Explanation of Local League Bylaws The Nominating Committee

- Political Accountability Rating Committee Borg reports that this committee recommends the idea be presented to the 1975 State Convention for approval. Questionnaires answered by Leagues were slightly in favor of a PAR, but not conclusive.
- Roll Call Kathy Merriam did a tabulation of voting on thirty bills of interest to LWV. There was discussion of how to make this information available how many bills to use, how much discription is needed to identify bills, etc? All have been referred to in the CAPITOL LETTER. It was decided that each Program chairman will write up the bills that are important in her field. Those that did not pass will be covered in a separate section. Next session we will inform legislators at the beginning of the session what our priorities are. Then a rating won't be a surprise. When the Program chairmen have written up their significant bills, a roll call will be sent to the local Leagues. The descriptions of the bills will be used in the next CAPITOL LETTER, which is due in the League office on Monday, May 20, by 1:00 p.m. An over-all view of the session will be used as the lead story.

VOTER - July-August - Lively issues/priorities. Liz will write the lead story on program. Program chairmen will find "holes" in their areas - focus on problems with our present positions. Point to new areas of interest. Considered lead story on Campaign Financing monitoring.

November-December - Legislative Outlook - looking toward the new session Minneapolis LWV wrote letter of appreciation for State allowing them to lobby for Fair Dismissal Act under their Juvenile Justice position. It was passed.

- University of Minnesota Honors Division (CLA) request by Ron Schurin for assistance on their Legislature Project. They are doing profiles on legislators, but their primary goal is an appreciation of the operation of a legislative body. They are interested in whether the League has any particular criteria for judging legislators, what issues we think most critical and what members of the legislature have been most helpful or antagonistic to our program. It was decided to send them our next CAPITOL LETTER, an explanation of our policy of not judging legislators and a list of critical issues such as ERA, Campaign Financing, "Ban-the-can", Open Meetings, Omnibus Election Laws, Environmental Quality bills (1973), Leech Lake Wild Rice ratification, and the Tenants' Rights legislation.
- Legislative Interim Committeess Borg gave list of those scheduled so far: Agriculture Com-including transportation needs and land banks, Appropriations Com physical plant and staffing of institutions, Commerce and Economic Development, Education restructuring of State High School League, Environmental Preservation and Natural Resources, Financial Institutions and Insurance, Governmental Operations proposed departments of human resources and transportation etc., Labor-Management Relations -impact of environmental controls on jobs, Transportation. There is also a committee evaluating the flexible session.
- Priorities Knutson gave reasons for reexamining our position on size of legislature.

 Reduced size has many ramifications. Discussion indicated members not informed,

 position is hard to implement and we need to know why and how to act on it. Knutson
 will get this information together for distribution.
- Other priorities for next session are reapportionment, "ban-the-can", changes in state laws to conform to ERA provisions, Rotation of names on ballot, and Land Use. Lively issues need a chairman to handle the mechanics of following the issues through to Covention. It was suggested we recommend Janet Rosenbloom. Ideas will be presented in the summer VOTER and the usual procedure followed.
- Amendments Shirley Westmoreland, of the Crystal-New Hope League and soon of the Minneapolis League, will be the amendment promotion chairman. The "railroad" amendment was
 discussed and the implications of whether we can support or oppose it. This will be
 decided at the Board meeting. Knutson had a fact sheet on why we could not support it
 under Oraganization of State Government consensus. Sid Moss will report further May 14.
- May Leadership Workshops These are "how to?" Think basics. Question on how groups should be divided. Suggestion that Program chairmen show specific publications including PROGRAM FOR ACTION the nitty-gritty of How To the mechanics. Try to involve new members in Program. Program people should keep in mind how to do Program at Unit meetings. Not every meeting is a presentation. Program person (local) needs to be a manager. Stress need for flexibility in presenting Program. How to update Program as important as new pregram. Have "what-you-ought-to-know" charts in each room

Each Program chairman will meet with her counterpart, except Barbara Jones will have both local and education, because Nancy Atchison will have membership. Liz Ebbott will meet with the completely new Board members and give background on how to serve on a League Board. The problem of having both new and old Boarders both days (because of sharing rides) was discussed. Gloria Philips will finish the planning.

Education - Levy Limits - It was decided that the committee researching this subject should have the information available by January 1.

Corrections - The committee will have the final schedule ready after their next committee

Monitoring Campaign Financing and elections - Do we need to do anything regarding action in these areas for Local Leagues? Should we send summaries? No decisions were reached. It was suggested we have something to hand out at the Falil Workshops on Election procedures.

Fall Workshops - gearing up for Legislative and Congressional action.

Action before fall elections - It was suggested that questions be sent to local Leagues with the August Board Memo on Action items. These could be used during Candidates' Meetings or as the opportunity arrives. Maybe with suggestions as to when some of these opportunities might occur. There was some dissent for fear candidates might twist replies to supporting League Program and therefore having League support.

Legislative and Congressional interviews to be done immediately following election.

Legislative interviews should be due December 15. Congressional date not set.

Congratulatory letters should go out from McCoy. Borg should arrange interviews with National Senators.

CAPITOL LETTER - interim edition scheduled for October

Lobbyist training workshop to follow election.

FOCUS days - decision to hold four each year of legislative session. Youth Days seem to have combined with these, so no separate series was designated.

CMAL plans - Del Calzo reported on their problems in getting lobbyists, because they have no funds for expenses. Increased gas prices are causing difficulties. They wondered if there is any way State can help them. It gets complicated for them to hold finance drives without infringing on local Leagues. Where are they to get money? CMAL is competing with State for lobbyists aside from the money problem. It was suggested that this whole problem needs to be considered by the State Board.

INput into Party Platforms - It was decided that a letter from McCoy would be more effective than sending League publications. This should contain our priority items for the comiking session.

POSITION OF SUPPORT: The League of Women Voters of Minnesota supports a judicial system with the capacity to assure a speedy trial and equal justice for all.

- Supports administrative reforms that expedite justice

- Supports methods to strengthen judicial selection

- Supports procedural reforms that ensure individual rights and access to due process of law

- Supports development of community alternatives as an adjunct to the judicial system

This item was first adopted at the 1971 Convention with consensus reached in the spring of 1973.

Position support made it possible to support legislation in the 1974 legislature session concerning no-fault divorce, grand jury reform and procedural reforms. League of Women Voter focus in the 1975-76 legislative session will include potential legislation in the areas of unified court and status offenses.

Of particular concern to a study commission operating under the jurisdiction of the Judicial Council is the relationship between the district and county courts. The commission is expected to make recommendations late in 1974 concerning this relationship and these recommendations may have the potential of helping to determine the course of www legislation concerning a unified court.

The 1971 Minnesota legislature passed a County Court Act which abolished all municipal courts and created county courts as the major lower level courts in 84 counties (excludes Hennepin, Ramsey and St. Louis). These courts have been in operation since July 1, 1972. Although the law gives county courts jurisdiction in specific areas, it does have concurrent jurisdiction with the district court in a number of areas, specifically cases involving the administration of trust estates, divorce, annulment and spparate maintenance proceedings and adoption.

In order for Leagues to refresh their knowledge of the court procedures, it is recommended that Leagues continue to observe the EMNYLKXIMXERENXIMIEE REGULARLY county and district courts regularly. Each League will be asked to fill out a questionnaire pertaining to the relationship of the county and district courts. Questionnaires will be due at the state office March 1, 1975.

Because the LWVMN is also concerned about the availability of counsel to indigent and semi-indigent individuals, the questionnaire will also include information concrening the public defender and kerral system and Legal Aid in each League's locality.

The last missing piece for total action on environmental issues will be supplied when we reach consensus on Land Use. The recent announcement from the National Board that Leagues can take action on energy issues which affect our current positions also will open up new areas for action.

The state E.Q. committee will concentrate on lobbying for water bills not yet a reality, beverage deposit legislation, vehicle emission inspection and, (after consensus), land use. We will supply you with new information to help you with your action.

A new opportunity for action to improve the water quality is through discharge permits. The Federal Water Pollution Act Amendments included provisions to eliminate harmful discharges into our water through a permit system. Each discharger must apply for a permit through the U.S. EPA and MPCA; (currently MPCA is seeking the authority to assume this responsibility). After an investigation is made, notices are sent indicating preliminary approval and citizens have thirty days in which to comment; no permits are granted until this opportunity for comment expires. We will prepare some instructional material for Leagues so they can participate in this important citizen action and learn how to oppose a National Pollution Discharge Elimination System permit (NPDES); this will be sent with the June mailings. The first step is to apply for notification of NPDES permits in your area to:

A potential threat to air and water quality is the copper and nickel mining presently proposed in northern Minnesota. We will gather information on the mining process and the environmental effects for those Leagues where mining might take place; this information will be available in August.

Local Leagues are making gains in promoting ordinances to ban the can; At present, Coon Rapids has passed such an ordinance and is awaiting a referendum on it; the ordinance has passed its first reading in both Blaine and Crystal and Anoka is circulating a questionnaire to ascertain the amount of support for a similar ordinance. We have a packet of the latest information on the subject, with "how-to" information on getting your council interested, as well as a model ordinance. Let us know if you want one. With funding available for grants for Resource Recovery projects in solid waste, be informed of what is happening in your area. Currently, Austin has a program for household separation of newspapers, plastics, and metals for subsequent recycling and recovery.

Until passage of ststewide wetlands protection and mandatory ersosion control legislation, local Leagues can press for ordinances at the local level.

We will provide wyou with a clearing house on E.Q. action so you can be aware of what other Leagues are doing in the state.

Environmental Quality Action to achieve a physical environment beneficial to life, including improvement of water and air quality, promotion of wise use of water resources, progress in recycling and reduction in generation of solid waste

The last missing piece for total action on environmental issures will be supplied when we reach consensus on Land Use. The recent announcement from the National Board that Leagues can take action on energy issures which affect our current position also will open up new areas for action.

Land Use Focus on land use policies and powers needed to foster an optimum talance between human needs and environmental quality.

Ann Thomas reported on training session on National Water Quality Act 1972 and on National Pollution Discharge Emimination System (NPDES) A training program for citizens to familiarize them with the permit system will be held in two areas--Duluth and Minneapolis; the latter one will be May 30 Henn. Two other meetings-hearing on MPCA Program Plan for Water Pollution Control for 1975 May 10 MPCA Board Room (9:00 a.m.) hearing on Minn. request to take over NPDES. 9:30 May 15 Holiday Inn 1313 Nicollet Ave.

She stressed that the MPCA be questioned at the May 15 meeting to be sure that are qualified to take over the program.

Lenore Parham will prepare a fact sheet from the materials supplied to familiarize Leagues with the process of permits for NPDES and after listening to the tape recording consider the possibility of re=recording essential parts of it and make it available to Leagues.

Lenore Parham discussed the possibility of a short course on water to be given by U. of M. professor Henry Hall. She will let him know of our interest and pursue the subject further.

The solid waste slide show was discussed; Leagues have been asked to indicate if they will be responsible for a showing in their community.

Discussion on the request for information on Copper-Nickel Mining and its environmental effects; Mary Poppleton will gather information for a fact sheet for interested Leagues. It was suggested that we ask DNR to be put on mailing for all information, i.e. meetings pertaining to Copper, Nickel mining.

The committee felt we should do an up-date on air, water, solid waste along with complete consensus working for the benefit of new E.Q. chairman. Mary Watson will explore the idea further at Leadership workshop.

State League should provide a clearing house for Leagues to let them know what other Leagues are doing in the EQ field. Mary Watson will check annual reports and provide this information.

Discussion on legislative priorities—deposit legislation, land use, wetlands, and erosion and sedimentation. Committee decided we should not compromise on beverage container (ie. returnable bottles and all stedl can proposal). Discussion on League's responsibility to coalition group for financial help for materials on non-returnables. Committee decided we should be responsible for a portion of the cost.

for the OUTLOOK for WORK

FINANCING GOVERNMENT in MINNESOTA

It's been about six years since any substantial activity has occurred on the financing government topic--either in study or action. There was one notable exception: the League did wage a "vote yes" campaign in support of the amendment on the ballot in 1970 allowing the Legislature to redefine exempt property. It testified both before and after the amndment passed.

State convention delegates have repeatedly voted to keep the subject on our program, where it has just languished. The 1973 state convention called for an update on tax information. The March 1974 Minnesota VOTER provided, within the limitations of space, that update.

What seems to be the problem? Are we satisfied/complacent/apathetic/
resigned about taxes? Is it too big and complex a subject to attempt to
understand? Do we think that there's nothing we can do about taxes anyway-aren't they here to stay? Why have we been content to hold a position all
of these years without bringing our members along?

Could the answer be reludtance, even fear about the difficulty in understanding so intricate a topic? We need to remind ourselves that members who joined League since 1968 have probably had no background at all in financing government and that those of us "old"members who were involved in the 1965-68 study have probably forgotten much of what we learned at that time.

League members are anxious to learn and become informed. The study of taxation is admittedly a difficult one for non-experts, but certainly not impossible. We've done it before and we can do it again! Once we kegin pick it up we will find that it is totally engrossing and fascinating. It's such a vital part of the economic well-being of every Minnesota citizen.

What should you do? Put it on your calendat for next year; schedule unit meetings. Begin your research by reviewing the League publications (see the bibliography in the March '74 VOTER). Some of the facts are out of date, but you will gain an understanding of the basic concepts of Minnesota's

tax structure. Refer to the VOTER for recent changes in tax laws. You and your League members will be informed citizens--much better informed than most of your friends and neighbors.

In order to effect change we must have an informed basis upon which to act and react. Fair and equitable taxes for all Minnesotans is a viable goal. The League can help to make it happen.

OUTLOOK FOR WORK EDITORIAL/PUBLICATIONS

This is the time of year when we check inventory to make sure that we have the publications necessary to do our usual sparkling, intelligent job.

You, as First of all ... you, as publications chairman. You will want at your Pub. Ch. fingertips the yellow, fold-out state PUBLICATIONS CATALOG, dated February 1974. If you don't have it, please order it; it's free.

You should also have the national catalogs. These appear in the National VOTER magazine. The two in use now are dated 'spring 1973' and have these titles: CATALOG FOR LEADERS, CATALOG FOR MEMBERS AND THE PUBLIC, and then there is a supplement to CATALOG FOR LEADERS dated 'fall 1973.' New ones should appear in the fall issues of the National VOTER.

When you order publications, keep these things in mind. State publications are ordered from the state office (555 Wabasha, St. Paul, MN 55102); the order must be for at least \$1.00; your League will be billed for the order.

Order national publications from the national office (1730 M Street NW, Washington, DC 20036); payment must be included with orders to national.

Plan ahead to allow ample time for ordering and shipping ... two to three weeks, please.

Helping Board Included in the OUTLOOK FOR WORK mailing is another important tool, GUIDE TO PUBLICATIONS FOR LOCAL LEAGUE BOARD MEMBERS. Have each of the directors on your Board read the section pertaining to her so that she knows what publications she should have in her portfolio. If she can't find the publications, you'll want to order them for her. Many of the things found on these sheets are not found in the publications catalogs because they're housekeeping tools like lists of local League presidents, reply cards for Time for Action, etc., so the entire Board should go over this guide carefully.

New Publications State publications are geared to a two-year cycle, following each state Convention, so this year is supposed to be a light year. However, we do have these new publications on the schedule:

DIGEST OF MINNESOTA ELECTION LAWS AND MINNESOTA SCHOOL DISTRICT ELECTION LAWS - this is being reprinted to include latest election laws. Publication date is July-August.

INDIANS IN MINNESOTA - this is a biggie and will be cause for much promotion, distribution and hoopla. It's presently out of print, and we're happily piling up back orders for the new edition. At this moment, it appears that the new edition will be at least a 50% revision (many, many things have happened in Indian affairs within the past two years) so the rewriting task has been laborious. At this point in time (May 10) the text has passed through the hands of one writer, two rewriters, one editor, one typist and is being read by on-Board readers and by off-Board expert readers. It will go to the printer on June 1st and should be off the press about August 15th and should be in your hands by September 1st.

CORRECTIONS Publication - Program people are aiming for an October 1st publication date. However, wise Leagues will schedule

corrections meetings to allow extra time for the appearance of the publication. League publication standards for thoroughness and accuracy require that extra checking of sources and figures and references; and League writers are all volunteers just like you so our deadlines are not guarantees.

VOTERS GUIDE - This is a special edition of the Minnesota VOTER which will be a 'meet the candidates' issue for statewide office and congressional offices in the Nov. 5th general election. This issue is a four-page tabloid newspaper which will go to press as soon as the primary election vote is counted on September 10. It should be off the press on Friday, September 13. Being a VOTER, it automatically is mailed to every League member, but if you want extra copies for community distribution, you'll want to order these in advance. (They'd be especially great for students away at school and servicemen. Check your files for the 1970 September-October issue, printed in blue and red, so you know what we're talking about.)

Background For You

Committee Cates Marie

As part of Board orientation sometime this summer, you'll be reviewing the LOCAL LEAGUE HANDBOOK. This includes a chapter on "What Every Board Member Should Know about Publications." Read this. In addition, you should have in you files (if not, order) a salmon-colored mimeographed publication called PUBLICATIONS, A HOW-TO GUIDE from the LWVMN (40¢). This tells you how to write and publish at the local level, how to promote, etc.

Your Job Outside the League Your job and that of the public relations director dovetail in the task of distribution of League publications. However you decide to share the responsibility, you should consider these aspects every time a new League publication is announced:

- should it be an every-member publication? The budget will decide this more times than not. If it can't be an every-member piece, offer it for sale at unit meetings, or review it in your bulletin so that members know about it. It would be good Public Relations to send reviews to your local newspaper so that the public could order also.

- should it be distributed to you junior, senior high schools?

Library?
Civic Organizations?
Finance Contributors?
Radio Station?

Newspaper editor?

Council members? School Board members?

Legislators?

Newcomer organizations like Welcome Wagon?

(This need not be FREE distribution, of course. For some, you might want to show it to them and ask if they would like to order it for their own use. Schools, libraries and civic groups could be approached on this basis.)

- every time your League has a general meeting or exhibits somewhere or does anything at which people gather, display League publications. (One example - the national publication, WHEN YOU WRITE TO WASHINGTON, should be a best seller these days!)

Keep this thought in mind. Publications serve no purpose on the shelf.
LWVUS and LWVMN get the publication to you; it's up to you to get it to local members and to the public. Have a good year!

Outlook for Work

Corrections: Study of the organization of both adult and juvenile correctional systems
Dimensions:

- a. Philosophy of rehabilitation and institutionalization (analysis of recidivism)
- b. Facilities
- c. Personnel
- d. Adult Corrections Commission, Youth Conservation Commissionpersonnel, powers, procedures
- e. The interface between judiciary and corrections; i.e. sentencing, probation
- f. Alternatives

Corrections is beginning its second year as a study item. It is proceeding according to the original schedule and plans in the first year learn what the Minnesota system is; look at local and county facilities and resources in the community; gain an overview of the system. Committee guides 1 and 2 as well as the completion of the questionnaires were designed to do this.

The outlook for the comming year, the second year is:

1. October 1.....publication release.

The publication will concern itself with corrections in Minnesota. It will incorporate and report in greater depth information on state institutions and their programs as well as include much new material. It will be objective in presentation. Because changes are constantly occurring within the system, consideration will be given to making the publication easy to keep up to date.

- 2. October 14....workshop
 A workshop on corrections will be held in the metro
 area. It will be planned to augment the fine workshop
 presented by the St.Louis Park and Edina leagues in
 last January. Planning now underway calls for the
 first formal announcement of it to go to local leagues
 in July and for all registrations to be made by October 1.
 The workshop will concentrate on material related to
 consensus areas.
 Plan to set aside the day NOW so your league will have
 the advantage of being able to come.
- 3. March 24, 1975 ...deadline for return of consensus to state office.

 To meet this deadline, local leagues will want to program study, discussio and consensus taking prior to March 1. Consensus questions will be "pretested" on non-committee members to aid the committee in writing understandable and unbiased questions which will lead to workable positions if consensus is reached. The questions will be available no later than October 30.

By request The slides presented at state council and showing state institutions are now available for use by local leagues. There will be a charge of for handling and postage. Contact the office if you want to borrow them.

OUTLOOK FOR WORK 1974 VOTERS SERVICE

Educating citizens is an enduring goal of the League. Good Voters Service does just that.

So be prepared! Read (again?!) your Local LEAGUE HANDBOOK and your VOTERS SERVICE HANDBOOK. These are basic tools to help you. A checklist of other publications that should be part of your Voters Service file will be available in June.

Recruit and organize your committee. Think of new League members as you recruit as well as experienced ones. Then plan together, keeping in mind the 1974 Minnesota Election Calendar.

Get to know your local election officials - do they need help with voter registration, training election judges, etc. - offer League assistance.

Remember that community celebrations and fairs are held during the summer months. They may be the perfect opportunity to begin your Voters Service.

A campaign techniques kit will be available by mid-June to be used and publicized in your communities. It is planned to encourage qualified people to become candidates. Contact community organizations that might be interested.

The Secretary of State is publishing a pamphlet about elections. It is designed to answer some of the general questions voters may ask, as well as explanations about the proposed constitutional amendments. The pamphlet is scheduled to be available by early July - more about it in the June Board Memo.

Candidates Meetings - put your League's experience to work. You have used several techniques with your candidates meetings in the past two years - forums, meetings, coffees, radio and TV programs. Be sure to include your legislative candidates as well as local and county candidates. A Voters Service Ad Hoc committee could be useful in cooperating with neighboring Leagues for candidates meetings. (See Ad Hoc Committee guidelines your president received at Council '74 for suggestions about this.)

A Voters Guide, available by Fall Workshops, will contain replies from candidates questionnaires for Congress and statewide offices. Copies may be ordered for local distribution along with your own replies from candidates for legislative and local offices. More information soon!

ABC Election Reporting: The League of Women Voters of Minnesota has again contracted with ABC News to report election returns in selected key precincts across the state. Proceeds from this project are included in our '74-'75 state budget. More information will follow when key precinct data is available.

So now we're up to the second week of November. Let's evaluate what we've done. In August you'll receive a form - use it as a guide for your planning and in November as a report for all the V.S. projects you have undertaken. Please return the completed form to the state office by December 1, 1974.

For the winter of '75 consider nonelection Voters Service. That could include special projects to reach the broad spectrum of persons in your communities. You probably reached them in the fall so build on that. Senior citizens, youth groups, minorities, new citizens offer opportunities for Voters Service tailored to their needs and concerns.

Although no new study is planned, ACTION under Organization of State Government has two areas of priority: Constitutional Amendment Promotion and legislative reform-reapportionment and reduction of the size of the Legislature.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROMOTION - The League of Women Voters of Minnesota will actively support the passage of two of the three amendments to the Minnesota Constitution on the November 5 ballot.

- Amendment #1 "Shall the Constitution be amended in all its articles to improve its clarity by removing obsolete and inconsequential provisions, by improving its organization and by correcting grammar and style of language, but without making any consequential changes in its legal effect?"
- Amendment #2 "Shall the Minnesota Constitution be amended so future constitutional amendments will pass if approved by 55% of the voters voting on the issue or a majority of those voting in the election?"

Each League should have an amendment chairman; this may be your Action member or an off-Board appointment. KEEP this separate from Voters Serivce. A promotion guideline with suggestions and information will be available early this summer to aid you in your community campaign.

PUBLIC AWARENESS TO THE AMENDMENTS IS ESSENTIAL.

LEGISLATIVE REFORM -

Reapportionment— As the memories of the 1972 reapportionment fade in the minds of the legislators and the public and new members are elected, the chance for a repeat performance after the 1980 census becomes more likely as each session passes without action. The League will continue to work for the passage of an amendment to the Constitution that will guarantee a method of regular and equitable reapportionment. Refer to PROGRAM FOR ACTION; Background for Action—Support of a proposal for an amendment to the Minnesota Constitution providing for congressional and legislative reapportionment by a commission. 8/24/73; and Capitol Letters-1973 and 1974.

Reduction of the size of the Legislature— The issue for further legis—
lative reform in the areas of size, salary, staff, committee organization and flexible sessions has already emerged with the formation of a Senate minority committee to discuss the merits of a full time-part time Legislature. Two hearings have already been held, one in St. Paul on 4/22 and the other in Rochester 5/6. Leagues will be notified as to future outstate hearings. Also, the formation of a bicameral, bipartisan committee with citizen

representation is anticipated. Information relating to the two committees will be sent to Leagues as the proceedings continue.

A background piece will be prepared with an August due date to bring members up to date on all the ramifications of reducing the Legislature as it relates to our position. It is expected that we will want to be adequately informed to stage a massive drive for public support.

Legislative action in other areas under Organization of State Government will receive attention as issues emerge based on the need for LWV support and woman power available. (I guess that should be people power..)

REPRESENTATIVE GOVERNMENT

ACTION to promote an open governmental system that is representative, accountable and responsible to all citizens, emphasizing comprehensive reforms in campaign financing and in comgressional structure and procedures. NB (This is the proposed wording for the '74 Convention.)

U.S. CONGRESS-- Action within this area is indeed a priority although overshadowed by interest in campaign finance and other activities at the Capitol. Annual reports indicate strong membership interest for continued action and membership updating. To keep members informed through bulletin articles and information meetings, refer to

At the local level Leagues may take action on the Congress position providing the membership is a) knowledgeable and informed and b) support the proposed action. This also applies to action taken by state League and ILOs.

District of Columbia: With the passage on May 7, 1974, of the charter for partial home rule for the District, the emphasis of League action will move to support full congressional voting representation whenever timely.

APPORTIONMENT -- League action should continue primarily at state and local levels to work towards apportionment based on population of all elected governmental bodies. See Organization of State Government.

DIRECT ELECTION OF THE PRESIDENT -- You have indicated membership interest in your annual reports. League position was reached in early 1970 and much congressional action occurred then but little since. Increased interest could be anticipated with

the upcoming 1976 Presidential election. League will take action when appropriate.

The state office also has a 25-minute slide presentation (with script) prepared by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce which offers a quick understanding of our present electoral college system and four major reform proposals. Since the presentation emphasizes the Chamber of Commerce position and we have since reached our own position with no new consensus intended, we suggest you edit the script accordingly.

NB. Direct Election really goes under Election Laws if we are following the same procedure. It is available and is it still an appropriate informational tool?

OUTLOOK FOR WORK - MEMBERSHIP (atchison)

Membership is the concern of every single member of League. The reasons are obvious, but sometimes the responsibility is easy to forget. This year the Leadership Workshops will concentrate on that every member responsibility for membership—and especially the Total Board Responsibility. We will urge every local League to have a PLAN—one that provides for flexibility of participation, thorough orientation of new and old members, and administration of the work of the League in such a way that members get maximum satisfaction from their League activities.

We hope that every Membership Chairman will have the opportunity to participate in the Leadership Workshops. If you do not, you will find lots of help in the printed materials available from the State Effice and National offices.

OUTLOOK FOR WORK

HUMAN RESOURCES/EQUALITY OF OPPORTUNITY

The Human Resources/Equality of Opportunity portfolio is a many-faceted thing and action is limited only by the interest and concern of the chairperson and local League members. Member interest can usually be stimulated by making the members aware of the problems and how they may be remedied. The HR/EO portfolio has not been a study item for several years and consequently many new members are not acquainted with all the action areas nor do they have the necessary background information. Updating members on the position is a major responsibility of the Program chairman. Involve the Membership chairperson in preparing ways that will be especially valuable to new members.

SOME ACTION SUGGESTIONS

- 1. Indians the book, INDIANS IN MINNESOTA, will be available this fall. Plan now to use the book to update League members. Work with the Publications chairperson in planning ways to publicize the book in your community.
- 2. Housing many laws were passed during the 1973-74 legislative sessions. How will they affect your community and what can you do to implement them? Metro Area chairperson may want to receive the reports published by the Metropolitan Council Housing program 300 Metro Square Bldg., St. Paul 55101.
- 3. Equal Rights Amendment update new members. Although a bill to rescind ratification of the ERA receive little support and died in committee during the 1974 session, we must continue to provide information to the public about the ERA. A packet of ERA material is available on a loan basis from the state office.
- 4. Guidelines concerning elimination of sex bias in schools will be formulated by the State Board of Education this year. When they are available, work with the Education chairperson to inform members, citizens and local school officials.
- 5. Work with EQ chairperson in the development of the Land Use study. Although the Action chairperson is responsible to respond to Call to Action, the Human Resource chairperson is responsible for providing the factual material needed for a response.

OUTLOOK FOR WORK

BULLETIN EDITOR (Amundson, Minnesota VOTER ed.)

Why are you your League's bulletin editor? You're creative! You're artistic? You've got style! A sense of humor maybe? A flair for writing? You own a typewriter! You know somebody who is willing to mimeograph your League bulletin? You're even tempered, I'll bet. A pushover for the later (after your deadline) article and for the telephonee who says she'll just give you a few facts and you can write the article because you're so good at it. Or wasn't anyone else willing to take over the bulletin and it looked like your League wouldn't have one unless you did?

To all bulletin editors who were chosen for <u>any</u> of the above "right" reasons—learn how to be a good bulletin editor <u>and enjoy</u> it—even on a small budget!

(At the Leadership Workshop counterpart sessions for bulletin editors—in May of even numbered years—experienced bulletin editors and new editors talk over their problems and get some new ideas for improving their League's image through the bulletin.)

Here are a few suggestions to make your job easier. Read or reread your Local League Handbook, page 51--"What Every Board Member Should Know About the Bulletin"—and the June 1972 OUTLOOK FOR WORK message to bulletin editors if it is in your file. See what other bulletin editors are publishing—ask another League for a copy of its bulletin and cover the postage at least (a list of local League presidents and their addresses in included with this OUTLOOK). Bulletin Editor's Guile, published by LWV of New Jersey, 460 Bloomfield Ave., Montclair, N.J. 07042 in 1966 and priced at 35¢, should be in your file. Although League terminology is a trifle dated, it is still a worthwhile how-to booklet.

Additional things to include in your bulletin: Names, address, sphone numbers of president, editor and membership chairman (many Leagues send bulletins to prospective members); your League's OUTLOOK CALENDAR in your first bulletin of the League year; a calendar each month of League events or meetings your members will want to be reminded about. Many Leagues include a membership roster in one of the early bulletins of the League year or issue a separate folder with roster, League OUTLOOK CALENDAR and pertinent voters service information (election dates, municipal officials and regular meeting dates, etc.). If you issue a separate roster-Calendar-info. folder, please send one to the state office.

And with the recent national Convention's emphasis on action in mind—when you meet/your Board, consult with each member on ways to cooperate through the bulletin. And if you do all of the above, you'll have a good bulletin your League members can enjoy. And how can you enjoy it?—By being creative, adding flair even on a limited budget, and by being innovative within your League's limitations. We hear that part of the pleasure of volunteer work is the freedom it gives one for creative self-fulfillment. How betterithaniwithcomething tangible—your local League bulletin?! (Let some of the other League members help you so that they will get some enjoyable self-fulfillment too!)
