### P. L. HINES RITES HELD HERE FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Victim of Bursted Steam Pipe at College Project Laid to Rest in Greenwood

Sorrowing relatives, friends and associates filled the Methodist Euiscopal church auditorium to capacity Friday afternoon when last rites were held for Phillip L. Hines, 63, who succumbed at the Bemidji Lutheran hospital Tuesday evening a little over ten hours after being severely scalded when a steam pipe burst in the boiler room of the new addition under construction at the Bemidji State Teachers College.

More than 30 members of the Odd Fellows lodge, of which Mr. Hines was financial secretary for many years, attended in a body, while Boy Scout Troop No. 45, of which Mr. Hines was scoutmaster, attended under the supervision of Assistant Scoutmaster Don Glenn and filled several pews. The Salvation Army Boy Scout troop with Vision of Assistant Scoutmaster Don Glenn and filled several pews. The Salvation Army Boy Scout troop with Captain Edgar Stohler in charge and Troop No. 23 sponsored by the M. E. Church with Warren Kirk in charge occupied places in the gallery. Floral emblems, large sprays in which beautiful Easter lilies were especially prominent, and lovely bouquets sent as expressions of love and sympathy filled the chancel.

Dr. Grays spoke touchingly of Mr. Hines' Christian life of service and friendliness, mentioning especially his excellent work among the boys of the community through his Scout leadership. He also spoke words of comfort to the family and friends of the

community through his Scout leadership. He also spoke words of comfort to the family and friends. Tribute was paid Mr. Hines' Christian character and his civic, church and fraternal activities. He had been a member of the Methodist church here all during his residence in Bemidji and was especially active in the work of the choir, the official board, the Sunday school and other departments.

Special music at the services was furnished by W. H. Johnson and Harold Naylor, with Mrs. Naylor playing the accompaniments. Mr. Johnson sang as a solo "Abide With Me", while he and Mr. Naylor sang as a duet selection "The Beautiful Garden of Prayer".

Pallbearers were friends from the church and the Odd Fellows lodge, including A. T. Carlson, Axel Swedberg, W. L. Woods, H. R. Conner, C. E. Riley and R. M. Danielson.

Born October 18, 1875, in Simco county, Ontario, Canada, Mr. Hines was 63 years old last October. Coming to the United States when eight years old, he resided for many years in North Dakota, moving to Hines in 1914 and to Bemidji in 1916. He was a past master of Ionic Lodge No. 64 of the Masons at Hannah, North Dakota, and was actively associated with the Masonic lodge here for many years. Surviving are his widow, the former Adelia Elliott to whom he was united in marriage in 1902 at Morden, Manitoba; two daughters, Leona Hines of Los Angeles and Mrs. Andrew George of Minneapolis; a son Grover Hines of Hibbing; a brother, William Hines, and several nephews and nieces at Hines, and a sister, Mrs. F. E. Adams of

At the time of the fatal accident Mr. Hines, engineer at the Bemidji State Teachers College for many years, was

on duty checking a steam gauge in the boiler room of the new building when the steam was turned on for the day from the main power plant.

John M. Bjerkness, watchman on the WPA construction project who was in the boiler room with Mr. Hines when the steam pipe burst, was severely scalded also but his condition is reported steadily improving at the Bemidji Lutheran hospital where he has been receiving care since the accident been receiving care since the accident occurred.

Mendelssohn's "Elijah" To Be Presented at Bemidji High School Auditorium

As the result of hearty cooperation on the part of the entire community, the Bemidji Civic Oratorio Society will present next Sunday evening at the Bemidji high school auditorium Men-delssohn's "Elijah" as an oratorio to which the general public is invited.

The Bemidji State Teachers College The Bemidji State Teachers College A Cappella Choir, directed by Carl Thompson, and the College Glee Club, directed by Nels Hervi, have cooperated closely. These groups, together with choirs of the various churches, form the nucleus of the chorus of about 75 voices.

There will be no charge for admission but a free-will offering will be taken to defray the expense of music and other items and a generous response is urged, since the oratorio society has no other revenue.

Mendelssohn's "Elijah" is described as the most dramatic of all oratorios and contains many of the most popular oratorio numbers. Composed in 1846 for the Birmingham festival, it was largely recast the following year and has been a favorite ever since. and has been a favorite ever since. Mendelssohn originally wrote the soprano part for Jenny Lind but she never sang the role until after his death.

Because most of the people of Israel have forsaken the Lord God and returned to their god, Baal, the prophet Elijah brings down a drought and famine upon the land. The overture suggests the lapse of time and grip of the famine. An angel of the Lord sends Elijah out of the stricken land to the home of a widew whose son is dying. Elijah restores the child to life, and stays three years, as the widow has been provided with food for his sustenance during the famine. At the end of the three years, he appears before King Ahab and Queen Jezebel and challenges them to call forth the people of Israel and let it

forth the people of Israel and let it be publicly proved whose God is the Lord. Elijah tells them to slay a bullock and call on Baal to consume it by fire. They do so to no avail, and Elijah taunts them to call louder Finally he calls upon by fire. They do so to no avail, and Elijah taunts them to call louder. Finally he calls upon the Lord God and the offering is consumed by fire from the heavens. The people are convinced that this is the one God, so they follow Elijah's orders to slay all the prophets of Baal. Elijah calls then upon the Lord for rain and a

mighty storm breaks forth in the stricken land.

Ahab and Jezebel resent Elijah's works and are angered when he reproaches them for punishing the righteous and worshipping Baal, so Jezebel incites the people to anger and urges them to kill Elijah, who is much grieved to learn that the people have not repented of their sins. He sings the beautiful solo "It is Enough, O Lord: now take away my life..."

An angel appears and sends him out

O Lord: now take away my life....."
An angel appears and sends him out of the way of his enemies and tells him to wait patiently for the coming of the Lord. Elijah goes out on the mount where the Lord's glory descends upon him. The Lord passes by and a tempest arises, followed by earthquakes and fire which destroy all the infidels, leaving the faithful unharmed. A fiery chariot descends and carries Elijah by a whirlwind to heaven. ed. A fiery chariot descends and carries Elijah by a whirlwind to heaven. After this revelation of God, the final chorus foretells the coming of Christ.
