offer an alternative either to the Hispanic viewing public or to the local artists and writers. Spanish-language television doles out a steady diet of soap operas from Latin America plus a few variety shows. Practically no Spanish-language programs are made in the U.S. Public affairs and news programs leave much to be desired. It seems that for Hispanics, television is a wasteland of much vaster dimensions.

I hope many people in the television industry read Mr. O'Connor's review and that it may lead to a new awareness of the Hispanic community. Congratulations are also in order to American Playhouse. I would also offer the challenge that, in addition to Ramón Iglesias', there are many more "houses" with a story to tell.

Arts-in-Education

ALL THE ARTS FOR ALL THE CHILDREN IN COMMUNITY SCHOOL DISTRICT 6

"When I grow up I want to be a dancer. My teacher formed a student dance company in our school." "My favorite artist is Vincent Van Gogh. I saw his paintings at the Metropolitan Museum." "Yevtushenko came all the way to P.S. 115 from the Soviet Union and worked with us on our poetry! We read his, too."

All over District 6 children are excited about creating and studying the arts which have long been a crucial part of every school's curriculum. This is the fourteenth year that we are active participants in the city and the state Arts in Education Networks. District 6 is unique in having a districtwide Arts in Education Steering Committee which meets monthly to formulate policy and coordinate arts activities. And what exciting arts activities there are!

Children work with many artists-inresidence in their schools in a variety of programs which include musicians from Young Audiences, artists from the Association of Hispanic Arts, actors and musicians from Lincoln Center Institute, poets and writers from Teachers and Writers Collaborative, muralists and playwrights from LEAP, and historians and musicians from Symphony Space. Professionals from the Metropolitan Opera Company train teachers and work with them as their students create and produce original operas. Dancers from the National Dance Institute work with students weekly - indeed, Jacques d'Amboise himself often instructs — as they prepare for "The Event of the Year" at Felt Forum with over 1,000 children from all part of New York. Enthusiastic support for these programs is given by Loyda R. Alfalla, Community Superintendent.

District 6 has received a highly-competitive grant, for the third year in a row, from Arts Partners — a special program funded jointly by the New York City Board of Education, the New York City Youth Bureau, and the New York City Department of Cultural Affairs, to purchase services from eligible arts agencies. The program has the following three components for intermediate school chidlren:

1. Talented Students in visual and performing arts are attending after school and Saturday master classes at the Harlem School of the Arts, conducted by professional artists to prepare them for entrance competitions to specialized arts high schools

2. Bilingual students are studying works of past and present Hispanic poets and

writers with poets from New York State Poets in Schools. They are writing and reciting their own poetry as well. This year, parents of students in the program also have the opportunity to write and recite poetry under the guidance of the professional poets.

3. Students with acting-out classroom behavior problems are attending specially-designed arts workshops with artists from the Children's Art Carnival to enhance their self-image, creative talents and areas of success. They are researching, writing, acting in, producing, showing and evaluating video films this year.

Every school in the district has visual and performing arts teachers as part of their regular curriculum program and an Arts Committee which meets to promote school arts needs. The quality of arts instruction is high. Choruses perform throughout the city, dancers give concerts, poets have their works published in an annual anthology, and visual artists show paintings, drawings, and photographs at the annual spring art exhibit at Gallery 12.

Arts teachers also plan with teachers in other curriculm areas so that the arts are integrated with communication arts, social studies, and science, for example.

In the summer, the children participate in the District 6 Reading Through the Arts Program. They read medieval literature, study medieval society, make medieval costumes and felt banners, write original plays, choreograph medieval dances, and

make giant puppets. The program culminates in the Medieval Festival in Fort Tryon Park in September, where our children perform for the community.

District 6 has strong ties with the community. Parents can participate in poetry writing and recitation workshops just as their children do. Talented parents will have their own art exhibit at Community Gallery 12 in May.

On May 15th and 16th, District 6 will host its fourth annual Arts Celebration. Children, teachers, administrators and the community will view visual and performing arts, participate in hands-on activities and be stimulated by new ideas for future inclusion into individual school arts programs. All of the schools in the district will contribute their examplary exhibits and performances to Celebration'86.

The excitement generated by the arts has inspired students from kindergarten through eighth grade, their teachers, parents, and administrators. Children are developing thinking and problem-solving skills, along with aesthetic and artistic disciplines. Vocabulary is being increased and talented children are preparing for specialized arts high schools. The arts are not only "in" education in District 6, they "are" education.

CHICANO GRAPHICS AT INTAR

Gráfica and Urban Iconography, the second exhibit of the series "Chicano Expressions: A New View in American Art" will open at INTAR Latin American Gallery on May 12th. The Chicano Expressions series is the first comprehensive exhibition of Mexican-American visual art in the Northeast. The current exhibit offers a wideranging selection of Chicano graphic arts. Tomás Ybarra-Fausto, curator of the show, writes about the new directions in this field:

"A new generation of graphic artists with different political perspectives, more specialized art training and energetic new cultural models is emerging. Drawing on accumulated experience, poster-producing groups have embarked on creative new training and both educational and marketing programs. While utility and information are still goals, these are now united to a heightened commitment to artistic experimentation and excellence. The multiple edition print is now privileged over the poster. Current Chicano graphics — based in internationalism and eclecticism — stress a new subject matter drawing upon iconographic elements from urban youth cultures."

In discussing "Urban Iconography", he says that: "The style, stance, and visual discourse of marginal groups within the Chicano community, while seeping into Chicano art forms, remain apart as a fracture and challenge. Urban iconography melds customs, symbols and daily practices of youth sub-cultures in the metropolis. *Plaqueasos* (wall graffitti), tatoos, customizing of *ranflas* (lowrider cars), gang regalia, *pinto* (prison) art, the self-presentation of cholos and countless other expressive forms evoke and embody a contemporary barrio sensibility. It is a sense of being that is defiant, proud and rooted in resistance.


"Proclaiming vibrant, syncretic cultural formations and practices, urban iconography reflects emergent aesthetic paradigms. It is a gesture, a signal towards an innovative visual discourse. These are clearly forms of Chicano art that will continue to enhance our understanding, engage our senses and ignite our imagination."

On Monday, May 12th at 6 pm INTAR Latin American Gallery will hold a "Symposia on Mexican American Art", with a distinguished panel of critics. A fully-illustrated catalog of the exhibit is available for sale.

\$\$\$ FOR STAGED READINGS

The New York State Council on the Arts' Literary Program has awarded \$53,300 for the first time to support staged readings to 26 theatre companies throughout the State.

The primary focus of this new category is to assist theatres in their efforts to develop new plays. Staged readings with professional actors enable playwrights and theatre companies to get a feel for how a script sounds off the printed page. Working closely with playwrights in an unpressured environment both before and after the plays are read, these theatres offer the time and resources necessary for the writing and subsequent revision of unproduced plays. Very often this can lead to the completion of a script that will receive a production at the original sponsoring theatre or at another interested theatre.

These awards, in most cases, will either allow the theatres to continue their financially endangered reading programs or expand upon existing ones. Grants range from \$1,000 to \$4,000.

Hispanic theatre companies receiving this grant were: Teatro DUO Theatre, INTAR and the Puerto Rican Traveling Theatre.

Support in this category will be offered again in 1986-87. Nonprofit organizations interested in applying for support for staged readings should contact the NYSCA Literature Program at 212-614-2964.
