Sorry about the delay. I've worked my way through the Cong Records & I think I've figured out what has passed and what hasn't, but it's a real job figuring it out. Some rather interesting quotes on League program were buried in the CR. I don't know what use you might make of them, perhaps as fillers...

Debate on the Fannin Amendment to the Tax Bill. The amendment would revoke tax exemption of any organization which supports or opposes a candidate or political party or which carries on voter registration drives. Senator Mondale led the opposition to the amendment and said, in part,

"The effect of the amendment would, for example, quite literally put the League of Women Voters out of business. The League has a major commitment to voter registration projects. It is ironic that that commitment is being threatened at a time when the League has just embarked on a major national campaign emphasizing the value of the right to vote. The League has designated 1970 as 'the year of the voter' and intends to do all in its power to alert citizens to the value of the ballot in our society.

"The League had its beginnings 50 years ago when the vote was granted to women. It has not forgotten its heritage nor its determination to involve all citizens in our system of representative government... Thousands of Leaguers participate in voter registration activities - knocking on doors; providing transportation; baby sitting; telephoning; or whatever it takes to get people registered.

"The list of League accomplishments relating to voter registration projects is almost endless. They have written an enviable record in the voting field and all of us owe them a debt of gratitude. Any curtailment of their activities would be a serious blow to our political process."

(The amendment was defeated 27-59 - McCarthy, Mondale voting Nay; Congressional Record, December 8, 1969)

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Representative Quie, speaking on behalf of the Ayres-Quie-Green substitute to the Economic Opportunity Act, "...the substitute bill provides an orderly procedure whereby a State which wished to do so, and which could meet the requirements of the Director and of the existing law, could coordinate and supervise local community action and VISTA volunteer programs, and could approve applications of such agencies in accordance with the law and with the guidelines of the Director. In addition, the State economic opportunity office would provide administrative review to assure sound financial accounting and program evaluation. The State economic opportunity offices would take over many of the functions of the regional offices of OEO, and would do so in a manner responsive to the people of the State who elect their Governor.

"The substitute would require that the State first set up an economic opportunity council, broadly representative of the economic, social welfare, religious, educational, and governmental resources of the State, which would oversee and advise on the conduct of the program and would devise a long-range plan for attacking the causes and effects of poverty in the State. The State antipoverty program would then be related to accomplishing the objectives of that plan devised by the people of the State who best know the problems

of the State.

"This is not a State 'takeover' of the Federal antipoverty program, and it ~~is~~ absolutely is not a State 'takeover' of local community action programs....I submit that this cannot fairly be criticized as an effort 'to turn back the clock.'" CR, Dec. 4, 1969

Congressman Donald Fraser (DFL-Minn. 5th District) criticized the substitute, "It would, among other things, give the responsibility for the conduct of the VISTA program to the Governors of the 50 States. It would substitute 50 separate programs related only in a superficial, nominal way and it would substitute staggering duplication for efficient control. Each State would conduct its own recruiting and selection and assignment of volunteers. The need for volunteers would be met only if there was a sufficient number of qualified volunteers within that particular State. The administrative costs would jump enormously. The problem of matching volunteers to sponsors would be almost impossible."

The substitute was opposed by the Nixon administration, the LNW. It was defeated 163-231

Commenting on the Murphy amendment to the Economic Opportunity Act, which would allow governors veto power over legal services, Governor LeVander wrote Congressman Fraser,

"I wish to declare my opposition to the 'Murphy Amendment' that would limit the OEO Legal Services program. It is my belief that states should be concerned and involved to a greater extent in assuring proper conduct in Community Action and other OEO programs. But, we must, at the same time, assure the poor and those working on behalf of the poor in our nation, that they have access to the legal process. Only through an unfettered Legal Services program can this assurance be given."

The amendment was removed in conference.

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MacGregor (R-Minn 3rd) speaking in opposition to the Senate rider which would have stopped the "Philadelphia Plan" of increasing minority employment. (A plan of voluntary goals worked out with the Department of Labor.) ~~& for minority hiring~~

"The revised Philadelphia Plan is not in conflict with any provision of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. It is a lawful implementation of the provisions of Executive Order 11246. It should be enforced in accordance with its terms in the award of Government contracts...The purpose of the plan is to place squarely upon the contractor the burden of broadening his recruitment base whether within or without the existing union referral system, as he, the contractor, shall determine. The contractor's obligation is phrased primarily in terms of goals and not quotas.

The elimination of the Philadelphia plan was ~~xx~~ added to the Supplemental Appropriations Bill. It was voted ~~xx~~ out <sup>by the report</sup> both the House and Senate.

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Minnesota's Congressmen are showing a great deal of interest in attacking the problems of environmental pollution. Senator Mondale has recently been named chairman of a new task force on improving environmental quality ~~by the~~ for the Democratic National Committee.

Congressman Quie, a US delegate to NATO parliamentary conference, noted a tremendous interest in pollution problems. NATO has now set up a committee on preserving the environment.

Congressman Blatnik was a major force behind mobilizing the Citizen's Crusade for Clean Water which did get \$800 million appropriated for sewage plant construction.

Bills have been introduced to:  
Declare an environmental decade - Karp, Fraser, Blatnik.  
Establish education programs promoting understanding of environmental quality and ecological balance - Quie, MacGregor, Zwach.  
Mandate states to have standards more restrictive than the Atomic Energy Commission - Quie, MacGregor.  
Establish a Standing Committee on Environment in the House to consider all legislation dealing with environmental quality - Quie, Nelsen, Zwach

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D.C. petition campaign will be stressed in the January or February National Voter. The campaign week is April 15-22. I don't know what you want to do and when - maybe little reminders in your next issue, maybe a more personal angle in this one.

The League has launched the Year of the Voter, 1970. It is our way of celebrating the 50th anniversary, through public service activity. It is also the 100th anniversary of Negro suffrage.

"There is still much unfinished business before we can reach the goal of full participation in the democratic process," said Mrs. Benson, national LWW president.

One of the most glaring pieces of unfinished business is the disenfranchised state of the District of Columbia. The issue is simple. In America we believe that all people have the right and duty to vote, to have a voice in shaping the policies that control their lives. This basic right is denied to the residents of ~~the~~ D.C. They have no vote in their local city government. They have no vote or even voice in Congress. (It's been only in the last few years that they have been given the right to vote for President and for their school board.)

The League is going to petition Congress for a constitutional amendment for Congressional representation. Every League member should participate, all local Leagues should organize their campaign

to get signatures. This demonstration of grass roots concern will be assembled and presented at the national Convention in Washington in May.

In Minnesota we have a ~~desire~~ incentive to wage a vigorous drive for support for the Congressional representation. Two of our Congressmen, Nelsen, 2nd District and Donald Fraser, 5th District are on the Washington, DC Committee. Congressman Nelsen, as ranking Republican on the committee will play a very decisive role in legislation for a non-voting Congressional member and DC self-government. Congressman Clark MacGregor <sup>is</sup> ~~is~~ on the House Judiciary Committee. It will be his committee that must approve any constitutional amendments.

Since 1924 the League has had as one of its tasks, "To give the District of Columbia representation in the Congress...". Let us give D.C. residents and ourselves a meaningful birthday present. Let's collect lots of signatures and build lots of support for Congressional representation for DC.

Water:

The Citizens' Clean Water Crusade, which means your letters, is on the verge of achieving its objective, the full funding of \$1 billion for construction of sewage facilities. The Senate has passed this amount, the House \$600 million (almost three times the budgeted amount). The bill will now go to conference. Letters stressing the \$1 billion will still be useful.

When the bill left the House Appropriations Committee with the \$600 million figure, Mrs. Benson wrote the following letter to the House:

"Dear Mr. Dingell: Letters and telephone calls to the League's national office say League members want the full \$1 billion appropriated in fiscal 1970 for construction of sewage treatment plants and intercepton sewers. The public is tired of rhetoric about cleanup; they want action.

The League of Women Voters thinks \$1 billion in federal help is needed and can be used. We have considered the arguments advanced to show that a smaller appropriations would be adequate for the job that needs doing. These arguments we find unconvincing.

Year in and year out, League members work to help pass local and state bond issues for water. Wherever they live, they find that assurance of federal aid is necessary to win public support. If treatment plants are to be built or improved to the extent necessary to control water pollution, the states must be able to plan firmly on their allocations from \$1 billion in 1970. Unless we can move positively toward facilities with the capacity and degree of treatment needed, the effort that went into setting state water quality standards will be wasted.

The great variety of organizations taking part in the Citizens' Crusade for Clean Water demonstrates how widespread is the feeling that more tax dollars should be spent on cleaning up our streams and coastal waters. I am sure that members of all the organizations in the Crusade join with the League of Women Voters in congratulating you and Representatives Saylor, Blatnik, Feighan, McClosky, Reuss, and Wright for spearheading appropriation of \$1 billion for the federal share of sewage facility construction.

All our Leagues have been delighted to see the roll of supporters increase. We congratulate each of the Congressmen who has pledged his support for full funding for clean water! We will be pleased to see them joined by many others when the vote is taken. Passage of the \$1 billion appropriation will be a signal to the people that our elected representatives are responding seriously to public determination to control water pollution."

The \$1 billion was narrowly defeated in the House, but there is still the chance that the conference committee will agree to the Senate's higher figure.

Representative Blatnik, Minnesota, 8th District, wrote the League, "Thanks a million for the splendid, untiring support we received from the League of Women Voters. Without the enthusiastic efforts and the active support of League members from throughout the country, we could not have come so close, and surely would not have managed to nearly triple, as we did, the budget request for funding of the Clean Water Restoration Act."

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The Senate, November 10, passed a resolution "Expressing the sense of the Senate that the United States should actively participate in the 1972 United Nations Conference on Human Environment."

The resolution to convene the conference was adopted by the General Assembly December 3, 1968. At that time it was introduced by Sweden with the United States and 49 other nations joining in sponsorship.

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Senator Gaylord Nelson, Wisconsin, has announced a teach-in next spring on campuses all across the nation on the crisis of environment. There will be symposiums, convocations, panel discussions and outdoor rallies among students, scientists and faculty members as well as labor, conservation, women's and other citizen organizations. The special day, still to be announced, will launch a popular movement to demand a national environment program much as we have a national defense program and on much the same scale. A Washington office to coordinate the event will be opened.

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#### Indian Education:

The appropriation bill has passed both houses which will enable Minnesota's schools serving reservation areas to start kindergartens. In the two versions of the bill as they came to conference, the House had provided nothing, the Senate had \$2.3 million. The final figure set was \$1.5 million.

It is Congress' feeling that by the time necessary contracts can be executed with the several State education agencies, this sum will be sufficient for the fiscal year 1970. It is unlikely that new kindergarten classes can be initiated before the start of a new school semester in January.

Perhaps most important of all, a new program is underway and this amount will be a part of the Indian education budget base next year.

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#### East - West Trade:

This bill HR 4293 greatly easing trade restrictions has been pushed by the strong leadership of Senators Muskie and Mondale. At the present time, the conference committee accepted the Senate version and the Senate has approved the conference report. The House has not acted yet on it. It is not certain that the House will accept. Immediate communication to Minnesota's House members urging acceptance of the conference committee version of the bill will still be useful.

One-man, one-vote - calling a constitutional convention:

The Wisconsin assembly, November 4, defeated by 62-36 a resolution to petition Congress to call a Constitutional Convention. Wisconsin could have been the last of the 34 states needed to force the issue. Of the remaining 33, Utah's petition was invalidated in a federal district court because it was adopted by a malapportioned legislature (this is being appealed), and the attorney general of Oklahoma has ruled his state's petition had expired.

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Summary of Mrs. Benson's testimony before the Senate Finance Committee concerning tax-exempt foundations.

"Expresses concern that unless it is absolutely clear that the League's Education Fund and Overseas Education Fund are not nonoperating private foundations, private foundations will withhold contributions. Indicates that the line between private foundations and publicly-supported charities in the bill is a shadowy one.

"Suggests that 1) private foundations be defined more narrowly and 2) the effective date be deferred until after Treasury has promulgated final regulations. Supports the Treasury proposal to consider distributions to private foundations from other private foundations as 'qualified' (and therefore immune from the tax on disqualified distributions) if the recipient organization applies the contribution directly to charitable activities within one year of receipt.

"Activities to influence legislation - Feels that the proposed language on restricting activities to influence legislation will adversely affect the educational work of the League, since it will be difficult to define what is "nonpartisan research."





STATEMENT TO CONGRESSIONAL AND SENATORIAL PANEL  
ON NATIONAL PRIORITIES AND MILITARY SPENDING

Trade Union Center, St. Paul, Minnesota, May 23, 1969  
Presented by Mrs. Ralph Ebbott

As spokesman for the more than 5,700 members of the League of Women Voters in Minnesota, I appreciate the opportunity to express to your panel some of our priorities for national action. Our statement discusses three national matters of great importance to our membership: foreign policy, human resources, and water resources. This presentation combines efforts of our State Board with those of the Minneapolis League, our largest local organization with 1,000 members. So, while the section on Human Resources relates specifically to the Minneapolis scene, it nevertheless reflects general problems of concern to all Leaguers.

Our local and state League organizations and the national League of Women Voters have no explicit position on defense policy or defense expenditures as such. We have reached agreement within our organization, however, on the very great importance of reducing the growing gap between rich and poor nations internationally and on narrowing the gulf between rich and poor within the United States. We also agree that our nation must promote comprehensive long-range planning for conservation and development of water resources and improvement of water quality.

First, to the issue of foreign policy. We must register our deep concern at the decrease in funds available to improve the lot of the "have-nots" at both the international and domestic levels. It has been said that the war in Vietnam has been paid for by the most miserable on earth in terms of benefits which they might otherwise have received. The same point may be made with regard to the evidently higher priority recently accorded by Congress to defense spending in general.

Recent developments in the funding of American foreign policy deeply concern League members. On the one hand, we are warned by experts that unless the developed countries greatly increase their foreign economic assistance, misery in the less developed countries will soon reach crisis proportions. Furthermore, as C. P. Snow suggested recently, wealthy nations may be likely to find themselves in a "state of siege" if greatly increased assistance is not provided for poorer, overpopulated nations. On the other hand, we see Congress appropriating the smallest amount for foreign aid since the inception of the American aid program 20 years ago. We are particularly disturbed to note that some of the more innovative programs and agencies - such as the Alliance for Progress, the International Development Association, and the Asian Bank - have been especially deprived of appropriations.

The aid program we do finance is further minimized by the spending of most of these funds in the United States: 91% in 1968. The mounting interest burden the less developed countries must bear further reduces the amounts of money available for development.

We are dismayed to see drastic cuts of modest requests in foreign aid while large military aid and defense budgets survive relatively unscathed.

This discrepancy in funding appears to suggest that something of a "siege" mentality already exists in this country. We regret the emphasis on a negative protection of the United States at the expense of a positive policy to make past promises credible. The United States, through continued policy statements and past aid programs, has directly contributed to the revolution of rising expectations on the part of the less developed world. A retreat from this policy can be viewed only as a false commitment by these people.

A similar picture seems to characterize Congressional domestic policy in recent years. In studying the topic of Human Resources, the League of Women Voters has taken a strong position of support for equality of opportunity in education, employment and housing.

Locally, the Minneapolis League has studied and supports the local anti-poverty effort. We are very concerned that now, just when these programs have begun to provide some disadvantaged citizens with meaningful participation in our society, the threat of cut-back or even cut-off of funds continues. Uncertainty and inadequate funding have plagued these programs since their beginning. This record is hardly convincing evidence of a strong national commitment to develop innovative solutions to the multi-faceted problems of poverty.

The local Headstart situation is an example. Studies and experience have clearly shown that the intensive year-round program is more effective than the brief, six-week summer session for these children. Yet interested Minneapolis citizens and public officials had to exert concentrated pressures on both regional and national OEO staff in order to obtain funds for the current year round program which serves only 100 of the more than 1,000 Minneapolis youngsters who need this experience. A rewarding local effort by the Minneapolis Urban Coalition has raised enough private money to include another 140. But we are still far short of meeting the need, and the Minneapolis school system is in no financial position to take on the task.

In a sense, the very success of poverty programs in raising the awareness and the expectations of disadvantaged citizens has created problems. This month the Hennepin County antipoverty board is struggling with the dilemma of how best to distribute funds for 1969 summer youth programs. The process involves hard, unpopular decisions. The same number of dollars as were available last summer has been allocated to our community. Inflation means that these dollars will buy less. Yet this year valid program proposals have come from more resident groups than ever before, including several American Indian organizations for the first time. These groups have been encouraged to form, develop programs, and use channels for seeking funds. Then their hopes are cut by two-thirds or more.

The League supports the Model Cities program. In Minneapolis, we admire the tremendous citizen involvement, the great amounts of time and effort which residents and officials have invested in the planning process. In view of the Nixon administration's recent announcement of Model Cities "reorganization," will this program - as John Herbers suggests in the New York Times - turn out to be "another pipe dream?" We earnestly hope not.

The commitments that count are promises backed by dollars. As a nation we have raised expectations which we now seem unwilling to meet, expectations that it is possible to narrow the gap between rich and poor in this country. Are we creating the potential for a domestic "state of siege?"

Housing problems - condition, supply and discrimination - in Minneapolis and Hennepin County are another concern of the Minneapolis League. The crucial need for an increased supply of low and moderate income housing here and in the nation as a whole has been frequently documented. The harsh and shameful fact that more than 20 million Americans continue to occupy more than six million substandard housing units must project this issue upward on our nation's priority list. The role of the federal government is not new in the area of housing. Indeed, 1968 has been called a significant year in the advance of federal housing policy. But our local study has shown that the Twin Cities area does not make adequate use of federal programs. There is little public knowledge of how to go about it. Furthermore, Congress has rarely funded housing and urban development legislation adequately. Some desirable programs are simply out of money.

Efforts to achieve equality of opportunity in education are stymied by insufficient funds. Quality education for all students has long been a concern of the Minneapolis League. We know the needs and have lobbied to increase program funds from state sources as well as from federal sources such as Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. So far these sources have been inadequate, despite the widespread recognition that cities themselves can no longer find the tax dollars to provide adequate modern education for all children.

Our national League position also states our support for federal efforts "to help communities bring about racial integration of their school systems." Such efforts will require a greater commitment of national will and money than have been shown to date.

The continuation of the set of Congressional priorities in recent years, as between foreign assistance and anti-poverty legislation on the one hand and defense policy on the other, may tend to prove the most pessimistic observers correct. Will such a trend over time make our country appear to other nations as a "garrison state" preoccupied with weaponry at the expense of constructive efforts in the international arena? Will such a trend, ironically, leave an increasingly indefensible domestic scene at home?

Another one of the nation's great domestic problems is securing, for the present and in the future, adequate quantities of good water. We as a nation are beginning to recognize the water crisis created by rising popula-

tion, increasing industrialization, and urban growth. Since 1956, the League has been concerned with this issue. We have worked for passage and implementation of amendments to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, the Water Quality Act, Clean Water Restoration Act, and the Water Quality Improvement Act just recently approved by the House of Representatives. These laws have done a great service to the country by requiring quality standards for interstate waters and providing the mechanism to help finance the needed treatment.

This crucial need to clean up water systems and to keep up with growing population concentrations has not received the necessary financial priority. Funds have been woefully inadequate. Former Interior Secretary Udall estimates that there is \$26 billion worth of work to be done over a five-year period to clean up the nation's waterways. In fiscal 1969, Congress appropriated \$214 million as its share in the work. This is far too little to stimulate the needed state and local investment.

If pollution is not stopped and corrected, it can become difficult to reverse. Lake Erie represents this process, to our great shame as caretakers of the earth. Experts say it will require 500 years to correct what man has done to that lake in the past 25 years.

Former President Johnson said in 1965, "The clear fresh waters that were our national heritage have become dumping grounds for garbage and filth. They poison our fish, they breed disease, they despoil landscapes. No one has a right to use America's rivers and America's waterways that belong to all the people, as a sewer ..... this sort of carelessness and selfishness simply ought to be stopped; and more, it just must be reversed."

Mr. Hickel, Secretary of the Interior, recently said he favors "gradually upgrading clean water standards until such now-polluted rivers as the Hudson and the Potomac flow as pure as mountain streams ..... possibly in a period of ten years that could be obtained." This cannot possibly happen to the water in Minnesota or in the nation in ten years unless we reorient our priorities and assume this as a moral and financial obligation.

In conclusion, we feel very grave concern at the discrepancy between funding for international and domestic programs of a constructive nature and the funding for defense policy. We are becoming in a very real sense what we will be. And years of underinvesting in constructive and innovative foreign and domestic policies are bound to be interpreted as evidence of their low ranking in our hierarchy of values. As the Durants stated so eloquently in The Lessons of History, "Our states, being ourselves multiplied, are what we are. They write our natures in bolder type, and do our good and evil on an elephantine scale." We in the League believe that our nation possesses a more positive and humane nature than our current priorities would suggest.

HEARINGS AND DISCUSSION SCHEDULED IN TWIN CITIES  
ON NATIONAL PRIORITIES AND MILITARY SPENDING

Can the United States get its national priorities and military spending under control?

In response to the growing concern over fragmented American policy, U.S. Senators Eugene J. McCarthy (D-Minn) and Walter F. Mondale (D-Minn) and U. S. Representatives John A. Blatnik (D-Minn), Joseph E. Karth (D-Minn) and Donald M. Fraser (D-Minn) announced today that they will sponsor open public hearings on Friday, May 23rd, and sponsor public meetings on Saturday, May 24th, in the Twin Cities to explore the issues of U. S. national priorities and military spending.

In a joint statement, the five members of the Minnesota Congressional Delegation said, "In the next few months, it is very likely that Congress will move toward a major showdown on the basic questions of this nation's domestic, foreign and defense policies.

First, to the issue of foreign policy. We must register our deep concern at the decrease in funds available to improve the lot of the "have-nots" at both the international and domestic levels. It has been said that the war in Vietnam has been paid for by the most miserable on earth in terms of benefits which they might otherwise have received. The same point may be made with regard to the evidently higher priority recently accorded by Congress to defense spending in general.

Recent developments in the funding of American foreign policy deeply concern League members. On the one hand, we are warned by experts that unless the developed countries greatly increase their foreign economic assistance, misery in the less developed countries will soon reach crisis proportions. Furthermore, as C. P. Snow suggested recently, wealthy nations may be likely to find themselves in a "state of siege" if greatly increased assistance is not provided for poorer, overpopulated nations. On the other hand, we see Congress appropriating the smallest amount for foreign aid since the inception of the American aid program 20 years ago. We are particularly disturbed to note that some of the more innovative programs and agencies - such as the Alliance for Progress, the International Development Association, and the Asian Bank - have been especially deprived of appropriations.

The aid program we do finance is further minimized by the spending of most of these funds in the United States: 91% in 1968. The mounting interest burden the less developed countries must bear further reduces the amounts of money available for development.

We are dismayed to see drastic cuts of modest requests in foreign aid while large military aid and defense budgets survive relatively unscathed.

This discrepancy in funding appears to suggest that something of a "siege" mentality already exists in this country. We regret the emphasis on a negative protection of the United States at the expense of a positive policy to make past promises credible. The United States, through continued policy statements and past aid programs, has directly contributed to the revolution of rising expectations on the part of the less developed world. A retreat from this policy can be viewed only as a false commitment by these people.

A similar picture seems to characterize Congressional domestic policy in recent years. In studying the topic of Human Resources, the League of Women Voters has taken a strong position of support for equality of opportunity in education, employment and housing.

Locally, the Minneapolis League has studied and supports the local anti-poverty effort. We are very concerned that now, just when these programs have begun to provide some disadvantaged citizens with meaningful participation in our society, the threat of cut-back or even cut-off of funds continues. Uncertainty and inadequate funding have plagued these programs since their beginning. This record is hardly convincing evidence of a strong national commitment to develop innovative solutions to the multi-faceted problems of poverty.

The local Headstart situation is an example. Studies and experience have clearly shown that the intensive year-round program is more effective than the brief, six-week summer session for these children. Yet interested Minneapolis citizens and public officials had to exert concentrated pressures on both regional and national OEO staff in order to obtain funds for the current year round program which serves only 100 of the more than 1,000 Minneapolis youngsters who need this experience. A rewarding local effort by the Minneapolis Urban Coalition has raised enough private money to include another 140. But we are still far short of meeting the need, and the Minneapolis school system is in no financial position to take on the task.

In a sense, the very success of poverty programs in raising the awareness and the expectations of disadvantaged citizens has created problems. This month the Hennepin County antipoverty board is struggling with the dilemma of how best to distribute funds for 1969 summer youth programs. The process involves hard, unpopular decisions. The same number of dollars as were available last summer has been allocated to our community. Inflation means that these dollars will buy less. Yet this year valid program proposals have come from more resident groups than ever before, including several American Indian organizations for the first time. These groups have been encouraged to form, develop programs, and use channels for seeking funds. Then their hopes are cut by two-thirds or more.

The League supports the Model Cities program. In Minneapolis, we admire the tremendous citizen involvement, the great amounts of time and effort which residents and officials have invested in the planning process. In view of the Nixon administration's recent announcement of Model Cities "reorganization," will this program - as John Herbers suggests in the New York Times - turn out to be "another pipe dream?" We earnestly hope not.

The commitments that count are promises backed by dollars. As a nation we have raised expectations which we now seem unwilling to meet, expectations that it is possible to narrow the gap between rich and poor in this country. Are we creating the potential for a domestic "state of siege?"

Housing problems - condition, supply and discrimination - in Minneapolis and Hennepin County are another concern of the Minneapolis League. The crucial need for an increased supply of low and moderate income housing here and in the nation as a whole has been frequently documented. The harsh and shameful fact that more than 20 million Americans continue to occupy more than six million substandard housing units must project this issue upward on our nation's priority list. The role of the federal government is not new in the area of housing. Indeed, 1968 has been called a significant year in the advance of federal housing policy. But our local study has shown that the Twin Cities area does not make adequate use of federal programs. There is little public knowledge of how to go about it. Furthermore, Congress has rarely funded housing and urban development legislation adequately. Some desirable programs are simply out of money.

Efforts to achieve equality of opportunity in education are stymied by insufficient funds. Quality education for all students has long been a concern of the Minneapolis League. We know the needs and have lobbied to increase program funds from state sources as well as from federal sources such as Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. So far these sources have been inadequate, despite the widespread recognition that cities themselves can no longer find the tax dollars to provide adequate modern education for all children.

Our national League position also states our support for federal efforts "to help communities bring about racial integration of their school systems." Such efforts will require a greater commitment of national will and money than have been shown to date.

The continuation of the set of Congressional priorities in recent years, as between foreign assistance and anti-poverty legislation on the one hand and defense policy on the other, may tend to prove the most pessimistic observers correct. Will such a trend over time make our country appear to other nations as a "garrison state" preoccupied with weaponry at the expense of constructive efforts in the international arena? Will such a trend, ironically, leave an increasingly indefensible domestic scene at home?

Another one of the nation's great domestic problems is securing, for the present and in the future, adequate quantities of good water. We as a nation are beginning to recognize the water crisis created by rising popula-

tion, increasing industrialization, and urban growth. Since 1956, the League has been concerned with this issue. We have worked for passage and implementation of amendments to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, the Water Quality Act, Clean Water Restoration Act, and the Water Quality Improvement Act just recently approved by the House of Representatives. These laws have done a great service to the country by requiring quality standards for interstate waters and providing the mechanism to help finance the needed treatment.

This crucial need to clean up water systems and to keep up with growing population concentrations has not received the necessary financial priority. Funds have been woefully inadequate. Former Interior Secretary Udall estimates that there is \$26 billion worth of work to be done over a five-year period to clean up the nation's waterways. In fiscal 1969, Congress appropriated \$214 million as its share in the work. This is far too little to stimulate the needed state and local investment.

If pollution is not stopped and corrected, it can become difficult to reverse. Lake Erie represents this process, to our great shame as caretakers of the earth. Experts say it will require 500 years to correct what man has done to that lake in the past 25 years.

Former President Johnson said in 1965, "The clear fresh waters that were our national heritage have become dumping grounds for garbage and filth. They poison our fish, they breed disease, they despoil landscapes. No one has a right to use America's rivers and America's waterways that belong to all the people, as a sewer ..... this sort of carelessness and selfishness simply ought to be stopped; and more, it just must be reversed."

Mr. Hickel, Secretary of the Interior, recently said he favors "gradually upgrading clean water standards until such now-polluted rivers as the Hudson and the Potomac flow as pure as mountain streams ..... possibly in a period of ten years that could be obtained." This cannot possibly happen to the water in Minnesota or in the nation in ten years unless we reorient our priorities and assume this as a moral and financial obligation.

In conclusion, we feel very grave concern at the discrepancy between funding for international and domestic programs of a constructive nature and the funding for defense policy. We are becoming in a very real sense what we will be. And years of underinvesting in constructive and innovative foreign and domestic policies are bound to be interpreted as evidence of their low ranking in our hierarchy of values. As the Durants stated so eloquently in The Lessons of History, "Our states, being ourselves multiplied, are what we are. They write our natures in bolder type, and do our good and evil on an elephantine scale." We in the League believe that our nation possesses a more positive and humane nature than our current priorities would suggest.
