USE OF AMERICA'S FOOD ABUNDANCE AT HOME AND ABROAD URGED

Use of America's food abundance at home and abroad to raise living standards of the underprivileged and further the aims of our nation's foreign policy was urged by Senator Hubert H. Humphrey last night in an address at Brainerd, Minnesota.

As steps in that direction, Senator Humphrey urged:

1. Adoption of some form of a food stamp plan to raise purchasing power of America's low income families, particularly those already on meager public assistance allowances, to enable them to obtain nutritionally adequate diets.
2. Making greater use of authority provided by the last Congress for sales of U.S. farm commodities for local 'soft' foreign currencies, plus donation of American food for famine relief and other urgent needs.

"America's food abundance can be a powerful force for good in the world, a real weapon of freedom," Senator Humphrey said.

"But linked with greater overseas use of our food abundance must be provision for assuring every American an opportunity to have a minimum adequate diet of basic foods, particularly of milk and butter. Issuance of food stamps to supplement meager public assistance allowances to the aged, the widows and dependent children, and the handicapped would go a long way toward that objective, and at the same time make wiser use than now provided for our temporary surpluses of food products."

Calling for expanded U.S. farm exports, Senator Humphrey blamed "needless red tape" for holding up functioning of the Agricultural Trade Development and Assistance Act of 1954, patterned after the Farm Trading Post Act introduced in the Senate by Senator Humphrey.

"After a year of urging such constructive action, we won approval in Congress for sales of American food for foreign currencies to stimulate exports by private traders, and approval for greater use of non-profit voluntary foreign relief agencies such as CARE for famine relief distribution," Senator Humphrey said.

"But all we have so far is the law on the books -- with no results to show for it," he declared.

"After three months of delay, the President finally resolved an administrative squabble over who was to run this new program by splitting it up between Secretary Dulles, FOA Administrator Stassen, and Secretary of Agriculture Benson.

"It's about time they moved some food into international trade, instead of fighting over who is going to get to appoint more job-holders.

INDEPENDENT BUSINESS, FAMILY FARMING, TRADE UNIONS 'PILLARS OF DEMOCRACY'

Independent business, the family farm, and trade unions are the "triple pillars" of America's free enterprise system, Senator Hubert H. Humphrey declared today in a luncheon address at Staples.

"These economic units and institutions provide the basic strength to our economy, and at the same time are real bulwarks of democracy," Senator Humphrey said. "All three must be encouraged and preserved to keep our country strong."

Senator Humphrey said fair trade laws, price supports, and the right of collective bargaining were the "accepted public policy of our country" for that purpose.

"A free society based on principles of individual liberty and social justice requires respect for human rights as well as property rights," Senator Humphrey said. "Capital and labor are not enemies; they are and must be partners. Agriculture and labor are far from enemies; they are interdependent, and share common concern with each others well-being," Senator Humphrey said.

"Business is entitled to a fair and reasonable profit. Labor deserves a fair and decent wage. Agriculture is entitled to equality of economic opportunity. Our fair trade laws, our price support laws, and our acceptance of the principle of collective bargaining are America's way of reaching such objectives, all encouraging a full and expanding economy.

"Americans all want and deserve an ever-better standard of living that comes with a full economy.

"We can't achieve it, however, by ever being satisfied with things being 'almost as good' as last year."

Senator Humphrey called on independent businessmen, family farmers, and members of trade unions to "work together toward such an expanding economy", deploring what he described as deliberate attempts to "divide these economic groups, and play one against the other -- to the detriment of all three."
