On Wednesday, Senator Humphrey will attend and speak at the annual Swift County Plowing Contest at Appleton.

Senator Humphrey will return to Minneapolis Wednesday evening for the banquet meeting of the Committee for Minneapolis' Future.

On Thursday evening he will attend and speak at the Payne Avenue Festival in St. Paul.

Senator Humphrey will speak Friday at the Minnesota State CIO Convention, also in St. Paul.

On Saturday, Senator Humphrey will accept invitations to visit two community festivals in the northern part of the state, speaking at the Karlstad "Potato Day" celebration in the afternoon and then at the "Barley Day" program in McIntosh Saturday evening.

America must learn to give No. 1 priority to conservation of our great natural resources, Senator Hubert H. Humphrey declared in Fairfax today (Tuesday, September 15) while participating in the Fairfax Soil Conservation Day.

"Our heritage of land, water, timber and minerals must not only be conserved, but they must also be replenished," he declared, calling attention to the ever-increasing demands being made upon such resources by the ever-expanding American economy.

"City folks must learn their own vital stake in soil conservation work, and lend every encouragement to farmers trying to protect the nation's future security by being wise custodians of the productivity of our existing farm lands", he said.

Senator Humphrey congratulated Fairfax businessmen for supporting conservation activities by farm leaders in Renville county, and declared such demonstrations as the conservation day plowing contests had "great educational value, for farm people and city people alike".

Senator Humphrey has been invited to Conservation Day demonstrations and plowing matches in many parts of the state this fall in recognition of the support he has given in Congress to soil conservation programs, and his efforts to stimulate interest and understanding in the importance of conservation among urban audiences during his frequent public addresses.
