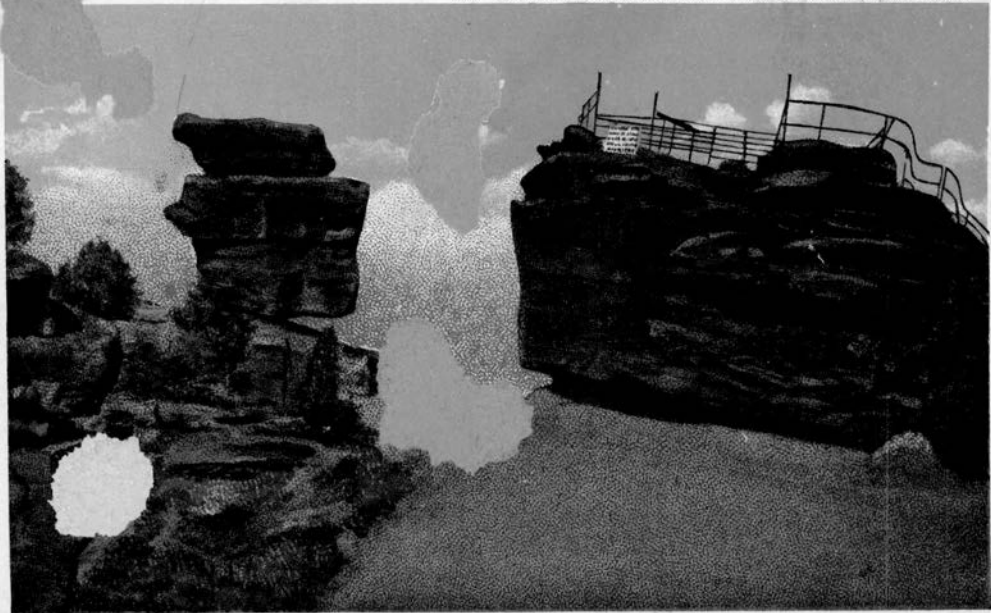

Dear Mom and Dad,

See! What a week! As I told you, I'm "living" with Dorothy Lemaster of Cheyenne and Judy Trinch from Encampment. Everyone's so nice!

Well, I made it through the Primary Elections and am looking forward to the General Election on Thursday. Wish me luck!

I got in the Courts and was a witness for the prosecution in an assault and battery case; and now I am a juror in a civil case.

I played for the talent show yesterday and everyone liked it. Then tonight I accompanied Judy, my roommate as she sang "Garden in the Rain".

We haven't had much free time; as a matter of fact, it is now exactly 11:15 at night! Last night I was up 'til 2:00 in the morning, writing my campaign speech for this morning and making new campaign material. It's the only free time we have.

I went swimming Monday. My hair came out straight, not nappy!

Well, see ya Friday. Oh! By the way, I was elected Election Clerk for my city, Wind River.

June 7, Sunday

The Sommers' came by for me at a little past 12 noon. We arrived in Laramie at a little past 1 P.M. Going directly to Education Building, we were soon through with our registration which consisted of receiving our name tags, assignment to political parties and branch of government, turning in our medical certificates and interest sheets, and assignments to rooms. Everyone was passing out campaign material. The first out-of-town girl I met was Rosemary (Amazon) Williamson, who was running for Governor.

Paula and I left the Education Building <sup>took our</sup> Knight Hall. <sup>wouldn't be open</sup> <sup>we left them</sup> and <sup>luggage to</sup> <sup>Since the rooms</sup> <sup>until 2:00 P.M.</sup> <sup>in the lounge</sup> <sup>Having</sup> <sup>unloaded</sup> <sup>we went</sup> <sup>down town</sup>. Everything, including drug stores, was closed, but we finally found a little delicatessen open. Here we had cokes.

At 2:00 P.M. we had our first general session, at which we were introduced to the staff and received instructions on dress, campaigns, <sup>elections</sup>, etc. Later we signed the Girls State Pledge.

4 o'clock finally came, and we went to the office of Knight Hall to receive keys to our rooms. I made three trips to get all my luggage transferred to the room.



Upon arrival in the room, I found that it was a room for three people, and that my roommates were Dorothy Lemaster of Cheyenne (U.S. Senator) and Judith Trinch from Encampment (County Sheriff). By the time we got unpacked, it was dinner time, and we didn't have time to either change for dinner or make our beds.

We were served about twenty minutes late in Knight Hall Cafeteria. It was a buffet-style meal of Roast Beef, Baked Ham, Baked Beans, Tuna-Noodle Casserole, Fresh vegetable relishes, Lemonade, and Strawberry Cheffon Pie.

By 8:30 we were back at the Education Building for another general session. At this time we held our City elections. We were divided into 5 cities — Basement and first floor was one city, 2 cities on second floor, and 2 cities on 3<sup>rd</sup> floor. I was in Wind River City, as my room was on first floor. Our officials were: Mayor — Jane Hazlitt of Powell; Councilmen — Dorothy Lemaster of Cheyenne, Loretta Simpson of Casper, and Caryn Treug of Jackson; Fire Chief, Anne Sieren of Laramie; Firemen, Michele Elliott of Cokeville and Joni Larson of Sheridan; Police Chief, Kathy Thompson.

of Casper; Street Commissioners, Janet Coyle  
of Cheyenne and LaVonne Frank of Powell;  
City Attorney, Krista Lacia of Cheyenne;  
City Clerk, Janice Hawley of Powell; City  
Treasurer, Janie Klotz of Newcastle;  
Election Judges - Susan West of Laramie,  
Jerra Johnson of Wheatland, and Kathy  
Boyle of Laramie. I had the opportunity  
to be Election Clerk of Wind River City  
along with Ann Bonner of Powell.

We also  
had a party meeting  
and elected  
party leaders

Several girls participated in Chapel  
services each night. The services consisted  
of <sup>organ music</sup> a scripture reading, a hymn, <sup>and</sup> a prayer.

After Chapel, we were dismissed to  
go to our rooms. Lights-out time was  
10:00, but Judy, Dorothy, and I talked  
until about 12 or 12:30.



June 8, Monday

At a quarter to 6 Mrs. Blevins got us out of bed. We had to be dressed and at flag raising by 6:45. Breakfast was at 7:00.

Our third General Session with singing and further instructions was held at 8:00.

Then at 9:00 we went to our first Legislative and Court sessions in <sup>the Biology Building</sup>. In court that day, Judge Vernon Bentley, our instructor, told us about the set-up of Wyoming courts — Justice of the Peace Court, District Court, Supreme Court. He assigned half of us to work on the Criminal case and half on a Civil Case. Everyone was given a job.

The criminal case, assault and battery, was <sup>to be</sup> tried in a Justice of the Peace Court.

Bonnie Murray of Robertson was assigned the job of Justice of the Peace. Others participating included: ~~Pat Fletcher of Mestecher, Clerk;~~  
~~Rosemary Williamson of Rock Springs, Reporter;~~  
Carolyn Thomas of Reliance, Plaintiff; Kay Wiand of Tarrington, Defendant. Prosecuting attorneys was; Sally Hobert of Wheatland, ~~Sally Stoddard of~~, ~~and Mary of Park.~~  
and the defense attorney was Darlene Kortes of Hanna.

The civil case, a car accident, was to be tried in District Court. Patsy Elmer of Evanston <sup>was</sup> suing Gretchen Bower of Morland for \$300 damage to her car. The prosecuting attorney was Jean Coyle, <sup>of Cheyenne</sup> and the defense attorney was June Mahoney of Casper, and the Judge was Marselle Werre of Sundance.

Filing for offices in primary elections was done at eleven o'clock. After lunch, we had a guest speaker, Mr. F. J. De Forest, State Treasurer's Assistant.

Back in court that afternoon, we moved over to the College of Law, where there was a duplicate of an actual court room. Here selection of the jury took place, and the criminal trial got under way with presentation of evidence. Court was recessed about 3:15.

For recreation that day, one could choose either swimming, volleyball, or softball. I went swimming in their beautiful, huge pool. By 4:30 we were back in the Dorm dressing for dinner. Flag lowering was at 6:00, following dinner.

There was no talent show that night, for too many people wanted publicity for the Primary election the next day, so

we divided into political parties and listened to campaign speeches until 9 o'clock, Chapel Time.

This time we all went to bed when we returned to Knight Hall.



June 9, Tuesday.

After flag raising <sup>and</sup> breakfast, we went to our party rooms to hear more campaign speeches, for the Primary Election was to be that afternoon.

Back in court, we completed presentation of evidence in the assault and battery case by lunch time.

A highlight of our afternoon general session was a speech on Americanism and the American Legion by Irving Salmer, Dept. Commander, after which we went back to our Legislative and Court sessions. <sup>To</sup> End our trial, the attorneys presented their closing arguments, the case was given to the jury, and the defendant was found not guilty. Judge Bentley excused us early, for many of us were Election Judges or Clerks, and had to be at the polls by 3:00.

There was a great deal of trouble with the election, for 3 names had been omitted from the ballots, but it was finally straightened out. It was nearly dinner time when we got through at the polls.

After flag lowering, we had our first talent show. Cheyenne participated in the following: a <sup>vocal</sup> quartet, Linda Call, Krista Lacia, Dorothy Lemaster, and Susan Dubois; a dramatic reading by Susan

Larson, and I played a piano solo. At last

After chapel, we did not go to bed. Anne Sien came to our room from the basement, and she, Dot, and I stayed up until 2 o'clock making posters, new campaign material and party tags, and writing new campaign speeches.



June 10, Wednesday

Judy was better today and ate a good breakfast. We had a guest speaker, Jack R. Page, Secretary of State, at our morning sessions. This was followed by all <sup>46</sup> of our campaign speeches for the General Election.

In the court that morning the jury for the civil case was selected.

After lunch we were given a test on Toiyah etiquette, ~~and~~ addressed by a representative from Mrs. Mitchell, the State Auditor, and began the presentation of evidence in our civil trial. For recreation that day I played volleyball.

At the talent show that night, Cheyenne was represented by a dramatic reading by Barbara Jensen, a piano solo by Paula Sommer, <sup>a piano solo by Janet Coyle</sup> and my accompanying Judy Finck's vocal solo.

Suzie Dubois came to our room, and we told Ghost Stories until one o'clock.

June 11, Thursday

I didn't have to go to flag raising today, but directly to breakfast, for I was an Election Clerk and had to be through eating and at the polls by 7:30. After the voting, we practiced the numbers we were to sing at the inauguration that night.

At our 10 o'clock court session, we heard the last of the evidence in the civil case, and that afternoon the jury ruled in favor of the plaintiff.

By the time we returned to the General Session at 3:00, excitement was at a peak, for the election results were to be announced. First, however, we voted on delegates to Girls Nation. This was done by secret <sup>write-in</sup> ballot. At last the election results were ready! They were:

Afterwards the telephones were swamped with girls calling home. Recreation time was devoted to rest that day.

3 Cheyenne girls helped with the flag lowering — Dorothy Lemaster, Sharon Kestman, and B. Taylor.

At 7:30 the impressive inauguration ceremony took place. Justice Parker of the Wyoming Supreme Court swore in the new officers. There were parties

in a number of rooms till after midnight that night.

June 12, Friday

At breakfast, Miss Velma Lindford, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, told us of her recent trip to London to attend a NATO conference.

This was State Capitol Day, so after breakfast we were given an hour to get ready. Our ~~busses~~<sup>Wife</sup> left at 8:45. The state officers rode over in patrol cars, the rest of us on chartered Greyhound Busses. We had a police escort with screaming sirens from the Husky Chief Terminal to the Capitol, where we attended a joint legislative session, then broke up into our respective groups. The Courts group went to the Supreme Court ~~building~~, met the Justices and toured the building.

By 11:30, we were back on the busses and headed to the Plains Hotel for a luncheon with the Boys Staters. Upon leaving the luncheon, we were entertained at a tea given by Mrs. J. J. Hickey at the Governor's Mansion.

Since we had been dressed up all day, we were allowed to wear playclothes after we arrived back in Laramie. Everyone was extremely exuberant, and we laughed and talked all through flag lowering and the talent show in which Jo Ann Schwaier gave a <sup>humorous</sup> reading. Things quieted down a little when Sharon O'Melia gave a talk on Girls Nation.

That night, back in the dorm, no one wanted to go to bed. Why, one girl who went to bed was made to get up and dress. There were parties until 2:30.

June 13, Saturday.

After our General Sessions at which special honors were presented, everyone was in tears, for we had to leave all the wonderful girls and go home. The special honors mentioned were:

# High School Adopts Double Shift Setup

A record shattering enrollment of 1,799 high school students has forced Cheyenne high school to adopt a double shift classroom program. At least 100 more students are expected to register for high school within the next two weeks.

The change in schedule has provided students with an unexpected two-day holiday Wednesday and Thursday to allow programs and schedules to be revamped for the double shift.

Students will re-register Friday and classes under the new schedule will begin Tuesday, Sept. 8, following the Labor Day holiday.

Half the students will attend school from 7 a.m. until noon and the other half from 12:30 to 5:30 p.m., school officials announced yesterday. S. R. Clark, superintendent of schools, said high school students residing in the east part of town and all bus students from

out-lying areas will attend the morning session and those residing west of the boundary line will attend during the afternoon.

The dividing line for the east-west students will be from the airport south on Dunn to Pershing, south from Pershing on Alexander avenue to the Union Pacific tracks, and south of the Union Pacific tracks on Seymour to the south city limits.

Clark said the dividing line splits the student population pretty much in half and is roughly the line which will be used when a second high school—Cheyenne East—starts operating in 1961.

Construction of the second high school, near the VA hospital in east Cheyenne, is just now getting under way. The new facility will

not be completed for two more years.

Merritt Jensen, principal of Cheyenne high school, will lead the east group under the double shift program, according to Clark. J. Neal Large, assistant principal, will head the central, or west group. When East high school is finished the present school will be known as Central high.

The east group was selected to attend during the morning shift because it works in better with present bus schedules, Clark said. It will permit the buses to operate during daylight hours on return trips through the winter months.

Clark said that for this year at least, the two sections would retain the identity of one high school, having only one varsity athletic team, one concert band, one newspaper and year book and integrated organizations.

He pointed out that the double shift program was adopted only after school officials and board members had studied various other possibilities, and that it offers the best opportunity of maintaining the quality of program that the community has come to expect. By using the double shift method, classes will be of a satisfactory size to maintain quality teaching.

According to Clark, all students will be able to carry the normal class load, exclusive of study halls and with a modified physical education program available for all students. Most of the student preparation will of necessity be done at home, although some form of activity program as well as supervised study will be conducted for those who desire such a program during that part of the day they are not in school.

Our dues this year will be \$1.00. This will include 50¢ for any other contributions that may come up during the year. We think this system will be better for you, and our treasurer because we will have to collect only once, and it will be easier to keep our books straight. Dues must be paid in the fall before the Initiation Dinner or District Meeting whichever comes first.

WHO MAY BELONG. Any girl who has had Homemaking in the 8th or 9th grades or is taking Homemaking in Senior High.

## OFFICERS

The Chapter has set up the following standards for its officers which are elected in March, for the coming school year.

Any girl, to be eligible for office, must not have more than 2 absences. Earned 80 points.

She must have been active in the chapter and able to assume responsibility.

President: A Senior or Junior the year she is to be in office.

President and Vice-President: Belonged to F.H.A. at least 2 years. A leader. Have at least her Junior Degree. Time for the office.

Secretary: Should have her Junior Degree or be working on it. Good at taking and reading minutes. Well if she can type.

Treasurer: Should have her Junior Degree or be working on it. Able to keep records.

Student Council Representatives: Will get to Student Council meetings promptly, at the time set for these meetings.

Reporter: Likes to write and will get in news for State Newsletter on time. Also articles in school and local paper.

Song Leader: Likes to lead singing and doesn't mind getting up in front of a group.

Parliamentarian: Knows and/or is interested in parliamentary procedure. Will keep the point system.

Historian: Keeps up the Chapter scrapbook and should have some artistic ability.

Absences: You are allowed 3 absences during the year. If you have more than this, you are dropped from the chapter and cannot belong again in senior high.

Officers who are absent more than 3 times from the Executive meetings will lose their office.

## POINT SYSTEM

In order to be initiated in Future Homemakers of America, a girl must learn the creed, purpose, colors, motto, and earn at least 25 points.

The F.H.A. emblem will be given to the girls who earn 50 points. Fifty points must be earned before receiving a Junior Degree and an additional fifty before receiving a Chapter Degree.

To be a candidate for office, one must have earned 80 points. A senior girl must have earned 75 points to be honored at the senior dinner. The girl with the most points at the end of the year will be honored.

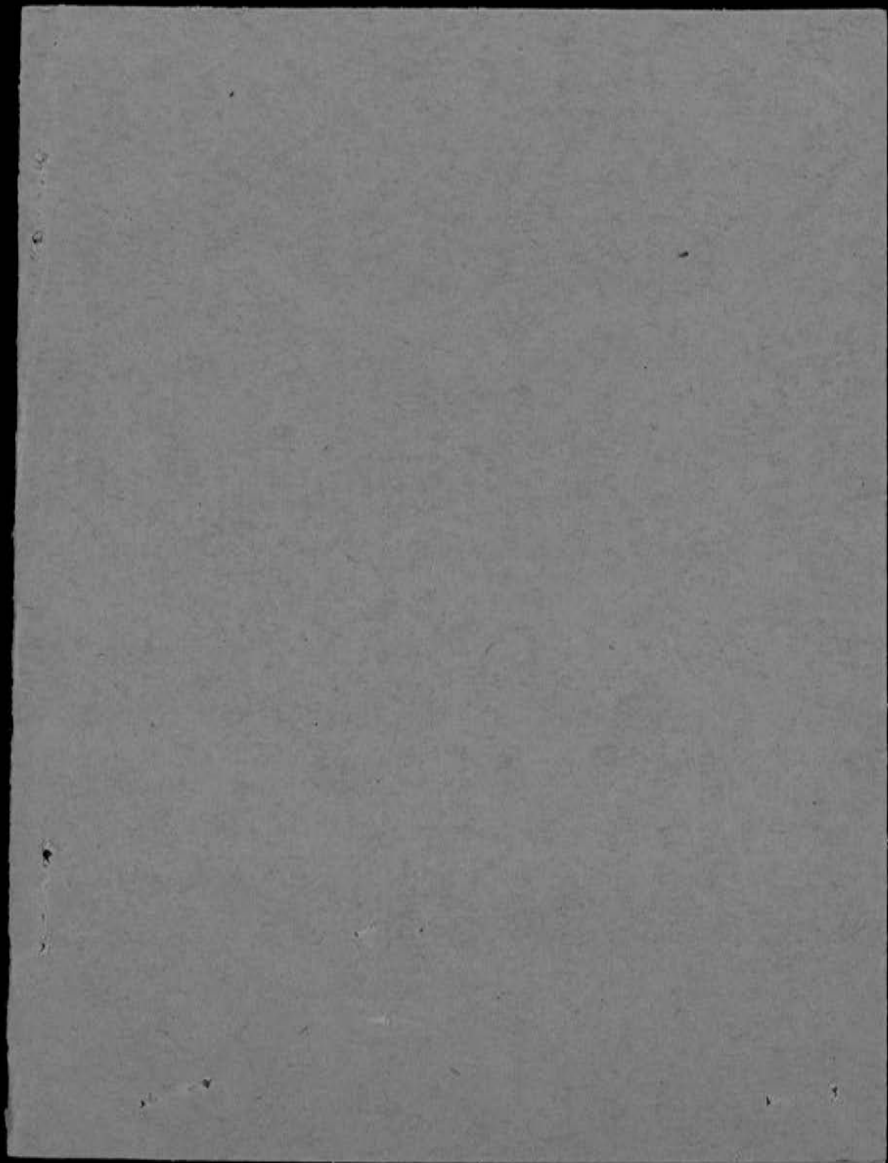

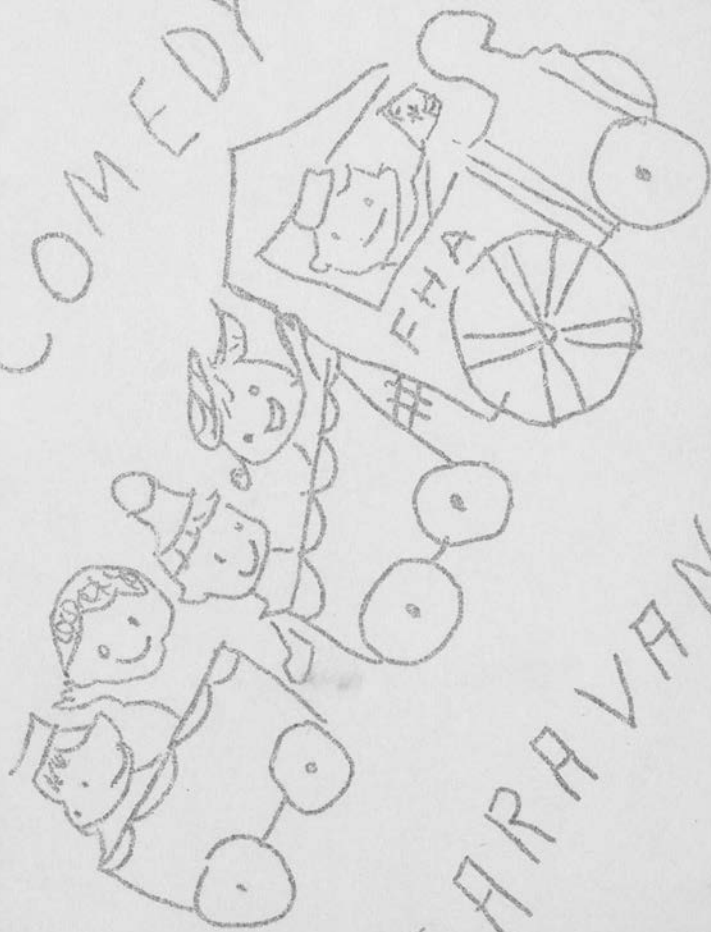

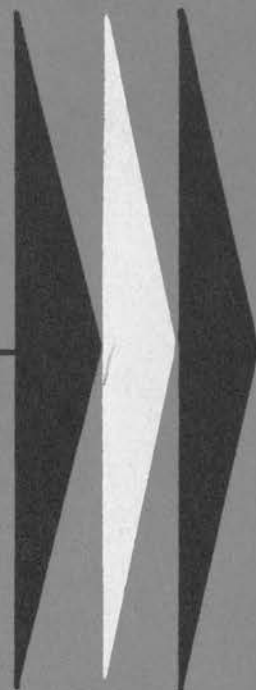

## FOREWORD

This booklet has been planned for you who are Future Homemakers of America. In it you will find information about FHA degrees of achievement; what they are, what their purpose is, and how chapter members can work toward the first two degrees—the JUNIOR HOMEMAKER degree and the CHAPTER HOMEMAKER degree.

When the FHA degree program was first developed, the plan included the idea that as chapter members and advisers had some experience in working with degrees, they would have some suggestions for improving the program. These suggestions were to be used in revising the degree program from time to time.

The materials in this booklet include the suggestions of many members and advisers. Some of you gave ideas about the kinds of changes that needed to be made in the degree program. Others have worked in preparing the materials which include these changes, and still others have given their opinions and suggestions at different stages in the development of this booklet.

The present revision has been limited to the first two degrees of achievement. There are several reasons for this. First, there was not enough time or personnel to work out necessary changes for all of the degrees. Since more FHA members and advisers, work with the Junior and Chapter Homemaker degrees than with the more advanced ones, it seemed desirable to place the emphasis on these degrees. Secondly, it seemed wiser to try out some of the suggested changes with the first two degrees before making changes in the total program.

It is hoped that you will find the materials in this booklet helpful in answering your questions and in offering you suggestions as you work toward degrees of achievement. Please remember, though, that the ideas given here are only suggestions. You MAY already have, or you MAY develop, materials which are better suited to your purposes. The National Office will be interested in successful methods that are being used and in suggestions which will be helpful in a later revision of the material. Therefore, as you use the materials in this booklet will you consider possible changes to be made for their improvement?

Every girl interested in homemaking will find many helpful ideas in this booklet even though she is not interested in working toward an FHA degree. There are suggestions you can use to help you grow as a class member, an FHA member, a home member, and as a person in a school and community.
