



The total compensation paid to First National Bank, which includes Mr. Weck and all others who have anything to do with the trusts, for the year ending November 1, 1956, was \$1478, the next year \$1733, and the year ending last fall \$2080. This compensation is based on a per cent of the value of the principal of the trust andis largely deductible for income tax purposes.

Dear Miss Musser:

I hope that when you read this you will have had a wonderful trip. My wife, Elin, and I thoroughly enjoyed meeting you when you passed through several weeks ago, and, along with our good friends, the Gillespies, we enjoyed the dinner we had together.

Recently I received an invitation from First Congregational Church in Minneapolis to come there for a concert this winter. In mentioning this to Helen I also said that I wished to play one or two other programs on this same trip in other places, and wondered if Little Falls might prove to be a potential sponsor. Helen told me that the group there which handles outside concerts is the Little Falls Musical Arts Club. She didn't know who was head of that group now so she suggested that I write to you about it.

Since I will be coming to Minneapolis anyway, I could of course play a concert in Little Falls for a nominal fee if you felt there were sufficient interest there for such a program. Perhaps you would be good enough to forward this letter and the enclosed material to whomever would make such arrangements. Also we thought that you, being an organist and interested in organ, would be able to suggest which instrument there would be most suitable for an organ recital.

I am enclosing in this letter one of my posters, along with a few programs from last year, and a data sheet telling something of my training and background.

Thank you. And I hope we may have the privelege of seeing you again before long.

P. S. I hope you have been able to make contact with Byron Arneson in Minneapolis and secure his services. I know you will like him.

RICHARD WESTENBURG, ORGANIST "Mr. Westenburg displayed a talent for recital playing which is all too rare. It was gratifying to hear a recitalist who could put across his program." (Pipenotes, official publication, Minnesota Chapter, American Guild of Organists.) After extensive background in piano and only six months formal organ study, Westenburg, then only 17, appeared for the first time in public as an organist playing the great 5-manual organ in the Minneapolis Municipal Auditorium before 4,500 listeners. Also during this first year of study, he appeared several times on a regular series of organ recitals over Radio Station WCAL and was regular organist for a Sunday morning program on Station WLOL. The Peformer's Prize was awarded by Lawrence Conservatory of Music to Richard Westenburg as the graduating senior with the most outstanding talent for public performance. He was also soloist with the Lawrence Symphony Orchestera and Choral Society. "Westenburg is as good an organist as ever (worked) in the interest of art, and surely this is not the last Lawrence audiences will hear of him." (Appleton, Wisconsin, Post-Crescent.) For five consecutive years, Westenburg was invited to be a solist on the Sunday afternoon series of organ concerts at the Cathedral Church of St. Mark in Minneapolis. "Westenburg has a pronounced feeling for the depth and dignity of the organ and a good sense of rhythm, as well as a fine musical imagination and sense of color in registration." (The Diapason, official journal of the American Guild of Organists.) Richard Westenburg's professional experience has been varied: Organist and Choirmaster at First Congregational Church in Minneapolis, from 1954-56. Assistant Organist and Choirmaster at the Cathedral Church of St. Mark, Minneapolis, from 1952-58. (Work limited to summers, 1957-58.) Summer Minister of Music at Hennepin Avenue Methodist Church, Minniapolis 1956-58. Summer Session faculty, University of Minnesota, 1955-58. Instructor in Music, Montana State University, 1956-Director of Music, First Presbyterian Church, Missoula, Montana, 1957-Degrees: B. Mus. from Lawrence Conservatory, Appleton, Wisconsin, 1954. M. 
