Butterfly and her girl friends arrive, soon the horde of relatives appear. The quaint ceremony is consummated. The festivities are interrupted by The Bonze, Butterfly's uncle, who has learned that his niece has turned Christian. He persuades the relatives and friends to renounce the fair renegade, and the two lovers are left alone.

Three years pass. The money left by Pinkerton is nearly gone. Suzuki, the faithful servant, is not as certain as her mistress that Pinkerton will return. Sharpless visits her to read a letter which he has received from his friend. Butterfly misunderstands the letter and thinks her husband is on the way. She proudly exhibits her tiny son. Trouble. A gun sounds from the harbor. The United States gunboat has arrived. Flowers are strewn about the room. Twilight fades to darkness. Butterfly, Suzuki and the baby keep vigil at holes in the shosi to catch a glimpse of the returning Pinkerton.

Dawn finds the faithful Butterfly still waiting at the shosi. Suzuki and the baby have fallen asleep. Butterfly awakens Suzuki and carries the boy out of the room. Pinkerton, Sharpless and Goro arrive and beg the startled Suzuki not to call Butterfly. Suzuki catches sight of a strange woman in the garden and learns she is Kate Pinkerton, the American wife of the Lieutenant. For the sake of the tiny boy she promises to break the news to her mistress. Butterfly bursts into the room only to find the strange woman whom she knows intuitively to be her doom, "Death with honor is better than life with dishonor." She reads this legend upon the dagger which removed her father from life. With it she ends her unhappy existence even as the call of the remorseful Pinkerton is heard.

In form, the symphony is original and highly effective. consists of four secticas which follow one another without pause so the worl has the effect of one great movement. There is, moreover, a rela ip be ween many of the themes of the different parts. Thus the subject of utroe vetion reappears in the Romanza, and the principal motive of the first o becomes 'e groundwork of the chief subject of the Finale.

"Stanczyk, the Jester," Symphonic Scherzo, Op. 1 Ludomir Rozycki

Ludomir Rozycki belongs to the group of composers called "Mloda Polska" (Young Poland) together with Karol Szymanowski-outstanding modernist of our time, and M. Karlowicz.

In style, Rozycki is inclined toward the descriptive and dramatic in music. He is the composer of several operas and ballets, chamber music, piano concerto, and symphonic poems. In his orchestral music Rozycki writes "al fresco" seeking not the formal musical developments but rather bringing color and contrast into bold

relief.

"The Jester" was inspired by a painting done by the famous Polish artist, Jan Matejko. Matejko brought to the canvas his impression of the historically noted Stanczyk, a jester of the 16th century in the court of Sigmund the Old. King of Poland. Rozycki, in turn, cr ated the musical impression of this court clown by composing a symphonic scherzo, in which Rozycki reveals Stanczyk's reputed ability to relate biting truths concerning his superiors, cloaking his utterances with his fool's mantle.

"Poem of Ecstasy," Op. 54 . . Alexander Nicholaevich Scriabin

There are three divisions in this sympnonic poem: "His soul in the orgy of love"; "The realization of a fantastic dream"; "The glory of his own art."

Scriabin (1871-1915) was a modern Russian composer whose first prominence was gained as a pianist, but whose reputation as a performer was soon overshadowed by the notoriety arising from the discussion of his transcendental modernism in composition. As a composer he began to develop some highly original views which in his later compositions he put into practice in a work entitled, "Prometheus, a Poem of Fire." A feature of this work was the play of multi-

colored lights thrown upon a screen and accompanying the music.

This work, written in 1913, was preceded five years earlier by his "Poem of Ecstasy," the basic idea of which is the ecstasy of untrammeled action, the joy in creative activity. To a friend, who visited him during the period when he was working on his "Poem of Ecstasy," the Russian master stated that in this composition he was endeavoring to express something of the emotional (and therefore musically communicable) side of his philosophy of life, "Scriabin," said this friend, "is neither a pantheist nor a theosophist, yet his creed includes ideas related to each of these schools of thought."

Though Russian, Scriabin, more yet than Tschaikowsky, is a musical cosmopolitan. It is the Russian within him which brings such extraordinary fire of emotion to a new feeling of romanticism. To his art indeed the description of "musical mysticism" may be applied. Scriabin follows his own line of thought, philosophi-

cally and musically.

JERZY BOJANOWSKI

Conductor of the National Opera and Philharmonic Orchestra of Warsaw, Poland

Jerzy Bojanowski who makes his formal debut as Guest Conductor of the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra before Symphony Patrons and Subscribers in a special concert this evening and again next Sunday afternoon for the Fourth Concert of the regular Popular Series, is one of Poland's most distinguished conductors of symphony and opera.

He was conductor of the Opera and Philharmonic Society of Warsaw as well as Posen for many years, and is famous in Dresden, Prague and other Continental cities through his frequent appearances as guest conductor. Four years ago he was sent to this country by his government as its musical representative at the Century of Progress Exposition at Chicago, where he presented the outstanding works of his countrymen as well as other composers with the official exposition symphony orchestra, scoring an unqualified success.

He conducted our Orchestra on its recent Northwest Tour, being accorded an ovation at each of the four concerts directed by him. Last Wednesday evening he scored another great success with the Orchestra in a concert at St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minn.

Program Notes

Prelude and Fugue, in D major Bach-Respigh

Bach's greatest organ works were written during the period of his residence at Weimar where he was court organist. The data as to the exact time of composition of his major organ works is very meager. In a general way we know only that they fall into two distinct groups, those of the earlier and those of the later period. The "Prelude and Fugue in D major," played on this occasion belongs to the earlier group and is considered the masterpiece of Bach's youth. In the words of Spitta, the authoritative Bach biographer, this Prelude and Fugue is "one of the most dazzlingly beautiful of all the master's organ works." To this comment, James G. Heller, writing for the Cincinnati programs, adds, "It possesses a remarkable combination of Bach's dignity with a certain careless gaiety, and even abandon. It is a bravura piece too, especially the fugue, which afforded many opportunities for the display of Bach's pedal technique."

The orchestration of this work is by the distinguished Italian composer, Ottorino Respighi, who dedicated it to Fritz Reiner under whose direction it had its premier performance March 14, 1930, with the Cincinnati Symphony.

Symphony No. 4, in D minor, Op. 120 . . Robert Schumann

Although published as No. 4, this is really the second of Schumann's four symphonies. It was written in 1841, shortly after the completion of his first symphony and had its initial performance in December of that year by the Gewandhaus Orchestra at Leipzig. According to a statement by Brahms, the composer was dissatisfied with his work and decided upon its complete revision. Eleven years passed before this revision took place, Schumann making many changes in the scoring as well as structurally. In its new form the symphony met


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DAD'S DAY
