The meeting was short consisting of the usual dissenting opinions on the subject under discussion and the final outcome. It was decided by a vote that we give a dance next week while the decorations are still up (if the Woman's Guild will be so kind as to leave them so) and a committee was duly appointed consisting of three: Barbara Roome, Marjorie Melgren, and Clara O. Mrs. Ebel, Mrs. Gurney, Antoinette Hoffman, the Brants, & Louise Pepin, very kindly offered their homes to the Y. P. for the evening of May 21.

On Sunday, October second, we were very glad to welcome to the Y. P. D. Miss Carr and Miss Miller who will act as advisors of the Fellowship and work in the place of Miss Ebel, whom we are very sorry to have lost.

Supper was served by Barbara Boone and Alice Fox. During about fifteen pre-meeting minutes those present lifted to their voices in several Y. P. D. songs. Nobody really knew them as they only sung on an average of only once a year. After the devotional service led by Father Ebel, he took us on a pilgrimage through the church. 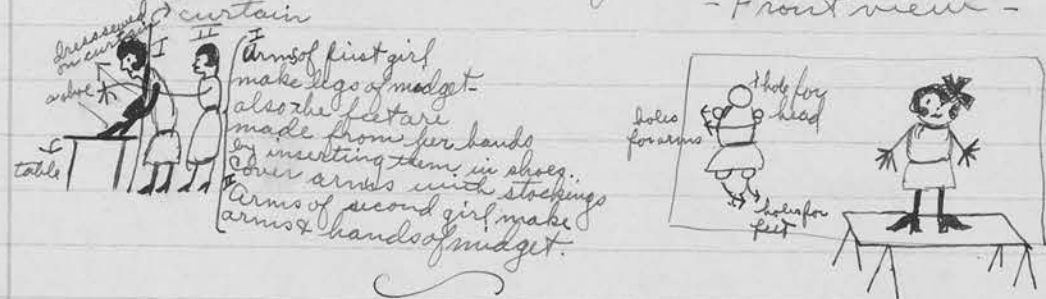
