Dear Harold:

Enclosed herewith you will find a tentative Schedule of next week's appointments in Los Angeles. This is for your consideration and suggestions.

It is not my intention to publicize anything except your meetings with the Members of the Motion Picture Industry. However, it would be desirable from the standpoint of the party to have some mention made of your breakfast with local Republican officials. Knowing, however, that care should be taken to avoid any political complexion being placed on your visit, I withheld any thought of this pending hearing from you.

A number of persons have offered their homes to you during your visit here. Almost all of them, however, are persons in rather prominent financial circles and from a psychological point of view I do not think it would be wise to accept any of them. Moreover, if you accept one of them, of course, the others sometimes choose to "misunderstand". Mrs. Haight and I would, of course, be delighted to have you and Mrs. Stassen as our guests. Our home is not large, but we do have a comfortable suite there. Also it is neutral ground but, here again we run into a possible political complexion being placed on your visit, and from your point of view, and since the press is bound to know where you are staying I have refrained from urging this upon you and have tentatively arranged a suite for you and Mrs. Stassen at the Beverly-Wilshire. The reason for the selection of the Beverly-Wilshire Hotel is that it is much closer to the heart of the motion picture studio area.

As I told you in our meeting last week, it was my thought to develop the following overall picture by your visit:

(1) Meet as many of the prominent members of the Motion Picture Industry as possible on a wholly non-partisan basis.

- (2) Meet privately eight or ten persons who are not necessarily widely known but whose ability and integrity could be depended upon and whose friendship could be developed into something more than casual. (Barbecue.)
- (3) Meet informally the official State and County Party Officers in this area. (Breakfast.)
- (4) Meet privately for question and answer period with the party Finance Committee for Southern California. (Luncheon.)

To accomplish all of the above will mean crowding quite a bit into a 24-hour period. However, we can do it. It is my thought at present to take care of Item (2) above by having a barbeque dinner in the yard of my home which you and Mrs. Stassen could attend when the reception is over. So far as the public and press are concerned, however, it is my suggestion that you state simply that you are dining alone with old friends or if you wish, with me. I leave that with you but in any event it should not be understood to be any kind of a party. Incidentally, if you do have any close friends that you would like to have present at the barbeque, do not hesitate to instruct me on this.

I will, of course, see that you are furnished with the names and addresses of all the persons whom you meet at these various gatherings.

As I told you in San Francisco, in building up our party structure here it is important that we have as many of our party leaders as possible visit the Southern California area. For that reason I do hope that your original plan to come here will not miscarry.

I know you realize the importance of giving us as much time as possible to prepare these various meetings and in order to assist you in connection with matters of transportation, etc., I am sending a copy of the Schedule to Douglas Mode so that he will be fully informed.

Permit me to thank you again for your courtesies while in San Francisco. I very much appreciated your frank and plain-spoken discussion.



Dear Harold:

We who have appreciated you for a number of years have been made very proud by your war record and your record as a real statesman at the San Francisco Conference. Many of us would like to have a chance to see you while you are home, but I fully appreciate that you need rest and want to be with your family as much as possible. Consequently, I am writing you this note, inadequately expressing what I feel.

I haven't seen Governor Thye very recently, but I have had several visits with him since Legislature adjourned, and I want you to know what he knows, and that is that I am just as enthusiastic about him as a good governor as ever. There are many things here in state and city politics that I don't like, and one of them is that there are so many so-called Republicans that apparently think every man in public life should always do everything that they think ought to be done. They do not realize that if a man in public life tried to suit everybody he would find it impossible, and he would certainly not be a leader of a successful party.

Dear Commander Stassen:

You will be glad to know that we have secured for the Mayo Memorial gifts and signed pledges amounting to about \$725,000. I feel confident that we shall be able in time to accomplish what we set out to do, --to raise \$1,000,000 in gifts from corporations and individuals.

We had expected to receive a grant of \$1,000,000 from the Legislature. As you know, \$750,000 was authorized shortly before the session closed. We are still hoping that the remaining \$250,000 will be appropriated two years hence when the Legislature reconvenes.

In addition to the Committee which you arranged to have appointed, committees have been appointed in Minne-apolis, St. Paul, Duluth, and for the various counties throughout the State. We also have a National Committee of Sponsors made up of distinguished people all over the country who have seemed glad to have their names associated with our undertaking.

We are now thinking of organizing an International Committee of Sponsors. This seems particularly appropriate in view of the world-wide influence of the work of the Doctors Mayo and of the respect in which they were held by people in many foreign countries. No individuals have as yet been invited. Would you be willing to serve as chairman of the proposed Committee? No duties would be involved, but the influence of your sponsorship would be a great help in accomplishing what we have in mind. The interest on the part of a few representative people from many countries which is likely to be developed by membership on an international committee of sponsors would not only be a fitting tribute to the Doctors Mayo, but would be a very definite advantage to the University Medical School and to the whole cause of medical research and instruction. I hope you will be willing to help us in the way proposed.

Your continued leadership in behalf of a better world is being recognized in a remarkable way. What has already been accomplished creates the finest kind of opportunity for still larger service in the years to come.

Dear Harold:

I am writing you because frankly it would mean a great deal to me if I might by some chance be able to fill a billet under you or somewhere in your immediate outfit. I fully realize that this may be entirely impracticable, but I am taking the liberty of writing you about my status and background with the hope that there may be a billet suitable for me and that you can request me through ComFair West Coast.

Attached herewith, enclosure one (1), is a copy of my transfer orders to ComFair West Coast for further assignment to duty. While almost six (6) months have passed since the date of my orders, it now appears that my relief is finally on his way here. Unfortunately I do not know his exact date of arrival, but he is expected within ten days which will bring him into Squantum on approximately the 15th of July. I will report to San Diego twenty-eight (28) days after Mr. Sealy reports here as my relief. This means that probably I will be in San Diego around the 15th of August.

In order that you will be fully advised of my background and experience, it is outlined briefly here.

(a) First National Bank, St. Paul, Minnesota -- October 1934 to February 1942. (Asst. Cashier 1941).

(b) Indoctrination (First Class, A-V(S)) NAS, Quonset Point, R.I. --

February to March 1942.

(c) Personnel Officer, and Adm. Asst. to the Executive Officer, NAS, Squantum, Mass. -- April 1942 to date.

U. S. NAVAL AIR STATION SQUANTUM 71. MASS. Note: The billet here at Squantum has coincided with the period of establishment and construction of this station. It has grown from an activity with only five officers and a few enlisted men to a small naval air station with allowances of 54 officers and 477 men. Our station has an excellent reputation in this district and there has been a wonderful opportunity here for me to become thoroughly familiar with accounting and record procedures in connection with both officer and enlisted personnel. I have received a written commendation from Commander, Naval Air Bases, FIRST Naval District on the personnel accounting and control procedures established here. In addition, due to being close to the Executive Officer, I have had every opportunity to take part in operations and the development of station policy. I am not expecting a reply to all this, but just wanted to forward it to you for what it might make possible.
