This is Senater Hubert Humphrey speaking to you from my office on Capitel

The Norwegian Constitution of May 17, 18th is one of the great documents and democracy of human freedom in all the world. Adopted only a few years after our own U.S. Constitution, it draws from the same well of fundamental truth, that just power derives from the consent of the governed. Our two nations, the United States and Norway, have been linked continuously by the same insight and the same aspirations. The people of both nations have been adequate to the trust of self-government. The democratic way has proved itself in every street of war and peace.

In these days of totalitarianism, when large parts of the world are in turmed, and when struggling nations are tempted to find a shortcut to power and democracy by deferring freedom, for the people, Constitution Day in Norway has a meaning far beyond that soundry. It is a memorial and remenstrance to the rest of the world that there is no shortleful/tol/hor/shop substitute for liberty. No one liberty can have it who does not trust it. The Founding Fathers of Norway wrought well. Their inspiration is one of the greatest assets of the Free World, and one of most seems thepes for a peaceful one.
