Mary Mantis started meeting by welcoming observers. Explained difference between interim commission and governor's committee. Said that a letter from the state office will be sent to each interim commission at which we will have an observer, telling who she is, why she is there, etc.

D.A. gave short speech on short notice. Reminded observers that they are public relations representatives of the League. That they should be a source of lot of ideas, esp. for future state program suggestions, manticused four getting outsomething like "Lively Issues" before the mext state program suggestions are due from local Leagues. We should have a report on the observer program at Council next spring. Then asked the observers present what kind of reporting they thamselves want to do. If commission attended is in the field of our state program, it would be halpful for the state chairman to receive reports of items pertient to the topic.

Louise Ruderling - thought she had been something of a guinea pig as we hadn't visited interim commissions before (she was a fiathful visitor at legis. Interim Commission on Election Legis for over a year) an interim commission compares with a legislative committee that meets during the regular legislative session, same structure with a chairman and secretary who are members of the legislature and a recording secretary who is a member of the office staff. Neetings are held in the same committee rooms at the capital. Reminied observers that they should get there early for the first meeting, if possible, and introduce themselves to the chairman of the commission even though a letter does go from the state office. Commissions are always anxious to know who is there - what special interest group. We are not expecting you to venture your opinion on the topics under discussion? They will ask you, somer or later, what you think. Each time you speak you want to preface it with "the law has no position in this field. I am not speaking for the law." An observer can give her own personal opinion - she is an interested citizen, but it must be clear to them that you are speaking as an individual, not as a member of the law.

MM read list of interim commissions and passed armori paper for people to sign up for their choices. Explained that the state office will let the observers know when the first meeting of their commission will be held. Hopefully, after attending the first meeting the observer will be put on a mathing list for minutes of the meetings and will therefore know when the next meeting will be. The observer will let the state office know if for some reason she cannot attend the commission meetings for which she signed. The observer should be on time at the meetings even if she has to leave early. Louise explained that the time of meeting will vary according to the makeup of the comm.

DA - the first purpose of the observer system is not the information on the topic you will get -- you are going to observe government in action.

If the observer gets committee minutes, she could write a digest for the report at council. Report to the state resource chairman pertinent remarks that will not appear in the minutes.

Minutes of Meeting --- Friday, August 26, 1960

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman, Joseph Prifrel, Jr., at 9:30 A. M. The roll was called and a quorum was present as follows:

A motion was made, seconded, and carried that the minutes of the last meeting be accepted as presented.

### Financing of Driver Training

The first point of discussion was the proposed compulsory driver training bill and the financing thereof. Senator Anderson reported that the Advisory Committee, of which he is chairman, had a meeting on Thursday, August 25th, to discuss the bill and the 2-cent per quart tax on motor vehicle lubricating oil proposed to finance it. The representatives of groups opposing the tax pointed out to the Advisory Committee the difficulties in collecting the tax. The Committee agreed, after consideration, that this would be a difficult tax to collect. Question that it might not be constitutional was raised. In checking on this after the Advisory Committee meeting, Mr. Ellingston found out from the Revisor of Statutes that a precedent had been set and the money from a tax on lubricating oil would not be dedicated.

These problems were discussed in detail and the Commission agreed that it should seek other methods of financing driver training. Various sources of revenue were discussed and tentative approval was given, separately and by motion, to the following as possible sources of revenue:

- (1) Charge of \$5.00 at the time the behind-the-wheel driver test is taken.
- (2) Charge of \$5.00 for return of suspended license.
- (3) Charge of \$10.00 for return of license after revocation -- over and above the present fee.
- (4) Additional fee on moving violation fines should be \$1.00 for under \$20; \$3.00 for over \$20 and to \$50; and \$5.00 on \$100.
- (5) Raise the driver's license fee from \$3.00 for 4 years to \$4.00 for 4 years.

There was also a suggestion that the chauffeur's license money be taken from the General Revenue Fund where it now goes and be used for driver training.

All of the above sources of revenue would bring in approximately \$1,200,000 a year. It was estimated that the fund would need about \$1,500,000 a year for \$30 per pupil reimbursement to the schools.

It was further suggested that all of these sources of revenue be taken up with the subcommittee of the Advisory Committee on Financing of Driver Training and a report of their suggestions be made to the Commission for final action on the sources of revenue.

### Uniform Recording and Reporting of Delinquencies

Senator Thuet reported on the progress made by the Advisory Committee on Uniform Recording and Reporting of Delinquencies. Mr. Ellingston said that effective collection and use of statistics has been a problem facing the major agencies. A committee was set up at the University of people who have done research in delinquency. This committee, together with the Department of Corrections, the Probation Department of Ramsey County, and the Hennepin County Department of Court Services, have jointly hired a research man and he is coordinating all the statistics. What he has been able to do is push through joint agreement on reporting of both police officers and the juvenile court and probation departments.

Mr. Ellingston introduced Dr. Nathan Mandel who explained how he was going about the work between the agencies. Dr. Mandel explained how uneconomical it was for the agencies to go about accumulating statistics individually. Although a solution to the problem is not easy, a good start is in the central department of crime statistics. He said that a uniform system is fine and all is well as long as all the various agencies and courts agree to it, but if for some reason someone changes his mind then there is no way to assure adherence to the system -- there is no law requiring it. However, Dr. Mandel said that at this point he would not recommend approaching it from the compulsory standpoint but rather to first sell people the idea of the advantages of recording and reporting in a unified manner and then use these same people in developing the law -- make it their law rather than to impose it upon them. Another problem is to gain agreement on terms -- what is meant by "discharge", "probation and parole", etc. Eventually, it is hoped, that with this system a manual can be put out for all the agencies and defining terms and forms and reports. The duplication of forms in a single agency is a tremendous waste alone and a large saving will be effected by having uniform report forms.

Regarding research, Dr. Mandel said it is impossible to proceed properly unless there is reporting that is meaningful. It cannot be said there are so many parolees when the word "parole" is not defined. A problem it is hoped to get at is the inconsistency in sentencing between counties -- where one man gets a certain sentence in one county and another man who is similar in all respects and commits a similar crime gets a much different sentence in another county. Dr. Mandel suggested that the court should refer the man to the adult corrections authority to make a pre-sentence investigation to determine what treatment best fits the individual. Mr. Fllingston said discrepancies in sentencing could be avoided by an indeterminate sentence with the men, except for lifers, being released by the parole board at any time it felt they were ready. Further, the man may not need incarceration and that is where a diagnostic center would come in, such as that now being built for juveniles.

Dr. Mandel said it is planned to do some research to see what the effect is of the probation system put into effect last session -- how do the probationers and paroless work out -- what is the percentage of success.

Senstor Thuet agreed that Dr. Mandel should be named to the Advisory Committee on Uniform Recording and Reporting of Delinquencies since the work he is engaged in will help complete the work of that committee.

### Revision of the Criminal Law

Senator Schultz called to attention the report before the members of the achievements and activities of the commission, stating that the explanation of the revision is correct. It is hoped to have the revision completed for the 1961 session of the Legislature.

At this point Dr. Mandel told the group that he has been noticing a lot of sentences from 5 to 2 1/2. This actually permits the perole board to take 2 1/2 as the minimum whereas 5 is supposed to be. He questioned what this meant. Mr. Ellingston said that the parole board overrides the minimum except for lifers -- while the court or the law says 1 to 5, this does not mean anything because the parole board has the power to release when they think the men is ready.

### Uraform Traffic Ticket

Mr. Ellingston reported that the Advisory Committee has come up with a uniform traffic ticket. Final refining is being done and it will be presented to the commission at a later date. It spells out in very simple detail precisely the offenses and conditions. It is a very simple and efficient form patterned after the 3t. Paul ticket. It will give the essential details of the accident with a minimum of judgment on the part of the officer.

Mr. Ellingston said this may not need legislation. This is something that might be done by court order but it will have to be investigated further. A uniform traffic ticket will be a tremendous advance in terms of equal justice to all traffic offenders in the state. It is planned that a manual will be sent out with the ticket to educate all the law enforcement officers as to the use and value of the ticket. This will give equality of arresting procedure and, hopefully, through the manual there will be some equality of court disposition. Municipal judges now have an agreed upon standard form of sentencing and it is moped to spread this to all the justices of the peace. There is one problem and that is that Duluth has installed equipment that will not handle the uniform ticket but it is felt that the goal would eventually justify the need for changing the equipment.

#### Jobs for Youth

Mr. Ellingston said that this is the hardest job the commission tackled and the least has been done on it. It turns out to be such a complex problem that requires vast and intensive study in order to prepare a complete analysis of all aspects of the problem. This analysis will be completed and at least presented to the Advisory Committee before the end of the year. This seems a

problem that requires a long and concentrated investigation, for which there has not been time this interim.

Mr. Ellingston explained briefly some of the phases of the problem that fall within the scope of the schools, such as the school-work program for the low I.Q. student, etc.

There was considerable discussion on the problem of job shortages in Minnesota -- not only for juveniles and young adults but also for the older adults -- this problem is particularly felt on the Iron Range where the economy largely depends upon the steel production and that has been down 50% this last year.

It was felt generally that the problem of jobs for girls is less since there are many areas that their services are still needed. Jobs for boys are much more difficult to find. In many places they are filling jobs with girls or older women where they used to have boys.

### Report on Huber Act

Mr. Ellingston gave a brief report on the information compiled from the questionnaires on the Huber Act which were sent out to all law enforcement officers and municipal and district court judges in the state. The material was compiled by two graduate students of the Criminal Law Seminar conducted by Professors Pirsig and Ellingston. The results are very encouraging. The greatest use of this act has been in Minneapolis. In 1957 the Minneapolis Workhouse had 20 offenders sentenced under the Huber Act, 72 in 1958, and 466 in 1959. Those convicted are largely of drunken driving.

The issue was raised as to whether this act was any punishment at all and it was pointed out by different members that those who have been sentenced under the Huber Act have felt that it was a great hardship to go through but they were most grateful for the opportunity to continue on their jobs. An offender who was placed on the Huber Act and then went out after his term was up and got himself into difficulty again would not be likely to get the sentence under the Huber Act a second time — the judge would probably not feel they were entitled to it. The fact that the use of this Act relieves what could be a great hardship on families of offenders is a strong point in arguing for its use.

Mr. Ellingston pointed out that in terms of the economic value to society here, the Minnespolis Workhouse Superintendent said that the use of this lew has saved the city of Minnespolis the need for building an additional building at the workhouse which would have cost in the neighborhood of a million dollars. Minneapolis had \$27,000 paid back by these offenders for their keep on this Act. Besides that, their families were not forced to go on relief in order to live.

The rural areas do not have the opportunity to use the law as much as the metropolitan counties but it is used wherever it seems possible and many areas expressed they would use it if they had the facilities.

The success of the law depends on its administration and that on the judgment of the judge.

### Legislation Passed Last Session

Mr. Ellingston reminded the members that the Commission was responsible for the passage of two pieces of legislation -- the probation bill and the bill providing for the Department of Corrections -- and had a share in passage of the juvenile court code. He said that inevitably there would be bugs in such bills which show up after they have been in operation for a time. Amendments to these laws will be presented to the Commission for their consideration at a future meeting.

### Other Business

The financial report of the Commission was read and approved.

There was discussion as to the estimated cost of the final report. Senator Wahlstrand suggested that Church Lithographers be contacted because they seem to be giving a very good bid for printing of the Employer-Employee Relations Commission's report.

There was discussion as to the next meeting of the Commission. Mr. Fena expressed hope that the Commission could hold a hearing in Hibbing because of the severe economic problem suffered there by both adults and children.

The date for the next meeting was set at September 16, 1960 at Shakopee at 9 A. M. The members would tour the institution in the morning and Mr. Turnbladh would appear in a brief business meeting to present the proposal for establishment of CCC-type camps for youth and the Department of Corrections program to be submitted to the 1961 Legislature.

Thereupon the meeting adjourned.
