A TRIBUTE TO SMITTY

Ira (Smitty) and my late husband, Ken Davis, were good friends. Although they seldom saw each other, hardly a week went by that they didn't speak by phone. They would laugh and cry and gossip. They would bemoan the condition of African-Americans in the U. S. in general and in Minneapolis in particular. They would talk about women--and men--and those they weren't too sure of. They would deride each other and exchange insults. They would call each other names. They would laugh and joke and gossip some more. And through it all, anyone listening could tell that they truly loved and respected each other.

When they had solved, or at least discussed, all the problems of the world, Ken would hand the phone to me. Smitty would always begin the conversation by telling me how beautiful I am, how beautiful his wife is, how much he loved Black women and how rotten most men are. He would then go on to say that Ken was the exception.

"I'll tell you one thing", he would say. "I love Ken like a brother. LOVE HIM LIKE A BROTHER. If he ever needs ANYTHING, you just let me know. I'll knock heads for that man. Don't nobody mess with Ken while Smitty's around!"

Then he would go on to tell tall tales about his exploits when he was younger and stronger. Tales of the days when he was the bouncer at joints so bad that even God wouldn't set foot in them. (Of course, he told them as though they had just happened that day.)

I would say to him, "Smitty, you are totally insane. You can't do all that any more. One of these young dudes will mess you up!"

To which he would reply, "No way! You just let one of 'em f___with Ken, and you'll see!"

One Christmas when Ken was Black Santa, he went to the Capri Theater, which Smitty owned at the time. Smitty had invited all the neighborhood kids to meet Santa and have some treats. Now, these kids were juvenile deliquents, hoods, thugs. They were yelling and screaming, running up and down the aisles, ripping up the seats, sticking gum and candy into the carpet, writing on the walls and generally tearing up the place.

Ken appealed to Smitty, "Man, you've got to get these suckers under control!"

"Don't worry about it", said Smitty. He reached for his shotgun.

Stepping up to the microphone, he yelled, "All you little Muthas, SHUT UP!" And shot a hole in the ceiling of the theater. You've never seen such an orderly bunch of kids!

A rough, tough, blustery storm with a heart of gold and his eyes on the prize--that was Ira Smith.

Best Wishes to Marcia K. Copeland as she competes for National Business Home Economist of the Year.

Marcia has been my friend, my mentor, my role model and my inspiration since the beginning of my career in 1965. She is a consummate home economist.

At General Mills, Marcia climbed from the entry-level position of Product Representive, through Supervisor and Manager to Director of the Betty Crocker Food and Publications Center. Her knowledge of food, her familiarity with the consumer and her negotiating skills served her well in those years. Even when she took time out from her career for mother-hood, she free-lanced as a home economist. Then she developed the formidable presentation skills that she displays today.

One of the things I admire most about Marcia is her true committment to equal employment opportunity. Hers is not merely lip-service. On several occasions she, personally, led the search for a minority employee, often spending hours on the telephone calling colleges and universities. She added her personal endorsement to deserving minorities who were recommended for promotion or candidacy or to represent her department in some compacity. She worked hard to initiate and maintain programs that brought the Betty Crocker Food and Publications Center in contact with home economists from traditionally black colleges and universities. Her objective? To assure that their students would be viable candidates for jobs.

Marcia reached outside her job to lend a hand to young home economists. She made friends with students. Then she helped them to make curriculum choices, taught them interviewing skills, evaluated their resumes, and guided their job searches. At the same time she worked tirelessly with their colleges to assure that their curricula reflected the changing needs of the marketplace.

Marcia's contributions to the profession, too are apparent. As Treasurer of the American Home Economics Association, she eliminated the deficit and balanced the budget. Among her accomplishments as President of AHEA she can proudly include the sale of the Headquarters building as well as the selection and hiring of the new Executive Director.

The National Coalition for Black Development in Home Economics is proud to nominate for the AHEA Distinguished Service Award, Flossie M. Byrd, Ph.D.

Dr. Byrd is currently serving as Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs at Prairie View A & M University, Prairie View, Texas. She began her long association with the home economics professioon in 1948, when she received a Bachelor of Science degree in Home Economics Education from Florida A & M University. Then she accepted her first teaching assignment at a high school in Florida. Later she went on to earn a Master of Education in Home Economics from Pennsylvania State University and a Ph.D. in Home Economics from Cornell University.

A look at Flossie Byrd's resume' only begins to tell the story of her contributions to the profession. There one can see countless honors, awards, appointments, professional memberships, publications, research projects, community service projects and more.

In the 40-plus years that she has plied her trade, Dr. Byrd has influenced countless young people to pursue home economics as a career. Even more importantly, she has encouraged them to become greater than they thought they could be and to make opportunities where none exist. She has served as a role model to show that a black-American female from the inner city can succeed in a white-male dominated society. When Flossie became a member of the American Home Economics Association, she was one of very few visible minorities in the organization. Along with all of the other pioneers, she proved that working in a traditionally female profession does not inhibit achievement.

Flossie has never been one to put her name on the rolls, then sit back and let others do the work. She has always been an active participant in home economics, reaching beyond teaching to touch the lives of others. Among her AHEA activities she can point to service on the Foundation's Board of Trustees, the Leadership Development Committee, the Council for Professional Development, the Commission on Graduate Programs, the Future Development Committee and the Human Relations Committee. In 1985-87, she served as Vice President for Professional Standards.

During her 27 years at Prairie View, Dr. Byrd has shaped the home economics programs, sometimes single-handedly. She evaluated ruthlessly, then dropped some courses, added others. She encouraged and cajoled, until the College of Home Economics was recognized as a force, not only at the University, but in the state of Texas and throughout the home economics community. Witness the number of research grants and special institutes that Prairie View receives.

All in all, if anyone deserves a Distinguished Service Award in Home Economics, Dr. Flossie M. Byrd is that person.

The National Coalition for Black Development in Home Economics is proud to support the nomination of Dr. Gwendolyn Newkirk for the AHEA Distinguished Service Award. Dr. Newkirk is a dedicated professional who has made many noteworthy contributions to the Home Economics profession. She is well respected among home economists across the nation and holds the distinction as an African-American pioneer professional.

Dr. Newkirk's service to the American Home Economics Association is one of exemplary leadership. Having progressed within the Association from treasurer (1970-72) to Vice President for Program Development (1972-74) to President-elect (1974-75), in 1975 she became the first African-American in the history of AHEA to assume the presidency of the Association. Although the Coalition is most proud of Dr. Newkirk for this pioneering achievement, through numerous other involvements she has provided a rich legacy of leadership for home economists in general, and especially black home economists. Her involvements have included the Future Development Committee, Professional Development Council, Code of Ethics Committee, Program of Work Committee, Award Committee for the Commemorative Lecturer, Leadership Development Committee and the Bylaws Committee. Additionally, she has served (1987), and is currently serving (1990-91) as Chair of the Past Presidents Organization. Her contributions in the Association are also noteworthy with respect to the AHEA Foundation, having served as Board of Trustees President-elect (1982-83), President (1983-84), and Secretary (1984-85).

In addition to AHEA, Dr. Newkirk is a member of numerous professional, scientific and honorary societies, including Kappa Omicron Nu and Phi Upsilon Omicron. As with AHEA, she is a life-time member of the American Vocational Association and has held several leadership positions in its Home Economics Division.

For more than forty years, Dr. Newkirk has contributed her time, energy and talents to the Home Economics profession. Since assuming her first position in higher education as a Home Economics instructor at Bennett College in 1946, she has continued to advance professionally to become a full professor and the first African-American to chair a home economics unit at a major university (Chairman, Consumer Science and Education, College of Home Economics, University of Nebraska, 1971 - present). Over the years, she has participated actively in professional meetings, authored several publications, developed and received internal and external grants, as well as served as a guest lecturer and consultant in Home Economics.

Dr. Newkirk has earned numerous honors and academic distinctions, including Outstanding Teacher Award for two consecutive years at the University of Minnesota (1970 and 1971), and Visiting Scholar at the University of Oklahoma (1976) and Indiana University in Pennsylvania (1982). Most recently (1990), she was presented with the Doctor of Humane Letters from Tillotson College in Austin, Texas.

Throughout her career, Dr. Newkirk has exemplified professional excellence through service, commitment and dedication to the Home Economics profession. As can be attested by her record of noteworthy contributions, she is highly deserving of special recognition. To this end, the National Coalition for Black Development in Home Economics strongly supports the nomination of Dr. Gwendolyn Newkirk for the AHEA Distinguished Service Award.

Instructions

Read the instructions carefully. If you do not follow the instructions, we may have to return your petition which may delay final action.

Definitions

Third Preference Immigrant - A prospective employee who is a member of the professions, or who because of exceptional ability in the sciences or arts will substantially benefit the national economy, cultural interest, or welfare of the United States, and whose services are sought by an employer.

Sixth Preference Immigrant - A prospective employee who is capable of performing skilled or unskilled labor, not of a temporary or seasonal nature, for which there is a shortage of employable and willing persons in the United States.

Schedule A - A list of occupations for which it has already been determined that a shortage of U.S. workers exists. This list can be found in Title 20 CFR 656.10.

1. Who can file?

- A. You may file this form under Third Preference if you are:
 - 1) the prospective employer, or
 - 2) the prospective employee, or
 - any other person applying on the prospective employee's behalf.
- B. You may file this form under Sixth Preference only if you are the prospective employee's prospective employer.

If the petition is approved, the husband or wife and unmarried children under 21 years of age of the prospective employee will automatically be eligible to apply for a visa.

2. What documents do you need?

- A. 1) In general, you must give INS certain documents with this form. For each document needed, give INS the original and one copy. Originals will be returned to you.
 - If you do not wish to give an original document, you may give INS a copy. The copy must be certified by:
 - a) an INS or U.S. consular officer, or
 - b) an attorney admitted to practice law in the United States, or
 - c) an INS accredited representative

(INS still may require originals).

- 3) Documents in a foreign language must be accompanied by a complete English translation. The translator must certify that the translation is accurate and that he or she is competent to translate.
- B. You must give INS a completed Form ETA-750A&B "Application for Alien Employment Certification" bearing the Department of Labor's certification, unless the occupation is currently listed in Schedule A (see definitions).

- C. You must document the prospective employee's qualifications:
 - If the prospective employee's qualifications are based on education, give INS:
 - a) diploma(s) and
 - b) a certified copy of school transcript(s).
 - 2) If the prospective employee's qualifications are based on exceptional ability in the sciences or arts, give INS evidence of national or international recognition such as awards, prizes, specific products, publications, memberships in a national or international association that maintains standards of outstanding achievement in a specific field, etc.
 - 3) If the prospective employee's qualifications are based on a profession requiring a license or other official permission to practice, give INS a copy of the license or other official permission.
 - 4) If the prospective employee's qualifications are based on technical training or specialized experience, give INS affidavits or published material supporting this training or experience.
 - 5) For physicians or surgeons, also give INS:
 - a) the results of Parts 1 and 2 of the National Board of Medical Examiners Examination, the Visa Qualifying Examination, or Foreign Medical Graduate Examination in Medical Sciences.
 - b) evidence of competency in oral and written English.
- D. The prospective employer must give INS documentary evidence that establishes ability to pay the offered wage (e.g., latest annual report, last U.S. tax return, profit/loss statement, etc.)
- E. Affidavits These must come from independent sources, such as the prospective employee's former employers or recognized experts familiar with the prospective employee's work. The affidavits must:
 - a) identify the person making the affidavit, showing the capacity in which he or she is testifying
 - b) give the places and the dates during which the prospective employee gained his or her experience
 - c) describe in detail the duties the prospective employee performed, the tools he or she used, how he or she was supervised, and any supervisory tasks that he or she performed. A mere statement, for example, that the prospective employee was employed as a baker, is not adequate.
 - d) show the date on which the affidavit was signed

3. How should you prepare this form?

A. Type or print legibly in ink

- B. If you need extra space to complete any item, attach a continuation sheet, indicate the item number, and date and sign each sheet.
- C. Answer all questions fully and accurately. If any item does not apply, please write "N/A".

4. Where should you file this form?

- A. If you are in the United States, send or take the completed form and supporting documents to the INS office that has jurisdiction over the place of intended employment.
- B. If you are outside the United States, contact the nearest American Consulate to find out where to send the completed form.

5. When will a visa become available?

The availability of an immigrant visa number depends on the number of aliens in the same visa classification who have an earlier priority date (date for which visas are available) on the visa waiting list.

Visa numbers are given out in the order in which Forms ETA-750A&B are filed with the Department of Labor or the order in which they are properly filed with INS in Schedule A cases. Since these numbers are limited each year, it is important to make sure the form is properly filed to put the prospective employee on the waiting list at the earliest possible date. To be properly filed, the form must be complete, the form must be signed, the necessary documents must be attached, and the fee must be paid. 6. What is the fee?

You must pay \$35.00 to file this form. The fee will not be

refunded, whether the petition is approved or not. DO NOT MAIL CASH. All checks or money orders, whether U.S. or foreign, must be payable in U.S. currency at a financial institution in the United States. When a check is drawn on the account of a person other than yourself, write your name on the face of the check. If the check is not honored, INS will charge you \$5.00.

Pay by check or money order in the exact amount. Make the check or money order payable to "Immigration and Naturalization Service". However.

- A. if you live in Guam: Make the check or money order payable to "Treasurer, Guam", or
- B. if you live in the U.S. Virgin Islands: Make the check or money order payable to "Commissioner of Finance of the Virgin Islands".

7. What are the penalties for submitting false information?

Title 18, United States Code, Section 1001 states that whoever willfully and knowingly falsifies a material fact, makes a false statement, or makes use of a false document will be fined up to \$10,000 or imprisoned up to five years, or both.

8. What is our authority for collecting this information?

We request the information on this form to carry out the immigration laws contained in Title 8, United States Code, Section 1154(a). We need this information to determine whether a person is eligible for immigration benefits. The information you provide may also be disclosed to other federal, state, local, and foreign law enforcement and regulatory agencies during the course of the investigation required by this Service. You do not have to give this information. However, if you refuse to give some or all of it, your petition may be denied.

It is not possible to cover all the conditions for eligibility or to give instructions for every situation. If you have carefully read all the instructions and still have questions, please contact your nearest INS office.



When the war ended in August 1945, America was more than ready to dump food rationing, swing shifts, and Victory Gardening.

War had been a time of experimentation with foods, as well as deprivation. People were becoming increasingly knowledgeable about the pleasures of the table. The California Wine Advisory Board suggested in 1945 that wine should not only be served as a beverage, but as a cooking ingredient in stew, hamburgers, Swiss steak, even tuna casserole!

Looking back at this eating advice, we can only guess what women were serving to those returning G.I.s, and how the baby boom got started! Margaret Reinhardt

MNCI Board Meeting Highlights August 2, 1995

Fourteen of the 17 members were in attendance for the initial board meeting for the 1995-96 year, with Barbara Jo Davis presiding. Joanne Kendrick distributed a draft of future membership meetings being planned by the Program/Finance committee. Varied weekdays, locations, and formats respond to the new strategic plan for MNCI meetings. Every effort is being made to minimize costs, but Joanne noted that meeting room availability is often contingent upon meals being purchased. MNCI will be co-sponsoring a Saturday morning meeting in January with TCDDA and the Melpomene Institute on health and fitness.

Treasurer Marie Winker will be putting revenue and expense information on to Quicken software. Total savings are currently \$17558.

Lisa Harvey was welcomed as Membership Chair. Karen Holtmeier and Lisa have prepared a membership renewal letter and revised form for current members. A different letter will be sent to former members and people identified during the Spring survey as potential members. Revision of the MNCI brochure will reflect the ideas and direction identified in the Strategic Plan.

Since speaker fees and expenses are for educational purposes, the board approved a motion by Julie Jones to pay those expenses from the treasury, and approved a second motion to insure that meeting costs do not exceed \$10 per member per meeting.

Marcia Hayes reported a net gain of \$2423 as MNCI share from the Foodways conference. Plans for a second Foodways conference are already underway, with sufficient time for MNCI to decide whether or not to commit as a co-sponsor for next Spring. The planning group is reviewing the time of year, location, and financial goals of the conference.

The Nutrition Gram will be published prior to each membership meeting as in the past. Deadlines are usually the dates of the board meetings. An effort will be made to take advantage of desktop publishing technology, including some photos at minimal cost.

Anne Cisek and Ivy Celender will direct their efforts at fund raising, but will also be involved in marketing our meetings, contacting the media, and preparing press releases as part of their development efforts.

Past President Pat Panshin met with the officers of TCDDA and MDA regarding infrastructure issues. Currently she is reviewing MNCI archives and a way to keep everyone apprised of policies, rather than re-visiting the same issue every couple of years.

Upcoming board meeting dates were changed to October 12th and December 7th.


