
# What should we expect of the next President?

It will take knowledge, experience, and backbone . . . and Harold Stassen has what it takes.

In 1945 he was called back from duty in the Pacific to sit as a delegate to the San Francisco Conference, where he helped draft the United Nations Charter.

Leading correspondents of all nations voted Stassen one of the two outstanding delegates at the Conference. (Herbert Evatt of Australia was the other.)


In 1947 he went up and down Europe, meeting leaders and people of all nations, from Stalin to Churchill, from kings to peasants.

He knows the problems, he knows the needs . . . and he knows how to deal with the problems and with the people involved.

Long before Pearl Harbor he was strongly urging preparedness and organization of nations for peace.

The record is clear: With Harold Stassen you can expect statesmanship.

## You can expect Harold Stassen to develop fair labor-management relations and high production

Government should be run for all the people .

Harold Stassen will be that kind of executive . . .

As Governor, he found bitter extremes fighting the labor battle. He steered a course between them and won approval of a workable labor law nearly 10 years ahead of the nation.

Result was labor peace and high production to everyone's benefit.

As postwar student of labor troubles, he again found bitter extremes. He laid a course of moderate action which became the pattern for federal law. But he knows it needs right attitudes and some amendment for best results.

As leader of opinion, he has shown constantly how there must be give as well as take in any argument.

His way will be fair to labor, to business, to agriculture—to all the people—as the way to high production and better living.

## You can expect Harold Stassen to foresee problems and do something about them


Ever since the war ended, we've had recurring crises—labor disputes, production, housing, prices, world relations.

We would have done much better with them by using a bit of foresight . . . a quality which Harold Stassen constantly demonstrates.

- In July 1945 he warned that ratification of the United Nations Charter was no insurance of peace; that veto power, other limitations of the charter, and bad faith, malice, or complacence could hamper efforts for peace.
- In November 1945, three months after Hiroshima, he urged the essentials of international control and inspection of atomic energy and research later incorporated in the Baruch report.
- In December 1945 he foresaw strike troubles and serious production losses—with resulting inflation—and proposed a bipartisan, expert conference to determine policies on wages, prices, etc. Instead, labor disputes got out of hand, production fell, prices rose.
- Late in 1945 and early in 1946—a year ahead of congressional action—he outlined a program for labor legislation which was largely written into the act of 1947.
- In May 1947 he proposed using 10% of American production of goods and food in a business-like program for building worldwide peace, plenty, and freedom... a forerunner of the Marshall Plan.

There are many others . . . but these illustrate the Stassen capacity for foresight and statesmanship.

- Said Time: "Few men in public life have exhibited more sympathy for the ordinary man, more understanding of the hopes and fears of the ordinary citizen."
