TRANSLATION OF EXCERPT FROM VOICE OF AMERICA KOREAN EROADCAST, MAY 19, 1965

VOICE: (IN KOREAN) At this farewell ceremony, Vice President Hubert Humphrey made the farewell speech. In summary, his speech was as follows:

TAPE:

(THE VICE PRESIDENT IN ENGLISH) President and Mrs. Park and our distinguished visitors from the Republic of Korea: We want you to know that we have enjoyed your visit immensely, Mr. President. Once again it has reemphasized for all of us the closeness and the warmth of the relations between our two countries. And Mr. President, your visit has given our President, President Johnson, to come to know you better. (FADE UNDER, THEN OUT)

VOICE: (IN KOREAN) President and Mrs. Fark and distinguished guests from

Korea: We want you to know that we very much enjoyed your visit.

Mr. President, you visit emphasized again how close and intimate are

the relations between our two countries. The comradeship established

in the grim days of 1950 and thereafter influenced many of the American

people and helped to establish a special friendship between our two

countries.

Many accomplishments have been made since your visit in 1961. You have made great achievements in housing, agriculture and industrial development and have practically removed malaria, tuberculosis, and other dangers threatening the health and welfare of the great Korean people. And you have expanded education projects. Therefore we want to congratulate your administration and especially on the economic progress Korea is making. We are convinced that Korea can attain complete economic independence in the near future.

Wishing you God's speed, we send our congratulations to you and to the Korean people. (START FADING IN TAPE) At the same time, we send our assurance of continued friendship in the cause of freedom and justice.

TAPE:

(FADE UP THE VICE PRESIDENT IN ENGLISH) Mr. President on behalf of President Johnson and the American people we wish you God's speed on your return journey. We thank you for bringing with you your lovely lady, Mrs. Park. To you and the Korean people we extend our very best wishes and our assurance of our continuing friendship in the cause of freedom and justice.

VOICE:

(IN KOREAN) You have heard a summary of Vice President Hamphrey's farewell speech delivered at the farewell ceremony for President Fark Chung-Hui.
