As to the work of Hadassah and Brandeis - and your question which basis, a people or a religion, that is the \$64. question and has been for centuries. I would say that the University is like most of . them, sponsored by people of the Jewish religion - it is non-sectarian, 13 non-sectarian, 13 non-sectarian, has a marvellous faculty, and will some day be one of the finest of the smaller universities in the country. Hadassah is a philanthropic organization, originally organized to help the poor, sick, and orphaned who were migrating to Palestine in small numbers - and of course has grown and grown and now helps to care for the 1000 children, saved from death by being allowed to go there - all are orphans whose parents were killed in the furaaces of the Nazis. The Hadassah Hospital and Nurses

training school treats Arabs also - or other groups.
I consider myself an American of the Jewish religion, but there was originally a double tie, that is Jews were of one group who adopted the Jewish religion, and the culture worked out of that, and made it almost a people also - there are many books on this question, and it is an intricate one. As to their being organized, that isn't really so true as it seems. They do organize for charity - that is one of the strongest beliefs of the Jewish faith. You see we have only our own group to draw from, besides contributing to the general good wherever we live - and so since we have to depend on ourselves it has made us more willing to work for those causes.

This National Women's Committee for Brandeis, a chapter of which I have started with others, through the request of Louise Lewisohn, is doing very well here - for such a small community, and only 5 wks since the Nat'l pres. was here to be heard, we already have 47 members, including 9 Life members. We are having 2 meetings next week, also.

We get our charter in April or May and will have membership group meetings every month in 1952 till that time as we want to have a large group on the charter list. After that we will only have a membership drive in the autumn - there is no working program, only 2 mostings a year, and no money-raising activities are allowed to be held. In other words it is to get support for the Library at the U, this is the project, and they don't want to interfere with any of the local organizationsin any of the cities where they organize. The organization is 3 yrs. old, as old as the U, and is already organized in the larger cities, now beginning to come into the smaller centers. It is a very interesting task, but almost more than I had bargained for. Takes such a great lot of phoning and organizing, but hope by the time I return to have it well enough organized, so that I can turn over most of the work to others and just direct

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The Challenge Of Old Habits at S. U. I.

The important thing, as we see it, in the current ruckus at State University of Iowa is not whether the Daily Iowan had a right to delay printing a letter, nor whether the sorority had a right to bar Negroes.

The important thing is that young people on the campus felt strongly enough about the exclusion of fellow students on mere racial grounds to DO something about it.

· Two girls made an issue of it. One resigned from the sordrity presidency in protest, the other wrote a letter of protest to the Daily Iowan. A whole group of others chipped in to get 1,000 copies of the letter printed.

Tracial barriers have started falling it is because individual people all over the country have started giving them a pushmostly young people who refused to accept the defeatist attitude of many of their elders that there was "nothing anyone can do."

The State University of Iowa has been rich in such young people in recent years. They helped the administration ditch its former policy of excluding Negroes from dormitories. They put pressure on the administration to stop asking "race" in application blanks. They put pressure on downtown barber shops and eating houses to stop violating the laws of Iowa by excluding Negroes.

Embarrassing as all this sometimes is for well-meaning people (who were "only doing what everybody has done for years"), it is a very healthy thing. Social customs and administrative regulations, just like statutes and budgets, need constant re-examination in the light of the times and in the light of eternal justice.

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ABOUT AMBASSADORS TO THE VATICAN.

The thousand people who turned up to hear Paul Blanshard in Des Moines last week, the 30,000 people he had spoken to during his present tour, give evidence as to what a hot issue this matter of sending an ambassador to the Vatican is.

Unlike most issues in politics, the thing that really excites people is a question of principle, not the practical aspect of it.

As a practical matter, it doesn't really make much difference. There are some practical advantages in diplomatic contacts with the Vatican, but they don't necessarily require an embassy. There are some practical disadvantages, for that matter, in a lay state having formal relationships with what is essentially a religious organization, but they are minor matters, too.

The chief embarrassment has not even figured in the popular debate, because most people are not aware of it-the custom of the papal representative acting as "doyen" or dean (ceremonial head and chairman) of the "diplomatic corps". especially in Catholic countries.

But all these are trivialities compared with the broad issues of principle which the debaters see.

Many objectors see this as singling out one church for special governmental recognition. They regard it, consequently, as a dangerous breach in our traditional separation of church and state.

To many proponents, on the other hand, this is absurd. They can see no reason for objecting except anti-Catholic bias, which they naturally resent. After all, a number of non-Catholic countries do have diplomatic relations with the Vatican, and small though it be, the Vatican state is certainly as important as some other states with which we maintain diplomatic relations.

Official Catholic. doctrine considers separation of church and state desirable only as a practical matter, under special circumstances. In principle, the Catholic ideal is close collaboration.

Several American colonies had established churches in 1775, and it was because one of these churches was headed by the King of England that we established our national policy-not the principle of separation so dear to Thomas Jefferson and Roger Williams.

* * *

While the American idea of separation in principle has spread widely since, here and abroad, many democratic countries with complete religious freedom still have established churches-England, Scotland, Sweden, Pakistan, as well as backward places like Saudi Arabia, Franco's Spain, and Tibet.

It should be possible to believe passionately in the principle of separation of church and state, and still recognize that other positions are possible. It is possible to favor separation and still want diplomatic relations with the Vatican.

The "wall of separation" is a rather new idea, far from universally accepted. It hardly jibes with the motto on our coins, the references to God in the Declaration of Independence and all sorts of proclamations, the chaplains in our armed services and legislatures. Still, those who favor the "wall" are not necessarily bigots, or atheists, or Communists, or unintelligent, or insincere.

In discussing this issue (so relatively unimportant, practically) we have a chance to test our adulthood in arguing matters of high principle with good nature and understanding. There is a wide range of possible positions on it, all of them "American".

Wednesday b.m Dear Laura Jane: Replying to your letter about my being ill. I am slowly feeling better - seem to tire, but hope to get over that. I notice your remarks about the subject of religion. May I express the thought that the best way to understand religion is to remember that it is supposed to be a way of life, and lead to the greatest good of the soul of man and his treatment of others. Now if everyone were able or willing to live up to the best of religion's teachings, and the best and highest of which each one is capable, - well then it would not be earth but heaven. I think the easiest way for you to retain your beliefs in religion is to find a church where the minister and his beliefs and talks are theclosest in general ideas, beliefs and teachings to your own idea. Otherwise, if you think and study and go about and see and hear self-righteous ministers, biased ministers, narrowminded ministers, mistaken ministers, and all the great variety, you become so confused and frustrated and disillusioned, because verily if the ministers, the teachers of religion, fall so far short of the understanding of what they are supposed to have mastered well I know how I have felt in the past at hearing and seeing how so-called good people think, talk and act, that I have wondered why religion at all? So for your own peace of mind I would suggest that you hang firmly to your own broad beliefs in the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man, and also believe firmly that most of the misguided people are not vicious, merely mistaken or self-righteous.
