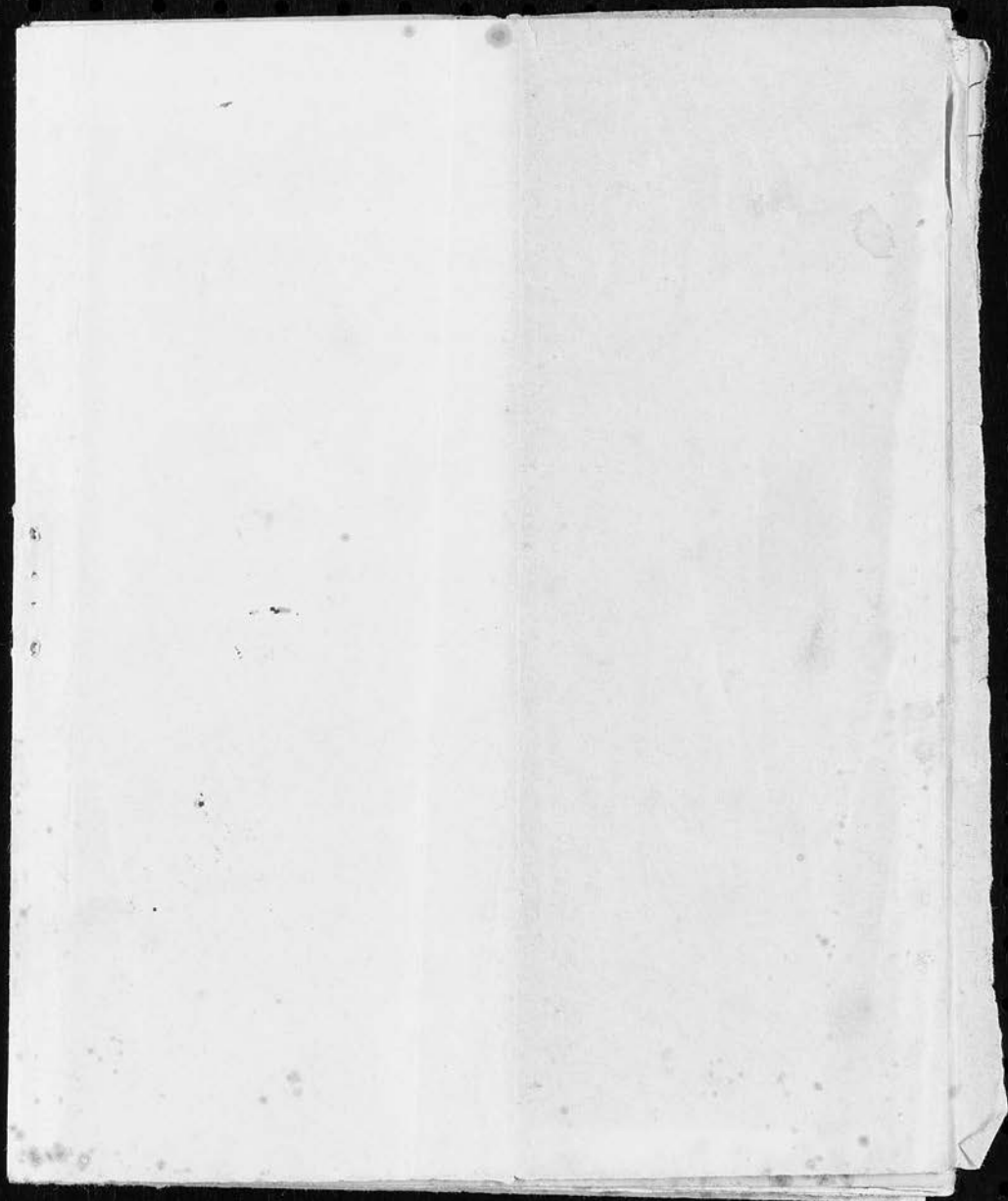

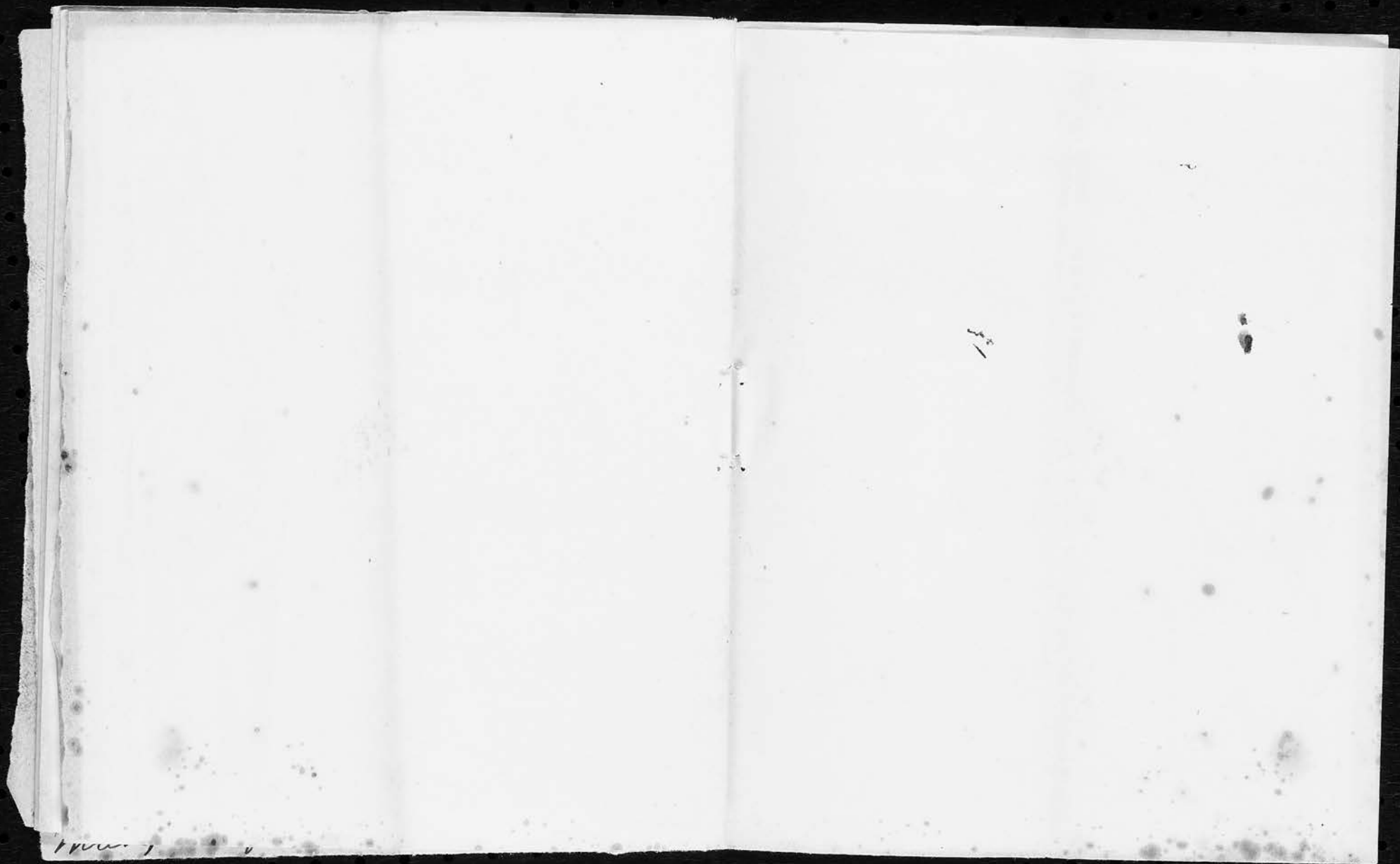

The following extracts from the Charter and By-Laws contain all the regulations existing in connection with the subject-matter of this petition.

ACT OF INCORPORATION—SECTION 8.—Be it further enacted, That the lots in said Cemetery shall be indivisible, and upon the death of any proprietor of any lot in the said Cemetery containing not less than one hundred square feet, the devisee of such lot, or the heir-at-law as the case may be, shall be entitled to all the privileges of membership as aforesaid; and if there be more than one devisee or heir-at-law of each lot, the Board of Trustees for the time being, shall designate which of the said devisees or heirs-at-law shall represent the said lot, and vote in the meeting of the Corporation;—which designation shall continue in force, until by death, removal or other sufficient cause, another designation shall become necessary; and in making such designation, the Trustees shall, as far as they conveniently may, give the preference to males over females, and to proximity of blood and priority of age; having due regard, however, to proximity of residence.

BY-LAWS.—ARTICLE 30. When the devisees or heirs-at-law of any deceased proprietor, or the guardian or trustee of such persons being infants, shall desire the appointment of a person to represent the lot owned in common by them, written application to the Trustees shall be made by them in that behalf.

This petition may be presented at any regular meeting of the Trustees, which occurs on the second Tuesday of every month. The Annual Meeting of the Corporation is held on the first Monday in February.

COLONEL THOMAS W. CLARKE.

The record of a notable life has been given to the public in the literal facts of his career, but a few words of loving remembrance are due to one who reached so wide a circle of friends from the days of school and college, of comrades during a devoted army service, and of brethren in his own chosen profession of the law. Whichever side of Colonel Clarke's life we touch we find it well rounded with solid performance. It is still not too long ago for us gratefully to recall his four years' of gallant service in the war of the Rebellion; a service whose value, from his absence of self-assertion, had to be learned from other lips than his own; though given with a devotion which never faltered from those first days when everything was clouded with doubt, until the expring struggles of the Rebellion.

To his profession of the law, and especially to his department of patent law, he brought a quickness of apprehension, controlled by sound judgment, and a native aptitude for dealing with its most delicate differentiations that was not excelled among his brethren of the bar; but his peculiar gift was the intuitive faculty of research, from which it seemed as if nothing could be too remote for his investigation. The width of his reading would have appeared discursive, if it were not that his results were always in point; what others passed by unheedingly or overlooked never seemed to escape him, and was sure sooner or later to come into play. He was therefore innately a scholar in the best and widest sense of the term. Not merely were his stores of knowledge deep and broad, but he assimilated all he knew so well that he often appeared better informed in each man's specialty than the specialist himself.

To many one of his most attractive qualities was his genuine and racy sense of humor. He was an admirable raconteur, and the clever anecdote or witty story had their perfect setting in his apt phrase and appreciative delivery. But his chiefest charm, and that surely not to any limited circle, but to all with whom he came in daily contact, was his rare sweetness of nature—a kindly gentleness that made and accepted the best of every one, conceding to each and all at least their due.

The class in Harvard to which he belonged had during the last few years gathered together informally three or four times each year. They noticed with each occasion the greater effort which he made to attend. For two years they have missed the benignant presence of Phillips Brooks; they feel their circle narrow, with a fresh and keen sense of loss, as the kindly face of Clarke, which sickness had prematurely marked, it is true, with the lines of age, but ever young in their remembrance, will greet them no more.

A Well-known Patent Lawyer.

BUGLE SOUNDED TAPS.

Funeral of Colonel T. W. Clarke at the New Jerusalem Church, Roxbury.

Over the casket of Colonel Thomas W. Clarke, at the funeral in the New Jerusalem Church on Warren street, Roxbury, this afternoon, was spread the flag of the regimental association to which the colonel belonged and on which were inscribed the names of all the battles in which the Twenty-ninth regiment participated. The regimental flags were placed on one side of the casket, while opposite were the colors of the Loyal Legion. Nearby were numerous floral tributes, consisting mostly of roses and lilies, sent by the organizations of which the dead colonel was a member, and by friends.

The service was of the simplest kind. Rev. James De Normandie of the First Unitarian Church, Roxbury, read from the Scriptures and made a prayer; then Rev. James Reed of the New Jerusalem Church, Boston, delivered a short address, ending with a prayer. As the last words of the Lord's Prayer fell from the speaker's lips the notes of a bugle were heard, sounding the soldier's signal for rest. There was no other music.

The little church was filled with relatives, friends and former associates of the colonel in the legal profession, while the organizations to which the deceased belonged were each represented. From the Twenty-ninth Regiment Association were General Barnes, president; S. C. Wright, color-bearer and secretary; Lieutenant George H. Taylor, Levi Gaylord, Charles Pond H. C. Pickford, J. Mahoney and Charles Vaughan. The last six acted as pall-bearers. Other members of the association who attended were Senator Neal, Major John M. Dean, and representatives from Companies K, B, I, F, H, besides a group of twelve old comrades from the company, A. The Loyal Legion was represented by Colonels Livermore, Tripp, Hapgood, Captain Lee, Companions Dorr and Swift and Colonel Rand. Among others in attendance were Commander D. S. Jones and a delegation from Post 26, of the Grand Army. The burial is to be at Cohasset.

COL. J. W. CLARKE DIES.

Well-Known Veteran and Patent Lawyer Passes Away at His Home.

Col Thomas William Clarke, the well-known patent lawyer, died at his home, in hotel Putnam, Roxbury, yesterday. He had been ill but a short time.

Col Clarke for a long time was connected with the Highland street railway company as counsel, and up to two years ago acted as counsel for those interested in the Meigs system of elevated railroad. He was one of the organizers of the former company, and figured prominently in its affairs up to the time of the consolidation with the West End street railway company.

As a patent lawyer Col Clarke was exceptionally well known. His office was located in Pemberton sq.

He was 60 years old, having been born in 1834. He was educated at Chauncy hall and at Harvard college. He was a member of the class of which the late Bishop Phillips-Brooks was a member—that of 54. When the war broke out he enlisted as a member of A company of the 29th Massachusetts regiment, and was promoted from time to time until he received the title of colonel.

In the last 20 years Col Clarke took great interest in municipal affairs and the questions concerning the commonwealth's interests. He gave considerable attention to the question of rapid transit, and his name has been before the public often in the past two years as an advocate of an elevated railroad system. He was a member of the Roxbury rapid transit committee, and figured quite prominently in its business.

A wife, two daughters and a son survive Col Clarke. The funeral services will be held Wednesday at 1.30 p m, at the church of the New Jerusalem, corner of Warren and St James sts, Roxbury.

THE PATENT LAWYER, DIES IN ROXBURY.

He Was a Harvard Graduate and Served With Valor in the War of the Rebellion—Ex-Judge Griswold of Conn.—Postmaster Webb of Williamette Found Dead.

Col. T. W. Clarke died last evening at Hotel Putnam, Roxbury, of heart failure after a short illness.

Col. T. W. Clarke, son of C. W. and Ann R. Clarke, was born in Boston, Dec. 1, 1834. His father was a native of Roxbury, and a well-known merchant of this city. He was a member of the common council a number of terms, an alderman one term, and was twice elected to the State legislature on the whig ticket. He was treasurer of the Amer. Unitarian Assoc. a number of years, and for a long period was a director of the Trader's Bank, the Manufacturers' Insurance Co., and the N. E. Glass Co. He died in 1879 at the age of 33.

Mr. Clarke's mother was a native of Boston, daughter of the late Dr. David Townsend, who was a pupil of Dr. Warren and one of the surgeons at Bunker Hill, Gen. Gates' chief surgeon at Saratoga, and director general of hospitals during the Revolution and surgeon of the U. S. Marine hospital, inspector of pot and pearl ashes for Mass., and pres. of the Society of Cincinnati later.

T. W. Clarke was educated in Chauncy Hall school and by private tutors, and graduated from Harvard in 1855. He studied law with H. M. & H. G. Parker and at the Harvard law school. He was admitted to the Suffolk bar in 1857, and conducted a general practice until 1861. He was commissioner of insolvency in 1859-60-61.

In 1861 he went into the war as capt. in the Wightman Rifles, which was first attached to the 4th regt. Mass. Vol. and afterwards organized at Fort Monroe with other 3 year companies which had gone into service independently into the Mass. battalion, which became in Dec., 1861, the 29th Mass. He was mustered out in 1865, as capt. with Mass. appointment of colonel, which the size of the regt. did not permit muster. He was quartermaster at Alexandria, Va., 1862-63; commissary in E. Tennessee, Jan. 1864; judge-advocate in Alexandria, Va., 1863, and near Pittsburg, Va., 1865; and adjutant-general in the Second and Third Brigades, First Div., 9th army corps in 1864-65.

He was at Big Bethel June 10, 1861; in the Irish Brigade during the siege of Richmond, 1862; was in the Vicksburg and Jackson campaign in 1863; in E. Tennessee, 1863-64; in the Wilderness and Petersburg campaigns from the last of May, 1864, until after the fall of Petersburg; and led the 3d line at the Crater, July 30, 1864, taking in the fight at Fort Stedman, March 25, 1865.

After the war Mr. Clarke resumed his practice. He confined it almost entirely to patents, copyrights and trademarks. He was associated at the time of his death with F. F. Raymond at 32 Pemberton sq. He was counsel for the Highland St. R.R. from its organization until its consolidation with the Middlesex. He was a member of the Loyal Legion. In politics he was a republican.

Mr. Clarke married Miss Eliza A. Raymond of Boston. Three children survive him.

COL. THOMAS W. CLARKE DEAD

Colonel Thomas William Clarke died at his home in Hotel Putnam, Warren street, Roxbury, yesterday of heart failure.

Colonel Clarke was born in Boston Dec. 1, 1834. He was educated in Chauncy-Hall School and Harvard College, graduating from the latter in 1855, being in the same class as Phillips Brooks. At the outbreak of the war Colonel Clarke enlisted in Company A, Twenty-ninth Massachusetts Volunteer Militia, and was later breveted major. He was counsel and one of the organizers of the Highland Street Railway Company. He had been for many years in the active practice of law in the firm of Clarke & Raymond, Pemberton square. The deceased leaves a widow, two daughters and a son. The funeral will be held at the Church of the New Jerusalem, corner Warren and St. James streets, Roxbury, Wednesday, at 1:30.

DEATH OF COL. CLARKE.

Col. Thomas William Clarke, one of Roxbury's best known citizens, and a well known lawyer, died last night of heart failure.

COMRADES OF THE OLD TWENTY-NINTH MASS. REGULAR VOLUNTEERS NOT FORGOTTEN ON THEIR REUNION DAY.

June 17, 1932 would have been the 63rd reunion day of the "boys in blue" of the Old 29th if they were able to travel and hold their banquet as they were accustomed to do in past years.

The regimental association was formed in Boston on June 17, 1870, and carried on until June 17, 1929, when the last reunion was held. The first president was the late Gen. Joseph H. Barnes, father of Judge Joseph H. Barnes, of the East Boston District Court. The last president of the association was Col. Willard D. Tripp of Woburn, who died during the past year. As the ranks were thinning fast prior to the disbanding of the association Col. Tripp deemed it wise to discontinue the annual reunions. At that time the secretary, Mrs. Jeremiah L. Murphy, whose father, Charles H. Almeder is one of the few remaining comrades of the regiment, promised that the day would always be remembered as the 29th's own day, and that each one of the members would be remembered by a personal visit if the distance were not too great, and the little tokens of good cheer they were wont to have at the reunion would tend to keep alive the spirit of comradeship which had been kindled so many years ago.

Captain Joseph B. Thomas of Charlestown presented a large silk flag to the regimental association and some few years ago when the number of veterans was much greater in attendance than it would be possible to assemble today, it was voted that when the association no longer

existed the beautiful silk flag would be the property of Mrs. Murphy, who had been then secretary for over twenty years and who had been elected for life at one of their last meetings. The flag ^{is} ~~was~~ still in perfect condition although presented in 1881.

Though valueless to others the little red-white and blue memory boxes mean a great deal to the men all of whom have now reached the grand old age of eighty-five and ninety years of age, ready and willing for what God has in store for them, truly verifying the fact that true patriotism fears nothing.

Three of the comrades live in Plymouth: Seth L. Holmes, Co. E; Caleb T. Robbins, Co. D; who is totally blind, and Leander M. Vaughn; Lorenzo L. Billings, Co. H, resides in Sharon; Lemuel Capen in Avon, Mass., and Mr. Charles H. Almeder at present in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

A second flag with the battles of the regiment printed in gold letters thereon has been taken at the decease of a comrade and placed on the casket. During the past week, the secretary draped the flag on the casket of Miss Lois Williams Clark, whose funeral was held at The Church of the Advent, Brimmer St., Boston. Miss Clark was the daughter of Capt., Tom Clark, and her boast was that in sixty years of life she had missed ~~but~~ only two reunions. She made the little visitation on June 17, last year, with the secretary, and was looking forward to the same this year-faithful to the end.
