





OBITUARY OF

Born in that section of the "Clover Covered and Blossom Bedecked" State of Kentucky, in the rugged hillside City of Orangeburg. He was the first born of five children--two brothers and three sisters, the happy culmina-tion of the blessing of Holy wedlock in the union of his Sainted Father and Mother, Isom and Anne Ford. Of the five children, two sisters preceded him in death, there yet survives two brothers and one sister.

Under the Christian influence and parental guidance of Godly parents, he grew and developed, completing his academic training in the public schools of his Native State.

In the early years of young manhood, he entered Historic Fisk University of Nashville, Tennessee, there pursuing his college training with honor and distinction that gave definite evidences of unusual ability and pronounced scholarship. Obsessed with courageous ambition, he studiously continued his preparation, graduating, with signal honor, from Beloite College in Wisconsin, and later with distinction completing his courses and emerging as an honor graduate of the University of Chicago, and an active member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity.

Upon his graduation he entered upon the duties as Secretary to the Dean of the University of Chicago, thereby serving, acceptably, his Alma Mater in a way that brought credit to his race and generation.

At this point in his young and eventful life he became concious of his Divine Call to the Gospel Ministry, and rendered his service in assisting the Ministry of the World's Largest Baptist Church, Mt. Olivet in Chicago.

Later he yielded to requests made upon him and was named President of Leland University of Louisiana, and also served as President of the State College in Kentucky, in each institution making a lasting and effective contribution to the cause of Christian Education, so that today there are thousands who are valiantly serving our people in the field of Education as a result of his Tutorship. They sat at the feet of Gamaliel, yet to this successful and energetic young man there continued the urge, the inner conciousness to labor in the Master's Vineyard, make full and further use of his stewardship. And, in Christian submission he heeded the Divine Call and gave his life and effort to the stewardship of the Christian Ministry. As such, he served as Pastor of Bethesda Baptist Church in Chicago, First Baptist Church in Los Angeles, California, Zion Baptist Church in Denver, Colorado, at each charge giving full proof of his ministry and zealously sustaining his well earned reputation as a scholarly, cultured and consecrated Christian Minister of the Gospel of our Christ.

And then, thirty-six years ago he was called to the Pastorate of Bethel Baptist Church in Jacksonville, Florida, where during all these years he has labored and served as Pastor, Brother and Friend. Twenty-five years ago he was joined in Holy Wedlock to his surviving widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Ford, who, as a loving help mate, shared with him his joys, sorrows, disappointments, sacrifices, trials and afflictions, remaining helpfully near and dear to and with him, with care and comfort, to the very last minute of his life.

The coming of Dr. Ford to Bethel Baptist Institutional Church has meant thirty-six years of progressive Church growth and development. Not only has he served Bethel Church, but his services have extended far beyond denominational boundaries and he has pastored the entire City of Jacksonville, and influenced the people of the State of Florida. He has valiantly and courageously led our people, and because of his sterling

character has weilded a mighty powerful influence in the interracial affairs of both races. He was especially endowed and benificiently privileged to speak for his people to the people of the other group, and they heard, respected and heeded his pleadings.

He was active in everything that made for the uplift and betterment of his people, responding to every call, and at the time of his death, was directing as Co-Chairman all of the varied activities of our people in the work of Civilian Dofense--a work so vitally important to everyone during this world-wide conflict of War-Distruction, suffering and death. Many there are among us who have been elevated to prominence by reason of his influence, using his righteous character to serve their selfish ends. His work for our institutions of learning, especially Florida Normal at St. Augustine, where he served thirty years as Chairman of the Trustee Board, also Home for the Aged, Parental Home for Girls and Boys, Tubercular Rest home and many other Institutions of loving care, remains a matter of historic record.

He was gentle, unassuming, yet courageous, cheerful and sympathetic, sharing our sorrows, comforting in our distress, and from his heart there involuntarily gushed an over flow of tears for those bowed in grief. He lived to serve his Master by serving his fellow men.

Enfeebled, broken in health, burdened with weighty responsibilities, he sought a brief period of rest and relaxation in the home of his friends, Mr. and Mrs. Marion Hawk, in the quaint old town of Dothan, Alabama, and while there, accompanied by his faithful and loving wife, he, Dr. Ford, like the venerable Patriach of Biblical History, heard a call, recognized the voice of his Master, as with Divine Providence he was admonished "Dr. Ford give now an account of Thy Stewardship, Thou canst Be Stewart No Longer", Our Pastor, Brother and Friend heeded the call, was speedily conveyed to his home, where, after a brief, painless interim, he late in the afternoon of Monday, August 9, 1943, passed on to his reward, leaving to us the treasured memory of a life well spent in the uplift of his people and the advancement of the Kingdom of our Christ in the World.
