The calendar in question was printed by our printing presses at headquarters. You can, therefore, be assured that the cost of the war has not been increased by the picture of the pretty girl on the calendars of the South Pacific. It should also be noted by enclosures (E) and (P), that all of the monthly calendars of the South Pacific do not contain pictures of pretty girls and that a variety of pictures is presented. It is recognised that it is perhaps difficult for people on the comfortable mainland of the United States to fully understand and appreciate, the pictorial interests of officers and men in the South Pacific Forces, who have spent many months at lonely island outposts of civilization, peering at and killing the ugly Japanese and oppressed by the denimens of the steaming jungles. It is also recognised that none of the pictures in enclosures (D), (E) and (F) would receive a second glance on Broadway or in the Harvard Art Gallery, but the officers and men of the South Pacific locked at each of them many times. -1 -





Heretofore, our men were quartered in tents that were screened, floored, and lights were installed. It seems to me these same arrangements could be made again. I am opposed to having any men housed in tents without decks, screening, or lights.

Dear Cdr. Stassen:

In order to give you as much warning as possible of what any of your enlisted personnel may expect in the way of housing here, I am writing to inform you that lumber and screening is unobtainable here for housing. We fortunately have on hand enough for two additional tents for officers; but when that is used up, according to information I have received both from the local Navy Public Workes, and the Army Engineering Office, there will be no more available. I am therefore planning to obtain tents, which will be set up without any decks, and probably with no framing; although if I can obtain any labor, I am going to try to build a rough framing of cocoanut logs and screen in the tents with mosquito netting.

There are some Quonset huts available, but I am not disposed to erect them here unless I receive instructions to the contrary; and those accompanied by a release from Comseron.

In the event that this proposed housing project is not considered adequate for your men, the only other alternative is for some of you to obtain a prompt shipment of materials here from Comseron, together with instructions that a sufficient priority be assigned to the project to enable us to obtain the necessary labor.

Incidentally, the proposed tents will not have lights in them, and there are no lanterns available; consequently, I should appreciate your equipping the men who will live in them with lanterns or good flashlights.

We are moving most of the fighter director officers from the Camp, and should have sufficient housing for your officers in Quonset huts and tents. I should appreciate, however, your seeing that I am informed as soon as possible the number and rank of those coming, and approximately when.

I am extremely sorry that we shall not be able to do any better, since it has always been my desire to provide adequate and fairly mosquito proof shelter for the men first; but I wanted you to know the situation as soon as possible.

Dear Secretary Carroll:

This time, I am really faced with a dilemma which cannot be resolved without knowledge which I hope you are, or shortly will be, in a position to send me. The problem is how to reconcile reasonable hospitality with the order (and my own fervent desire) not to overbuild. In addition, they are really giving out of material and labor up here, as you probably know; and there won't be any of this rushing through at the last minute.

In addition, I am quite sure that we are going to have some unexpected guests, who will come around either to add a last bit of essential knowledge, or out of curiosity; so I am especially anxious to know all I can. The situation is not quite as bad for officers, as it is for enlisted men. But I need to know quite definitely about both, as soon as I can know; otherwise, we has shall have people sleeping with each other, or in the galley, with a number swung from the rafters.

The Topics of the Tropics is finally beginning its run in our vicinity, and we are looking forward to seeing it; I especially, since I want to see how Leta can do when they really turn her loose as I understand they have in this show. I hope that we'll have something of the sort to entertain us when all of you next appear.

Although I doubt if the Japanese can make much out of this even if they got it, I am classifying it as secret, and sending it by officer messenger who leaves tomorrow. Do the best you can for me, as soon as you can; and I hope that we'll be able to make everybody reasonably comfortable.






