According to some traditions, the Chaplain <sup>of the Senate</sup> was at one time asked whether he prayed for the Senate. His reply was supposed to have been: "No, looking over the Senators, I pray for the country."

I suppose I must expect that my dangerous reputation has preceded me to Harvard. But those of you who are frightened can take courage from Emerson's remark: "Men are conservative when they are least vigorous, or when they are most luxurious. They are conservatives after dinner".

Having been a radical in Washington all week, you are now seeing me my most conservative state. In fact, after a good dinner one can forgive anybody -- even Republicans -- yes even Harvard Republicans —

Travelling today from Washington to New England reminded me of Senator Flanders' favorite account of his first trip in the opposite direction. Senator Flanders comes from a small New England town named Springfield, Vermont. I understand that it is a pleasant hamlet, and that on the occasion of his ~~first election to Congress,~~ <sup>appointment to the Senate,</sup> all of his country neighbors came into Springfield to wish him Godspeed. The spokesman for the community mounted a hay wagon and addressed the Senator-to-be in somewhat this fashion:

"As you leave the familiar, pleasant scenes of rural life here in Springfield, and move on to the Nation's Capital, you can comfort yourself with the certain knowledge that in going from Springfield to Washington you are raising the moral level of both communities." — *I only hope that Both Washington + Boston are better off than.*

My own progress to Washington was somewhat more circuitous, coming as I did -- to use the language of the race course -- out

of South Dakota by Minneapolis. When I got to Washington, I was very earnest about it and was determined to do everything I could

to disprove Will Rogers' old accusation about Congress. You remember what he said: "With Congress, every time they make a joke it's a law; and every time they make a law it's a joke."

(At times during the debate on billboards this week, we were reminded once more that every absurdity has a champion to defend it.)

But like the Germans, my own solution for keeping out of trouble and maintaining office discipline is hard <sup>work.</sup> I am not very Germanic, but I am when it comes to hard work. There was once a very disagreeable Frenchman who described his friends across the Rhine in the following terms:

"Work is not to the Germans the painful obligation and punishment which it often is to others... They go into it with their whole hearts, as if yielding to a powerful mania, and fall back into work as others fall back into

sin."

That passion for work has also permeated German universities, where two generations ago Harvard professors used to undergo spring training. I suppose that had he known about Harvard Law School, Bismarck could have even included ~~you~~ <sup>you</sup> in his famous remark that one-third of the students of German universities broke down from overwork; another third broke down from dissipation; and the other third ruled Germany.

But I suspect <sup>that</sup> here at Harvard you <sup>have</sup> always tried <sup>harder</sup> ~~successfully~~

to emulate Oxford ~~more~~ than Berlin. After all, it was about

Oxford that Sir Max Beerbohm said: "I was a modest, good-humored boy; it is Oxford that has made me insufferable."

I suppose that Harvard like ~~Oxford~~ <sup>H</sup> is a sanctuary in which exploded systems and obsolete prejudices find shelter and protection after they have been hunted out of every corner of the world. In any case, I have heard that you ~~are~~ <sup>too are</sup> a home for lost causes and impossible loyalties.
