MINNESOTA .. HISPANIC-AMERICAN DEMOCRATS

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Minnesota Hispanic-American Democrats, hereinafter referred to as MHAD.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

The purpose for which MHAD is formed shall be to enhance the political opportunities of the Hispanic-American community in the local, state and national Democratic parties.

ARTICLE III - POLICIES

The governing body of this organization shall be its State Central Committee. The State Central Committee shall be responsible for all policy decisions between meetings of the state general membership.

ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1

Membership in MHAD will be open to all Hispanic-Americans interested in the objectives of MHAD and who are registered democrats.

Section 2

A membership fee of \$5.00 must be paid in full each year so that the member may be in good standing with full voting privileges.

ARTICLE V - ELECTIONS AND VOTING

Section 1

Elections for State officers shall be held once a year at the state convention.

Section 2

Elections for Congressional Chapter officers shall be held once a year at least 15 days prior to the state convention.

ARTICLE V - ELECTIONS AND VOTING (Cont.)

Section 3

Delegates to the national convention of MHAD shall be elected by the members of the congressional chapters at the state convention.

Section 4

A simple majority vote is required for all measures to pass.

Section 5

There shall be no proxy vote in general membership meetings or at the state conventions, but proxy votes shall be valid at State Central Committee meetings.

ARTICLE VI - STATE CENTRAL COMMITTEE

Section 1

The State Central Committee shall consist of delegates who are elected from each congressional committee in the following manner:

Each congressional chapter shall be entitled to elect one delegate,

Section 2

10 delegates at large shall be elected to the State Central Committee at the annual state convention.

Section 3

The State Central Committee shall have the responsibility of acting on behalf of MHAD during periods between state conventions.

Section 4

In case of a vacancy on the State Central Committee, a new member must be elected within forty (40) days of the vacancy by the congressional chapter from which she-he was elected. If the vacancy is by a delegate at large she-he will be elected by the State Central Committee.

ARTICLE VI - STATE CENTRAL COMMITTEE / cont.

Section 5

The governing body of the State Central Committee shall be the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consist of all the state officers and all chairpersons of standing committees.

ARTICLE VII - STATE OFFICERS

Section 1

The officers of MHAD shall consist of a Chairperson, a Vice-Chairperson, a Treasurer, and a Secretary.

Section 2

Term of office shall be for one year from date of election. No MNAD member may serve for more than four terms in the same office.

Section 3

The Chairperson shall preside at all meetings of HAD. She/He will report to the State Central Committee on a periodic basis. She/He shall be the organizations chief executive officer. She/He shall also perform other such duties as assigned to him by the State Central Committee. The Chairperson may also take action on behalf of MHAD when the State Central Committee is not in session, if she/he obtains the concurrence of the Vice-Chairperson and one other member of the State Central Committee.

Section 4

In the absence of the Chairperson, the Vice-Chairperson shall exercise all duties and powers of the Chairperson. The Vice-Chairperson may also perform other such duties as assigned to him/her by the State Central Committee.

Section 5

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and collect all monies due to MHAD and deposit the funds at a bank chosen by the State Central Committee. The Treasurer is authorized to disburse funds of MHAD in the manner prescribed by the State Central Committee. She/He shall also maintain detailed records of MHAD funds and transactions.

ARTICLE VII - STATE OFFICERS (Cont.)

Section 6

The secretary shall keep a correct record of all MHAD meetings and shall send out notices of official meetings. She-He shall also conduct such correspondence as the Chairperson shall direct and shall also maintain membership records.

ARTICLE VIII - CONGRESSIONAL CHAPTERS

Section 1

Congressional chapters may be organized for the purpose of promoting the objectives and facilitating the activities of MHAD. Every congressional district which meets the minimum requirements, shall be entitled to one MHAD Chapter.

Section 2

Participation in the congressional committees shall be open to all Hispanic-Americans who are registered Democrats.

Section 3

It shall be the responsibility of the HAD State Central Committee to charter congressional chapters, which shall not be granted unless the participation of thirty (30) or more Hispanic-Americans is maintained in a congressional chapter.

Section 4

The membership of each congressional chapter shall elect one delegate for every 25,000 Hispanic-Americans residing in its congressional district to the State Central Committee.

Section 5

The governing body of each congressional chapter shall be an Executive Committee. Officers of the Executive Committees shall be a Chairperson, a Vice Chairperson, and a Secretary-Treasurer. They will be elected for one year term.

Section 6

Congressional chapters are authorized to adopt rules as long as they do not conflict with the Bylaws of MHAD.

ARTICLE IX - AMENDMENTS TO THE BY-LAWS AND IMPEACHMENTS

Section 1

The State Central Committee may remove a member of JHAD for willful violation of the By-Laws or for official misconduct.

Section 2

A two-thirds (2/3) vote shall be necessary to amend the By-Laws or for impeachment of a member.

Section 3

If the State Central Committee acts under Article IX, it must submit a written report explaining its actions at the next state convention.

AKTICLE X - AUTHORITY

Where not specified in these By-Laws, Roberts Rules Order (Revised) Shall Govern.

ARTICLE XI - MEETINGS AND STATE CONVENTION

Section 1

There shall be three State Central Committee meetings per year.

Section 2

Congressional chapters shall meet at least six times per year.

Section 3

Quorum for the State Central Committee meetings shall be set at 20% of members, and quorum for congressional chapters shall be set at fifteen (15) members.

Section 4

There shall be an annual convention of MHAD at a time and place designated by the State Central Committee.

Section 5

A convention committee shall establish the rules governing the procedures. Voting at the convention shall be conducted by congressional chapters.

ARTICLE XII - STANDING COMMITTEES

Section 1

The State Central Committee Chairperson shall appoint the Chairperson of each standing committee from members of the State Central Committe.

Section 2

Committee on Finance shall have the duty of preparing the organizations annual budget and shall supervise all fund raising activities.

Section 3

Committee on Credentials shall have the duty of evaluating the applications of the congressional chapters and to inform the State Central Committee whether the congressional chapter met the requirements.

Section 4

Committee on Voter Education and Registration shall have the duty to develop, promote and implement an on-going voter education and registration program.

Section 5

Committee on Special Projects shall have the duty of planning and implementing any activity assigned to it by the State Central Committee.

Section 6

Committee on political issues shall have the duty to research, develop and report to the State Central Committee on political issues of interest.

Section 7 _

Committee on Communication/Liaison shall maintain an active communication with the newspaper, radio, and television media to ensure optimum dissemination of .HAD activities and accomplishments. It shall also maintain close liaison with other political, labor, and community organizations.

Section 8

Special Ad Noc Committees shall be formed by the State Central Committee, for specific purposes, as the need arises.

ARTICLE XIII - ENDORSEMENTS

Section 1

The MHAD State Central Committee can endorse candidates for Presidential, U.S. Senate and state-wide office by a majority vote of the State Central Committee.

Section 2

Congressional chapters can endorse candidates for local office by a majority vote of the congressional chapter.

ARTICLE XIV - STATE OFFICE

The office of HAD shall be located in the City of Minneapolis State of MINNESOTA. The office shall be under the general supervision of the State Central Committee.

ARTICLE XV - STATE STAFF

The State Central Committee shall have the power to hire an Executive Director for the office. Other staff persons may be hired at the descretion of the Executive Director.

MINNESOTA HISPANIC-AMERICAN DEMOCRATS

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Minnesota Hispanic-American Democrats, hereinafter referred to as MHAD.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

The purpose for which HAD is formed shall be to enhance the political opportunities of the Hispanic-American community in the local, state and national Democratic parties.

ARTICLE III - POLICIES

The governing body of this organization shall be its State Central Committee. The State Central Committee shall be responsible for all policy decisions between meetings of the state general membership.

ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1

Membership in HAD will be open to all Hispanic-Americans interested in the objectives of MHAD and who are registered democrats.

Section 2

A membership fee of \$, must be paid in full each year so that the member may be in good standing with full voting privileges. \$5 each will be distributed to the local, state and national chapters.

ARTICLE V - ELECTIONS AND VOTING

Section 1

Elections for State officers shall be held once a year at the state convention.

Section 2

Elections for Congressional Chapter officers shall be held once a year at least 15 days prior to the state convention.

ARTICLE V - ELECTIONS AND VOTING (Cont.)

Section 3

Delegates to the national convention of MHAD shall be elected by the members of the congressional chapters at the state convention.

Section 4

A simple majority vote is required for all measures to pass.

Section 5

There shall be no proxy vote in general membership meetings or at the state conventions, but proxy votes shall be valid at State Central Committee meetings.

ARTICLE VI - STATE CENTRAL COMMITTEE

Section 1

The State Central Committee shall consist of delegates who are elected from each congressional committee in the following manner:

Each congressional chapter shall be entitled to elect one delegate for every -five thousand Hispanic-Americans residing within its congressional district. In addition, each chapter shall be entitled to one bonus delegate for every 25 chapter members beyond 50.

Section 2

10 delegates at large shall be elected to the State Central Committee at the annual state convention.

Section 3

The State Central Committee shall have the responsibility of acting on behalf of MHAD during periods between state conventions.

Section 4

In case of a vacancy on the State Central Committee, a new member must be elected within forty (40) days of the vacancy by the congressional chapter from which she-he was elected. If the vacancy is by a delegate at large she-he will be elected by the State Central Committee.

ARTICLE VI - STATE CENTRAL COMMITTEE / cont.

Section 5

The governing body of the State Central Committee shall be the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consist of all the state officers and all chairpersons of standing committees.

ARTICLE VII - STATE OFFICERS

Section 1

The officers of M.HAD shall consist of a Chairperson, a Vice-Chairperson, a Treasurer, and a Secretary.

Section 2

Term of office shall be for one year from date of election. No M NAD member may serve for more than four terms in the same office.

Section 3



Dear Mr. President:

The Hispanic population of the United States represents an estimated 20 million people, most of whom rely on the broadcast media for information and entertainment, particularly on the Spanish language broadcast media in the United States. Currently, Spanish media is experiencing tremendous growth, partly due to the increasing sophistication of Hispanic broadcasters and entrepreneurs and due in part to such FCC policies as the "tax certificates" and "distress sale". However, there are still great strides to be made and we should not become complacent in our efforts to increase Hispanic participation in broadcasting.

The policy and regulations formulated by the FCC affect Hispanics just as they affect the overall population of the United States. Moreover, there are unique regulatory issues that principally concern Hispanics and Spanish broadcasting which are of lesser consequence to the general public. Yet there is no one to personally provide the Hispanic perspective at the highest decision-making level of the FCC: among the Commissioners themselves.

Today Hispanics are underrepresented in every level of the FCC hierarchy, accounting for approximately 1% of the FCC workforce. A Hispanic Commissioner would not only benefit the FCC by providing Hispanic input to the FCC's decision-making process, he would also enhance the agency's ability to attract Hispanics and generally increase Hispanic participation in broadcasting.

We are not suggesting that a "token" Hispanic be named as FCC Commissioner. A token Hispanic appointment would not be in the best interest of broadcasting or in the best interest



Enclosed are two items for your immediate attention:

- 1. DEMOCRATIC COMPLIANCE REVIEW -- As we discussed at our last meeting with Elaine Kamarck from the DNC, challenges to state affirmative action and delegate selection plans for the national convention are now being accepted by the Compliance Review Commission. If you believe you have a legitimate complaint with your state's delegate plan, please review the enclosed procedures carefully and file an official challenge as outlined in the document. If you have any questions on any aspects of these procedures, please contact Ms. Kamarck at the DNC office, 202-797-5900. She is more than willing to assist us in our efforts. I would also appreciate being kept apprised of any challenges that are filed so that we may assist (if needed) from our office.
- 2. FCC APPOINTMENT -- It is essential that we keep the heat on the White House for an Hispanic appointment to the Federal Communications Commission. We need to keep the pressure on if we are to secure this important position. The enclosed reprint from Broadcasting magazine details the latest developments. I urge you to send letters and mailgrams directly to the President requesting an Hispanic appointment. I also suggest that you call Arnie Miller, assistant director for presidential personnel, directly at the White House at 202-456-2995. And as we agreed at our last meeting, because there are several qualified Hispanics for this position, we are not backing any individual candidate. We all need to pull together on this appointment. Please send me copies of your letters.

As we enter the primary season, we need to start compiling names of Hispanic delegates from each of the states. Please gather these names from your state as they are selected and submit them to our office.

Additional follow-up reports from our last Executive Committee meeting will be mailed within the next two weeks. Please feel free to call if I can be of any assistance.




I am writing you to request your support in an effort to establish a local chapter of the Minnesota Hispanic American Democrats of the Congressional District. It is important that we Hispanic Pemocrats organize politically, and this can only happen with your support and attendance at two meetings scheduled in August.

Last fall we attempted to organize MHAD and many of you assisted. Unfortunately, we failed because we couldn't meet for a second time in sufficient numbers. We need your commitment to establish a functioning organizational structure and my analysis is that we can succeed in two well attended meetings.

A group of Hispanics have been working since November to urge the appointment of Hispanics to the Perpich Administration. I feel that this organized effort has been relatively successful, and that we can clearly see the benefits of good political organization to promote the Hispanic. My other feeling is that since in Minnesota we are not numerically strong, we can only be politically effective by political organization. SMALL BUSINESSES (with less than 50 employees or gross sales of less than \$4 million) will receive special considerations in the administrative rule-making process. These considerations include less stringent compliance and deadlines

THE AUTO LEMON LAW provides that if a new but defective vehicle cannot be repaired after four or more tries during its warranty period, or if it is out of service for 30 or more business days during that time, the owner is entitled to a refund or replacement.

UNEMPLOYED JOB SEEKERS will receive reducedrate bus passes to be used while seeking employment during off-peak weekday hours. The passes will be available through - June 30, 1985

DRUNK DRIVERS AND HIT-AND-RUN DRIVERS

now face stiffer penalties. Drunk drivers can be prosecuted for the felony of being "drunk and negligent" if they cause death or injury on the highway. This new charge (punishable by up to three years in jail and a \$3,000 fine) will be much easier to prove than the present gross negligence charge. Hit-and-run drivers will be faced with a felony charge, also, instead of the present misdemeanor if they kill someone or cause great bodily injury and then leave the scene

REFUSAL TO TAKE A BLOOD ALCOHOL TEST to determine blood alcohol content may now be introduced

as evidence during drunk driving trials.

THE EDUCATION FINANCE BILL provides more than \$2 billion in aid to state secondary and elementary schools over the next biennium. The per pupil spending allowance increases to \$1475 for both school years. The local effort remains at 24 mills.

SCHOOL DISCIPLINE POLICIES must be adopted by school districts prior to the 1984-85 school year. The policies must be written and include rules of conduct for students in class and on school grounds, and procedures for removing students from class. Local school boards will develop policies with assistance from administrators, teachers, students and parents.

THE 2% MANDATORY STATE EMPLOYEE PAY

CUT, intended to help balance the budget, will be lifted by July 1983. Consequently, state employees will only be experiencing a 1% pay cut for the year and can expect that amount to be paid back when they retire.

SALARY DISPARITIES between male-dominated and female-dominated classifications in state employment will begin to be equalized with a \$2.9 million appropriation

PRECINCT CAUCUS DATES have been changed from the fourth Tuesday in February to the third Tuesday in March in order to shorten the length of state election campaigns. Caucuses will still begin at 8 p.m.

NURSING HOMES will not be allowed to expand their facilities over the next three years, in accordance with a legislative effort to control spiralling costs to the state. The law cuts \$50 million in state aid to those institutions and redefines the method of appropriating money to nursing homes. The institutions will now be divided into different groups to determine the amount of aid to be received.

THE NEW ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSE AND LIABILITY ACT - THE SUPERFUND - sets strict standards of liability so the people most responsible for hazardous waste are responsible for any necessary clean-up and can be sued for personal injuries and illness caused by the waste. The law also establishes a fund to clean up sites where no individual is liable. Money will come from a direct state appropriation an a tax on generators of hazardous waste. The PCA is authorized to act when any hazardous substance is discovered and imposing a public danger. Minnesota's Superfund makes the state eligible to receive federal Superfund dollars.

WORKERS NOW HAVE THE RIGHT TO KNOW if they are routinely exposed to toxic substances on the job. They must be provided training and complete access to all information regarding the toxic materials.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND GRANTS-IN-AIDS totalling \$90 million in state aid will be available to needy students. A new formula for determining aid calls on students to contribute a least 50% of their education cost. Parents who are financially able, are required to contribute and will be considered along with student contribution and any federal Pell grant awards when aid is determined. Minimum aid is set at \$100 for both state scholarships and grants-in-aid.

THE WORKERS' COMPENSATION REFORM BILL was designed to reduce costs in several ways:

- The Commissioner of Labor and Industry is forbidden to grant the current premium increase request:
- · Documented pre-existing injuries causing permanent disabilities will not be compensated as one with a new workrelated injury. Payment for permanent partials will be reduced accordingly:
- The state competitive fund passed as a separate bill. The fund will help Minnesota's small businesses by offering lower premiums for workers' comp coverage.

THE ST. PAUL-MINNEAPOLIS JOB TRAINING PROGRAM was created to counter unemployment among blacks, females and other minorities in the building and construction trades. \$250,000 is designated for the job training activities of the St. Paul Urban League's Labor Education Advancement Program. The funds will be disbursed through the Commissioner of Labor and Industry. Recruitment, training and placement of minorities in apprenticeships is the primary focus of the program.

RENT CREDIT will be based on actual property taxes paid, rather than the current 23%, except for senior citizens and others in subsidized housing whose rent credit will be

THE HOMESTEAD CREDIT will be reduced from 58% to 54% for non-farm homesteads, but with the maximum remaining at \$650.

THE STATE GASOLINE TAX is now 17¢, after a 4-cent increase became effective May 1, 1983. The second stage of the gas tax will occur January 1, 1984 when it is increased an additional cent. The law also reduces the tax on gasohol by 6¢ per gallon.

INCOME TAX PREPARATION will be simpler because of conformity with the federal income tax system on a number of deductions. Indexing remains intact. The 10% surcharge is extended through the 1984-85 biennium.

THE JOBS PROGRAM, which is geared toward generating work for the unemployed in both the public and private sector, has been alloted \$70 million to subsidize employment throughout the state.

Up to \$4 per hour and up to \$1 per hour in fringe benefits may be used to pay each full-time employee for 26 weeks. The hourly wage may be increased with the employer's own funds. Businesses taking part in the project are required to pay back 70% of the funds received.

Representative Frank RODRIGUEZ REPORTS ON THE 1983 SESSION

Dear Neighbors,

Now that the 1983 Session is well behind us, summer is over and I have returned from my first real vacation in eight years, it is time to report to you on the last legislative session.

When the session began in January, three main challenges faced us. 1) Balancing the budget so that the State is once again on a sound financial footing; 2) restructuring government to emphasize basic services and the best value for our tax dollars; 3) promoting economic growth in Minnesota to create jobs in new fields to make up for the job loss in depressed economic sectors (such as mining).

The State's finances are now in good order. The latest revenue reports show us in the black. ...at last. Progress was made in the other two areas but more still needs to be done.

This summary includes the legislation that I authored, both those that passed and those that didn't and a sampling of new laws enacted in the 1983 Session. If you have any questions, just call me at 296-6456.


Locally, MHAD has many members, including State Legislator, Frank Rodriguez. MHAD has held several meetings in conjunction with the national network to educate the community.


