 Describe your League's coverage of the Development of Human Resources item (committee work, unit and general membership meetings, subjects covered, membership participation).

A committee of five members met several times for planning and research sessions. They attended an all day workshop sponswed by the Minneapolis League which covered the War on Poverty in Perspective. We had one unit meeting on the Human Resources item where we covered the background review of the Economic Opportunity Act, its implementation in Hennepin County and an attempted evaluation and future prospects of some programs. It generated very active discussion on the part of the Leaguers.

2. Describe your League's response to state and national Times for Action on Development of Human Resources.

Letters and telegrams were sent to representatives and senators each time there was a call for action. Several times we had 4 and 5 responding and once we had nine women write or telegraph messages on the appropriations for the poverty program.

3. What local action was taken under the Development of Human Resources position?

Describe. Was the national position combined with a state or local position?

None as yet . However, it has been brought to our attention that some people feel the League should take the lead in open housing legislation (Ordinance) for our villages. We have discussed this and read the directive from the State League about the proper procedure in this case and very likely we will do something to maxim bring the matter of an advisory commission to the attention of the village councils.

DEVELOPMENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES (Continued) 4. How many and in what capacity have members of your League served in local programs related to the Development of Human Resources? Has this contact been beneficial to the League? Five of our members have been active in one or more programs in the inner city. One acted as a tutor to individual children with a reading problem in a "ghetto" school; one is an aide in a nursery school; one woman organized a neighborhood coffee group who got together for education and relaxtion while nursery care was provided for their children. Several other women assisted her as hostesses for this endeavour. Some have become active in Father Groppi's open housing marches in Milwaukee and are organizing a money raising project here to help support that movement. Considering that we an almost exclusively all white suburban development with very little contact with minority groups and seeing little poverty, these contacts can only be of help to us-to open our minds a little to the needs of these people and hopefully make us more aware of the urgency of the need to provide all people with equal opportunity in fact and as well as by law. 5. In evaluating local programs to provide equality of opportunity in education and employment, what improvements in the programs would you suggest, if any? These programs should be made on a long term basis with adequate funding. It only breeds cynicism in the minds of those slightly touched by the beginnings of programs and then to have them cancelled without reason and at crucial times. Funds too should be adequate - 8 -

National resource materials were not ready then, so we had to research for ourselves. Our committee was enthusiastic, diligent, thorough and they ready many publications in an attempt to get an objective picture of Red China today. They also attended several League workshops and one general meeting with speaker sponsored by a nearby League. Our League received their programs with great interest and discussion was active. This has been the most popular area of concern in our League in the last two years. 2. WATER OVER THE DAM

Not very bright, but very early on the morn of September 13, two half-closed eyes peered out over St. Albans Bay into a grey, misty dawn. They were searching, hopefully, for old Mr. Sun, who had been in the habit of showing up so brilliantly every morning for the past month or so.

After all the beautiful weather we had been enjoying the past few weeks, this just couldn't be the day we were to have rain. This was the day we were going to have our League "Go-See" Tour.

"Be alert for interesting water-oriented Go-See trips", wrote the National Board in the August, 1967, Leaders Guide. Well, We were way ahead of that illustrious body, for we had been planning an interesting tour of the Minnehaha Creek Watershed long before we had the word.

By the appointed morning, all the arrangements and final details of our trip seemed to be fairly well settled; that is, all except the weather. At 6:30 a.m. I was a bit shaken when lightning streaked across the sky and thunder rumbled in the distance, but by five to seven, when the rain started to come down in torrents, I was downright worried. The only note of optimism I could find at the time was the old adage, "Rain before seven; clear before eleven."

Then came a barrage of phone calls. Were we still planning on having the tour? Of course! After all, what would I do with a chartered bus and lunch enough for 60 people?

By the time we arrived at the Minnetonka Plaza, our appointed meeting place, the rain had settled down to a drizzle, but the entourage seemed to be wisely fortified with raincoats, hoods, umbrellas and boots.

I found Edie Herman and started to apologize for the weather. "Oh, it's a perfect day," she exclaimed enthusiastically, "now we can really see where the water is coming from and where it is going!" My spirits rose; if Edie was happy about the weather, why should I feel dejected? Mrs. Randolph Herman (Edith), had kindly consented to be our tour guide. She is vice-president of the Minnesota Association for Conservation Education and chairman of the Midwest Conference on Conservation Education.

Just before we boarded our bus we had some photos taken for the local papers, as the Westonka League thought a picture and write-up of our tour would be good publicity just before the combined finance drive.

At 9:15 we proceeded directly to the Minnetonka Art Center in Wayzata to gain background information from J. Donald Fruen, chairman of the board of managers for the Minnehaha Creek Watershed District and Eugene Hickok, consulting engineer for the district. Here we ran into our first snag, as the door to the Art Center was locked, and the person who was supposed to open it for us at \$:30 hadn't arrived. So there we stood, under those ominus black clouds, trying to study our rain-spattered watershed and Lake Minnetonka maps that had been distributed by Mrs.Herman.

We learned that there are 26 municipalities in our watershed district and that during the first year the board of managers may levy a two mill assessment (not exceeding \$60,000) on all lands within the district for organizational expenses and preparation of an overall plan. Thereafter the managers may levy a one mill assessment for administrative costs and for projects of common benefit to the district. Any construction costs are paid by special assessment against properties which are determined to be benefited.

After a short question and answer period, we again boarded our bus and were on our way to Spring Park and Mound. Time did not permit us to visit the Mound Sewage Plant, as we had originally planned, but I did obtain some information on the plant from Mr. Farren, the manager. We are welcome to tour the plant at any time, and will keep this in mind for a future go-see trip.

Our water wagon then wound its way over to County Road 110, where we stopped at the A. F. Mader farm. We left the bus in the farmyard and walked down a little gravel path to the carp trap on Six Mile Creek, where thousands of pounds of carp are trapped each year to prevent them from getting into Lake Minnetonka. We also examined the duck weed and the algae in the creek, which seem to be prevalent throughout the bays in Minnetonka.

We had to hurry back to our bus, as we were due at the Jesuit College Campus at 11:00. Here we met with Donald Berg, who is employed by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture as work unit conservationist of the Carver County Soil and Water Conservation District. We took a walk through some tall grass in order to get a better look at Lake Parley, and waw how the "people problem" has been over-fertilizing the lake with too much nitrogen. He thought that the best way to manage water is to hold it where it falls, and to engineer for a 50-year cycle instead of a 20-year cycle, as has been done in the past. After some questions, we thanked Don and invited him to lunch with us at the Arboretum. By this time my feet were very "squishy", as I wasn't one of the wise ones with boots on, so thoughts of hot coffee were beginning to come to the fore. We were a little late in arriving at the Arboretum, but my husband had picked up the lunch that was prepared by the Ladies Missionary Society of Our Saviour's Lutheran Church, and everything was laid out buffet style in the pavillion, which we had reserved. The bubbling hot dish, saldd, rolls, hot coffee and dessert were more than welcomed and all very delicious. We had enough time to have a second helping, and then we had to be on our way again, leaving the clean-up to friend husband.

We wended our way down to Gray's Bay Dam, where Mrs. Herman gave us an interesting history of the Dam, and Mr. Ray Swenson, Administrator of Minnetonka Village, showed us Libb's Lake, which is the only lakeshore belonging to Minnetonka Village.

We then followed along Minnehaha Creek where Mrs. Herman commented on various points of interest, and concluded our tour at Mount Olivet Lutheran Church. Here Mr. Bruce Paulson, attorney and member of the Minnehaha Creek Citizens Association, showed us slides of the 1965 flooded areas along the Creek, making us well aware of the problems at that end of the watershed. He suggested that we read Ernest Swift's "Conservation Saga".

The purpose of our six-hour, 75-mile tour was to point out our problems and opportunities in water pollution and control, and I think that most of us felt the trip had fulfilled its intention.

Well - I've said what has been on my mind. It is not my KKKARt purpose to 'hurt' anyone and perhaps the New Ulm League is alone in feeling 'snowed under'. I feel sorry that out of 80 some clubs in New Ulm - it is the League that has to fold. Just doesn't seem right somehow. Perhaps, if we can continue to 'hold on' as a Unit - we will rise again one day.

The first thing that happened in Fall - our 1st Vice Pres. (also Voters Service and Budget Committee Chairman) moved. Then our 2nd Vice Pres. (also Nat. Res. Ch.) took a leave-of-absence as her husband was ill. I couldn't get a replacement, but I was able to get another member to work on the United Nations Day window display we had planned. We had Foreign Aid for our November topic and our Membership Ch. took over the topic. (Our Nat. Res. Ch., 2nd Vice Pres. resigned from the Board in January.)

Our Nat. Res. Ch. wasn't able to help in answering the Time For Action Letters that seemed to come in droves - so I tried to take over the job. I was over-whelmed, then to receive a condescending letter from our coordinator - was too much.

I object to the pressure applied to answer these Time For Action letters. I object to having to send a card stating my reason for not answering the T.F.A. letters. especially when I explained once that the New Ulm League disagreed on Foreign Trade and Aid.

Since this is a voluntary organization I see no reason for the attitude of 'you must do this or tell us why not'.

Regarding all the speeches by various members: they must be interesting, but I don't have the time to read them thru. There are too many and they are too long. As long as we know League position - why the speeches? Save your paper and postage. The mailman will be happier too.

We have contacted former members of the I.W.V. and asked them to come back into League. When we mention the programs - they lost interest - they studied these same programs years and years before. When we told them about our new one 'China' - it still didn't offset the issue.

"An Emergency Ordinance is an ordinance necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, morals, safety or welfare in which the emergency is defined and declared in a preamble thereto, and is adopted by a vote of at least four members of the council. No prosecution shall be based upon the provisions of any emergency ordinance until 24 hours after the ordinance has been filed with the City Clerk and posted in three conspicuous places in the city or until the ordinance has been published, unless the person charged with violation had actual notice of the passage of the ordinance shall have any force and effect 61 days after the date of its adoption unless reenacted by council."

Chapter 10

Section 111: Public notice be given for all meetings of Board of Equalization so people with grievances may plan to attend.

"The council shall constitute a Board of Equalization to equalize assessments of property for tazation purposes according to law." Statement is made regarding publication of such matters as council may deem in public interest.

Sections 116-117: City Attorney shall attend all regular meetings or shall appoint a substitute under Council-Manager plan.

City Attorney subordinate officer under City Manager and subject to his request for presence at council meetings.

The League recommended adoption of Council-Manager form of government.

Chapter 2. Section 2.01: "The municipal government provided by this Charter shall be known as "The Council Manager government".

Consensus reached by the LWV of International Falls in September 1965 on recommended changes in the city charter:

Chapter 1

Condensation and simplification is recommended.

Some condensation was accomplished and remainder is legal description and leaves no question in interpretation.

City Manager qualifications: That he be a trained municipal manager and at the time of his appointment he need not be resident of city.

Section 3: Change third ward boundaries or move second ward over one block.

Addition of fourth ward by altering boundaries of Wards Three and Two.

Chapter 2

Section 6: Change election date for city officers from first Tuesday after the first Monday in April of each year to the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November.

"A regular municipal election shall be held on the first Tueaday after the first Monday in November of each even-numbered year commencing in 1966 at such place or places as the city council may designate."

Section 7: We recommend not more than two aldermen be elected at large under Council-Manager plan.

"Council shall be composed of a mayor and four councilmen, who shall be qualified electors and who shall be elected, one from each ward. Mayor to be elected at large."

Section 9: Aldermen appointed to fill a vacancy should serve to next election only.

"In each such case the council shall be resolution, declare such vacancy to exist and shall forthwith appoint an eligible person to fill the same until December 31st following the next regular municipal election at which time the office shall be filled for the unexpired term."

Section 19: Salary of council members be increased from seven dollars and fifty cents per meeting for each meeting of the council actually attended to ten to fifteen dollars per meeting.

"The members of the council shall receive a salary of \$100.00 per year. The mayor shall receive a salary of \$300.00 per year. In addition thereto both councilmen and mayor are to receive \$10.00 for each regular meeting."

PUBLICATIONS - We need more information on the invoices we are sent, at least the name of the person ordering the materials. The form the National uses is more helpful. It would also help if the charges for the individual publications would show on the packing list as well as on the one sent to the Treasurer. (We were recently billed for 2,000 "WHo Me?" flyers and a number of precinct caucus kits not ordered by our League.)

Also, we feel that the wholesale price of the publication should not be printed on the publication. We feel we should be able to buy at a discounted price (at least on quantity purchases), and resell at the price printed on the publication, and not be out the additional 5% that we are charged.

We are also concerned about the lack of response and leadership on important issues, such as the national water item. This is vital in our state, as in others, and we need strong leadership. We've been groping for the information we need to be effective. We are up against high-salaried industrial scientists and lawyers, and aweak approach isn't adequate.

CONSENSUS questions should be more objective (especially the ones on state taxes).

We have been disappointed at the lack of activity on our national UN item. We witness a good deal of activity against the Liberty Amendment and feel we would be ill advised to remove it from our agenda at this time. As we mention in our Second Round National Program suggestions, we were just last week called upon for information to fight a strong group (The Central Minnesota Conservative Club) who had been able to recommend a resolution favoring study of the Liberty Amendment to the Stearns County Republican Convention. It was tabled as a result of information we got to some of the concerned Republican regulars. This has been fought in the last two or probably many more sessions of our State Legislature Never in history have our liberties been more in jeopardy. We see many of the same methods in operation that ushered in the McCarthy period.

ANNUAL REPORTS - Are they necessary? We would rather have the effort required by our very busy board members put to more constructive purposes. Surely the information in local bulletins should be adequate - and less burdensome to our very busy state and national board members as well.

Cur Board would like to suggest a review of the Travel Equalization Fund. We had interest this year/sending delegates to the National Convention because it/hear and we though it would possibily be with-In reach. But the Travel Equalization Fund raises the cost to the point where we just do not feel it can/justified in our budget. In our case the people who were planning to attend were going to furnish their own transportation, but they can hardly be asked to pay an extra \$20 each, so the additional cost would have to be absorbed by the League (which in effect doubles the registration cost). We doubt that we are the only small League that faces this problem and we question the fact that a small League in California would be helped enough through the Fund to enable them to send delegates. And does it prove to be a factor either way for Leagues with large membership? We see and understand the merits of the Fund, but is the total effect an encouragement or adeterrent to Convention attendance? Is it possible that some consideration might be given to exempting small Leagues from the Fund? We realize here you would have to define what constitutes a "small League", and on the national scale it would be impossible for us to judge, would you consider under 50 members a reasonable number? Your impression to this alternative may be that it would be unfair to the Leagues with a larger membership, and it may wellbe. but again we can draw conclusions only from the information available to us, and as we look at our state's financial picture we find that our per member contribution to state and national services is greater in many instances than that of Leagues with large membership, renging as high as \$3 per member more. We ask that you explore these factors and evaluate the Fund to see if it is serving the pure pose for which it is intended.

Minneapolis Board members were totified in advance that they would discuss this quantion at their February Board meeting.

Most of the questions raised during the discussion period had to do with League program making procedures. These were variously described as "cumbersone," "inflexible," "unnecessarily time consuming," and " a high price to pay in order to be a democratic organization." One member commented that we "keep taking our own temperature all the time" through the consensus process. It was suggested that we should delegate more authority to competent committees empowered to take a stand, letting them decide how to apply broad general positions in specific situations.

There was some feeling that we have a conflict within our ranks between members who are activists and those who want the League to be a study organization; this produces frustrations on both sides. The comment was made that we often keep rehashing old items when we might be working for a cause. The familiar complaint that our members cannot cope with all the items on our very broad program was repeated.

It was recommended that we make a more active effort to encourage TIMES FOR ACTION and that we try to enlist the support of other organizations and non-members to reinforce our own efforts.

One member suggested that we beware of our League lingo - that we do away with "agenda," "CR's," and "consensus"bit and talk in terms of "this year's program" or "position" or "long term program." She felt that we discourage newcomers and persons who are not full-time volunteers - that we are needlessly selective in those at whom our talk is aimed. (The single list national program proposed this year should, of course eléminate some of the jargon.)

- 1. making all levels of League more aware of the pitfalls of careless wording, phrasing, etc.
- 2. consulting with professionals in the fields of question@making (such as market research or opinion polling professionals) to get some information on the basic principles and general guidelines for the construction of good objective meaningful questions.
- 3. using publications and workshops, get this information and guidance out to the local Leagues.
