#### Consensus Report On Ethics

June 1960

The Minnetonka league is in favor of ethics in government and is happy to be studying the subject - but was unable to reach consensus on the questions concerning conflict of interests and lobbying.

There was not enough unaminity among the membership to reach consensus and therefore this league does not wish the state board to use the report as a basis for action. We realize the state board is looking for direction from the member leagues but we, in Minnetonka, feel we cannot give direction for any action because we have not studied the subject thoroughly enough. We don't know what action we want to take, if any at all.

Specifically now, this is what the members reported: Four of the eight units thought it was too soon to reach any definite conclusions on a subject introduced for the first time in our units. They were not sure, especially in the area of conflict of interests, that legislative action was desirable. They said that the league has prided itself on its careful study of agenda items before taking a stand or position on them. On the basis of a one unit meeting study, they did not feel they were adequately informed to put the League stamp of approval or disapproval on any bills that might be introduced in the 1961 legislature. They also expressed a wish for a wider latitude of opinion in the questions posed in order to accurately reflect their thinking. They felt that there was too much emphasis on the specific areas and categoried - not enough on the main question: "Is legislation desireable?" They disliked the presumption that the first question would be answered affirmatively making the following questions answerable. Some league'rs said reapportionment is the biggest and most important ethical question -"why worry about the plantings around the commons when the whole commons itself is being stolen from us".

Three units favored legislative action in the area of conflict of interests and would like to see in this legislation, all of the seven questions raised in the questionnaire. However, within this group:

- 9 were against financial disclosure 3 " on the spot disclosure
- 6. " " prohibition of public official representing private interest before a state agency
- 9 against 2 year prohibition of former official representing interest against state in any matter for which he was responsible during state service.
- l against each of the other stipulations listed on the questionnaire.

One unit did not think conflict of interests was an area for legislative action.

Four units agreed that legislative action was desireable for lobbying regulation and though all isx questions concerning lobbyist disclosure should be enacted in legislation.

So much for the report of the 8 units.

Prior to our unit study of this agenda item, we had a general membership meeting with one of the members of the Governor's Committee on Ethics, Mr. William Carlson, as guest speaker.

In our unit study we used the "Ethics and the Public Servant" pamphlet, the Governor's Committee on Ethics report, and the MacDonald newspaper articles.

In conclusion we can only request:

- 1. further study, with
- 2. emphasis on whether or not these questions are legislatively desireable, and
- 3. how practical and how enforceable they would be
- 4. a consessus questionnaire that does not appear slanted to preclude affirmative answers.

Approximately sixty members, in four units, of the St. Cloud League considered the problems of conflicts of interest and lobby regulation at their respective unit meetings. It was generally agreed that legislative action in the two areas is desirable and that all the items listed under lobby regulation are obvious requirements if legislation is enacted.

The conflicts of interest item stimulated the expression of differing opinions. Three units were in favor of including all the items mentioned in some form. They agreed, moreover, that disclosure of sources and amount of income should not be made available to the public. Some members believed that gifts of amount should be included; others felt that the limitation should be \$100 rather than \$50. Many felt that items 3&4 were confusing in wording and that item 6 could be so general as to be unenforceable.

In contrast to the position taken by the other groups, members of the fourth unit wanted to have the financial statements printed in the official county newspapers a few times during the legislative session. They also believed that on the spot disclosure of interest would be used unfairly to sway the public opinion.

One suggestion made was that a review board, specifically some form of enforcement committee, should be required.

It was also pointed out that legislation in the field of ethics should make constituents aware of the necessity for selecting candidates who do not have conflicts of interests.

Summary

All units feel that some legislation is necessary in this area. Most feel that legislation should include disclosure of source and amount of income and disclosure of interest in legislation. Units reporting generally feel that legislation should prohibit public officials from representating private interest before State agencies, and from representating private interest against the State if the State is the complaint. Legislation should also prohibit officials from disclosing confidential information, from accepting private employment that would be imcompatible with public service.

Lastly we feel that legislation should require former officials to wait 2 years before representating private interest against state on any matter for which the public official was responsible during state service.



## Board Report

The Board of Directors reviewed the consensus questions in December 1960 and agreed with the units in the majority of questions.

> Question No. 2- Some Board members suggested a time limit on campaigns and that conventions be held at a later date to curb spending rather than an unrealistic dollar limitation.

Question No. 8-The Board voted one yes and thirteen no . Some members considered this Code similar to a Loyalty Oath and objectionable for that reason.

At the January 19, 1961 Board meeting, Mrs. William Boyce moved that question No. 8 be reconsidered as she felt that the Code of Fair Campaign Practices and its purposes may have been misunderstood.

The question was discussed and the Code read to the Board. A vote was taken.

Two members voted that candidates be <u>required</u> to sign the Code of Fair Practices. Comment- A law in this area would have "teeth" and therefore be more effective.

Fifteen Board members voted that candidates be requested to sign the Code.

- Comment- 1. Objection was taken to the use of the word condemn in the Gode.
  - 2. It would be better to leave this type of thing up to the Fair Campaign Practices Committee.
  - Legislation in this area is almost impossible because it could not be properly inforced.
  - 4. Public knowledge or public rejection would be the best check on this problem.

Attached is the consensus of the Edina League with a few comments.

The interest and enthusiasm in the study of Corrupt Practices and Money in elections was most evident. As usual, the pertinent questions appeared "loaded", "idealistic", and "general" to some. One even termed the questions "just stupid" which would seem to indicate an impatient and intollerant negativism toward the problems being considered.

Most predominent reactions indicated the question of fine line of interpretation and enforceability; the ultimate dependence on personal integrity of people involved; the best possible methods of exposure used, and the hope for adoption of laws similar to those of Florida as possible. The answers to the eight questions were almost unanimous for a change, but the degree of emphases somewhat varied, and all had misgivings of final enforceability.

The League of Women Voters of Falcon Heights answered the consensus questions with these comments:

- 2. One person thought that the information should not be published in the newspapers, but should merely be made available (or accessible) to those who would be interested.
- 3. Public reports should be made during, not just after the campaign. Some thought that publicity money could better be spent by publishing the past record of each candidate. Some thought that publication of #1 should be candidate responsibility, (or party) but that #2 be merely available for publication as straight news. One unit favored the plan of having each candidate's and each party's books available and up to date all during the campaign would insure publication of any infringements or unethical practices.
- 4. Agreement was/that this might not be entirely possible with the citizens committee system of campaign financing. It was suggested that everyone working on behalf of a candidate might be required to take a fair practices oath. (Required by the candidate to protect himself?)
- 5. Limits if set should be reasonable in accordance with today's prices (and tomorrow's). Unlimited campaign expenditures give the advantage to wealthier candidates. Publication of records during campaign would bring out facts, both contributors and expenditures, so public could judge fitness for office by the record. Any limits should be rigidly enforced, and there should be no loopholes, such as 'miscellaneous expenses' or Citizens committees.
  - &7.
- 6./One unit favored regulation of collection methods for both unions and corporations, rather than ban on either type of contribution. Union membership dues should be banned. However, more accurate reporting of income sources might be result of dropped bans. Neither employees of corporations nor union members should be made to contribute. Contributors of any sort—individuals, corporations or other groups—should be listed very carefully, perhaps listing individual's job, position, or employer as well as name and address.
- 8. One unit voted 11-1 'yes' on this question, then changed 2-10 'no' after hearing '1' state her reason. She opposed it as she opposed oaths by teachers of no communist affiliation--breach of liberty. Their comments: We do not want a law or code to handle this. We should aim at individual responsibility, better education of voters. An oath would not stop an unethical person from wrong-doing. Other comments: The code should be used, but not required. It should be available for candidates who would want to use it, even for publicity alone. Deviations should be published as newsworthy material. One unit re-worded your questionaire, 'be asked to sign it.' 'Asking' could be a service of the League of Women Voters.
