01610 - General Election Debate funds are up \$15,000 are up from two years ago.

01620 - Voter Guide Sales were up \$10,000.

17000 - In the Public Interest P&M money is being paid in installments. The expenses have been high as representatives from League attended a training in Chicago.

Voter Service income is up \$81,000 from two years ago. October and November will show significant expenses being paid out of the grant funds. This was a very successful year in raising money for election activities and consequently, the EF is in very good shape.

Since the October 14 Board meeting, money has been received from American Medical Systems, \$500; Ceredian, \$1,000; Gannett/Kare 11, \$2,500 for Judges study; MN Mutual Foundation, \$1,000; MN State Bar Foundation, \$3,000 for CIA/HTMD; Star Tribune Foundation, \$2,500; West Group, \$5,000. Total \$15,500.

It was reported that there are 10 applicants for the Director of Development position.

FutureTrek: One goal of FutureTrek is to develop major strategies for approaching funders. There are no major projects planned except the Study Circles and it will be determined if there are significant projects to develop a major 2000 campaign. A concern was expressed that a lot of the emphasis in FutureTrek deals with the LWVMN and the funding for most of the projects are for EF projects. The funding can still be raised for EF work and the LWVMN will still have to address funding issues.

It is hoped that projects will go into the next budget. Some of these might include LOTT, the Study Circles, an Election Institute (Joan Growe).

Local League memberships continue to drop. Leadership is a real concern for many LLs. Is the future for LLs with state units? State units are administered by the State League and they are not allowed to act locally. Again, how do we attract younger members? It was suggested that a consultant be hired to examine how the State League works and interacts with LLs. There may be a need to have an outsider examine how the League operates and see if there are not better ways of running the organization.

There will be more investigation regarding a Voter Service project connected with Joan Growe. There were questions whether the project should be named for one person and what should be the focus.

The LWVUS Diversity Toolkit was recommended and should be used to promote diversity in Leagues.

Annual Appeal: It was estimated that the Annual Appeal is nearing \$40,000. It is felt that the appeal is on target. There is money that has come in that has not been processed. The goal is \$55,000.

The meeting adjourned at 9:50 p.m.

LWVMNEF PORTFOLIO: Immigration Study Circles

TITLE OF PROJECT: Changing Faces, Changing Communities

PURPOSE OF PROJECT:

We will talk about immigration, race and all the issues that come with immigration, such as jobs, schools and language differences, because this is a part of our everyday lives. It is also a focus of much recent public debate and legislation.

After the 1992 civil unrest in Los Angeles, the country woke up to these issues. Many wondered if people from different races and cultures could live and work together in a cooperative, positive manner. Many of the people who lived in Los Angeles got together in focus groups, sponsored by the National Civic League, to look for ways to stop these violent flare-ups from reoccurring.

According to *Changing Faces, Changing Communities*, the Los Angeles focus groups found that conflict existed at many levels.

There was conflict:

- · Between races and cultures
- Within races and cultures
- Between those who spoke different languages
- · Between those competing for jobs.

Although the immigration picture in the towns and cities of Minnesota is much different than in Los Angeles, immigration affects all of us, wherever we live in the United States. This Study Circle project will help Minnesotans do the same things they wanted to do in Los Angeles in 1992.

It will help Minnesotans:

- · Talk honestly and positively
- Take local action
- Build communities
- Change government policy.

DETAILS OF PROJECT:

The LWVMNEF will establish a planning committee with several sub-committees including, for example, media, action plan, documentation/evaluation, recruitment, kick-off and fundraising. The recruitment committee will work on securing broad-based community participation. The personnel will include a project director. The project should be approved at the January 1999 board meeting. During December 1998 and January 1999, the LWVMNEF will develop a proposal for seed money. Starting in January, the LWVMNEF will identify sponsoring organizations and form coalitions. These will be statewide and local committees. During the early part of 1999, the LWVMNEF will select participating communities. First, a selection method must be established. Then requests will go out for proposals to local Leagues.

Timeline:

Fall/Winter 1998-1999: Setting goals, planning, forming coalitions/co-sponsors, raising money.

April 1999: Kickoff at the state Convention.

Fall 1999: The statewide pilot program begins.

Fall/Winter 1999-2000: Local community projects are identified.

March/April 2000: Community discussions.

May 2000: Final report, action, evaluation (action means outcomes, i.e. school

programs, education, community programs)

TOTAL PROJECT BUDGET: \$50,000 to \$75,000

Barbara Stuhler is seeking funding for the manuscript formatting of the book For the Record, a documentary history designed as a companion piece to In the Public Interest: The League of Women Voters, 1920-1970, by Louise M. Young. (See reverse for more background information on the project.)

From the beginning, this documentary history was planned to bring to the attention of scholars and other interested parties, the resources available in the League Papers in the Library of Congress. Stuhler came to the League last year to ask the LWVMNEF to be the fiscal agent for her request to the Minnesota Humanities Commission. We must have given her preliminary review approval. Sally Sawyer signed the Humanities grant proposal on 2/26/98. However, we cannot find any documentation showing that preliminary review or approval was given at a subsequent board meeting. At this meeting, we are asking for that approval. Barbara would like to submit the request to the Elmer L. and Eleanor J. Andersen Foundation.

4. PROJECT SUMMARY

The documentary history will be a companion piece to In the Public Interest: The League of women Voters, 1920-1970 by Louise M. Young with the assistance of Ralph A. Young, Jr. This history - the only comprehensive League history in print - was published in 1989 by the Greenwood Press in Westport, Connecticut as part of a series on Contributions in American Studies, edited by Robert H. Walker. From the beginning of the project, an accompanying documentary history was planned in order to bring to the attention of scholars, as well as other interested parties, the rich resources available from the collection of League Papers in the Library of Congress. The deaths of the two principals put the project on hold until I agreed early in 1996 to undertake the task. In 1950 the Library of Congress accepted the League Papers for use by students of social and political history. The papers weighed more than two tons and comprised the largest single collection of non-governmental papers in the Manuscript Division. They contain a valuable historical record of the social, economic, and political life of the nation in the twentieth century and portray the efforts of an important, well-respected, and influential women's organization to shape public policy. Of primary importance, however, was the League's continuing commitment to the basic precept of a democratic society - an informed and active citizenry -- and its vast array of educational programs designed to advance the knowledge and participation of citizens in the process of self-governance.

The principal research activities have involved going through the microfilm edition of the League Papers available at the Unitversity of Minnesota's Wilson Library and selecting documents for inclusion. One visit last year to the Library of Congress will be followed by another in May to locate certain documents not included in the microfilm edition and to choose pictures for the book.

The public audience will be League members, individuals, and organizations interested in the League's innovative educational programs, the issues addressed by the League, and the achievements of women in the political arena following the final years of the suffrage campaign and passage of the Nineteenth Amendment in 1920.

5. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

(1) Humanities Topic. For the Public Record will be a documentary record describing the significance of a prominent women's organization in American society and serving as a chronicle of the progress of women and their increasing effectiveness in the political arena. Although some dismiss the impact of the vote because of the low voter turnout by women in the 1920s (the same was true of men) and the failure to win public office (an unreal expectation given their recent emergence as voters), that allegation of a "feminist wasteland" overlooks another important fact. In the period between the two world wars, there was a virtual explosion of women's organizations through which women exercised their influence, replacing party politics with pressure politics..

Among these groups (and an acknowledged leader) was the League of Women Voter, a direct descendent of the suffrage movement (first proposed by national suffrage president, Carrie Chapman Catt in 1919 and formally organized in February 1920, six months before ratification of the Nineteenth Amendment). The League's twin mission of voter education and multi-issue advocacy is unique among women's groups, and, as Anna Lord Strauss, a past national League president, once commented, "The League has an enviable record of pricking the conscience of our public life."

Scholars affecting this research include those who have written about women in American history and women in politics. They include Emeritus professors Gerda Lerner of the University of Wisconsin and Anne Firor Scott of Duke University; Sara Evans, McKnight Professor of Women's Studies, University of Minnesota; Nancy Cott of Yale University; Elizabeth Perry of Vanderbilt University, and many others who have served as pioneers in the study of American women as well as the scholars who now continue their work. Two scholars of note (see #2) have written approving comments on the draft.

This documentary history does not advocate or take a single viewpoint. It simply attempts to be an accurate record of the work of the League over the years in the context of the public life of the United States. It will reveal the League's legislative failures as well as its successes, the internal disagreements that have marked member discussion and debate over League policy and program, the interaction with other women's groups, and its innovative efforts to expand civic know-how and participation.

My funding request is to cover the cost of manuscript formatting which will involve retyping the entire volume to integrate the documents with the narrative (an exploration of the possible use of scanners for this possibility resulted in a negative assessment).

STATEMENT BY CAROLYN JEFFERSON-JENKINS, PRESIDENT LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF THE UNITED STATES

November 2, 1998

The CBS news magazine show, "60 Minutes," did a major disservice to the election process and to American voters last night in its presentation of a segment called "Vote Early, Vote Often."

The story tried to make the case that the National Voter Registration Act, also known as the motor voter law, has led to an increasing problem with vote fraud in this country. Unfortunately, the segment was characterized by one-sided reporting, inadequate research and a disappointing disregard for the facts.

In a very biased manner, the story gave the impression that no identification of any kind is allowed under the motor voter law in order to vote. It ignored the fact that registration opportunities are offered at driver's license agencies because this is the most popular form of identification in this country, and that people who register through public assistance agencies are already known through these agencies.

The story ignored the fact that over half of the states had mail-in programs before the motor voter law. In fact, the motor voter law anticipated potential problems by explicitly allowing states to require first-time mail-in registrants to vote in person. Seven states do so. It ignored the fact the states may require ID at the polls as long as the requirement is uniform and nondiscrimatory.

While some officials have sought to block motor voter, they also have failed to use all the tools it provides for keeping lists clean. The law provides ample opportunities for state and local officials to protect against potential criminal violations without restricting access to voting and without allowing discrimination against minorities. State and local officials are responsible for enforcing the law to protect against illegal registrations.

In an effort to make a case for an increase in vote fraud in this country, the show's producers chose hyperbole, isolated cases and anecdotes over meaningful research. The quality and balance of "60 Minutes" presentations has been sadly compromised.

The timing of this inaccurate and misleading presentation, two days before the election, can only falsely discourage an American electorate that is already dangerously turned off. Some want to go back to the day when local officials could control who is allowed to vote. Motor voter, by ensuring uniform procedures, helps ensure that all eligible American citizens can exercise their constitutional right to vote.

I'm seeing some comments about motor voter that I think need clarification. So, armed with a copy of the Act, and advice from our LWVUS lobbyist who is an expert on this, here goes:

The National Voter Registration Act (the official name of motor voter) makes several changes to the way states handle voter registration:

--it mandates a lot of new sites where persons can apply for voter registration (driver license stations, public assistance sites, etc.

--it requires states to accept and use "mail voter registration application form prescribed by the FEC..."

-- it requires states to keep their voter lists updated

-- it prohibits purging for nonvoting

--it establishes new safeguards by requiring voters to attest, in writing, to their eligibility, including citizenship, under penalty of perjury

--it gives states the right to require that first time voters vote in person if they registered by mail
--it establishes additional federal criminal penalties against voter intimidation, voter registration and
vote fraud

Throughout the NVRA, whenever referring to registration forms, the term "application" is used. The person is *applying* for registration. Section 8(a) reads, "...each state shall ensure that any eligible applicant is registered to vote in an election." Note the word "eligible": local election officials are *still responsible for verifying the eligibility of an applicant* before accepting that person's registration.

NVRA does not prevent or prohibit purging, but it does put limits on how the purging can be conducted. Election officials must conduct general programs to remove the names of ineligible voters by reason of the death of the registrant or the voter's change of residence. Section 8(b) requires that any such activity "shall be uniform, nondiscriminatory, and in compliance with the Voting Rights Act of 1965." "Uniform" means that any purge program or activity must be applied to an entire jurisdiction. For instance, a purge program can not mail only to minority districts or certain zip codes. "Nondiscriminatory" means that the procedure complies with the requirements of the Voting Rights Act. That is, the program must not be applied in a discriminatory manner or have an impact that discriminates against racial minorities, consistent with the Voting Rights Act.

It further states that no one's name can be removed from the rolls "by reason of the person's failure to vote." That is the phrase that has many election officials unhappy. Purging for nonvoting was quick and cheap. Under the NVRA, nonvoting is not a valid reason for believing a voter has moved. Nonvoting purges were also banned under the NVRA because of their discriminatory impact.

States may develop their own mail-in forms. Section 6(b) states "The chief state election official shall make the [mail-in] forms ... available for distribution through governmental and private entities, with particular emphasis on making them available for organized voter registration programs."

The NVRA deals with the registration application process. How a state verifies the eligibility of applicants, the manner in which states conduct their elections or handle absentee voting and whether or not states require identification of voters at the polls consistent with the Voting Rights Act is still the state's decision and responsibility. So, bottom line: it is still the responsibility of local election officials to ensure the integrity of their voter registration rolls and their electoral process.

I hope that this information, coupled with the statement by Carolyn Jefferson-Jenkins, will help you in responding to people who saw or heard about the 60 Minutes broadcast. Judy Poulson, LWVUS Board

A new financial report form with columns showing the budget vs. actual with current figures and a yearly budget overview was presented. The column showing the budgeted amount for the current period is prorated according to past knowledge of money movement -- not just a 1/12 of the budget figuration. It was felt that the new format gives useful and timely information. Hondl and Berquist were thanked for their significant contributions to helping with streamlining the financial reports and setting up more efficient bookkeeping processes.

Co-sponsorship of Center for Women in Government Reception for recently elected women: Motion: That LWVMN co-sponsor the Center for Women in Government's reception for recently elected women.

While the League opposes the Amendment dealing with Hunting and Fishing, we do so for different reasons than the Coalition.

It was decided that there was not enough information about the abolishing the office of Treasurer to make a decision.

FutureTrek: It was recommended that LLs receive the executive summary and the grids along with a cover letter describing that FutureTrek will be a tool for the State League. February was selected as the time to send out the information. It is hoped that state committees will have met and filled in some of the grids by then.

Future Voters will include some of the trend information that will be interesting to all Leaguers.

Voter Service Update: Covey brought the Board up to date on Voter Service Activities. They included:

Debates - There will be a debate October 16 in Duluth at the Blake School. It will be rebroadcast October 27 at 7:00 p.m. by WCCO TV and Radio.

Voter Guide - 350,000 were printed. Most have been distributed. Those with questions regarding the Voter Guide and distribution should contact Evdie Kargas.

Campaign Finance Survey - 27 leagues are covering 105 legislative districts. CMAL is covering the remaining districts. The survey will be mailed October 20.

Hot Line - Sign up sheets were distributed to all Board members. If Board members are available they need to call Linda Loomis. Board members were encouraged to spread the word that workers are needed.

MN Compact - There has been remarkable unity among groups that never work together.

Budgets for 1999-2001: Nancy Witta, Budget Committee Chair has developed a form for portfolios to fill in for Budget Committee planning. Sawyer will meet with those affected and discuss future budget requests.

Nominations for 1999 -2001: Sandy Cooper, Nominating Committee Chair, has sent Board members a form dealing with future plans/wishes of Board Members. This information is needed so the Nominating Committee can begin their work. She has also sent a letter to LLs asking them to submit names of perspective Board members.

Women Come to the Capitol: There are concerns about the format of the Women Come to the Capitol. The attendance has been declining for the Monday event. The President's event, held with Presidents of groups and legislators continues to be successful and the Sunday evening dinner has been well-attended. One suggestion was to combine the CIA and Women Come to the Capitol events but the CIA is an EF event while the other is a MN project.

Program Planning: Possible "Lively Issues" was discussed. Some suggestions included: Immigration; the Metropolitan Airports Commission, Higher Education in Minnesota, Educational Profiles in Learning, K-12 quotas for desegregation, K-12 remedial education, Health Care trends in MN, Welfare Reform evaluation and Proportional Representation.

It was felt that the Metropolitan Airports Commission would be a state-wide study. Funding for K-12

remedial education is also being discussed by the Legislature and could also be a Lively Issue.

Convention Planning: The Member Resources Committee is looking for possible workshops for Convention. Among those suggested are: Study Circles (immigration); Presidents Workshop, Nuts and Bolts; Running and Winning; FutureTrek; Feedlots and Communications. It was suggested that an "expert" be recruited to help LLs deal with the National Making Democracy Work program. Kathleen Blatz, Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court was suggested as a speaker.

Date: November 5, 1998

You've been asked to discuss the long-range plan with your committees and come up with ideas for implementing it. I'd like to clarify what it is you've been asked to do.

I. Before you can fill in the timeline, the person/group responsible for implementation and the budget of the grid, the first question to ask is how and what is going to happen. What program, activity is going to be developed from the strategies/tactics of the plan?

For example, under the leadership goal (pg. 7, grid) one of the items under strategies/tactics is to "expand, promote and trademark League's existing, multi-tiered training programs, including classroom training/curriculum for high school students, public policy and campaign training for potential political candidates and general leadership training." There may be several programs that we may want to do under this strategy. Who do we want to target? How should it be done? What will it be called. How will it be organized? (For example AAUW has a new campus program called *Sister to Sister* and they've just started a new chapter at St. Thomas. The Minneapolis League's leadership program for high school senior women and their increased involvement in neighborhood revitalization came out of their LRP.)

2. Next, set priorities. What will be done first, second, etc.? Who is responsible? Do we need staff? How much will it cost?

To help get the creative juices going, this packet includes:

- examples of programs that resulted from the national Ed Fund's long range plan
- an article on Gen. X
- focus group results (from the LWVUS meetings in MN)
- national League survey results
- the outline for the Joan Growe Voter Education and Participation program
- community opinion leaders ideas about what League should be doing (from the phone survey).

We'll have time at the board meeting to discuss any questions you may have.

VISION 2000

The League's VISION 2000 includes five interwoven strategies critical to the future of democracy:

The LWVEF will enable people to address public policy issues for the common good through a Center for Community Dialogue, a Grassroots Internship Program and the Global Community Dialogue.

Democracy cannot be representative without the participation and the active consent of the governed. To combat the distressing trends toward disengagement and isolation, the Center for Community Dialogue will offer training in consensus building, facilitation, collaborative decision making and conflict management. The Global Community Dialogue/Grassroots Internship Program will extend these skill-building efforts to citizen leaders from emerging democracies around the world, based on successful LWVEF initiatives in Poland, Hungary, Russia, Ukraine, Latin America and South Africa.

The League will fully embrace diversity in all programs and operations to promote participation of all citizens in their government.

Diversity is a social justice issue on which the LWVEF must act to meet its mission and vision for shaping better communities. Our commitment to diversity is fundamental to achieving true community and political participation. LWVEF programs will reach across racial, ethnic, cultural and other boundaries to educate all citizens about how to participate effectively in the political system and about policy issues of importance to building communities of inclusion.

The LWVEF will encourage women and minorities to seek public office, to create an elected body that reflects the diversity of our communities.

Based on more than 75 years of study and education on how government works, the League also will offer skills training to strengthen the effectiveness of all public servants.

The LWVEF will lead an effort to achieve and maintain voter registration above 85 percent of the voting-age population by the year 2000. The League also pledges that voter turnout in presidential elections will exceed 85 percent of registered voters.

We must make democracy work for all citizens. Building on the tremendous success of the National Voter Registration Act in clearing the obstacles to the voting booth, the League will promote universal citizen access to the polls. Working in precincts across the nation, we must make the electorate look more like America.

The LWVEF will provide citizen information and promote problem solving online, through Citizen Education Centers in each congressional district.

The information superhighway is one route to increased political participation and to deliberative discussion of public policy issues. Long the model for grassroots citizen networking, the League is now "wired for democracy" and committed to using new technology to strengthen and amplify the voices of citizens.

In 1920, League founder Carrie Chapman Catt called the organization "a mighty political experiment." Every day, in communities across the nation, the experiment is recreated, and the power of the original idea is demonstrated anew. Every day, this mighty political experiment, the League of Women Voters, takes on new challenges in democracy.

FOCUS GROUPS Non-Members

We conducted a total of 4 focus groups with non-members in Minneapolis-St. Paul and Washington, DC. One group with people of color and one with white people were held in each location. Focus group size ranged from 7-9, and participants were recruited much like a local League would conduct a membership drive: through networking. What follows is a summary of responses to each question. Unless otherwise indicated, the statements were themes from each of the focus groups.

How do you define "civic participation"?

- · hands on involvement
- · broad scope, from direct service to political action.

People of color mentioned that they see making policy and elections as "distant." However, after some discussion, they did connect local issues to the policy process, but only as it was able to affect the solution of local, community problems.

Obstacles to participation

There were several factors named, among them:

- Time scarcity
- Lack of clear goals and tasks, unclear what difference participation will make.
- Feeling overwhelmed by the possibility that there will be too much to do.

People of color non-members cited additional obstacles as:

- · A sense of not belonging because of race, class, or culture.
- The expectation that the individual will be knowledgeable about the issues and the
 organization's expert on their racial or cultural group whether, race, gender, age, class, or all
 of the above.

How to overcome obstacles to participation?

Despite the obstacles all focus group participants were willing to be active in community organizations. They were most likely to participate if:

- There was a personal relationship.
- There was an outrage to a perceived wrong or a deeply compelling issue.
- · There was a sense of camaraderie, warmth, support, and recognition.
- The individual felt she mattered to the group and could make a difference.
- There was an opportunity to learn.

In addition, white non-members mentioned fun as a motivator.

People of color added:

- While personal relationship was desired, it could be indirect, that is, a referral would substitute.
- The individual felt she mattered to the group as a person as well as for a particular skill or resource.

• The goals of the organization are clear, the process is well-organized, and there is a sense that the group will make progress. Given time constraints, people want the group to demonstrate its effectiveness, or at least its potential for effectiveness, right away.

Impression of the League: The League as car

Participants were asked, "If the League were a car, which one would it be?"

Though models named varied, several shared traits of upper end, suburban cars belonging to older, wealthy, white women who are not employed outside the home. Positive images also existed among white women: the League has a history, high quality, gets things done, and stable. Other images included the League as outdated and bland, neutral.

Several participants were able to associate the League with voters guides, debates, education, and presence during elections. All of these activities were viewed positively.

Others did not know what the League is doing or what its function is.

People of color all said it was a white car. They perceived the presence of women of color as peripheral, designed to help the League look good, but not because the League would be dedicated to issues of concern to women of color. They also defined the motivation of white women to be involved in an organization like the League as a struggle for equality with white men of their own class—a struggle that does not include women of color.

Impressions of the League: The League as ideal car

Participants were asked, "Imagine the League as an ideal non-profit organization. Which car would it be?"

Common models included sports utility vehicle and bus or other mass transit. These are seen as rugged, accessible, involving all, and modern.

White participants also mentioned high end vehicles such as Mercedes and associated qualities such as performance and integrity although some qualms were raised about the price of these cars.

People of color were adamant that the vehicle not be an upper-end car, as they associated that with status symbols, facades, and elitism. Moreover, they believed those cars do not symbolize getting work done.

Encouraging Diversity

All groups agreed on several points:

- · Be determined to realize diversity-make a commitment
- . Develop a consciousness about the organization itself and its openness to change
- Build personal relationships
- Do not use an outreach approach. This was viewed as patronizing since it assumes the League would have already decided on agendas, methods, etc. and then invited others to fit in.
 Outreach was seen as creating a "we" and "them" feeling.

Survey Highlights

The following highlights are from a nationwide randomly selected sample of League members surveyed in early 1998. Random selection can be more representative than other approaches in which respondents self-select (i.e., a national *Voter* survey.).

This League demographic profile is the most accurate estimate available. Because the League only records member addresses, other League population figures were not available for comparison. Based on available member addresses, the sample over represents the west coast and under represents the midwest. The sample matches the percentage of member addresses from other parts of the country.

The percentage of people of color in the League may be-slightly higher than 5% (possibly 7%–10%), and League members may be somewhat younger than the survey shows. Research on surveys indicates that people of color tend to have lower response rates to surveys in general and people over 55 have higher response rates to mail surveys.

Because of the small number of members of color, the analyses below do not differentiate between minority groups. The overall margin of error is approximately 2.5–3%, but is greater when looking at the responses of people of color independently.

(a) Being politically active was a more important factor for joining for members under 45 years old: 58% versus 35%--41% for older members. Proportionally more people of color indicated being politically active as an important reason for joining than white members did: 55% to 42%. (statistically significant differences).

Satisfaction with membership in the League

Most respondents reported being satisfied with their membership, with older members being more satisfied. Overall, 78% said they were very likely to remain members for the foreseeable future, a figure significantly higher, however, for older members.

Over 70% of the sample believed that the League is well known by the American public. However, just 42% indicated the League has an up-to-date, contemporary image, an impression more likely to be held by older members.

- People with more education and with higher household incomes are less likely to agree that the League's image is up-to-date. Close to 90% of the sample, however, agree that the League is relevant to today's pressing issues.
- Half of the sample believed that the League needs to more effectively distinguish itself from other organizations doing similar work. Many others neither agreed nor disagreed, and 16% disagreed that the League needs to distinguish itself better.

Diversity

- Over half of the sample (62%) agreed that becoming more diverse is critically important for the League's continued success; 29% neither agreed nor disagreed, and 10% disagreed.
- People of color and younger respondents were more likely than whites and older members to have disagreed with the following statement: the League works effectively on racial/cultural issues.
- Members of color were significantly less likely than white members to have been a board member (42% to 58%); helped to organize an

event (39% to 55%); been a delegate to a state meeting/convention (22% to 33%); been a delegate to a national meeting/convention (7% to 18%), though they are just as likely to have been a committee member or chair.

Impact of work and family on volunteer availability

Younger members were highly likely to say that their paid work and family commitments limit the time they have to volunteer with the League.

What should the League do in the next decade to ensure its relevance and survival?

Political

- help the rest of us figure out what civic participation means in this era of changing technology; we're in a transition from representative democracy to direct democracy with technology, need practical thinking, not fear mongering
- get people more interested in the political scene, people need to understand how politics works (afraid to call legislators)
- look at how League positions itself with the media; keep up the long term stuff
- voter education, voter education, voter education
- enhance its training department and facilitate meetings at all levels
- LWV should adopt whole election and candidate selection process and making sure that is done in the most democratic way possible


JOAN GROWE FUND FOR VOTER EDUCATION AND PARTICIPATION

Purpose: to maintain Minnesota's outstanding record of voter participation by initiating programs and procedures that continue to improve voter accessibility and interests; to serve as a model for other states; and to provide information on successful processes and policies that can be adapted by emerging democracies on other continents.

In order to achieve these goals, the Joan Growe Fund for Voter Education and Participation will:

- 1. Create a network organized in each Congressional District to work with existing organizations, government officials, schools and colleges in order to establish Citizenship Schools providing voter education on a regular and systematic basis. A part-time staff person (a resident of the district) would serve as coordinator operating with the help of a district advisory committee. The Citizenship Schools, held in different communities throughout the district, would reach out to new voters (new citizens and 18-year-old first time voters) and to all citizens who wish to learn more about the electoral process, the issues, and candidates in upcoming local, state, and national elections. The Schools will be conducted in the nonpartisan tradition of the League of Women Voters, and League materials (voters' guides, etc.) would be distributed and information about candidates provided.
- 2. Establish a computer network of voter information by conducting inventories of existing computers easily available to the public and, where not available, seeking contributions of computers in such places as libraries, shopping center kiosks, and the like. The networks could provide means to find out how to register, where to vote, view a sample ballot, or connect with candidate web pages.
- 3. Form a research group to examine new means of voting, needed changes in election laws, and other initiatives relating to the Fund's purposes, to send a representative to national/international meetings to report on the Minnesota experience, to prepare publications relating to that experience, and to form alliances with organizations working overseas to enhance civic literacy and activity.


We suggest that the Fund itself have a governing board of directors with such representatives as may be chosen by Joan Growe and by the League of Women Voters of Minnesota, and we suggest that Joan Growe serve as chair of that board. These proposed activities, along with the composition and size of the board and a budget, should be on the agenda of ensuing discussions.

5. Co-sponsorship of Center for Women in Government Reception for recently elected women: Frisch: Motion: that LWVMN co-sponsor the Center for Women in Government's reception for recently elected women

<u>Background</u>: The LWVMN Executive Committee has reviewed this request; five of six have approved the League's co-sponsorship. The event will be held at Hamline on November 19th. (Hamline is home to the Center for Women in Government; Tews & Sawyer have each served for some years on its Board.) This event has been held many times in the past and includes women from all political parties. The request came from Molly Woehrlin, LWV of Northfield, who is currently on the Center Board.

6. <u>LWV of Alexandria</u>: Borgen: Motion: to recommend to LWVUS that the request of LWV of Alexandria to disband be granted.

<u>Background:</u> They have been in steady decline for several years and finally stopped functioning altogether the last year. Of the nine members left, all but maybe two or three were elderly women. That was not the case when the League started slowing down. There were younger people then who had been very active, but they were faced with an all too common situation. Those active people were tired, and they weren't getting any new people to replace them.

We started asking regularly as much as three years ago, or more, for a date that we could meet with them and start working with them to try to pull things back

together. We were met with an ongoing refusal. If you don't have a meeting to go to, it's hard to do anything. We have to assume that they weren't interested in doing anything about their situation. And so, the inevitable has occurred.

7. <u>Constitutional Amendments:</u> Frisch: Motion: to conduct an education campaign encouraging informed voting on the three Constitutional Amendments on the ballot.

Background: At the Action Committee Meeting of October 5th, proponents of the Environmental Trust Fund urged the LWVMN to support Constitutional Amendment #1 (see enclosure). While their arguments were compelling the LWVMN Action Committee decided not to support this amendment because of its opposition to "dedicated" funds. The presenters expressed concern that despite overwhelming support for the environment, many people would simply not see the Amendment on the ballot or would decide not to vote on it, not realizing that a non-vote is a no-vote. The introduction to the Constitutional Amendments in our *Voter Guide* states this. The Action Committee is recommending that we emphasize this point through a voter education campaign. Voter Service Committee should review this at their 10/12 meeting.

Frisch: Motion: that LWVMN oppose Amendment #2, Preserve Hunting and Fishing Heritage.

<u>Background:</u> the Action Committee also reviewed information from the "No on 2" Committee. While this group makes several arguments the one that the Action Committee found convincing was that we shouldn't clutter up the Constitution. At best, no real purpose is served; at worst there are unanswered questions such as what the impact would be on private property rights, Native American Treaty rights, the right of the State to regulate hunting and fishing. Enclosed is more information for you to consider.

We also discussed Amendment 3 which would abolish the office of Treasurer. We do not have much information about this but were disturbed that very little discussion seems to have taken place. Of the major party candidates for Treasurer, the Republican and the Democrat oppose the abolition of the Office, while the Reform Party candidate supports it on the grounds that it is a duplication of functions already performed elsewhere. Opponents have argued that you could make the same argument for abolishing other Constitutional Offices.

- 14. Program Planning: we are looking for "Lively Issues" to "prime the pump" for the LWVMN Program Planning process. The Action Committee came up with three possibilities: Immigration; the Metropolitan Airports Commission and higher education in Minnesota. If you have some good ideas, bring them. Even better, write them up for the next issue of the *Voter*.

The books are at the auditor. Thanks were given to Cindy Berquist for a number of reforms she has been able to institute this past year. Connie Hondl has taken a leave of absence from the Board and is serving as the League bookkeeper. Board members are not allowed to hold a paid position with the League.

The net income for LWVMN for 1998 is listed as -\$24,128.12. This includes the \$17,803 forgiven from the Education Fund.

The new overhead formula has given a truer picture of the financial statement. The reporting by Board members of time contributions resulted in \$28,550 in contributions. The hourly rate for contributors is around \$13.00.

Harry Boyte from the Humphrey Institute and Nan Kari from the College of St. Catherine, Jane Adams School were introduced to the Board. They have observed that there are few opportunities for individuals to participate as citizens. They would like the LWVMN to participate in the establishment of a study circle campaign. A study circle campaign would allow a broad based

group of citizens to discuss a topic with the goal of arriving at a concrete action outcome. Study circles are time bound with the norm being four to six meetings. The topic to be discussed in the pilot would be immigration as it is a relevant issue to all communities in the state.

The role of the sponsoring groups is to convene and pilot the group. They would help organize the materials for state-wide distribution. It would be a two year time commitment and would begin after the elections. The direct costs of forming a set study circles is estimated to be around \$50,000. The Oklahoma State League has organized study circles and will be contacted about their experience.

Discussion centered around whether this could be an Education Fund project as there will be action at the end of the cycle. This will have to be considered, but the sense of the Board was that this could be an opportunity to contact different funders for a project they would be happy to support. Another consideration was that this program would allow the State to be involved in a "Making Democracy Work" project. This topic was re-adopted at National Convention and the Minnesota League has not had a specific project in the past.

There was a question if we needed a commitment from LLs and how do we get LLs to sign up. A Board member will be needed to oversee this project and deternube how to involve LLs.

Nan Kari announced that on September 9 there will be a dinner at 5:30 sponsored by the Jane Adams School which will allow discussion with J.A. staff. At 7:00 there will be an open house at the Jane Adams School located in Neighborhood House to see the learning opportunities that exist there. All Board members were invited.

Judicial Study Consensus Questions: Motion: To approve the enclosed draft consensus questions with suggested changes.

Seconded

Approved

It was recommended that the questions be presented as one set instead of two as the two sets were confusing. Some felt that the number three of the instructions was not clear. A Board member who had read the *Facts and Issues* thought that once that was read, the instructions would be understandable.

As presented to the Board, the consensus process would be a number count. After discussion, it was recommended that both a consensus column and a number count be employed. This will, allow the committee to better represent the intent of all Leagues.

The Judicial Study committee was commended for their hard work and the resulting Facts and Issues.

1999 LWVMN Convention: Discussion for Convention centered around a need for a theme. The one suggestion was a focus on immigration. Speakers and workshops could focus on that topic. How to workshops were successful at the 1997 Convention.

The cost of the Convention was a consideration. One suggestion for keeping the price down is for those Board members, who are interested in doing so, pay their own expenses. It was strongly recommended that this be an option and not a requirement. There was also a question whether Ed Fund money could underwrite segments of the Convention.

Ways for making the Convention more user friendly were discussed. Suggestions included:

- * a sign up for restaurants
- * mixing people up for meals assigning tables

* hotel suites made available for networking

* setting times for regional groups to get together.

A time sheet was handed out and Board members were encouraged to look at it and call Sally or Peggy Thompson if there were obvious glitches.

Former Board Members: The suggestion to invite former Board members to the 10/14/98 Board Meeting from 9:00 to Noon was met with enthusiasm. This was an idea spurred by the National Convention decision to include past members in opportunities for participation.

Building Better Communities: Pam Nelson's report was read with interest. Special attention was focused on three points of the report which dealt with:

- * designing a plan for high school students to meet the graduation requirement to perform community service
- * promoting the League curriculum written in Spanish to English as a Second Language teachers.
- * developing press packets with letters to the Editors and other timely commentary pieces on National and State League activities or send disks for local Leagues to personalize for publication. The goal is a higher profile for League.

Further discussion will be included in the Future Trek discussion.

MN State Budget: Frisch reported that the Minnesota Council of Non-Profits has published two books addressing who have been the beneficiaries of the budget spending surplus. In the past session, the general public was the beneficiary with tax cuts and rebates. The MN Council of Non-Profits is recommending that in 1999, the Governor and State Legislature enact fiscal policy which will result in long-term investments intended to support people moving from welfare to work, provide for their families, and to promote self-sufficiency.

Voter Service Projects Update: Covey announced that there were five areas of voter service projects.

- 1. MN Compact. Borgen and Duffy have been representing League at meetings.
- 2. Martin Grant. Seventeen Leagues applied for the legislative debate grant monies.
- 3. There are three LWVMN debates scheduled.
 - a) There will be a DFL gubernatorial debate at 2:00 at the State Fair. It will be aired at 7:00 p.m.
 - b.) There will be Gubernatorial debate on rural issues October 1 aired by KMSP
 - c.) There will be a gubernatorial debate on October 27 with WCCO Television and radio, MPR and MNN.
- 4. The Voter Service Guides for the primary will be delivered about August 20. The general election Voter Guide will be available at a later date. There will also be posters available.
- WCCO and the LWVMN will have a primary and general election hot line. The Secretary of State and the LWVMN will sponsor a hot line in the office. Linda Loomis is in charge of the LWVMN hot line. Board members were asked to volunteer.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:23 a.m.

To the Editor:

The League of Women Voters of Minnesota acknowledges with sadness the loss to your community of the League of Women Voters of Alexandria. Since 1951 its members have provided nonpartisan discussion of public issues, sponsored candidate forums and voter registration drives, and provided a training ground for members who have run for public office.

This problem is not unique to Alexandria or to League. We live an era when it is difficult for all community organizations to find volunteers. The current members, proud of their history and committed to the community, have held on with just a few members for a long time. We encourage them to stay in League as state members-at-large and hope that one day there will be enough interest among residents to restart a local chapter. The state office has recently heard from two Minnesota communities that have lost leagues and found that League services are difficult to replace. One caller expressed concern that no group existed to study difficulties with a city charter and the other worried about the lack of candidate forums held on behalf of the general public.

The League of Women Voters, established in 1920, grew out of the suffrage movement, which fought for the right of women to vote. Today men as well as women are encouraged to join, but the goal of informed political participation and the policy of nonpartisanship remain unchanged. In an era of political cynicism, the League reminds us that turning our backs does not make the problems of government go away. Elected officials from the city council to the U.S. Congress make policy decisions that affect our lives every day. I'm certain that the former League members of Alexandria join me in reminding all of you to register, to follow the issues, and to make your voice count at the ballot box. Vote November 3rd.

Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund Revenue

A Proposed Minnesota Constitutional Amendment

On November 3, 1998, Minnesotans will vote on an amendment to the state constitution concerning the rededication of state lottery proceeds to the Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund. The trust fund was established by Minnesota voters in 1988, and amended two years later to allow dedication of 40 percent of the lottery's net proceeds until the year 2001.* This information brief describes the proposed amendment.

Amendment Language

The proposed amendment states:

"Shall the Minnesota Constitution be amended to extend to the year 2025 the dedication of lottery proceeds to the environment and natural resources trust fund and to maximize the long-term total return to the fund?"

Like all constitutional amendments, the trust fund amendment requires a majority of all persons voting in the general election. A failure to vote on the amendment is the same as a "no" vote.

Trust Fund Purpose

Money dedicated to the trust fund from the lottery proceeds is invested by the State Board of Investment. The investment earnings are used to help finance the protection, conservation, preservation, and enhancement of the state's air, water, land, fish, wildlife, and other natural

Future Revenue

Hunting and Fishing

A Proposed Minnesota Constitutional Amendment

The hunting and fishing amendment is one of three amendments to the state constitution proposed by the 1998 Minnesota Legislature. Each of the proposed amendments will be submitted to the voters for ratification at the November general election. This information brief describes the hunting and fishing amendment, explains the positions of its proponents and opponents, lists similar amendments in other states, and discusses hunting and fishing amendment case law in other states.

The Hunting and Fishing Amendment

The hunting and fishing amendment is a brief statement that would be added as a new section 12 in article 13 of the state constitution as follows:

"Hunting and fishing and the taking of game and fish are a valued part of our heritage that shall be forever preserved for the people and shall be managed by law and regulation for the public good."

The ballot at the November state general election will ask the voters the following question:

"Shall the Minnesota Constitution be amended to affirm that hunting and fishing and the taking of game and fish are a valued part of our heritage that shall be forever preserved for the people and shall be managed by law and regulation for the public good?"

An amendment to the state constitution must be approved by a majority of everyone voting at the general election; voting at the general election but not voting on this amendment counts the same as voting "no."

Proponent and Opponent Positions

In legislative hearings, proponents of the constitutional amendment indicated they wanted a statement of principle to ensure that attempts that have been made in some other states to completely ban hunting or fishing or a type of hunting or fishing could not happen in Minnesota. Opponents pointed out that no such activity has occurred and that in this state there is a statute protecting the rights of hunters and fishers. Opponents also objected to placing recreational

interests in the state constitution.

Hunting or Fishing Amendments in Other States

Four states have a constitutional provision protecting an interest in hunting or fishing. The texts follow.

All persons have the right to hunt and fish in this state in accordance with law

and regulations. (1996)

California: The people shall have the right to fish upon and from the public lands of the

State and in the waters thereof, excepting upon lands set aside for fish hatcheries, and no land owned by the State shall ever be sold or transferred without reserving in the people the absolute right to fish thereupon; and no law shall ever be passed making it a crime for the people to enter upon the

public lands within this State for the purpose of fishing in any water

containing fish that have been planted therein by the State; provided, that the Legislature may by statute, provide for the season when and the conditions

under which the different species of fish may be taken. (1910)

Rhode Island: The people shall continue to enjoy and freely exercise all the rights of fishery,

and the privileges of the shore, to which they have been heretofore entitled under the charter and usages of this state. But no new right is intended to be

granted, nor any existing right impaired, by this declaration. (1844)

Vermont: The inhabitants of this State shall have the liberty in seasonable times, to hunt

and fowl on the lands they hold, and on other lands not inclosed, and in like manner to fish in all boatable and other waters (not private property) under proper regulations, to be made and provided by the General Assembly. (1777)

Case Law under Hunting or Fishing Amendments in Other States

Constitutional provisions on hunting or fishing have stimulated very little litigation in other states. In no published appellate decision has a statute or regulation been invalidated because it conflicted with one of the provisions. Courts elsewhere have not interpreted hunting or fishing to be fundamental rights elevated above the legislature's usual ability to exercise its regulatory powers or to delegate appropriate powers to an administrative agency.¹

State Treasurer: Should the Office Be Abolished?

A Proposed Minnesota Constitutional Amendment

This information brief is about the proposed constitutional amendment to abolish the office of state treasurer. The proposed amendment will be submitted to the voters for ratification at the November 1998 general election.

An amendment to the state constitution must be approved by a majority of everyone voting at the general election; voting at the general election but not voting on this question counts the same as voting "no."

The 1998 Legislature proposed a constitutional amendment that would abolish the constitutional office of state treasurer (Laws 1998, chs. 387; and 408, § 24). The question to be presented to the voters at the 1998 general election is:

"Shall the Minnesota Constitution be amended to abolish the office of state treasurer on the first Monday in January 2003?"

Duties of the Treasurer

Many of the treasurer's duties relate to the systems for collecting, investing, and disbursing state funds. The treasurer's office deals frequently with three other state agencies that are involved in these functions: the Department of Revenue, the Department of Finance, and the State Board of Investment.

The 1998 legislation did not specify what agency would take over the treasurer's duties if the constitutional office is abolished. Rather, the legislation provided for the treasurer, in consultation with the secretary of state and the Commissioner of Finance, to study this issue. If the constitutional amendment is adopted, the treasurer must recommend to the legislature by January 15, 2000, an appropriate agency or constitutional office to receive the treasurer's duties. The treasurer may also recommend any conditions that the treasurer believes should govern the transfer of duties (Laws 1998, ch. 387, art. 2, § 1).

The Minnesota Constitution also currently provides that the treasurer is one of five members of the State Board of Investment (Minn. Const., art. XI, § 8). The board is responsible for investing state funds and most public pension money. The board generally approves overall investment policies and hiring of outside money managers, leaving implementation of the policies to its staff and to the money managers. The proposed constitutional amendment would remove the treasurer from the board, leaving a four-member board: the governor, state auditor, attorney general, and secretary of state.

Pros and Cons

Advocates for abolishing the office contend that:

- The treasurer's office is unnecessarily duplicative. Necessary checks and balances
 on collection, investment, and disbursements of state funds can be maintained at a
 lesser cost in existing executive branch agencies without having an elected state
 treasurer.
- Most of the treasurer's duties are ministerial, not policymaking, and do not require an elected official.
- Accountability and efficiency would be strengthened by centralizing responsibility in an executive office that reports directly to the Governor.

People who favor retaining the treasurer's office argue:

- It is important to retain checks and balances in an office outside of the other executive agencies that are involved in collection, investment, and disbursement of state funds.
- An elected office provides the most independent system of checks and balances and provides the highest degree of accountability to the people.
- . The treasurer can be a source of innovative ideas.

Potential Staff and Budget Reductions

Currently the budget of the treasurer's office is approximately \$2 million per year. Approximately \$1 million per year is for banking services that the state would continue to pay for, even if the treasurer's office were abolished. Much of the remainder of the budget is for staff.

The treasurer's office currently has 13 employees, including the treasurer. Testimony during legislative consideration of the proposed constitutional amendment indicated an expectation that most of these employees would be transferred to another agency if the amendment is approved. Thus, abolition of the office would result in the elimination of the position of the elected state treasurer and possibly one or two other positions. Savings, if these positions were eliminated, likely would be approximately \$150,000 per year. Abolishing the office also could save public money used to finance campaigns for treasurer for candidates who agree to spending limits.

Past Studies

Several past studies of state government organization recommended abolishing the elected office of state treasurer (1984 Governor's Task Force on Constitutional Officers; 1968 Governor's Council on Executive Reorganization; 1950 Efficiency in Government Commission; 1948 Constitutional Commission). However, the most recent study made no recommendation on this issue (1992 Commission on Reform and Efficiency).

Other States

The Council of State Governments has compiled the following information on treasurers in other states:

- In 37 states, treasurers are elected by the voters.
- · In seven states (Alaska, Hawaii, Michigan, Montana, New Jersey, New York, and Virginia), the governor appoints the treasurer.
- · In four states (Maine, Maryland, New Hampshire, and Tennessee), the legislature elects the treasurer.
- In Georgia, the treasurer is appointed by the state depository board.
- Texas recently abolished the office of state treasurer and transferred duties to an elected Comptroller of Public Accounts.

I. Intro

II. What We Don't Know

Testifying today as to the possible legal effects of an amendment to our state constitution establishing a privilege to hunt and fish.

I say "possible" because there are currently no constitutionally-established privileges in our Constitution, so we don't know exactly how the courts would treat such a privilege.

III. Legal Language

This proposed amendment could establish an entitlement to hunt and fish beyond that which currently exists under Minnesota law.

Article I, § 2 of the Minnesota constitution provides:

No member of this state shall be disenfranchised or deproved of any of the rights or privileges secured to any citizen thereof, unless by the law of the land or the judgment of his peers.

This provision makes no distinction between "rights" and "privileges," but instead treats them as equivalents.

Black's Law Dictionary (5th ed.) defines a privilege as:

A particular and peculiar benefit or advantage enjoyed be a person, company, or class, beyond the common advantages of cener citizens.

The definition continues:

An exceptional or extraordinary power or exemption. A <u>right</u>, power, franchise, or immunity held by a person or class, against or beyond the course of the law.

This is powerful language.

The current bill states that the provision does not create a new right or impair any existing right. This language, however, simply begs the question – it is clear that the language operates to create a privilege – if a privilege established by the Minnesota Constitution functions as a right, or something very near to a right, there may be little practical difference.

IV. Practical Effects

What effects could this provision have on a practical level?

A. Most Obvious - State's Ability to Regulate The Taking of Game and Fish

Currently, DNR can act quickly to regulate these matters as necessary. A citizen that disagrees with the State's strategy, armed with a constitutionally established privilege to hunt and fish, could hold up state action and mire the state a costly litigation, which could result in restriction on the state's ability to regulate in this area.

A good example of the type of situation that could result is provided by the moose season. If every hunter had a privilege to hunt moose, there would soon be no moose left to hunt. The DNR uses strict limits and a lottery system in order to insure the opportunity to hunt moose remains for all.

— This example illustrates another point – the current scenario has not impaired any one's ability to fish and hunt. This amendment is a protection without a problem.

B. Private Action

If a hunter is tracking game on public land, and the animal crosses into posted private land, has the hunter's privilege to take game been abridged by the landowner's posting of his or her land?

Is a fisherman permitted to cross private property in order to reach the lake he wishes to fish, so that his privilege will not be abridged?

If a developer wishes to clear a wooded lot, resulting in less game habitat, could an unhappy hunter bring an action challenging the developer's action as an abridgement of his privilege to hunt?

C. Firearm Regulation

Could a convicted felon assert that his or her privilege to sake game has been impaired because he or she is not permitted to own a firearm?

As I stated earlier, we don't yet know how any of these spanarios listed above might play out in the courts. Given the use of the word privilege in Art. 1, § 2 of our Constitution, and at least one definition of "privilege" equating it with the term "right," there is the potential for litigation and a change in the legal landscape.



Line 00400 showed that LL PMP payments are just short of budget.

The net income (loss) for the year is -\$1,417.46. When the LWVMNEF is forgiven debts, it owes the LWVMN, the amount will increase. Being an off-election year reduces income from the EF to LWVMN because of the lack of Voter Service projects.

LWVMN billings for office services to LWVMNEF: Motion: that LWVMN forgive those accounts receivable from LWVMNEF for which funding is doubtful. The final amount is to be determined by Sally Sawyer and Cindy Berquist pending further review of inter company billings.

The Moorhead League has been low functioning for quite a while. They decided to attempt a Voter Service project in 1996 but were not able to follow through with that plan. It was decided by mutual agreement between the State and Moorhead that the League should disband. Their remaining funds will be sent to the LWVMN office.

Voter: Mary Steen presented her ideas for an exciting *Voter*. Articles that she would like to include in issues would include: coming events, projects by the State, LLs and individuals, opinions as in letters to the editor, issues, people, and book reviews. She is looking for people that would like to do cartoons or sketches to illustrate articles.

The next issue of the *Voter* will include articles on the Election of Judges, a retrospective on the Action Committee, Mary Ann McCoy's experiences as an election judge in Bosnia, and the LOTT partnership.

State of local Leagues: Jeanne Matlock and Peggy Thompson passed out some strategies for strengthening local Leagues. One suggestion discussed was a "mentoring" program with stronger Leagues working with weaker Leagues. Much of the discussion of membership had been addressed in the morning FutureTrek session. The FutureTrek committee will formulate membership ideas to be considered by the Board.

It was suggested that to help local Leagues survive, a full commitment from a variety of State Board members is needed. More than just the Member Services Committee is needed as all items have a membership component to them. It was felt that the Member Services Committee can act on what was discussed at the FutureTrek session.

There was a suggestion to keep track of how many members are retained and dropped by LLs in a year. The current reporting system only gives numbers so we don't know which Leagues are doing a good job of retaining members.

Pickering announced that representatives from about twenty Leagues have been invited to a meeting on May 20th to talk about membership issues.

Convention Update: Weisbrod explained that "Proportional Voting," along with "Sustainable Communities" will probably be raised as non-recommended items at Convention. "Proportional Voting" is a new concept to the U.S. but is used in some other countries.

Weisbrod also reported that there is a proposal to increase national dues by \$4.00 in fiscal year 1999-2000.

One proposed bylaw would allow associate members (those members under 18 or non-citizens) to be voting members of League. Currently, they are allowed to participate in the consensus process but do not vote at annual meetings or program planning meetings.

It was felt that the Member Services Committee can act on what was discussed at the FutureTrek session.

Debates Schedule: WCCO will air primary debates live to tape at the State Fair on August 29 and 30th.

The Brainerd area MPR station will have a Governor's debate on September 23, 24 or October 4 focusing on rural issues.

There will be a live Gubernatorial debate from the twin cities on October 27 co-sponsored with WCCO-TV.

There will be debates with the Attorney General and Secretary of State candidates in Duluth, St. Cloud or Northfield. These will be co-sponsored with MPR.

Liz Nordling will be the Debates Project Manager.

Board Meetings: The Board agreed to meet the second Wednesday of the month. The LWVMNEF meeting will be scheduled first. There were requests for a shorter Board Meeting and it was decided to try a 9:00 a.m. to noon format.

The meeting adjourned at 3:50 p.m.

Basic information about the Study Circles Resource Center

What is a study circle?

The study circle is a simple process for small-group deliberation. There are just a few defining characteristics:

- A study circle is comprised of 8-12 people who meet regularly over a period of weeks or months to address a critical public issue in a democratic and collaborative way.
- A study circle is facilitated by an impartial person who is there not to act as an expert on the
 issue, but to serve the group by keeping the discussion focused, helping the group consider a
 variety of views, and asking difficult questions.
- A study circle looks at an issue from many points of view. Study circle facilitators and discussion materials give everyone "a home in the conversation," and help the group explore areas of common ground.
- A study circle progresses from a session on personal experience ("how does the issue affect me?") to sessions providing a broader perspective ("what are others saying about the issue?") to a session on action ("what can we do about the issue here?").

What is the Study Circles Resource Center (SCRC)?

SCRC was established in 1990 to promote the use of study circles on critical social and political issues. It is a project of the Topsfield Foundation, a private, nonprofit, nonpartisan foundation whose mission is to advance deliberative democracy and improve the quality of public life in the United States. SCRC operates by creating study circle organizing and discussion materials, distributing those materials free of charge to organizers of large study circle programs, and providing free technical assistance to organizers.

What is a community-wide study circle program?

Study circles can take place within organizations, such as schools, unions, or government agencies. They have their greatest reach and impact, however, when organizations across a community work together to create large-scale programs. These community-wide programs engage large numbers of citizens – in some cases thousands – in study circles on a public issue such as race relations, crime and violence, or education. Broad sponsoring coalitions create strong, diverse community participation. Participants in study circles have an opportunity to make an impact on an issue they care about.

How do community-wide study circle programs come into being?

Typically, a single organization such as a mayor's office, a school board, or a human relations commission spearheads and staffs the project. In most communities, an initiating organization takes the first step by approaching other key organizations to build a sponsoring coalition. Most community-wide programs have 10-30 organizations as sponsors or endorsers. Grass-roots organizations such as churches, neighborhood associations, businesses, schools, and clubs often take part.

What are the outcomes of community-wide study circle programs?

By participating in study circles, citizens gain "ownership" of the issues, discover a connection between personal experiences and public policies, and gain a deeper understanding of their own and others' perspectives and concerns. They discover common ground and a greater desire and ability to work collaboratively to solve local problems – as individuals, as members of small groups, and as members of large organizations in the community. Community-wide study circle programs foster new connections among community members that lead to new levels of community action. They also create new connections between citizens and government, both at an institutional level and among parents and teachers, community members and social service providers, residents and police officers.

Where are community-wide study circle programs going on?

In 1992, Lima, Ohio, became the first city to create a community-wide study circle program. Since then, over 40 communities have followed Lima's lead, ranging in size from Orford, New Hampshire, to Los Angeles, California. Over 100 other communities are in various stages of planning and organizing community-wide programs. SCRC also collaborates with a number of national organizations that are working with the community-wide study circle model, including the National Crime Prevention Council, the YWCA of the USA, the League of Women Voters, the Education Commission of the States, the National Association of Human Rights Workers, and the Alliance for National Renewal.

Project Summary

Although no new Leagues were established in Hastings, Cambridge or Forest Lake, the League certainly has a much higher profile in these communities as a result of our efforts. I'did have considerable contact with existing Leagues in the surrounding area, particularly Northern Dakota County and the Red Wing Leagues. I had numerous lengthy phone conversations and attended meetings with members of these organizations to discuss the Outreach project as well as strategies for attracting new members and encouraging the active participation of the existing members. I found that the Red Wing League had gained new members because of their high profile in the community as a direct result of their "Making Democracy Work" campaign, which had resulted in a great deal of newspaper coverage and grassroots organizing over a two year period.

Conclusions

- People need to see tangible proof that the League is a dynamic organization, worthy of their time and interest. It is not effective to simply discuss its merits.
 They must see the League in Action and personally benefit in some way.
- Each target community already had many existing community organizations and viewed the emergence of another group as a threat to their membership rolls.
- The Chamber of Commerce assumed the ownership of candidate forums as well as the political relationships in town and was very threatened by suggestions of collaborative action.
- Many older community members leave the state for long periods of time, or feel they have already "done their duty".
- Public organizational meetings raise the public's awareness about the League, but do not attract people to organize a new group.
- The League is viewed as an "Outsider" and I often felt that while people met gave the impression they were supportive and interested, they may have worked behind the scenes to derail my efforts. People may have taken offense and felt we had targeted their town with a mission to change the power structure, or "fix it" because we had identifies it as "deficient" in some way.
- It is extremely difficult to build a new League from the "outside in". It would be viewed as non-threatening to be invited to the town to provide expertise on an issue, or to work with groups as a partner in a collaborative project which dealt with issues outside of the town.
- Growing and supporting existing Leagues, as well as seeding the interest in establishing new Leagues would be.

Strategies and Recommendations

Most people still confuse the LWV with the Junior League and the Urban League. A strategic plan for marketing the the LWV should be made, with a State Board position established to oversee its implementation. The League

needs a MUCH higher profile if it is to compete with other organizations for members.

As a part of the marketing plan, a historical list of National, state and local League studies and accomplishments should be added to the Internet site, and in turn, hyperlinked to the Home Page of every city in the state which has a League. Excerpts should also be hand delivered (so they get published!) to local newspaper editors prior to the anniversary date of the League in that area. If the county has a Home Page, the League ought to have a link.

A second tier of the marketing plan is to focus on teachers as key leaders in their communities as and potential members or partners. State High School Graduation standards require students to perform community service. Part of the plan might include the State League offering a Voter Service project designed

to meet the standard, working in conjunction with the local League.

Another high profile strategy could be something similar to the "Got MilK?" campaign, but using well known politicians and citizens to endorse the League in Public Service Messages for television, video radio and print. This might be most effective in a Presidential election year and from the National LWV.

Another way to attract the attention of teachers is to focus on schools educating English as Second Language teachers because of the League ciriculum written in Spanish. Many ESL teachers are also teaching content courses like government. Hamline and the U of M are the only schools with this high demand specialty. It would be a way to initiate a relationship with education faculty at the

college and graduate school level.

Another marketing piece could be a Press Packet with Letters to the Editor and other TIMELY commentary pieces on National and State League activities. Some local papers may be open to a regular League column. Or, perhaps these articles could be sent on disk or downloaded (and personalized) by the local League for publication. Keeping a higher profile is the object.

The State LWV should initiate state awards for: local League projects, cleanest campaign, best collaborative project, "Leaguer of the Year", and perhaps some negative awards as well (like the "Most Violations of Open Meeting Law" etc., as a way to spotlight success (and closed political practices) and encourage others

and keep the League in the public view.

Local Leagues should be encouraged to set up community awards with same

objectives.

New Member orientation materials as well as general information can be repackaged at very reasonable costs. For example, audio portions of existing League videos can be remixed and mass-produced for distribution on cassette tapes. Video tapes can be re-edited and mixed to create topic sensitive materials from old or visually outdated videos (See attached memo).

The State LWV could offer regional workshops for members, as well as the general public. Perhaps a one-day seminar could have break-out sessions in:

"How To Build Collaborative Partnerships in Your Community" and "Everything"

Need To Know To Run for Political Office" "How to Run a Successful

You Need To Know To Run for Political Office", "How to Run a Successful Campaign" and "Making Technology Work for You". Coordinating a one day event is more manageable and less costly than multiple shorter events. I would

also suggest that the break-out sessions be videotaped and that this entire event should be repeated annually for at least three years. One, the information presented would not be quickly outdated (and could be easily updated). Two, probably only two sessions could be attended in one mini-conference. Three, it

usually takes three events to maximize public exposure.

The National program "Making Democracy Work" should be the focus of the State LWV Board for the next five years with a new position added to the Board specifically charged to monitor activities of Leagues around the state. I further recommend that all Leagues operating in a county collaborate on this project. which would focus on county or regional issues. Individual Leagues could hold round table discussions and educational forums in their own communities, but have responsibility for only one piece of the project as well as the identification of potential collaborative partners in their own community. It would be particularly advantageous to have a member of the Red Wing League in the State Board position. Each League, as a collaborative partner, could take on the responsibilities of one subcommittee, rather than trying to tackle the entire project alone. I believe this regional approach will motivate and encourage Leagues with few members to see the LWV as still a dynamic organization. At the very least, perhaps a demonstration project could be undertaken by the Red Wing League for their county, acting as mentors and partners with Northern Dakota County. The project will build upon the seeding done in the Hastings community (the county seat).

I strongly recommend that any remaining monies from the Building Better Communities Project be used to create a professional video documenting the success of the Red Wing League in their two year "Making Democracy Work" project. A step-by-step video and accompanying guide (simplifying the National materials) would help other Leagues conceptualize (and sell) this project in their own community. It is a "good government" project that is broad in scope and non-threatening to existing social and political power structures, while giving the League a high profile and a position as facilitator of citizen involvement. A "What Works.. What Doesn't" guide from the Red Wing experience is a practical transference of knowledge and experience. This video should be distributed to every League in the state

as proof of the feasibility of the project.

The systematic airing of this proposed video on local cable stations around the state should also be included as part of the overall strategic plan for marketing the League. The Red Wing experience is something that merits attention from local metro television stations, and perhaps national news magazine shows, as well (contacted by the National LWV).

To paraphrase an environmental theme, we ought to try to "Think BIG, act

locally!"

Nearly three years after we finished our work with projects and activities celebrating the 75th anniversary of the Nineteenth Amendment and our decision to leave a legacy to the State of Minnesota in the form of a memorial garden, the project is about to be built. Sufficient funding has been achieved to proceed with the project. The efforts of Lieutenant Governor Joanne Benson, Senator Sandy Pappas, and Representative Phyllis Kahn were key elements in the three-year process of obtaining adequate funding for the memorial.

The garden design had been judged by a jury appointed by the Capitol Area and Architecture Board (CAAP) and was awarded to Ralph Nelson, head of an architectural firm called LOOM (his associates were all women). Throughout the three years, we have been meeting regularly (and frequently) to go over the design and to do all the things necessary to make sure that the memorial would meet the specifications of the state (very exacting) and the expectations of the sponsors, represented by Harriette and Barbara until Harriette decided to spend her winters in Arizona and then Susan Gross took her place. We want you all to how much the CAAP Board staff — Nancy Stark, director, and her associates, Mary Duroche (until she retired in December 1997) and Paul Mandell — have given to this effort, and we all owe them our highest praise. Other participants have included architects and advisers on such matters as maintenance and safety. Representing the state Department of Administration has been Sally Grams, an architect by training, and no one could have been more determined to see that this project would succeed both in terms of design specifications and cost containment. It has been a very instructive experience to have been able to participate in these meetings.

With that as background, we can now turn to the business of constructing the memorial. The groundbreaking will take place on Wednesday, August 26 at high noon on the corner of Cedar Street and Constitutional Avenue on the Capitol Mall. August 26, as you know, is the anniversary of the 19th Amendment and is now called Women's Equality Day. The League of Women Voters of Minnesota, the Upper Midwest Women's History Center, and the Minnesota Women's Consortium will be joining us in sponsorship of this event. We certainly hope that all of you can be with us on this happy occasion -- there will be brief remarks and introductions, music, celebrities, and the groundbreaking itself. Please join us — this was your idea!

The request for construction bids have gone out and they are due July 28. We are holding our collective breaths in the hope that there will be a compatible match between the money in hand and the bids that are submitted. The current budget will cover the landscaping, planting of native plants, a trellis with the names of 25 representative Minnesota suffragists, text tables with appropriate quotes from suffrage leaders, and a gatherings area for visitors and outdoor meetings or rallies. (continued on reverse side)

Also part of the plan is the planting of 10,000 daffodil bulbs this fall so that every spring the garden will be awash in yellow (one of the principal suffrage colors). We would like to involve the community in that process so that women and girls will have a sense of ownership of the memorial and a commitment to its preservation. We hope to be able to have a symbolic planting of 100 bulbs sometime in the fall. Stay tuned for more information — we may need your help on this in one way or another. Thanks for your continuing and enthusiastic support for this project! Within a short time you will be receiving a formal invitation to the event. We look forward to a reunion of the Nineteenth Amendment Celebration Committee on August 26.

P.S. For those of you interested in the convoluted tale of the money process, here 'tis. The original appropriation of \$250,000 (with a required match by us for \$50,000 from private sources) totaled \$300,000. We set aside the \$50,000 match for educational materials being prepared by the Upper Midwest Women's History Center. Our subsequent request for an additional \$100,000 in 1997, which was in the Governor's bill, was amended by DFL senators who attached a number of other memorial-type items that prompted a gubernatorial veto. By 1998, the request had risen to \$150,000 because of unforeseen inflation attached to the original infrastructure estimates. Increased costs included: preparing the site for access to the disabled; new lighting and water connections; and a sudden rise in the cost of stainless steel to be used in the construction of the trellis—which is an important component of the garden design. In a nail-biting finale, the Legislature approved the \$150,000 in the bonding bill on the last day of the session and the Governor signed the measure into law.

The year end report is incomplete at this time. The report currently shows over \$9,000 in income for the year. This does not include depreciation or losses from the Women's Building Partnership.

Appreciation was expressed to Jean Tews for her efforts in raising \$6100 over the Corporations/Foundations budget.

Development Report: Tews reported that \$19,125 have been received this fiscal year from the following contributors:

The MWB has been in operation for ten years and the Management Committee has proposed examining the physical status of the building. William Gavzy of the Gavzy Group is going to submit a proposal for a Physical Asset Evaluation. The areas to be covered include sitework, concrete, masonry, metals, wood & plastics, thermal & moisture protection, doors & windows, finishes, specialties, equipment, furnishings, conveyor system, mechanical, and electrical.

This evaluation will enable the Management Committee to prepare for any costly work for future repair or replacement. Problems with heating and ventilating and the flooring base are already a concern.

The space needs of the tenants will also be addressed. If there is a need for expansion, different scenarios will be examined.

The Committee proposes using up to \$8,000 for the Physical Asset Evaluation from the Operating Reserves which have accumulated over the past ten years to \$33,000. Up to \$4,000 of this amount will be for Gavzy's coordination and carrying out of the evaluation and up to \$4,000 more for consultants with expertise in

structural, concrete, masonry, mechanical, electrical, thermal and moisture areas.

The Committee also recommends that \$3,500 from the Partnership reserves be used for the Physical Expansion Evaluation. These reserves now stand at about \$40,000. Originally, the Partnership wanted to maintain a \$40,000 minimum in reserves to cover the cost of the note on the building held by the St. Paul HRA. That note has recently been renewed for another ten years and would be called only in case of the sale of the building.

The approved agreement between the LWVMNEF and LOTT will become effective beginning June 15 and will be reevaluated before March 31, 2000. LOTT will request that it's 501(c)(3) be inactive and the funds go into a restricted account of the LWVMNEF.

Conditions of the agreement include:

- * LWVMNEF will open a restricted account for funds raised and will assume responsibility for handling all receipts and disbursements
- * The seven member LOTT Steering Committee will continue to plan and design LOTT programs and events with approval of the LWVMNEF Board
- * LWVMNEF will hire a project director as an independent contractor to manage and coordinate the day to day aspects of the project at a flat fee or stipend



<u>Background:</u> The LWVMN provides office services--staff support, copying, phone, postage-- to LWVMNEF. As of 4/20/98 the remaining accounts receivable from LWVMNEF for fiscal year 1997-98 for services was \$24,743.73. We have enclosed a list of bills by month and by project that remain on the books. We will have a recommendation for you of which bills we should keep on the books and which we should forgive.

Billings are in two parts--direct office costs and "administrative reimbursement," the latter overhead fee applied only to program or program-related projects. Generally in the past, we have retained on the books accounts receivable for projects and/or funded projects, especially those for which we have a reasonable expectation of raising money from grants or sales. We have sometimes only paid direct costs and forgiven the administrative reimbursement. Note that forgiving administration and fundraising related invoices will reduce the percentage devoted to administration and fundraising we report to the Attorney General's Office, Charitable Organizations Division, which should be well under 30%.

5. REVISION OF AGENDA

6. Minnesota Women's Consortium: Frisch: Motion: to nominate Kay Erickson, LWVMN Board member, to be LWVMN representative to the Minnesota Women's Consortium Steering Committee.

Background: Kay has worked with the MWC in several capacities and knows and understands its history and the challenges facing it. Former LWVMN President Joan Higinbotham has been the League's representative for many years but does not want to continue. The MWC's future is important to us because they are our partners in the MN Women's Building in addition to being a clearinghouse for women's organizations and providing a wealth of information about women's issues.

7. LWV of Moorhead: Matlock: Motion: to recommend that LWVUS grant the request of LWV of the Moorhead Area to disband.

Background: They have been non-functioning since spring of 1996. They agreed at that time that they probably couldn't continue. During that summer in conversation with the president, it was decided they should make an attempt to do some Voter Serveie in the fall. As it turned out, she couldn't get people to do even that. We subsequently discussed state unit status, and before that was put into place, a number of their members paid MAL dues. Beyond that nothing developed. There was no one willing to do anything. It has taken them an inordinate amount to get their formal request in, but it is here and their check will follow. That required more discussion.

Several different people met with them on an annual basis for several years--something they wanted--and our impressions were almost identical. They were into themselves, perfectly satisfied with the way they were, so any discussion of the need for membership growth fell on deaf ears. They never made any effort at an, order began to dwindle sharply.

For your information, Kathleen Pickering, Membership Chair, has scheduled a meeting for May 20th, to which she has invited about twenty representatives from local Leagues to talk about their successes with membership recruitment and to advise LWVMN about what tools from LWVMN local Leagues would find useful in either recruitment or retention.

10. Proportional Voting: Susan Weisbrod will explain this issue to the Board; it promises to be a hot topic at the LWVUS Convention. (to be discussed here only if we don't get to it at lunch)

Strategies for Strengthening local Leagues suggestions for 5/13/98 Board discussion from Peggy Thompson and Sally Sawyer

- 1. Board liaisons and Regional Reps to give local Leagues more individual attention (have tried various versions of this in the past)
- 2. Field Service person to monitor/assess health of local Leagues/arrange for and make field service visits with Field Service Chair (currently in place)
- 3. Pilot Project: state League provided administrative support to free up local League time for innovative programming, membership recruitment, etc. (early 1990s)
- 4. LWVMN Field Service has provided leadership/local League Board training upon request to local Leagues, especially in late summer, early Fall. (currently in place)
- 5. Once upon a time, LWVMN provided intensive Spring leadership workshops for various portfolios: president, bulletin editor, finance, action, voter service, membership. Regional workshops are usually held every other year in the Fall in several locations to provide specific information about the new study and other LWVMN initiatives.
- 6. Membership recruitment efforts: recruitment from NOW list was successful, but retention was a failure; have tried membership mailings to hundreds of drops (a very small response relative to size of mailing), to MN Historical Society list (no response). (early to mid 1990s)
- 7. Membership Committee develop a plan to help recruitment, retention, orientation with input from local Leagues (first meeting 5/20)
- 8. Leadership manual: developed a leadership training manual; lots of paper, limited use; a few leadership workshops at Convention were very popular. (late 1980s)

For struggling Leagues:

- 1. Visits, calls with follow-up contacts: this takes more than one visit--ongoing attention is required--in person, by phone; involvement of various Board members contributing their specific expertise. Follow-through! Multiple visits over time until the League can make it on its own.
- 2. We could try a "mentoring" program: a strong local League could help a struggling nearby League (if both are willing).

- * 10. (third paragraph) Board members are expected to be representatives of the State Board at these meetings, rather than to be local League delegates.

Leaders of Today and Tomorrow: The League and LOTT leaders have continued to meet and discuss possible scenarios for LOTT coming under the League umbrella. It is felt that there are many positive reasons for League to undertake this project. Among those are that:

- * The LOTT projects fall under League guidelines
- * League would be involved with young women
- * There could be new funding opportunities.

There was concern that League staff would be stretched. Also, that there might be friction between the LOTT organization and the League. The importance of defining the roles of each group beforehand was stressed.

League participants feel that LOTT wants to continue in some manner and that discussions between the two groups should continue.

April 4th Council and Retreat: The agenda and directions for the April 4th Council were enclosed. Board members were asked to notify the office know by March 23 if they cannot attend. Handouts that are to be distributed for Council need to be in the office so that a packet can be prepared.

The 1998-99 Budgets for LWVMN and LWVMNEF: A part of the Council meeting will be a review of the 1998-99 budget. A two-year budget was adopted at the 1997 State Convention and there are no anticipated major revisions to the budget. The Treasurer's Report for the end of the fiscal year will not be ready for the April 4th Council. Possible changes in PMPs, to be adopted at the 1999 LWVMN Convention, will be presented for discussion. While the LWVMNEF budget is adopted by that Board at a Spring meeting, it will also be discussed at Council.

Duffy will have foot surgery on April 7 and will not be in the office for a time.

Background: LOTT is a program founded in 1993 by Annie Lee to encourage college women to participate in public leadership and the political process. Its first conference was January 1994. Since then LOTT has organized four *Women Making a Difference in Public Policy* conferences. In 1996, LOTT added a *Making a Difference: Local and Grassroots* conference. Also that year, working with MN Women Lawyers, LOTT organized the *Women, Law and Public Policy* seminar. Until it obtained its 501(c)(3) status last spring, it was a program of the Minnesota Women's Consortium operating out of an incubator space in the MN Women's Building,

Founder and Coordinator Annie Lee has moved to Washington, D.C. On the advice of its Board of Advisors, LOTT is now seeking to become a program of another organization. Because the goals of LOTT and the League are so compatible, League would seem to be a good partner for LOTT. We have had several meetings with their board and have a plan for how LOTT and the LWVMNEF might work together-

The main concerns of LOTT have been their 501(c)(3) status, loss of autonomy and using up their cash on hand. (They recently learned that they can inactivate their tax status without giving it up altogether.) League's concerns have been how to provide LOTT with the

autonomy it wants and still have control over a program that will have League's name on it and how to make sure we recover our costs.

The attached agreement outlines how a collaboration might work. In short:

- LOTT would become a program of the LWVMNEF for a trial 2-year period
- LOTT will write a letter to the IRS requesting an inactive status for its 501(c)(3) ruling
- LOTT will write funders notifying them that funds raised will go into an account with the LWVMNEF
- LWVMNEF will open a restricted account for LOTT funds
- The LOTT steering committee will continue to plan and design LOTT programs/events. LWVMNEF will approve them as EF projects with budgets and timelines
- A member of the committee will serve on/or report to the LWVMNEF Board; a member of the Board will serve on the LOTT steering committee
- LWVMNEF will provide administrative support:
 Receive and disburse funds
 Assist with preparing funding proposals and budgets
 Office assistance (phone calls, mail, processing registrations, providing mailing lists, preparing letters, news releases)
- LWVMNEF will provide space for the program (same station and phone in incubator, paid for with LOTT funds)
- LWVMNEF will charge LOTT for actual staff costs
- Anticipated events for 1998-99: Rosalie Wahl Fundraiser/recognition dinner (9/23/98);
 the LOTT training seminar (January); development of a mentoring project. (They are
 also thinking about a symposium concerning the role of arts in public leadership.)

Notice has been received that the Joyce Foundation will give the LWVMNEF a \$19,285 grant for a survey to be conducted by LLs. The survey will focus on candidates and how they finance their campaigns. This information will be used to suggest improvements in campaign finance laws. Weisbrod will attend a conference in Chicago at the end of April and there are funds for additional attendees. A project manager needs to be hired and a job description was circulated.

Minnesota Compact: Tim Penny spoke to the Board about the history of the Minnesota Compact, '96 projects, their successes and areas for improvement. The Minnesota Compact is a known system now and it is hoped that editorial boards will be more agreeable to the concept this year. The timing of activities this year will be more closely tied to the election cycle. He talked about the League system of disseminating information and encouraging citizens to become informed.

Five planks were distributed and discussed. The goal is to raise the level of campaigning in the debates, advertising, media, citizens' participation and interest groups and political parties. Plank one deals with debates. There will be two debates coordinated through the Compact. One will be co-sponsored by the *Star Tribune* and KTCA. The second one will be organized by the League and WCCO-TV. These debates will follow the League format. Other groups organizing debates will be

sent suggested formats. It is hoped that the debates will be used creatively by the media to disseminate information in a variety of ways.

The Pew Charitable Trust has given a large donation to the Annenberg School at the University of Pennsylvania for the Alliance for Better Campaign Project. It is funding ten demonstration projects nationally in areas where there are significant Governor races. The MN Compact will receive \$40,000 for activities in Minnesota. This money will be used to finance the administrative expenses of the Compact.

The McKnight Foundation is being approached for a grant of \$97,000 and the Minneapolis Foundation for \$40,000. If these funds are received, they will fund other affiliated projects.

The Minnesota Compact Steering Committee and Associate members are a high profile group that is well represented by the major political parties. The co-chairs of the committee include: Dean Barkely (Reform Party), Joanell Dyrstad (Republican Party), Tim Penny (Democratic Party), and Judy Duffy (LWVMN). Janna Haug will continue as the project director.

The League is being asked to act as the fiscal agent and to coordinate Compact activities from the League office using League guidelines. The impact on the staff will be considerable. Sawyer will have oversight responsibility as the financial manager. The use of an 800 number is proposed and all staff will need to be kept apprised of the project to effectively answer phone calls relating to the Compact. There was some discussion whether a new 800 number should be purchased. It was decided to use the current 800 number and evaluate the impact on the usage.

Minnesota Women's Building Parntership/Management Committee Proposal

The Minnesota Women's Building Partnership/Managment Committee asks each of the Boards of the MWB Partners, the Minnesota Women's Consortium, Chrysalis and the League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund, to ratify the following motions:

Motions from the 4/21/98 MN Women's Building Partnership/Management Committee Meeting.

Motion: to move forward with Physical Asset Evaluation and Steps 1 & 2 of the Physical Expansion Feasibility Study, the physical asset evaluation not to exceed \$8,000 and the physical expansion study, steps one and two, not to exceed \$3,500.

Motion: the prior resolution will be funded as follows: the physical asset evaluation portion from operating replacement reserves, not to exceed \$8,000, and the physical expansion study, steps 1 &2, not to exceed \$3,500, from the partnership reserves.

As the MWB completes its tenth year of operation it is an appropriate time to examine the physical status of the building. The MWB Partnership/Management Committee asked William Gavzy of the Gavzy Group (Gavzy Group manages MWB) to submit a proposal for a Physical Asset Evaluation—the areas to be covered include sitework, concrete, masonry, metals, wood & plastics, thermal & moisture protection, doors & windows, finishes, specialties, equipment, furnishings, conveyor system, mechanical, electrical. See attached "4. Scope of Work: Physical Asset Evaluation."

The reason we feel this evaluation is important is that it will enable us to prepare for any costly work for future repair or replacement. We've had ongoing problems with the roof (insufficient insulation) and with the heating and ventilating system. We are already aware that the flooring base made of gypcrete is deteriorating and the carpeting has worn prematurely.

The Committee has also been discussing space needs of tenants, especially the Childrens' Defense Fund. CDF has approached the Committee about needing more space--they are rapidly growing and bursting the seams of the current space. CDF wishes to remain in the MWB and we believe they are good tenants to have in the building. If we are going to have to make major repairs, coordinating a study of reconfiguring or expansion of the building with these repairs seems logical. For example, one suggestion is to add another full story to the building--if we are looking at major roof repair or replacement anyway, it would only make financial sense to do the two projects simultaneously. The Physical Asset Evaluation will undoubtedly discover physical issues that could be resolved as part of a Physical Expansion.

Therefore the Committee asked William Gavzy to also submit a step-by-step Physical Expansion Plan. See enclosed "Scope of Work: Physical Expansion Coordination."

After considerable discussion, the committee chose to proceed with steps one and two, Zoning/Building Code Feasibility Analysis and Structural Feasibility Analysis. One outcome of the study might be reconfiguration of the existing space rather than expansion of the building.

Costs

The Committee proposes using up to \$8,000 for the Physical Asset Evaluation from the Operating Reserves which have accumulated over the past ten years to \$33,000. Up to \$4,000 of this amount will be for Gavzy's coordination and carrying out of the evaluation and up to \$4,000 more for consultants with expertise in structural, concrete, masonry, mechanical, electrical, thermal and moisture areas.

The Committee has recommended that we draw the \$3,500 for the Physical Expansion Evaluation from Partnership reserves, which now stand at about \$40,000. Originally the Partnership wanted to maintain a \$40,000 minimum in reserves to cover the cost of the note on the building held by the St. Paul HRA. That note has recently been renewed for another ten years (we pay no interest on the note); the note would be called only in the event of the sale of the building.

When these two studies are completed and if it appears that expansion is a good possibility, a number of other incremental evaluation steps need to be taken. We would need to form a separate committee, composed of one representative from each partner to assist in that decision-making process with authority to approve whatever is needed.

4. Scope of Work: Physical Asset Evaluation

Evaluation Means

All of the physical components of the property will be evaluated as part of the Physical Asset Evaluation. Some of these areas will be able to be adequately evaluated by William Gavzy or other staff of The Gavzy Group. Other areas will need outside experts. When possible, outside evaluations will be from contractors willing to provide free service in exchange for the opportunity to bid on any required construction work. In some areas it may be necessary to hire outside professional consultants, such as a structural engineer, where neither in-house expertise, or an outside free contractor is appropriate.

Areas to be Covered

All of the physical components and systems of the property that could result in the need for costly future repair or replacement will be evaluated. The major areas to be covered will include the following construction areas present on the property as organized according to the Construction Specifications Institute (CSI) Masterformat system that is universally used in architectural specifications:

Work Product

The end result of the Physical Asset Evaluation would be the following:

Narrative Description of Existing Condition

Each of the areas identified above would have a detailed narrative description of their present condition, their expected useful life, any other relevant information and the source of the evaluation and information.

Proposed Scope of Necessary Improvements

Those items that will need to be replaced or repaired over the next 10 years will be identified with a detailed description of the reason for replacement or repair and a detailed description of the scope of such replacement or repair.

Estimated Costs of Necessary Improvement

Those items that are expected to be replaced or repaired during the coming 10 years will have a cost estimate for such replacement or repair in both current dollars as well as projected future dollars.

10-Year Replacement Reserve Analysis

Finally, all of this information will be summarized in a detailed spreadsheet that will calculate the amount and timing of dollars needed to fund the needed repairs and replacements over the next 10 years.

5. Scope of Work: Physical Expansion Coordination

The feasibility of physically expanding the Minnesota Women's Building would be approached incrementally; that is to say, a series of small incremental steps will be taken to assess whether the project is feasible. Thus, if a determination of unfeasibility is eventually made, a minimum amount of effort and cost would have been expended. Each additional incremental step in this process would generally be increasingly more complex, time-consuming and expensive. Progression from one step to the next would require explicit approval from the Partnership.

The following would be a preliminary scope of work for these incremental steps. In general, the first five steps relate to feasibility, the remainder of the steps relate to coordination of the implementation of the project and owner representation of the Partnership. Owner representation includes selecting, contracting with, and coordinating the work of all necessary professionals such as architects, engineers, testing and surveying consultants, attorneys, title insurance companies, and marketing firms.

I. Zoning/Building Code Feasibility Analysis

The first step in determining feasibility is to look at the St. Paul Zoning Ordinance and City and State Building Code to see how much additional space could be added to the building "as of right"; how much additional space could be added under a special permit and how difficult such a special permit would be to obtain; and whether there are any other zoning or building code restrictions that would be significant.

2. Structural Feasibility Analysis

Once zoning and building code feasibility is established we would hire a structural engineering consultant to preliminarily assess the structural feasibility of adding space above the existing building and the extent of any architectural or financial restrictions the existing structure would impose on a physical expansion of the building.

3. Disruption to Existing Tenants Feasibility Analysis

Next we would explore methods to minimize the disruption to existing occupants of the building and determine if the expected disruptions arising from an expansion would be acceptable to the tenants.

4. Architectural Programming Coordination

The actual preparation of the architectural program (including such things as the amount of space to be added, the desired characteristics of the additional space, etc.) would be done by an architectural consultant. However, The Gavzy Group would serve as the coordinator of this work. The program will have to address not just the desired characteristics of the additional space, but also issues related to the existing space such as: changes to accommodate the addition, the location of the communal photocopier; new telecommunications technology relating to telephones and computers; redesign of the existing Chrysalis space; inadequate existing storage space; etc. Coordination with the existing telecommunications consultant, Diane Gibson, will be required.

5. Financial Feasibility Analysis

Once a program is developed a definite financial feasibility analysis can be performed. This would entail developing a detailed project schedule and project budget. This would then indicate the extent of funding that would need to be raised.

6. Schematic Design Coordination

An architect would need to be selected and contracted with to prepare a schematic design from the approved architectural program. The ultimate design may involve not just additional space but also changes to existing space on all the levels of the building.

7. Design Development Coordination

Once the schematic design is approved by the Partnership, we would coordinate the work of the Architect in completing the design development drawings. This will allow a more accurate fine-tuning of the project budget. The work product of this step could include presentation materials needed for the next step.

8. Fund-Raising Assistance

The Partnership would be responsible for raising needed funds for the project. However, The Gavzy Group would be available to provide assistance such as providing information, seeing that the Architect provides necessary presentation materials such as architectural renderings or models, and for participating in fund-raising meetings or presentations.

9. Legal Coordination

Besides hiring and coordinating the work of necessary attorneys, we would also coordinate the governmental review process which might include obtaining zoning variances or special permits.

10. Construction Documentation Coordination

We would then coordinate the work of the Architect in completing the working drawings and specifications. We would also prepare the construction contract and any other contract documents not prepared by the Architect.

11. Construction Contracting Coordination

We would select and contract with the construction contractor(s) either through negotiation or bidding.

12. Construction Coordination

During the Construction Phase The Gavzy Group would:

• Represent the Partnership in all dealings with the contractor(s)s and the architect, e.g., re. change orders, pay requests, etc.

Coordinate the architect/engineer's administration of the construction contract.

Periodically visit the site at intervals appropriate to the stage of construction to become familiar
with the progress of the work and protect the interests of the Partnership.

Monitor the progress of the contractor(s).

 Maintain records of payments on account of the construction contracts; control all costs to keep the project within budget.

 Coordinate the provision of funds by the lender and the disbursement of funds by the title company.

 Participate with the contractor(s) and architect in the Substantial Completion Inspection and Final Completion Inspection.

Coordinate with any lending institutions.

Select and contract with a marketing firm if necessary to market any space not yet committed.

13. Move-in Coordination

If necessary, The Gavzy Group could also assist the partners within the Partnership and for the equipment to be owned by the Partnership in planning for, and moving into the newly expanded space.

6. Coordination Between Two Projects

Coordination between these two projects - the Physical Asset Evaluation and the Physical Expansion Coordination - is absolutely critical. The Physical Asset Evaluation will undoubtedly discover physical issues that can be resolved as part of the Physical Expansion, e.g., deteriorating gypcrete flooring not remedied within the next few months, or inadequately insulated roof areas that may simply be removed as part of the expansion. Thus the scope of work of the expansion may depend a great deal on the results of the Physical Asset Evaluation.

Likewise, the Physical Asset Evaluation will depend on both the existence and the scope of the Physical Expansion. Therefore, the 10-Year Replacement Analysis that is a major result of the Physical Asset Evaluation may need to have two versions: one for if there is a physical expansion; a second for if there is no physical expansion.

Agreement between the Leaders of Today and Tomorrow(LOTT) and the League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund draft, 4/9/98

This is an agreement between the Leaders of Today and Tomorrow(LOTT) and the League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund(LWVMNEF), whereby LOTT becomes a program of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund for a trial period of two years.

The agreement will become effective beginning June 15 following the approval of the Board of Directors of LOTT and the Board of Directors of LWVMNEF. This relationship will be reevaluated before March 31, 2000 (the end of LWVMNEF's fiscal year 1999-2000).

Pursuant to this agreement the LOTT Board will write to the Internal Revenue Service requesting an inactive status for its 501(c)(3) ruling. Funds raised by LOTT will go into a restricted account of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund.

The LOTT Board will write to funders to notify them that contributions and funds raised for the LOTT program will go into an account with the League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund and that LOTT has become a program of the LWVMNEF.

LWVMNEF, upon approval of LOTT as a program of the Education Fund, will open a restricted account for funds raised from corporations, foundations, individual contributors fees and interest. LWVMNEF will assume responsibility for handling all receipts and disbursements and will report to the LWVMNEF Board and to the LOTT Steering Committee on a regular basis.

The LOTT Steering Committee will continue to plan and design LOTT programs and events. Such programs and events will be presented to the LWVMNEF Board for approval as education fund projects, with proposed budgets and timelines; the LWVMNEF Board will have the final decision about whether a project can be carried out (given circumstances such as availability of funds, personnel, other events/projects on the LWVMNEF agenda).

A member of this Committee will serve on and/or report to the LWVMNEF Board of Directors. A member of the LWVMNEF Board will serve on the LOTT Steering Committee.

LWVMNEF will hire a project director as an independent contractor to manage and coordinate the day to day aspects of the project at a flat fee or stipend, the amount to be determined by funding available and prospects for income to the project. This person could work from the LOTT station in the incubator or, if preferred, from home.

The LWVMNEF agrees to provide administrative support to the LOTT program in the following ways:

*receipt of and disbursement of LOTT funds, with regular reporting as stated in paragraphs 4,5, and 6 of this agreement, to be primarily carried out by the LWVMNEF bookkeeper, with oversight by LWVMNEF Executive Director and Treasurer;

*assistance in preparing funding proposals and budgets, to be primarily carried out by LWVMNEF Development Director in consultation with LOTT Chair or

project director;

*Office assistance, such as receiving phone calls, directing messages, opening and routing mail, processing registrations, providing mailing lists, faxing, preparing letters, mailings, news releases as necessary, will be carried out by LWVMNEF's Administrative Assistant and LOTT's project director or Chair;

*Executive Director will assign above duties in consultation with LOTT Chair and/or project director and will assist in planning, budgeting and implementing projects of LOTT.

In addition, LWVMNEF will provide a space for the program (same station in incubator, paid for with LOTT funds) with a phone (paid for with LOTT funds). LWVMNEF will arrange call-forwarding to LWVMNEF office phones so that LOTT phone calls will be answered during the League's office hours.

LWVMNEF will

- * provide its fax and fax number to the LOTT program;
- * provide copying at .06 per copy, charged to the project;
- * postage at cost from its postage meter;
- * provide its e-mail address to LOTT;
- * add LOTT program and event information to its website and its newsletter;
- * will promote LOTT as a program of LWVMNEF to its local Leagues, members, and funders;
- *provide membership lists for LOTT events;
- *provide media list for promotion/publicity purposes.

It is anticipated that LOTT activities for the 1998-99 year will include the Rosalie Wahl Fundraiser/recognition dinner, tentatively scheduled for Fall of 1998, depending on availability of Rosalie Wahl and suitable location; the LOTT training seminar, tentatively scheduled for 1/14-16 or 17 of 1999; the development of a mentoring project. Also planned is a project/symposium concerning the role of arts in public policy. Each of these projects will be presented to the LWVMNEF Board for approval, with a budget and timeline.

LWVMNEF will charge the LOTT project for actual staff costs plus an administrative reimbursement fee, related to staff time spent on the project; these rates are applied equally to all projects of the LWVMNEF on a monthly basis.

Should this arrangement prove to be unworkable to either party, this agreement can be terminated by the consent of the LWVMNEF Board and the LOTT Steering Committee.

Under such circumstances, all funds, including interest, not expended on LOTT programs will be returned by LWVMNEF to LOTT, following the reactivation of its 501(c)(3) tax status.
