Ladies and gentlemen---

This is Senator Hubert Humphrey, reporting to you  
from my office on Capitol Hill, in Washington, D.C.

There are many qualities and characteristics which blend together  
to make a State progressive, successful and full of opportunities for its  
people.

When I think of the strength and the appeal of Minnesota, I think  
first of the skills and <sup>qualit</sup>energies of its people. I think of the great nat-  
ural resources and beauties of our Minnesota lands. I think of the  
growing new industries and business activities of our State's commerce.

But the State of Minnesota---and any society of people---is not strong  
and great only because of population and economic factors. The cultural  
and artistic achievements of its people are <sup>truly</sup> important ~~and significant~~.

As a Minnesotan, I have been proud to report, in the Senate of the United States, a new and impressive cultural achievement in our State--- the opening of the Tyrone Guthrie Theater, in Minneapolis.

In my Senate statement, I summed up my own feelings about this new and outstanding artistic effort with these words:

"(Quote) Here, art and the people have united at the grassroots to serve art and the people."

Most of you already know why we can apply the word "grassroots" to the new Tyrone Guthrie Repertory Theater.

For decades, observers of our society have said that the living theater was dying in America. We have seen the legitimate stage become more and more concentrated in New York City. And in New York itself, the number of Broadway productions has actually declined in recent years.

But the people of Minnesota---and specifically the people of Minneapolis and St. Paul---ignored the patterns of pessimism and banded together to establish a first-class, top-notch repertory theater in Minnesota.
