Dear Mr. Bethke:

The Neighborhood Justice Center, Inc. is in the process of submitting to the McKnight Foundation a proposal to expand its criminal and juvenile defense services by establishment of an office on the West Side of Saint Paul to provide these much needed services to the Latino community and migrant stream in Minnesota. Presently, the Neighborhood Justice Center provides its legal services within Ramsey County only.

The new office would be called the West Side Defense Project and if the proposal is funded would be staffed by two staff attorneys, three bilingual community workers, and a bilingual secretary. An advisory committee consisting of Latino individuals and representatives of community organizations will be shortly formed to assist in planning of the project and will nominate individuals from the Latino community to serve on the Board of Directors of the Neighborhood Justice Center.

To assist this project in its formation, Fr. Monson of Our Lady of Guadalupe Church has agreed to provide space rent free during the first year of operations.

Since its formation in 1973 the Neighborhood Justice Center has serviced more than 1,600 clients, primarily from the Summit-University area of Saint Paul. We feel it essential that our services be made available to the Latino community on a greatly expanded basis. With your support and that of the McKnight Foundation we estimate that we could provide criminal and juvenile defense, as well as representation in immigration matters to 300-350 Latino clients per year.

We are asking at this time for your support in the form of a letter. Hopefully this letter would acknowledge the need for legal services within the Latino community and endorse the proposal of the Neighborhood Justice Center for funding from the McKnight Foundation. The letter would be attached to the proposal. In order to provide direct legal service to the community, we need the full support of community organizations and individuals.



Dear Mr. Heegard:

On June 26, 1979, you received a letter from the United Way of Minneapolis Area indicating that your Agency application as a financially participating Agency of the Minneapolis United Way was accepted for 1980 dependent upon a successful United Way Campaign this fall. As you know, the Campaign is completed and was successful. On November 27, 1979, the United Way Board of Directors approved allocations for program services for 1980 for all existing and new Agencies. Your Agency was approved as a new Agency for 1980.

Your allocation for 1980 is as follows:

The release of 1980 United Way funds will be contingent upon:

- a) The development of a program monitoring and evaluation component satisfactory to both the prospective new Agency and the United Way.
- b) A 1978 audit and other current financial data submitted by the new Agency showing the total financial activity of the Agency and demonstrating that the prospective new Agency is financially solvent.

The United Way Agency Relations Staff has already made one contact with your Agency regarding the contingencies noted in this letter. Attached is a copy of the outline which was used in this conference. It is important that all these matters be handled and completed as expeditiously as possible by the Agency and by the United Way so that your funding for program services in 1980 can start on schedule.

Within the next two-three weeks, your Agency will be invited to an orientation session for the four new Agencies joining the United Way in 1980. We would recommend that the Board President, Executive Director and Bookkeeper attend this session.

Early in 1980, your Agency will be assigned to an Allocations Panel which will be the principal way through which your Agency and the United Way will interact. The Panel is made up of a broad representation of community volunteers. Its function is to meet with your Agency in a variety of ways during the year to review your Agency program services, overall Agency approaches and your Agency finances. The end result of this activity each year is the recommendation of your Allocation for the following year.

All Agencies will begin receiving their 1980 Allocations on January 15, 1980. Each Agency will receive one-twelfth of its 1980 Allocation on this date. Any Agency which wishes to receive their Allocation other than in 12 equal payments should submit a detailed cash flow plan to the United Way no later than February 1, 1980, for consideration. Any revised monthly Allocations would then begin with the February, 1980, Allocation.

We welcome your Agency as a financially participating Agency of the United Way of the Minneapolis Area. The New Programs Committee, the Allocations Committee and the United Way Board of Directors feel that your addition to the group of already existing Agencies will provide some services to groups which are in great need of your services. We look forward to our first year with you in this new relationship.

RE: CALENDAR YEAR 1979

As we complete our first nine years of continued service to the citizens of Hennepin County, we would like to reflect on our accomplishments of this past year.

The Center's case load has been increasing month by month. This appears due to the fact that we have a full complement of staff for the first time in many months. Felonies amount to about thirty percent of our cases, while misdemeaners are approximately fifty percent of our caseload. Our juvenile caseload has been doubling each month. At his very moment, year two funding of our state-wide juvenile advocacy project, funded by the Crime Control Planning Board, is in its final stages. As has been the case in the past, about ninety percent of our clients, both young and old, are minority people.

Our financial picture is considerably rosier than ever before. Our administration has been able to not only broaden our financial base in the legal, foundation, and corporation communities, but has secured new sources of funding as well.

Over the past two years we have been expanding our services to the Chicano-Latin community. Legal representation for this group is important because Chicanos now comprise the largest racial or ethnic minority in Minnesota. Many of these people originally arrived as migrant and seasonal farm workers and settled out of the migrant stream. The process of adapting to a northern

industrial city after living in rural areas of the southwest, has inevitably been difficult and a small number of Chicano people, principally youngsters, have been involved in brushes with the law. The Center has been able to serve this new clientele notably by employing a bilingual-bicultural community worker, part time. After repeated attempts at United Way membership, in 1980 we shall begin receiving United Way support for a bilingual-bicultural community worker to serve this community on a full-time basis.

The Center has always served as a training ground for law students who want experience in criminal defense work. We have recently received a three year Bush Foundation grant aimed at hiring minority lawyers. This grant pays for part time employment for senior law school law clerks, then employment as a staff lawyer for one year after passing the Bar examination.

We were pleased with the results of our Second Annual Lawyers fund drive. This year, approximately one hundred and fifty lawyers and law firms contributed for the first time or increased their previous donation. This was an increase of about fifty percent over the number giving in 1978. Bob Henson and Stu Rider, co-chaired a group of hard-working volunteers and we are confident that next year's drive will be a tremendous success.

Since 1976, we have received funds from Hennepin County and the State of Minnesota on a fee-for-service basis. Our 1980 appropriation from the County will amount to a ten percent increase over our 1979 allocation.

As we begin our tenth anniversary year, we believe that we can truthfully say that the Center has combined its youthful exuberance with a new maturity and seriousness and has become a permanent part of the criminal justice process in Hennepin County.

RE: Legal Rights Center request for United Way funding

As you know, the Center has applied for funding from United Way of Minneapolis Area. Each of you has agreed to speak to a specific member of the United Way New Programs/Allocation Committee. The Center will not receive funding unless the application is approved by this Committee.

Here is a summary of the application, so that you will be familiar with it when you talk to the committee member:

The Center has asked for \$21,000 to hire a bilingual (Spanish-English) - bicultural (understands migrant life, etc.) community worker so that the Center can work with the Chicano community.

This position is important to the Center because the Chicano community of Minneapolis is growing bigger, the Center is already getting an increasing number of Chicano clients and because there isn't any bilingual-bicultural staffperson in the Hennepin County criminal justice system at present.

In your discussion, please emphasize that the primary objective is to provide family and individual counselling, to find out which social service agencies understand the values of Chicanos and are successful working with them, and to make referrals to these agencies when appropriate.

The Chicano community worker will do the same kind of work as the present Black and Indian community workers and will be paid the same.

The Center was asked by representatives of the Chicano community to hire such a community worker and the proposal has the endorsement of Centro Cultural Chicano, Migrants In Action, CASA and Center for Spanish Speaking Seniors.

Legal Rights Center Board members and staff were invited to attend a meeting at Heart of the Earth Survival School to initiate review of Legal Right Center policies and administrative process.

Areas discussed for future in-depth analysis included: 1) Definition of administrative function and internal chain-of-command; 2) Intent of members present to review present Legal Right Center Personnel Policy, By-Laws and Amendments and follow-up with recommendations for possible revision. Discussion evolved informally, and general perspective of Legal Right Center Board members was the stated intention to educate new Board members as well as staff on the written policies and reiterate original goals and philosophy of Legal Right Center.

PROBLEM AREAS

It was noted that presently staff of Legal Right Center problem solve during bi-weekly meetings. Problems are listed in agenda order and resolved collectively. Staff vote on administrative decisions. Jerry Patterson developed a model problem solving situation for discussion purposes.

A critical point in discussion and interpretation was the role of the Legal Right Center Board versus staff role. It was stated generally that the Legal Right Center Board develops policy and administration thru the Director - Doug Hall is charged with implementing policy and program operation.

The discussion indicated the need for basic role definition and although staff has been heavily involved in the decision-making process, the need that clearly identify the Directors' responsibility and aurthority is apparent. The position was also taken generally by the legal Right Center Board members that staff input does not override Board of Directors policy decisions or mandates.

* That the Board of Directors forwards policy directives to Doug Hall and he there on is charged with implementation and is directly answerable to the Legal Right Center Board.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1) During the week of February 9th, 1981 that Roard members comprised of original founders of Legal Right Center will hold a meeting to determine whether or not the Legal Right Center is conforming within original framework of Legal Right Center.
- 2) Clyde Bellecourt suggested that minutes from staff meetings, personnel meetings, etc. be included in the monthly Legal Right Center report. Bill Koenen further suggested that monthly Board minutes be compiled by the Legal Right Center Secretary and the Legal Right Center Treasurer become actively involved in financial responsibility at Legal Right Center (i.e. check signing, revision of monthly budget statement, overview financial management, etc.)
- 3) It was recommended that each staff report to the Legal Right Center Board during monthly Board meetings on a rotation basis. For example, two staff would present a report to Board of Directors during March 1981 and would not be required to report until all other staff had similarly reported. This was suggested to a mandatory requirement. The Legal Right Center Board and particularly the new members need this background information from all staff to develop an awareness

of existing Legal Right Center programs and services.

In closing, the meeting it was generally stated by Legal Right Center Board members that staff should not be under the misconception that the Legal Right Center Board is going to be involved in daily implementation but rather seeks to clarify the Board role and responsibility of members and the relationship to administrative process.

February 28, 1981

I will attempt to explain a matter that I am familiar with that could have been alleviated with "common courtesy" or guts enough to say "NO".

Approximately 2 months ago a person, namely, James Senter, stated to me that I was pointed out to him by a member of the community as a member of the Board Of Directors of the Legal Rights Center. He also stated that he had made attempts to get in tough with Sylvester Davis or Harry "Spike" Moss to help him resolve a problem that he was having in communicating with the Legal Rights Center. He attempted to explain his legal problem. I told him that I had no expertise in law but I would go with him to the Legal Rights Center in an attempt to help him in this matter, in which I did.

I received a call 3 or 4 days later from Legal Rights regarding Mr. Senter. I was asked if I had any special interest in this person. I replied that I did not, but I did not want to see anyone go to jail. I was told that the case load was heavy but an attempt would be made to discuss the problem with Mr. Senter and I thought that was the end of the matter.

To my surprise on President's Day I received a call from Mr. Senter stating that he had been in jail for 3 or 4 days and was to appear in Court the following morning. I told Mr. Senter that I thought he had been in touch with some from the Legal Rights Center since our last meeting and he assured me that he had not. I called the Legal Rights answering service shortly alter my conversation with Mr. Senter. requested that someone from the Center return my call. My call was returned later that same day. I then explained the conversation that Mr. Senter and I had by telephone and also explained that Mr. Senter was scheduled to appear in Court the follwoing day. At this time I was told that Attorneys would be tied up but someone from Legal Rights would appear in Court in Mr. Senter's behalf to explain the problem. On that same day of Court I had a commitment to be at another urgent meeting from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. After the meeting was over I decided I would go to court to see the outcome of Mr. Senter's case. was shocked when the Bailif called Mr. Senter's name that no one from Legal Rights Center stepped forward.

Judge Rogers, I believe, was involved in a conversation that was leading nowhere. I then proceeded to step forward and introduced myself

as a member of the Board Of Directors of Legal Rights Center. I explained to him that it was my feeling that there was an error or possibly lack of communications. Judge Rogers asked me if I cared to take it upon myself to speak with the Staff of Legal Rights Center to alleviate this matter and I did. I left the Courtroom and proceeded immediately to the Legal Rights Center and talked to Doug Hall for approximately one hour and a half. I attempted to explain the situation to the best of my knowledge as to what had transpired in the courtroom that afternoon concerning Mr. Senter and this particular matter. At the end of the conversation Doug appeared to be hesitant as to whether to handle the case or not. He stated he would make a phone call and get back to me. I told Doug not to call me but to call the two people who were in the office with me at the time who were concerned with Mr. Senter's well being.

On 2/23/81 I received a call from Doug Hall. At times the conversation got quite heated. Doug stated that he had no intentions of representing Mr. Senter. I asked him "why"? and he said he just was not going to represent him. I asked Doug if he realized that Mr. Senter had to appear in Court the following day? Then I asked Doug if he would go to Court and explain to the Judge why Mr. Senter had no legal representation and his reply was "NO".

The following morning I went to the Judge's Chambers and explained to her the situation as I saw it. At this time Mr. Senter was not aware that he did not have legal representation from the Legal Rights Center. I asked the Judge to extend his case for a week to give Mr. Senter an opportunity to obtain legal representation fo which she (The Judge) was accommodating.

It is my feeling that some time in the future The Board Of Directors of Legal Rights Center should take some action to alleviate such incidents from happening in the future.

Attention:

I would like to bring to your attention the concerns that were discussed at our July 7, 1981 meeting.

I decided that this meeting should be an informal meeting. The purpose was for general discussion and information. Such information and concerns about the functions of the Legal Rights Center. This was the first meeting that I have attended of which every attending member participated in asking questions and disagreeing with some of the policies now in use at the Legal Rights Center without anyone becoming angry. I will list some of the concerns discussed.

- The number one concern seems to be "lack of communications between the Board and Staff.
- 2. The concern of our policies not being consistant. An example referred to is the hiring of Attorneys and Community Workers. Our policy varies from time to time. It is my feelings that we should have a set rule in our hiring practices. This would alleviate a lot of hard feelings and discussions.
- 3. The chain of commands should be spelled out and clear to all Board members. I feel that the Board of Directors should deal directly with the Execetive Director and possibly the Director and each Community Board Members should deal with its Community Workers.
- There was a great deal of concern regarding the filling of vacancies. As you may know we have been without the servicies of two Attorneys for approximately 3 months and without one or two Community Workers for a shorter period of time. These openings have not been filled as of this date. This does our Communities a dis-service. One bright spot. Everyone seems to feel that the financial structure was a good move. The new spread sheet is simplified and everyone seems to understand it.

July 10, 1981

continued:

From the information that we obtained, I have appointed a Committee to meet at the Way Community Center July 27, 1981 at 12:00 noon. The purpose is to discuss and bring recommendations back to the Board at our August meeting for action. The Board can accept, reject or ammend for the restructure of Legal Rights functions. Also the By-Laws will be reviewed and ammended if necessary. All Board members should read the By-Laws and if there is anything that they feel should be changed they should bring to the Julys meeting for discussion.

Per intent and by direction of the Board, I have met and visited with the Bookkeeper of Legal Rights Center, Inc. on June 24th, and July 27th, 1981.

Prior to the above mentioned meeting, a meeting had taken place on June 3rd, 1981 with other members of the Board appointed "Finance Committee" members, Legal Right Center CPA firm and Mr. Ralph Crowder, Legal Rights Center Administrator. An initial recommendation stemming from the June 3, 81 meeting was the immediate need to hire a full-time bookkeeper, thus, the two follow-up meetings by myself to assess progress. Rather than a detailed analysis of each meeting, it would seem more effective to generally summarize my perspective of the three meetings and a layman view of what needs to be done.

The underlying objective of the report of course is to assist in strengthening the Legal Rights Center accounting and financial reporting process.

Process Review Statement:

A complete set of "books" such as "Journal", "Ledger", Cash Disbursement records, etc. need to be established and maintained monthly. Prior to the newly hired book-keeper coming on board, no existing set of books or generally accepted recording process had been maintained. This area of deficiency caused alarming concern on behalf of the Treasurer;

A centralized purchase order system needs to be developed, in view of the non-existence of such a system. The bookkeeper should receive copies of all approved purchases for line item designation before actual obligation. The purchases should be approved only by the Executive Director. If purchases seem or appear unnelated to the nature and conduct of Legal Rights Center activity, the bookkeeper should red line the expenditure upon entry to the records.

Rights Center for Executive Director signature and designated Board sign-off. The bookkeeper then has an established accurate way of determining cash disbursements. Checks should be carbon copy with white-slip filed numerically and checks filed accordingly on a monthly basis.

All receipts must match disbursement and attached to original purchase order request. Receipts documentation is crucial and if an amount disbursed does not match receipt total the check recipent should be responsible for any reimbursement. If the chack handler is other than the Executive Director and fails to reimburse, it is my recommendation that the amount be deducted from earnings of either party. All approved vouchers disbursed should be prepared for Treasurer's view on a regularly scheduled basis.

C) Check signing authority should be revised to include the signature of the Executive Director and at least one designated Board member. Normally the Treasurer signs off with Executive Director. Check signing by two staff members should be eliminated. The checks should be prepared on regular scheduled basis for Treasurers' review and approval. If an in-house emergency develops, the Executive Director should notify the Treasurer or the other Board signer for verbal approval. In this case only a check could be released with Executive Directors' signature. Suggested signature include Executive Director, Treasurer, and one other Board member. A corporate resolution document must be signed to that effect and new signature cards ordered if the recommendation is approved.

4) The Bookkeeper should be the only person responsible for budget statement preparation and book entries.

Bank Loans: McKnight loan fund availability and line of credit from any source should be "Frozen" and repayments made.

Loan authority beyond that should require full Board consideration and approval. All relevant loan documents and information should be forwarded to the Treasurer and Bookkeeper for analysis. It is my belief in looking at the past and current budget statements that Legal Rights Center is generally operating with a 10 - to 30 thousand cash flow deficit. Bond status should be investigated by the bookkeeper and summarized for report.

6) It is my recommendation that all personnel and fixed costs be maintained if cash flow is sufficient. All non-personnel and non-fixed cost disbursements should be frozen for sixty days with full Board review prior to lifting.

7) The bookkeeper should prepare a summary of fixed monthly expenditures and cash flow.

A new independent CPA firm is needed and should be selected immediately. Upon selection via a bid process, Legal Rights Center should conduct a mid-term full audit extending from January 1, 1981 to June 30, 1981.

The Bookkeeper should prepare a tax status report in coordination with a tax consultant if necessary to insure a solid tax structure payment base. This could be accomplished via an accounting firm.

10) Review of management responsibilities per job descriptions should be conducted by the Board of Directors for the position of Executive Director and Administrator.

SUMMARY:

In outlining the above areas, it should be noted that all the areas are open for discussion since it is not a legal opinion or judgement.

But in analyzing the accounting system whether one considers themselves a layman or professional, it is clear that the process needs clear and strict revision.

The process of management authority needs to be also clarified and undertaken. It appears that in this area that responsibility has not been positively assumed by either the Administration or the Legal Rights Centers' Board.

When one talks of \underline{cash} flow problems the two words needs to be looked at separately. Is it a cash problem or is it really the \underline{flow} ? If it is a flow problem, then it really appears to be a management problem. That is the crux of the situation as I see it.

The meeting was held at The Way, Inc. The mission of the Committee was to discuss the direction, historical mission, and the administrative function of the Executive Director.

While a number of subjects were discussed relevant to the function of the Center, we primarily focused on the areas listed:

a. That a Committee be selected to examine the By-Laws and revise as necessary.

b. A Retreat for Board and Staff be held very soon, for clarifying various functions and communication between Board and Staff.

- c. A specific training program for Community Worker.
- d. To establish a better record for staff contact, and record keeping and financial accountability.
- e. To define officers and Board responsibility.
- f. To improve office procedure so contact and follow-up calls can be returned.

In regard to history and its mission: The Center was to be a vehicle for communities which were disenfranchised and poor, to have legal services for its members and institutions. Areas to be served were: Criminal, Juvenile, Corporate & Business, Domestic, Civil, Education, etc.

To date there has been focus in only two of the seven areas - Criminal and Juvenile - with some minor involvement in Civil Class action.

Areas that are becoming more and more important to members of the disadvantage communities are:

- Landlord-Tenant
- 2. Mental Hospital
- 3. Prisons
- 4. Community Education of Laws

- 5. Immigration Alien
- 6. Juvenile
- 7. Class Action Suits
- 8. Legal Action for Business, etc.

and finally the leadership of the center.....

While the initial format for the function of the Center was to be a cooperation of the Director and Staff - the primary decision still resides with the Director when accord was not reached - for the leadership was mandated in that manner. However, since the original concept was adopted to fit the mode of the time; i.e. to help Lawyers understand the client we served and thus provide a better line of communication and trust between client and attorney. While this concept is still or should be the thrust; it is doubtful that much of this concept is still applicable, lack of proper preparation and training for worker. The Center does not function as a Legal center as it should in reference to management and control, information flow, or services to client and other business calls, Lawyer and Community Worker accountability, and discipline. Some accounting of time and availability to office when in Court, etc. How do we interpret actions and what are the principal actions of Lawyer and Staff.

How can we measure the success and failure of the Center's operation. What evaluation can be made of Community Worker function and the success of his/her role. Community Worker's are responsible for his/her actions to the community which he/she represents; in the main, however, this does not preclude his/her responsibility to the Client who apply to the Center regardless of ethnicity.

Please review this information along with the information you have received from the meeting of February 4, 1981, at the Heart of the Earth Survival School.

We should meet at least once more before the next Board meeting to finalize our report. Please make notes so we may expidite the meeting. A call will follow in the next few days to confirm a date.

Legal Rights Center Board members and staff were invited to attend a meeting at Heart of the Earth Survival School to initiate review of Legal Right Center policies and administrative process.

Areas discussed for future in-depth analysis included: 1) Definition of administrative function and internal chain-of-command;
2) Intent of members present to review present Legal Right Center Personnel Policy, By-Laws and Amendments and follow-up with recommendations for possible revision. Discussion evolved informally, and general perspective of Legal Right Center Board members was the stated intention to educate new Board members as well as staff on the written policies and reiterate original goals and philosophy of Legal Right Center.

PROBLEM AREAS

It was noted that presently staff of legal Right Center problem solve during bi-weekly meetings. Problems are listed in agenda order and resolved collectively. Staff vote on administrative decisions. Jerry Patterson developed a model problem solving situation for discussion purposes.

A critical point in discussion and interpretation was the role of the legal Right Center Board versus staff role. It was stated generally that the legal Right Center Board develops policy and administration thru the Director - Doug Hall is charged with implementing policy and program operation.

The discussion indicated the need for basic role definition and although staff has been heavily involved in the decision-making process, the need that clearly identify the Directors' responsibility and aurthority is apparent. The position was also taken generally by the legal Right Center Board members that staff input does not override Board of Directors policy decisions or mandates.

* That the Board of Directors forwards policy directives to Doug Hall and he there on is charged with implementation and is directly answerable to the legal Right Center Board.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1) During the week of February 9th, 1981 that Roard members comprised of original founders of legal Right Center will hold a meeting to determine whether or not the legal Right Center is conforming within original framework of legal Right Center.
- 2) Clyde Bellecourt suggested that minutes from staff meetings, personnel meetings, etc. be included in the monthly Legal Right Center report. Bill Koenen further suggested that monthly Board minutes be compiled by the Legal Right Center Secretary and the Legal Right Center Treasurer become actively involved in financial responsibility at Legal Right Center (i.e. check signing, revision of monthly budget statement, overview financial management, etc.)
- 3) It was recommended that each staff report to the legal Right Center Board during monthly Board meetings on a rotation basis. For example, two staff would present a report to Board of Directors during March 1981 and would not be required to report until all other staff had similarly reported. This was suggested to a mandatory requirement.

 The Legal Right Center Board and particularly the new members need this background information from all staff to develop an awareness of existing Legal Right Center programs and services.

In closing, the meeting it was generally stated by Legal Right Center Board members that staff should not be under the misconception that the Legal Right Center Board is going to be involved in daily implementation but rather seeks to clarify the Board role and responsibility of members and the relationship to administrative process.

'GENCY:

Please list and briefly describe those programs provided in the greater Minneapolis service area that are not funded by United Way.

The major purpose of the Center is to provide quality legal defense to the poor and minority communities of Hennepin County. To accomplish this objective the Center has an adult and a juvenile program:

1. Adult Legal Services

Presently, the adult program is staffed by 4.5 Community workers and 2.5 Attorneys. The attorney and community worker combine to provide effective legal representation, assist the client to understand legal procedure and encourage his/her constructive participation in trial and dispositional proceedings.

2. Juvenile Legal Services

The juvenile program is staffed by 1.5 Attorneys and 2 part-time Community Workers. This program seeks to provide legal counsel to juveniles charged with crimes or in delinquency. The Community Worker and the Attorney also seek to advise and involve the respective families in a constructive and supportive role during all proceedings.

The Center believes that an effective criminal defense is not a sufficient response to the lodging of charges against an individual from its constituent communities. This perspective was the emphasis for the:

3. Coordinated Social Services Program

Community Workers attempt to identify the social conditions (e.g. lack of employment or chemical abuse) which may have contributed or caused involvement in the criminal justice process. With this information they can provide constructive alternatives at the dispositional stage of trial and direct clients to social service agencies which are successful working with poor and minority people.

LEGAL RIGHTS CENTER, INC. 1981 Funding Proposal

Introduction

The Legal Rights Center is one of the most critical resources serving the poor and minorities effected by the criminal justice system of Minneapolis and Hennepin county. The Center seeks your support in order to continue providing quality legal representation and coordinated social service to its clients.

Background

During the turbulence of the 1960's, Minneapolis was only one of the many urban communities confronted by civil disturbances, allocations of racism and social alienation. Within this atmosphere local leaders of the Black and Indian communities expressed a concern that the existing criminal defense resources were not sufficiently addressing the problems and needs of minority people. The community advocates became convinced that it was essential to establish a new agency. They sought to found an organization which would provide skilled legal services while being sensitive to the historical experiences, values and perceptions of the poor and minority communities. Their efforts resulted in the establishment of the Legal Rights Center in 1970.

Uniqueness

Poor and minority clients facing the criminal justice system often have feelings of suspicion and helplessness. This powerless and vulnerable perception of traditional criminal defense programs is reinforced by the recent major publication of Charles E. Silberman,

<u>Criminal Violence</u>, <u>Criminal Justice</u> (New York: Random House, 1978). In Dr. Silberman's words,

It is not surprising that most defendants do not see public defender service lawyers as their advocate . . . The defendants with whom I spoke tended to see their lawyers as representing the legal system to them, rather than representing them to the system.

This researcher concludes his assessment by stating,

. . . some defendants have trouble understanding why anyone would want to help them, let alone someone paid by the same society that is prosecuting them.

To address these problems, the Center employs community workers who are from the same ethnic and cultural backgrounds as the Center's clients. No other organization providing criminal defense services employs community workers.

It is the role of the community worker to "demystify" the criminal justice system for the Center's clients. Due to similar cultural and social experiences, community workers are able to explain the criminal justice process in language the clients understand.

Community workers are involved and assist the client in every significant stage of judicial proceeding. Since they have established credibility with the courts and police, they often are able to arrange court appearances, release without bail or the provision of minimal bail. This procedure tends to minimize the interruption a sudden arrest makes upon the client's fmaily or job.

Frequently, the community workers act as investigators. Because they are trusted by the clients and their communities, they can acquire information which may exonerate the client, impact on the degree of criminal responsibility or have an important influence on sentencing.

The community workers also strengthen the client's confidence in the integrity of the judicial system. During trial they assist the client and attorney select a jury which the client will accept as fair. By helping clients to understand legal procedure and encouraging his evaluation of trail strategy, they ensure the client's intelligent and productive participation in the trial.

At the conclusion of the case, the community workers will recognize factors in the client's lives which may have contributed or caused involvement in the criminal justice process. With this information they can provide constructive alternatives at the dispositional stage of trial and direct clients to social service agencies which are successful working with poor and minority people.

Staff and Board

To effectively serve its clients, the Center aggressively recruits staff from poor and minority communities. Currently, two of the Center's five attorneys are Black, two community workers are Black, two are Indian and two are Chicano. The Center has historically served as a training ground for students pursuing a career in law or criminal justice. Presently, there are two Black law students who are serving as part-time employees.

A majority of the Center's Board of Directors are required by its Articles of Incorporation to be drawn from the ethnic and racial communities served by the Center. The current members of the Board are listed in an attachment to this proposal.

Caseload

The Center handled 704 cases in 1980. This was a twenty-eight percent increase over the caseload of the previous year. About twenty percent were felonies, sixty percent misdemeanors and twenty percent were juvenile matters. There was a clearly defined increase in the number of new cases accepted each month. The increase in juvenile cases for the year was significant.

Juvenile Program

The growth in the number of juveniles served by the Center in recent years, encouraged the Center to develop a specific component to deal with young offenders. In cooperation with four other legal services groups, the Center developed a grant and presented a proposal to the Minnesota Crime Control Planning Board. This program is now in its third year of funding. Under the grant, the Center represents juveniles in delinquency and related matters and the other organizations represent them in civil cases. This grant covers the entire cost of the Center's juvenile program.

Chicano-Latino Program

In the past two years, the Center has greatly expanded its services to the Chicano-Latino community. This community represents the largest racial/ethnic minority in Minnesota. Many Chicano people arrived in Minnesota from the rural Southwest as migrant farmworkers. Through the years, they left the migrant stream and adapted an urban residence. This transition to an urban lifestyle has created some tensions with the criminal justice system. In addition, the recent influx of Cuban immigrants has introduced another Spanish speaking population to the

Minneapolis urban community. To respond to this challenge, the Center has employed two bilingual-bicultural community workers to maximize its effectiveness.

Finance

In 1980, approximately twenty-five percent of the Center's support came from foundations, twenty percent from lawyers and law firms and fifty-five percent from contract for service payments from state and local government.

Among major developments in the Center's financial picture are the following:

As a second year agency in the United Way of Greater Minneapolis, the Center's 1981 allocation was increased by 38.6% over 1980. The United Way's contribution includes the full cost of a bilingual-bicultural community worker and target population grant.

The 1981 appropriation from Hennepin County was increased by 9.1% over 1980. Funding for year three of the juvenile advocacy program was approved by Crime Control Planning Board.

The Center entered year two of a three year Bush Foundation grant to encourage minority law students to practice criminal law. The grant pays the salaries for part-time employment of two law students during their senior year in law school and for one year as a staff attorney following graduation.

The Center was awarded a special one year grant from the Commission on Race and Religion, The United Methodist Church. This grant partially funded one community worker during 1980.

A detailed breakdown of the sources of the Center's financial support is attached.

Conclusion

The Legal Rights Center has become an established part of the criminal justice system of the Minneapolis metropolitan area. Since its

establishment in 1970, the Center has fulfilled a unique role in serving the poor and minority community. During this period, the Center has developed new programs as needs became apparent. Further, the Center has continuously sought means to broaden its financial base.

I received a call from Ralph Crowder informing me that Irene Bethke had requested that the September 15th meeting be posponed due to a Function in the Chicano community. We will pospone this meeting until the 4th Tuesday of the month. The date will be September 22, 1981. It will be very important that we have a quorum on 9/22/81 because we have many things to discuss and decide. Items that appear on the A-genda are as follows:

- From our August Committee meeting we have 7 recommendations, some of which may or may not be valid since I have checked the By-Laws of the Legal Rights Center. But this is not for me to decide, as this will be the decision of the Board.
- 2. One of the 7 recommendations is to appoint a Personnel Committee to determine job description.

 Comment: This procedure was used 2 years ago and the Board failed to follow through on it.
- 3. I will ask Syl Davis, Chairperson of the Legal Rights Center Structure Committee, to meet with members of the Staff for the purpose of
 starting to impliment Said program. Such as, where do we start to
 intergrate Said program into the functioning of the Legal Rights
 Center and to estimate the amount of money that is needed to start
 such new programs. I would appreciate it if he could report his
 findings back to our October meeting.
- 4. I will appoint a Committee to work along with Ralph Crowderin his efforts to raise funds for the up-coming year. Such as, explaining to our Friends and hopefully, our new Friends who have and will contributed to the Legal Rights Center, without being aggressive, but just stating facts.

 Comment: Whether we agree with the Reagan Administration or not, finances for Legal Services will be cut back throughout the Country. Reagan's concept is that Private Interprise and Foundations will pick up the slack. Lets hope he is right.
- 5. Another Selling Point: In the 1970 Census, Minority population was 3 1/2 % of Minneapolis. In the 1980s the Minority population has increased to 12% actual figures with a marginal error of 3 to 5%. So allowing for the error this would 15 to 16%. This means that our Case load would have to increase.

The intentions of the Legal Rights Center is to go to our new friends, the Asian Americans, Vietnam Community and make them aware of the Services that the Legal Rights Center has to offer and welcome them to the Services. We also intend to search out and welcome them as new members of the Legal Rights Center Board of Directors.

I am enclosing a program of the Fund Raiser that was given August 23. 1981 at the Children's Theatre for some of you who were not able to attend. I feel that Ralph Crowder should be complimented on the excellent job he did in promoting this affair. It contributed a lot for Public Relations in our community.

Looking forward to seeing all of you September 22, 1981.

Since I became President of Legal Rights Center in May, 1981 many questions have been raised of which I will attempt to answer said questions.

The Legal Rights Center, Inc. operates under a Non-profit Corporation under and pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 317, Minnesota Statutes, known as the Minnesota Non-profit Corporation Act.

The Articles Of Incorporation of the Legal Rights Center, Inc. and By-Laws has to operate under the guidelines of Chapter 317, Minnesota Statutes, known as a Non-profit Corporation Act and they appear to be within the guidelines of the said Act.

- Q. The question has been raised as to who has the authority of making policy?
- A. Section 2 of the By-Laws answers that question. It states; "The Board Of Directors determines policies and shall be responsible for seeing that the Staff carries out the basic functions of the Corporation". Some may get confused when they read Section 4 of the By-Laws which reads that the Exective Director has total administrative responsibility. This simply means that the Board Of Directors makes the policy and relays the policy to the Exective Director who carries it out.
- Q. Questions have been raised regarding discharging of the Exective Director.
- A. Section 4 of the By-Laws clearifies this question. It says-"The Exective Director must have due process, grievances in writing and being specific. He or she must be notified and a hearing must be held. And finally a vote must be taken of 3/4 of all members of the Board.

- Q. Questions have been raised concerning the financial structure.
- A. Under the Articles Of Incorporation, The Legal Rights Center comes under Section 501-c-3 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 or future United States Internal Revenue Code.

Article XV: The Corporation shall establish methods for a full, complete and fair accounting of the finances of the Corporation. An annual audit by a Certified Public Accountant shall be made of the banks and records of the Corporation for submission to the Annual meeting of the Board of Directors.

Section 13 of the By-Laws would seem to be consistant with the Article above.

At an August Committee Meeting, there was an article on the structure of Legal Rights Center presented to the Board of Directors which is in direct conflict with Section 2 of the By-Laws and the Articles of Incorporations and Chapter 317, Non-profit Corporation, Minnesota Statutes.

Paragraph 7 of that Article on the structure of Legal Rights Center which was discussed at the Committee meeting that evening stated the following: "that the Staff hold regular and special meetings to deal with policy and operating problems, the filling of Staff vacancies, and problems in particular cases. Decisions on these questions are made by concensus or majority vote."

Section 4 of the By-Laws makes it very clear the duties of the Executive Director.

(1) The Executive Director, he or she, has the administrative responsibility and operation of the program. This is not to say that he or she may not delegate such power to qualified individuals. But he or she must be aware of the every day functioning in all aspects so that he or she may be able to inform the Board of Directors of the Legal Rights Center.

At the August Committee meeting it was stated that the Executive Director had a full case load. In all of the documents that I have read pertaining to the Legal Rights Center there was not a mention of case load.

(2) His or her first priority is to administrate. If this means cutting case load down or out then, so be it.

Plaintiff, Dwight W. Kelsey, seeks declaratory and injunctive relief and damages in the sum of Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars \$800.000.00 against the defendants and their agents and employees for the facts and reasons set forth.

Jurisdiction

Jurisdiction is conferred upon this court by virtue of Title 42 United States Code, Section 1933; Title 28 United States Code, Sections 2201, 2202 and 1343 and the United States Constitution.

Class Of Plaintiff

Plaintiff, Dwight W. Kelsey, a citizen and inmate at Stillwater State Prison brings this action pursuant to the rules of civil procedure applicable to civil actions, on his own behalf against Jack Young, individually and as well as in his official capacity as commissioner of corrections for the State Of Minnesote; Robert Frickson, individually and as well as in his official capacity as warden of the Stillwater State Prison. Stillwater, Minnesota; Attorney Douglas Hall, individually and as well as in his official capacity as attorney for Legal Rights Center, Minneapolis, Minnesota; and their agents and employees.

- 1: The plaintiff in this instant cause of action was incarcerated at Stillwater
 State Prison on March 12,1971 and soon thereafter Dr. David Fogel was named
 commissioner of corrections by Governor Wendell Anderson. Governor Anderson wanted
 prison reform. Dr. David Fogel started a liberal program for prisoners and they
 were well intended. He allowed the American Indians to have their religious and
 culture group and the black inmates were allowed their Afro Culture Group and the
 white inmates were not allowed any all white group to represent them. White
 inmates are still not allowed any group activity by the department of corrections.
 That has been the rule up to the present. As soon as the Indians and Afro American
 formed their all Indian and All Afro American culture group they started to
 physically attack white inmates in packs and it has resulted in several deaths and
 hundreds of assaults and stabbings. Correctional officials have been aware of
 the racial attacks and racial problems and nothing has been done to protect white
 inmates or allow them an all white group for their protection, culture, education
 and religion.
- 2: On one occasion the plaintiff was sitting on the steps to cell hall B and a group of approximately forty Indians confronted the plaintiff and said that he could not sit on the Indian's steps. If he didn't move he would have been beaten by them. The racial problem has existed at Stillwater State Prison for years and only when the Indians and Afro Americans attacted guards in a pack were they punished severely.
- 3: The white inmates at Stillwater State Prison want an all white religion named the Church Of The White Conception and they are interested in reading Nazi and Ku Kluz Klan Literature. A Jewish Correctional Official, Ron Walters, has consored and confiscated all Nazi and Ku Kluz Klan Literature from white inmates and the department of corrections has prevented the white inmates from having an all white school and religion and deprived them of an equal amount of funds provided to Indian and Afro American Inmates for their religious and culture group.
- 4: The first problem the plaintiff had at Stillwater State Prison regarding racism and segregation began shortly after his incarceration on March 12,1971.

 The plaintiff sat in the southeast corner of the dining hall with another white

inmate, Gary Waters. Shortly after be sat down with Gary Waters he was confronted by Ray White, Indian Chief, and the plaintiff and Gary Vaters were advised that they would have to move because only Indians could sit there in that section of the dining hall. Inmate Gary Waters, at first refused to move and was threatened by the Indian Chief. The plaintiff was able to persuade Gary Waters to move because it was clear that the Indians would attack in a group. The practice of racial segregation in the dining hall by the Indians has continued up to the present. On numerous occasions the plaintiff has been witness to physical attacks by Indians on white inmates because they sat in their section of the dining hall. Most of the new white inmates are not aware that they cannot sit in the Indian Section of the dining hall and have been attacked and chased out of the Indian Section of the dining ball. The last attack on an incate by Indians for sitting in their section of the dining hall was on a black inmate. He sat in their section and refused to move. The Indians attacked him and tipped over his table. A sergeant and a couple of guards broke it up and nothing was done about it and there was no disciplinary report to the knowledge of the plaintiff. The prison administration has been aware of the racial issue for years and it appears that they have encouraged it and intentionally failed to prevent it. The courts have prevented correctional official from using corporal punishment and it is clear that if they use Indian and black inmate to attack white inmate that they cannot be accused of corporal punishment. It would be a less severe punishment if corporal punishment be restored and the guards beat white inmates under supervision of the warden or the commissioner because Indians and black irmates have been using knives and pipes to attack white inmates.

5: The protective custody unit at Stillwater State Prison has been in operation since about 1974 and 99% of the immates in the protective custody unit has been white immates. A lot of them have been attacked by Indian or black immates. White immates have been placed in the protective custody unit for racial reasons and correctional officials have done nothing to stop racial attacks on white immates. The protective custody unit is for white immates with the exception of approximately 1% black and Indian that have been forced into protective custody by their own culture group. There has never been an Afro Ameriaen or Indian forced into the protective custody unit by white immates.

- 6: Department Of Corrections officials deprive whith immates of their civil rights secured to them by the United States Constitution because Indian and Afro American Immates have been allowed to engage in the following racial practices which violate constitutional principles in that:
- A: Indians are allowed to have religious ceremonies in segregation and white inmates are not allowed to go to church services or have any culture ceromonies in the segregation section of the prison:
- B: During movies and other entertainment in the auditorium, Indian Inmates sit in segregated section of the auditorium and if white immates sit down in their section of the auditorium they are told to leave or else. If they do not leave they are assaulted and forced to move by the Indians;
- c: There were numerous telephones installed at Stillwater State Prison soon after Dr. David Fogel became commissioner of corrections and there has always been a racial issue regarding the use of the telephones because Indians and Afro Americans have controlled the telephones by intimidating white immates. On one occasion Indians took over the white immate's telephones and then Afro Americans took over the white immate's telephones from the Indians. The white immates had none for a long time. The correctional officers have been aware of the situation and have done nothing to alleviate the situation. In fact, it appears they have deliberately encouraged it. The racial issues regarding the telephone had a lot to do with the last murder. One white immate got forty years for murder and he is not guilty because the truth was suppressed about racial problems that correctional officials failed to prevent. The plaintiff has been acquainted with the racial issue that led to the last murder;
- D: There is an all Indian School for Indian Inmates that teach racial hatred and they are allowed their religious ceremonies at their school and are allowed to have recreation in the yard during school hours. White inmates are not allowed the same privileges that are provided to the Indians.
- 7: On October 18,1981, the plaintiff was given two reports at Stillwater State
 Prison for violation of rule #41 (assault) and rule #32 (disorderly conduct)
- 8: On October 21,1981, the plaintiff was found not guilty at a disciplinary hearing of violation of rule #41 (assault) and guilty as violation of rule #32, (disorderly conduct)

9: On October 22,1981, the plaintiff filed a notice of appeal with the warden upon the grounds that the institution was out of control at 10:00 A.M. on October 18,1981, at the time of the plaintiff's rule violation and the T.V. camera should have been turned on, and if the camera had been on it would have shown that the plaintiff was a victim of assault.

10: The reasons given by the disciplinary board members for finding the plaintiff guilty of violation of rule #32 were that the plaintiff's action were not the proper way to resolve such problems. The plaintiff was being choked by Indian Storm and on October 19,1981. Judge Father Tomlianovich issued a writ of babeas corpus to bring the plaintiff into her court on another matter and the plaintiff showed herthe choke mark on the plaintiff's throat. That is on the court transcript. The prison disciplinary board said that it did not matter that the Indian was choking the plaintiff. The disciplinary board have been aware of the racial attacks on white inmates and have done nothing to remedy the situation. The racial problems hearing and attacks on whiteinmates raised at the plaintiff's disciplinary have been going on for years and the department of correction and the disciplinary board have done nothing because Attorney Douglas Hall, defendant in this cause of action had got the Indians off by intimidating disciplinary board members and correctional officials by threat of court action in the Federal Courts. The Indians and Afro American get their rights in the courts but have no regard for rights of others when they get their rights. The problem raised in this cause of action has been going on for years.

- ii: The first problem with Indian Storm started because of a disagreement with another Indian who was using the Indian Group and Inmate Storm to provide the muscle for him, on the plaintiff. The problem with Indian Storm continued for several months. They don't fight one on one but attack in packs.
- 12: Inmate Storm had been walking in the plaintiff's cell without permission and had been making racial remarks about his former wife. When the plaintiff demanded that he stop making insulting remarks Indian Storm said "Fuck you old man. I can say anything that I want to you". Then he grabbed the plaintiff by the throat. Inmate Storm feels that he has a right to do anything he wants to a white man because of the Indian Culture Group at the prison has been backing their members for years and have physically attacked white inmates if there is any disagreement.

American Inmates and the Indians have their own special school that teaches racial hatred. It is necessary for this court be to order that correctional officials give white immates equal treatment and allow white immates to have their own all white school or in the alternative the dining hall, Indian School and all groups be completely intergrated according to the civil reghts act passed by congress.

14: On October 18,1981, the plaintiff left cell # 558 A cell hall and proceeded down the hallway to the gym to go out to the yard. It was on a Sunday and the yard is open at 9:30 A.M. if the weather conditions are suitable to the watch lieutenant. The plaintiff made it to the stairway of the gym without any problem. On the stairway Indian Storm, was loitering. As soon as Storm saw the plaintiff he made a remark about the bikers an all white group not recognized by correctional officials, at Stillwater State Prison. The remark by Storm was racially intended and he advised Storm that he does mind his own buisness and does his own time. The plaintiff went on into the gym floor and found out that the yard was closed because of weather conditions. As soon as the plaintiff found out the yard was closed he was returning to his cell and found inmate Storm lurking in the hallway and that the institution was out of control with approximately fourty immates protesting in front of the security center and not a guard in sight. The plaintiff had to pass Inmate Storm to get to his cell and requested that he stop making remarks in the future and advised him that he had been doing it for several months and didn't want anymore of it. Inmate Storm then grabbed the plaintiff by the throat and a struggle started.

15: On October 21,1981, reporting officer K. Bjorkman testified at the plaintiff's disciplinary hearing. The reporting officer K. Bjorkman, testified that when he unlocked the side door to the hospital that the plaintiff was struggling with Inmate Storm approximately ten feet from the door in front of the radiator. On his report he claimed that the plaintiff had Inmate Storm up against the wall. The report was intended to show that the plaintiff assaulted Inmate Storm. During the hearing, after questioning by the plaintiff, the reporting officer admitted the radiator was in front of the window and that the plaintiff did not have him in front of the wall. The reporting officer also admitted that he was inside of the security center and came out to unlock the door to the hospital and did not see the first part of the struggle. He also testified that there were approximately forty inmates protesting in front of the security center. There was no guard in

the hallway when most of the struggle was going on and Inmate Storm had the plaintiff by the throat with his fingers digging in to crush cartilege in the plaintiff's throat, which if successful would have resulted in the plaintiff's death. There was no guard present to free the plaintiff until the reporting officer appeared at the struggle. The disciplinary board felt that it was okay to assault the white plaintiff and released inmate Storm like they have released other Indian and Afro-Americans that have assaulted white inmates, even though there was evidence of bodily harm on the plaintiff and no bodily harm on Storm.

- 16: When white inmates have been under attack by Indians or Afro-Americans it has been the policy of correctional officials to place the white inmate in the protective custody unit at Stillwater State Prison, which is punishment. The white inmates are visited by a psychologist and that are told by the prison psychologist to face their problems and not run from them; yet, when white inmates have faced Indians or Afro-Americans the security squad will stop white inmates from trying to resolve their problems with the Indian and Afro-Americans.
- 17: For several years white inmates at Stillwater State Prison have brought their request for an all white culture group to the defendants, Jack Young and Robert Erickson and their underlings. White inmates have been told by the defendants and their underlings that white people have no culture and that Indian and Afro-American Inmates have a culture and that only them are allowed a culture group at Stillwater State Prison. It is necessary for this court to declare that white inmates are members of the Caucasoid ethnic division of the human species that have a culture that is a behavior and an expression that is characteristic of a white culture and that their intellectual and artistic activity is their culture.

19: On December 2,1970, the plaintiff was held in the Hennepin County Jail on the charge of attempted murder in the first degree and was subsequently found guilty and sentenced to 20 years. The plaintiff contacted Attorney Douglas Hall from . legal rights center, Minneapolis, Minnesota and was seeking legal assistance from bim for his trial held on January 1971 at Minneapolis, Minnesota. The plaintiff was advised by Attorney Douglas Hall's Legal Rights Center that he could not help the plaintiff because they just ran out of funds. There were other white prisoners that got the same story from Attorney Douglas Hell about being out of funds and that he could not provide them with legal assistance at their trial in Hennepin County. Minnesota. He continued to provide legal assistance to Indian Prisoners for their trials. At the time, the plaintiff thought that he was probably out of funds but for years he has been advising white prisoners that he is out of funds to provide them with legal assistance and he has systematically excluded white prisoners from legal assistance for their trials. After the plaintiff was sentenced to Stillwater State Prison he found that Attorney Douglas Hall provided Indian Inmates with legal assistance at the prison for their civil legal needs and defends them at their disciplinary hearings at the prison and systematically excludes white inmates from legal assistance with the same story he has given for years, that he just ran out of funds. He provides legal assistance exclusively to Indian Inmates and they feel that they can get away with just about anything at the prison and their physical attacks on white inmates have continued for years because Attorney Douglas Hall gets them off. White inmates are not given a fair hearing at their disciplinary hearings and they only have the state public defender, which has L.A.P. and L.A.M.P. and they are not able to adequately represent white inmates because of funding and lack of staff to provide assistance for all immates. Attorney Douglas Hall has the funds to represent Indian Immates at Stillwater State Prison but claims that he just ran out of funds for white innates. Attorney Douglas Hall, defendant in this cause of action, has discriminated against white prisoners and the plaintiff and his action has violated constitutional principles in systematically excluding the plaintiff and other white inmates from legal assistance.

20: A white inmete was found guilty of the last murder at Stillwater State Prison and was not guilty because the truth was suppressed by correctional officials. Correctional officials blamed him to cover up for the fact that they were aware of the racial conditions that led up to the murder and failed to prevent it. The white inmate was transferred from St. Cloud Reformatory to Stillwater State Prison after a gang of Afro-Americans jumped him and he fought back. He advised the plaintiff that he had a fight with Afro-Americans at St. Cloud and the plaintiff has found out that there were approximately seven that jumped him and it appears that it was racial and sexual. Afro-Americans have been involved in many sexual attacks on young whites and they like to do it to young whites. After the white inmate was transferred to Stillwater State Prison the plaintiff became acquainted with him and the Afro-Americans were spreading a story about him being a fairy. That story was not true. Soon after he was transferred to Stillwater State Prison an Indian approached him and told him to check in to protective custody or he would throw him off the gallery and was advised by the white inmate that he was doing too much time to check into protective custody and lose privileges. The Indian that threatened him has been beating and robbing and leading attacks on white inmates for several years and prison officials have been aware of it. It has been their policy to lock up the white inmates in the protective custody unit and allow the Indians and Afro-Americans to continue their robbing, raping and beating white inmates. The white inmate that was threatened by the Indian chose not to check into protective custody and became involved in protecting other white inmates from being beaten and robbed in A-Academic by Indians and Afro-Americans. A few days before the last murder Afro-American Inmates went to Sergeant Johnson and Lt. Ostendorf and told them that they would murder the white inmate if they didn't put the white inmate into protective custody. On the morning of the murder the white inmate went to the gym to seek a peaceful settlement with the Afro-Americans and they jumped him with weapons with the intent to murder him and he had to fight his way out to save his own life and his white companion was beaten and lost approximately 25% of his brain on the gym floor. Prison officials put all of the blame on the white inmate to cover up for the fact that they have encouraged racial attacks on white inmates for several years.

Prayer For Relief

Wherefore, plaintiff demands that this honorable court:

State Prison:

- 1: Issue a mandatory injunction that requires the defendants to integrate the dining hall at Stillwater State Prison and other areas previously segregated and provide white immates with protection, when they are integrated, from guards or from United States Marshals:
- 2: Issue an order that requires Attorney Douglas Hall to provide equal legal assistance to white immates at Stillwater State Prison and white prisoners waiting trial:
- 3: Issue a mandatory injunction that restrains the department of corrections from the use of Indian and Afro-American Inmates to attack white inmates:
- 4: Issue a mandatory injunction that requires the defendants to have religious ceremonies in the segregation section of the prison for white inmates or allow them to attend religious ceremonies of Indian Inmates with protection from the guards or United States Marshals while they attend Indian Religious Ceremonies;
 5: Issue a mandatory injunction that restrains Ron Walters an American Jew from confiscating Nasi and Ku Klux Klan Literature from white inmates at Stillwater
- 6: Issue a mandatory injunction that requires the defendants to provide white inmates with their own all white school at Stillwater State Prison or in the alternative allow white inmates to attend the Indian School at Stillwater State Prison and provide protection, for white immates, by the guards or U.S. Marshals until the Indian School is segregated with white immates;
- 7: Issue a mandatory injunction restoring corporal punishment on white immates at Stillwater State Prison and abolish the use of Afro-American and Indian Inmates to beat white inmates. The beatings on white inmates should be done by guards under the supervision of the warden or the commissioner of corrections;
- 8: Provide a prompt settlement in this controvercy and a declaration by this court that white inmates at Stillwater State Prison are members of the Caucasoid ethnic dévision of the human species that have a culture that is a behavior and an expression that is characteristic of a white culture and that their intellectual and artistic activity is their culture;
- 9: Award the plaintiff, Dwight W. Kelsey, damages in the sum of Six Hundred Thousand Dollars \$600,000.00 to compensate him for the harm he has suffered;
- 10: Award the plaintiff, Dwight W. Kelsey, punative damages in the amount of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars \$200,000;00, in order to deter the defendants, from in the future, from intentionally depriving the plaintiff of equal rights and privileges solely because he is a member of the Caucasoid ethnic division of the human

species with a white culture;

11: That this court provide any further relief that is just pursuant to the Federal Declaratory Judgment Act.



Board of Directors

At our May 18th Board of Director's Meeting - topic "By-law changes to bring Indo-Chinese aboard" also a Committee reported on other By-law changes to improve function of Legal Rights Center. Committee was chaired by Syl Davis. This was the largest turn out by the Board of Directors that I have seen in a number of years.

Changes recommended and accepted by the Board Members attending said meeting are as follows:

- (1) Under Section 2, line 10, 11 and 12 shall read as follows: Shall be representatives of the Black Community, the Indian Community, and the Latino-Chicano and the Indo-Chinese Community...
- (2) Line 14 & 15 shall read as follows:
 An equal number of Board Members to be elected from each of the Black, Indian, Latino-Chicano and four members shall be selected from the Indo-Chinese Community.
- (3) A footnote should be added at the bottom of Section 2 to indicate various languages spoken in the four groups. One of the Board of Directors attending said meeting had questions regarding this method. I, as President, stated that if this Board member felt strongly enough he should put it into writing for further discussions at our upcoming meeting.

Recommendations by Committee for By-law Changes will read as follows:

Section 3, Line 1 & 2 will read as follows:

"The Executive Committee of the Board of Directors shall be determined by the Board and the Executive Committee shall be the officers of the Corporation and other Board Members so designated.

Section 4, Line 1 & 2 shall read as follows:

Once an Executive Director has been selected and employed by the Board of Directors, he or she shall not be discharged or have his or her salary and compensation reduced without due process, including notices and hearings, and then not unless by a vote of at least three-fourths of all the members of the Board of Directors.

Enclosed you will find a post-card with the Board Members name on said card. We are asking you to mark the card Yes or No and return to Legal Rights Center. And if either of you has any questions or comments please express your concerns on said card and they will be discussed and acted upon at the upcoming meeting. Looking forward to hearing from you.

PROPOSAL FOR ADMINISTRATIVE FEES

The committee submits the following proposal for consideration by the Legal Rights Center staff and board:

- 1. That Legal Rights Center assess an administrative fee of \$50.00 for misdemeanors and \$100.00 for felonies to each client who is determined to be able to pay.
- 2. That it will be the function of the community workers to determine a client's ability to pay; to inform the client of the administrative fee; to make the initial effort to collect the fee; and to turn over the fees when they are collected to the administrator.
- 3. That it will be the duty of the administrator to keep records relating to the collection of administrative fees, both accounts received and accounts receivable; to have custody and control of the funds received; to make appropriate efforts to collect the fees according to ordinary business practice; and to have general supervision of the system for collection and administration of administrative fees.
- 4. That administrative fee shall not be assessed to any client who is determined to be unable to afford the fee.
- 5. The fee shall be due at or before the first appearance, but the community worker shall have discretion to allow further time for the payment of all or part of the fee.
- 6. The administrative funds, when collected, shall be assigned to the general funds of L.R.C.
- 7. The collection of an administrative fee shall in no way negate or detract from the right of L.R.C. to seek payment of litigation expenses from clients who are financially able to bear the costs of the expenses of litigation of their cases.

Contractual Obligations

The attorneys on committee have reviewed the contract of L.R.C. with Hennepin County and are of the opinion that nothing in this proposal is inconsistent with the provisions of the contract. Specifically, the committee believes this provision is permitted by Section 1.d. of the contract, which states:

d. Except as otherwise provided herein, Contractor shall maintain in all respects its present control over the autonomy with respect to:

(1) The application of its intake procedures:

(2) The methods, times, means and personnel for furnishing purchased services to eligible recipients.

Since there are no provisions in the contract which provide otherwise, it appears that this proposal is consistent with the contract. The committee was not asked to consider whether the proposal is consistent with the stipulations and conditions of the grants or contributions received by LRC, and therefore does not express any opinion on that question.

Dear Ike:

Here are my recommendations for the investment of the \$150,000 McKnight grant.

First \$50,000 for 1982 keep in savings or spend.

Second \$50,000. Buy U. S. Treasury Bills due December, 1982 with a 15 1/8% coupon priced at \$100.24 to yield 14.07% to maturity in December of 1982.

Third \$50,000. Buy U. S. Treasury Bills due December, 1983 with a 13% coupon priced at \$98.8 to yield 14.14% to maturity in December of 1983.

These investments would maximize the yield, give us maximum security and have funds available for the beginning of each year recognizing that January is our toughest month.

I hope the Board will approve these recommendations. The Treasury Bills should be purchased from a bank bond department where we have a checking account so that interest and the proceeds can be transferred to our checking account at maturity.

At the on-set, I requested Terry to provide the check journal. Having been presented with the journal, I established a time frame to be analyzed beginning Jan. 1, 1982 thru Feb. 26, 1982.

Journal entries selection were random with emphasis on non-personnel expenditures although not limited to. The sequence of review will be stated as it actually occured and the draft notes will be attached.

During the discussion summarizing the brief review, Terry Lindall presented a memorandum in which he contended that an improper transaction has taken place regarding the McKnight revolving loan. In the memo, he calls for an investigation and subsequent to the meeting, disclosed that to me that he had issued a memo to the Board during the last L.R.C. meeting, relevant to his assessment of the financial accounting system which was forwarded to Ike Watkins, but did not reach the Board members during the last Board meeting.

During the review process and prior finance meetings as well as board meetings, there seems to be a serious problem in that Lindall does not have full control of the finances of the process and that Ralph Crowder is also involved in check disbursements, entries, and reporting of financial activity.

At the board of directors meeting last February, I was asked by Doug Hall to inquire of Dave Nasby about whether the McKnight Revolving Loan Fund should continue to be listed on the balance sheet as a liability or whether we had the right to transfer the \$25,000 into our general fund. Dave indicated that it was his understanding at the original meeting with McKnight that the McKnight revolving Loan Fund was to remain listed on our books in perpetuity.

It had been Ralph Crowder's position that this McKnight Revolving Loan Fund was to be absorbed by the general fund at some point. In that apparent belief, but without supporting documentation from McKnight and without authorization from the executive director or the board, Ralph authorized in late 1980 the transfer of the McKnight Loan into the general fund.

I have been discussing the status of the McKnight
Loan Fund with Doug Hall and Ralph Crowder on several
occasions during the past year. But until discussion with
Dave Nasby I had no hard evidence that any improper
transaction had taken place. However, since all material
and verbal evidence indicates that no transfer of the
McKnight Loan fund into the general fund was approved
by McKnight, it is my opinion that an improper transaction
involving a large sum has taken place. The possible ramifications
of this may be seen in similar situations in other organizations
which have resulted in public scandal and lossof funding.

The saving grace of this situation is that our treasurer, Bill Koenen, who was pursuing the matter of this McKnight Loan Fund transaction, signed the questionable federal and state reports for 1980 with the legend "under review." It is

these certified 1980 reports which reflect the improper transfer of the McKnight Loan Fund. Because Bill wisely signed the reports in this fashion, it will show any outside organization that the board is alert and is able to take proper action to keep its house in order.

In my memo of March 16, 1982 regarding the McKnight Revolving Loan Fund, I stated my belief that Ralph Crowder had made an improper transaction in late 1980 transfering the McKnight Revolving Loan money into the General Fund. This opinion was based upon a letter from Ralph in October 1980 to Peter Heegaard verifying the existence of such a loan fund and the subsequent absence of its being listed in our 1980 audit. I had assumed that first, the liability for this loan fund was listed on our books at the time of Ralph's Alberto O. Miera, Jr. letter to Peter Heegaard and that, second, a transaction had taken place between that time and the audit which removed this liability from our books. Since Doug Hall disclaims authorizing any such transaction, and since Ralph Crowder is the only other person on staff who could have legally authorized such a transaction, I deduced that Ralph Crowder had authorized such a transaction moving the McKnight Loan Fund Liability into our General Fund. I believe that on the basis of the evidence it was a fair deduction. And since after several discussions with Ralph Crowder this was not denied and in light of his continued insistence that it was his understanding that the McKnight Loan Fund was at some point to be transfered into the General Fund, the conclusion that Ralph authorized such a transfer seemed valid.

After a meeting with Ralph Crowder, Doug Hall and Bill Koenen, it was discovered by looking at our 1980 and 1979 audited reports that no recording of such a loan fund liability appeared on those reports. Therefore, it appears that the impropriety was the fact that Ralph knew of such a liability and failed to either have such a liability listed on our books or to inform the auditors of such a liability. This is just as serious a matter as transfering the McKnight Loan Fund into the General Fund without proper authorization.

I hope that the board will have this matter looked into since have facts remain clear:

1) there was a Mcknight Loan Fund liability

2) it should have been recorded on our books and have appeared in our audit

3) it was not recorded in our books and did not appear in our audit

4) the failure of item three caused it to appear that our General fund was much larger that it actually was

No. 1 To my knowledge the Administration has not provided the Board of Directors with proper Data of work

Such as; statistics of the Clients that Legal Rights Center, Inc. has handled and the final results. Secondly, there is a lack of documentations from the Community Workers regarding their case loads. And last, but by no means least, the Board has not received a financial report for a period of 3 months. I might add, of the 3 concerns that I have mentioned in this paragraph, the financial report is the only one that the Board has had some type of report on during the 10 months that I have been Chairman.

NO. 2 Communications and Credibility:

Procedure to Lease said Building at 2110 Nicollet Avenue South in Minneapolis is an example of communications and credibility gaps between the Administration and the Board of Directors of the Legal Rights Center, Inc.

I do know that Administration did, in fact, have ample time to notify the Board of Directors of the intentions of a proposed move. In accommodations, the Board would have had time to further investigate the conditions pending to justify a decision to accept or reject the proposed move in the best interest of Legal Rights Center, Inc. Consequently, I will describe the involvement that has transpired thus far. See below;

On February 16, 1982, at a Board of Directors meeting, the subject concerning a move brought up. Prior to this meeting, the Board of Directors had not been made aware or given any knowledge of the proposed intent to move the Legal Rights Center offices to said location of 2110 Nicollet Av. S., Minneapolis.

Many questions were raised, such as; "Why the move"?, etc ...

Answers given were: Legal Rights Center, Inc. did not have a Lease at the present location at 808 E. Franklin Ave., and may be evicted anytime or the building may be torn down. (Re: Redevelopement program)

Q. By Board of Dir: What is the time limit that the Board of Directors is allowed to make a decision?

Ans. By Administ: Administration replied that a decision was needed by the following day and recommended that the Executive Board should meet and resolve this matter.

At the end of this question and answer session, I, as Chair, explained to Administration that the Executive Board could not make a final decision to resolve this matter, but could recommend it to the full Board of Directors. At this time Administration recommended that the Executive Board would meet at said location of 2110 Nicollet Ave. the following day to discuss the placing of a deposit of \$1277.09 to hold options open until March-1, 1982 with stipulations attached. The stipulations attached would so state the full Board of Directors would have the opportunity to investigate further and if the full Board made the decision not to lease said huilding located at 2110 Nicollet Ave., Minneapolis the full deposit of \$1277.09 would be refunded to Legal Rights Center; Inc.

On Feb.17th, 1982(the following day)all Executive Board members bet as planted at said location of 2110 Nicollet Avenue and were quite surprised to learn that a deposit of \$1277.09 had already been made without any authorization from the Board of Directors or any Board members. All of the Board members were quite alarmed and there was an unanimous feeling that there was an attempt to use the Board of Directors as no more than a rubber stemp.

After some discussions the conclusions were that if the information which had been obtained from Administration implying that Legal Rights Center had limited time to vacate its present premises were true, then we had no alternative but to go along and follow through at a later date. It was suggested that I should contact the Owner of our present site at 808 E. Franklin Ave. of which I did the following day. Mr. Paul Taylor, owner of the building at 808 East Franklin, was very cooperative and in our conversation he informed me that this was the first that he had heard that Legal Rights Center had any intent to move. He also indicated that Legal Rights Center were good tenants and the reason that a Lease had not been signed was because the Legal Rights Center, Inc. had not asked for one. He also said that he was willing to inspect the property(and it is my understanding that he did this) and then follow up with any repairs, painting, screening of the windows, cleaning up the bathrooms and whatever is needed, etc., etc...

A copy of Mr. Taylor's letter is attached. (Enclosure)

There appears to be a difference of opinion of what the Board of Directors means by <u>LINE OF CREDIT</u> and the way that Staff interprets it.

Regarding Proposals submitted for funding Legal Rights Center in '82, I suggested to Administration that the Indo-Chinese program should not be included as I felt that it may be misleading at this time since we do not have the Indo-Chinese aboard. However, I felt it was wise to seek out new funding sources for seed money with the possibility of including the Indo-Chinese program. But apparently Administration felt differently and included the Indo-Chinese in their proposals. After reading the letter from the McKnight Foundation I get impression that they have the impression that Legal Rights already has Indo-Chinese aboard, which is not true, and we may have to go back to this Foundation for assistance at a later date.

NO.3 Recommendations:

In conclusion I feel that the Board of Directors should take any actions necessary to assure that such nonsense does not continue in the future.

The question has arisen as to whether Resop Realty can retain the \$1,277.09, which was placed as a damage deposit for the premises at 2110 Nicollet Avenue South.

The pertinent portion of the lease agreement states: "Lessee shall place a deposit of \$1,227.09 with Resop Realty Inc., to be held by them for 2110 Nicollet Avenue, limited partnership as a damage deposit" (Emphasis added).

The lease does not state that the damage deposit will be forfeited in the event that the Legal Rights Center fails to rent the premises or even by what date an agreement is to be reached. The \$1,227.09 was not placed as the first months rent nor as a sum that could be characterized as liquidated damages.

While Mr. Born in his March 18, 1982, letter to you characterizes the damage deposit as a good faith deposit and then states that it has been forfeited, he cannot by means of a letter change the language of the lease (which is a contract).

Since the \$1,227.09 was specifically placed as a damage deposit, and there has been no damage to 2110 Nicollet Avenue, it is my opinion that the damage deposit of \$1,227.09 should be returned with interest.

At our last Board meeting, which was held Tuesday, February 16th, I was informed that I should call for an Executive Board Meeting which I complied. The topic to be discussed was the leasing of said building located at 2110 Nicollet Avenue South, Minneapolis.

The said meeting was held Friday, February 19th. The purpose of this meeting was to authorize placing a deposit of \$1,227.09 as a showing of "good faith money" to negotiate further. The Executive Directors arrived at a conclusion that the request of \$1,227.09 should be deposited with the stipulations that the full Board of Directors would have to agree on the leasing of said building. If the full Board of Directors could not agree, then said "food faith money" would be returned to Legal Rights Center, Inc.

Concerns of Board of Director Members:

Some of said Board Members were not aware of any intentions of any type of move until February 19th, the date said meeting was called. Other Board members were concerned that there was no copies of the said lease available to them, and others felt that staff had ample time to notify all Board members of said intentions.

Instructions the Executive Committee laid out for the Chair.

- (a) Meet with the owner of said building now occupied by Legal Rights Center at 808 E. Franklin Avenue, Minneapolis, MN 55404 to determine lease arrangements that Legal Rights Center has had in the past.
- (b) Call a Special Meeting of full Board of Directors to make the final decision of this matter. The Special Meeting is set for Thursday, February 25, 1982 at 6:00 P.M. The FINAL decision must be made by March 1, 1982 in order to comply with said arrangements.

Opinion

Also it is my feeling that Legal Rights Center should move to a different location and I feel that any Board Member who attends meetings at Legal Rights Center can understand why a move is necessary. That is not to say that the Board should be pressured into a move. I happen to feel that there is enough expertise, dedication and concern to make the proper decision. I, as on person with one vote, intend to see that such an important matter as this is not handled in this manner in the future.

I might add that the staff was under the impression that the Executive Board could make a final decision on this matter. I would like to refer the Staff to Page 2, Section 3 of the By-Laws.

DEALING WITH AGENDA ITEMS:

Item #1

Item No.1; has no relations to any of the other 3 items listed below.

Item #2: Freezing of Legal Rights Center, Inc funds

- (a) No Legal Rights funds can be frizen by anyone other than through the proper procedure. If the Board of Directors wishes to freeze funds, the Treasurer has access to the financial records. After the Treasurer has studied Said records and he or she feels there is misuse, he or she may present that information to the Board of Directors. If the Board of Directors, likewise, agrees that there is misuse then action can be started.
- (b) It then becomes a legal problem and it may be necessary, but it is my feelings at that point that an Attorney with expertise in this field should be called in to advise on said matters.
- (c) Funds can be frozen temporary until there is an audit of the books or ,if needed, any other person with financial expertise who can verify if the accusations are legitimate or not.

Item #3: Clarification of PAYROLL process

Article 4 of the Legal Rights Center, Inc. makes it very clear of this process. The second line in Article 4 states clearly that the Executive Director, he or she, shall have complete and total administrative responsibility for the operation of Legal Rights Center, Inc. and that would include structuring policy to deal with payroll process.

Item #4: Role of Legal Rights Center Treasurer

Article 5, listed under D, states that the Treasurer supervises receipts, custody, deposit and disbursement of all funds of the Corporation and the keeping of all such things. So you see that Article 4 makes it clear that the Executive Director structures such procedures and that Article 5, section D, states that the Treasurer is to supervise and see to it that the policy is carried out.
