FUNDING OF PUBLIC LIBRARIES IN MINNESOTA

LWVMN POSITION: SUPPORT FOR INCREASED AND RESTRUCTURED FUNDING FOR PUBLIC LIBARIES SO THAT THE STATE CAN MEET GOALS INCLUDED IN THE 1977 MINNESOTA

LONG RANGE PLAN FOR LIBRARY SERVICE.

DETAILS

LWVMN:

- * supports increased funding of Minnesota public libraries by means of a combination of substantial local funding, an increase in state funding, and a moderate increase in special-purpose federal funding.
 - considers the 1978 funding proportions 85% local government, 6% other local funds, 6% state, 3% federal to be inequitable, in that funding depends predominantly on the local property tax.
 - supports substantial local funding (more than the 30% proposed by the National Commission on Libraries and Information Science (NCLIS) but less than the current 91%), in the belief that local control insures sensitivity to local needs
 - supports an increased level and greater proportion of state funding for public libraries (but not to the 50% proposed by NCLIS), believing that public libraries, like public schools, share significantly in the education of the state's citizens.
 - supports an increased level and moderately increased proportion of federal funding for public libraries (but not as much as the 20% proposed by NCLIS).
- * supports distribution of state and federal funds to Minnesota public library systems according to a formula based largely on population, but also taking into account square miles of area served and the inverse of assessed adjusted valuation, so as to achieve the most equitable and satisfactory distribution of funds.
- * supports four goals of the Minnesota Long Range Plan for Library Service, ranked as follows: (1) making services accessible to all citizens; (2) fostering a system of shared resources; (3) developing multi-county regional systems; (4) establishing libraries in areas without them.
- * supports the sharing of resources; using trained and supervised volunteers; and charging fees for time-consuming research and special materials, programs, equipment and services.
- * opposes cutting services and/or hours.

LIBRARY RECEIVES MAJOR GRANT

This issue of the Circulator is late because we have been waiting for a piece of very important news to break. And on April 7, it broke! By now you have probably heard about it; at least, I hope you have. But since we are so pleased and excited about it, and since this is my direct channel to you, our community leaders and supporters, I want to take this opportunity to tell you about it personally.

The Minneapolis Public Library and Information Center has been awarded a \$362,800 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH). The announcement of the award became official on Saturday, April 7, when Vice President Mondale was in the Twin Cities and brought special notification of the grant. We reported the good news to the staff first thing Monday morning, and held a news conference on Tuesday to make the announcement public.

We are the seventh city library to be recognized by an NEH Learning Library grant, the others being Boston, Chicago, Tucson, New Orleans, Dallas, and Houston. The grant is the largest ever made to a library in Minnesota and the second largest made by the Endowment to any public library in the country.

Our project, titled Minneapolis: Portrait of a Life Style ("MPLS" for short) will study why our city consistently rates so highly in national quality of life surveys, despite extremes of climate and isolation from major population centers. The study will use nine subject areas, derived from the social indicators commonly used to measure quality of life. They are: peoples, health, social justice, politics and government, the arts, work, environment and resources, information, and learning.

Each of the subjects above will form the basis for a three-month unit of study, made up of lectures by speakers of national reputation, forums, workshops, displays, film showings, and tours. The first unit will begin in September of this year.

The programs will be free and open to all. They will also be taped and made avail-

able for future use through the Libraries. College credit may be arranged through Metropolitan State University, and Continuing Education Units may be made available, also. Procedures to be followed will be widely advertised prior to the beginning of the program.

There is a wealth of information on most every conceivable subject in our nation's public libraries. The National Endowment believes that by bringing the public into contact with academic humanists within the context of the Library, a great educa-

tional and cultural potential can be realized. Such is the responsibility which has been consigned to us.

We are honored that the Minneapolis Public Library has been chosen as a Learning Library. It has been one of our goals to become accepted as the educational institution that we know we are. The MPLS program gives us a golden opportunity to prove it to everyone.

MARS performs well in "test flight"

MARS (Machine Assisted Reference Service) became available to the public in July of last year. The service uses computerized data bases, which are usually more up to date than indexes in book form, and often provide listings that are not available in printed indexes. For especially in-depth or current information, a patron can request a computer search. Performed by a library staff member, the search yields a detailed listing of pertinent articles, books, govern-

ment documents, etc. The patron can then refer to these sources to find the needed information.

This service is offered free of charge for up to eight minutes of on-line time. Beyond that, the patron has the option of continuing the search on a direct cost basis.

From July through December, 1978, a total of 540 searches were requested and performed. The average on-line time per

The Library's 1978 Annual Report was issued last month. The report gives a narrative description of the year's activities plus financial and statistical summaries. It is mailed to libraries, organizations, and interested individuals around the country. The Metropolitan Connection is now in operation and headquartered at Southeast Community Library. Through a simple telephone referral system, the Metropolitan Connection helps individuals and organizations efficiently locate educational and recreational resources. The service aims to reach people of all ages and backgrounds, enabling them to teach, learn, and share their experiences either on a one-to-one basis or in a group. People offering skills to teach or share, as well as those with the need to know, are invited to call the Metropolitan Connection at 379-7777.

Have you heard the bouncy new radio jingle about your library? Written by local songwriter Dick Wilson, the ad proclaims tunefully, "When you need to know, check it out! Your library is where you find what it's all about." The production and air time for the radio ads was paid for by the Metropolitan Library Service Agency. We hope the campaign will remind many potential library users to check us out!

Library Board officers were elected at the Board's annual meeting in January. The 1977 officers were re-elected to second terms: Frances Naftalin, president, Ann Higgins, secretary, and Io Anne Thorbeck, representative to the Board of Estimate and Taxation.

Closed for remodeling is Franklin Community Library, 1314 E. Franklin. The work began at Franklin Monday, February 5, and is expected to be completed by around mid May. Funded by Community Development Block Grant funds, the renovation will include replacing the outside steps with an elevator and a thorough cleaning and repainting, both interior and exterior. Franklin users are being directed to other neighboring libraries for service.

During the tax season, individuals received free help with preparation of their Income Tax returns at several Minneapolis Public Libraries. The service was provided by the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program of the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Under the program, volunteers trained by the IRS answer questions about tax return preparation and help taxpayers fill out their personal Income Tax forms.

search was 7.3 minutes. Out of the 540 searches, only 15 required more than eight minutes of on-line time.

Requests for computer searches are handled by the appropriate Central Library department, depending on the subject. During 1978, the most requests by far came in the Business/Science Department. Sociology, Government Documents, ECOL, History, Art/Music/Films, the Municipal Information Library, and Literature followed. It is interesting to note that computerized searching was found useful in this diverse range of fields, proving that it is a viable addition to our strong reference capability.

Library Needs Study

Deaf and Hearing Impaired

The deaf community has been estimated at 5.5% of the national population; hearing-impaired at 20%. Because of their disability, many deaf and hearing impaired persons are not traditional users of the library services. Yet most rely on the printed word for communication and information. Identification of the deaf communities and communication with them to assess library needs is essential to program planning.

Through a special project funded by an LSCA Title I grant, MELSA is initiating this identification and communication. Recruitment has begun for a project director to assess the library needs of the deaf and hearing impaired in the MELSA service area and to provide a plan for library service to the deaf and hearing impaired in this area.

The Director will identify the deaf communities; communicate with the deaf communities to learn their library needs; propose services and programs that meet these needs, including special collection needs, TTY machines, staff training; and outline costs for individual libraries to consider in future operating budgets.

The application deadline is May 7, 1979. The interviewing process should commence shortly thereafter.



SPPL: READ TO ME A Literacy Project

American society has a disturbing problem - a literacy problem. During the last ten years, according to recent literacy studies, the primary academic skills necessary to function in our society (reading, writing, and computing) have drastically declined.

The St. Paul Public Library has decided to take an active role in helping to solve the literacy problem. In 1978, the Minnesota State Library awarded the St. Paul Public Library a \$17,842 grant to develop, promote, and implement the READ TO ME literacy project. This project is a pilot program, and if successful, will extend to the state and national levels.

The READ TO ME project developed from a simple ideathe best way to instill a love of reading and books in children is to read to them in the home on a day-to-day basis in a loving, sharing one-to-one relationship. This project will inform the parent, grandparent, day-care worker, brother, sister, or anyone who works, plays, teachers, or lives with young children, the importance that reading has in their overall emotional and educational well-being.

Beginning in February of 1979, the READ TO ME project will present workshops throughout the City of St. Paul. These workshops will cover language development of the young child, the importance of reading to the child in a loving, one-to-one relationship, the selection of appropriate materials, the introduction of various forms of storytelling for day care and preschool facilitators, and the use of the community library as a vital resource for reading material.

READ TO ME supports the concept that sees the home as the first and most lasting environment for developing skills, knowledge, and attitudes necessary for learning to read. St. Paul Public Library hopes to share this message with the community, a message that takes the first step in solving America's literacy problem.

Advance notification from the American Library Association has indicated that MELSA's 1978 entry in the John Cotton Dana Library Public Relations Award Contest is an award winner. This special award, which will be presented at the ALA Conference in Dallas, was made for MELSA's "animated television message and its lively and entertaining series of radio spots titled 'check it out' to encourage library use to all segments of the community."

The 3O-second animated television spot, "Free Answers for the Asking" was funded through an LSCA Titla I grant at \$10,36O. The spot is directed to an adult audience and emphasizes the library's function as a source of information for dailing living. Animation was provided by Bajus-Jones Animation Studio. The script was written by MELSA in consulation with the marketing firm of Markgraf & Wells. The spot has been well received and has been played as a public service announcement during prime viewing hours.

The three radio spots utilized a library jingle and scripts written by Dick Wilson of the advertising firm of Campbell-Mithun for MELSA. The spots have been aired 557 times of twelve radio stations in the Twin Cities area.

MELSA's 1977 entry in the contest also won a John Cotton Dana special award.

TV Spot

Storyteller Bob Gasch, who has performed in MELSA sponsored summer library activity programs during the past two years, has donated his talents to produce a new MELSA TV promotional. The 3O-second spot, written by Dick Wilson of Campbell-Mithun, features a conversation between Paul Bunyan and Abraham Lincoln, both portrayed by Gasch. Lincoln notes a number of "did you knows" about the life of Bunyan, indicating that the library was his source of information, and launches into a chorus of "Check-it Out," very badly sung. Paul Bunyan's comment – "Did you know that Abraham Lincoln couldn't sing a note." Look for it on your local TV stations.



Children's Films Summer 1979

From May 14, 1979 until August 2O, 1979, 66 children's films which are preceded by a cross (+) in the MELSA Film Circuit Catalog will be removed from the circuit and placed in the MELSA Office for direct booking through that office.

To reserve a film, call Gloria Schultz (645-5731) at the MELSA office, with the title of the film and the date it is needed. The film will be sent to you via the MELSA delivery service.

Video Production Equipment

On January 29, 1979, the MELSA Board of Trustees approved a proposal to rent portable video production equipment during a four-month period in 1979. Rental has been contracted through Video Midwest and the equipment is available for the months of May, July, August, and October, 1979. A complete list of equipment is available from the MELSA office.

BOOKING: In order to book the equipment call Tzvee Morris at MELSA (645-5731) with dates requested.

DELIVERY: Video Midwest will make one delivery each month to the library system making the earliest scheduled request. The equipment will remain in that library until such time as another system needs it. The second system must then pick up the equipment. Video Midwest will make the final (end-of-the-month) pick up.

EDITING: Editing time at Video Midwest is provided free within the MELSA video package. A total of 90 hours is available; each system is to receive 10 hours of editing time. At the end of September, those systems that have not used up their allotted editing time will be queried regarding their expectations for the remaining time. Any time thereby "released" will be reallocated. Beyond these provisions, editing time is available to individual systems at a \$25/hour charge to those systems requiring it.

Videotape Instruction

Three videotapes offering instruction on videotape production are available from the MELSA office. They are:

AUDIO TECHNIQUES FOR VIDEOTAPE PRODUCTION

This tape discusses a variety of audio techniques including microphone selection and placement, acoustical effects, voice, sport effects, dual audio tracks and sound mixing. Learn how to select audio techniques to provide the interest and variety that will make your program successful.

PORTABLE VIDEOTAPE PRODUCTION TECHNIQUES

This program describes the potential of the new portable production systems. Equipment selection, remote operation and segment and insert editing are covered.

SET-UP. OPERATION AND CARE OF THE VIDEOTAPE SYSTEM

This program provides a logical, step-by-step procedure for setting up and checking out each component for proper operation until the whole "system" is operating properly. Learn how to diagnose problems, take corrective action and minimize downtime through preventive maintenance.

WORKSHOPS: Two workshops were scheduled in conjunction with the video production equipment rental. The first took place on Monday, May 1, 1979 at the Fridley Branch Library. It consisted of a review of the use of video equipment and instruction on planning to edit.

The second workshop will take place in June. It will provide instruction on actual use of editing equipment and is intended for library staff who use or expect to use the editing equipment. This workshop will be limited to 1 person from each MELSA system in order to maximize the opportunity for hands-on experience.

How-To-Do-It Index

How-to-do-it projects constitute an area of high interest among MELSA library clients. Considerable information in this area is available but is not currently indexed with sufficient depth and with enough frequency. The research effort required for retrieval of specific information items is enlarged accordingly.

In response, 6 out of 9 MELSA systems have begun How-to-do-it indexing projects individually. However, coverage has not been systematic nor coordinated; indexing produced has not been readily available on a MELSA-wide basis; and no individual system has had a sufficient budget or personnel resources to attempt indexing on a larger, all-inclusive scale.

With the employement beginning in mid-May of Ms. Sylvia Welygan, MELSA will engage itself in developing a systematic access tool to how-to-do-it materials.

The special project will establish an on-going, current, and cooperatively produced index to how-to-do-it information contained in approximately 36 periodicals received by MELSA libraries. It will include the development of a thesaurus of subject headings, based on a compilation of existing authority files and professionally published how-todo-it indexes. After thesaurus development, each MELSA system will be responsible for the indexing of a specific set of periodicals according to a uniform format, and for forwarding their indexing to a central station within two weeks of receipt of periodical issues. A paraprofessional to be trained by Ms. Welygan will be hired and assigned the responsibility for designating subject headings for the indexed material received from the libraries, and for handling duplication and distribution of completed indexing. Indexing will be duplicated on 3 x 5 cards. One copy of the index will be made available to each MELSA system free of charge and systems will have the option of purchasing additional copies at cost. The thesaurus developed for the project will have the capability for conversion to machine-readable form (on-line adaptability).

Summer Library Activity Program 1979

From June through August, 1979, MELSA will sponsor a series of special performances as part of the 1979 Summer Library Activity Program. Systems have selected from among the following performances to appear at their libraries:

CLYDE DIGIT & FAMILY Clyde Digit & Family is a professional theatre troupe performing shows that are collections of original drama, satire, song and mime -- ranging from ageold fairy tales to 30's musicals to comic scenes from modern life.

ELECTRIC COMPANY Most of the Electric Company presentations are folk music/story/history programs. Each program contains ten to fifteen traditional songs, the stories that go with them, and the history surrounding them. Programs for children include a variety of participation. The children sing with performers, play simple folk instruments and often help to tell the stories.

BOB GASCH Storyteller Gasch brings us Abe Lincoln's boyhood, young Samuel Clemen's adventures, Sinbad the Sailor, or Zeke the Goldminer.

CHARLIE MAGUIRE Maguire has been working closely with the Minneapolis Public Library & Information Center, composing and performing the music for their weekly radio program, and touring all of the branches twice a year. He gave concerts in the five-county area in cooperation with the library system, and also wrote a children's songbook which was published by Head Start.

MONTY KRIZAN REPTILE SHOW The program demonstrates the habits and care of a variety of reptiles.


THE PANGOLIN PUPPETS Puppeteers Cheryl Bartholow and David Elrod operate the 7-puppet cast as well as the lighting and sound effects. They have performed in schools, libraries, and shopping centers.

ROSENTHORN PUPPETEERS Presenting four puppet programs:

GEORGE SHANNON These storytelling programs are performed in the oral tradition without props, etc. and the content is primarily folktales. Each program is different. A large number of the folktales are from Africa, Asia, and Latin America, but tales from nearly every area are included at one time or another. Types or forms of tales included are porquoi, cante fables, participation, myth, and the more general folktale.

STORYTALERS The Storytalers is a professional touring theater company that began as a children's theater program for the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board four years ago. Since that time the Storytalers have become an independent organization that tours schools, parks, libraries, shopping centers, churches and nursing homes throughout the five-state area.

PROPOSAL

This is a proposal by the League of Women Voters of Minnesota (LWVMN) to the St. Paul Foundation for \$1,000 to print and distribute 2,000 additional copies of the study, LIBRARY FUNDING IN MINNESOTA.

We are very grateful to the St. Paul Foundation for its original funding of this study and for its invaluable assistance in securing further grants from First National Bank of St. Paul, the Northwestern National Bank of St. Paul, the St. Paul Companies, and the Dayton Hudson Foundation in the total amount of \$6,380.

Requests for this publication have been so numerous that we have nearly depleted the 12,780 copies that were printed. In order to satisfy the interest shown in the study, we face the need for 2,000 additional copies.


All public libraries in Minnesota have received copies as well as all library board trustees and people in library-related services. We also distributed the study to the 201 state legislators, the Governor's office, State Board of Education, and State Department of Education. Many members of the general public have been reached through their local libraries, by request, and through local League members. In addition, 3,800 local League of Women Voters members have received and had the opportunity to discuss the material at hundreds of meetings held throughout the state. This includes the 230 members of the St. Paul League and the 870 members of the Leagues in St. Paul area suburbs. Last fall the Governor's Conference on Libraries and Information Services requested 664 copies. As a result of its impact on this Conference, the White House Conference on Libraries has included it in their program.

Our concern now is to continue to inform the public and to reach those who make decisions about the financing of public libraries on the local level. We have responded to requests for copies for 45 local city council members and mayors, but there are countless other local and school officials who have not yet seen the study. We also do not have the additional 450 copies necessary to send to all the County Commissioners, nor do we have funds with which to pay mailing costs. Members of the Metro Council and the mayors and

councils of the three major cities of the state also would benefit from a reprinting and further distribution of this material. The League of Women Voters of Minnesota believes that it is vital that all involved in decisions concerning libraries have this publication.

Reactions to the publication have been very favorable. Apparently the LWVMN study is the most comprehensive report of its kind done in any state. At the May, 1979, Awards Banquet of the annual conference of the Minnesota Library Association, the League was awarded a Certificate of Merit in appreciation of this study. The publication is seen as a valuable resource tool, and its impact is already being felt. We recently received word of a Friends of the Library unit formed in a St. Paul suburb as a direct result of the study. Included in this proposal is a copy of a letter from Wayne Alfveby, formerly with the Dakota County Library System, which is fairly representative of the responses we have received.

The League of Women Voters of Minnesota hopes that the St. Paul Foundation will give favorable consideration to this request for \$1,000 so that we may make additional copies of this valuable study available to the public.

This is a proposal by the League of Women Voters of Minnesota (LWVMN) asking for \$6,380.00 to study the financing of public libraries and to implement a program of public education and awareness of that financing. The research for this study is nearly completed, and the education process will be completed about January 1, 1979.

Public libraries are dependent on the property tax for the bulk of their funding. Libraries, like other governmental services, are experiencing the tightening of incomes because of the combination of taxpayer resistence to higher taxes and inflation. Yet the demands for library services are growing. With little hope of increased funding at local levels, this study reviews present funding patterns and considers alternate methods of support.

The League of Women Voters of Minnesota is well able to implement this state-wide program of educating the public to the financing of public libraries. A publication written in simple, understandable language will result from this study and will be disseminated at no cost to a broad cross-section of Minnesotans. In many communities public meetings will be held to inform the citizens and supplement the publication. The 71 local Leagues throughout the state will conduct these public meetings and distribute the League publication.

LWVMN is known for providing quality publications, public meetings, workshops, and candidates forums. It has a long-standing reputation for fairness, fact-finding, and non-partisanship. The League has strong leadership and an informed, broadly based membership unusual for its sense of commitment. Because of this commitment, members of the library study committee will spend several thousand volunteer hours researching, writing, and editing the publication.

This proposal is also being submitted to the Bigelow and Grotto Foundations.

Index of application requirements of the Mardag Foundation

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This is a proposal by the League of Women Voters of Minnesota (LWVMN) to study the financing of public libraries and to educate the public about its findings. The study is being conducted by the Library Study Committee of the LWVMN, chaired by Katharine Muff. The committee will study the ways in which libraries are presently funded and explore alternatives to present funding. In dealing with the problems of funding, the services of libraries will be studied plus the trends in these services.

A concern about public libraries has been aroused by the "visible cuts" made in public library services, e.g., decreasing the hours which the library is open, eliminating some library programs and special events, and reducing maintenance and even professional staff. Other cuts are "invisible" but have serious consequences for the future, i.e., slashes in the materials and equipment budgets. Once these cuts are made, it becomes progressively more difficult for libraries to rebuild collections and services.

These cuts are being made at a time when the number of library patrons is increasing. The library is an important source of information and recreation for the under-employed, the unemployed, and the retired. It is also a time when the patrons are asking for more services and information from many types of media. These growing demands of library users have brought great pressure on library budgets. In addition, the buildings, built at the turn of the century, need to be replaced, refurbished, or expanded at considerable expense.

But the public library has a low priority during budget time even though it is considered an asset to the community. As local property taxes steadily rise, municipal and county governments are encountering taxpayer resistance to increasing budgets for any service not directly related to health and safety. Public libraries depend on the property tax, a regressive tax, for the bulk of their funding. And this dependence on a local tax means there is no uniformity among libraries in Minnesota.

Research for this study is many faceted. The committee is examining the funding of public libraries, documenting the current sources of funding, and determining the allocation of funds by examining the Metropolitan Library Service Agency (MELSA) and the Office of Public Libraries and Inter-Libraries Cooperation (OPLIC). It also is determining the role of the State Department of Education in the funding of public libraries. The Minnesota Long Range Plan for Library Service, passed by the Legislature in 1957 and revised in 1977, is also being studied by the committee. These documents evaluate the existing

library situation and determine the "procedures, projects, and programs" that will be selected in steps over a five-year period to improve library services. Since the State of Minnesota is divided into 22 regional library districts and there is not uniformity among them, local Leagues in each district are being asked to conduct interviews of library personnel and patrons to determine the funding and services in each district.

Research is expected to be completed by mid-June. A draft of the resulting publication will be presented to Board and off-Board readers in July for checking for accuracy and objectivity. Final revisions will be completed by the end of the summer, and the publication will be ready for distribution to the public by October.

The study's main purpose is public education. We will approach the public in two ways: through open meetings and through the publication. Once the League members throughout the state are informed by means of local unit meetings, local Leagues will begin to inform their communities. LWVMN is known for providing quality public meetings, workshops, and publications. At the live presentations conducted by League members (at public meetings, club meetings, service organizations, and in the high schools), the publication will be distributed at no cost. To assist local League personnel in planning their presentations on the library material, the LWVMN Board will hold a series of five regional workshops in the fall. The Board will also plan a schedule for "marketing" the materials. The publication will be distributed to a broad cross-section of Minnesotans through local and regional libaries, high schools, and organizations such as the Citizens League. The publication will be offered to the public through Public Service Announcements on local radio stations and through the press. Governmental officials, i.e. legislators, county commissioners, and city officials, will also receive a copy of the publication.

While direct results of the publication and meetings will be impossible to measure, LWVMN hopes that the information imparted will stimulate citizens to take a more active role in planning for the future of their public libraries. By increasing the public's awareness of the problems facing libraries, and by showing them their opportunities for participation in the decision-making process, citizens will be better equipped to provide input into an area which affects the entire community.

Questionnaires will be inserted, on a random basis, into a number of the publications. The purpose of the survey will be to determine reader knowledge

about the financing of public libraries before and after reading the material. Forms will be self-addressed for return to the LWVMN office. Information will be collated, and the results reported to the Foundation.

The committee members responsible for the study are not experts in public libraries or their finances. They are, however, interested in the field and, more importantly, they are members of the League of Women Voters. The League has an excellent reputation for fact-finding and unbiased publications. Its 1972 report on the Judiciary served as the model for publications by the Supreme Courts of both Washington and Oregon and was listed by the Minnesota Department of Education as a suggested text for vocational schools. LWVMN's Financing State Government series was praised by the Chairman of the Minnesota Taxation Commission as "extremely useful...and an excellent overview."

The Saint Paul Foundation grants #60-78 (September 6, 1978), #76-78 (December 20, 1978), and #45-79 (July 24, 1979), totalling \$7,380, enabled the League of Women Voters of Minnesota to research, write, print, and distribute 14,780 copies of a publication entitled: Library Funding in Minnesota, as well as to conduct meetings to educate the public on this subject.

The publication has been widely used in the Saint Paul area as well as in the rest of the State of Minnesota and beyond. It has been given to all public libraries in Minnesota, to all library board trustees, and to many other people in library-related services. The League of Women Voters also distributed the study to the 201 state legislators, the Governor's office, the State Board of Education, and the State Department of Education. Many members of the general public have been reached through their local libraries, by request, and through local LWVMN members. Quantity orders have come from the Library School of the University of Minnesota and from other colleges and universities. In addition, 3,800 local League of Women Voters members have received and had the opportunity to discuss the material at hundreds of meetings held throughout the state. This includes over 1,000 LWV members in St. Paul and surrounding suburbs.

In September, 1978, the Governor's Pre-White House Conference on Libraries and Information Services requested and distributed nearly 700 copies. As a result of the enthusiastic reception at this conference, the White House Conference on Libraries and Information Services in November, 1979, also distributed 1,500 copies to delegates from around the nation.

One regional library system has requested recently an additional 57 copies for information packets being sent to public officials in the area. Mayors, city council members, county commissioners, and others in position to influence decisions on funding of libraries have also been included in the distribution of this publication. All of these people have been able to receive the publication free of charge because of the Saint Paul Foundation grant which has covered not only printing but also distribution costs.

The grant also enabled the LWVMN to reimburse the volunteer library committee for some of the mileage expenses incurred in their meetings to research, plan, and write the publication. They also held five regional workshops to train and educate local League leaders about the study. All time was donated by committee members. The grant also covered some of the staff time and office expenses incurred with writing, typing, and mailing out or delivering the publication.

Reactions to the publication have been very favorable. It has been acclaimed as the most comprehensive report of its kind done in any state. LWVMN was awarded a Certificate of Merit at the 1979 annual conference of the Minnesota Library Association in appreciation of this study. A new Friends of the Library unit was formed in a St. Paul suburb, with direct impetus for its founding coming from the League publication. The results of the questionnaire sent out with every 15th copy of the publication have been compiled and show a very positive response from users. 93% found it very useful or useful. 85% said that as a result of reading the publication, their knowledge of the funding of public libraries in Minnesota had increased; this, although many of those reading the study and returning the questionnaire, were librarians or library trustees or public officials, who should have been expected to understand the subject. 81% of those responding said they used libraries more frequently than once a month. Comments included "Excellent"; "fine job"; "I have gained much information from this survey" - from a homemaker; "well-written, clear document"; and one teacher's comment: "all tax-paying MN citizens should receive a copy of this collected information."

The Director of the Northwest Regional Library, formerly with the Dakota County Library System, wrote us as follows:

"Thank you for supplying me with extra copies of your excellent document LIBRARY FUNDING IN MINNESOTA. I shall put them to good use in my area, informationally and promotionally.

"I would like to express my gratitude to the LWVMN and to the organizations funding your research. The document LIBRARY FUNDING IN MINNESOTA accurately reflects the financial problems faced in Minnesota libraries in attempting to provide free information to the public. Not only may this be one of this decade's most important library documents, but the fact that it was researched by an outside source with the League's reputation for insight and quality is of great benefit to those of us in library service....

The study of the Financing of Public Libraries, which the St. Paul Foundation helped fund, has been enormously successful.

Requests for the publication have been so numerous that we find our supply of 10,000 nearly depleted. In order to satisfy the interest shown in the report, we face a need for 2,000 additional copies. Projected printing and postage costs for the limited second run are \$950 to \$1,000.

The League of Women Voters of Minnesota would like the St. Paul Foundation to consider a grant to fund these additional copies.

Among those who have already received the study are legislators, city and county administrators, and people in library and library-related services, as well as members of the general public.

Thank you for your letter of May 4, 1979. Please accept my apologies for the lack of an earlier response. The press of Conference planning and associated travel has considerably delayed our responses to helpful suggestions and good wishes such as yours.

I find your study of the funding of the public libraries done by the League of Women Voters of Minnesota very interesting and a good example of what might be done in other states. We are appreciative of the fact that the League would be able to cover publication and postage cost to make the report available at no cost to delegates of the White House Conference on Library and Information Services. This would be a very useful item to add to the background information of delegates and alternates to the White House Conference in November of this year.

There are several questions related to the distribution of this item. Frances Naftlalin may have indicated to you a recent policy decision of the National Commission on Libraries and Information Science that all materials from individuals or outside agencies separate from the White House Conference would be made available at the time of the Conference in our materials distribution center if those materials are provided in sufficient quantity, a minimum of 1,500 copies. For those who wish to distribute this material prior to the White House Conference, the procedure would have to be governed by making a formal Freedom of Information Act request to have the mailing list of delegates and alternates to the White House Conference. This is the natural procedure due to the requirements of the Privacy Act and the Freedom of Information Act which governs this kind and similar kinds of government activities.

Please take this letter as an expression of interest in having this information distributed to the delegates. We would be interested in knowing which of the two routes you would prefer to take, whether to send us the minimum of 1,500 copies prior to the National Conference which would then be made available in our distribution center at the Conference or would you prefer to make a formal request under the Freedom of Information Act for a list of delegates and alternates so that you could distribute this information prior to the White House Conference.

Again we appreciate your expression of interest and support of the White House Conference and look forward to further communication with you in this regard.



I talked to Frances Naftalin yesterday about the use of the Library Funding pub at the White House Conference. She felt they could use 2000, as opposed to the 1000 we had originally planned on. This means that we will be short. (We have 1500 remaining, and 775 are programmed for the Media School Library meeting, the MN Library Ass'n general meeting and the Catholic University workshop on Libraries and the Legislative Process.) Our study is being highly touted around the country by the associate director of the American Library Ass'n, who finds it very impressive and is encouraging other organizations to do similar studies in their states, so we may be getting out-of-state requests for the pub.

I subsequently totaled up printing, mailing and evaluation sheet postage for an additional 2000 copies. It comes to approx. \$950.

I then talked to Nancy Harris at the St. Paul Foundation about any discretionary funds they might have to cover the reprinting. She is contacting Paul Verret, the executive director, and will get back to me in the next week or so. She felt there was a fair chance we could get additional funding.

The White House Conference on Libraries and Information Services doesn't take place until November so there is ample time to pursue this. If the St. Paul Foundation can't provide the funds, Dayton-Hudson (another of the initial funders of the study) might be sold the project. Since they are nationwide, we could make a good case: possibility of national impact of the study, etc.
