Dear board members:

Larry Hansen, VP of the Joyce Foundation (Chicago), recently called me to talk about their interest in supporting some new democracy building work in MN (I had met him sometime back at a conference in Evanston). A couple of weeks later we talked again, and I said it would be nice if he could come to MN to talk with us. Lo and behold he came to our office 2 days ago-he decided to come to MN to talk with Walter Mondale and Arne Carlson et al., and made us part of his trip schedule.

Gwen, Nancy Witta (who lobbies on government issues), Sally, Heidi and I met with him (Carol would have liked to be there but couldn't) about Joyce's agenda and discussed LWVMN at length. The upshot is that we were advised that Joyce would entertain a proposal from us: it seemed clear that the goals of Joyce's democracy agenda fit very naturally with the mission of LWVMN and frankly with what we do and have been doing for years. Not incidentally, Joyce is focusing on the upper Midwest and is already working with the LWVs of Ohio, Wisconsin, Illinois and to a lesser extent Michigan. A two-year project and \$100K were mentioned.

The same group met again this morning (without Larry of course) and listed out how our project might look. The ultimate goal would be to diagnose democracy in MN (health, pathologies) through a hard look at certain measures such as election law, cial independence, role of media, redistricting, campaign finance. In this effort LWVMN would serve as "trusted convenor," bring a wide variety of voices to the table, steer the agenda with the goal of disseminating findings to the public and thus raising the consciousness of MN citizens, and potentially laying the groundwork for reform. As you know we are known and respected by, and we work with, an impressive number of organizations, media, government, etc. As such we are well positioned to serve as convenor and in fact catalyst for this wide-ranging project.

So there's a glimpse of what we discussed, first with Larry Hansen, and then amongst ourselves. If we are awarded a grant, we would employ a project director, so the work would not fall directly on the board. But we need board support to submit the proposal. Before we submit a formal letter of inquiry we need you to approve this project as an Ed Fund project, and to support our pursuit of a grant to carry it out.

We have an extremely short timeline. PLEASE RESPOND TO ME by 5:00 p.m. on Monday (the 18th). Thank you and ever onward!!





# LWVUS president promotes "pro-voter" reform

LWVUS Press Release

League of Women Voters President Mary G. Wilson testified on December 7, 2006, before an open meeting of the U.S. Election Assistance Commission. The meeting, titled "Assessing the 2006 Election," brought together experts and elections officials in an effort to shed light on how 2006 election administration went, what challenges voters faced at the polls, and what reforms to our election systems are needed in the future.

"It is extremely frustrating that we saw some of the same types of problems in 2006 that we saw in 2000," said Wilson. "Ballot design was the problem with the butterfly ballot in Florida in 2000 and ballot design seems to have been the problem in Sarasota's undervote in 2006. It is time to start getting the basic management issues right"...

"The one issue that must be a priority for the EAC between now and 2008 is poll worker management. . . We need systems in place that are pro-voter; but they can't be pro-voter if they are not pro-poll worker as well," Wilson said. "The EAC can also play a powerful role in assessing why polling place administration problems happen, sharing best practices, and offering guidance to elections officials to make the system work better for the voter."

"We need to apply the lessons of 2006 to make sure voters are well served in 2008 regardless of where they live, who they are, or by what method they voted. We need to make sure the answer to whether the system works in 2008 is not 'It depends' but a resounding 'Yes,'" concluded Wilson.

## League models democracy

At the start of this new year, here is something to consider: In the 1940s there were 100,000 nonprofit organizations in this country; today there are 1.5 million. Clearly, in order for the League of Women Voters to survive and prosper in the midst of such a huge crowd of nonprofits, we members must know exactly—and be able to explain to others—just who we are, and why we *deserve* to survive and prosper.



I know of no other organization like the League of Women Voters: political, yet nonpartisan; grassroots and volunteer driven, with a vast network of local Leagues across the country and a presence in much of the world; an organization that itself models democracy as it works to engage citizens in it. In short the League does the on-the-ground, day-to-day work of democracy and has done so for 87 years.

In Minnesota how are we working for democracy? For a start here is a recap of our voter service efforts: During the 2006 election season

- we held a record eight televised debates (gubernatorial and US Senate debates reached over 500,000 viewers), produced information-packed Voter Guides (300,000 distributed), and set up and staffed a hotline. We sponsored 47 billboards around the metro area urging citizens to vote. Our website election pages received nearly 133,000 hits.
- We co-sponsored with Citizens for Election Integrity Minnesota's first post election audit observation project.
- Along with our partners in the Voting Rights Coalition, we helped protect voting rights and prevent voter suppression.

Finally—no small thing—the Minnesota resolutions passed at the 2004 and 2006 LWVUS conventions brought the national League around to a position favoring a paper trail and random audits for all election systems, a position that found its way into LWV President Mary Wilson's testimony to the Election Assistance Commission last month.

On other fronts:

- Leadership Training: Our Leaders of Today and Tomorrow seminar in public policy is bringing together some 50 college women from the upper Midwest for training this month.
- Advocacy: In this new legislative session our 15- member Action Committee will be following and lobbying on bills, in accordance with League positions.
- Good government: Our two-year study, Examining a State Agency: Minnesota Pollution Control Agency will be available shortly.
- Public Education/Diversity: This winter we will celebrate the publication of the fifth edition of our *Indians in Minnesota* (University of Minnesota Press).
- Independent Judiciary: I have been serving on former Governor Quie's Commission on the Preservation of an Impartial Judiciary; a recommendation will be out shortly.
- Civic Education: Juanita Peterson, LWVMN first vice president, is working on a project to restore the civic mission of our schools—this through the Alliance for Representative Democracy.

The League of Women Voters engages citizens in civic life, helps to make public policy, demands good government, educates members and the public, and trains future leaders. The League was necessary in 1920, and it is necessary now. "But," as Shirley McConnell es in the current LWV Brainerd Lakes *Voter*, "we cannot continue this work that we eve in if we do not tell our story to like-minded women who should be joining us in these endeavors... we need more hands and hearts and minds to carry on..."

We know our story, and we need to tell it. Let us all build membership in this wonderful and essential organization.

## Observation Project a success . . .

## MN Citizens for Election Integrity makes history

This fall LWVMN partnered with Minnesota's Citizens for Election Integrity (CEIMN) and made history by overseeing the nation's first ever statewide observation of a post-election review.

#### Requires random recounts

The review itself, Minnesota's first, resulted from legislation passed in 2006 and focused on determining the accuracy of our optical scan voting machines. The 2006 law requires each county to randomly select 2 to 4 precincts for a hand-count to take place one week after the general election. The results of the hand-count are then compared to the machine tallies provided on Election Day. If an error rate greater than .05% is discovered in any one precinct, further reviews are then triggered within that precinct's county.

#### Permits independent observers

Minnesota is the thirteenth state to enact such a law. LWVMN and CEIMN made Minnesota the very first state in the country to undergo a review in the presence of independent citizens trained to observe and verify in a non-partisan manner.

CEIMN initiated the Observation Project in the spring of 2005, and LWVMN joined as a project co-sponsor in midummer. The long-term goal is to position Minnesota as a leader nationally in the effort to conduct verifiable elections that enjoy widespread public confidence.

CEIMN recruited and trained teams to observe in 70 of Minnesota's 87 counties. LWVMN members were a great help in that effort. Ann Gerlach of Detroit Lakes worked hard to ensure that Becker County was covered with a great group of volunteer observers. Another fantastic example is Peg Sundell of New Ulm, Minnesota. As president of her local chapter Peg single-handedly recruited her fellow LWV members to cover a total of 5 counties in southern Minnesota, providing invaluable help to the project in that part of the state.

#### Only two errors found

Of Minnesota's 4,121 precincts, 195, or nearly 5%, were reviewed. Overall, the review proved to be a tremendous success, with only two counties finding errors that triggered further review. Both of those instances involved human, and not machine, error.

Both outgoing Secretary of State Mary Kiffmeyer and newly-elected Secretary of

State Mark Ritchie praised the postelection review for providing a way to demonstrate the accuracy of Minnesota's voting machines and for creating public confidence in Minnesota's election results.

#### Citizen volunteers made this work

The civic-minded individuals who took the time to show up and observe the review were crucial in making this new review process one that effectively builds voter confidence. LWVMN and CEIMN are proud to have taken part in this endeavor and look forward to keeping Minnesota a leader in electoral integrity.

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#### League of Women Voters of Minnesota Board Meeting Minutes

Minnesota Women's Building Saturday, November 18, 2006

President Palmer called the meeting to order at 10:14 a.m.

- 1. **Housekeeping**: Sawyer announced that Barb Person has agreed to stay on as outreach person and will continue in that capacity through convention but is off the month of December. We are close to hiring a legislative coordinator. Christy Dording has been retained as the project director for LOTT. Board members are urged to fill out the conflict of interest Disclosure Questionnaire now. The next President's Mailing will have information on the state study, legislative interviews, program planning, LOTT seminar and the Spirit of Democracy Awards application. The nominating committee is asking for a response from current board members as well as suggestions for new board members. Sawyer will be out of town November 21-27.
- 2. **Diversity:** Mae Brooks was moved up on the agenda so that she could leave when her report was finished. Brooks reported that things are going well with the diversity project. An article will be in the next issue of the *Voter*. Brooks is working on determining how many leagues are interested in dialogue groups. Facilitators for the groups will be trained in January. The goal is to have dialogue groups in ten communities.
- 3. President's Report: Palmer reported that:

- Everyone is invited to the Holiday Party at Palmer's home on December 9.

- Minnesota had the highest voter turnout in the nation with 59.5% of eligible voters voting. In 2004 we had 63% voting.
- Mary Wilson, the new LWVUS President, is a good communicator. She knows that the local leagues are the front lines of league work and we need to keep them strong. She set up a conference call with about 8 state league presidents, including Florida and Minnesota. Florida has once again had problems with voting. Discussion ensued as to what LWVUS could do to promote election integrity. Some suggestions were lobby for same day registration, require nonpartisan election officers, provide better training for election judges.
- The scope has been adopted for the immigration study. The lead article on the study is being written by Katherine Fennelly and will appear in the next *National Voter*.
- LWVUS has set up task forces on various issues to get them ready for lobbying. Topics include

climate change and health care.

- A number of glowing letters regarding the usefulness of the Voter Guide were received. They will be forwarded to Target Corporation, the donor making the guides possible.
- 3. **Minutes**: Thompson moved approval of the LWVMN Board meeting Minutes of October 11, 2006. Seconded and passed unanimously.
- 4. **Treasurer's Report**: Hondl presented the Treasurer's Report. The report will be filed for audit. Moved, seconded and passed unanimously to confirm the email approving the LWVMN audit.
- 5. Revision of the Agenda: Myers asked to be added.
- 6. **New Board Member**: Palank moved to approve the appointment of Diane Tran to the LWVMN Board to represent the LOTT program. Seconded and passed unanimously.
- 7. **International Women's Day Co-Sponsorship**: Stuthman moved that we be a co-sponsoring organization for International Women's Day, March 3, 2007 and contribute \$50. Seconded and passed unanimously. Simmons suggested that we have an information table at the event and that we encourage attendance by league members.
- 8. **State Unit**: Frisch moved to approve the formation of a State Unit in Stevens County to be called League of Women Voters Stevens County, State Unit. There is a rather cumbersome 2-3 year procedure to become a local league. Seconded and passed unanimously.
- 8A. Transit Partners: Myers reported that a coalition of environmental and action groups is forming to lobby for transit needs and if we want to participate we would need someone to attend the meetings. Moved, seconded and passed unanimously to participate in the coalition. The goal of the Transit Partners will be to generate 365 million dollars annually for transit.
- 9. **Program Planning:** Simmons reported that she has received eight first round program suggestions from local leagues. The eight suggestions will be sent to local leagues for review and discussion. Local leagues may still propose other topics. Myers suggested that we all read the Minnesota Constitution. Steen suggested scheduling a workshop on the state constitution at state convention.
- 10. **Voter Service**: Doepner-Hove reported on a very successful voter service season. She commended the staff for all their help and work. KSTP has been a good partner for voter service activity. The Election Hotline was successful. Three hundred thousand Voter Guides were distributed and were well received. Susan Hoyt aptly handled the debates of the congressional candidates for districts 3,5 and 6; Attorney General; Secretary of State; Governor and U.S. Senator. This was the most ambitious debate season ever. The Minnesota Council of Nonprofits awarded us \$200 per debate. Wickstrom reported that the website activity was good although there were less hits than in 2004. Local leagues need to get their information to the website. We are waiting on final reports on forums around the state. General consensus that the billboards were great.

- 11. **State Election Review project**: Doepner-Hove reported the audit was observed and from the reports in, it went very well. Random audits are an important part of election integrity. Hennepin County did not post the dates for audits early enough to ensure adequate volunteer observers.
- 12. **State Study**: The study is in draft mode. Not sure if this study will lead to a consensus. We may already have positions that can be implemented.
- 13. **Action:** Myers reported that the booklet "How to Make a Difference" is at the printers. Yesterday former Minnesota house speaker Sviggum and new house speaker Kelliher came to the action committee meeting and told the committee what their caucus goals are and how they plan to "reach across the aisle." Next action committee meeting is January 12, 2007. The session starts January 3.
- 14. **LOTT:** Palank and Tran reported that Christy Dording has been retained as the project director for LOTT. Plans are underway for the seminar to be held January 11-13, 2007 at Holiday Inn East in St. Paul. It is not too late to sponsor people. The cost is approximately \$225. The kickoff banquet is January 11 and is always a great event.
- 15. **Budgets for 2007-2008 & 2008-2009**: Sawyer asked that everyone turn in their budget forms. The budget committee is: Morem, Moorman, Marshall, Power.
- 16. Nominating Committee: All current board members are asked to get their nominating form filled out and turned in to Alice Moorman.
- 17. Communications: Oliver stated that the *Voter* deadline is Friday December 29.

Meeting adjourned at 11:48 a.m.

## University of Minnesota Press Publishes League of Women Voters Minnesota's 5<sup>th</sup> Edition of *INDIANS IN MINNESOTA*

St. Paul, MN, February 2, 2007—The League of Women Voters Minnesota (LWVMN) announced today that *INDIANS IN MINNESOTA* 5<sup>th</sup> Edition, published by the University of Minnesota Press, will be released Saturday, February 3. *INDIANS IN MINNESOTA* 5<sup>th</sup> Edition is the fully updated survey of American Indian communities in Minnesota. The last edition of the book was published in 1985.

Characterized by a balanced perspective and a comprehensive approach, *INDIANS IN MINNESOTA* provides an historical and contemporary account of Ojibwe and Dakota Indians living in both reservation and urban settings. Compiled from hundreds of interviews with tribal members, as well as data from the 2000 Minnesota Census and federal and state reports, this 5<sup>th</sup> edition examines the significant changes and continuing needs of American Indians in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

Exploring American Indians' relationships with federal, state, and local governments—including the expansion of gaming and growing tribal sovereignty—this book includes extensive coverage of the status of American Indian culture, natural resources, economic development, employment, education, social services, health, housing, and criminal justice issues. The authors also focus on central concerns facing American Indians today, including widespread efforts to preserve sovereignty, culture, language, and reservations, and to build brighter futures for Indian men, women, and children.

INDIANS IN MINNESOTA is the only resource of its kind," says LWVMN Executive Director Sally Sawyer. "It offers statistics as well as insight into American Indian spiritual, cultural, and economic views to promote a better understanding of American Indian communities and to create an invaluable tool for social change."

American Indian leader and Minneapolis Library Board member Laura Waterman Wittstock says *INDIANS IN MINNESOTA* "captures 20<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup> century Minnesota American Indian history with the authenticity of being there when events unfolded."

In Minnesota, the legacy of the American Indian people is reflected in many ways. Twenty-seven of the state's counties have names of American Indian origin. The cities of Wabasha, Red Wing, and Shakopee are named for important Mdewakanton Dakota tribal leaders. With more than fifty-four thousand American Indians currently living in Minnesota, their culture and values are well represented throughout the state.


Reimbursement from EF for services is budgeted to be 95% and 96% of office operations for 2007-2008 & 2008-2009 respectively. It's unlikely that the full budgeted amounts will be realized. Please note that more than \$100,000 in office services are allocated to LWVMN functions such as Direct Service to local Leagues, Action, Administration, etc. The EF is billed for office services in two pieces: direct out-of pocket costs (salaries, copying, etc.) and an administrative reimbursement charge for each EF project billed.

### Per Member Payment rate:

Per Member Payment is calculated on a full membership of 1,510 and household members of 127. For purposes of discussion the proposed PMP is set at \$20 for members and \$10 for household members (an increase of \$2) for each fiscal year. However, other figures have been proposed: \$0 increase, a \$5 increase or \$3/\$2 increase or other variation.

**State Unit Members-at-large:** are billed at \$50 per member with a \$5 rebate; expense of \$26.30 per member for the first fiscal year for LWVUS and \$26.80 for LWVUS second fiscal year;

**Members-at-Large** who pay dues to LWVMN directly and do not affiliate with any local LWV are calculated at \$60 per member. PMP to LWVUS of \$26.30 and \$26.80 are reflected in expenses.

Dear Miriam,

I've been thinking about this for a while: based on my experience with this current study, I think we need to re-think the model. This study, like the agriculture one, and very likely some others, was really unwieldy, frustrating, and too dependent on a few individuals. It would not have happened at all if you hadn't gotten it organized to begin with, and if Sally and Helen hadn't come to every meeting and steered things in the right direction. We did not have enough people who could really commit to work on it (and I include myself). It's not a format that works well for people who are still in the workforce. And it may be that we don't need studies to develop new positions, that we have the positions we need in order to lobby, at least much of the time. (Except when circumstances change: I know we need to revisit our election of judges position.)

Anyway, I can see the problems; I don't have any terrific solutions offer. But I'm wondering whether it's too late to try to figure an alternative model for the next two years to propose at convention. If it isn't too late, I'd be happy to brainstorm with a few folks (you, for example, and Helen and maybe Marsha Oliver and Judy Stuthman, chairs of recent studies) to come up with other ways for members to be actively involved in learning and policy and whatever the other goals of studies are.

Let me know what you think. And whether it's too late to bring this up now.

But how do we involve the local leagues in the process? Maybe ask them to identify issues and then a small Board committee refines one of them? Maybe this is more or less what we do already. And if we did that, there might be even less buy-in than we currently get, at least in terms of working on them.

I'm obviously just musing out loud here. But a good start would be what you've begun, Sally, which is to set out clear goals for the study process, or maybe clear goals for keeping the grassroots alive and studies aren't necessarily one of them. I'll be interested to see what comes up for program this year; if we can contrive to make it workable, then we've got two years to figure out an alternative means of accomplishing our goals.

Sally's remarks about our debates

There are two fewer congressional than two years ago: we had five? Districts 2, 3, 5, 6, 8 with no debate in 1, 4 and 7. This year, incumbent candidates in 1, 2, 4, 7 and 8 have refused. Two years ago was the first time LWVMNEF directly sponsored televised Congressional debates—local LWVs may have done so before that with similar results. For example Fifth District forums have been held for years—although they haven't been televised by a major commercial station.

We have done US Senate and Gubernatorial debates for 28 years: the only time we failed to hold a televised general election debate was in 1990 when the sitting governor refused to participate at the last minute. In 2002, the governor debates were broadcast on MPR. And of course the televised US Senate debate in Duluth was canceled because of Senator Wellstone's untimely death.

This year we are holding Congressional debates for districts 3, 5 and 6; debates for US Senate and Governor to be aired live on a network affiliate at prime time. We are also hosting Attorney General and Secretary of State debates. This is actually the busiest debates year ever\_

### League of Women Voters of Minnesota Board Meeting Minutes

Minnesota Women's Building Wednesday, October 11, 2006

President Palmer called the meeting to order at 5:51 p.m.

1. **Housekeeping:** Sawyer asked for expense vouchers and volunteer hours as well as articles and enclosures for the Presidents' Mailing.

### 2. President's Report: Palmer reported that:

- The holiday party will be Saturday, December 9 at Palmer's home. Invitations will go out later.
- Congratulations to LWV St. Cloud for a great voter service project. The LWV St. Cloud held a Candidates' Fair on Oct. 7. They moderated 12 forums during the day, concluding with a forum for the 6<sup>th</sup> Congressional District candidates. Karen Langsjoen was congratulated for her role in the event, which was well covered and appreciated by the local press. Several hundred people attended the Fair.
- The Investment Committee is working on a conflict of interest statement and an authority statement. Proposals will go out by email shortly.
- Sally Sawyer announced that she intends to retire at the end of June. A transition committee has been appointed with the following members: Carol Frisch, Stacy Doepner-Hove, Laurie Nelson Halvorsen, Joan Higinbotham, Sandy Lutz, Vivan Jenkins Nelsen, Juanita Peterson, Jane Callahan. Palmer expressed appreciation for all that Sawyer has done over the years. Sawyer stated that she has loved her work because of the people and because what we do is so important.
- Palmer passed out a letter that she sent to Secretary of State Kiffmeyer explaining the LWV's nonpartisan policy and clarifying the LWV Duluth's role in a nonpartisan Progressive Action event in Duluth last summer that was erroneously publicized as partisan. The Secretary is reluctant to participate in LWV sponsored debates as she feels she will not get fair treatment.
- Reminder to tell Tania when you have a speaking engagement so that she can get it on the calendar.
- Palmer spoke at a Minnesota Council of Non Profits forum on the topic "How does your

organization agree to lobby on an issue?"

- -Palmer continues to serve on the Quie Commission on an independent judiciary. Palmer has stated on that commission that she believes an appointment system would work best, but it would be hard to sell to the public as they would give up their right to vote on judges. A report from the Commission will be released in January.
- Palmer attended a meeting at Hamline on judicial independence with Arne Carlson as the key speaker.
- "Avoid the hole in the resume" can be an LWV membership pitch to young women who are taking career time off to be involved with their families and communities.
- 3. **Minutes:** Thompson moved to approve the minutes of the September 13, 2006 Board Meeting. Seconded and passed unanimously.
- 4. **Treasurer's Report:** Sawyer presented the August 31, 2006 LWVMN Treasurer's Report. The report will be filed for audit.
- 5. Revision of the Agenda: Regal asked to be added to the agenda for a few remarks about convention.
- 6. **Co-Sponsorship of Immigration Forum:** Stuthman moved to approve co-sponsorship with the Humphrey Institute Center for the Study of Politics and Governance of an Immigration Forum to be held November 1 at the Humphrey Institute, University of Minnesota. This item was already approved by email. Seconded and passed unanimously to reaffirm the email vote.
- 7. **Ballot Question Constitutional Amendment:** Nancy Witta presented information on the proposed Transportation Constitutional Amendment that will be on the November 7<sup>th</sup> ballot. The arguments are outlined in the agenda. After much discussion, Frisch moved that the LWVMN stay neutral on this issue but publish a Pro and Con information piece on our website to help educate the public. The information piece will be prepared by Witta, Myers and Morem. Seconded and passed with two nay votes.
- 8. Voter Service Update: Doepner-Hove reported that the Voter Guides are out and being distributed. Hotline planning is underway. The debate schedule is finalized. Hoyt reported that all of the incumbent congressional representatives except District Reported that Jim Ramstad are declining to participate in LWV debates. This is a phenomenon throughout the country. Hoyt explained LWVMN criteria for participation in the debates and related some requests to revisit the LWVMN criteria policy by disgruntled candidates. The board affirmed her decision to stick to the approved criteria.
- 9. Voting Rights Coalition/Election Protection: The Voting Rights Coalition, of which we are a member, is doing a poll monitoring project that involves training poll monitors to give advice and direct voters to appropriate assistance. Doepner-Hove stated that we should not be a part of this project as the possibility of inadequate training could lead some poll monitors to conduct themselves in a partisan manner. The voter service committee decided not to take part in this particular project. Palmer suggested that the LWVMN put something in writing to explain our position to the coalition.

Langsjoen moved that we put our position re: non participation in the poll monitoring project in writing and deliver it to the Voting Rights Coalition. Seconded and passed with one nay.

- 10. Communications: Peterson reported on the 47 LWVMN sponsored billboards going up throughout the twin cities area with VOTE messages. Peterson had samples of the billboard messages. Great enthusiasm for this project. Peterson reminded board members of the packets of information on LWV available in the state office that could be useful at speaking engagements or other league events.
- 11. **Nominating Committee:** Moormann reported that she, Benson and Jenkins Nelsen met right before this meeting. They would like input from current board members as to whether they would like to continue on the board and in what capacity. They would also like input as to good prospects for state board members. Please feed names to the committee.
- 12. **State Study:** Steen reported that the first draft is complete. More editing and reading is going on. Oliver stated that she got a look at the draft and it is fascinating. There are two case studies in the report that read better than any novel.
- 13. **Diversity:** Jenkins Nelsen reported that the committee has tightened the time line. Mae Brooks will be meeting with local league presidents around the state. Jenkins Nelsen is contacting women's organizations of color. The dialogue groups will attempt to include some Somali-African American groups already meeting and also work in Judy Stuthman's groups of new citizens.
- 14. **Convention:** Regal has a proposed agenda for convention which she will send out by email for comments and suggestions. She reminded board members to make their liaison calls.
- 15. Miscellaneous: Benson is going to Ukraine on a LWVUS project.

Palmer adjourned the meeting at 7:32 p.m.

the case of the Executive Director, the disclosure statement shall be provided to the President.

In all cases, the recipient is the designated reviewing official responsible for bringing potential conflicts to the attention of the appropriate authority. The Secretary of the Board of Directors shall file copies of all disclosure statements with the official corporate records of LWVMN/LWVMNEF.

#### Section IV. Procedures for Review of Potential Conflicts

Whenever there is reason to believe that a potential conflict of interest exists between LWVMN/LWVMNEF and a board member, the Executive Director, committee chair, or committee member with significant decision-making authority, the Board of Directors shall determine the appropriate response. This shall include, but not be limited to, implementing the procedures described below with respect to a specific proposed action, policy or transaction. The designated reviewing official has a responsibility to bring a potential conflict of interest to the attention of the board promptly for action at the next regular meeting of the board or during a special meeting called specifically to review the potential conflict of interest.

Where the potential conflict involves a staff member or independent contractor, the Executive Director shall be responsible for reviewing the matter and may take appropriate action as necessary to protect the interests of LWVMN/LWVMNEF. The Executive Director shall report to the President the results of any review and the action taken. The President shall determine whether any further board review or action is required.

#### Section V. Disclosure Procedure

Where a potential conflict exists between the interests of LWVMN/LWVMNEF and an interested party with respect to a specific proposed action, policy or transaction, the Board of Directors shall consider the matter during a meeting of the board. The Board of Directors shall not act until the proposed action, policy or transaction has been approved by the disinterested members of the Board of Directors. The following procedures shall apply:

An interested party who has a potential conflict of interest with respect to a proposed action, policy or transaction of LWVMN/LWVMNEF shall not participate in any way, or be present during, the deliberations and decision-making vote. However, the interested party will be given an opportunity to provide information about the proposed conflict and/or action, policy or transaction. In addition, the board may request that the interested party be available to answer questions.

 The disinterested members of the Board of Directors may approve the proposed action, policy or transaction upon finding that it is in the best interests of LWVMN/LWVMNEF. The board shall consider whether the terms of the proposed action, transaction or policy are fair and reasonable and whether it would be possible, with reasonable effort, to find a more advantageous arrangement with a party or entity that is not an interested party.

- Approval by the disinterested members of the Board of Directors will be by
  vote of a majority of directors in attendance at a meeting at which a
  quorum is present. An interested party may not be counted for purposes of
  determining whether a quorum is present, or for purposes of determining
  what constitutes a majority vote of directors in attendance.
- The minutes of the meeting will reflect that the conflict disclosure was
  made to the board, the vote taken and, where applicable, the abstention
  from voting and participation by the interested party. Whenever possible,
  the minutes should explain the decision of the board in such a way that it
  provides guidance for consideration of future conflict of interest situations.

#### Section VI. Records of Proceedings

The minutes of the Board of Directors and all committees with board-delegated powers shall contain:

- a. The names of the persons who disclosed or otherwise were found to have a financial or non-financial interest in connection with an actual or possible conflict of interest, the nature of the interest, any action taken to determine whether a conflict of interest was present, and the board's decision as to whether a conflict of interest existed.
- b. The names of the persons who were present for discussion and votes relating to the transaction or arrangement, the content of the discussion, including any alternatives to the proposed transaction or arrangement, and a record of any votes taken in connection with the proceedings.

#### Section VII. Violations of Conflict of Interest Policy

If the Board of Directors has reason to believe that an interested party has failed to disclose a potential conflict of interest, it shall inform the person of the basis for such belief and allow the person an opportunity to explain the alleged failure to disclose.

If the board decides that the interested party has in fact failed to disclose a possible conflict of interest, the board shall take such disciplinary and corrective action as the board shall determine, up to and including termination.

#### **Proposed Role and Charge of the Committee**

Below is a possible statement of the role and charge of the Investment Committee. In the mid-90's the Investment Committee chaired by Beverly McKinnell was supervisory rather than advisory, meaning that it had the authority to carry out investment policies and hire, monitor or replace any professional consultant or manager working with the committee. We are proposing that the current Investment Committee serve in an advisory capacity.

The following statement is almost identical to one used by the national League (with the substitution of LWVMN for LWVUS and LWVMNEF for LWVEF). The words in italics are not in the LWVUS statement. Also included are statements regarding the Board's right to dissolve the committee and requiring background checks. Both were suggested by Board members.

#### **Investment Policies**

All funds of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota (LWVMN) and the League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund (LWVMNEF) are held by the LWVMN/LWVMNEF Board of Directors as a fiduciary. Both legally unrestricted and restricted funds are held for the purpose of carrying out the organization's mission, and the following investment objectives and directions are to be judged and understood in light of this overall sense of stewardship. These policies are to be applied separately to the funds of the LWVMN and the funds of the LWVMNEF.

#### Delegation

The LWVMN/LWVMNEF Board of Directors has authorized an Investment Committee to serve in an advisory capacity over its financial affairs. In carrying out its responsibilities, the Board, its agents and the Investment Committee shall act in accordance with these investment policies and all applicable laws and regulations. The Board reserves to itself the exclusive right to revise these policies and may also grant exceptions to these investment policies when appropriate.

The Board is authorized to retain one or more investment counselors to assume the management of funds and assets owned and administered by the organization. In discharging this authority, the *Executive Committee* may act in the place of the Board and may

receive reports from, pay compensation to, and enter into agreements with such counselors.

The President shall appoint with Board approval five persons to serve on an Investment Committee. A majority shall be League members and at least two shall have professional investment experience. Each member shall serve a two-year staggered term starting August 1, 2007. No member shall serve more than two consecutive terms. The chair shall be a League member chosen from members of the committee and shall serve as chair for one year. The President, Executive Director and Treasurer shall be ex officio. The Board reserves the right to remove members or dissolve the committee at its discretion. Anyone making investment decisions, including the Committee and the Board, shall undergo background checks.

#### The Board:

- Approves investment policies and asset allocation recommendations
- Approves threshold at which Investment Committee is authorized to allocate and disburse funds
- · Approves recommendations of Investment Committee
- Approves hiring of financial consultants
- Assigns Treasurer to serve as Investment Committee liaison to the Budget Committee
- Reviews financial reports quarterly as presented by chair of Investment Committee
- · Reviews Investment Policies annually

#### The Executive Committee:

- · Acts on behalf of the Board at the discretion of the President
- Reviews financial reports monthly

#### The Investment Committee:

- Develops investment policies and asset allocation recommendations
- Makes allocations and disbursement decisions up to a percentage of the portfolio to be determined
- Recommends strategy for investing in financial products

 Recommends hiring of financial consultants; monitors work of financial consultants

Reviews financial reports monthly (provided by Treasurer)
 Meets quarterly; chair reports to board quarterly

· Reviews Investment Policies annually.

Amendment language as it will appear on the ballot November 7: Shall the Minnesota Constitution be amended to dedicate revenue from a tax on the sale of new and used motor vehicles over a five year period, so that after June 30, 2011, all of the revenue is dedicated at least 40 percent for public transit assistance and not more than 60 percent for highway purposes?

#### From Nancy Witta, LWVMN Action Committee, Budget:

LWVMN should make a decision on the action desired on this ballot question. The Minneapolis Star Tribune has stated that only government purists are in opposition. This is not entirely true and overlooks the fundamental question of fiscal responsibility. However, there has been overwhelming approval of this measure from business, labor, and metro communities choked with traffic. It would certainly add sorely needed funds not only to highway construction and maintenance but 40% would be devoted to mass transit and we all favor those outcomes.

Leagues' dilemma is this—of course we favor badly needed monies for transportation BUT lost in the debate is the source of funding and the ramifications. No new monies are appropriated for the approximately \$300 million that would be diverted from the general fund for this purpose. Where will appropriations be cut to fund transportation? Education? Health Care? LGA? Additionally, from a "purists" point of view this is bad government.

The legislature has the power to enact increased funding for transportation whenever they wish. For years this responsibility was not taken seriously until the public outcry demanded some action. In the last two sessions the Legislature has succeeded in passing transportation bills that would alleviate the funding lack but the governor has vetoed the bills. The only leg left standing was this proposed amendment which could not be vetoed. Shouldn't state government function to address outstanding needs of the state without resort to constitutional amendments? If they cannot agree on something that appears to have such support how can they be trusted to replace the funds taken for other purposes? Will we need more constitutional amendments to command them to do their job? Also bear in mind that the two frontrunners for governor have both said they will not raise taxes.

Should LWVMN support this amendment? Oppose? Or do pro-con voter education? I think you can perceive my bias on this matter but it is a real policy question for the board to decide.

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## Testimony Re: SF1691 Presented to the Senate Judiciary Committee April 4, 2006

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee:

Good afternoon. My name is Helen Palmer and I am president of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota. Thank you very much for allowing me to speak today regarding Senate File 1691.

The League of Women Voters of Minnesota believes that this bill, which proposes an amendment to the Minnesota Constitution on same-sex marriage, amounts to an assault on a minority group. While the League of Women Voters has no position on marriage, we do have a strong position in support of equal opportunity in public services for all people. The proposed amendment's language barring recognition of a "legal equivalent" of marriage appears designed to prevent same-sex partners from having the responsibilities and protections of a civil union.

Furthermore, we believe that this highly divisive amendment is dangerous and unnecessary. It is dangerous because it sets apart a minority group and specifically denies to them the civil rights of the majority. In fact, this proposal is of special concern because it would turn constitutional history on its head by requiring Minnesota to restrict, rather than guarantee, the civil rights of a portion of its citizens.

The proposed amendment is unnecessary because the State Supreme Court ruled unanimously in 1971 that there is no right to same-sex marriage contained in the state Constitution. And although the League of Women Voters does not agree with the action, the Legislature has already acted to make same-sex marriage illegal in Minnesota.

The fundamental rights of any minority should not be subject to the vagaries of the majority. In this representative democracy we depend on and expect our elected officials to make informed decisions and to safeguard the civil rights of *all* our citizens.

The Minnesota Constitution is a remarkable document: it is about rights and liberties, and its spirit is honorable and generous. Alterations to it should be rare and deeply considered, and made with the good of all the people in mind. The amendment proposed in SF 1691 does not belong in our Constitution, and the League of Women Voters of Minnesota urges you to reject it.

President Palmer called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

1. Housekeeping: Sawyer asked for expense vouchers and volunteer hours as well as articles and enclosures for the Presidents' Mailing, to be mailed the week of September 18<sup>th</sup>.

#### 2. **President's Report:** Palmer reported that

- Kathy Fennelly has been selected to serve on the LWVUS Immigration Study Committee. There will be five people on this committee. Fennelly is a University of Minnesota professor.
- Donna Lauffer has been appointed by the national board to be liaison with the LWVMN. She is from Kansas and has already made contact with Palmer and asked a lot of questions. Local leagues should send a copy of their newsletters to Donna Lauffer.
- Palmer is in the process of naming seven members to a transition committee planning for Sawyer's retirement as executive director.
- We have been asked recently by a number of different organizations to give a "seal of approval" to their endeavors. This speaks well to our reputation in the community.
- A survey funded by the Joyce Foundation has been completed and the results will be on the Joyce Foundation website. The survey of 2,040 randomly selected adults from five states was on the state of democracy. Focus groups were also used. The overwhelming result was that citizens want honesty from their government and there is currently a lack of trust. However, most of those surveyed do not feel powerless. There is great concern about the role of money in politics. This concern is on a par with concern about health care and other issues. The survey tends to show that we need to highlight solutions and not promise too much. It might be useful to educate by linking issues.
- 3. **Minutes:** Thompson moved to approve the minutes of the August 9, 2006 Board Meeting. Seconded and passed unanimously.

- 4. **Treasurer's Report:** Sawyer presented the July 31, 2006 LWVMN Treasurer's Report. The report will be filed for audit.
- 5. **Revision of the Agenda:** Palank asked to strike LOTT from the agenda. Peterson and Wickstrom asked to be added to the agenda.
- 6. **Resignation:** Regal moved to accept with regret the resignation of Qamar Ibrahim from the LWVMN Board. Seconded and passed unanimously.
- 7. **By-Laws:** Myers moved to appoint Kay Thompson, Anne Salisbury and Judy Stuthman to the LWVMN Bylaws Committee. Seconded and passed unanimously.
- 8. **Communications:** Peterson reported that the pre-primary televised debate was a good trial run. Unfortunately, LWVMN was not given credit as a sponsor in the Star/Tribune news story the following day so she contacted the reporter. KSTP prefers to be called "5 Eyewitness News." A letter regarding civility at election time and education of the public written by Peterson has been used by several local leagues. The Eastern Carver County League President adapted the letter and it was published in the Chaska newspaper. Other leagues are adapting the letter and sending it to their local newspapers. President Palmer was interviewed on a noontime 5 Eyewitness News show on Primary Election day.
- 9. **Diversity:** Mae Brooks, Diversity Project Director, was introduced. She would like to visit with local leagues or local league presidents and discuss the formation of dialogue groups. She would like to identify people relevant to the diversity discussion. Dialogue groups will be forming. Would like to involve ten local leagues in the project. She needs to identify other groups that would be helpful with the project. Wants to communicate that the project is working toward action. Can be marketed as a social action project.
- 10. **State Agency Study:** Steen reported that she is in the process of writing the draft of the study. She is about 2/3 of the way through the first draft. The draft will be reviewed by the committee. The committee has learned a huge amount this year. Local leagues can plan on unit meetings on the state study after Christmas.
- 11. **Convention:** Regal reported that the theme of the May 17-19, 2007 state convention at Breezy Point is the *Gift of Time*. One goal of the convention is to build relationships between local leagues. Accordingly, Thursday will allow adequate social time for local league presidents to share and interact. Another theme of the convention will be water. Regal is pursuing some ideas for speakers.
- 12. **Program Planning:** Sawyer reported that the first round of program-planning will go to local LWVs in September with a response deadline of October 31<sup>st</sup>. The program-planning packet will go to local LWVs in November for program planning meetings in December, January, February. Program suggestions will be presented to LWVMN Board in March and the Proposed Program will be sent to local LWVs in March, 2007 for debate and action at Convention May 18 and 19.

- 13. LWVMN/EF Budget Process: Sawyer and Morem discussed the budget process. Look for materials in the last board mailing.
- 14. **Board Liaison Assignments:** Regal has assigned each board member to act as liaison to two or three local leagues. Regal provided a list of questions for LWVMN board members to ask local league presidents. This is a way to keep in touch with local leagues and establish better communication.
- 15. **Action:** Myers distributed a handout on the Great Lakes put together by the Alliance for the Great Lakes. There is a compact regarding protecting the Great Lakes that has been signed by the governors of affected states. The compact needs to be passed by the state legislature. The Action Committee needs more lobbyists for the 2007 session in such areas as transportation, environment, education policy, early childhood, and gun legislation.
- 16. **Voting Rights Coalition:** We are a member of the Voting Rights Coalition. Currently, the coalition is disturbed by the lack of publicity given to the Tribal Voting Rights law. The Secretary of State neglected to get pertinent information out to native Americans regarding the change in the law allowing Tribal ID's to be used for same day registration. Stuthman reported that 794 new citizens were registered to vote this morning. Palmer stated that working on voting rights in very important and we're glad to be involved with other organizations that also do this. As a result of our efforts, challengers at polling places now have to be Minnesota citizens and state that they have "personal knowledge" that the challenged voter is not eligible to vote.
- 17. **Nominating Committee Guidelines:** Regal reported that the guidelines are up to speed. These will be passed on to the nominating committee.
- 18. **Spirit of Democracy Awards:** Regal asked board members with suggestions to email them to Sawyer.
- 19. **LWVUS Membership Initiative:** Langsjoen reported that five leagues have been selected to participate in the LWVUS membership initiative pilot program. Myers encouraged local leagues to have voter registration, election information and LWV membership information at high school open houses as a way of attracting new members.
- 20. **Voter Service Update:** Sawyer reported that there are 12 debates scheduled in October. They will be taped on Saturdays. There will be live governor and senate candidate debates on October 29<sup>th</sup>. The site has yet to be determined. It may be the Guthrie Theater. The *Voter Guide* will be out on October 1.
- 21. **Board Leave of Absence**: Peterson moved to accept with understanding a request for a two month leave of absence from the LWVMN board from Miriam Simmons effective immediately. Seconded and passed unanimously. Simmons will return to the board in November.
- 22. **Member Resources Committee:** Langsjoen noted that we need new people on the Member Resources Committee. Simmons is now off the committee.

23. Voting Machines Working Group: Wickstrom reported. The working group is made up of county clerks, elected officials, members from the office of the Secretary of State and others, including Wickstrom. They are working on the implementation of HAVA requirements re: voting machines. The committee has been getting feedback from election judges, voters and election administration officials. There is general agreement that the HAVA law was not well thought out. A lot of money was thrown at the election problems without much analysis. The committee is looking at what will work best in the future.

Palmer adjourned the meeting at 8:32 p.m.

#### League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund **Board Meeting Minutes**

The meeting was preceded by a discussion of the LWVMN nonpartisan policy.

The meeting was called to order at 5:32 p.m. by President Palmer. Palmer read the Mission Statement and the Diversity Statement.

- 1. Minutes: Thompson moved the minutes of the Board Meeting of August 9, 2006 be approved. Seconded and passed unanimously.
- 2. Treasurer's Report: Sawyer presented the Treasurer's report in the absence of Connie Hondl. We are still lacking money to completely fund the state study. This has been a disappointment but work is still going on to secure funding. Unrestricted gifts to the Ed Fund would be helpful. The Treasurer's Report for the period ending July 31, 2006 will be filed for audit.
- 3. **Development Report:** Frisch moved to accept the Development Report through September 7, 2006. Seconded and passed unanimously.
- 4. Revision of Agenda: None.
- 5. Approval of Local League Projects: Frisch moved to approve Local League projects as Education Fund Projects by general consent. Seconded and passed unanimously to approve the following:
  - a. Duluth EF materials storage space. (EF space is a percentage of Duluth LWV office space), \$585.
  - b. CMAL Mission Flyer to inform members and public of CMAL mission and program, \$62.95.
  - c. RoMaFH Public meeting on transportation, \$200.
- 6. Approval of State League Projects: Frisch moved to approve State League projects as

Education Fund projects by general consent. Seconded and passed unanimously to approve the following:

- a. LOTT Purchase rights to LOTT image and logo from designer, \$750.
- b. LOTT Women Making a Difference in Public Policy January 11-13, 2007, up front costs, \$10,000. Registration fees are projected to cover these estimated costs.
- 7. Investment Committee Report: Kay Erickson presented the investment committee report. The committee is getting educated, looking at previous LWVMN investment policies, learning about committee duties and legal issues. It is projected that the committee will be investing around one million dollars, with \$700,000 on hand now. The committee is looking at four main issues: authority of the committee, conflict of interest statement, goals and reporting policy. A decision as to the authority of the committee will be made by the Board. A conflict of interest statement will be adopted after study of various non-profit board statements. The Minnesota Council of Non-Profits has a model statement that is being looked at. The goals of the committee will lay out the acceptable risk tolerance. LWVUS may have a model laying out risk tolerance for the committee to study. Another issue for the committee is whether to hire a professional to manage the funds. Palank suggested that a background check be run on anyone with direct influence on investments. Other suggestions were to look at asset mix and diversification and also look at making socially responsible investments. The fund will most likely need to be in equities in order to stay ahead of inflation.
- 8. **Millenium Campaign Grant.** Benson reported that for a number of reasons, it has been decided not to have the October 15 event at this time and therefore the grant has been returned to LWVUS.
- 9. **Power of 3 Update:** Frisch reported that we are very close to the \$3.9 million goal. We are about \$63,000 short.
- 10. **Donor Cultivation Committee:** Frisch reported that the Donor Cultivation Committee met to write personal notes on the Annual Appeal letter to many high donors. The committee plans to host a book release party upon the publication of *Indians in Minnesota* at the end of 2006 to which board members and high donors will be invited.
- 11. **Annual Appeal:** Frisch reported that the Annual Appeal mailing is out and over \$15,000 has been received. A phonathon is scheduled for September 26<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup>. The board is encouraged to make their gifts and also participate in the phonathon.
- 12. **Biennial Report Update:** Peterson distributed the 2003-2005 biennial report of the League of Women Voters Minnesota Education Fund.

Palmer adjourned the meeting at 6:20 p.m.

The Legal Environment
For many years, the operative Prudent Man Rule is now being replaced by the Prudent Investor Rule. This transition represents important and substantive changes in the law and not just a politically correct name change.

The recommendations of a 1969 Ford Foundation report led to the widespread adoption of the Prudent Investor Rule, which brings modern portfolio theory to fiduciary investing.

## **Background: The Prudent Man Rule**

e Prudent Man Rule traces its roots to the 1830 case of Harvard College v. Amory in the Supreme Judicial Court of Massachusetts. In that case, the judge wrote that when investing, a trustee:

... is to observe how men of prudence, discretion, and intelligence manage their own affairs, not in regard to speculation, but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income, as well as the probable safety of the capital to be invested.

As written, the Prudent Man Rule is reasonable and accommodating. In practice, however, it became narrow and restrictive, particularly as expressed in various state statutes. Some statutes actually prescribed lists of acceptable investments and became known as legal list statutes. These statutes generally restricted fiduciaries to investments in U.S. government securi-

hes and high-grade corporate bonds. Common stocks were often prohibited.

More importantly, judicial interpretation of the Prudent Man Rule tended toward certain results. First, nothing was more important than the preservation of capital; the primary responsibility of trustees and board members was to never lose money. In addition, investments were expected to generate current income, which made non-income producing assets suspect if not inappropriate per se. Finally, in determining prudence, each investment was judged independently.

By judging each investment independently, board members could be liable for losses incurred in a portfolio, even if the portfolio's overall performance was excellent. Taken together, these three characteristics of judicial interpretation made it difficult to invest in common stocks, even when such investments were not prohibited by statute. The profile of a "prudent man" was one who invested in U.S. government bonds.

The attitudes created during the 150-year primacy of the Prudent Man Rule still linger in the nonprofit community. Many smaller organizations continue to invest endowment and other long-term funds exclusively in certificates of deposit and U.S. government bonds. As we shall see, such an approach is no longer considered prudent investing.

## Changes in the Investment Environment

Two broad changes occurred in the 1960s and 1970s that heralded the need for revised standards for fiduciary investments. The first was a dramatic increase in the rate of inflation. With inflation reaching an unprecedented 13.3 percent, holders of fixed-income portfolios found themselves consistently losing money. Second, much of the academic work on portfolio theory discussed above was published and available for practical application.

These two trends—high levels of inflation and the development of modern portfolio theory—merged most notably in a 1969 Ford Foundation study entitled "The Law and the Lore of Endowment Funds." It recommended allowing colleges to spend realized

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capital gains as a means of combating the poor, inflation-adjusted performance of many endowments. That recommendation led to the widespread adoption of the Prudent Investor Rule.

## The Prudent Investor Rule

As with many broad legal concepts, the Prudent Investor Rule is not

itself a law. Rather, it is an idea embodied in state statutes and eventually reflected in judicial decisions interpreting those statutes. Two statutory expressions of the Prudent Investor Rule exist. One is the Uniform Management of Institutional Funds Act (UMIFA), first promulgated in 1972 and presently enacted in 39 states and the District of Columbia.

More recently, the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws promulgated the Uniform Prudent Investor Act (UPIA), which applies these same investment concepts to trusts. Since its promulgation in 1994, the UPIA has been enacted in seven states, including New York, Florida, and California. Both statutes reflect the same investment standards but vary in certain details. The following discussion deals primarily with the Uniform Management of Institutional Funds Act. (For a copy of the Act, see Appendix A on page 18.)

The most important point in this context is that the Prudent Investor Rule is rapidly becoming the law of the land. The Uniform Act broadly applies to any "incorporated or unincorporated organization organized"

and operated exclusively for educational, religious, charitable, or other eleemosynary purposes . . . "

The new UPIA applies to trusts. Consequently, it is important for all nonprofit boards to review their investment policies for compliance with these legal ex-

pressions of the Prudent Investor Rule.

# The Standard of Care

Under both acts, the measure of prudence focuses on investment processes, as opposed to classifying an investment or course of action as prudent or imprudent per se. In addition, the standard of care language in the Uniform Act provides that:

. . . a governing board shall exercise ordinary business care and prudence under the facts and circumstances prevailing at the time of the action or decision.

In other words, hindsight is no longer a component of the investment standard. In addition, a board is to consider "expected total return on its investments." Thus, capital gains are placed on an equal footing with dividends and income. Collectively, this language permits a board to include riskier investments in its portfolio without fear of being held liable, after the fact, for the losses on any one investment.

The standard of care provision for the new Uniform Prudent Investor Act, a partial copy of which is provided in Appendix A on page 21, makes the incorporation of portfolio management theory explicit:

(b) A trustee's investment and management decisions respecting individual assets must be evaluated not in isolation but in the context of the trust portfolio as a whole and as part of an overall in-

vestment strategy having risk and return objectives reasonably suited to the trust.

Inherent in this portfolio approach is a diversification requirement that is implied in the UMIFA and made explicit in the UPIA and in many state statutes.

Notice that in determining prudence, a board is entitled to take into consideration the organization's "educational, religious, charitable, or other eleemosynary purposes." This is good news for an organization with strong political or religious beliefs. If such an organization wishes to eschew investments it believes are philosophically incompatible with its purposes, it may do so, even if the result is a lower total return.

Finally, in evaluating anticipated returns, both acts acknowledge the importance of protecting a portfolio against inflation. Section 6 of the UMIFA provides that a board is to consider both "the long and short term needs of the institution," as well as "price trends and general economic conditions." The UPIA also refers directly to inflation.

The permission in the Uniform Prudent Investor Act to consider the impact of inflation is particularly beneficial to a nonprofit with substantial charitable remainder trust assets. In such trusts, the donor is typically the income beneficiary for his or her lifetime following which the charity receives the remaining principal. Frequently, nonprofit trustees are under enormous pressure to favor the donor by investing exclusively for the production of current income. By expressly authorizing a trustee to include growth investments to protect the remainder interest against inflation, the UPIA acts to reduce that pressure.

Delegation

Another significant change embodied in the Prudent Investor Rule is express permission for board members to delegate investment authority. Not only may a board "delegate to committees, officers, or employees of the institution or the fund," but a board may also "contract with independent investment advisors, investment counsel or managers, banks, or trust compa-

nies..." This new-found authority is a reflection of the tremendous complexity associated with modern investing.

The Uniform Prudent Investor Act also specifically authorizes a trustee to delegate investment and management functions. In doing so, this act also specifically provides that a trustee shall not be liable to the beneficiaries of the trust for the decisions or actions of the agent. In other words, a charitable board may delegate management of its planned gift trusts to an investment manager and thereby relieve the board of directors of liability for the investment decisions.

To avail themselves of this provision, board members must use reasonable care and skill in selecting the advisor, directing the advisor, and reviewing the advisor's performance. If the board delegates authority to an outside advisor, it must convey to that advisor the organization's investment policy objectives. Consequently, in the area of managing charitable trusts, the existence of appropriate policies is a component of limiting the organization's and the board's liability.

## Scam-Proofing

Keeping your organization's assets safe is a significant concern. How do you avoid the scams that seem to plague the nonprofit world? In 1995, hundreds of Christian ministries and public charities were deceived by Jack Bennett and his Foundation for New Era Philanthropy. It was a classic Ponzi scheme in which the contributions of the subsequent participants were used to pay off the earlier entrants. All told, several hundred million dollars in nonprofit assets were involved.

Palmer called the meeting to order at 5:55 p.m.

- 1. Housekeeping: Sawyer passed around the folder for articles for the Board Memos and President's mailing as well as expense vouchers and volunteers hours.

Judy Duffy went to Washington and heard that whenever there is a non-Washington convention, it should be in Minneapolis. Local arrangements committee (LAC) had \$10,000 to work with. Most substantial was hotel bills for committee chairs. We shared the profits from the fundraiser and tours with the Minneapolis league, receiving \$3117.54. In addition we received \$1630.41 (adjusted since the board meeting) for the use of the office and staff for a total of \$4747.95 in income for the convention.
- 16. **Communications:** Juanita Peterson distributed a list of Talking Points about LWV and led us through some exercises to practice responding to questions about LWV.

# THE MINNESOTA COMPACT ON CAMPAIGN STANDARDS

## A Citizen Initiative to Improve Elections

## PROJECT SUMMARY

The Minnesota Compact on Campaign Standards is designed to raise the level of political discussion among Minnesota candidates, campaigns, the media, and voters. It seeks to persuade candidates, political parties and interest groups to maximize the presentation of issues and candidate qualifications and to minimize attacks. It works to strengthen the tradition of substantive, informative debates. It asks news organizations to cover the substance of political campaigns with less emphasis on campaign strategy. It encourages fuller participation of citizens in the election process. The standards are voluntary with the only enforcement method that of public opinion. The Compact encourages citizens to hold candidates, the media and themselves accountable during an election season.

This project is a continuation of an election reform initiative begun in 1996. The Humphrey Institute assembled a coalition of community, education, media and political groups in response to an article by Star Tribune reporter, Tom Hamburger, challenging Minnesotans to improve political campaigns. That group wrote and promoted standards, called planks, for candidates, campaign advertising, the media and the public. In 1998 the Minnesota Compact became a project of the League of Women Voters Minnesota Education Fund and operated as a part of a national project in cooperation with the Alliance for Better Campaigns. The latter was funded by a grant from the Pew Charitable Trusts and was based in part on the Minnesota model.

Now in its third election cycle, the 2000 Compact is again a project of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund. The League convened the steering committee and will print and distribute the campaign standards to news media and candidates statewide. Committee members and cooperating organizations will provide advice and encourage citizen, media and candidate support throughout the election season. The steering committee is comprised of interested individuals and representatives from several organizations. All major political parties have been invited to attend the meetings and to comment during discussions.

Supporting organizations and individuals include the League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund; Common Cause of Minnesota; the Minnesota Newspaper Association; E Democracy; the Humphrey Policy Forum, Humphrey Institute, University of Minnesota; Dean Alger of the Minnesota Alliance for Better Campaigns; and John Kostouros, Educational Consultant.

Observing organizations and individuals include Bill Hanley of KTCA TV, Jenny Martin of the Martin Foundation, Bill Blazar of the Minnesota Chamber of Commerce, Brad Stokman of the Minnesota Citizen's Forum, Larry Werner, Reader Involvement Editor of the Star Tribune, and Jim DuBois of the Minnesota Broadcasters Association.

Three political scientists have agreed to be interviewed about the Minnesota Compact. They are Christopher Gilbert, Gustavus Adolphus (507-933-6093), Charles Backstrom (651-792-9904) and Steve Smith (612-624-6820), the University of Minnesota.

## Five Pilot Leagues Selected for Membership Recruitment Initiative

LWVUS received an overwhelming response to its call to Leagues to participate in the pilot phase of a new membership recruitment initiative. Dozens of Leagues, representing twenty-two states and the District of Columbia, applied to be part of the pilot program that will examine new approaches to recruiting members. A rigorous review process was undertaken by a team of LWVUS Board members and staff, and five pilot Leagues were ultimately selected. They are the Leagues of Greater Omaha (NE); of Oakland (CA); Palm Beach County (FL); Saginaw County (MI); and Spartanburg County (SC).

The pilot phase also involves a separate, but additionally important group of dedicated Leagues. Six other Leagues have been selected to be part of a "control" group. These Leagues will help us assess additional aspects of the project that we believe are essential to understand, prior to rolling the project out nationwide after the pilot phase. They are the Leagues of Atlanta-Fulton County (GA), Greater Pittsburgh (PA), Metropolitan Columbus (OH), Pikes Peak Region (CO), Rockland County (NY), and Tyler (TX).

Not everyone understands that the League is a unique organization because every day, our members do the hands-on work that democracy requires. We educate new citizens and first-time voters about their rights and responsibilities, monitor our system of checks and balances, and help protect our natural resources. Our network of energetic and engaged members in communities across the nation is dedicated to making an impact - from city council meetings to Capitol Hill. And, as we all know, the League wants to engage more people in this important work.

To that end, the pilot Leagues will be reaching out to newly retired women, a vast and dynamic group that shares aspirations and goals similar to LWV, "testing" new outreach strategies during FY2006-07. They will also be adding new messaging techniques to already planned events, creating new programs around Election Day and Sunshine Week 2007, and establishing a signature event such as a "Making Democracy Work" Award celebration.

As the initiative develops, LWVUS will be measuring areas of success, which will be shared with the larger League community. We also will be sharing some of the materials developed during the pilot phase more broadly with Leagues around the country over the coming months.

Transit Partners: Myers: Motion: that LWVMN join the "Transit Partners," a very loosely organized coalition of environmental groups, religious groups, transit for livable communities, the senior federation, and a few others who are working toward a long-term, stable, dedicated funding source for Minnesota transit.

Background: Transit Partners supports the *Transportation Choices 2020* initiative, which would provide a dedicated, stable source of funding for transportation choices in Minnesota. The goal of the initiative is to generate approximately \$365 million annually, which would be used to expand transit in Greater Minnesota to all counties and provide more evening and weekend service; double bus service, create better transit facilities and expand Park & Ride capacity in the Metro; construct at least eight dedicated bus and rail transitways in both the Metro area and connecting with key cities in greater Minnesota; and provide revenue to local governments for transit, bicycle & pedestrian projects.

Current members of Transit Partners include the Sierra Club, Transit for Livable Communities, ISAIAH, Senior Federation, MCEA, Minnesota Public Transit Association, the Transit Union Alliance for Metropolitan Stability and Fresh Energy. The primary commitment they're looking for between now and January would be for someone from the League to attend coalition meetings (about every month, but sometimes more frequently as things come up). It would also be nice if we could raise the transportation choices issue in the electoral debate between now and November. While candidate questions have been completed, maybe if we raise the profile of the issue, it will come up in questions from the floor.

If LWVMN joins this group, we will try to find someone to attend these meetings so we can take an active part.

Nonpartisanship

The nonpartisanship of the LWVMN is the basis of our public credibility and must be carefully maintained. All members are responsible for maintaining the LWVMN's reputation for fairness and objectivity.

Members are encouraged to seek elective/appointive office in government as well as responsible positions in the private sector. To avoid any perceived or actual conflict with the integrity of LWVMN, the following guidelines apply:

Directors in <u>highly visible positions</u> such as president, voter service, action, and executive directors may not undertake any action which would publicly identify them with partisan activity. They may not run for public or party office or publicly support campaigns at the regional, state or national levels.

Directors may not run for <u>national or state</u> elective office. Should they choose to run for local office they will first consult with the State Board and notify the local Leagues affected.

Directors may not be <u>highly visible</u> in the campaign of any candidate running for U.S. Senate, Congress or for Minnesota executive or legislative office. They may make contributions to candidates at all levels and work on local campaigns. Directors not in highly visible positions may hold positions in a political party at any level with Board approval, after consideration of possible conflicts of interest.

The political activities of a spouse or relative of a Board member are to be considered as separate and distinct from the activities of the Board member.

Directors may accept appointment to commissions, boards, or committees where such service would not conflict with an LWVMN program. It must be clear to all whether the member is acting as an LWVMN representative or as an individual. If a member is acting as an LWVMN representative, the appointment must be approved by the LWVMN Board of Directors.

14. Convention 2007 Planning: Joan Regal: the Member Resources Committee is seeking ideas from Board members for speakers and workshops to offer at the Convention. The Convention is scheduled for Thursday evening, May 17, Friday, May 18 and Saturday, May 19 at Breezy Point.

From the minutes of the MR Committee meeting: Speakers need to be contacted as soon as possible. Ideas include a panel of former governors; at the banquet, someone to talk about the ethical use of time; since we are on the water, someone to talk about water issues. Workshops/Programming: how to address the needs of those interested in action and of those interested in voter service? We should have time for LLs with multiple jurisdictions to share their concerns and what works and what doesn't (ABC, Wayzata/Plymouth, RoMaFH, MEPH, etc.). For the Presidents' orientation, we will get feed back from them about interests/needs.

Integrity

The board convened at 5:35 p.m. to hear from guests, Halvorson, Thomas and Wolff of Citizens for Election Integrity (CEI) regarding the statewide election audit observation project. CEI has recruited about 200 citizens to date, from all political parties in Minnesota, to observe the audit process that will occur after this year's elections. Their goal is to recruit 500 citizen volunteers for this project. They are asking LWVMN to be a co-sponsor to their education and recruitment effort related to this audit project. One LWVMN board member, Anne Salisbury, is on their advisory board. They could use our help with publicity (i.e. to our members) and maybe some help with space for training. If we wish to be more actively involved with CEI, we could have input in designing the training sessions, actively recruiting volunteers, and shaping the education and recruitment strategy. Volunteer training will take place from mid-September through mid-October. This should involve about a two hour session. The time and place of the audits have to be announced before the election and will be held one week after the election, so people would know their time commitment in advance. Palmer thanked the guests for their time and presentation and welcomed them to stay for the discussion of their request at item 9 on the LWVMN board meeting agenda.

Palmer called the meeting to order at 5:55 p.m.

- 1. **Minutes:** Thompson moved to accept the minutes of the Board meeting of May 10, 2006. Seconded and passed unanimously.
- 2. **Treasurer's Report**: Hondl presented the Treasurer's Report for the period ending May 31, 2006. The report will be filed for audit.
- 3. **Development Report**: Frisch moved to accept the Development Report through June 22, 2006. No written report was available. Frisch withdrew the motion until a written report is available for

board members to review.

- 4. **Approval of Local League Projects**: Frisch moved to approve local league projects as Education Fund projects by general consent. Seconded and passed unanimously to approve the following projects:
  - a. Duluth Forum on the state of elections in Minnesota, \$400
  - b. St. Louis Park Girls State sponsorship, \$250
- 5. Funds for Voting Rights Coalition monitoring position: Doepner-Hove moved to approve a \$500 contribution to the Voting Rights Coalition for the purpose of supporting a staff person to monitor Office of Secretary State's follow-up on 2006 election legislation and training of election officials prior to the 2006 Election. Seconded and passed unanimously.
- 7. **Investment Committee and Members**: Hondl moved to approve the establishment of an Investment Committee to oversee the management of league investments. Seconded and passed unanimously. Hondl moved to approve the members of the Investment Committee: Kay Erickson, chair; Amy Alvero, Chris Hansen and Carol Frisch. Seconded and passed unanimously. Doepner-Hove asked that the committee report to the LWVMNEF Board at least two times a year. She stated that the committee will need their own by-laws in order to establish standard rules and policies and need to have them reviewed by the LWVMNEF board.
- 8. **Power of 3 Update**: Frisch reported that the executive committee will be meeting in July and dispersing more funds. A 100K pledge was received last month. There is a preliminary promise of 50k from Mary Lee Dayton. Two Anderson Foundation gifts are also anticipated. IBM gave an in kind gift of computers. \$3,752,000 has been raised with more anticipated.
- 9. **Donor Cultivation Committee**: Frisch reported that this committee has met three times to do strategic planning. They are setting up a system to keep in communication with key donors.
- 10. Annual Appeal: A mailing will go out around Labor Day for the annual appeal.
- 11. Biennial Report update: Peterson reported that the Biennial report is ready.

Four corrections were noted as follows: opening paragraph: Susan Hoyt is the campaign debates *project director*, paragraph 14: the state study committee *is working with* a research intern, paragraph 15: the LWVUS may be pursuing *retired* women, paragraph 19 C: 4 LOTT *participants*. Seconded and passed unanimously to adopt minutes as corrected.
- 5. Treasurer's Report for 5/31/06: Hondl presented the Treasurer's report which will be filed for audit.
- 6. **Revision of the Agenda**: Palank asked to add an announcement regarding LOTT and Palmer asked to add next board meeting date.
- 7. **Appointment of Margit Berg:** Simmons moved the appointment of Margit Berg as the LWVMN representative to the *Living the Questions* ... *As Minnesota Ages* project. Seconded and passed unanimously.
- 8. Appointment of Ady Wickstrom to working group on voting equipment: Doepner-Hove moved to approve the appointment of Ady Wickstrom to the working group on alternatives for voting equipment to meet HAVA requirements. Seconded and passed unanimously. See agenda for more background information.
- 9. Citizens for Election Integrity Statewide Election Audit: Simmons moved to approve Anne Salisbury as LWVMN representative to the Election Audit Advisory Board. Seconded and passed unanimously. Salisbury moved that LWVMN co-sponsor the statewide election audit project. This option will involve a greater commitment of time, recruitment of volunteer observers and a more active planning role. General discussion ensued with agreement that we are in support of the project. Doepner-Hove questioned where we will get the volunteers to work on this and who will be doing the training of the volunteers. Question was raised as to where Citizens for Election Integrity gets their money and whether we might have any conflict should the funder be an affiliate of one of the political parties. Peterson moved to table the motion until we could be satisfied that the group is in no way partisan. Seconded and passed with one dissent. General agreement that Palmer and Sawyer will check into this and email board members for approval of main motion.
- 10 **President's Mailing**: Peterson reported that only 3 people responded to her question regarding preferences for the President's mailing. The issue is cost savings for email versus mailing. She will continue to look into possibility of changing to email communication of President's mailing.
- 11. Nonpartisan policy and speaking with one voice: Peterson reviewed the importance of maintaining a nonpartisan stance in this election year. All oral and written materials issued in the LWVMN name must be approved by LWVMN President Helen Palmer and LWVMN Executive Director Sally Sawyer. Be careful to avoid partisan remarks, asides or innuendos in anything associated with the League of Women Voters.
- 12. **Media Report**: Peterson handed out Tips for Working with the News Media. She reminded members that news releases should be reviewed by Palmer and Sawyer if speaking for LWV.

Peterson handed out her letter to the Star/Tribune after the disappointing Star/Tribune news article and especially disappointing headline on LWVUS convention. She also handed out the response she received from Kate Parry at the Star/Tribune.

- 13. **Voter Service Report**: Susan Hoyt is working with KSTP to set dates for candidate debates. Laura Wang will send out candidate questions to be used for the Voter Guide as soon as filings close. Barb Person of the St. Louis Park League starts next week as the newly hired Voter Service coordinator. She will do moderator training and many other functions. The election website will be accessible during the election season via the LWVMN website. Linda Loomis, project director, will handle the election Hotline. Hotline will be staffed day before and day of primary and general election in collaboration with KSTP. Applications for the Martin & Brown pass through grants for local candidate forums are due August 1. Discussion as to role we will take in voter registration drives. Simmons will pull out guidelines on voter registration. We have moderator and candidate forum training scheduled for August 5 at Hamline. Discussion as to participating in a joint moderator training session with the Minnesota Participation Project, a project of the Minnesota Council of Non-Profits. They have asked for our curriculum. Consensus that we have a public checklist-type publication on moderator training that we sell to the public but the detailed one we have for local leagues should not be shared. We want to be collaborative, but need to protect our intellectual property.
- 14. **Nominating Committee:** Regal reported that the committee needs to meet and needs a chair. Suggestions to contact: Alice Moorman, Carol Bergeson, Kathy Tomsich. Palmer will contact them.
- 15. Global Democracy Millennium Development Goals: Benson reported that grants are available to sponsor an event on October 15 when people all over the world will be standing up for Millennium Development Goals of the UN. She is looking for collaborators on such a project. The UN will provide a speaker but we would need to provide airfare and expenses which is expensive. The deadline for grant application is Sept. 30. Benson will call Qamar Ibrahim for suggestions.
- 16. LWVMN Convention 2007 May 17-19: Regal: Local league presidents will be encouraged to come to Breezy Point on Thursday for some new president orientation sessions. Regular sessions of convention will begin on Friday. Board decided it would work best to let Thursday attendees purchase their own meals for Thursday and Friday breakfast rather than trying to include those expenses in one of the registration options.

#### 17. Miscellaneous items:

A. Palank: LOTT was well received at convention. Kentucky wants to start a LOTT program, as does Georgia.

**Background:** This is a project of the Metropolitan Area Agnecy on Aging (MAAA). Margit discussed the project, the mission of which is to engage all sectors in the planning for the aging of Minnesota, with LWVMN Board on 5/10; she has agreed to follow the project on behalf of LWVMN. As board members will recall, there are several options for LWVMN involvement: encouraging local study, sponsoring fellows, providing consultation and directing the fellowship program.

8. Appointment of Ady Wickstrom to working group on voting equipment: Steen: Motion: to approve the appointment of Ady Wickstrom to the working group on alternatives for voting equipment to meet HAVA requirements. Background: "As a result of a meeting between the OSS, legislators, county election officials and other interested parties (I was asked to attend by Jim Hanson from the OSS), an amendment was written to an election bill that created a working group charged with looking at alternatives for voting equipment to meet the HAVA requirements. The group will be chaired by Mark Halvorson (Election Integrity MN) and Mai Thor (Disability Law Center). In addition to the chairs the amendment requires the membership of 4 legislators (2 from each body and 2 from each party), representatives of the OSS, city and county election officials, and other interested people to be approved by the committee. As a party to the creation of the working group, I would like to be appointed and have spoken to Mark Halvorson. If appointed, I would like to be on the task force as a representative of LWVMN."

9. Citizens for Election Integrity Statewide Election Audit:

Simmons: **Motion**: to approve Anne Salisbury as LWVMN representative to the Election Audit Adviosry Board.

Salisbury: Motion: that LWVMN co-sponsor the statewide election audit project.

Background: You will recall from our recent board meeting that we talked about the proposal from Citizens for Election Integrity that LWVMN participate in their 2006 election audit observing project program and serve on their advisory board. Following the board meeting, board members agreed via email that LWVMN should be represented on the Audit Advisory Board, and that LWVMN officially endorse the audit program. A third option, cosponsorship of the audit program, will involve a greater commitment of time, recruitment of volunteer observers, and a more active planning role. Enclosed is the brochure describing the project—it was distributed at the LWVUS Convention.

Nominating Committee: Regal: the member resources committee will review revised Nominating Committee Guidelines as prepared by Stacy Doepner-Hove and present them to the board in August for approval. We are sorry to report that the Nominating Committee Chair who was elected at the 2005 LWVMN Convention, Michelle Kukoleca Hammes, has resigned. We need your suggestions for a chair, who will then be appointed at the August Board Meeting along with two members of the LWVMN Board. The two elected members of the committee are Ann Berry of RoMaFH and Cathy Cella of Edina.

Global Democracy—Millennium Development: Salisbury: will report on the Global Democracy Domestic Programs session she attended at Convention. She suggests that LWVMN have an event on October 15<sup>th</sup> which is the day when people all over the world will be standing up for Millennium Development Goals. League of Women Voters of Minnesota Board Meeting Minutes Minnesota Women's Building Wednesday, May 10, 2006

Palmer called the meeting to order at 6:05 p.m. Palmer welcomed Susan Hoyt, newly hired campaign debates chair to the meeting.

Housekeeping. Sawyer passed around the file for vouchers, volunteer hours and articles for Presidents' Mailing.

#### 2. President's Report:

- Breezy Point has been selected as the site for the state convention in 2007.
- Kay Erickson will chair the newly formed investment committee. The state president will appoint 5 to serve on the committee. Three committee members will be LWV members and two committee members will have expertise in financial matters. The terms will be for two years. It is anticipated that the committee will meet 3-4 times a year.
- There will be a transition planning committee to look for a replacement for Sally Sawyer upon her retirement. Materials outlining some of the ways to handle transition were passed out. One method is to hire an interim executive director. A copy of an Executive Transition Board Checklist was provided to all board members. The Office Management Committee has suggested a 7 member transition committee made up of 4 board and 3 non-board members. Nothing has been decided at this point; the interim executive director is just one way to approach this.
- Palmer is representing the LWVMN on former Governor Quie's Commission on the Preservation of an Impartial Judiciary. A report will be issued at the end of December
- LWVMN has been invited to work on the Judicial Campaign Conduct Committee of the Minnesota State Bar Association. More to follow, as we work out an appropriate role for the League.
- We collaborated with the St. Paul league and moderated a May 1 Law Day Forum on the separation of Powers. About 60 people attended the forum.
- Judy Duffy and Helen Palmer appeared on Joan Higinbotham's TV show.
- Things are popping on the list serves related to the upcoming LWVUS convention.

3. Minutes: Thompson moved to approve the minutes of the 3/15/06 LWVMN board meeting as mailed. agraph 9 was corrected at line 4 to change "volunteer from Northfield" to "intern from St. Olaf." At paragraph 19 a, "a journalist whose beat is philanthropy, Margaret Steen" was added at the end of the first sentence. Seconded and passed unanimously to approve minutes as corrected.

Thompson moved to approve the minutes of the 2006 Council meeting as mailed. The direction to the board at arragraph 9 was corrected from "standardized dues form" to "standardized membership form." Seconded and passed unanimously to approve Council minutes as corrected.

- 4. Treasurer's Report: Hondl presented the Treasurer's Report for 3/31/06 and answered questions regarding the report. The report will be filed for audit.
- 5. Revision of the Agenda: Simmons, Palank, Frisch and Wickstrom asked to add items to the agenda.
- 6. President's Mailing: Peterson moved that LWVMN switch from hard copy to email to send the President's Mailing after the May 2006 edition. After much discussion, Peterson withdrew the motion.
- 7. Battered Women's Coalition: Salisbury moved that LWVMN join the Minnesota Coalition for Battered Women (MCBW). LWVMN would serve as a "supportive, non-voting organization." Seconded and passed unanimously to join the Coalition and pay the dues of \$75.
- 8. Women Candidate Development Coalition: Ellen Biales and Shirley Nelson of the Women Candidate Development Coalition were introduced. They asked that the LWVMN increase its membership dues in the coalition from \$50 to \$100. LWVMN has been a part of the coalition since 1986. League members including Joan Higinbotham, Kay Erickson and Ellen Biales have served on the board. The coalition's goal is to promote pro-choice women candidates for public office. Moved, seconded and passed unanimously to increase our dues amount to \$100.
- 9. LWVUS Convention Local Arrangement Committee Report: Frisch reported that everything is under control. Board members are urged to check the delegate list available online to make sure that your local league has submitted delegate names properly. Some of the tours offered to convention delegates may be cancelled due to lack of registrants. There are still many tour opportunities.
- 10. LWVUS Convention Publicity: Peterson and her committee have been working on this for two years and can enthusiastically report that much publicity is in the works. A media panel is being planned featuring outstanding journalists from the twin cities area. Peterson has yellow convention T-Shirts available for sale for \$18. The profits from these sales will go to defray the costs of providing convention volunteers with free purple T-Shirts.
- 11. LWVUS Convention: Proposed Study on Immigration: Simmons reported that several variations of a national immigration study have been submitted to LWVUS. The issue now is how to word the study so as to define the scope. National has recommended a study of "Immigration Policy." LWVMN is sponsoring a caucus on Friday of convention from 8 10 p.m. Judy Stuthman has arranged a panel. There will be another caucus on Saturday night. 1000 copies of our immigration study are being printed to give to convention delegates.
- 12. LWVMN Council, April, 2006: Simmons announced that the Council evaluations were good. About 33 evaluations were received out of 73 in attendance. Langsjoen felt that the PMP discussions were very interesting. A qualified majority seem to think that a \$2.50 raise in national PMP was okay.
- 13. LWVMN Convention 2007 Site: Regal announced that the 2007 convention site will be Breezy Point Resort near Brainerd, Minnesota. This site was approved by the LWVMN Board via email on April 27. It has been suggested that the Presidents come a day early for a President's Workshop.
- 14. State Study: Steen reported that the study committee continues and has hired a research intern from St. Olaf for about 18 hours a week during the summer. The first draft of a written report from the committee should be out in August. Local leagues could probably schedule their meetings on the study for sometime in Lanuary or February, 2007.
- 15. Diversity: Jenkins Nelsen will be conducting a workshop on diversity at LWVUS Convention with 300-400 expected to attend. There will be a display table with books etc, regarding diversity issues at convention.

BACKGROUND: Preliminary Review Committee, consisting of the LWVMNEF President, Executive Director and Development Director or Treasurer, has read and reviewed projects. Full applications are available at the meeting.

- Funds for Voting Rights Coalition monitoring position: (Doepner-Hove) MOTION: to approve a \$500
  contribution to the Voting Rights Coalition for the purpose of supporting a staff person to monitor Office
  Secretary of State's follow-up on 2006 election legislation and training of election officials prior to the 2006
  Election.

BACKGROUND: LWVMN has been part of the voting rights coalition (also known as Election Protection) which formed originally before the 2004 election; it has been spearheaded and staffed by MAPA. This year MAPA and Progressive Minnesota merged to form an organization entitled Take Action Minnesota. The staff person who has worked on voting rights issues will not be continuing and Take Action Minnesota only has funds for some of the coalition's pre-election projects but not for monitoring of OSS election activities. Coalition members are trying to raise sufficient funds to support this monitoring project. Because it is monitoring and not action, these funds can be drawn from our Education Fund, either from unrestricted funds, Bridge funds or possibly from unrestricted voter service funds. Gwen Myers has notified the coalition that LWVMNEF can provide \$500, contingent upon board approval. If the Board has concerns about supporting this project with EF funds, funds could come from unrestricted sources in the LWVMN Budget. Note: the fiscal agent for this project must be a 501c3 organization in order for the funds to come from LWVMNEF.

7. Investment Committee and Members: (Hondl) MOTION: to approve the establishment of an Investment Committee to oversee the management of league investments.

BACKGROUND: The committee will consist of five members. A majority will be League members and at least two shall have professional investment experience. The LWV President, Executive Director and Treasurer will serve as ex officio members. Ten years ago the LWVMN/EF formed an Investment Committee to supervise its investments. The committee set gift acceptance policies, standards of conduct and investment fund policies for LWVMN and LWVMNEF. Because of the success of the P3 Campaign it is time to review and perhaps revise those policies. A group of potential members has met three times to begin reviewing the committee's role and responsibilities. (See enclosed June 1, 2006 meeting minutes.)

(Hondl) MOTION: to approve the members of the Investment Committee: Kay Erickson, chair; Amy Alvero, Chris Hansen, and Carol Frisch. (We have one additional person we are waiting to hear from.)

BACKGROUND: Here are brief bios of committee members.

Kay Erickson, Chair, has been an LWV member since 1981 and is a current member of the South Tonka LWV. She has served LWVMN/EF in a number of areas including development, field service, action and as president from 1992-1995. She has also served on the Minnesota Women's Consortium Steering Committee, the Women Candidate Development Coalition, Minnetonka Charter Commission and Comprehensive Plan Citizen's Committee and the LOTT Board.

Amy Alvero has been a member of LWV Edina since 1998, fulfilling such roles as finance drive chair, budget chair and treasurer. Amy worked in various finance, accounting and budgeting functions at Ameriprise Financial between 1989 and 1997. Since then, she has fulfilled similar and many other types of functions for a variety of volunteer organizations (LWVE, Edina ECFE, Concord PTO, Normandale Lutheran Church,

Edina hockey and soccer associations). She has a BA in economics from St. Olaf College and an MBA from the University of Minnesota as well as CPA certification from the state of Minnesota.

Carol Frisch is currently chair of the Power of 3 Campaign and LWVMN/EF Development Director. She has served LWV, both at the local and state levels, in many capacities and is the immediate past president of LWVMN/EF.

Chris Hansen, member of Unit 48 in LWV Minneapolis, has over 15 years in the financial services industry (banking, insurance and brokerage). She is currently Vice President of U.S. Bank Private Client Group in Minneapolis. She has an MBA in Marketing and Finance from Northwestern University in Evanston, IL. Before I talk about the convention, I want to thank you for your quick responses to to e-mail votes that you made since the last board meeting. First, and this has to do with the citizens for election into a gritty audit observation project, you agreed (unanimous vote) that

a. LWVMN be represented on the Audit Advisory Board, and

#### b. LWVMN officially endorse the audit program

The second vote, also unanimous, gave you are approval to our Minnesota resolution requiring a voter verified paper record/ballot for all voting systems. The LWVUS supports only voting systems that are so designed that:

- they employ a voter verifiable paper record; that paper record being the official record of the voter's intention; and
- the voter may verify, either by eye or with the aid of suitable devices for those who have impaired vision, that the paper record accurately reflects his or her intent; and
- such verification takes place while the voter is still in the process of voting; and
- d) the paper record can be used for audits and recounts; and thus
- e) the vote totals can be verified by an independent hand count of the paper records, and

f) that routine, random audits of a portion of the paper records be conducted in every election, and published by the jurisdiction.

Because you supported this, we were able to presented at the convention as an official LWVMN resolution, that no doubt helped it succeed.

Dear Barbara,

Obviously in the mathematical and scientific world there are some issues for which there is only one "true answer." However the areas of broad public policy which the League of Women Voters addresses at all levels of government, are just not simple mathematical or scientific problems for which there is a single answer. Rather there is always a minimum of two "sides" to these broad public policy issues, and often many more than two. Choosing among competing voting systems is not a matter of "proving" the truth of a geometry problem. It involves an analysis of many complex factors in order to arrive at the best feasible solution, but obviously not the only possible solution. This kind of policy issue is just not reducible to a single mathematically determined "right answer".

It is obviously possible for a single computer in a single environment to be manipulated for any number of purposes, legal or illegal. However this basic concept has been expanded by the advocates of voter verified ballots to a conclusion that voting across the country over extended periods of time can be similarly manipulated. Such a conclusion must be based upon a belief that there could be a continuing nationwide conspiracy between voting system manufacturers and all election officials throughout the country, and that there is only a single method of preventing the possible success of this vast conspiracy. Personally I cannot envision how such a vast conspiracy, involving so many people, could ever be implemented; and even if it could ever be implemented, how it could continue for any length of time without being discovered. And finally I can't believe there is only one possible way to prevent such a Doomsday scenario.

You will recall from our recent board meeting that we talked about the proposal from Citizens for Election Integrity that LWVMN participate in their 2006 election audit observing project. Stacy Doepner-Hove had e-mailed you the project proposal prior to the board meeting May 10 with her suggestion that we might serve on their advisory board and also endorse the audit program.

Mark Halvorson, CEI Director, and Jenny Thomas, CEI Board Chair, met May 17 with Sally, Anne Salisbury and me for more detailed discussion of how the project will work. It looks very exciting, and we think the League should definitely be involved at least at the level of endorsing the program and serving on their advisory board. In her note Stacy also finds it doable.

b. LWVMN officially endorse the audit program

CEI is also interested in having us participate as an official cosponsor of the audit program, but this is more complicated and will require board discussion when we meet on June 28.

Since CEI needs to get out a brochure right away, I am asking for your speedy response: I will need it by Monday evening May 22 at the latest. If you have questions, please call me (612 377 5972). I think this is an exciting development and a great opportunity for LWVMN. I hope for your support.

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# **Transit Partners**

#### Goal Statement Transit (7/13/06 DRAFT)

To convince the 2007 Minnesota Legislature (and Governor) to substantially increase funding for transit in order to implement the Metropolitan Council's transit plan<sup>1</sup> by 2020 rather than 2030, and to provide for expansion of transit in greater Minnesota.

In support of this goal, we believe the following:

- A new funding source for transit is urgently needed to increase access for all citizens and to promote economic development.
- The estimated amount needed is \$300 million/yr (or \$180 million per year if the Transportation Referendum passes in November 06).
- The new funding source should be dedicated revenue that enables MN to match federal "new starts" funding for planned transitways.
- We support the existing Metropolitan Council transit plan which stipulates that over 50% of new money for transit be used to double the bus system.
- The new transit funding source should be equitable and provide for efficient implementation.
- To date, we think a regional (7-county) sales tax (approximately ½ cent) offers the best prospect for gaining the political support necessary for passage. (\* however we are open to dialogue about other funding sources including raising and "un-dedicating" gas tax revenues/license tab fees)

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> This plan does a good job of identifying priorities for future transit investments. However, we anticipate that it will need to be adjusted over time to reflect changing conditions and opportunities.

# League of Women Voters of Minnesota (LWVMN) Nominating Committee Guidelines Adopted by the LWVMN Board ?????, 2006

The LWVMN Nominating Committee is the most important committee at all levels of LWV: local, state and national. The choices of this committee shape the future of the League of Women Voters. The Nominating Committee is responsible to the LWV membership as a whole rather than to the board, the executive director or the president. These guidelines are intended to help the Committee in its work, but are not to be considered the absolute rule on anything. It is up to the Committee to do what it thinks is right in any given situation, bound only by the LWVMN bylaws as follows:

# Article X Nominations and Elections

Section 1. Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall consist of five members, two of whom shall be members of the Board of Directors. The chairperson and two members, who shall not be members of the Board of Directors, shall be elected by the Convention. Nominations for these offices shall be made by the current Nominating Committee. Further nominations may be made from the floor of the Convention. The other members of the committee shall be appointed by the Board of Directors immediately after the Convention. Vacancies occurring in the Nominating Committee shall be filled by the Board of Directors. The president of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota shall send the name and address of the chairperson of the nominating Committee to the president of each recognized local League.

<u>Section 2. Suggestions for Nominations.</u> The Chairperson of the Nominating Committee shall request through the president of each local League suggestions for nominations for offices to be filled. Any member may send suggestions to the chairperson of the Nominating Committee.

Section 3. Report of the Nominating Committee and Nominations from the Floor. The report of the Nominating Committee of its nominations for officers, directors, chairperson of the Budget Committee, and the chairperson and two members of the succeeding Nominating Committee shall be sent to local Leagues at least six weeks before the date of the Convention. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be presented to the Convention on the first day of the Convention. Immediately following the presentation of this report, nominations may be made from the floor by any member of the Convention, provided that the consent of the nominee shall have been secured.

Section 4. Election. The election shall be under the direction of an Election Committee appointed by the president on the first day of the Convention. The election shall be by ballot. When there is but one nominee for each office, it shall be in order to move that the secretary cast the ballot for every candidate. A majority vote of those present and voting shall constitute an election.

#### Guidelines

- I. Composition of the Nominating Committee
  - a. The size and composition of the Nominating Committee is set forth in the LWVMN bylaws and it should be noted that the majority of members on the Committee are elected by the membership at Convention and are not appointed by the Board.
  - b. The Nominating Committee chair is an off-board position and neither the LWVMN president nor the LWVMN executive director hold a place on the Nominating Committee, not even in an ex-officio capacity.
  - c. Any Nominating Committee member who chooses to be nominated for one of the officer positions should resign from the nominating Committee.

d. Members of the Nominating Committee should understand and be able to explain the responsibilities of a board member and how the LWVMN functions. They should also understand the LWVMN non-partisanship policy and should be well acquainted with the membership.

#### II. General Procedures

- a. Review the LWVMN bylaws and portfolio descriptions to determine the offices to be filled and the requirements for each office or portfolio.
- Visit Board meetings and other LWVMN meetings as observers to become familiar with likely candidates for office.
- c. Solicit suggestions from the Board and the membership through the *Voter*, the President's mailing, lwvmn-share and by announcements at meetings.
- d. Review membership lists, committee involvement, local league officers, etc. for other possibilities.
- e. Interview potential nominees and make clear the expectations for the position.
- f. Meet as a Committee to discuss candidates and make selections.
- g. Be available to help suggest names to fill Board positions due to resignations.

#### III. Suggested Timetable

- a. LWVMN Council in April of year following convention
  - Remind those attending Council that the Board will be elected again at Convention the following year and nominations will be solicited in the fall. Interested members should talk with the Nominating Committee chair when the call for nominations goes out.
- b. September preceding Convention
  - i. Orientation meeting for Nominating Committee
  - ii. Make an announcement to the LWVMN Board that nominations will be open within the next month.

#### c. October

- i. Call for nominations with a due date of early December
  - The Nominating Committee should consider the approach taken to solicit nominations. Board positions should be looked upon as a good thing, an honor, a privilege and fun-not just "another thing to do." Consider making nomination forms that are marketing pieces as well.
  - 2. Think broadly about how to market the positions, be realistic about what is expected but pitch it as a goal to reach for in being a LWV member.
  - 3. Be sure to make the call as widely as possible, using many forms of communication. Encourage lots of applications and remember to encourage members to try again if they are not selected.
  - Pay particular attention to reaching members of the LWVMN community who
    are diverse in terms of race, age and socio-economic status.

#### d. December

- i. Committee meets to see what nominations have been received and what spots remain open. While there is nothing in the LWVMN bylaws stating that the Committee must assign portfolios to elected Board members, most people feel better knowing what they will be doing before agreeing to be members of the Board. So, use the nomination time to get not only general willingness to be on the Board, but what position or portfolio the person is interested in. The Committee should secure those who have been nominated at this time.
- e. January and February
  - Committee meets to determine where there are still holes in the slate. Work continues until slate is completed. The Nominating Committee Chair should be notified as each acceptance is secured.

ii. If the Committee feels it would be helpful, the LWVMN Board can be consulted to ask for suggestions to fill positions that remain open. This is not mandatory, but can be of great help to the Committee.

#### f. March

- It is a courtesy to announce the completed slate to the LWVMN Board before making the public announcement, since it is helpful in getting an early start on planning for the next LWVMN year.
- ii. The completed slate must be published to the membership at least six weeks prior to the LWVMN Convention. The Committee should also publicize the right of the membership to present additional nominations from the floor.
- iii. If the slate is not complete at the time it is published to the membership, the Committee should continue to work to secure candidates who will then be nominated from the floor of the Convention.

#### g. LWVMN Convention

- i. The Committee chair shall present the slate to the members and move its election.
- ii. Any nominations from the floor and subsequent elections should be presided over by the Nominating Committee chair.

#### IV. Suggested Dos

- a. Make a positive approach
  - i. Discuss the importance of the position to be filled and the opportunity the nominee will have to make a contribution to the LWVMN and to broaden her/his experience and contacts. Be confident that the LWV is a highly respected national organization and it is an honor to represent the LWV in the community.
  - Make this a marketing tool for the LWV. Consider a nomination form that includes the names and bios of past national LWV board members. Make it a big deal to be part of this board.

#### b. Be candid as possible

- i. Explain the expected workload for the position in question. Give an estimated timeline, if possible.
- ii. Make it clear that the nominee is expected to:
  - 1. Attend all LWVMN Board meetings
  - 2. Help with membership and development
  - 3. Put the LWVMN in their "top five" for personal charitable contributions
  - 4. Actively contribute to total LWVMN Board planning

#### c. Try to achieve a balanced Board

- i. A variety of viewpoints, backgrounds and experiences is helpful in maintaining a proper balance on the LWVMN Board.
- ii. The Nominating Committee should be particularly attentive to racial, socioeconomic and age considerations when looking for Board members.
- iii. Consider the political affiliation of potential nominees, the broader our Board the better we can reach the political community with whom we work.
- d. Discuss the LWVMN non-partisan policy
  - i. See below for a copy of the LWVMN Political Activity Policy
- e. Consult with the prospective LWVMN President
  - Discuss any concerns she/he may have with her/his ability to work with the potential nominees.
  - ii. This does not mean that you do not nominate someone because the prospective President has an issue, but it may be a consideration.

#### V. Suggested Don'ts

a. Ever allow discussion among the Nominating Committee members to be aired outside the committee.

- Violation of this rule can reflect poorly on the LWV and may make the Committee's work unnecessarily unpleasant.
- ii. Comments and suggestions from outside should be welcomed to inform the Committee, but discussions and decisions are confidential.
- b. Feel you have to assign portfolios
  - This is the LWVMN Board's responsibility. However, in reality potential Board members often want to sign up for a specific position rather than an open-ended directorship.
  - ii. Keep communication open with the prospective President for her/his ideas on portfolios as well.
- c. Necessarily renominate persons simply because they have served well in the past
  - i. Rotation in office is the best way to ensure that the LWVMN will grow and develop new leadership.
  - ii. Consider asking current Board members to take on new positions as a way to spark new ideas as well.
- d. Fill an office with an unqualified or uncommitted person simply to fill the slate
  - i. The LWVMN Board is a hard working Board. It needs to be filled with people who are willing to do the work required.
  - ii. It is a disservice to the person and the LWVMN to simply put bodies into positions.
- e. Let good prospects get away
  - If someone is unduly modest about her/his abilities, explain how much you think of her/him.
  - ii. If good nominees appear to busy to serve, ask them anyway. Let it be their choice. You will never get that for which you do not ask.
  - iii. If someone is a great candidate, but you choose not to nominate-be sure to follow up with the person and encourage her/him to try again. Actively ask an appropriate Board member to recruit the person to join that committee. Pass the name on to the next Nominating Committee, if appropriate.
- f. Allow the Nominating Committee to restrict nominees to a single group, area or clique
  - i. A wide variety of experiences and viewpoints is essential to a healthy LWV.
  - ii. Get outside of your comfort zone and look broadly for nominees.
  - iii. If you don't feel you know enough about a particular nominee, ask others, have an interview and visit them in action. Don't put aside a nominee just because you don't know them.
  - iv. Be honest with yourself about your own viewpoints and biases and work to get past them.
- g. Allow the LWVMN Board to decide on its successors
  - The current LWVMN Board can be of great service when looking for potential nominees.
  - ii. However, it is the Nominating Committee's job to recruit nominees for its slate. Do not allow the Board to overrun your decisions.

You may adapt these policies for your Local League.

The nonpartisanship of the League of Women Voters is the basis of our public credibility and must be carefully maintained. All members bear responsibility for maintaining the League's reputation for fairness and objectivity. The discussion of nonpartisan policy should be a part of new board orientation.

The mission of the LWV is to encourage the informed and active participation of citizens in government. The League is political and takes action on selected governmental issues after membership study and agreement. It encourages members to be informed participants in political activity, but as a nonpartisan organization, it does not support or oppose any political party or candidate.

All members are encouraged to seek elective or appointive office in government as well as responsible positions in the private sector. To avoid any perceived or actual conflict with the nonpartisan integrity of League, the following restrictions are accepted:

#### I. League Action

A Board member may not speak publicly or work against a League position.

#### II. Partisan Activity

Directors in highly visible positions such as president, voter serve chair and action chair may not undertake any action which would publicly identify them with partisan activity. They may not run for public or party office or publicly support campaigns at the regional, state or national levels.

Directors may not run for national or state elective office. Should they choose to run for local office, they will first consult with the State Board and notify the local Leagues affected.

Directors may not be highly visible in the campaign of any candidate running for US Senate, Congress, or for MN executive or legislative office. They may make contributions to candidates and work on local campaigns. Directors not in highly visible positions may hold position in a political party at any level with Board approval after consideration of possible conflicts of interest.

The political activities of a spouse or relative of a Board member are to be considered as separate and distinct from the activities of the Board member.

#### III. Appointed Office

Directors may accept appointment to commissions, boards, or committees where such service would not be in conflict with League program. If a member is acting as a LWVMN representative, the appointment must be approved by the LWVMN Board of Directors. It must be clear to all whether the member is acting as a League representative or as an individual. The Board shall review this policy annually and update it as necessary.

  - The Nominating Committee should be broad in the approach taken to solicit nominations. Make sure to contact all local LWVs in as many ways possible to be sure they have received the message.
  - Explain both awards specifically and create an informational piece that is a marketing piece as well. Explain how these awards are both an honor and recognition for past services.
  - The Committee could decide to let local LWVs who made nominations in the past year that were not the winning nominations to see if they want to renominate these people.

#### c. January

- Send out follow-up solicitations for nominations reminding local LWVs of the deadlines, forms, etc.
- ii. Be sure that the nomination forms are complete and work with the local LWVs to get them in line if necessary.

#### d. March

- Copy nomination packets for the Committee to read at the decision meeting. Because
  these awards are meant to be secret, the packets should not be sent out to potentially
  "float around" out there. All packets should be kept in the office.
- ii. Committee meets to review nominations and select winners.
- iii. Winners must be selected at least one month ahead of the Convention to assure the plaques are ready and the winners can be arranged to be in attendance.

#### e. April

- i. Work with person who completed the nomination of the winners to make sure that the award winners will be at the LWVMN Convention in May.
- Contact the past year's award winners to be sure the will be able to attend the LWVMN Convention to read the bios of the new award winners at the banquet.
- iii. Create a bio for each winner to be read when the award is presented.

#### f. LWVMN Convention

i. The Committee chair shall introduce each of the award winners from the past year and then each past winner will present the awards to the new winners.

#### g. After the Convention

i. Write a press release announcing the winners.

Please note the following addition to the LWWMN Board Meeting; this is a recommendation from the Member Resources Committee as decided at its 8/8/06 meeting.

Increase in dues: Karen Langsjoen: Motion: to increase the LWVMN State Unit members' dues from \$45 per year to \$50 per year, with periodic re-evaluation.

Background: Member-at- Large dues have been set at two different rates. For members-at-large who affiliate with no local LWV or LWV unit, the dues are \$60.

Members of state units pay \$45 each to LWVMN and each unit receives a \$5 rebate per member to support local activities. LWVMN pays the per member payment due to LWVUS for both types of members. When MAL dues were recently raised to \$60 for the purpose of not underselling local LWV memberships, state unit dues were not raised. The Member Resources Committee proposes to begin closing the disparity in dues between the two types of MAL members by raising the state unit dues from \$45 to \$50. This increase would go into effect September 1, 2006. We bill members on the anniversary date of their membership.

State units are Brainerd Lakes Area, Lakes Area, Chisago County, Park Rapids, Winona, and Bloomington.



The League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund's (LWVMNEF's) Minnesota Compact on Campaign Standards is designed to raise the level of political discussion among candidates, campaigns, the media and voters. It seeks to persuade candidates, political parties and interest groups to maximize the presentation of issues and candidate qualifications and to minimize attacks. The standards are voluntary with the only enforcement method being that of public opinion, so we need your help.

One plank of the Minnesota Compact is that news organizations cover the substance of political campaigns with less emphasis on campaign strategy.

### Therefore, our request of you is twofold:

### First:

As a news provider, we urge that you cover this project in an article in the near future for the public's information. With early coverage during the campaign, Minnesota citizens can learn about the Minnesota Compact and contact the League if they would like to receive a brochure or obtain more information.

### Second:

As a watchdog of the election season, we also request that you adhere to these standards individually and as an organization. In our democracy, it is critical that media organizations provide fair, accurate information during an election. This includes:

- Emphasizing issues
- · Placing less emphasis on strategy and predictions of outcomes
- Checking accuracy and fairness of campaign advertisements
- Promoting and broadcasting debates, then following-up on those debates and candidate promises after the election
- Encouraging participation in elections
- Describing your news organization's decisions on when and how to cover controversial and/or ethically challenging news about the candidates or the campaigns.

# What Is Your Organization's "Elevator Message"?

Excerpt from Attracting the Attention Your Cause Deserves

When I first heard the phrase "elevator message," I wondered what was so important about delivering a message while rising to the 15th floor. Then someone explained the idea was to be able to describe an organization's work to an outsider in the short space of an elevator ride. I've been a confirmed elevator man ever since.

I've known several masters of the elevator message. Each knew how to sound a few simple and powerful notes about his organization in such a way that every visitor left with an understanding of why the group mattered.

There is a knack to honing a simple message. The more tightly focused your niche, the easier it is to express who you are—witness groups from a local hospice to Habitat for Humanity. But even the sharpest niche can be subverted if you insist on saying too much in your message.

Given about 90 seconds, what would you say if asked, "What does Save Our Families do?"

You'll need to be direct and focused, answering just the basic questions:

- · What does our organization do?
- Where is it heading?
- Why should anyone care?

The fact is, your time with reporters and visitors is fleeting. You want to impart key bits of memorable information that characterize your work.

Maybe you're a "camp for sick kids" that "transforms lives" by allowing youngsters to "play and be themselves for the first time." There is much more that leaders of the Hole in the Wall Gang Camps would want you to know. But, as I learned in working with the group, it is the beauty of allowing kids to be just kids that lies at the heart of the program.

Rest assured that Paul Newman, who founded the camps, could speak at length about the numbers of campers served, the careful medical management of the camps, the wonderful facilities that have been created for the kids, and the important respite that the kids' going away to camp offers stressed-out parents.

But you have to restrain yourself in the elevator—offering just enough to convey who you are and what's special about what you do, and no more.

Another way to think about an elevator message is to imagine a friend standing a hundred yards away on the other side of a river, and you have to shout for her to hear. What are the few declarative sentences you would be sure to get out if you were describing your organization? In the case of the Hole in the Wall Gang Camps, it would be:

We have camps for sick kids!

The experience transforms their lives!

The kids can play and be themselves—for the first time!

What do you want to shout for the world to hear? Figure that out, and you have the tight, focused message that will inform all of your publicity efforts.

### **Telling Your Story**

Once you've polished your elevator message, it's time to tell your story.

Amid the chaos of life, nothing gives order and meaning as much as a well-told story. More to the point, stories grab people. Give a reporter a tale about a 75-year-old grandmother graduating from your business college, and he'll go for it every time.

You don't have to be a great storyteller to pitch a story to reporters. Just be sure you know all the facts—no surprises, please—and can provide the outline of why the story will make a great feature or broadcast segment.

Let's say yours is a community hospital with new outreach programs for inner-city families. Greater visibility will help boost patient numbers and perhaps scare up some new donors to meet the high costs of additional staff and facilities

### LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF MINNESOTA BYLAWS

As adopted by the 1947 Convention and as amended by the 1951, 1953, 1955, 1957, 1959, 1961, 1963, 1965, 1967, 1971, 1973, 1975, 1977, 1979, 1981, 1983, 1985, 1987, 1989, 1991, 1993, 1995, 1997,1999, 2001, 2003, 2005 Conventions.

### **ARTICLE I**

<u>Section I</u>. The name of this corporation shall be the League of Women Voters of Minnesota. This state League is an integral part of the League of Women Voters of the United States.

# ARTICLE II Purpose and Policy

<u>Section I. Purposes</u>. The purposes of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota are to promote political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government and to act on selected governmental issues.

<u>Section 2. Political Policy.</u> The League shall not support or oppose any political party or any candidate.

### ARTICLE III Membership

<u>Section I. Eligibility</u>. Any person who subscribes to the purposes and policy of the League shall be eligible for membership.

### Section 2. Types of Membership.

- a) Voting members. Citizens at least 18 years of age who join the League shall be voting members of local Leagues, state Leagues and LWVUS.
  - individuals who live within an area of a local League may join that League or any other local League;
  - 2) those who reside outside the area of any local League may join a local League or shall be state members-at-large;
  - 3) those who have been members of League for 50 years or more shall be honorary life members excused from the payment of dues.
- b) Associate members. All others who join the League shall be associate members.

### ARTICLE IV Officers

### Section I. Enumeration and Election of Officers

- a) The officers of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a third vice-president, a secretary and a treasurer. They shall be elected by the Convention and shall hold office until the conclusion of the next regular biennial Convention or until their successors have been elected and qualified. Two individuals may be elected to share one position, or two positions may be held by one individual elected to the dual-position office, except that the offices of president and treasurer shall be held by two different individuals.
- b) The officers of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota shall constitute the executive committee. In addition, the president may appoint up to two members of the Board to serve on the executive committee. The executive committee shall confer when immediate action is necessary and a meeting of the Board of Directors is not feasible, and shall in those instances have the powers and duties of the Board of Directors for planning and directing the Program and carrying out organizational responsibilities.
- <u>Section 2. The President.</u> The president shall preside at all meetings of the corporation and of the Board of Directors unless the president shall designate another person to preside. The president may, in the absence or disability of the treasurer, sign or endorse checks, drafts or notes. The president, or a designated representative in the president's absence, shall sign all contracts and other instruments when so authorized by the Board. The president shall be, ex officio, a member of all committees except the Nominating Committee and shall have such usual powers of supervision and management as may pertain to the office of the president and perform such other duties as may be designated by the Board.
- <u>Section 3. The Vice-Presidents</u>. The three vice-presidents, in the order of their rank, shall, in the event of absence, disability, resignation or death of the president, possess all the powers and perform all the duties of that office. In the event that no vice-president is able to serve in this capacity, the Board of Directors shall elect one of its members to fill the vacancy. The vice-presidents shall perform such other duties as the president and Board may designate.
- <u>Section 4. The Secretary</u>. The secretary shall keep minutes of Convention, Council and of meetings of the Board of Directors and shall perform such other functions as may be incident to the office. If a second signature is necessary on a contract or other instrument, the secretary shall sign when so authorized by the Board.
- <u>Section 5. The Treasurer</u>. The treasurer or a duly appointed representative, shall receive all money due, shall be the custodian of such funds, deposit them in a bank designated by the Board of Directors, and shall disburse them only upon order of the Board of Directors. The treasurer shall present periodic statements to the Board at its regular meetings. The treasurer shall present an annual report, including a report of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota Reserve Fund, to the Convention or Council. The books of the treasurer shall be audited annually and the report made available to the membership.

### ARTICLE V Board of Directors

<u>Section I. Number, Manner of Selection and Term of Office.</u> The Board of Directors shall consist of the officers of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota, eight elected directors and not more than eight appointed directors. The elected directors shall be elected by the Convention and shall serve until the conclusion of the next regular biennial Convention or until their successors have been elected and qualified. The elected members shall appoint such additional directors, not exceeding eight, as they deem necessary to carry on the work of the League. The term of office of the appointed directors shall expire concurrently with the term of office of the elected directors.

<u>Section 2. Qualifications</u>. Any voting member of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota can be elected or appointed to serve as an officer or director of this corporation.

<u>Section 3. Vacancies</u>. Any vacancy other than in the office of the president may be filled, until the next Convention, by appointment by the president and final approval by a majority vote of the remaining members of the Board of Directors. The office of the president shall be filled in accordance with Article IV, Section 3 of these bylaws.

Section 4. Powers and Duties. The Board of Directors shall have full charge of the property and business of the corporation with full power and authority to manage and conduct the same, subject to the instructions of the Convention. The Board shall plan and direct the work necessary to carry out the Program on selected governmental issues as adopted by the Convention. It shall accept responsibility delegated to it by the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of the United States for the organization and development of local Leagues, guidance of inter-League organizations, for the carrying out of Program and for promotion of finance programs in the local Leagues. Such local finance programs are requisite to further the work of the League as a whole, including transmission of funds toward the support of adequate state and national budgets. The Board shall create and designate such special committees as it may deem necessary.

<u>Section 5. Regular Meetings</u>. There shall be at least four regular meetings of the Board of Directors annually. The president shall notify each of the directors of all meetings at least one week before any such meeting. No action taken at any regular Board meeting attended by three-fourths of the members of the Board shall be invalidated because of the failure of any member or members of the Board to receive any notice properly sent or because of an irregularity in any notice actually received.

Section 6. Special Meetings. The president may call special meetings of the Board of Directors and shall call a special meeting upon the written request of five members of the Board. Members of the Board shall be notified of the time and place of special meetings by personal telephone contact, email or letter sent at least six days prior to such meeting. At the time of a Convention the president may, and upon the request of five members of the Board shall, call a special meeting of the Board by handing the members of the Board a written notice of the time and place of said meeting.

Section 7. Leave of Absence. Any member of the Board of Directors may request a leave of absence from the Board of up to six months. This leave must be approved by a

majority of the Board. When on leave, the absent Board member will not be included in the quorum needed for the Board to conduct business.

Section 8. Removal of Officers and/or Directors. At any regular or duly called special meeting of the Board of Directors, any one or more of the officers and/or directors may be removed by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Directors. Any vacancy to come of such removal shall be filled in accordance with Article V, Section 3 of these bylaws. Any officer and/or director whose removal has been proposed shall be given at least thirty days notice of intent to take such action and an opportunity to be heard at this meeting.

<u>Section 9. Quorum</u>. A majority of the members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum, and a majority of the members in attendance at any Board meeting shall, in the presence of a quorum, decide its action.

### ARTICLE VI Recognition of Local and Provisional Leagues and State Units

### Section I. Local Leagues.

- Local Leagues are those Leagues which have been so recognized by the League of Women Voters of the United States.
- b) The Board of Directors shall recommend to the national Board of the League of Women Voters of the United States that it recognize as a local League any group of members of the League of Women Voters of the United States in any community within the state, provided the group meets qualifying standards for local Leagues as adopted by the national Convention.
- c) In the event of recurring failure of a local League to meet these qualifying standards, the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota may recommend to the national Board that it withdraw recognition from the local League. All funds held by a local League from which recognition has been withdrawn shall be paid to the League of Women Voters of Minnesota. In the event the non-qualifying League is merging with another local League, its funds would go to the merged League minus a reorganization fee paid to and determined by the League of Women Voters of Minnesota.

### Section 2. State Units

- State units are those which have been so recognized by the League of Women Voters of Minnesota.
- b) The Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota has responsibility for the establishment of new Leagues. For this purpose the Board may organize a group in a community in which no local League exists and shall recommend the group for recognition as a state unit when it meets the qualifying guidelines as set forth by the League of Women Voters of Minnesota Board of Directors.
- c) In the event of recurring failure of a state unit to meet these qualifying guidelines, the Board of Directors of the LWVMN may recommend that recognition be withdrawn. All

funds held by state units from which recognition has been withdrawn shall be paid to the League of Women Voters of Minnesota.

# ARTICLE VII Finance

<u>Section I. Fiscal Year</u>. The fiscal year of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota shall commence on the first of April each year.

<u>Section 2. Budget</u>. The Board shall submit to the Convention for adoption budgets for the ensuing two fiscal years. These budgets shall provide for the support of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota. The Per Member Payment amount shall be determined for the ensuing two fiscal years only by the delegates at the state convention. A copy of the proposed budgets shall be sent to each local League president at least six weeks in advance of the Convention. The budget shall be adopted by a majority vote of the delegates at the state convention.

<u>Section 3. Budget Committee</u>. The budgets shall be prepared by the elected chair and a committee which shall be appointed by the Board for that purpose at least six months in advance of the Convention. The treasurer shall be ex officio a member of the Budget committee but shall not be eligible to serve as chairperson.

Section 4. Distribution of Funds on Dissolution. In the event of a dissolution for any cause of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota, all monies and securities which may at the time be owned by or under the absolute control of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota shall be paid to the League of Women Voters of the United States, after the Board of Directors has paid or made provision for the payment of all the liabilities of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota. All other property of whatsoever nature, whether real, personal or mixed, which may at the time be owned by or under the control of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota, shall be disposed of by any officer or employee of the corporation for such public, charitable or educational uses and purposes as may be designated by the then League of Women Voters of Minnesota.

Section 5. League of Women Voters of Minnesota Reserve Fund. The fund shall contain the \$1,000 restricted principal of the Jane Grey Swisshelm Fund and all other monies, securities and property of whatever nature, which the League of Women Voters of Minnesota may receive by gift, bequest or otherwise, which the Board of Directors may designate as reserve funds. Expenditures of monies from the fund and of interest earned on monies in the fund shall be for League purposes as may from time to time be determined by the Board of Directors subject only to restrictions which may have been imposed by the donor at the time the funds were received.

# ARTICLE VIII Convention

Section I. Place, Date and Call. A Convention of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota shall be held biennially at a time and place to be determined by the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota. The president shall send a first call for the Convention to the presidents of the local Leagues and State Unit chairs not less than four months prior to the opening date of the Convention fixed in said call. Thereafter the Board of Directors may advance or postpone the opening date of the Convention by not more than two weeks. A final call for the Convention shall be sent to the presidents of the local Leagues and State Unit chairs, and the delegates at least six weeks before the opening date of the Convention.

<u>Section 2. Composition</u>. The Convention shall consist of the delegates chosen by the members enrolled in the local Leagues, and delegates chosen by members-at-large of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota, as provided in Section 4 of this article; the presidents of local Leagues or an alternate in the event the president is unable to attend; and the members of the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota.

<u>Section 3. Qualification of Delegates and Voting</u>. Each delegate shall be a voting member enrolled in a recognized local Minnesota League whose State Per Member Payment is paid or be an at large member of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota. The State Board may make an exception in the case of proven hardship. Each delegate shall be entitled to one vote only at the Convention even though the delegate may be attending in two or more capacities. Absentee or proxy voting shall not be permitted. The Convention shall be the sole judge of whether a delegate is qualified to vote.

### Section 4. Representation.

- a) The members of the League of Women Voters of the United States who are organized into recognized local Leagues in the State of Minnesota shall be entitled to voting representation in the Convention as follows: Each local League shall be entitled to two delegates, in addition to the president of the local League or an alternate in the event the president is unable to attend; these additional delegates shall be chosen by the local League. The members in each local League having more than twenty-five voting members shall also be entitled to one additional delegate for each additional twenty-five members or major fraction thereof belonging to said local League on January 1st of said year. The record in the state office of paid voting members as of January lst of said year shall determine the official membership count for this purpose.
- b) Members-at-large of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota shall be entitled to one delegate for each 25 members, chosen by a procedure determined by the Board of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota.

<u>Section 5. Powers</u>. The Convention shall consider and authorize for action a Program; shall elect officers and directors, the Budget Chairperson, Nominating Committee Chairperson and two Nominating Committee members; shall adopt budgets for the ensuing two fiscal years; and shall transact such other business as may be properly presented.

<u>Section 6. Quorum</u>. A quorum shall consist of a majority of the delegates registered at the Convention provided that no fewer than ten local Leagues are represented.

# ARTICLE IX Council

Section I. Place, Date and Call. A meeting of the Council shall be held in the interim year between Conventions, approximately twelve months after the preceding Convention at a time and place to be determined by the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota. A formal call shall be sent by the president of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota to the presidents of the local Leagues in Minnesota at least thirty days before the opening date of a Council meeting. Special meetings may be called in the event of extreme emergency.

<u>Section 2. Composition</u>. The Council shall be composed of the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota, the presidents of local Leagues or an alternate in the event the president is unable to attend, and one delegate chosen by each local League.

Section 3. Powers. The Council shall consider Program, and methods of work and review the budget as submitted to the Board of Directors. The Council is authorized to change the Program only in the event of an emergency, provided that notice of proposed modification of the Program shall have been sent to the presidents of the local Leagues at least two months in advance of the meeting of the Council, and provided also that a two-thirds majority of the members of the Council present and voting shall be required to adopt the modification. The Council shall review the budget for the ensuing year and may modify it to meet current needs and shall transact such other business as shall be presented by the Board.

<u>Section 4. Quorum</u>. A quorum shall consist of no fewer than twenty members other than the Board of Directors for the transaction of business at a Council meeting.

# ARTICLE X Nominations and Elections

Section I. Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall consist of five members, two of whom shall be members of the Board of Directors. The chairperson and two members, who shall not be members of the Board of Directors, shall be elected by the Convention. Nominations for these offices shall be made by the current Nominating Committee. Further nominations may be made from the floor of the Convention. The other members of the committee shall be appointed by the Board of Directors immediately after the Convention. Vacancies occurring in the Nominating Committee shall be filled by the Board of Directors. The president of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota shall send the name and address of the chairperson of the Nominating Committee to the president of each recognized local League.

<u>Section 2. Suggestions for Nominations</u>. The Chairperson of the Nominating Committee shall request through the president of each local League suggestions for

nominations for offices to be filled. Any member may send suggestions to the chairperson of the Nominating Committee.

Section 3. Report of the Nominating Committee and Nominations from the Floor. The report of the Nominating Committee of its nominations for officers, directors, chairperson of the Budget Committee, and the chairperson and two members of the succeeding Nominating Committee shall be sent to local Leagues at least six weeks before the date of the Convention. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be presented to the Convention on the first day of the Convention. Immediately following the presentation of this report, nominations may be made from the floor by any member of the Convention, provided that the consent of the nominee shall have been secured.

<u>Section 4. Election</u>. The election shall be under the direction of an Election Committee appointed by the president on the first day of the Convention. The election shall be by ballot. When there is but one nominee for each office, it shall be in order to move that the secretary cast the ballot for every candidate. A majority vote of those present and voting shall constitute an election.

# ARTICLE XI Program

<u>Section I. Principles</u>. The governmental principles adopted by the national Convention and supported by the League as a whole constitute the authorization for the adoption of Program.

<u>Section 2. Program</u>. The Program of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota shall consist of:

- a) action to implement principles, and
- b) those state governmental issues chosen for concentrated study and action.

<u>Section 3. Convention Action</u>. The Convention shall act upon the Program using the following procedures:

- a) Local Leagues shall make recommendations for a Program to the Board of Directors at least three months prior to the Convention.
- b) The Board of Directors shall consider the recommendations and shall formulate a proposed Program which shall be submitted to the local League Boards at least six weeks prior to the Convention.
- A majority vote shall be required for the adoption of the Program proposed by the Board of Directors.
- d) Any recommendation for the Program submitted to the Board of Directors at least three months before the Convention, but not proposed by the Board, may be adopted by the

Convention provided consideration is ordered by majority vote and at a subsequent session the proposal for adoption receives a three-fifths vote.

Section 4. Council Action. The Council may change the Program as provided in Article IX.

<u>Section 5. Member Action.</u> Members may act in the name of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota only when authorized to do so by the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota.

<u>Section 6. Local League Action</u>. Local Leagues and inter-League organizations may take action on state governmental issues only when authorized to do so by the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota. Local Leagues may act only in conformity with, and not contrary to, a position taken by the League of Women Voters of Minnesota and/or the League of Women Voters of the United States.

# ARTICLE XII National Convention and Council

<u>Section 1. National Convention</u>. The Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota, at a meeting before the date on which the names of delegates must be sent to the national office, shall elect delegates to that Convention in the number allotted to the League of Women Voters of Minnesota under the provisions of the Bylaws of the League of Women Voters of the United States.

<u>Section 2. National Council.</u> The Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota shall elect delegates to the meeting of the Council of the League of Women Voters of the United States at a meeting preceding such Council meeting in the number allowed the League of Women Voters of Minnesota under the provisions of the Bylaws of the League of Women Voters of the United States.

# ARTICLE XIII Parliamentary Authority

**Section 1. Parliamentary Authority**. The rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the corporation in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws.

### **ARTICLE XIV**

### **Amendments**

**Section 1. Amendments**. These Bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any Convention of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota, using the following procedures:

- a) Proposals for changes shall be submitted by any local League Board in Minnesota to the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota at least three months prior to the opening date of the Convention.
- b) All such proposed amendments together with the recommendations of the Board of Directors of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota shall be sent to the presidents of local Leagues at least six weeks prior to the opening date of the Convention.
- c) The presidents of the local Leagues shall notify the members of their respective Leagues of the proposed amendments. Failure of a local League president to give such notice or failure of any member to receive such notice shall not invalidate amendments to the Bylaws of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota.

# Program for Action

A Summary of Positions of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota

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### INTRODUCTION

To the League of Women Voters, *Program* means those issues chosen by the members for study and action. At each level of the League--national, state or local--Program includes items adopted for current study, and carefully worded, study-based consensus positions that lead to action.

State Program is selected by League of Women Voters of Minnesota (LWVMN) members in individual units through proposals to their local boards of directors, who send the proposals to the state Board. The state Board then formulates a recommended Program of old, new and/or amended items consisting of those most frequently mentioned. All items, whether recommended or not, may be discussed, amended and adopted or rejected at the biennial state Convention.

Following adoption of the Program, research committees are formed to prepare study information on new items. In small units and at large meetings, members weigh the pros and cons of issues to reach consensus on each study item. The state Board receives the consensus reports from the local Leagues, determines areas of agreement, and formulates position statements. Only after consensus is reached and a position is formed can the League take action. The state Board also evaluates specific legislation and decides what action should be taken. There are two kinds of action: 1) developing public support for League positions; 2) supporting specific measures and policies which promote a League position or opposing those which threaten it. The process works similarly for the Council of Metropolitan Area Leagues (CMAL), except that the Program items have regional significance and are chosen and studied by members in the metropolitan area.

Leagues at all levels may "concur" with a position of another League either within Minnesota or in another state. A possible concurrence study is considered at state Convention in the same manner as any other Program item. Study materials developed for the original study may be used and are supplemented by the committee overseeing the concurrence study. The LWVMN position on Prevention of Violence, for example, was originally adopted by the LWV-Minneapolis and concurred with by Leagues throughout the state.

Included in this booklet are summaries of the 2003-2005 Programs of the LWVMN, of the League of Women Voters of the United States (LWVUS), and of the CMAL, which consists of the local Leagues in the seven-county Minneapolis-St. Paul metropolitan area. For each LWVMN Program item on which a position has been reached, you will find:

- a summary of the position, along with a brief statement of the relevant LWVUS position, if there is one (all in boldface);
- details of the LWVMN position, including the date when consensus was reached on each section; and
- a history of League and governmental action on the topic since 1990. <u>Prior history will be found in *Positions for* Action 1999-2001.
  </u>

LWVMN positions have been grouped according to LWVUS classifications: Social Policy, Natural Resources and Government. Exceptions to these groups are Education and Criminal Justice, which LWVMN retains as separate categories. To emphasize the fact that the state League often acts on national positions, summary statements of LWVUS positions have been included where appropriate.

League members throughout the state promote public support for positions by talking with legislators and community leaders; attending precinct caucuses and participating in the political process; and using the media, public meetings and personal contacts to tell their story. Local Leagues may take action themselves if the action is consistent with national, state and/or CMAL positions; their membership is informed and in general agreement; and, when the action affects other Leagues, they confer prior to taking action.

The state Board takes official action in the name of the League of Women Voters of Minnesota. This action may consist of writing letters, personal lobbying of members of the Legislature or executive agencies, testimony at legislative hearings, holding press conferences, or any other measure deemed useful by the Board. Individual Leaguers speak for themselves only and not as League members unless directed to do so by state, national or local League boards.

The League of Women Voters strongly endorses citizen involvement in the political process. It encourages League members to participate in the political party of their choice. The League itself is nonpartisan; LWV, as an organization, does not support candidates or political parties. State Board members are restricted to low-level partisan political activities and may not run for party-designated public office.

### LEAGUE PRINCIPLES

In addition to the items adopted for LWVUS and LWVMN Programs, League Principles may be the basis for state and local League actions. The Principles have served two functions according to LWVUS Bylaws: 1) as authorization for adoption of national, state and local Program, and 2) as a basis for taking action at the national, state and local levels. Action to implement the Principles is authorized by the appropriate League board once it determines that member understanding and agreement exist and that the action is appropriate.

League Principles are as follows:

- The League of Women Voters believes in representative government and in the individual liberties established in the Constitution of the United States.
- The League of Women Voters believes that democratic government depends upon the informed and active participation of its citizens and requires that governmental bodies protect the citizen's right to know by giving adequate notice of proposed actions, holding open meetings and making public records accessible.
- The League of Women Voters believes that every citizen should be protected in the right to vote; that every person should have access to free public education which provides equal opportunity for all; and that no person or group should suffer legal, economic or administrative discrimination.
- The League of Women Voters believes that efficient and economical government requires competent personnel, the clear assignment of responsibility, adequate financing and coordination among the different agencies and levels of government.
- The League of Women Voters believes that responsible government should be responsive to the will of the people; should maintain an equitable and flexible system of taxation; promote the conservation and development of natural resources in the public interest; share in the solution of economic and social problems that affect the general welfare; promote a sound economy; and adopt domestic policies that facilitate the solution of international problems.
- The League of Women Voters believes that cooperation with other nations is essential in the search for solutions to world problems, and that the development of international organization and international law is imperative in the promotion of world peace.

### PROGRAM AT A GLANCE

### Program Adopted by League of Women Voters of Minnesota

### I. CRIMINAL JUSTICE

**Judiciary:** Support of a judicial system with the capacity to assure a speedy trial and equal justice for all.

Corrections: Support of a correctional system responsive to the needs of the individual offender and of society. Support of sentencing decisions based on circumstances in relation to the crime, the offender and the effect on public safety, made by the judge within legislative guidelines.

Selection of Judges: Support present system of selection and retention of appellate and district judges with certain modifications. Oppose allowing candidates to accept and use endorsement by political parties.

### II. EDUCATION

Equal Opportunity: Support of increased state responsibility in creating equal public educational opportunities for all Minnesota children through measures to correct racial imbalance and ensure adequate financing of public schools.

Financing of Education: Support of equal access to a good public education for all Minnesota children. State funding for education should be at a level that makes programs of comparable substance and quality available to all. A student's access to a good education should not depend on the wealth of his or her school district.

Collective Bargaining and Tenure: Support of improvements in the collective bargaining and tenure laws of the state as they apply to K-12 teachers only.

**Library Funding:** Support for increased and restructured funding for public libraries.

### III. GOVERNMENT

Citizen Rights: Support of improvements in election laws regulating election procedures, voting and school district elections. Support of improvements in election laws regulating campaign practices.

Organization of Government: Support of improved structure and procedures for the Minnesota Legislature and Executive Branch; support of an improved process for amending the Minnesota Constitution; support of timely redistricting based substantially on population of congressional districts and of all elected state and local governmental bodies; opposition to a unicameral state legislature.

Initiative, Referendum and Recall: Support of the continuation of legislative initiative and compulsory voter referendum on constitutional amendments; and support of voter approval by a majority of those voting on the question.

Oppose most forms of voter initiative and referendum and recall of members of the legislature and state constitutional officers.

Oppose term limits for members of the legislature and state constitutional officers.

Financing State Government: Support of a balanced and diversified revenue system which relies on broad-based taxes and user fees. Support of an evaluation of each individual revenue source to determine if it is competitive with other states, efficient, equitable, progressive, reliable, responsive and simple. Support of a broad-based sales tax with exemptions for essential items. Support of an equitable property tax as the primary source of financing services provided by local governments and as a partial funding for education. Support of a corporation franchise tax competitive with other states. Support of achieving social goals through open and visible expenditures rather than by granting deductions, exclusions and credits. Support of the principle that state legislation mandating local government action should identify sources of revenue. Support of long-term financial management, budget projections and budget reserve.

State Government Spending: Belief that a longterm vision as well as immediate concerns should guide state spending decisions. Support of the following broad goals, in order of priority: provide high-quality K-12 educational opportunities; provide basic level of health and human services; protect natural resources; encourage economic selfsufficiency; provide for public safety; provide highquality post-secondary educational opportunities; and preserve open spaces. Support of the use of specific criteria when faced with the need to limit spending. i.e. curtailing subsidies for sports teams and convention centers, maintenance of existing infrastructure over increased infrastructure, tax relief targeted to low-income households and providing services first to the most needy.

Firearms: Action to support restrictions on the sale, possession and use of firearms by private parties in the state of Minnesota. Opposition to an amendment to the Minnesota Constitution granting to an individual the right to bear arms. Support for the ability of local municipalities to regulate ownership and possession of firearms and ammunition more strictly than state law allows.

### IV. NATURAL RESOURCES

Water Resources: Support of a state role in the preservation and management of Minnesota's water resources through protection, allocation, conservation, pricing and interbasin transfer policies protective of Minnesota's current and future needs.

**Solid Waste:** Support of measures to reduce generation of solid waste and ensure safe treatment, storage and disposal of all wastes.

Air Quality: Support measures to reduce air pollution from vehicular and stationary sources.

Land Use: Support of an overall land use plan with maximum cooperation and implementation at the regional and local levels, with state help in developing and exercising land use management, with opportunity for maximum local decision making, and with regional planning and regulation for matters of more than local concern.

Agriculture: Support of a system of sustainable agricultural production which provides safe, healthful food and which preserves and protects the state's human and natural agricultural resources and enhances the environment. Support of a state policy which promotes research and technical assistance in farming practices and rural economies that improve the economic viability of family farms, environmental health and the quality of life of family farmers and their communities.

### V. SOCIAL POLICY

Equal Opportunity: Support of policies to ensure equality of opportunity in employment, real property, public accommodations, education and other public services for all persons. Support of administrative enforcement of antidiscrimination laws. Support of state responsibility for and responsiveness to Indian citizens.

### **FAMILY ISSUES**

**Family Violence:** Support for improved procedures for agencies dealing with family violence; support for improved services for the victims.

**Child Support:** Support of stricter enforcement of court-ordered child support payments.

**Child Protection:** Support of adequate staffing and resources for child protection services.

Child Health: Support access to comprehensive prenatal and child health care.

Child Care: Support of coordinated public policies and funding to ensure safe, affordable, quality child care throughout the state.

**Teen Pregnancy:** Support prevention efforts to lower the rate of teenage pregnancy.

Housing: The League believes that all people have a right to housing. The public and private sectors should work together to ensure that everyone has access to adequate, decent, affordable housing. Support an active state role in providing long-term decent and affordable housing for very low-, low-, and moderate-income households. Support of incentives to local units of government to promote a mix of housing opportunities. Support of disincentives to local units of government that do not promote a mix of housing opportunities. Support of revision of the tax system to narrow the tax disparity between rental and owner-occupied residential property; reduction of the tax rate on rental property available to very low-, low-, and moderate-income households: encouragement of maintenance of rental property available to very low-, low-, and moderateincome households.

Mental Health: Support of a comprehensive and coordinated system of programs and services for mentally ill adults and emotionally disturbed children and adolescents (hereafter referred to as "persons with mental illness"). Priority should be given to persons with serious and persistent mental illness and/or acute mental illness. Minnesota public policy and funding should sustain an array of community-based services that are available and accessible to persons with mental illness. Administration of that policy should provide clients with appropriate and adequate services.

**Violence Prevention:** Support for violence prevention programs in Minnesota.

Alcohol and Tobacco Use: Support statutes, ordinances, enforcement efforts and public funding designed to promote chemical health and reduce illegal use of alcohol and tobacco.

Support educational programs to improve chemical health and prevent illegal use of tobacco and alcohol starting in elementary school and continuing in middle and high school.

Immigration: Support incorporating immigrants into our communities by providing access to education, by endorsing the development of secure identification documents, and by respecting the right of law enforcement personnel to perform their duties without the burden of interpreting federal immigration policies. Oppose residents with legal immigrant status running for local office

### Program Adopted by League of Women Voters of the United States

### I. REPRESENTATIVE GOVERNMENT

Promote an open governmental system that is representative, accountable, and responsive; that

has a fair and adequate fiscal basis; that protects individual liberties established by the Constitution; that assures opportunities for citizen participation in government decision making; and that preserves public health and safety through gun control measures.

### Citizen Rights

Citizen's Right to Know/Citizen Participation:
Protect the citizen's right to know and facilitate citizen participation in government decision making.

### **Individual Liberties**

Oppose major threats to basic constitutional rights.

Public Policy on Reproductive Choices
Protect the constitutional right of privacy of the individual to make reproductive choices.

### Congress and the Presidency

**Congress:** Support responsive legislative processes characterized by accountability, representativeness, decision-making capability and effective performance.

**The Presidency:** Promote a dynamic balance of power between the executive and legislative branches within the framework set by the Constitution.

## DC Self-Government and Full Voting Representation

Secure for the citizens of the District of Columbia the rights of self-government and representation in both houses of Congress.

### **Election Process**

**Apportionment:** Support apportionment of congressional districts and elected legislative bodies at all levels of government based substantially on population.

Campaign Finance: Improve methods of financing political campaigns in order to ensure the public's right to know, combat corruption and undue influence, enable candidates to compete more equitably for public office and promote citizen participation in the political process.

**Election of the President:** Promote the election of the President and Vice-president by direct popular vote and work to abolish the Electoral College; support uniform national voting qualifications and procedures for presidential elections.

### **Fiscal Policy**

Support adequate and flexible funding of federal government programs through an equitable tax system that is progressive overall and that relies primarily on a broad-based income tax; promote responsible deficit policies; support a federal role in providing mandatory, universal, old-age, survivors, disability and health insurance.

### **Gun Control**

Protect the health and safety of citizens through limiting the accessibility and regulating the ownership of handguns and semi-automatic weapons.

### **Voting Rights**

Protect the right of all citizens to vote; encourage all citizens to vote.

### II. INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

Promote peace in an interdependent world by cooperating with other nations, strengthening international organizations, fostering long-term development, negotiating arms control measures and encouraging the successful resolution of conflicts through nonmilitary means.

### **Arms Control**

Reduce the risk of war through support of arms control measures.

### Military Policy and Defense Spending

Work to limit reliance on military force; examine defense spending in the context of total national needs.

### Trade

Support systematic reduction of tariff and nontariff trade barriers and support broad long-range presidential authority to negotiate trade agreements.

### **United Nations**

Support a strong, effective United Nations and its efforts to promote world peace and security, and meet the social, economic and humanitarian needs of the world's people.

### U.S. Relations with Developing Countries

Promote US policies that meet long-term social and economic needs of developing countries.

### III. NATURAL RESOURCES

Promote an environment beneficial to life through the protection and wise management of natural resources in the public interest by recognizing the interrelationships of air quality, energy, land use, waste management and water resources.

### Resource Management

Promote resource conservation, stewardship and longrange planning with the responsibility for managing natural resources shared by all levels of government.

### **Environmental Protection and Pollution Control**

Preserve the physical, chemical and biological integrity of the ecosystem, with the maximum protection of the public health and environment.

### **Public Participation**

Promote public understanding and participation in decision making as essential elements of responsible and responsive management of our natural resources.

### **Agricultural Policy**

Promote adequate supplies of food and fiber at reasonable prices to consumers and support economically viable farms, environmentally sound farm practices and increased reliance on the free market.

### IV. SOCIAL POLICY

Promote social and economic justice, secure equal rights for all, achieve universal health care coverage at reasonable cost, promote the well being of children, and combat discrimination, poverty and violence.

### Child Care

Support programs, services and policies at all levels of government to expand the supply of affordable, quality child care for all who need it.

### Early Intervention for Children at Risk

Support policies and programs that promote the well being, development and safety of all children.

### **Equality of Opportunity**

Support equal access to education, employment and housing. Support ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment and efforts to bring laws into compliance with the goals of the ERA.

### **Health Care**

Promote a health care system for the United States that provides access to a basic level of care for all US residents and controls health care costs.

### Meeting Basic Human Needs

Support programs and policies to prevent or reduce poverty and to promote self-sufficiency for individuals and families.

### **Gun Control**

Protect the health and safety of citizens through limiting the accessibility and regulating the ownership of handguns and semi-automatic weapons.

### **Urban Policy**

Promote the economic health of cities and improve the quality of urban life.

### **Violence Prevention**

Support violence prevention programs in all communities.

Whatever the issue, the League believes that government policy, programs and performance must meet these criteria:

- competent personnel with clear responsibilities;
- coordination among agencies and levels of government;
- adequate financing;
- effective enforcement:
- well defined channels for citizen input and review.

### CRIMINAL JUSTICE

### **JUDICIARY**

LWVMN Position: Support of a judicial system with the capacity to assure a speedy trial and equal justice for all.

### **Details**

Support of:

- administrative reforms that expedite justice:
   establishment of a unified court system, an intermediate
   appellate court, and procedures to strengthen and
   streamline judicial administration; additional staff for
   prosecution, public defenders and legal services when
   such needs are established; statewide guidelines on
   bail-fixing process; standardization of forms and
   procedures; use of technology in administration; use of
   juries in civil cases only by request.
- methods to improve judicial quality: a nonpartisan selection with a commission to propose names for all appointments to the bench; mandatory training for all judges; adequate salary increases for judges and related revision of retirement benefits.
- procedural reforms that ensure individual rights and access to due process of law: reform of bail process to recognize methods other than monetary to ensure appearance of accused at trial; strict guarantees to ensure protection of the defendant and society in the use of plea bargaining; sentencing alternatives; methods to reduce disparity in sentencing; no-fault divorce procedure using irremediable differences as grounds for dissolution; guarantees to witnesses in grand jury proceedings re: counsel in proceedings, availability of information to defense counsel and restrictions on waiving immunity in later trials; retention of age 18 for persons under jurisdiction of juvenile court; mandatory first appearance in juvenile court for all persons under jurisdiction of such court; requirement for formal transcript of commitment hearings with a rule or regulation protecting privacy of such records.
- the development of community alternatives as an adjunct to the judicial system: alternatives for

sentencing; alternatives for handling behavior now defined as "status offenses" and "social (or victimless) crimes." (1973)

### CORRECTIONS

LWVMN Position: Support of a correctional system responsive to the needs of the individual offender and of society. Support of sentencing decisions based on circumstances in relation to the crime, the offender and the effect on public safety, made by the judge within legislative guidelines.

### **Adult Corrections Position Details**

Support of:

- correctional options which will protect society from the offender.
- provision for a continuum of correctional options available according to the needs of the individual offender. The continuum should range from maximum security to facilities and services in the community.
- treatment and rehabilitative programs for all offenders. Among the programs should be those of mental health, education, job preparation, employment assistance and counseling. There should be appropriate incentives to encourage offender participation in programs.
- recognition of the offender as an individual with basic human rights commensurate with constitutional rights except as necessary for the protection of offenders and society. These rights include, but are not limited to, healthful conditions and due process.
- ongoing programs of evaluation and research as an aid in setting program priorities. Included within the scope of the program are need identification, data collection and retrievability, and the use of scientific methods in designing the evaluation plan.
- education programs aimed at increasing citizen knowledge and awareness of all facets of corrections.
- up-to-date personnel procedures including, but not limited to, training, compensations plans, grievance procedures. (1975)

### **History of State Action**

In 2000 LWVMN submitted written testimony to the Senate Crime Prevention Committee in support of a statewide integrated criminal justice information system. The bill to provide for sharing information between agencies was signed into law.

### **Juvenile Justice Position Details**

### Support of:

- a program of evaluation of the juvenile justice system in Minnesota.
- continual evaluation of all existing programs for juveniles and their families funded and/or used by public agencies.
- the availability of a complete continuum of services for troubled, delinquent, abused and neglected youth and their families. This includes quality community-based corrections in all geographic areas as an alternative to the traditional institutional setting in an attempt to assure the most successful rehabilitation and prevent further offenses. It does not deny the value of secure institutional treatment for some. We define quality as including proper supervision, standards, inspections and screening of residents.
- maximum effort directed toward finding adequate alternatives to detention, juvenile court processes and institutionalization.
- diversion of juveniles to community alternatives from the formal judicial process at all levels.
- the consideration of confidentiality in efforts to coordinate services for juveniles.
- constitutional protections for juveniles equal to those for adults, including due process of law, and protection from invasion of privacy and unwarranted removal from their families. (1975)

### **Sentencing Position Details**

### Support of:

- a presumptive sentencing model, but not indeterminate sentencing, the presumptive sentencing model to be fixed by administrative or judicial staff.
- consideration of mitigating and/or aggravating circumstances.
- the use of diversion and contracts between offenders and authorities.
- sentencing based on both the seriousness of the crime and the needs of the offender.
- · sentencing taking into consideration:
  - ⇒ the need for drug counseling
  - ⇒ whether the offender has a marketable skill
  - ⇒ academic training of the offender
  - ⇒ need for psychiatric treatment
  - ⇒ restitution when appropriate
  - ⇒ the availability of a residence and/or employment
  - ⇒ resolution of the causative situation

No consensus was reached on plea bargaining, sentence length, time off for good behavior, or determinate or legislatively-fixed models. (1976)

### SELECTION OF JUDGES

LWVMN Position: LWVMN supports the present system of selection and retention of appellate and district court judges with certain modifications. LWVMN strongly opposes allowing candidates for appellate and district judge to accept and use endorsements by political parties. (1999)

### Details

- A candidate for judge at the appellate or district court level should have at least five years experience as a practicing attorney.
- The state government should be required to publish voter information on all candidates running for judicial office.
- The governor should be required to appoint appellate and district court judges from among the nominees provided by the selection commission.
- LWVMN strongly favors retaining the incumbency designation on judicial ballots. (1999)

### **EDUCATION**

(See Social Policy section for additional positions.)

### **EOUAL OPPORTUNITY**

LWVMN Position: Support of increased state responsibility in creating equal public educational opportunities for all Minnesota children through measures to correct racial imbalance. Support equal access to education, employment and housing.

LWVMN Position: Support of policies to ensure equality of opportunity in employment, real property, public accommodations, education and other public services for all persons.

### **Details**

### Support of:

- correction of racial imbalance in the schools. The state should have the power to investigate, to set and enforce standards, and to give extra financial help to achieve these standards. (1967)
- life-long access to public education for expanded job opportunities and personal enrichment to achieve education equity for all citizens. (Convention 1983) (see Social Policy section)

### FINANCING OF EDUCATION

LWVMN Position: All Minnesota children should have equal access to a good public education. State funding for education should be at a level that makes programs of comparable substance and quality available to all. A student's access to a good education should not depend on the wealth of his or her school district.

### Details

### Support of:

- the concept of the foundation formula program (general education revenue). Any revisions in the current education financing system should support:
  - ⇒ provision of adequate funding to meet the real costs of education; (1983) until the State of Minnesota can ensure consistent and adequate funding of education throughout the state, the LWVMN supports the continuation of local excess referendum levies to raise additional money from property taxes; (1991)
  - ⇒ state funding of the following cost differences between students: pupil unit weighting, poverty, special education for various handicapping conditions, gifted and language differences (ESL and LEP); (1991)
  - ⇒ state funding of the following cost differences between school districts: scarcity, training and experience, desegregation and transportation; (1991)
  - ⇒ using the income tax as the mainstay of school funding; (1983)
  - ⇒ encouragement of financial efficiencies; (1983)
  - ⇒ requiring school districts to raise money from property taxes for building construction and debt service with local bond referendum levies. Such expenditures must be approved by the state Department of Education; (1991)
  - ⇒ allowing local districts to raise a limited amount of additional funds for supplemental programs through local levies, to maintain local choice and ensure local accountability; (1983)
  - ⇒ reorganization of school districts with extremely low enrollments; (1983)
  - ⇒ the gradual phasing out of supplemental revenue; (1991)
  - maintaining most social and recreational services now offered at schools but seek alternative funding sources for many. (1983)

### Opposition to:

- continuation of the current Minnesota private school tuition tax deduction. (1983)
- state funding of cost of living differences between districts. (1991)

### COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AND TENURE

LWVMN Position: Support of improvements in the collective bargaining and tenure laws of the state as they apply to K-12 teachers only.

### Details

### Support of:

- collective bargaining for teachers, with changes in Minnesota's collective bargaining law to:
  - require that teacher bargaining agents and school boards publish first offers and all subsequent written offers during the negotiations.
  - ⇒ require that arbitrators hearing teacher contracts know school law and procedures.
  - ⇒ allow a limited number of school board bargaining strategy sessions that are closed to the public.
- the present bargaining law provision that allows parties to negotiations in each district to determine for themselves which items they consider negotiable. If necessary, the district court would make the final decision
- the school board as the representative of the public in the negotiation process. Neither parent-community advisory committees nor representatives on the negotiation team should be required by the state.
- Tenure/Continuing Contract laws for teachers, with changes in the current state law to:
  - ⇒ require periodic review and evaluation of tenured teachers' performance, leading to remedial help when indicated,
  - ⇒ retain teacher probationary periods, but lengthen the probation period of Continuing Contract teachers. (Continuing Contract does not apply to first class cities,)
  - require school boards to consider factors in addition to order of employment when they must make staff dismissals due to reduction of positions. Such factors include recent teaching experience in the field of certification, program needs of the district, and special expertise of the individual faculty member,
- retention of state laws defining fair dismissal procedures. (1978)

LWVMN does not support extension of the right to strike.

LWVMN opposes *mandatory* negotiation of procedures for reducing staff.

#### LIBRARY FUNDING

LWVMN Position: Support for increased and restructured funding for public libraries.

#### Details

Support of:

- increased funding of Minnesota public libraries by means of a combination of substantial local funding, an increase in state funding, and a moderate increase in special-purpose federal funding. LWVMN considers the 1978 funding proportions--85% local government, 6% other local funds, 6% state, 3% federal--to be inequitable in that funding depends predominantly on the local property tax.
- substantial local funding (more than the 30% proposed by the National Commission on Libraries and Information Science (NCLIS) but less than the current 91%), in the belief that local control ensures sensitivity to local needs.
- an increased level and greater proportion of state funding for public libraries (but not to the 50% proposed by NCLIS), based on the belief that public libraries, like public schools, share significantly in the education of the state's citizens.
- an increased level and moderately increased proportion of federal funding for public libraries (but less than the 20% proposed by NCLIS).
- distribution of state and federal funds to Minnesota public library systems according to a formula based largely on population, but also taking into account square miles of area served and the inverse of assessed adjusted valuation, so as to achieve the most equitable and satisfactory distribution of funds.
- four goals of the Minnesota Long Range Plan for Library Service, ranked as follows: (1) making services accessible to all citizens; (2) fostering a system of shared resources; (3) developing multi-county regional systems; (4) establishing libraries in areas without them.
- the sharing of resources; using trained and supervised volunteers; and charging fees for time-consuming research and special materials, programs, equipment and services.

LWVMN opposes cutting services and/or hours. (1979)

#### HISTORY OF STATE ACTION

**Equal Opportunity:** In 1980 LWVMN published What's the Score in Minnesota, a project to monitor equality of opportunity for women in athletics in public schools. In 1995 and 1996 LWVMN joined several other organizations in a letter to the Legislature opposing making danceline an interscholastic sport.

In 1993 LWVMN lobbied in support of maintaining measurable standards to determine racial imbalance. LWVMN opposed the wholesale repeal of many education rules and mandates which was proposed during the 1993 session. We urged an interim review to assure that no loss of equality of opportunity resulted. We continued to support human relations training for school staff and programs for health and violence prevention. Legislative rules that we advocated retaining included gender equity in sports, and the Inclusive Educational Program Rule which requires each school district to create a plan for multicultural, gender-fair, disability-sensitive curriculum. The League was instrumental in developing the latter rule.

Finance: LWVMN opposed a limited demonstration voucher plan which could be used for private or independent schools because of our concern that use of public money for private K-12 education erodes the financial support of public education. In 1996 the LWVMN actively opposed school vouchers for K-12 education; the League believes the focus of state resources should be on continuing to improve the system that serves all children.

During the 1989 session LWVMN supported the Alliance for Commitment to Education in their proposal for school funding. We opposed shifting more of the burden for the cost of special education onto the local districts as proposed in the Governor's budget. During the Special Session called in September 1989 to consider property tax reform, LWVMN supported the increased state responsibility for school funding as a way to assure less reliance on local property wealth for school programs.

Financing education was restudied in 1991 and the consensus updated. During the 1991 session the LWVMN's goal was to support funding at an adequate level. We also supported supplemental funding to correct racial imbalance. We opposed funding alternative education in non-sectarian schools. In 1992 we supported the American Indian post-secondary grants and the school breakfast program.

The League lobbied in 1997 in support of legislation to expand programs for reading readiness. The bill required early reading instruction to be a mandatory part of curriculum for teacher candidates and provided challenge grants to schools for early intervention reading instruction. The legislation was rolled into the Omnibus Education Finance bill. The 1997 bill was vetoed by the Governor because it did not include his requested increase in tax deductions and tax credit for education expenses. The League contacted the Governor urging him to sign the bill. A special session convened in June 1997 passed a bill including tax credits and doubling deductions for private school tuition.

In 1998 LWVMN opposed a proposed voucher plan for students in K-12. The plan did not pass. The 1999 legislative session considered abolishing the Profiles of Learning . LWVMN cautioned that this would be a retreat from meaningful statewide standards. The proposal failed.

## GOVERNMENT

Promote an open governmental system that is representative, accountable, responsive; that has a fair and adequate fiscal basis; that protects individual liberties established by the Constitution; that assures opportunities for citizen participation in government decision making; that provides sound agriculture policies; and that preserves public health and safety through gun control measures.

#### CITIZEN RIGHTS

LWVUS Position: Protect the citizen's right to know and facilitate participation in government decision making. (1974, 1976)

## PUBLIC POLICY ON REPRODUCTIVE CHOICES

LWVUS Position: Protect the constitutional right of privacy of the individual to make reproductive choices. (1983)

#### HISTORY OF STATE ACTION

Citizen Rights: In 1995 the LWVMN was a member of the Information Access Policy Discussion group which sponsored legislation to make it easier to access information via the rapidly emerging cable and phone line technology.

In 1996 LWVMN was very involved in a debate to continue the dual-track airport planning process so that citizen groups could provide input to the decision process. Legislation to abort the process was successful, despite League efforts.

Public Policy on Reproductive Choice: Over the years LWVMN has worked in coalitions to monitor state developments on reproductive choice. In 1989 LWVMN became a member of the MN Alliance for Choice, encouraging local League members to help with a Choice Attitude Survey conducted by Planned Parenthood of Minnesota (PPM). More recently LWVMN has joined with PPM and MN National Abortion Rights Action League (MN NARAL) in the effort to protect reproductive choice.

During the 1990 legislative session, LWVMN focused on opposing legislation which would have made abortions illegal in Minnesota. During the 1991 session, the League worked with the Alliance for Choice to emphasize preventing unintended pregnancies and reducing the abortion rate in Minnesota as set forth in the Minnesota Women's Consortium's <a href="Prevention. Not Prohibition">Prohibition</a> campaign. This campaign was rated as an effective advocacy and educational tool.

During the 1990s the LWVMN focused on opposing the multiple efforts to restrict access to abortions or to make them illegal, and to increase funding for the full range of family planning services for low-income people. In 1993 the League worked to pass the "health clinic access bill" assuring the right of unimpeded approach and departure from abortion clinics.

Our pro-choice coalitions were successful in either derailing antichoice legislation or in convincing pro-choice governors to veto the bills that got through. In 1995, for example, the "Woman's Right to Know" was deleted from the Welfare Reform Bill.

Anti-choice efforts increased over the decade. With an anti-choice governor and anti-choice majorities in both houses, the challenge was to get the anti-choice forces to agree that preventing unwanted pregnancies was the best way to reduce the number of abortions. This met with mixed success. The "Woman's Right to Know" bill passed in 2003 and was signed into law, but state-subsidized family planning was saved with Gov. Pawlenty's help. The "Super Gag Rule" failed to get a hearing in either house, anti-choice Constitutional amendments were foiled for the moment, and the effort to force a dual-track sex education program also failed. This last item would have forced the state to spend tax dollars for religious-based, just-say-no sex ed programs. Many of these bills will return in the 2004 session, unfortunately.

#### **ELECTION LAWS**

LWVUS Position: Promote the election of the President and Vice-president by direct popular vote and abolish the electoral college; support uniform national voting qualifications and procedures for presidential elections. (1970, 1976)

LWVMN Position: Support of improvements in election laws regulating election procedures, voting and school district elections.

#### **Details**

Support of:

- centralized responsibility in the state government for achieving uniform election procedures and for training election officials. (1961)
- extension of mandatory voter registration prior to election day to cover more voters through inclusion of more municipalities through county-wide registration, or through state-wide registration. (1961)
- extension of election laws to cover school district elections, including uniform, mandatory voter registration. (1972)
- rotation of names of candidates for the same office on ballots. (1972)

## HISTORY OF STATE ACTION

Election Laws In 1995 the League was asked to provide testimony on elections to the Election Division of the House General Legislation, Veterans Affairs and Elections Committee. The League testified on what is right and wrong with the current election process and on our general position on elections and the campaign process. The Growe Commission, an 18-member bipartisan commission of which LWVMN President, Kay Erickson, was a member, published its report on Electoral Reform.

During the 1995 session the League testified in support of appropriating money to produce and mail 3 voter guides: to the caucus, to the primary and to the general election. The League assured the legislators that such guides can be produced in a non-partisan way, in a manner similar to our production of voter guides, and offered to produce the guides. Funding was not forthcoming.

In 1996 the LWVMN supported an unsuccessful attempt to authorize mail ballots in special elections for the increased accessibility to the voting process which it provides in elections with traditionally low voter turnout.

In 2002 and again in 2003, LWVMN supported a bill to allow election judge appointing authorities to appoint individuals who are not affiliated with a major political party. Despite wide support, the bill failed in both sessions.

The 2001 Help America Vote Act (HAVA), passed by the U.S. Congress after active support by LWVUS, authorizes and finances statewide improvements in voter access by setting standards for access for the disabled, provisional voting, improved registration procedures and purchase of improved voting machines. LWVMN representatives served on a task force advisory to the Secretary of State for implementation in Minnesota.

School District Election Laws: League members reached consensus in 1972 and lobbied for a bill which passed in 1973, simplifying absentee balloting, requiring rotation of candidates' names on non-partisan ballots, and forbidding election day campaigning or solicitation of votes within 100 feet of a polling place.

Presidential Primary: In 1991 the League supported adding a presidential primary in addition to caucuses and supported a bill to clarify issues of candidate withdrawal to help elections be more "voter friendly." A primary was held in 1992, with League support and involvement at the polls. However, due to an insufficient voter turnout a primary was not held in 1996.

Term Limits: LWVUS Convention 1992 adopted a motion "to amend the Government position of the LWVUS national program to allow state and local Leagues to use national positions and principles to take action against term limits for state or local officeholders." At the January 1993 Board meeting, LWVMN voted to oppose term limits for the legislative branch of Minnesota state government. LWVMN in 1994 established an "opposition to legislative term limits fund" and worked in coalition with such organizations as Common Cause, AFL-CIO, League of Minnesota Cities and MEA to successfully oppose the placement of a term limits measure on the ballot.

In 1995 the League voiced its strong opposition to both national and state efforts to adopt term limits legislation. As an alternative to term limits, the League supported successful legislation to rotate committee chairs. Limiting the number of years a member can be chair allows new ideas.

Permanent Absentee Voter Status: During the 1990 session LWVMN supported the enactment of a bill establishing permanent absentee voter status for eligible voters who are permanently unable to go to the polling place on election day due to illness or disability.

#### CAMPAIGN PRACTICES

LWVUS Position: Action to improve methods of financing political campaigns in order to ensure the public's right to know, combat corruption and undue influence, enable candidates to compete more equitably for public office and promote citizen participation in the political process. (1973)

LWVMN Position: Support of improvements in election laws regulating campaign practices.

#### **Details**

Support of:

- the public's right to comprehensive disclosure of all political campaign contributions and expenditures: mandatory, timely, uniform and complete reports of campaign contributions and expenditures should be made to a central authority responsible for disseminating such information to the public; responsibility for reporting contributions to the candidate's campaign and for reporting expenditures by the candidate and those made on the candidate's behalf rests squarely on the candidate; penalties should be stringent enough to ensure compliance by candidates. (1961)
- judicious use of public resources to finance campaigns. (1972)
- reduction of the amount of money spent on campaigns. (1972)

## HISTORY OF STATE ACTION

LWVMN has been active on this subject since 1961.

LWVMN has supported efforts to limit fundraising events for legislators during sessions each year since 1985. The 1990 Legislature enacted a bill prohibiting principal campaign committees and "friends of" committees from holding fund-raisers during a regular legislative session.

During the 1995 session LWVMN lobbied hard to keep the current ethics law, and in the end was successful. There were several attempts to weaken the laws passed the previous year. In particular an attempt to create a loophole was monitored by League lobbyists.

The 1999 legislative session saw a renewed effort to relax the gift ban with other campaign finance changes. LWVMN testified in opposition and the measures failed to get out of conference committee. LWVMN supported a proposed measure to prohibit lobbying by former legislators for one year after leaving public office. The measure failed.

The League continues to work to make the federal election process more open and equitable. Recent national action has focused on support for legislation mandating public financing for congressional elections and placing limits on the size of donations that political action committees can give to candidates. Leagues continue to apply the position in working for campaign reform measures at the state and local levels.

In 1993 LWVMN supported action by the legislature to improve campaign finance laws in Minnesota. Working with a coalition formed by Common Cause, a reform measure passed which decreased financing from political action committees, lobbyists and large donors for candidates for state office and encouraged increased participation by small donors and the general public. The measure also eliminated abuses of the system by prohibiting "friends of" committees, the transfer of funds between candidates, disallowed public subsidy for unopposed candidates and prohibited caucus fund-raisers during legislative session.

Recognizing the incumbent advantage, first-time candidates for state office are permitted to increase their spending limit by 10%. For the first time contribution limits were placed on candidates for local office.

To provide funding for these changes, more emphasis was placed on public financing for state-office candidates. The check-off system remains with an additional state appropriation. Small contributors may receive a one-time reimbursement from the state for a contribution to a candidate running for state office.

In 1996, in conjunction with Common Cause, local leagues lobbied US representatives in support of a comprehensive campaign finance reform bill in the House of Representatives: voluntary spending limits: reduced cost ways for candidates to communicate with the public; controls on "soft-money" contributions'; limits on large individual contributions; and cuts in the amount of PAC donations.

The League issued a statement in 1997 regarding our position on campaign finance reform measures considered in Congress.

LWVMNEF moderated a town meeting on campaign finance (attended by Senator Wellstone, Representatives Gutknecht, Ramstad, Luther and Vento), at which the League was able to present our position directly to some of our elected officials.

At the state level, LWVMN lobbied against the relaxation of a gift ban included in campaign reform legislation passed in 1994. We urged legislators to avoid the perception of undue influence at a time when the public is asking for continued reform.

In 2000 legislation was introduced in both houses that would provide candidates with the option of full public financing. The bill also placed limits on the size of contributions individuals and PACs can give to political parties and legislative caucuses. The bill did not reach either floor for a vote. In 2001 LWVMN joined the FACE (Fair and Clean Elections) Coalition to promote the bill introduced in 2000. Vigorous advocacy was presented in both houses and there were press conferences, letters to legislators, committee testimony. The League remains a co-sponsor of the FACE Coalition.

## OPEN MEETINGS AND OPEN RECORDS

LWVUS Position: Governmental bodies (should) protect the citizens' right to know by giving adequate notice of proposed actions, holding open meetings and making public records accessible. (Principles, 1974)

#### HISTORY OF STATE ACTION

**Open Meetings:** The 1990 legislature passed a bill which applies the requirements of the open meeting law to the Legislature. (Caucuses of members from the same party are excluded.)

**Open Records:** LWVMN continues to monitor all bills dealing with the Data Privacy Act. The League has resisted attempts to facilitate the classification of materials since such classification impedes the public's right to know.

#### ORGANIZATION OF GOVERNMENT

LWVUS Position: Action to support responsive legislative processes characterized by accountability, representativeness, decision-making capability and effective performance. (1972) Action to promote a dynamic balance of power between the executive and legislative branches within the framework set by the Constitution. (1976) Action to support reapportionment of congressional and elected legislative bodies at all levels of government based substantially on population. (1966, 1972)

LWVMN Position: Support of improved structure and procedures for the Minnesota Legislature and executive branch; support of an improved process for amending the Minnesota Constitution; support of timely redistricting based substantially on population of congressional districts and of all elected state and local governmental bodies. Opposition to a unicameral state legislature.

#### Details

Support of:

- legislative reform through improved procedures for providing information, adequate research assistance, no increase in size (reduction in size is desirable), realistic compensation for legislators, improved organization of committees, legislative sessions of adequate length, and allowing the Legislature to call itself into special session. The Legislature should meet annually and should have the power to determine the time of meeting and length of session and should have the power to recess. (1955, 1968)
- a post-auditor appointed by and directly responsible to the Legislature. (1955)
- changes in executive structure characterized by clear lines of authority and responsibility, elimination of duplication and overlapping of agencies, a structure of organization designed to focus on current and emerging problems, and a system of standard nomenclature. (1970)
- measures to change the process of amending the state Constitution by retaining a simple majority vote by the Legislature in proposing an amendment and requiring a simple majority of those voting on the question for ratification. (1947, 1962)
- regular and equitable reapportionment, with definite procedures established to ensure prompt redistricting by the Legislature or by a reapportionment commission; support of procedures which provide for:
  - compact, contiguous districts giving advantage to no particular person or group,
  - public accessibility to legislative or commission deliberations and action,
  - ⇒ prompt judicial review. (1979)

### Opposition to:

⇒ Unicameral legislature. (1999)

## III. INITIATIVE, REFERENDUM AND RECALL

LWVMN Position: Support of the continuation of legislative initiative and compulsory voter referendum on constitutional amendments; opposition to most forms of voter initiative and referendum on statutes; opposition to recall by voters of members of the Legislature and state constitutional officers; support of strict procedural limits on any process of initiative, referendum or recall.

#### Details

### Support of:

- the continued initiation of constitutional amendments by the legislative branch; opposition to all forms of voter initiative of such amendments (direct, indirect or advisory).
- the continuation of compulsory voter referenda on constitutional amendments.
- strict procedural limits on any form of initiative, referendum or recall considered or adopted in Minnesota, including restrictions on:
  - ⇒ time span for collecting signatures,
  - eligibility requirements for persons signing and collecting petitions,
  - percentage of signatures required, geographic distribution of signers, and verification of signatures,
  - ⇒ size of vote required for passage,
  - procedure for repeal or amendment of a successful initiative or referendum.
  - ⇒ contributions to and spending for ballot issue campaigns. (1980)

### Opposition to:

- direct initiative and advisory initiative on statutes; no agreement on indirect initiative on statutes.
- optional and compulsory referenda on statutes; no agreement on petition referenda on statutes.
- Voter recall of members of the legislature and state constitutional officers, no agreement on recall of judges or appointed officials.

### HISTORY OF STATE ACTION

Redistricting: During the 1991 session, LWVMN worked with a coalition to support timely redistricting of the state legislature. As in previous redistricting efforts the legislative process was contentious and the resulting plan controversial. A final plan was mandated by the court, thus reinforcing the need for a bipartisan redistricting commission. In 2001 the House, Senate and a Governor's advisory commission presented widely different plans. No compromise was reached and again a court plan was adopted.

Initiative, Referendum and Recall: In the 1999 session a constitutional amendment to establish Initiative and Referendum for both statutes and constitutional amendments passed the House but died in the Senate. LWVMN joined a coalition to defeat the amendment.

The League Action Committee and the State Board reiterated its 1979 position against recall. A bill, including recall enabling legislation, passed during the 1996 session, to place on the November ballot a question to include recall as part of the constitution. The amendment passed but LWVMN raised many procedural questions both before and after the passage.

Unicameral Legislature: In 2000 a strong effort was put forward to introduce a constitutional amendment to establish a unicameral legislature. LWVMN opposed it by testifying before committees, sending letters to legislators who were members of key committees, issuing action alerts and participating in a rally at the Capitol. The bill did not pass.

In 2002 LWVMN testified against a renewed effort to establish a unicameral legislature. The effort failed.

#### IV. FINANCING STATE GOVERNMENT

LWVMN Position: Support of a balanced and diversified revenue system that is equitable, competitive with other states, progressive and reliable. Support of long-term financial management, projections and a budget reserve. (1995)

- a balanced and diversified revenue system which relies on a combination of broad-based taxes and user fees.
- the following criteria for evaluating individual revenue sources and the overall revenue system:
  - ⇒ Competitiveness: Allows Minnesota to compete with other states and nations as a location of economic activity, recognizing that the revenue system is only one of many factors involved in location choice and that the level and effectiveness of public services affects competitiveness,
  - ⇒ Efficiency: Maintains a reasonable relationship between administration and compliance costs and the amount of revenue generated,
  - ⇒ Equity: Imposes a similar revenue burden on taxpayers in like circumstances,
  - ⇒ Progressivity: Requires that those with a greater ability pay a larger percentage of their income in taxes.
  - ⇒ Reliability: Provides a stable source of revenue.
  - ⇒ Responsiveness: Adjusts to changes in economic conditions and reflects long term growth,
  - ⇒ Simplicity: Is understandable to the taxpayer.
- a progressive individual income tax with a graduated rate schedule.
- a broad-based retail sales tax with exemptions for essential items to reduce the impact on low-income persons.
- the use of an equitable property tax as the primary source of financing for services provided by local

governments and a partial source of financing education (see the Financing Education position.).

- a corporation franchise tax which is competitive with other states providing a comparable level of public services. The LWVMN supports a corporation franchise tax which equitably taxes all corporations earning profits from their business activities within the state.
- the use of other sources of revenue, such as user fees and special assessments, for funding specific activities and projects. These charges should be assessed with a sensitivity to the criteria established to judge the overall revenue system.
- achieving social policy goals through open and visible expenditures rather than by granting deductions, exclusions and credits. If deductions, exclusions and credits are granted, they should be:
  - Evaluated on the basis of their compliance with the criteria established to judge the overall revenue system;
  - Determined to be the most cost-effective means of achieving the intended purpose;
  - 3. Reviewed periodically to justify continuance.
- the distribution of state-collected revenues to local governments based upon the following principles:
  - ⇒ It is appropriate for state and local governments to share in the cost of services provided by local governments that benefit all Minnesotans,
  - ⇒ If necessary, state funding may be used to assure that local community services are available on an equitable basis,
  - The state should not impose statutory limits on local governments' ability to raise and spend revenue for local community services,
  - ⇒ Programs which distribute state-collected revenues to local governments should enhance the equity, progressivity and efficiency of the overall revenue system,
  - ⇒ Once enacted, promised distributions of statecollected revenues to local governments should be a reliable source of revenue to local governmental units.
- the principle that state legislation mandating local governments to provide specific services should identify adequate and appropriate revenue sources.
- long-term financial management of all state government funds.
- consideration of long-term projections of revenue and expenditures when making budget decisions.
- an adequate budget reserve, established during good economic times, to be used in recession years to sustain expenditures for necessary services.

#### HISTORY OF STATE ACTION

Since the mid '50s the LWVMN has studied the financing of state and local governments. Early studies focused on the property tax, resulting in LWVMN support of property tax reform.

In the October 1989 Special Session, the Legislature enacted a property tax reform bill which began to restructure state-local finances. The goal was for the state to fund state-mandated programs and for property tax to support local programs. For example, starting in 1991, the state funded income maintenance programs formerly paid for by state and local money. In 1990 the state also assumed district court administration and certain other court costs. Other features of the bill were changes in property tax rates, a decrease in the number of rates, and more detailed property tax statements. LWVMN supported the bill's effort to break the link between local property tax and state mandated services.

In 1999 the Legislature had to determine what to do with large surpluses. LWVMN lobbied the legislative leadership and the Governor to retain a healthy reserve and invest in long-range programs for Minnesota citizens rather than returning all the surpluses to the taxpayers. LWVMN also lobbied to use the one-time tobacco lawsuit funds for tobacco cessation and medical programs. In 2001 the State again enjoyed huge surpluses and a significant Tax Reform Bill was passed which will reduce the local property tax levies for education. The state will assume more educational costs but local governments will lose state grants. The aim is to tie taxes more exactly to the controlling arm of government.

In 2003 facing unparalleled deficits and determined to enact "no new taxes," the state budget was slashed across the board for 2003 and the 2004-05 budget. LWVMN lobbied for selective tax increases to blunt the effect of spending cuts to programs especially beneficial to women, children and the most vulnerable. Support for this position increased during the session but "no new taxes" won the day.

## **GOVERNMENT SPENDING**

## I. Broad Goals

The League of Women Voters of Minnesota (LWVMN) believes long-term vision as well as immediate concerns should guide state spending decisions. The League strongly supports the following broad goals: (by priority)

- Provide high-quality K-12 educational opportunities for Minnesotans,
- Provide for a basic level of health and human services for all Minnesotans.
- 3. Protect the state's natural environment,
- 4. Encourage economic self-sufficiency,
- 5. Provide for the public safety,
- Provide high-quality post-secondary educational opportunities for Minnesotans, and
- Preserve the state's open spaces (i.e., parks, state buildings).

LWVMN also supports the following goals:

 Ensure that all Minnesotans receive a basic level of local public services without regard to individual or community wealth,

- Maintain a viable state-wide transportation system, including public transit.
- Create a business climate that will allow MN businesses to compete nationally and internationally and,
- 4. Ensure timely resolution of court cases.

LWVMN does not support the goal of limiting state and local expenditures to a legislated percent of personal incomes.

#### **Spending Priorities**

LWVMN believes that the highest priority areas for state spending are the following:

- 1. K-12 (regular) education
- 2. Health Care
- 3. Environmental protection

When considering specific proposals requiring choices, the League believes that some components of state spending should be given higher priority than others.

### **Relative Priority**

Regular education over vocational education.

Vocational education over special education.

Special education over community education and recreation.

Health care and family support over nursing home care. Environmental protection over parks and recreation. Roads and transit over highway patrol.

Job-related economic security over business incentives.

Property tax relief related to income over Homestead and .

Agricultural Credit Aid (HACA).

HACA over Local Government Aid.

The court system and law enforcement over correctional Institutions.

## III. Criteria for Limiting Spending

When the state finds it necessary to limit spending, LWVMN supports use of the following criteria (by priority):

- State subsidies for sports teams, convention centers, and similar projects should be among the first items to be curtailed.
- Maintenance of existing infrastructure should take precedence over expenditures to increase the infrastructure,
- Property tax relief programs should be directed to those with lower household incomes,
- Services should be provided first to the most needy citizens.
- Eligibility guidelines for public services should be adjusted to increase individual responsibility.

The League opposes the following:

 Making across-the-board cuts first, as a way to allocate funds,

- Placing more reliance on non-government ,organizations (such as churches and not-for-profit organizations) to deliver services,
- Reducing state funding for higher education and increasing reliance on tuition,
- Allowing services for the elderly to take precedence over those for children.

## IV. Efficiency

The League supports enhancing efficiency and cost effectiveness in the provision of quality government services. To this end, the League strongly supports:

- Emphasizing prevention over treatment of problems,
- 2. Encouraging inter-governmental cooperation.

The League also supports:

- Providing funds/grants to individuals to allow them to select providers of child-care services and housing assistance.
- Giving government employees more flexibility and incentives to manage the way they do their jobs
- Using performance-based budgeting to emphasize outcomes over inputs and to hold government officials responsible for results,
- 4. Encouraging competition (private-private, public-private and public-public) to enhance efficiency.

The League of Women Voters of Minnesota does not support providing funds/grants to individuals to allow them to select providers for K-12 education.

## VI. FIREARMS

LWVUS Position: Protect the health and safety of citizens through limiting the accessibility and regulating the ownership of handguns and semi-automatic assault weapons, and support the allocation of resources to better regulate and monitor gun dealers. (1990)

LWVMN Position: Action to support restrictions on the sale, possession and use of firearms by private parties in the state of Minnesota. (1990)

#### **Details**

- licensing of long guns, hand guns and assault weapons.
- registration of long guns, hand guns and assault weapons.
- a waiting period for the purchase of long guns, hand guns and assault weapons.
- a waiting period as preferable to an instant computer background check.
- a ban on the manufacture, sale and importation of assault weapons and assault weapon parts.

- mandatory firearm safety training before the purchase of a firearm.
- the concept of gun owner liability when others are harmed due to the owner's negligence.
- stiffer and/or mandatory penalties for people who commit crimes with firearms.
- the ability of local municipalities to regulate ownership and possession of firearms and ammunition more strictly than state law allows.

#### Opposition to:

 an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Minnesota granting an individual the right to bear arms

LWVMN does not support or oppose an instant computer background check.

#### HISTORY OF STATE ACTION

Following the adoption of the LWVMN position in 1990, LWVMN members played a key role at the LWVUS Convention in the adoption of a gun control position through concurrence with the Illinois position.

In January 1991, LWVMN joined "Citizens for a Safer Minnesota," a coalition of organizations and individuals dedicated to: supporting legislation regulating availability of military assault weapons and handguns; educating Minnesotans about the causes of and solutions for gun-related violence; promoting awareness that gun-related violence is not just a crime issue, but also affects public safety, child protection, health and the educational climate as well.

The Coalition lobbied successfully in 1992 for legislation that would prohibit handgun permits from being granted to persons with a history of domestic assault; and in 1993, for the Omnibus Crime Bill which enacted a statewide ban on carrying rifles in a public place, a ban on kits that would convert semi-automatics to full machine guns, and legislation that would permit municipalities to regulate gun shops through zoning laws. The Child Accident Protection Bill passed; this requires adults to store loaded weapons away from children and enhances penalties for guns in schools and drive-by shootings.

The League, as part of Citizens for a Safer Minnesota, lobbied unsuccessfully in 1996 to raise the age from 14 to 18 as the threshold for adults to store loaded weapons away from children. In 1993 LWVMN successfully lobbied members of Congress for passage of the Brady Bill after several years of effort. In 1995, the League lobbied representatives to stop the repeal of the Brady Bill. League lobbyists were active in opposition to a proposal to place a "Right to Bear Arms" amendment on the ballot.

From 1996 to 2000, the League continued to lobby successfully against the expanded right to carry a loaded handgun in public and bills that would limit local zoning of gun shops.

In 2000, the gun violence prevention efforts by the LWVMN and Citizens for a Safer Minnesota were strengthened by the addition of the Minnesota Million Mom March, which was founded by League members. This coalition was able to keep "carry conceal" legislation from passing until April 28, 2003, when the " Carry Conceal Weapons" bill, attached to a non-germane bill in the MN House, passed. The MN Senate bypassed the committee process and passed the "Conceal Carry Weapons" portion of the bill. A

"Repeal Conceal" effort (petitions and lawsuits) was immediately supported by the League and it's coalition members beginning May 28, 2003---the day the bill became law.

#### VII. NATURAL RESOURCES

Promote an environment beneficial to life through the protection and wise management of natural resources in the public interest by recognizing the interrelationships of air quality, energy, land use, waste management and water resources.

LWVUS Position: The League of Women Voters of the United States believes that natural resources should be managed as interrelated parts of life-supporting ecosystems. Resources should be conserved and protected to assure their future availability. Pollution of these resources should be controlled in order to preserve the physical, chemical and biological integrity of ecosystems and to protect public health. (1986)

#### WATER RESOURCES

LWVMN Position: Support of a state role in the preservation and management of Minnesota's water resources through protection, allocation, conservation, pricing and interbasin transfer policies protective of Minnesota's current and future needs. (1985)

#### **Details**

- state water policies which emphasize planning for supply, use and quality, and effective coordination of agencies and levels of government with responsibility for water resources. Support for statewide, comprehensive planning to protect both ground and surface water. Support for policies which:
  - ⇒ recognize regional differences in supply and use.
  - integrate both ground and surface water management,
  - ⇒ integrate quality and quantity management.
  - provide for research on hydrogeology and best use of water resources,
  - ⇒ consider future use (of water resources),
  - promote data acquisition to characterize quality and quantity,
  - provide for maintenance and repair of water facilities.
  - ⇒ distinguish between withdrawal and consumption.
- a state water conservation plan which emphasizes preservation and efficient use of water resources. The plan should, at a minimum:
  - ⇒ continue to develop the protected stream flow and aquifer-safe yield programs,
  - ⇒ provide for education and technical assistance,

- ⇒ require specific conservation plans from those who propose interbasin transfers,
- ⇒ provide incentives for recycling and reuse.
- water-pricing policies which include full costs of production and delivery in water prices. Support for rate structures which encourage conservation. Support for user fees or taxes to cover costs in state water management.
- interbasin transfers (both intrastate and interstate) only if water remaining in the basin would be sufficient for present, future and instream needs. Decisions to transfer water should consider environmental effects, future water needs of basin of origin and conservation practices of the receiving basin.
- clear legislative definition of the decision-making process for interstate and interbasin transfers. This process should include at least an advisory role for local governments affected by the transfer and a regulatory role for state government. Each of the following options should be considered:
  - Minnesota legislation governing interbasin transfers.
  - ⇒ uniform legislation among Great Lakes states,
  - ⇒ federal legislation requiring basin-of-origin state approval,
  - interstate compacts with authority for transfer decisions,
  - ⇒ increased state and province participation in International Joint Commission procedures.

### AIR QUALITY

**LWVMN Position:** Support measures to reduce air pollution from vehicular and stationary sources.

## SOLID WASTE

LWVMN Position: Support of measures to reduce generation of solid waste and ensure safe treatment, storage and disposal of all wastes.

#### **Details**

#### Support of:

- state government's taking measures to reduce the generation of municipal solid waste through research and development of alternatives to sanitary landfills.
- measures to discourage the use of nonreturnable beverage containers.
- flexibility in the establishment and enforcement of standards in solid waste management to allow the state to adopt more stringent standards than federal standards. (1973)

### LAND USE

LWVMN Position: Support of an overall land use plan with maximum cooperation and implementation at the regional and local level, with state help in developing and exercising land use management, with opportunity for maximum local decision making, and with regional planning and regulation for matters of more than local concern.

#### Details

Support of a state plan that should:

- be tied closely to integrated planning (e.g., human services, highways).
- be coordinated with plans and policies of local and regional agencies.
- require local government to exercise at least a minimum level of planning and control.
- recognize fragile or historic land, renewable resource lands, and natural hazard lands as critical areas and subject them to at least minimum control.
- require impact statements of major public and private development.
- provide financial aid for research, technical assistance and state data for local and regional governmental units.
- provide authority to local and regional governmental units to exercise innovative planning and regulatory techniques such as land banking, planned unit development, transfer of development rights, timed development ordinances
- provide for an appeals board to arbitrate conflicts among governmental bodies and between citizens and governmental bodies. (1975)

### AGRICULTURE

LWVUS Position: Promote adequate supplies of food and fiber at reasonable prices to consumers and support economically viable farms, environmentally sound farm practices and increased reliance on the free market.

LWVMN Position: Support of a system of sustainable agricultural production which provides safe, healthful food and which preserves and protects the state's human and natural agricultural resources and enhances the environment; research and technical assistance in farming practices and rural economies that improve the economic viability of family farms, environmental health, and the quality of life of family farmers and their communities.

#### **Details**

## Support of:

- · family-owned, moderate- and small-sized farms.
- research directed to moderate- and small-sized farm operations.
- beginning farmers.
- innovative practices and crops for moderate- and smallsized farms.
- access to markets for all producers.
- providing crisis supports based on need (crisis understood to be an event beyond the farmer's control such as a natural disaster).
- monitoring contracts for the protection of farmers.
- ensuring that corporate farms be held liable for their share of losses, environmental damage, public health hazards, etc.
- · incentives for sustainable farming practices.
- incentives for contributions to clean water and air, healthy soil and conservation of wildlife.
- · incentives for the preservation of agricultural land.
- shared liability for environmental damage (caused by agriculture) between farmers and businesses under contract.
- stricter standards for animal confinement operations (based on concerns for both animals and human health as well as ethical issues relating to the treatment of animals).

In order to promote the stability of rural communities, support of:

- community and regional planning.
- education (retraining, farm management, marketing, etc.).

- infrastructure.
- · livable wages for workers.
- crisis assistance.
- development of leadership skills.
- · networking with farmers and community leaders.
- research into viable and sustainable rural communities.
- exports should be promoted as long as this does not hold priority over promotion of a local/regional food system.
- Research into genetically modified foods is supported if the purpose of such research is to ensure the longterm safety of GMO food and crops, to advance basic research knowledge, to benefit sustainable agricultural practices and to serve the public good.

Note on terms used: "Family farm" generally implies that the family owns and lives on the land, provides most of the labor, assumes the economic risk, and makes management decisions.

According to the Minnesota Institute for Sustainable Agriculture, sustainable agriculture seeks to balance three long-term goals: quality of life (to satisfy personal, family, and community needs for health, safety, food and happiness); environment (to enhance finite soil, water, air and other resources; economics (to be profitable). In any given situation, the most sustainable choice is the one where the net effects come closest to meeting all three goals.

#### HISTORY OF STATE ACTION

Water: In 1995 the League closely monitored some legislators' attempts to relax Wetlands restrictions. The session ended without changes. In 1996 the LWVMN actively participated with the Wetlands Coalition to monitor the changes to the Wetlands Protection Act. The League wanted to keep the "no-net loss" policy on drainage ditch repair and construction.

In 2003 the LWVMN was an active part of a coalition supporting legislation to control the use of Off-Highway Vehicles (OHVs). The damage they do to our wetlands and to the environment in general is very detrimental. A watered-down OHV bill was passed and signed into law in the spring of 2003, an important component is the requirement that all state forest trails will be closed to OHVs unless posted open by 2010. OHV clubs began organizing to repeal the law immediately after passage.

In 2003, LWVMN supported legislation developed by the MN Environmental Partnership that would remove and/or severely limit phosphorus in dishwashing detergent. Septic system upgrade requirements were also supported. Both issues were referred for more study and will resurface in the 2004 legislative session.

Air: Since 1981 LWV has worked to strengthen and readopt the National Clean Air Act; a bill passed in 1990.

LWVMN has supported acid rain controls at both the state and national levels, and continues to monitor the acid rain situation both in Minnesota and other areas of the country.

Solid Waste. .During the 1989 session LWVMN supported passage of amendments to the waste management statute fostering an integrated waste management system through reduction and reuse, waste recycling, yard waste composting and resource recovery. A portion of the fees charged for disposal of solid waste is used to assist counties in their waste reduction efforts. LWVMN also supported proposed ordinances in Minneapolis and St. Paul requiring that food packaging be returnable, degradable or recycled, and was represented in the Advisory Committee on implementing these ordinances.

From 1990 to 1993 LWVMN supported legislation designed to reduce packaging waste through fees including container deposit. We also supported provisions which had mandatory recycled content requirements for products.

In 1991 we opposed the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) Citizens Board's granting of a permit for the Dakota County's incinerator based on LWVUS' seven minimum conditions necessary to support an incinerator.

**Hazardous Waste:** LWVMN supported the adoption by the state Legislature of the Waste Management Act of 1980, and has continued to support citizen action as the Waste Management Board seeks to site waste facilities.

Since 1984 when Minnesota became a part of the Midwest Interstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Compact, LWVMN has joined with other midwest state Leagues to monitor siting of a low level radioactive waste disposal site.

In 1997 and again in 1999 LWVMN and other states opposed the transport of nuclear wastes through the heavily populated areas of the state without a clear nuclear waste disposal program from the federal government.

LWVMN opposed the Northern State Power Company's request in 1992 to the Public Utilities Commission to grant a Certificate of Need for dry cask storage of high-level radioactive waste at the Prairie Island facility. This was based on Minnesota Statute Sec. 116C.72, which requires legislative consent to create a high-level radioactive waste facility in Minnesota. In 1993 a Minnesota Appeals court upheld that position. Our opposition was based on the process rather than the facility. LWVUS has granted permission for LWVMN to oppose the storage facility as proposed by NSP.

Land Use: In 1997 the League lobbied for mandatory state planning which would require the units of government to coordinate their plans with neighboring communities. A softer version of the bill was passed, merely recommending planning and providing assistance to those localities who choose to do it.

In 2003 LWVMN supported stronger control of off-highway vehicles because of excessive damage to public and private lands. Restrictions were vigorously fought by industry and some user groups, but a bill with some long-sought relief finally emerged.

**Energy:** The LWV continues to support conservation and development of alternatives to fossil fuels.

**Agriculture:** The LWVMN position adopted in 2001 was immediately used to lobby against a bill appropriating \$192,000 to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) for a court ordered Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for a large hog operation. LWVMN believes this subsidy sets a dangerous precedent.

LWVMN also opposed a bill (which passed) expanding nuisance liability protection for farm operations.

From July 1998 through January 2002 LWVMN's representative participated in the working of the Citizen Advisory Committee for the Generic Environmental Impact Statement (GEIS)on Animal Agriculture. The purpose was to help the state of Minnesota understand the issues and controversy surrounding animal agriculture and to produce recommendations for public policy. The recommendations were to be ready for the 2002 legislative session.

In September 2001 LWQVMN testified at a public hearing of the GEIS in support of the policy recommendations for animal agriculture put forth by the Citizen Advisory Committee which were consistent with League positions.

LWVMN testified against legislation proposed in 2003 that eliminated citizen and/or local governments from initiating the environmental review process for feedlots having under 1,000 animal units. The legislation passed despite strong opposition by environmental groups and supporters of local control.

## SOCIAL POLICY

Promote social and economic justice, secure equal rights for all and combat discrimination and poverty.

## **EQUAL OPPORTUNITY**

LWVUS Position: Support equal access to education, employment and housing. Support ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment and efforts to bring laws into compliance with the goals of the ERA.

LWVMN Position: Support of policies to ensure equality of opportunity in employment, real property, public accommodations, education and other public services for all persons. Support of administrative enforcement of antidiscrimination laws. Support of state responsibility for and responsiveness to Indian citizens.

## Details

- the principle that the state is responsible for all its citizens on an equal basis and should work to ensure equal treatment for all citizens by all levels of government. (1951)
- antidiscrimination legislation as a necessary means of eliminating discrimination. (1957)
- the principle of fair housing and antidiscrimination laws governing transactions of all real property, regardless of whether the financing is public or private. (1961)
- adequately financed enforcement of antidiscrimination laws dealing with employment, housing, real property, public accommodations, education and other public services. (1961)
- state legislation to ensure services for Indian citizens which are equal to those provided for other citizens.

Where Indians are singled out for special attention, that attention should be directed towards solving existing jurisdictional conflicts in order to guarantee equal treatment of Indian citizens by all levels of government. Programs should have the explicit recognition that the basic decisions regarding Indian lives and property are to be made by the Indians themselves. (1963)

- a state agency of Indian affairs which meets the following criteria: acceptable to the Indians themselves; permanent; staffed by professionally qualified people, authorized to act in setting up, carrying out and coordinating programs; empowered to use the services of other existing agencies and provided with adequate funds. (1963)
- the correction of racial imbalance in the schools. (1967)
- life-long access to public education for expanded job opportunities and personal enrichment to achieve education equity for all citizens. (Convention 1983)

#### FAMILY AND CHILD ISSUES

#### **FAMILY VIOLENCE**

LWVMN Position: Support for improved procedures for agencies dealing with family violence. Support for improved services for the victims.

#### Details

Support of:

- a multi-disciplinary approach in dealing with child abuse.
- more advocates to protect the interests of victims of family violence.
- · more shelters for battered women.
- a complete and continuing system of data collection on incidents of family violence to aid in planning and evaluation of services.
- a continuing program of mediation as an alternative to criminal prosecution in resolving domestic disputes.
- provision of immediate legal remedies for victims of family violence.
- a coordinated training program for all legal and human services professionals to address the problems of family violence. (1980)

#### **CHILD SUPPORT**

LWVMN Position: Support of stricter enforcement of court-ordered child support payments.

#### Details

Support of:

- efforts to make support collections and enforcement services equally available to non-public assistance families.
- · efforts to adequately publicize available services.
- providing adequate staff to enforce child support in an efficient and expeditious manner. (1982)

#### CHILD PROTECTION

LWVMN Position: Support of adequate staffing and resources for child protection services. (1986)

#### **Details**

Support of:

- the assignment of a high priority to state and county level Child Protection Services to ensure adequate staffing and sufficient resources to provide meaningful services to families experiencing abuse and neglect.
- a Children's Trust Fund to support programs aimed at preventing the abuse and neglect of children.
- funding programs to promote good parenting and to provide support for parents, especially those in high risk groups, in order to prevent child abuse and neglect.
- modifications of juvenile and criminal court proceedings in cases of abuse and neglect, reducing the trauma to the child victim while still protecting the rights of the alleged abuser.

### **CHILD HEALTH**

LWVMN Position: Support access to comprehensive pre-natal and child health care. (1987)

#### Details

- public policies that provide access to comprehensive pre-natal and child health care because of the cost effectiveness of preventive health care for pregnant women and children.
- publicly supported health insurance for pregnant women and children with family incomes up to at least 200% of the poverty level.
- publicly and privately sponsored programs that ensure adequate nutrition for pregnant and nursing mothers and young children.
- ensuring adequate care for children with disabilities and chronic illness.

#### CHILD CARE

LWVUS Position: Support programs, services and policies at all levels of government to expand the supply of affordable, quality child care for all who need it, in order to increase access to employment and to prevent and reduce poverty.

LWVMN Position: Support of coordinated public policies and funding to ensure safe, affordable, quality child care throughout the state. (1987)

#### Details

### Support of:

- adequate funding of a child care sliding fee program to ensure quality child care for low income children.
- public policies and adequate funding at the state and county level to create and sustain quality programs, including grants and loans and resource and referral services to meet the demand.
- policies in the public and private sectors that recognize the value of the child care professional and provide adequate wages and benefits to trained child care workers.
- providing an unpaid leave of absence for the parent of a newborn or newly adopted child.

#### TEENAGE PREGNANCY

LWVMN Position: Support prevention efforts to lower the rate of teenage pregnancy. (1988)

## Details

## Support of:

- the Minnesota Department of Education requiring school districts to collect data on drop-outs for reasons of pregnancy or adolescent parenting.
- increased prevention efforts in the public schools in order to lower the rate of teenage pregnancy.
- a prevention curriculum that includes the legal and financial responsibilities of male teenage parents.
- health care providers publicizing the necessity of prenatal care and the locations of free and low cost health services.

#### HOUSING

LWVMN Position: The League believes that all people have a right to housing. The public and private sectors should work together to ensure that everyone has access to adequate, decent, affordable housing.

#### **Details**

Support an active state role in providing long-term decent and affordable housing for very low-, low-, and moderateincome households. Specifically support programs that:

- increase a community's capacity to provide a full range of housing opportunities.
- preserve and expand the existing affordable housing stock.
- prevent homelessness.
- promote rental housing subsidies.

Support incentives to local units of government to promote a mix of housing opportunities including home ownership and rental housing for people of all ages with very low-, low- and moderate- incomes. Support disincentives to local units of government that do not promote such a mix of housing opportunities.

Support revising the tax system to:

- narrow the tax disparity between rental and owner occupied residential property.
- reduce the tax rate on rental residential property available to very low-, low- and moderate- income households.
- encourage maintenance of rental property available to very low-, low- and moderate- income households.

## **HEALTH CARE**

LWVUS Position: The League of Women Voters of the United States believes that a basic level of quality health care at an affordable cost should be available to all US residents. Other US health care policy goals should include the equitable distribution of services, efficient and economical delivery of care, advancement of medical research and technology and a reasonable total national expenditure level for health care. (1993) (See 'National Program At a Glance' for full position.)

#### MENTAL HEALTH

LWVMN Position: Support of a comprehensive and coordinated system of programs and services for mentally ill adults and emotionally disturbed children and adolescents (hereafter referred to as "persons with mental illness"). Priority should be given to persons with serious and persistent mental illness and/or acute mental illness. Minnesota public policy and funding should sustain an array of community based services which are available and accessible to persons with mental illness. Administration of that policy should provide clients with appropriate and adequate services. (1989)

#### Details

## Support of:

- adequate and consistent funding for services for persons with mental illness. Public funding should be flexible, following the client's needs, yet accountable to the public.
- a range of appropriate housing options for persons with mental illness.
- a commitment process which ensures prompt and appropriate treatment for persons with mental illness while protecting their civil rights. The commitment process should enable the commitment of persons so gravely disabled by mental illness that they cannot meet their basic human needs.
- a coordinated system of quality assurance (including standards, mechanisms to monitor and the ability to take corrective action) for programs and services for persons with mental illness with an emphasis on evaluating outcomes and consumer response.
- continuing state financial responsibility for improved intensive treatment programs and adequate living conditions for persons currently served in regional treatment centers.

## PREVENTION OF VIOLENCE

LWVUS Position: Support violence prevention programs in all communities.

LWVMN Position: Support for violence prevention programs in our community.

### Details

### Support of:

 educational programs that emphasize self-esteem, healthy sexuality, problem solving, positive expression of emotions, non-violent conflict resolution and respect for others to prevent violent behavior. This would include support for:

- government sponsored parenting and early childhood classes;
- ⇒ local or state government mandating or encouraging such education programs in school curricula;
- ⇒ use of public money to train teachers and administrators to use non-violence curricula;
- ⇒ training for child care providers.
- a requirement that adult educators, including coaches, participate in prevention of sexual harassment and violence education programs, and that public money be provided for adequate training.
- the use of public money for a statewide public information and communication campaign designed to prevent violent and sexually violent behavior; i.e., to promote healthy sexuality, non-violent conflict resolution, and gender and racial equality.
- efforts of state and local government to develop and coordinate programs dealing with primary prevention of violence.
- allocation of public moneys in governmental programs to combat violence through reducing substance abuse and poverty, and by identifying and responding to individuals who have been violent or are at risk for violent behavior.
- the following social institutions taking an active role in preventing violent behavior: religion, business, law, medicine, media, civic and recreational organizations.
- efforts to encourage the media industry to exercise self-restraint in the promotion of violence.
- efforts to encourage the pornography industry to exercise self-restraint in the promotion of sexuallyviolent pornography.

### ALCOHOL AND TOBACCO USE

LWVMN Position: LWVMN supports educational programs that advance improved chemical health.

#### Details

- Ongoing programs, starting in the elementary school and continuing in the middle and high school.
- Regular, continuing education for adult educators, coaches and school administrators.
- Alternatives to suspension for alcohol and tobacco violations in the schools.
- Allocation of public funds for state and community initiatives to prevent illegal alcohol and tobacco use.
- Consistent city and school guidelines for adults who chaperone youth activities.

 State laws, city ordinances and law enforcement efforts designed to promote chemical health and reduce illegal alcohol and tobacco use. (Convention 1999)

#### **IMMIGRATION**

LWVMN Position: LWVMN supports incorporating immigrants into our communities by providing access to education, by endorsing the development of secure identification documents, and by respecting the right of law enforcement personnel to perform their duties without the burden of interpreting federal immigration policies. Oppose residents with legal immigrant status running for local office.

#### **Details**

## Support of:

- State funding of Adult Basic Education for each program site should be adequate to meet the needs of the eligible residents.
- All Minnesota residents, regardless of their immigration status, should be eligible for in-state tuition at state colleges and universities under the same conditions, such as one year's state residency or graduation from a Minnesota high school.
- The Department of Public Safety should recognize the matricula consular as an acceptable document to prove identity for obtaining a driver's license.
- Law enforcement employees of state, county, or local government agencies, such as the Department of Public Safety and state and local police, should not be deputized by the INS to enforce immigration laws.
- Residents with legal immigrant status should not be allowed to run for local offices. (As adopted by the LWVMN Board, March, 2003)

## HISTORY OF STATE ACTION

Antidiscrimination and ERA: In 1993 LWVMN joined the coalition "It's Time Minnesota" which lobbied successfully for the inclusion of sexual preference in Minnesota's anti-discrimination legislation. A LWVMN lobbyist served on Governor Carlson's 1994 task force on gays and lesbians, instrumental in passing the Human Rights Amendment.

During the 1990 session LWVMN lobbied in favor of clearer definitions of an equitable compensation relationship, provisions for reviewing and accepting plans by the Department of Employee Relations, and penalty provisions. The revised measure was passed and signed into law.

Family Violence: The League lobbied for legislation incorporated in a 1996 crime prevention bill to fund visits to homes and nurseries. The visits provide early intervention in abusive situations, given that the number one indicator of criminal behavior is child abuse.

Child Support: LWVMN has supported child support legislation to make services more equitable for non-Public Assistance families and to withhold income automatically for court-ordered support.

Child Protection: LWVMN has worked to support adequate staffing and resources for Child Protection Services at the county and state levels.

Child Health: The League took action in support of the Children's Health Plan and expanding pre-natal health care services. In 1997, the League strongly supported a bill to restrict the sale of tobacco to minors by licensing retailers and setting criteria for display of tobacco products. The legislation was passed and signed into law.

In 1999 LWVMN supported adolescent health clinics.

In 2003 the Legislature cut about \$1 billion from current levels of support in the Health and Human Services bill, in spite of efforts in opposition by the LWVMN and others. The cuts resulted in a raise in health care insurance premiums for people covered under the MinnesotaCare Program, eliminating basic health care coverage for undocumented immigrant children and their families, and raising premiums for families receiving Minnesota Medical Assistance for disabled children. In addition, the governor's unallotments imposed severe cuts on WIC, a nutritional program for women, infants and children.

Child Care: In a coalition the League helped to found, Child Care WORKS, LWVMN has aggressively worked for expansion of the Child Care Sliding Fee Program for low-income parents and development grants to increase the supply of quality child care. The League supported legislation to guarantee an unpaid parental leave.

The League supported a proposal to expand the basic sliding fee program to subsidize low- and middle-income Minnesotans who pay child care expenses. The bill was incorporated into the Omnibus Human Services legislation. The League lobbied for the appropriation of money for crisis nurseries and home visiting programs.

In 1997 the League successfully lobbied for expansion of child care in welfare reform legislation. One provision of the package was to exempt parents with babies under one year from immediate work requirements. Parents will receive a portion of the child care subsidy and be allowed to stay at home with their infant.

In 2003 cuts to the Health and Human Services bill included significant reductions in state-subsidized childcare assistance, e.g., eliminating from the program families earning more than 175% of the Federal poverty level, or \$15,000 for a family of three. The league opposed these reductions, and testified against budget cuts in health and human service and in favor of a "diversified revenue system."

**Teenage Pregnancy:** LWVMN testified in 1994 for the inclusion in the Omnibus Education Finance Bill for money to fund a program to teach male responsibility to teen fathers.

In 2003 funding for family planning clinics was protected and the effort to mandate dual-track sex education in public schools was defeated. The latter would have mandated religious-based, abstinence-only sex-ed programs offered along with the standard program. The League submitted testimony on Emergency Contraception and did action alerts on it and the 24-hour wait bill.

Housing: LWVMN lobbied in 1993 in support of a bill that would provide "comprehensive choice" in housing throughout the metropolitan area. The vision was to distribute a full range of housing throughout the metro area enabling very low-, low-, and moderate- income people to live near new entry level jobs opening up in outer ring suburbs.

In 1997 the League followed with interest legislation to increase affordable rental housing through no-interest mortgages or deferred loans. The program received \$16.4 million for the biennium.

In 2000 LWVMN issued action alerts to members urging that TANF (Temporary Assistance to Needy Families) funds be used to expand affordable housing programs rather than replace existing funding. New affordable rental housing received \$30 million and \$20 million went to Habitat for Humanity.

Health Care: The national Health Care position arrived just in time to allow crucial lobbying by LWVMN for the establishment of Minnesota's HealthRight legislation in 1992 (now called MinnesotaCare). The League continued monitoring its development in the 1993 legislative session and also monitored rulemaking by the Minnesota Health Care Commission and Department of Health. A primary concern is that the consumers' point of view be included in Commission decisions.

LWVMN is also working with the Health Care Reform Project, a national coalition to promote health care reform at the federal level. Included in any plan the Project supports are: universal coverage and mandatory employer participation; serious cost containment; comprehensive benefits for all; and reform now.

The League concentrated its health care lobbying efforts in 1995 to prevent the erosion of the 1994 MNCare bill and to seek funding for universal coverage.

The League took action on several health care issues in 1997, including a Prescription Drug Fair Competition bill to negotiate lower drug prices for independent pharmacies. The Governor used a line item veto to eliminate the funding to allow the Department of Administration to negotiate on behalf of the pharmacies. Also, a weakened Patient Protection Act passed and was signed. We had hoped the bill would include an independent appeals process and a strong patient advocacy program, but it

certainly is a good beginning.

In 1999 LWVMN wrote to the legislators asking that funds from the tobacco lawsuit be used to establish endowments for the health care of Minnesotans and not be used for tax rebates.

LWVMN joined a new health care coalition in 2000—Seniors and Workers for Quality Coalition. We monitored bills related to patient protection and prescription drug programs for seniors. Legislation passed relating to training for nursing home resident assistants and developing alternative procedures for nursing home inspections. Participation in the coalition during the 2001 session also proved successful. Advocacy efforts brought gains for workers' wages, limits on the use of temporary nursing pools and funding for studying staffing needs.

Mental Health: During the 1993 session the League supported refinements of the Comprehensive Mental Health Act. LWVMN lobbied for community-based homes for persons with mental illness. The League has consistently supported increased funding for community services. We also supported the Anoka Alternatives, a fund to find housing for difficult-to-place persons at Anoka Regional Treatment Center. We supported the closing of Moose Lake Regional Treatment Center and increased funding for community services for those clients. LWVMN also supported innovative employment programs in the community which will be an ongoing concern.

In 1995 the League provided testimony in support of a bill to create delivery system pilots which would pool the resources of regional treatment centers with community dollars. In 1996 the League lobbied successfully for the continued funding for five Coordinated Employment Projects. The projects provide job counseling for persons with mental illness. In 1997, the League lobbied for the additional employability projects.

Bridges, a temporary housing program for persons with mental illness, was expanded in the 1997 after strong lobbying from the League. Other mental health issues that arose during the 1997 session included a cost of living increase for mental health employees, and additional funding for the relocation of Regional Treatment Centers staff into community services.

Legislation to implement the recommendations of the Supreme Court Civil Commitment Task Force was successful in 1997. Funding was made available for a civil commitment training and resource center.

In 1998 and 1999 LWVMN lobbied for expansion of the Bridges Program and the Employability Program. LWVMN issued action alerts to members on a number of issues in 2000: employability projects, housing, prescription drug programs and adequate wages for community health workers. Advocacy efforts during 2001 for many bills included action alerts, letters to legislators and newspaper editors and committee testimony. Among successes were expansion of the civil commitment criteria, increased wages for mental health workers and \$1 million to save the supported employment projects.

Long Term Health Care: In 2003 the League supported:

- \* Investment in long-term care targeted to ease chronic staffing problems in facilities and community service.
- \* Dedication of new funds to the wages and benefits of workers to improve the quality of care for the residents and their family members.
- \* Provision of Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) benefits to the children of all long-term care workers.
- \* Regulation of supplemental staffing pools and limit what they can charge.
- \* Expansion of training and education opportunities for potential and current long-term care workers; and a commitment to updating the Nursing Assistant and Home Health Aide curriculum.
- \* Assurance of public accountability and solid planning for the future with these studies and reports: results of the rate increases for wages, benefits, and major expenditures, time studies of staffing needs and financial implications; report on the changes in supplemental staffing pool usage; improved reporting of Vulnerable Adult caseloads, backlogs, and issues.
- Equal rates protections ensuring equal access to care regardless of the ability to pay.

Relatively speaking, the long-term care system fared well in the 2003 session. While the Governor's budget cut other programs funded with state aid, such as childcare and health insurance for adults without children, according to the Department of Human Services, nursing facilities received only a 1.6 percent overall reduction in aid for the 2004-06 biennium compared to 2003 payments. Originally, the Governor had proposed cutting nursing home rates by 4 percent per year and eliminating the Worker Scholarship Program on top of the 1.6 percent reduction. Below is a list of some of the areas where nursing facilities will see budget reductions and policy changes:

- \* State reduces what it pays facilities to hold beds, cuts \$865,000 in state aid for '04-05.
- \* State reduces 90 day enhanced rate to only 30 days; cuts \$5,141,000 in state aid for '04-05.
- \* State increases surcharge payments for nursing homes; gains revenue through intergovernmental transfer.
- \* The surcharge for nursing homes is increased from \$990 per licensed bed to \$2,815 per licensed bed paid to the state. That \$1825 per bed per year increase will largely fall on private pay patients.
- \*Because of reimbursement from the federal government, the state nets over \$98 million.
- \* According to the new law, workers in nursing homes, assisted living, home care and day services that market services to people with dementia are now required to be trained in understanding the disease, helping people with activities of daily living, solving problems with behavior, and learning ways to communicate.

Prevention of Violence: In coalition with the Minnesota Attorney General, the Violence Against Women Coalition, the Citizens Council, the Battered Women's Coalition and other groups, LWVMN has lobbied successfully for violence prevention programs at the Legislature. Minnesota now has among other innovations: anti-violence curricula in its schools with funding provided to districts that offer such curricula in grades K-12; an Office for a Violence Free Minnesota, which coordinates statewide efforts in violence prevention; foundation grants specifically targeted to violence prevention programs; and in Ramsey County, an urban, county-wide Community Action Plan using a multifaceted approach to end family violence. Delegates to LWVUS Convention in 1994 concurred with LWVMN violence position in its essentials following a campaign led by Minnesota delegates.

Minnesota American Indians: In the 1993 session LWVMN supported legislative ratification of the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources and the Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe Indians agreement regarding the 1837 Treaty rights to hunting, fishing and gathering by the band. Legislative ratification would have honored the rights of the Ojibwe, protected the environment and avoided a costly court fight. The Legislature failed to act and the agreement was sent to trial. The federal Court of Appeals has ruled in favor or the band following an appeal by the State of Minnesota of the federal district court's ruling also in the band's favor. In 1999 the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the Mille Lacs Band retained the hunting and fishing rights guaranteed to them by the 1837 treaty.

**Alcohol and Tobacco Use:** The 1999 LWVMN Convention adopted by concurrence the Edina LWV's Alcohol and Tobacco Use position.

**Immigration:** During the 2003 session, LWVMN supported an 8% growth factor in funding for Adult Basic Education. However, this growth factor was eliminated in the budget.

LWVMN members adopted a study of the challenges and opportunities facing Minnesota with regard to immigration in May 2001. Members did not reach consensus on three issues:

- \* In the "Details" of the League Equal Opportunity (Social Policy) Position, to change the working from "citizens" to "all persons" to match the position statement
- \* Should the driver's licenses of non-citizens on short-term visas be marked to indicate their status?
- \* Should residents with legal immigrant status be allowed to vote in local elections?

## COUNCIL OF METROPOLITAN AREA LEAGUES

The Council of Metropolitan Area Leagues (CMAL) was established in 1962. It is an interleague organization composed of all the local Leagues in the seven-county metropolitan area which includes Anoka, Carver, Dakota, Hennepin, Ramsey, Scott and Washington counties. Through CMAL, League members work to address governmental issues of metropolitan concern.

#### METROPOLITAN COUNCIL

CMAL Position: Support of the development of the Metropolitan Council as the decision-making body for metropolitan needs in accordance with these criteria: efficiency and economy, equitable financing, flexibility, citizen control and responsiveness to the electorate. CMAL supports provisions for coordinated metropolitan services focused through the Metropolitan Council. CMAL supports retention of an appointed Metropolitan Council with greater use of its existing powers. (1969, 1976, 1993)

#### **Details**

## CMAL supports:

- retention of an appointed Metropolitan Council.
  - The appointed Council is seen as less parochial, less subject to special interests, and better able to adopt and maintain unpopular positions for the good of the entire area,
  - ⇒ The appointed Council is responsible to our elected state Legislature and watched over by our elected local officials. (1969, 1976, 1993)
- an open appointment process including publicized vacancies; increased citizen, local government and legislative influence on appointments; formal qualifications for office, a return to fixed, staggered terms, establishment of a removal procedure for members of the Council and district apportionment based on population.

In the event that it appears that the Council may become an elected body, CMAL supports nonpartisanship of candidates, with availability of public financing, with selection of the chair made by the council members from among their number; maintaining population as the basis for districts, election of Council members at the same time as local officials (assuming passage of the Uniform Election Law), continuance of a part-time Council and of the per diem basis for compensation. (1976, 1993)

#### HOUSING

CMAL Position: Support of the Metropolitan Council as the Housing and Redevelopment Authority acting as an administrative agency providing technical assistance to communities requesting service. CMAL opposes an independent regional body separate from the Council to own and operate subsidized housing. (1981)

#### HEALTH

CMAL Position: Support of the continuation of health planning and coordination at the metropolitan level with state and/or regional funds, if federal funds are reduced. (1981).

# FUNDING/FINANCING FISCAL DISPARITIES

CMAL Position: Support for area-wide sharing of fiscal resources, to move towards the solution of problems created by fiscal disparities and to finance services which benefit the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area as a whole or affect the lives of all its citizens. (1970) The integrity of the area-wide pool used in the sharing of fiscal resources should be maintained with no exceptions. (1997) Loans from the pool should be discouraged and if made should not be forgiven. (1997)

## FINANCING METROPOLITAN SERVICES

CMAL Position: Support for operating and maintaining the metropolitan systems and services with a mix of funding sources specific to each service (federal, state and local funds and user fees). If a supplemental fund is created, CMAL supports additional user fees, new or increased, appropriate to the service. (1985)

## Details

#### CMAL supports:

- improved accountability of metropolitan agencies by:
  - ⇒ uniform reporting and submittal dates of agency development programs to the Metropolitan Council
  - ⇒ a responsible, uniform system of administrative procedures for all metropolitan agencies.
- improved accountability of the Metropolitan Council by:
  - ⇒ the establishment of a permanent legislative committee/commission for metropolitan affairs,
  - ⇒ regular reports to the legislature on regional programs for financing,
  - ⇒ regular reports and discussion sessions with local elected officials,
  - ⇒ responsible administrative procedures.

### SCHOOL INTEGRATION/DESEGREGATION

CMAL Position: Support the following measures to achieve school integration/desegregation in the metropolitan area: mandatory participation by the school districts; voluntary participation by students; combination of student exchanges, magnets and incentives; combination of incentive plans for school districts and individuals funded by state money; redrawing of school district lines (as necessary). (1991)

#### HOUSING/HEALTH CARE FOR THE AGING

CMAL Position: Support for local planning for the housing and service needs for the elderly and disabled in the community. Support for the preparation of a local "Blueprint for Action." (1989)

#### Details

## CMAL supports:

- the provision of a single telephone number at the local level for information and referral for senior housing and services available in that area. (CMAL supports the city as the most appropriate provider of this service.)
- local ordinances which allow for the provision of housing and services necessary to meet the needs of the aging.
- the provision of additional health, home care, and housing support services as they become necessary.
   CMAL supports flexibility in the provision of these services. Providers can be in the private sector (profit or non-profit), the county, city, school district, community center, the informal network, or any combination of these.

## LAND USE AND ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY

CMAL Position: CMAL recognizes that increased pressures for development in the entire Twin Cities area indicate the need for a strong public voice in land-use decisions. CMAL supports metropolitan-level planning, programs and policies directed toward channeling development in ways that will: (1) preserve and enhance the natural environment; (2) use public investment to the best advantage; and (3) provide area residents with diversity in choice of facilities and amenities. (1972) (Also see LWVMN and LWVUS positions.)

#### Details

## CMAL supports

 channeling growth so that necessary public services are provided in an efficient, orderly pattern.

- preserving the natural environment to the extent possible by protecting land and water during and after development, and from development where necessary, and preserving open space for recreation, protection and amenities.
- using land in the seven-county area to implement social goals, such as a full range of housing choices, adequate transportation, parks and the necessary facilities and amenities to enhance the quality of life.
- the Metropolitan Council should be authorized to develop the policy tools necessary to implement these goals, provided local governments are involved in decisions affecting them.

#### **ENVIRONMENT**

CMAL Position: Support for a requirement that local governments adopt implementation ordinances for protection of environmental quality for review and approval by the Metropolitan Council. (1981)

CMAL Position: Support the Metropolitan Council as the agency to plan and coordinate the water supply needs of the region. (1995)

#### Details

#### CMAL supports:

- water supply as a regional system with Metropolitan Council review and approval of local plans and implementation of the water supply system through local water utilities.
- Consideration of water supply availability in shaping the growth of the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area and the Metropolitan Council should have the authority to deny approval of development in areas with limited water supply availability through approval of amendments to land use plans.
- Protection of water supply resource, emergency response, and water conservation as high priorities in a regional water supply plan with plans for alternative sources of water a slightly lower priority.
- Water supply becoming a regional operating system only if implementation of local water supply plans is ineffective and threatens the water supply of the region, or major regional investments are needed for interconnections to provide for the water supply of the region, and/or if supplies of water must be brought in from outside the region.
- Metropolitan Council having a role in educating the public.

## SOLID WASTE

CMAL Position: Support for the establishment by the Metropolitan Council of a system for controlling the flow of solid waste for recycling and resource recovery. (1981)

#### HISTORY OF CMAL ACTION

Water Resources:. CMAL adopted at its 1993 convention a study of Regional Government Structures and Management Efforts to Provide an Adequate, Safe Water Supply. Their report, Water Supply: A Regional Perspective, was released in January 1995.

Solid Waste: In 1985 CMAL testified before the Metropolitan Council and State Legislature. It supported mandatory source separation, cautioned against total reliance on high tech solutions to waste management, and supported the 1990 deadline for cessation of landfilling of unprocessed mixed municipal wastes. Subsequent legislation mandated the 1990 deadline, but source separation remains voluntary unless mandated by individual metropolitan counties.

## TRANSPORTATION

CMAL Position: Support of the Metropolitan Council as the single metropolitan agency to plan and coordinate a diverse transportation system, meeting varied needs, and to have approval authority over this system's major capital expenditures. New funding sources should be service related. (1983) (Also see LWVUS position in Impact on Issues, p. 59-60.)

#### Details

## CMAL supports:

- various modes of transportation, both public and private: ridesharing, carpools, vanpools, paratransit, buses and deregulated taxis. A light rail transit mode can be supported if assured high ridership, economic feasibility and integration into the total transportation system.
- transportation service for the handicapped, fringe parking, and feeder services; High Occupancy Vehicle (HOV) lanes, bikeways, walkways and selected reduced fares.

## **COUNTY GOVERNMENT**

CMAL Position: Support of measures to ensure accountability and visibility of county government. Support of measures to improve cooperation and communication between the Metropolitan Council and county government within the metropolitan area. (1975)

#### Details

- Accountability of a governmental body is obtained by the effective communication of its policies and procedures to residents of its jurisdiction. While accountability to the citizenry is recognized as a responsibility of all governments, CMAL also recognizes the responsibility of citizens to become adequately informed and involved as well as to participate in the election process. Accountability of county government would be increased by the following (but not limited to):
  - public access to the budget process where priorities and policies are set, including, for example, citizen review of revenue-sharing allocations and funding for public services and citizen review of methods of setting budget priorities,
  - systematic and objective evaluation of county programs,
  - creation of a public information system to ensure not only public access to meetings of the county board and advisory committees but also more understanding of the issues being considered by the county board; ample publication of location, time, date and agenda of meeting; dissemination of information on the procedures for citizen appointments; and publication of background information prior to the decision-making time when policy is set,
  - regular communication between county and municipalities and other levels of government,
  - ⇒ full disclosure of campaign financing by every candidate in county elections.

The Metropolitan Council is viewed as the regional planning and coordinating body, while the counties are viewed as administrators, implementers, and enforcers of regional policy. CMAL believes that counties should be involved in the initial planning and policy-making stages of Metropolitan Council activities in order for counties to carry out their eventual implementation.

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
