Early initial use of drugs is regarded as a serious public health problem. It opens the way for subsequent multiple drug use. Moreover, its linkages to impaired psychological and social development are reflected in disrupted familial relations, school involvement, and employment.

The Eden Children's Chemical Health Services Project was developed in 1989 to help younger children and families resolve their unique individual needs related to the child's chemical use. With just a call to (320) 235-2042, anyone looking for help with any Hispanic, Chicano, Latino child aged 16 and younger who is suspected of using inhalants, alcohol, or other drugs can expect prompt, courteous responses.

The focus of the Project is to provide chemical health evaluations, interventions, treatment, and referral services. We address family, peer, social, leisure, recreation, physical, educational, and vocational areas. We will help you deal with the child's personal risk/behavior factors. We use a strengths-based approach that acknowledges the needs of young people by focusing interventions on identifying and building strengths, establishing trust, addressing environmental factors, and enabling self-fulfillment.

The bottom line is that we will help Hispanic, Chicano, Latino children and families halt the progression of chemical use in its early stages and, perhaps, enable a troubled child to grow into a happy, healthy adult.

Artist Statement

Palas de Mi Apa Shovels of My Grandpa

When I was a small child on my grandparents truck farm in south Texas one of my jobs was to hand out tools to the migrant workers hired on irrigation days. Back then fields were irrigated with gravity driven water along carefully cut furrows. The water was provided at a specific time and for limited duration. Workers were needed in large numbers for only a half-day. Many shovels needed to be provided. To prevent his shovels from walking off my grandfather took to painting his tools. His fellow truck farm owners soon took up the same practice.

This group of Latino farmers in south Texas informally became their own circle of honorable men. I often sat in their gatherings and listened to their discussions of local affairs and their own peculiar philosophical discourses. I was also a witness to their grim resolutions to harsh action.

A few years ago I created an Ofrenda dedicated to my grandfather's memory. It was in the form of a farmhouse back porch crowded with seedlings in tin cans, boots and painted tools. Many of the audience familiar with farm life were moved to gentle tears by the piece. This experience led me to realize the beauty of the idea of a circle of shovels. The painted shovels were the badge that farm workers sought. They could see that the employer before them held to the same values as the circle of Latino farm owners honorable conduct.

I set out as part of my Coyote Cuatro Performance Art to use the painted shovels to form power circles in the Latino community. To date five power shovels have been purchased by individuals committed to working in the community with a true sense of honor. These shovels are waiting for those who know the importance of working in their community with honor.

In this exhibit are shovels made for someone who can see in himself the need to undertake a course of honorable living. I make these shovels as personal totems to announce a commitment to honorable action. They are intended solely for self-realization of the humbled spirit as it accepts her/his fate.

The shovels are available for \$1,000 a piece. The money goes toward running a grantless mural program this coming summer for those agencies that cannot afford to include murals into their limited budget.

The Circle formed by this set of shovels will be those individuals in our community who support Latino artists outside the anglo-dominated art scene.

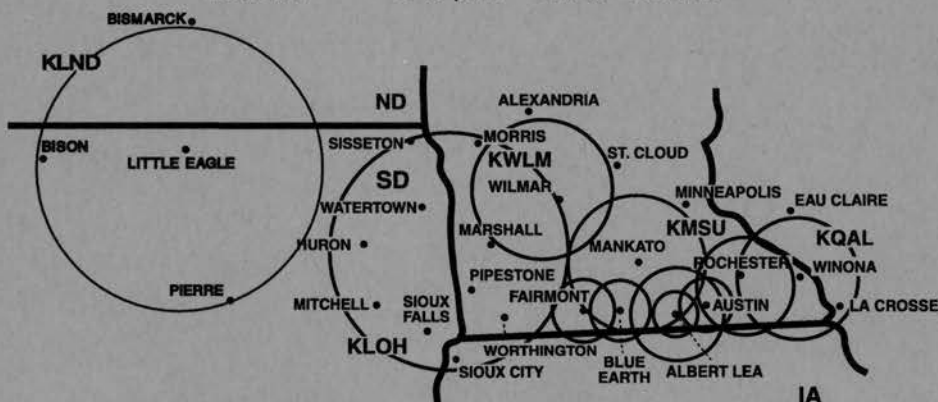

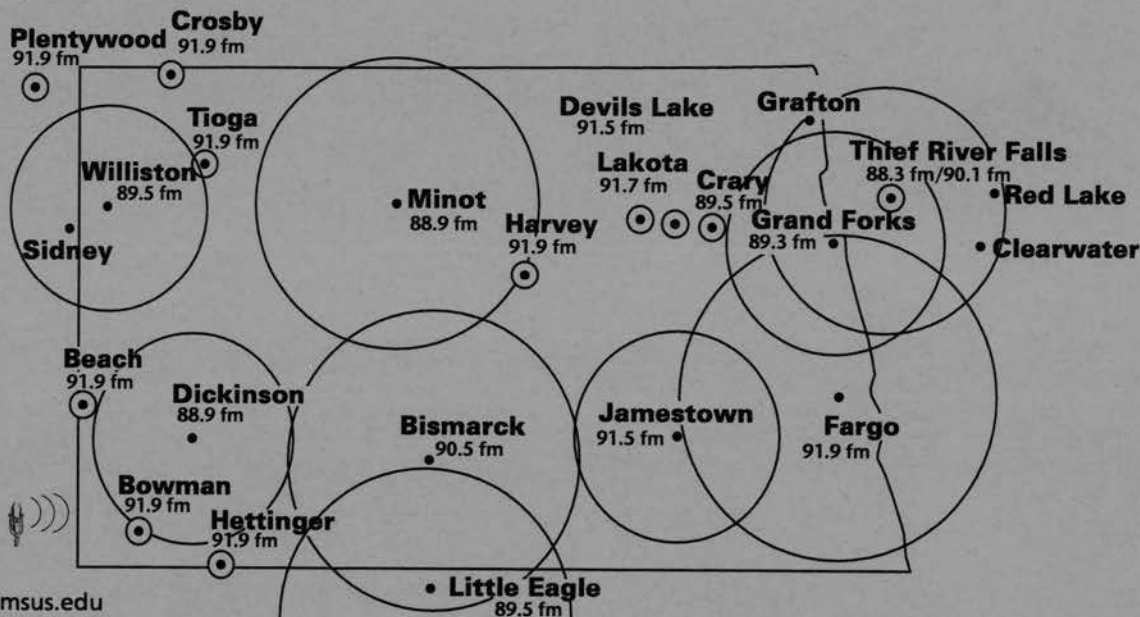

Personal Attention is a Priority

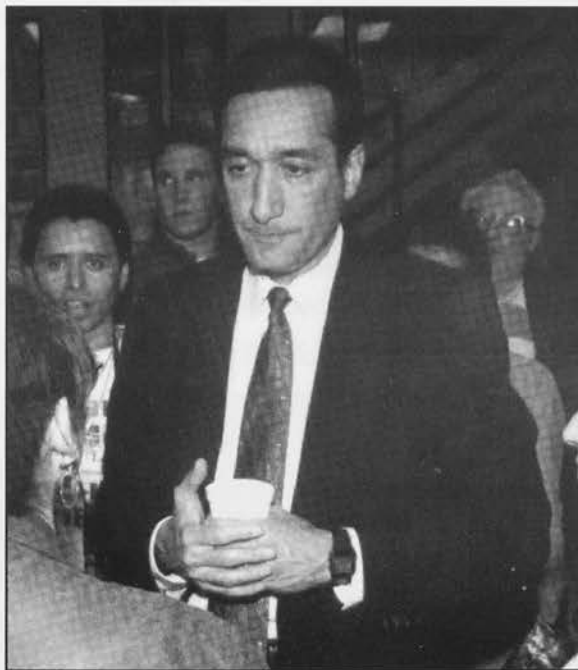
Among MSU's highest priorities is giving you the personal attention you deserve. In and out of the classroom students are known by name and the professors are accessible and approachable. MSU gives you the resources of a major university, yet the advantages and attention of a smaller campus. Our academic standards challenge you to think critically, yet our size permits personalized learning—one student at a time. Classroom sizes are kept to a minimum to enhance interaction between faculty and students, even during the freshman year. The exchange of new ideas and methods is encouraged in these smaller classroom settings. MSU's student/faculty ratio of 22:1 allows for questions to be answered and opinions to be heard.

Faculty frequently serve as mentors to students through academic advising, by suggesting research topics and internship possibilities, and helping make professional contacts. More than 200 undergraduates participate in professional research projects with faculty members; it's a shared approach to teaching that helps you succeed.

Financial Aid to Help You

Financial aid is available to you in a variety of forms, including university grants or scholarships, Pell grants, Minnesota State grants, Perkins loans, Stafford subsidized and unsubsidized loans and the college work study program.

All students applying for financial aid should do the following:

- Apply for admission and be admitted to MSU.
- Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).
- Respond quickly to all requests for additional information and documentation.
- Allow 8-12 weeks for processing.

Apply as soon after January 1 as possible to be considered for campus-based aid. Scholarships

Campus-based scholarships are available through MSU and can cover \$300-\$1,800 of your costs, which may represent as much as 23 percent of your total college expenses. **(This is in addition to federal financial aid.)** Some scholarships are renewable as long as you maintain the criteria required by the scholarship. Two special grants offered through MSU are the Minnesota Indian Teacher Education Program and the Teachers of Color Program. In these programs students may receive awards which cover educational costs plus a monthly stipend. All programs have specific application forms.

Admission

MSU encourages you to plan ahead and apply early for college.

To apply for admission, please send the following to the Admissions Office:

- Completed application for admission;
- \$20 non-refundable application fee;
- ACT, PSAT, or SAT scores;
- High school transcripts and/or GED scores;
- Transcripts from any previous colleges/institutions attended.

Applications will then be reviewed for an admission decision. Each applicant is individually reviewed for one of several admission options. New students who are in the top half of their high school class or who have a 21 ACT (or 90 PSAT or 1,000 SAT) will automatically be admitted; other students will be asked to submit a questionnaire and letters of recommendation before an admission decision is made. Students who transfer from other institutions must have a cumulative 2.0 grade point average for admission.
