Just one more request, from Matt, Scott and myself – It would be nice to know the total number of people that were involved in Community Circles – Steering Committee, Facilitators, Participants – anyone who was involved in the program. – Thanks!

ACTION FORUM

The question has been asked – How many people would you like us to bring to the forum?

We would suggest at least three and more if you are interested in having someone from your community in each of the small group discussions. At this point there will be groups discussing housing, youth, health care, education, legal assistance, and welfare benefits. The other answer is, of course, anyone who wants to come is welcome.

We will also need to know if any of the attendees need translators and if childcare is needed.

Please let me know if a member of your circles would be interested in saying a few words about their experience at the end of the program. We would like to celebrate and wrap up with some words from participants.

MONEY

The final 5% of your pass through grant will be available after your final reports and receipts or invoices have been turned in. Several communities have indicated they will not need the last 5%. The Community Circles Project is out of money as of March 6 (with the exception of the money for the pass through grants and money for limited refreshments at the Action Forum). If you have excess funds due to in-kind donations or additional grants please consider the option of replenishing the LWVMN Community Circles Fund.

OPPORTUNITIES

"Partnership for Preventing Violence: The Six-part Satellite Training Forum," is scheduled for April 14, 2000, from 9AM to 3:00 PM. 



These are Minnesota's newcomers, a second wave of immigration that has significantly increased er foreign-born population. F 95 75

They've come for the same reason the first wave did-opportunity. And they go through the same kind of readjustment stress-language barriers, culture shock, isolation, sense of loss confusion and resulting health problems.

They also bring the same cantural richness and hard-work ethic as the first wave. Our vibrant Twin Cities art scene is already a testament to their influence, and their entrepreneurship is obvious in the large number of successful small businesses and self-help organizations they've started. Immigrants and refugees are part of the new workforce that's helping Minnesota bridge its labor shortage and keep its economy healthy.

Sometimes, we can't help staring at them—their interesting clothes, unfamiliar language and unusual customs. But we may not take time to learn more about them. We probably should. It might help us understand how much a friendly word or gesture can mean when you're in a strange place surrounded by people you don't know. Hi might make us take a risk and offer help, or just a little patience and empathy. It might make us remember that, 100 years ago, our own families were the newcomers.

eroes, all of them—at least they're my heroes, especially the new immigrants, especially the refugees. Everyone makes fun of New York cabdrivers who can't speak English: they're heroes. To give up your country is the hardest thing a person can do: to leave the old familiar places and ship out over the edge of the world to America and learn everything over again different that you learned as a child, learn the new language that you will never be so smart or funny in as in your true language. It takes years to start to feel seminormal, And vet people still come-from Russia, Vietnam and Cambodia and Laos, Ethiopia, Iran, Haiti, Korea, Cuba, Chile, and they come on behalf of their children, and they come for freedom. Not for our land (Russia is as beautiful), not for our culture (they have their own, thank you), not for our system of government (they don't even know about it, may not even agree with it), but for freedom. They are heroes who make an adventure on our behalf, showing by their struggle how precious beyond words freedom is, and if we knew their stories, we could not keep back the tears.

The State Department of Human Services estimates that there are 15,000 Somali refugees in Minnesota, with the vast majority of them having arrived in the past five years. Minnesota has the largest Somali population in the United States.

About Somalia

Somalia gained independence in 1960. With Mogadishu as its capital and nearly 7 million people, the country is mostly desert with a hot climate. Nomads and semi-nomads make up a large portion of the population; others are crop farmers, fishermen or urban dwellers. The average life expectancy is about 46 years. The main language is Somali, which uses the Roman alphabet, and the literacy rate is about 24%.

SOMALIA

People Government

Although most Somalis share the same language, religion and culture, they are divided into groups by deeply ingrained clan structure, such as the Darod, Dir, Isaq and Digil.

Somala has no functioning government and has been the scene of political strile and civil war since the overthrow of Siyad Barre's regime nine years ago set off conflicts among 16 rival factions. Ensuing clan wars and a series of natural disasters (flood, famine and drought) have forced more than 900,000 Somalis, many in a serious state of exhaustion and starvation, to flee to neighboring countries like Kenya and Ethiopia. Others have found shelter in the United States.

Islam

The vast majority of Somalis are Sunni Muslims, but there are different levels of orthodoxy, Islam's fundamental tenet is the existence of one God, Allah, without equal or partner, who created and maintains the world.

Important Islamic beliefs include: 1) angels—two angels attend every person, one records sins and the other, good deeds, 2) prophets, of whom Muhammad was the final and greatest, but which also include Adam, Noah, Moses and Jesus, 3) the Couran, the hollest book of Islam—God's final revelation to man passed orally to Muhammad from the angel Gabriel and 4) the day of judgment which determines eternity in heaven or heil.

Important Islamic practices include: 1) prayer five times a day, 2] giving 2½% of one's annual income in cash or in kind to charity, 3] fasting from dawn until dusk every day during the month of Ramadan (observed in the U.S. near the end of the calendar year) and 4] making a pligrimage to Mecca, Saudi Arabia, the birthplace of Muhammad, at least once if it's affordable. Alms giving is part of wealth purification, a belief that prevents many Muslims from having any involvement with interest and makes it hard for them to deal with western finance.

Somali in Minnesota



Some Somalis in Minnesota were highly educated urban dwellers, some were from coastal regions, others from agricultural regions. The vast majority now live in Minneapolis, with smaller numbers settled in Mochester, Owatonna and Marshall. The State Department of Planning expects more arrivals om Somalia due to recent changes in our immigration policy that permit new visas for family reunification.

Current Situation

Mutual assistance groups have been the first sources of help for Somali refugees. According to the head of one such group, when they first arrived here individuals tried to help each other. As the population has increased,

however, clan/tribe affiliations have been reestablished. Several Somali self-help organizations now exist, such as the Confederation of Somali Community, the Somali Community of Minnesota, the Horn of Africa and the Somalian Womers Association.

Right now, most Somalis are focused on issues of survival and resettlement—finding adequate

justment, overcoming loss and isolation

housing, coping with cultural adjustment, overcoming loss and isolation and learning English. Some ethnic enclave businesses have been developed to serve specific Somali needs. Local Jobs in which Somalis are most visible include parking lot attendant (they are often hired because of their reputation for honesty) and taxi cab driver. Somali women are eagerly joining the workforce. In fact, one of the emerging issues in the American Somali community is women assuming new roles while men seek to maintain old traditions.

Education

In the past three years, the number of Somall students has tripled in Minneapolis schools—making them the third largest group of non-English speaking students. One-fourth of the total student body at Roosevelt High School in Minneapolis is Somali. Half of Somali youngsters have been in the U.S. for less than three years and half live with their mother only. (Many Somali men were civil war casualties.) As their student numbers grow, Somalis are being offered culturally specific academic support and the opportunity to adhere to their religious practices by local schools.

Cultural Highlights

Waaberi, "morning" in Somall, is the name given to the elite group of singers and folk dancers who used to perform at the Somall National Theatre before the civil war. After years of exile, some of these artists have found each other again and are creating a new dawn for Somall music with Waaberi CDs. Unable to carry instruments, Somall nomads learned beat rhythms on whatever was handy. Those ancient nythms serve as accompaniment to a chorus that supports a lead voice as they all sing their way through the old Waaberi sonus about love and death.



About Russia Geographically the largest country in the world the Russian

Geographically the largest country in the largest country in the world, the Russian Federation, or Russia as it's commonly called, is nearly twice the size of the United States and contains 11 time zones and 21

republics.



Three-quarters of the population of 150 million reside in one quarter of the land mass west of the Ural Mountains, while the eastern three-fourths of Russia has vast tracks of unoccupied land. Russian is the official language, and 98% of the population is literate. Life expectancy 64 years.

Under its 1993 constitution, Russia has a democratic, federative government divided into executive, legislative and judicial branches. The president, elected to a four-year term, sets the basic tone for domestic and foreign policy and represents the state at home and abroad. The prime minister appoints the cabinet and administers policy according to constitution, laws and presidential decrees.

RUSSIA

A diversity of populations from the former Soviet Union are often lumped together under the heading of Russian immigrants, but the State Demographic Center estimates that there are 6,000 % currently residing in Minnesota.

Judaism in the Former Soviet Union

Most Russians in the United States are Jews, who fied religious persecution. During the 19th century, despite repressive conditions and high levels of emigration to the U.S., the Jewship operation in Russia grew rapidly to a total of 5.2 million. By 1922, due in part to a civil war that took place in areas where Jews were settled, that rungber lade been reduced by note than half. The Jewish population continued to decline, and because all religious practice was banned under Soviet rule, Jews were semi-assimilated into the larger Russian culture. After perestroyla in the late 1980s, large numbers of Russian Jews began applying to leave the Soviet Union for Israel and the United States.

Judaism is the oldest of the monotheistic faiths. It affirms the existence of one God, Yahweh, who entered into covenant with the descendants of Abraham, God's chosen people, Judaism's holy writings are known as the Torah, specifically the Five Books of Moses (traditionally called the Old Testament by Christians) and the compilation of oral tradition and law known as the Talmud.

Current Situation

While Russian immigrants are dispersed throughout the Twin Cities, Jewish refugees were initially resettled in St. Louis Park, downtown Minneapolis and Highland Park in St. Paul, based on proximity to services. Affordable

Our Fark, downlown Junneapois and riginand Park n St. Paul, based on proximity to services. Affordable housing remains an issue for these groups. Families have gradually begun to move to first ring suburbs, as housing has become available, lewish immigrants have had access to a number of lewish social service agencies in both the east and west metro areas to assist them in resettlement. Also of help is a Russian language newspaper called *The Mirrox*. Emerging issues are intergenerational communication problems and translation/interpretation needs for medical purposes.

For Pentecostal and Baptist Russian immigrants, their first line of support has been faith-based. In the 1980s the new arrivals began to form their own churches, of which six now exist. A number of these churches have started Russian language newspapers.

Cultural Highlights

Russian ballet has contributed enormously to the development of dance throughout the West. Building on a century-long reputation, renowned Russian ballet companies like the Bol'shoy and Kirov tour the world regularly. In the early part of this century, Sergey Diaghilev founded the innovative Ballet Russe, which featured famed dancer Vaslav Nijinsky. Then came ballerina Anna Pavlova and choreographer

George Balanchine. Two of the most admired and influential dancers of this century have been the Russian defectors Rudolf Nureyev and Mikhail Barishnikov—both credited with helping to establish the dominant role of the male dancer in classical ballet.

Russians in Minnesota

The current wave of Russian immigration, which began in the late 1980s, followed the collapse of the Soviet Union and was precipitated by religious persecution of Jews as well as Pentecostal and Baptist Christians in the former Soviet Union Republics. In 1980, no Russian refugee arrivals were recorded in Minnesota; in 1988, there were 69 and by 1989, 721.

The majority of the newcomers are Russian-speaking Jews. Since 1987, more than 3,000 have settled in Minneapolis—making p 10% of its Jewish population. Nearly 50% are over 55 years old—some are in their 90s. Recent economic and political developments in Russia have set the stage for another immigration wave. The majority of the immigrants who are already here are from urban areas, are educated and often hold professional positions such as doctors, teachers and engineers. Many encounter difficulties pursuing their careers due to certification or licensing requirements. During recent years, dozens of small, issian-owned businesses have been started successfully.



About Mexico

Cultural Highlights

Mexico has given the world some of its best writers and artists-from Diego Rivera and the ground-breaking Mexican School of muralists (known for their colorful frescoes) to the architecture of Luis Barragán. famous for distilling the style of old Mexican convents, monasteries and haciendas into modern homes. Writers like Carlos Fuentes (The Death of Artemio Cruzi and Octavio Paz | The Labvrinth of Solitude), who won th 1990 Nobel Prize, have woven the distinctive character of their country into some of the most critically acclaimed literary works of our century. Evidence that immigrants are carrying on these vibrant artistic traditions is clear in the famous Chicano murals of Los Angeles as well as the Mexican murals on St. Paul's West Side and along Lake Street in Minneapolis.

Roman Catholicism

About 90% of Mexicans are Roman Catholics. There are two central ideas to Roman Catholicism: 1) the Church as a teaching authority, which means that the Church is the interpreting agent for the Bible and the Pope speaks officially and infallibly on matters of faith and morals, and 2) the Church as a sacramental agent, which means that the Church institutes sacraments like baptism. penance, holy communion, confirmation, marriage, holy orders and last rites to help its followers live more spiritually. In Mexico, many villages and sectors in the major cities honor a patron saint with festivities usually lasting a week or more.

Mexicans in Minnesota

Mexicans have been settling in Minnesota since the late 19th century. After World War I, Mexican men found work in South St. Paul's meat packing plants, sent for their families and settled along the river flats and, in the 1930s, in Swede Hollow. Not long afterward, an influx of Mexican farm workers came to Minnesota.

By the 1940s, St. Paul's West Side was predominately Mexican. A decade later, Our Lady of Guadalupe Church and a variety of restaurants and shops supported the community, and dexican immigrants moved from the flats to e bluffs above the river. By 1975, Latinos comprised the largest minority community in the state. Many Mexican workers still find employment in Minnesota's meat packing, food service or agricultural industries. Each summer between 15,000 and 20,000 Mexican migrant farm workers come here to work.



Current Situation

Statisticians predict the Spanish-speaking population will be the fastest growing in the state over the next several years. The Mexican community is now spread throughout Minnesota with concentrations in Winona, Scott and Carver counties as well as the southwest metro area. In Watonwan and Spanish-speaking students make up about 15% of the total student body in the public schools. In Minneapolis, Hispanic students make up about 6%; in St. Paul. 8%.



The newer Spanish-speaking immigrants in parts of the metro area and out-state have not always found it easy to assimilate. Families speak of the challenges of schooling and of prejudices, such as being wrongly branded as illegals. The majority of Mexicans are here legally on work permits and many others are U.S. citizens who have relocated here from other parts of the country.

Today, as the Mexican population in Minneapolis grows, St. Stephen's Church has become an informal center for them, offering masses in Spanish and staff who help locate useful services. As on St. Paul's West Side, Mexican entrepreneurs have changed the face of Minneapolis' Lake Street, culminating in the recent opening of Mercado Central at Lake and Bloomington. The Mercado, a cooperative shopping and cultural center, features 45 shops in a market bazaar atmosphere. Currently, four newspapers-La Prensa de Minnesota, La Voz Latina, Latino Midwest and Nuestra Gente-serve the state's Spanish-speaking population.



From 1975 to 1990, nearly 17,000 Hmong immigrated to Minnesota. The first wave arrived in the late 1970s with many families reuniting in St. Paul from other resettlement areas around the country. Because Hmong have a strong sense of clan and family ties, it's been natural for each new wave of immigrants from refugee camps in Thailand to find their way to Minnesota, Recently, as many as 8,000 Hmong have come to Minnesota from the Fresno, California area. Most Hmong live in the Twin Cities, with a high concentration in St. Paul, Hmong now ranks behind English as the most spoken language in the Minneapolis and St. Paul School Districts.

After almost 20 years of assimilation into American culture, the Hmong still struggle to balance the demands of a strong cultural heritage and the challenge of being Hmong American at work and in school. The community has supported a variety of entrepreneurial efforts, including three Hmong funeral homes that follow American burial customs while continuing to practice traditional Hmong funeral rites. The increasing number of Hmongowned businesses has led to the establishment of a local Hmong Chamber of Commerce.

Many Hmong have started family and community gardens. Our local farmers' markets reflect the large number of families who supplement their income with weekend produce sales. Hmong often invest in family-owned businesses with relatives providing start-up funds and operating capital. Examples include the many shops along University Avenue in St. Paul. The Neighborhood Development Center has assisted many new Hmong ventures, among them the Hmong Arts, Books, and Crafts Store, and the local Hmong radio and television programs that help keep the community informed and connected. Two newspapers-the Hmong Times and the Hmong Tribune-serve the same purpose.



The first Hmong who came to this country were farmers and villagers who had worked undercover for the U.S. Army and C.I.A. during the Vietnam War and were forced to flee to refugee camps when the war ended. Hmong had no written language (until the 1950s) and few opportunities for formal education. Once they arrived here, they were employed in factories where English proficiency wasn't necessary. As young immigrants completed high school and post-secondary programs, many entered teaching and social service jobs. Several local colleges and universities now have special programs encouraging Hmong to pursue higher education, especially teaching, Today, Hmong enter all kinds of professions, notably the medical and dental fields and business support services.

Traditionally, most Hmong are animists

who believe in the existence of spirits, which are separate from (but coexist with) physical bodies. Today, however, there are as many Hmong Christians, Catholics, Mormons and practitioners of other religions as there are animists.

Hmong animists believe in a variety of spirits associated with the house, nature or ancestors. Many animist homes have altars that serve as the center of spirit rituals. Hmong New Year ceremonies renew the general protection of the household and ancestral spirits.

Animists rely heavily on shamans (or healers) to carry out many of the rituals and ceremonies that keep their families healthy and their ancestors appeared.

Press Release template: Andrea Lex, Devolpment and Communications Director for LWVMN, has been kind enough to develop a template for communities to use for press releases. In the packet given to each community there is a more generic one -- please feel free to use these as you see fit.

FLYER TEMPLATE

Jessica Crary, administrative assistant for LWVMN, has designed a brochure and a flyer that we will include with this mailing. We can also email this material (if computers are compatible) so you will not have to key it in.

LISTSERVE

What is a listserve, you ask? It's a way to have a discussion with a group of people electronically. When you send a message to the listserve, it is sent to all those who are on the list. You can ask questions, solicit advice, and share your ideas to all who are on the list. It's a great way to communicate at your and others' convenience. First, however, you must sign up so you are a member of the list.

Go to the website at http://www.onelist.com/community/Mncommunitycircles. This page will tell you that "you are not a member of this community." Select "Join Community." This page will say "New Member - Click here to register for free." Select to register. Registration is in 4 steps.

- 1. Fill out your information. At the "HTML E-mail Selection" choose "normal (text) email". Select "Next." (You may read the "Terms of Service" if you'd like; it's more of a technicality than anything.)
- 2. In confirming your email, *de-select* the check box that says "Check here to get email..." (This will prevent you from getting junk mail.) Select "Next."
- 3. Verify your settings. (Filling out additional information is optional.) Select "next."
- 4. Select topics only if you are interested in receiving regular messages about them. Otherwise you can bypass this step by selecting "Submit."

On the "Subscription Options" page select "Send email messages to youremail@abc.com," the first option. Select "Join." (You can ignore the next page unless you want to make changes to your options.)

You'll receive a message from onelist.com with instructions to which you must reply. After you are confirmed for the list, the League Office will send you an additional confirmation.

The action forum is an important part of the community circle process. If you are having more than one circle, you will need to have an action forum. The purpose is for the participants to share their action items, and form task forces to work on solving local problems that have been identified.

To present concerns, exchange ideas and find workable solutions without duplicating an already existing effort

MONEY

Question: Do we handle this money differently than other money from the LWVMN Office?

Answer: This money is to be deposited in the checking account of your local league and to be used only for this project. You must save all receipts and copies of checks and keep an accurate record of what you have spent. As you recall, the second 45% will be forthcoming in the middle of February. The last 5% will be awarded after your final report is received.

FACILITATORS

Please email or call Susan with the number of facilitators that will be attending facilitator training. This information is <u>necessary</u> in order to plan for size of room and for refreshments!

In order to accommodate the facilitators, who could not make it to the three scheduled training sessions, we have investigated ITV (Interactive Television). PUBLICITY/MEDIA COVERAGE

Remember to call local radio stations. Many communities are being interviewed. Some stations are going to feature immigrants' stories.

Question: What is the correct way to identify this project? Is it Community Circles, Study Circles, Discussion Groups?

Answer: We are officially calling them Community Circles. Reasons: Study Circles sound too official and may scare some people away. The League usually does studies and we want people to understand that this is different.

PARTICIPANT SELECTION:

Remember we are looking for people with <u>all points of view</u> to participate in this process. You might want to call service clubs such as Elks, Lions and Rotary. You might want to check with the local barber, grocer or bank manager. We don't want just people who give their full support to immigrants and the immigration process; we want everyone to feel their point of view is welcome.

DISCUSSION GUIDES

We have two versions of our Discussion Guide. One has facilitator tips in the margins and one does not. Discussion Guides with facilitator tips will be brought to the training sessions along with a booklet called The *Facilitator's Handbook* We will also bring discussion guides for the participants. Facilitator guides and Discussion Guides will be mailed to those communities not having representatives at the training sessions.

What is a listserve, you ask? It's a way to have a discussion with a group of people electronically. When you send a message to the listserve, it is sent to all those who are on the list. You can ask questions, solicit advice, and share your ideas to all that are on the list. It's a great way to communicate at your and other's convenience. First, however, you must sign up so you are a member of the list.

Go to the website at http://www.onelist.com/community/Mncommunitycircles. This page will tell you that "you are not a member of this community." Select "Join Community." This page will say "New Member - Click here to register for free." Select to register. Registration is in 4 steps.

- 1. Fill out your information. At the "HTML E-mail Selection" choose "normal (text) email". Select "Next." (You may read the "Terms of Service" if you'd like; it's more of a technicality than anything.)
- 2. In confirming your email, de-select the check box that says "Check here to get email..." (This will prevent you from getting junk mail.) Select "Next."
- 3. Verify your settings. (Filling out additional information is optional.) Select "next."
- 4. Select topics only if you are interested in receiving regular messages about them. Otherwise you can bypass this step by selecting "Submit." On the "Subscription Options" page select "Send email messages to youremail@abc.com," the first option. Select "Join." (You can ignore the next page unless you want to make changes to your options.)

You'll receive a message from onelist.com with instructions to which you must reply. After you are confirmed for the list, the League Office will send you an additional confirmation.

ACTION FORUM

The action forum is an important part of the community circle process. If you are having more than one circle, you will need to have an action forum. The purpose is for the participants to share their action items, and form task forces to work on solving local problems that have been identified.

STATE ACTION FORUM

On Saturday, April 29 from 12:30 to 5pm in St. Paul we will hold a State Action Forum at the Minnesota History Center

To share common concerns identified by Community Circles across the state.

To share workable solutions to problems identified by participants

To form task forces to work on statewide issues

Hopes:

To have several or many participants from each community that hosted a community circle project.

To have organizations represented at our "Action Bazaar" that will make us aware of which of these ideas is already being addressed on some level.

To present concerns, exchange ideas and find workable solutions without duplicating an already existing effort.







PILOT PROJECTS

Willmar and Austin were the hosts for the fall pilot projects. What follows are some of their suggestions and some of their challenges and their outcomes.

Attendance

Out of 12 or 13 invited in each community the lowest attendance was 8 people, usually only one or two were absent. Willmar felt part of the problem was that some of the people worked nights and getting up for a noon meeting was difficult.

Translators

Not needed in either community

Facilitation

Facilitators donated their time in both communities - extension people, teachers and league members. According to the evaluation one facilitator was challenged regarding neutrality. It is very difficult to be a neutral facilitator - thus the importance of selection and training and the use of co-facilitators.

Location

Both communities had location donated.

Food

Willmar purchased food supplied to Bremer Bank employees at a discount.

Child Care

Not necessary

Media coverage

Willmar expressed concern about lack of media coverage. Media didn't use press release supplied by LWVMN. There was one article in the paper and a radio interview is pending.

Action

Both plan to continue to meet as a task force or as friends. Both communities plan to have community circles in February and March.

Possible solutions - Other group members might be bilingual or investigate the use of earphones.

KICKOFF PLANS

Rochester has their plans in place. An evening event – offer coffees from around the world – Hmong comedienne – ½ hour presentation on the plight of the immigrant.

Edina has arranged a panel discussion about immigration dynamics and community impact.

Other suggestions include a multicultural potluck, bazaar. Participants speak about issues affecting the community or about issues affecting the newcomer.

Responding to immigration...

League initiates community conversations

by Janet Gendler

A record 8,977 immigrants came to Minnesota directly from their native countries in 1996 (Minnesota Planning publication). Many of these were refugees-more than forty percent of Minnesota's immigrants that year--from places such as the former Soviet Union, Somalia, Sudan, Ethiopia, Eritrea, Cameroon, and Southeast Asian countries. In addition, Minnesota's economy is strong at this time, and immigrants are attracted to a welcoming job market.

Their integration into the communities in which they settle, however, has not always been smooth. In response to this development, LWVMNEF is beginning a two-year project to focus community discussions state wide on immigration and the accompanying issues of race, jobs, housing, language differences, and education.

Study Circles

This project will use Study Circles, a process for small-group deliberation developed in 1990 as a project of the Topsfield Foundation, a nonprofit, nonpartisan foundation whose goal is to improve the quality of public life in the United States.

Groups of 8-12 people representing a cross-section of their communities will meet to discuss immigration and how it affects their community, to get to know one another, to consider different points of view, and suggest solutions for problems. They may use discussion materials and a guide developed in cooperation with the Study Circle Resource Center to help focus serious and broad public conversation among conservative and liberal voices, uninformed but interested citizens, service veterans, those who lived here originally, recent immigrants, community leaders, and other folks.

Pilot programs

Pilot programs are planned for May and early fall with a target of 1,000 participants in 100 study circles throughout the state during January, 2000. During this month each study circle would meet four or five times, with an ultimate outcome of an action plan for the group.

Study Circles have been used successfully in Oklahoma, where the League of Women Voters and several other organizations initiated a study circle program on criminal justice and corrections called "Balancing Justice."

Over 1,000 citizens joined judges, sheriffs, and legislators in deliberation about how to handle the challenges of skyrocketing corrections costs and falling public confidence in the judicial system. Over 50 state and local civic organizations and churches cosponsored the project with study circles in 13 communities. A bill enacted into law a month after the study circles were completed upheld the two major policy themes identified by the study circle participants.

The LWVMNEF will be the lead sponsor of this project in Minnesota. A League steering committee of Executive Director Sally Sawyer, President Judy Duffy, Development Director Andrea Lex, and Board Member Janet Gendler joined Harry Boyte of the University of Minnesota Humphrey Institute and Nan Kari of the Jane Addams School for Democracy in St. Paul to plan.

A seed grant from the law firm of Siegal, Brill, Greupner, Duffy & Foster PA has enabled the League to hire a project director, Janna Wallin Haug. Currently, this core group is working to form partnerships with community organizations for the Study Circles project.

Information at Convention

The Study Circles on Immigration is a separate initiative from whatever traditional two-year study delegates to the LWV State Convention may choose in April. Two workshops at the Convention on April 17 will give participants a chance to ask questions about Study Circles. Local Leagues will have an opportunity to take leadership roles in this project, and individual members can and should participate.

Janet Gendler was Co-Chair of the just-completed Election of Judges Study. She has been Vice-President, Community Services, for the Minneapolis League.

Changing Faces, Changing Communities Community Circles on Immigration in Minnesota League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund

Changing Faces, Changing Communities will focus on immigration and diversity in Minnesota using Community Circles, a process for small-group deliberation developed in 1990 by the Topsfield Foundation of Connecticut, a nonprofit, nonpartisan foundation whose goal is to improve the quality of life in the United States. The Study Circle Resource Center (started by the Topsfield Foundation) is providing the League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund (LWVMNEF) with in-kind contributions of advice, training and materials.

The purpose of the project is to initiate discussion on immigration and diversity, and all of the accompanying issues, such as jobs, housing, schools and language differences. The Community Circles will bring a broad-based group of individuals and opinion leaders together in face-to-face discussions on immigration and how it affects their communities.

One pilot program has taken place and another is planned for this fall in a rural community. Community Circles will be held in February and March 2000, with a target of 1,000 participants in 100 Community Circles throughout the state. Each Community Circle of 8-12 people will meet five times, with an outcome of an action plan appropriate for their community. In May 2000, the League will prepare a final report.

Specific goals of the Community Circles include:

- Participants will represent a cross-section of our society, including people from all ethnic, socioeconomic, political, religious and citizenship-status backgrounds.
- Participants will develop a better understanding of each other and build trust in each other.
- Participants will bring their own values to the Community Circles, and will speak from their
 perspective of values. If they come and only want to listen, then that would be respected.
- Participants will leave feeling empowered, valued and important.
- Participants may take action, whether this is in the form of starting a support group, setting
 up a cultural center or an after-school program, developing curriculum or educational
 materials, or influencing state or local policy. Public policy action that participants
 undertake may include employment and/or housing initiatives; small business loans for
 immigrants and people of diverse backgrounds; and policies against discrimination in any
 context.
- Communities will recognize and value the cultural and economic contributions of immigrant groups.

The League views this project as an opportunity to form strong coalitions with many area organizations working with immigration and diversity. LWVMNEF has formed or is in the process of forming coalitions with the Center for Democracy and Citizenship at the Humphrey Institute of Public Affairs, the Jane Addams School for Democracy, the Refugee and Immigrant Programs of the Minnesota Advocates for Human Rights, the Chicano and Latino Affairs Council, the Council on Black Minnesotans, the Indian Affairs Council, Neighborhood House, Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), the St. Paul Pioneer Press, the Minneapolis Star Tribune, KTCA-TV, Minnesota Public Radio, Minnesota Extension Service, Minnesota Chamber of Commerce, Minnesota Council of Churches, the College of St. Catherine, the League of

Minnesota Cities, the Citizen's League, the Education and Housing Equity Project, and the Center of the American Experiment, as well as Asian and Asian Pacific organizations. By forming these partnerships, the League will be able to focus serious and broad public conversation among conservative and liberal voices, uninformed but interested citizens, service veterans, those who lived here originally, recent immigrants and others.

Minnesota leads the United States in taking in refugees. According to *PopBites*, *Trends in International Migration to Minnesota Continue*, published by Minnesota Planning, refugees made up 42.2 percent of all Minnesota immigrants in 1996. For evaluation and assessment, the steering committee has proposed that all Community Circle participants complete a pre- and post-Community Circle survey. Upon completion of the project, there will be internal and external evaluations conducted by the steering committee as well as partnering organizations. Community opinion leaders will also be surveyed before and after the Community Circles take place. This project will help all Minnesotans use their power as citizens to work for a better Minnesota. The perspectives of new immigrants on issues such as family, community and educational policies are fresh resources that we should tap. As new arrivals define how they contribute to their communities and what it means to become an American, we can rediscover what it means to be an American and how lucky we are to be living in a democracy. We want to use a broad framework for these discussions so that when the participants and all Minnesotans "imagine America," we can move from a "we – they" stance to one that reflects a diverse "we."

Community Circles have been used successfully in Oklahoma, where the League of Women Voters and several other organizations initiated a Community Circle program on criminal justice and corrections called *Balancing Justice*. Over 1,000 citizens joined judges, sheriffs and legislators in deliberation about how to handle the challenges of skyrocketing corrections costs and falling public confidence in the judicial system. Over 50 state and local civic organizations and churches co-sponsored the project with Community Circles in 13 communities. A bill enacted into law a month after the Community Circles were completed upheld the two major policy themes identified by the Community Circle participants.

Successful government depends upon how well we use our power as native-born citizens, brand-new citizens, or just-arrived immigrants in creating ways to work together. This project will help all Minnesotans use their power as citizens to work for a better Minnesota. The perspectives of new immigrants on issues such as family, community and educational policies are fresh resources that we should tap. As new arrivals define how they contribute to their communities and what it means to become an American, we can rediscover what it means to be an American and how lucky we are to be living in a democracy. We want to use a broad framework for these discussions so that when the participants and all Minnesotans "imagine America," we can move from a "we – they" stance to one that reflects a diverse "we."

Community Discussion Circles on Immigration in Minnesota League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund Project Pilot Event Outcomes

Pilot Description

On the morning of May 18th, 1999, approximately 60 community members gathered at the Minnesota State Office Building to participate in a pilot event for *Changing Faces, Changing Communities* Community Circles on Immigration in Minnesota. The pilot event was designed to demonstrate and test some of the questions that will be used by Community Circles meeting statewide in the spring of 2000 focusing on immigration.

Questions addressed during the pilot included: What does it mean to be an American? What impact does immigration have on language, culture, the workplace and marketplace? And what does it mean to be a citizen? Participants in the two-hour session included project steering committee members, representatives of a broad range of community groups, youth involved in the Public Achievement program at Humboldt High School in St. Paul, media representatives, and members of the League of Women Voters.

Participants met in small groups in order to facilitate deeper discussion and evaluation of particular chapters and questions of the proposed study guide. During the first half of the small group sessions, each group was involved in an activity designed to make group members more familiar and comfortable with one another and to set the stage for further discussion. Each individual brought a story or something tangible to share with members of their group, such as a photo, newspaper clipping, family curio, fabric, tool, art object, -- something that expressed an important aspect of their heritage, or of becoming or being American. Each group was allowed 45 minutes to complete this activity.

After a brief break, participants reconvened in small groups for the second part of the pilot that ran a full hour. At this time, each of the groups was assigned a separate chapter of the study guide. These sessions were challenging because participants were not only trying to get a sense of how a Community Circle works, they were also asked to evaluate and react to the particular chapter to which they had been assigned.

In order to do this, the groups spent up to 45 minutes on the particular questions or views laidout in each chapter. The facilitators then spent the last 15 minutes guiding participants through a discussion of their views on the usefulness and quality of the questions, activities and views outlined in each chapter.

The pilot closed with a session in which all participants were invited to reconvene in a large group to discuss the various outcomes in the individual sessions. The responsibility for reporting on each of the groups rested with a pre-assigned group reporter. However, facilitators and others who wished to remain for this session were encouraged to offer comments and insights on the group dynamics and reactions to the discussion guide.

Pilot Outcomes

Generally, it was felt that the opening exercise was effective in introducing participants to one another and establishing a sense of community. This was important since this sense of community had to be set very quickly given the abridged nature of the pilot. Ordinarily, Community Circle participants would have five weeks to become acquainted with one another.

The high school students were felt to be an exceptionally important element of the pilot. Their stories were brief, but very moving. The intergenerational aspect of their participation is very valuable and youth should be strongly encouraged to participate in all communities in which Community Circles will be held. Organizers and facilitators should think carefully about how to fully engage young participants, and how to intentionally draw them into the discussion as soon as possible. The discussion guide should also include views and questions that reflect young people's questions and concerns.

While careful consideration was given to bringing together as diverse a group as possible for the pilot, participants felt the groups could have been still more varied in terms of ethnic backgrounds. Also, the pilot participants could have been even more varied in their political views. Bringing together individuals who already share common views can be interesting and engaging, but does not lead to the tough discussions that must take place in communities that are deeply divided on issues surrounding immigration and diversity.

There were several tips for facilitators. These included: the need to keep two or three individuals from dominating the discussion; the need to repeat the questions several times in order to keep the group focused; and the recommendation that facilitators ask questions in a variety of ways in order to elicit responses and discussion that addresses ideas and underlying assumptions that are not always obvious or even included in the discussion guide.

It is nearly impossible to include every single view, assumption or fact on a given subject in the discussion guide. However, through a combination of open-ended questions, examples, and supplementary materials, facilitators should be able to lead participants through a discussion that is focused while also representing a broad range of opinions and views.

The final chapter of the discussion guide will be entitled "What kind of Minnesota do we want to build?" This session will raise the basic questions of where do we go from here? What kind of Minnesota do we want for ourselves? For our children? What ideas do we have for action in our respective communities? And how, given an alternate view of citizenship, do we respond or contribute? While this chapter will be focused almost entirely on ideas for action by individuals, at the community, state and federal levels, some participants felt the discussion on action ideas shouldn't wait until the final session but should be integrated through the entire five-week series.

Participants also raised questions as to whether or not there are plans to publish the discussion guide in other languages and/or to use translators. Organizers plan to encourage the use of translators in communities where they are needed. However, the cost of translating the entire discussion guide into more than one language might be prohibitive.

Community Circles on Immigration in Minnesota League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund

Changing Faces, Changing Communities will focus on immigration and diversity in Minnesota using Community Circles, a process for small-group deliberation developed in 1990 by the Topsfield Foundation of Connecticut, a nonprofit, nonpartisan foundation whose goal is to improve the quality of life in the United States. The Study Circle Resource Center (started by the Topsfield Foundation) is providing the League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund (LWVMNEF) with in-kind contributions of advice, training and materials.

The purpose of the project is to initiate discussion on immigration and diversity, and all of the accompanying issues, such as jobs, housing, schools and language differences. LWVMNEF has formed or is in the process of forming coalitions with the Center for Democracy and Citizenship at the Humphrey Institute of Public Affairs, the Jane Addams School for Democracy, the Refugee and Immigrant Programs of the Minnesota Advocates for Human Rights, the Chicano and Latino Affairs Council, the Council on Black Minnesotans, the Indian Affairs Council, Neighborhood House, Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), the St. Paul Pioneer Press, the Minneapolis Star Tribune, KTCA-TV, Minnesota Public Radio, Minnesota Extension Service, Minnesota Chamber of Commerce, Minnesota Council of Churches, the College of St. Catherine, the League of

Minnesota Cities, the Citizen's League, the Education and Housing Equity Project, and the Center of the American Experiment, as well as Asian and Asian Pacific organizations. By forming these partnerships, the League will be able to focus serious and broad public conversation among conservative and liberal voices, uninformed but interested citizens, service veterans, those who lived here originally, recent immigrants and others.

Minnesota leads the United States in taking in refugees. According to *PopBites*, *Trends in International Migration to Minnesota Continue*, published by Minnesota Planning, refugees made up 42.2 percent of all Minnesota immigrants in 1996. Introductions: Zoe Nagell joins us from Armstrong High School. Zoe will be doing a *Changing Faces, Changing Communities* Study Circle project in her high school. Emily Chen joins us from Augsburg College. She is an intern with EHEP (Education & Housing Equity Project).

Announcements: Maire McMahon passed out flyers announcing the Wilder Forum – Beyond tolerance: A Call to Action on November 8 from 5 to 8:30pm. john powell will be the keynote speaker.

Kickoff: One of the goals of the kickoff is to obtain visibility for the project. Kate Parry suggested that prior to or in addition to the kickoff we do the following:

- Contact the following news organizations: Associated press, Katherine Lanpher from MPR, News Night Minnesota, Almanac, morning TV talk shows, Kimberly Hayes Taylor from the Minneapolis Tribune.
- 2. Prepare several specific examples of interesting items around the topics of immigration and citizenship (such as a profile of a local family); have them ready when talking to news organizations if one story doesn't capture their attention, perhaps another one will. It is important to have at hand the numbers of people participating in or sponsoring the community circles.
- 3. Send an advance mailing (post cards to local churches, for example) before the Kickoff and the community circles begin.
- **4.** Design our web site to include information on *Changing Faces, Changing Communities* and then link with other organizations interested in the same topic.

Kate also suggested we team up with other Minnesota organizations that are focusing on similar topics - Minneapolis Foundation, United Way, Wilder Foundation is polling immigrants on their use of tobacco. We might be able to combine our efforts and find a very high profile speaker such as Madeline Albright or Kofi Annan.

Kate said the *Pioneer Press* would be doing a feature article the Sunday before the circles begin.

Nan Kari suggested we might use International Fellows from the Humphrey Institute. They are interested in looking at the work that is being done around the issues of citizenship.

Joel Wurl suggested we plan a Kickoff event carefully so that it does not compete for time and money with the circles themselves. He also mentioned that there will be a University of Minnesota seminar on Race, Ethnicity and Migration. The timing may or may not coincide with our Kickoff event.

Funding Update: The budget is \$140,000. \$53,000 of that amount has been received. We are waiting to hear from ten more foundations. Joel asked if we knew why we did not have a more positive response. Susan suggested that at least one foundation had granted the requests of organizations that had specific action pieces.

Pilots: Willmar and Austin will do pilots projects. Willmar will start on October 21 for 5 weeks and Austin will start on November 1 for four weeks. Susan Anderson and Janet Gendler have done training for both sites; and will offer assistance and monitor their progress.

Site Selection: The following communities have returned their RFP's: Austin, Detroit Lakes, Edina, Eden Prarie, Mankato, Minneapolis, Northfield, Rochester, St. Cloud, St. Paul, Willmar and Winona. Marshall has asked for an extension.

Matt Leighninger, Susan Anderson and Janet Gendler will visit sites on Tuesday, November 9 and Wednesday November 10 to further explain the study circle process and to answer questions.

This bill waives the English language requirement with respect to the naturalization of certain aliens (or their spouses or widows) who served with special guerrilla units in Laos.

Fall Pilot: Janet Gendler

The communities of Willmar and Austin are now 99% sure that they are ready to participate in a Pilot project in October and November. Austin is looking for a Project Director and Willmar is waiting for final approval from their League chapter. Both communities will start their search for facilitators from their local Extension office. LWVMN will work closely with these communities as they form coalition partners, invite participants and develop the logistics of forming a community circle pilot project.

Site Selection: Janet Gendler

Twelve Leagues have either returned their RFP forms or have given verbal assent. There are several additional communities that the Otto Bremer Foundation has suggested as possible Community Circle sites. Mary Ann Gwost Hennen has contacted these communities to see if we might work with their Extension Service.

Site selection is limited by the fact that the project is as yet not fully funded. In order to issue pass through grants to communities we need to have funds in hand.

Evaluation Committee: Susan Anderson

The steering committee was presented with a draft of the evaluation tool to be used in the fall pilots.

Harry Boyte suggested the facilitators stress the importance of the group summary or evaluation at the end of each session. "Public evaluation is an important community building skill that we want to develop as part of the Community Circles Project"

Janet Gendler suggested that we ask project managers to include a sentence or two about their experiences with finding and using effective translators, child care and transportation.

Gilbert DeLaO suggested that we ask participants for additional comments after the questions about attitude change. It would be helpful to allow people to elaborate on how they might have changed their mind. Julie Plaut seconded the idea.

Facilitation Committee- Sara Taylor

At this time the facilitation committee is concerned about recruitment of quality facilitators and the method of training to be used. Finding facilitators that are neutral may involve recruiting from neighboring communities.

Besides the Facilitators Network, Center for Dispute Resolution, Wilder Foundation and the Minnesota Extension Service it was suggested that we call the Jefferson Center, Retired Seniors Volunteer Program, local k-12 schools and the Minnesota Humanities Commission .

We hope to be able to train facilitators for the pilot projects when Wilder trains their facilitators for their fall study circle projects (October 1 and 2)

The job description for facilitators includes:

Participate in Facilitators training and practice sessions

Work with co-facilitator

Be familiar with entire discussion guide

Moderate the discussion

Moderate the group before and after each session

Participate in the evaluation process

Remain completely neutral during the sessions

Facilitators are not responsible for:

Location

Food

Translators

Child Care

Participant recruitment

Budget

Gilbert DeLayO reported that there are three ways to do translation; 1. Earphones, 2. Individual translators and 3.Group translators. He suggested we check with school systems for earphones

Action Committee: Susan Anderson

Action committee members are needed to:

- 1. Be responsible for creating the conditions that help participants take action.
- 2. Be aware of action ideas that surface at community circle meetings.
- 3. Identify and reach out to organizations already working on similar issues. Ask if they would welcome volunteers and how they would like to receive citizen input.
- 4. Hold an action forum and support task forces as they move forward
- 5. Therese Gales, Myrna Nelson and Julie Plaut agreed to be on the Action Committee.

Steve Young and Moire McMahan both felt strongly that it is important to recognize that one of the main outcomes of the project is the discussion or the dialogue. Action items should come from the groups, not be imposed on them.

Sara Taylor suggested that the action committee seek to educate themselves about action initiatives already in place and be a virtual encyclopedia of same.

Next Meeting – Monday, October 18, 1999 – 12 noon to 2pm

Update

Both Willmar and Austin will have fall pilots. Willmar will start on October 21 and Austin after their Town Meeting on October 25. Janet and Susan will make site visits in October to help these communities prepare. A facilitator from Willmar and Susan Anderson attended Wilder's facilitator training on October 1&2.

Zoe Nagle from Armstrong High School (Robbinsdale School District) will use our study guide and our assistance to put together a Community Circle program in her school.

Introductions: Phil Jeni joins us from the Citizens' League and Julie Plaut joins us from Minnesota Campus Compact .

Announcements: Seng Yang passed out information about Neighborhood House and asked for support for the Hmong Veterans' Naturalization Act of 1999 (H.R. 371.IH & S.890.IS). This bill waives the English language requirement with respect to the naturalization of certain aliens (or their spouses or widows) who served with special guerrilla units in Laos.

Discussion Guide:

Bob Hulteen of the Minnesota Council of Churches suggested that we delete the phrase "new age" from the subtitle. This phrase would be offensive to some sectors of the religious community

The Discussion guide subtitle will be changed to:

What does it Mean to be an American in this age of Immigration?

Building a new Minnesota with Citizen Involvement

Fall Pilot: Janet Gendler

The communities of Willmar and Austin are now 99% sure that they are ready to participate in a Pilot project in October and November. Austin is looking for a Project Director and Willmar is waiting for final approval from their League chapter. Both communities will start their search for facilitators from their local Extension office. LWVMN will work closely with these communities as they form coalition partners, invite participants and develop the logistics of forming a community circle pilot project.

Site Selection: Janet Gendler

Twelve Leagues have either returned their RFP forms or have given verbal assent. There are several additional communities that the Otto Bremer Foundation has suggested as possible Community Circle sites. Mary Ann Gwost Hennen has contacted these communities to see if we might work with their Extension Service.

Site selection is limited by the fact that the project is as yet not fully funded. In order to issue pass through grants to communities we need to have funds in hand.

Site selection Criteria: (items in bold are additions or changes)

- 1. Demographics profile of the community
- 2. Coalition partners

- 3. Purpose (What are their hopes, their largest aspirations for the project? What else is going on in the community how will this fit in?)
- 4. Timeline
- 5. Organizational plan (How are they going to find coalition partners, participants, etc.)
- 6. Number of study circles planned
- 7. Media connections? (How do you see yourself working with the media)
- 8. Facilitators identified?
- 9. Project manager experience?
- 10. Other funding sources
- 11. Perceived problems

Evaluation Committee: Susan Anderson

The steering committee was presented with a draft of the evaluation tool to be used in the fall pilots.

Harry Boyte suggested the facilitators stress the importance of the group summary or evaluation at the end of each session. "Public evaluation is an important community building skill that we want to develop as part of the Community Circles Project"

Janet Gendler suggested that we ask project managers to include a sentence or two about their experiences with finding and using effective translators, child care and transportation.

Gilbert DeLaO suggested that we ask participants for additional comments after the questions about attitude change. It would be helpful to allow people to elaborate on how they might have changed their mind. Julie Plaut seconded the idea.

Facilitation Committee- Sara Taylor

At this time the facilitation committee is concerned about recruitment of quality facilitators and the method of training to be used. Finding facilitators that are neutral may involve recruiting from neighboring communities.

Besides the Facilitators Network, Center for Dispute Resolution, Wilder Foundation and the Minnesota Extension Service it was suggested that we call the Jefferson Center, Retired Seniors Volunteer Program, local k-12 schools and the Minnesota Humanities Commission.

We hope to be able to train facilitators for the pilot projects when Wilder trains their facilitators for their fall study circle projects (October 1 and 2)

The job description for facilitators includes:

Participate in Facilitators training and practice sessions

Work with co-facilitator

Be familiar with entire discussion guide

Moderate the discussion

Moderate the group before and after each session

Participate in the evaluation process

Remain completely neutral during the sessions

Facilitators are not responsible for:

Location

Food

Translators

Child Care

Participant recruitment

Budget

Gilbert DeLayO reported that there are three ways to do translation; 1. Earphones, 2. Individual translators and 3.Group translators. He suggested we check with school systems for earphones

Action Committee: Susan Anderson

Action committee members are needed to:

- 1. Be responsible for creating the conditions that help participants take action.
- 2. Be aware of action ideas that surface at community circle meetings.
- 3. Identify and reach out to organizations already working on similar issues. Ask if they would welcome volunteers and how they would like to receive citizen input.
- 4. Hold an action forum and support task forces as they move forward
- 5. Therese Gales, Myrna Nelson and Julie Plaut agreed to be on the Action Committee.

Steve Young and Moire McMahan both felt strongly that it is important to recognize that one of the main outcomes of the project is the discussion or the dialogue. Action items should come from the groups, not be imposed on them.

Sara Taylor suggested that the action committee seek to educate themselves about action initiatives already in place and be a virtual encyclopedia of same.

Next Meeting - Monday, October 18, 1999 - 12 noon to 2pm

Update

Both Willmar and Austin will have fall pilots. Willmar will start on October 21 and Austin after their Town Meeting on October 25. Janet and Susan will make site visits in October to help these communities prepare. A facilitator from Willmar and Susan Anderson attended Wilder's facilitator training on October 1&2.

Zoe Nagle from Armstrong High School (Robbinsdale School District) will use our study guide and our assistance to put together a Community Circle program in her school.

Matt Leighninger from SCRC will join us in November for a barnstorming tour of Minnesota communities that want to participate in community circles. Input and resources are being compiled from other Study Circles to assist communities in planning their projects.

The Discussion guide and Evaluation tool are in a final draft form to be used in the Fall Pilots. Discussion Guide and Evaluation Committees should expect to meet after the pilots to discuss revisions to both.

Action Committee will meet in the next few weeks.

The Big Bang

Creating a successful kickoff for your study circle program

The kickoff is one of the periodic large meetings that help to focus and define a community-wide study circle program. It allows you to demonstrate that many different organizations are involved, that high-profile people have 'bought in' to the idea, and that taking part in a study circle will give citizens a real opportunity to effect change on an issue they care about. In short, it gives people the sense that they are part of something larger than themselves.

The kickoff meeting is your first chance to show potential participants that your study circle program is a truly community-wide effort. Study circle organizers sometimes make the mistake of thinking that a study circle is like an amoeba: the first group will automatically create two other study circles, which will create four more, and on and on. It usually doesn't work that way. People come out for study circles in large numbers because they think the program will help the community make meaningful progress on an issue; the kickoff presents the idea that action is possible, that the whole community must be involved, and that a study circle program is the way to do it.

It is important to think of your kickoff as the beginning of something larger, rather than as an end in itself. There are several elements that will make it clear to the community that the effects of the day will be lasting:

- 1. High-profile speakers Call on people who have high visibility either in the community or nationally. They can speak knowledgeably about the issue, give legitimacy to the idea, and provide inspiration to the community. It is important that these people are able to speak specifically about the value of study circles.
- 2. An explanation of what study circles are, and how the program works Sometimes your featured speaker can do this, but it is also wise to have a member of your steering committee explain the need for study circles, the specifics of how people can participate, and the ways in which the ideas and recommendations that arise in individual groups will be presented to the community. They should also describe how a concluding forum will channel the citizen energy generated by the program.

- 3. Testimonials from people who have been involved in study circles Invite someone who took part in a pilot study circle to talk about the value of the process. You can also invite a representative from a large-scale study circle program in another community to talk about the impact of the program.
- 4. Breakout study circle sessions You can give people a feel for study circles by dividing them into groups for a first session. Give Busy Citizen's Guides to the participants so they will be able to see what the subsequent sessions will be like.
- 5. Specific ways for people to sign on Give people the opportunity to sign up, right there on the spot, to be participants or facilitators.

Always provide food, and always leave some free time for socializing. Contact SCRC for agendas from successful kickoffs.

Be sure to invite the media. Consider radio, television, and print journalists. Send out a press release ahead of time that mentions your speakers, and follow up to see if you can arrange interviews.

Some study circle kickoffs have been ineffective because they didn't establish enough of a connection to the study circles that were to follow. The opening speaker did not mention study circles, there was no explanation of the nuts and bolts of the program, there were no reports from pilots or any other study circles, and the breakout sessions were presented as complete dialogues in themselves rather than demonstrations of what a study circle is like. These kickoffs generated some emotion, but also a fair amount of skepticism, since people know that a problem like crime or racism cannot be solved or even meaningfully addressed in a day.

If you make it clear that your one-day event is the launching of a sustained community dialogue, your kickoff will strike a chord that resounds throughout the duration of the program. By emphasizing the strength and variety of the sponsoring coalition, the support of community leaders, and the potential for action, your kickoff will begin to persuade people that they are part of a community capable of solving its problems.

The following memo was sent to League presidents in June:

Are you looking for increased visibility in your community? Do you want to learn about a new tool for addressing an important public policy issue? Are you interested in a new way to add to community life and perhaps to recruit new members in the process? Are you interested in cooperating with other Leagues in your area on an interesting local issue with regional as well as statewide implications?

If so, you're invited to participate in "Changing Faces, Changing Communities," a community circles project on immigration sponsored by the League of Women Voters of Minnesota Education Fund.

Community Circles are a means of small-group deliberation developed in 1990 as a project of the Topsfield Foundation, a nonprofit nonpartisan foundation whose goal is to improve the quality of public life in the United States.

For the Minnesota project, groups of 8 - 12 people representing a cross-section of their communities will meet to discuss immigration and how it affects their community, to get to know one another, to consider different points of view, and suggest solutions for problems. They will use a discussion guide which was developed in cooperation with the SCRC by a committee led by the LWVMN to help focus serious and broad

public conversation among a range of voices: conservative and liberal; young, middle-aged, old; new and not-so-new immigrants as well as Native Americans; leaders as well as followers; skeptics and believers.

The LWVMNEF is the lead sponsor of this project in Minnesota. Local government, community organizations, church groups, ethnic groups, and media

organizations serve as members of the steering committee and as coalition partners.

What will the LWVMN provide participating communities? All participating Leagues will receive organizer and facilitator training; assistance in connecting with diverse populations; easy-to-use, tested discussion guides for facilitators and participants; and general on-going support.

In addition, communities may apply for a grant which would help cover the cost of a project coordinator, child care, refreshments, transportation, room rental, translators (if needed), publicity and advertising; office costs; costs for rental of audio/video equipment, or other miscellaneous costs incurred by communities..
