Dear Governor:

Your article, which I trust is not returned too late, is expertly done and can stand as written. I have spent considerable time with it, and with profit to myself. For whatever they may be worth, I have made some additions and some rearrangements in a retyped draft. This may aid in your editorial revision.

My additions are expressed and included in parentheses--e.g., by using the device \*( ). I have endeavored to keep true to what seemed to be your intent; however, I may have stretched a bit here and there; if so, it was unintentional.

You will note some changes in your "second" and "third" principles. There is so much packed in your compact sentences that the real intent was somewhat obscure to me. My additions here are satisfying to me, as a sample test; but, again, I may be expressing something different. It is here, upon these two points, that the whole thesis rests.

I conferred with Alvin Hansen on the housing paragraphs. He suggests adding two paragraphs which I am attaching, labelled "A", for insertion after my page 7. I have thus numbered his page 7A. His second paragraph may be too strong for the present, but it is suggestive. PAnd I took some liberties in attempting revision of the summary, merely to bring out the points.

Your draft is nicely expressed; it is adroit; and some of the key sentences are gems.

If I can be of any further service, please call upon me. And I'll try to keep to any time schedule you may suggest.

Dear Governor:

Just a brief note to let you know that we are thinking of you and miss you, and I want to tell you that in all my life I have never seen such a display of self-control as you and Mrs. Stassen and Glenn exhibited last week. I was ashamed of myself. Here I am, fully grown, and I had a lump in my throat as big as a goose egg. I thought I could depend on Haskins for support and when I looked at him I found him in worse shape than I was, and if we hadn't both ducked I think we would have said boo-hoo in public, but what topped off the whole parade for me was when that boy of yours stood out of the car and saluted you and said "Good-bye Dad". I just kind of vanished in the crowd after that.

I have been up across the Iron Range and over to Walker, Park Rapids, Detroit Lakes, Moorhead and Fargo since then and every person I talked to that knew you at all was just thrilled over the fact that you were in service. They knew of course, that it was a matter of your choice and everyone I have talked to of any importance, commends you. I haven't heard a man say anything unfavorable to your leaving the State service.

I have just had a good talk with Badger. He informs me that Governor Thye is getting along fine and taking a good hold of things. I had a good visit in Detroit Lakes with Senator Sletvold and he said everything is going to be just okey.

I don't expect you to take time to answer this. You are going to have so much mail, don't waste your time answering my letters, but I am going to write you from time to time to let you know how things are going. One thing I would like to have you tell Mrs. Stassen is that if at any time any crank or anyone



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
